SIXTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

COUNTY AND CITY OF WORCESTER LUNATIC ASYLUM,

Presented to the County Council of the County of Worcester and to the Town Council of the City of Worcester, pursuant to the 190th Section of the Lunacy Act 1890.

- We beg to submit our Report on the management of the Asylum for the year ended 31st March, 1919.
- 2.—In the first place we have to record that, following upon his resignation of the Chairmanship last year, Canon Coventry this year retired from the Committee, having ceased to be a Member of the County Council. We wish to put on record our appreciation of the valuable services, earnest work and untiring attention Canon Coventry always rendered in the interests of the Asylum during the many years he was connected therewith, not only as Chairman but as a Member of the Committee. Mr. J. D. Harward also retired from the Committee at the same time; and the County Council thereupon appointed Mr. S. Fiddian and Mr. H. E. Purkis to fill the vacancies. The City Members of the Committee remain unchanged.
- 3.—There have been one or two changes in the Medical Staff during the year. We hope now with the approaching return of Dr. Fenton, our 1st Assistant Medical Officer, who has been absent from the country on War service, that Dr. Braine-Hartnell will be relieved of some of the work which has fallen upon him during the past 4½ years and that matters will shortly resume their normal conditions.

4.—The usual Monthly Meetings and 1 Special Meeting of the Committee and the bi-monthly Meetings of the House Committee have been held. The following is a Table of attendances:—

The Engineering and Agricultural Sub-Committees have met as usual.

- 5.—A Commissioner of the Board of Control visited the Asylum on the 11th and 12th December, 1918, and we append a copy of his Report.
- 6.—Consequent upon increased expenditure owing to the War we have been obliged to further increase the rate of maintenance of patients chargeable to the various Unions of the County and City by 1/9 per head per week as from the 1st April, 1919, thus making the rate for such patients 16/11 per week. For out-County Patients (other than those under Contract) we increased the rate to 17/6. For Private Patients to 17/6 per head from 1st March, 1919, and for those admitted since that date to 21/-.

The rate for Patients received under Contract from Birmingham, Montgomery and Hereford has also been increased as from 1st October, 1918, to 18/1 per head per week.

- Deputations from the various Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum and reported favourably upon the management.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

THE COUNTY AND CITY ASYLUM, POWICK,

WORCESTER.

March 31st, 1919.

To the Committee of Visitors.

Mr. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Fourth Annual Report as Chaplain. During the past year the usual daily round of visiting the Wards and outbuildings of the Asylum has been carried on. Special attention has been given to the sick and dying, and the comfort and consolation of the Gospel has been I trust of some help. It is not for man to judge how deeply our Patients receive the Chaplain's ministry, but from time to time there are evidences of real help, which encourage one in the work.

The Services in the Chapel are always bright and hearty in character, yet truly reverent, and much looked forward to, and appreciated.

In no small degree is such a result attained by the earnest and devoted efforts of our Choir of Attendants, and a debt of gratitude is due to them all and to our Choir Master, Mr. Martin, for his painstaking labours.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is regularly administered; once a month to Patients with an average attendance of 42, and twice a month to the Staff. Owing to the number of our Staff being considerably below normal, we have had a smaller attendance, but the average has been 15 at each Celebration.

The Harvest Thanksgiving Service was held on Sunday, October 13th, and as a Thankoffering I was able to send £2 10s. 0d. to the Missions to Seamen.

The signing of the Armistice, which was received with much joy and thankfulness, was the occasion of a very solemn Service of Thanksgiving, when an effort was made by all to be present.

During the past year there have been 164 interments in the Cemetery.

The number of Books issued from the Library have been 700, but as Books are frequently passed from one Patient to another, the number issued does not represent the number of readers.

In conclusion, I take the opportunity of tendering my thanks to the Superintendent, Officers, and Staff generally, for all their sympathy and help in my work.

The attendance of the Patients has been as good as could reasonably be expected.

Besides Sundays, I have visited the Asylum once in each week, and have thus been able to know the Patients intimately and to help them as far as was possible.

When summoned I have attended the sick and administered to them the last rites of the Church.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the Superintendent, the Medical Staff and the officials of the Asylum for their courtesy and kindly assistance in the discharge of my duties.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CONTROL.

