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# FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

#### COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

# COUNTY AND CITY OF WORCESTER LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Presented to the County Council of the County of Worcester and to the Town Council of the City of Worcester, pursuant to the 190th section of the Lunacy Act, 1890.

1.—The Committee of Visitors of the County and City Lunatic Asylum beg to present to the Councils of the County and City of Worcester respectively, their Annual Report for the year ended the 31st December, 1906.

2.—We desire to record with regret the loss we sustained during the year by the death of Major Grice-Hutchinson, who was an active member of our Body, and whose services were much appreciated by us. In consequence of his decease Mr. James Ashwin was appointed a Member of our Committee.

3.—In the month of August, our Third Assistant Medical Officer (Mr. Manning), resigned his post on being appointed Senior Assistant Medical Officer to the Cambridgeshire Asylum. In his place we appointed Mr. J. A. Taylor, who entered upon his duties immediately upon Mr. Manning relinquishing his office. Towards the close of the year the Rev. W. Osmund Knight, our Roman Catholic Chaplain, who had, during six-and-a-half years, ably discharged his duties in that capacity, resigned his appointment in consequence of his leaving the district. Pending the expiration of his term of office, the Rev. Father Weld-Blundell kindly undertook his duties, and we subsequently appointed him to fill the

vacancy thus occasioned. One or two other vacancies have occurred in the Official Staff during the year, which we have filled up, we hope, satisfactorily. The Medical Superintendent and other Officers of the Asylum continue to discharge their duties to our entire satisfaction. We annex copies of the respective Reports of the Rev. T. J. L. Davies and the Rev. Father Knight (Schedules I and II).

4.—We have held the usual Monthly Meetings, also Meetings of the House Committee as required by the Lunacy Acts, when every Patient has been given an opportunity of conversing with some Members of the Committee and thus apply to be discharged. Every such application is fully considered by the Committee, so as to avoid the possibility of any person being improperly detained in the Asylum. The Agricultural and Engineering Sub-Committees have also met from time to time. There have been 12 Monthly Meetings and six House Committee Meetings during the year. - 5.—Deputations from Boards of Guardians from the several Unions have visited the Asylum during the year, seeing the Patients in the Asylum who belong to their respective Unions. The Reports made by these Deputations testify to the satisfactory way in which the Patients are treated.
- 6.—The rate of maintenance chargeable to the Unions remains the same as last year, viz: 8s. 2d. per head per week.
- 7.—A Commissioner in Lunacy visited the Asylum on the 29th November, 1906, and a copy of his Report will be found in the Appendix (Schedule III). The suggestion contained in such Report with regard to the condition of the Lavatory is being attended to, so that we hope now there exists no cause for complaint, however slight.
- 8.—One Inquest has been held upon a Patient who fractured his ribs by an accidental fall. The Jury exonerated the Officials of the Asylum from all blame in connection with the Patient's death.
- 9.—We have to acknowledge a gift of a Gramophone and Records from Sir Tollemache Sinclair, Bart. We believe the Gramophone is much appreciated by the Patients.
- 10.—Subject to the approval of the County and City Councils, we have granted Henry Price, who had been Carpenter Attendant in the Asylum for 32½ years, and who retired on account of ill-health, a pension of £59 10s. 2d. per annum.
- 11.—We have met the Committee of Visitors of the Barnsley Hall Asylum upon several occasions with a view to some arrangement being made with regard to Patients to be sent to the respective Asylums, and as to the rate of maintenance to be charged to the respective Unions in the County, and we hope that a satisfactory arrangement will be shortly arrived at. We understand that the Barnsley Hall Asylum will be ready for reception of patients in the Spring of 1907.

- 12.—Proceedings were instituted during the year against the Senior Laundry Maid with the result that she was convicted for theft. The prisoner made certain accusations against other of the Asylum Employees; we enquired into the matter but could find no ground for the same. We have made alterations and improvements in the Laundry which, we think, will reduce the possibility of a repetition of the offence.
- 13.—Some difficulty is still experienced by the Married Attendants