WORCESTER ASYLUM,

Powick.

December 12th, 1918.

Since the last visit in November, 1917, the discharges (44 in number) and the deaths (378) have largely exceeded the number of admissions (156), thus leaving on the books the names of only 893 Patients, 370 Males and 523 Females, as against 1,159.

All of the Patients are now in residence, except 2 Females, who are absent on trial. 247 are out-County Patients, 75 being chargeable to Birmingham, 51 to Montgomery, 13 to Hereford, 88 to Rubery Hill, and 20 to Berry Wood; 16 are Service Patients.

At my visit yesterday and to-day, I saw all those in residence and found them to be well and tidily dressed and generally contented, and though on the Male side I received a number of complaints as to the diet and to the absence of tobacco, their behaviour was quiet and orderly and a number spoke gratefully of the kindness with which they have been treated. I saw one Female Patient, recently admitted with severe Influenza. She was found not to be insane, and will be removed as soon as she is able to travel.

The Dayrooms, Dormitories and the Annexes were all in good order and well kept, but some of the large Dayrooms in the Annexes struck me as being too cold—a matter which is receiving attention from the Medical Superintendent.

The general health of the Patients cannot be said to have been satisfactory, and until last August, when the diet was increased, there had been a good deal of loss in weight amongst both Males and Females. Since then the Male Patients have begun to put on weight again, though the Females are still going down. I went through the present diet with Dr. Braine-Hartnell, and he hopes to be able to still further improve it.

During the past two months, 22 Attendants, 20 Nurses, 95 Male and 81 Female Patients have been attacked with Influenza, with fatal results in the case of 8 Male and 5 Female Patients. I was glad to hear that all the Staff made good recoveries. One Attendant, one Nurse and two Female Patients have had Enteric Fever and two Male Patients Erysipelas.

I discussed various matters bearing on the health of the Patients with Dr. Braine-Hartnell, and he made notes of a few points concerning which we thought improvement might be made, especially with regard to the personal cleanliness of the Patients, and to the method of dealing with the foul clothing in the Laundry.

The number of deaths, 378 (195 Males and 183 Females), has been very high, as will be seen from the following Table of death rates:—

The principal causes have been Phthisis, in no less than 174 instances (85 Males and 89 Females) or 46 per cent. of the deaths, Heart Disease in 83 or 22 per cent., and Senile Decay in 38 or 10 per cent.

Phthisis I regret to say has been very prevalent throughout the Institution and on my round I noted that 15 Male and 15 Female Patients were being treated in bed for this disease. These cases were spread all over the building, as is shewn by the fact that they were being treated in no less than 7 Wards on the Female and 5 on the Male side. It appears to me that this must tend towards the further spread of the disease, and I hope it may be possible in future to congregate them in one Ward on each side—the Females being placed in the Ward in the Annexe to which the large Verandah is attached, and to keep them separated, to as great an extent as possible, from the other Patients. I understand that owing to shortage of Staff it is not possible to utilise the Isolation Hospital for this purpose at present.

Dysentry caused two deaths, there being in all 14 Patients attacked. All, except four, of these Patients lived in the Annexe. There is no case of this disease now present in the Institution.

I hope temperature charts will be kept for all sick Patients in bed, and that bottles for poisons will be used, which are quite distinctive from others, both in colour and shape.

The present Staff in the Wards consists of 51 Attendants and 42 Nurses, 22 of the former and 2 of the latter being temporarily engaged.

The Female Staff is much below the normal in number, and great difficulty is experienced in obtaining candidates for the posts. The Clerk, the Storekeeper, the Stores Clerk and the Stores Porter are also away on Military duties, their places being taken by a Girl Clerk and a Patient only, with the Baker to act as Porter. This has necessitated Dr. Braine-Hartnell spending a very considerable portion of his time in clerical duties, and has prevented him from undertaking practically any Medical work, or Ward supervision. He must have been through a most arduous and anxious time, but I hope that the near future will see the return of his old Staff and the end of most of his difficulties.

THE SIXTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Medical Officer and Superintendent.

Mr. CHAIRMAN, MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the Report for the year ending March 31st, 1919. The Statistical Tables are for the year ending December 31st, 1918. The Financial Statement, prepared by the Clerk, is appended.

The changes that occurred among the Patients were as follows:—

These numbers show a decrease of 100 males, 102 females, total 202.

The average number resident was 409 males, 567 females, total 976.

Admissions.—One hundred and fiftyfive patients, 74 males and 81 females, were admitted during the year. Of these, 41 males and 61 females, were Direct Admissions. Thirty-three males and 20 females were transferred from other Asylums.

DISCHARGES.—Fourteen males and 25 females, total 39, have been discharged during the year.

Twelve males and 16 females, total 28, were discharged "recovered," being at the rate of 29.26 per cent. for the males and 27.11 per cent. for the females, total 28.0 per cent of total "recoveries" on Direct Admissions.

DEATHS.—One hundred and sixty males, 158 females, total 318, died during the year, being at the rate of 39·11 per cent. for the males and 27·86 per cent. for the females, total 32·58 per cent. on the daily average number.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.—On January 1st, 1918, there were 20 males and 13 females, total 33, in residence. At the end of the year there were 24 males and 12 females, total 36.

The Criminal Patients remaining at the end of the year were one male and one female.

Accidents.—Two accidents occurred during the year.

One female slipped and fractured her hip. One female fell while taking the tea to the Ward and scalded her face and hands.

Escapes.—Three Patients escaped. They were all recaptured under an hour.

Health.—There were four cases of Typhoid Fever—one male Attendant, one female Nurse, and two female Patients. They all made a good recovery. Influenza has been very prevalent among the Staff and Patients. There were 11 cases of Colitis, 6 males and 5 females. Death was due to this disease in the case of 2 females. Phthisis is very prevalent and was responsible for more than half the number of deaths. I attribute this to overcrowding in the early days of the War and to the reduction in the dietary. The seeds were then

sown and we are now reaping the harvest. Since the dietary has been increased the health and weight of the Patients has improved.

STAFF.—During the year the following Officers were "called up" for the Army: Mr. Jackson, Storekeeper, Mr. Longden, Clerk. We were then left without Clerk, Storekeeper, Stores Clerk and Stores Porter. Your Committee endeavoured in vain to fill the vacant posts. Mrs. Bridges, temporary Assistant Clerk, and a Patient worked hard—without their aid I do not know what we should have done. It was with a feeling of relief, to me at any rate, when Mr. Longden was returned on January 1st, 1919. I am extremely indebted to the Board of Control for their kind help in the matter. Several of the Attendants have been demobilised and returned to their duties. Some have made the last sacrifice. A list of those who "joined up" is appended. Mr. Hales, Superintendent's Clerk, on demobilisation was appointed Assistant Clerk.

My grateful thanks are due to the Staff who were left to us for the way in which they have kept things going during the most trying and arduous time we have ever experienced.

Five members of the Staff were pensioned during the year. I regret that one of them only lived a few months to enjoy his pension. Mr. Leek, a Pensioner, died during the year.

BOARD OF CONTROL.—On December 11th and 12th, Dr. Rotherham, a Commissioner of the Board of Control, visited the Asylum. His Report will be found in Schedule III.

GENERAL MATTERS.—The average cost per head per week for the year ending March 31st, 1919, was 15/104.

In April 1918 the cost was raised from 14/- per week to 15/2.

The following Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum:—Alcester, Birmingham, Kidderminster and Worcester. The Inland Revenue Authorities refunded the Income Tax paid during the last 3 years on freehold land.

The balance in favour of the Farm Account for the year was £2,194 13s. 5d.

In March the Rev. Canon H. W. Coventry, who has been a Member of your Committee since 1883, and for some years had occupied the post of Chairman, resigned. Having been associated with him in the work of the Asylum for most of that time, I realise that he ever strove to promote the welfare of the Asylum and its inmates. He was constant in his attendances, far sighted, and his advice sound and advantageous to the Institution. Personally I am indebted to Canon Coventry for much help and encouragement.

In conclusion, I beg to thank your Committee for their help, advice and also for their practical recognition of my work during the past year.
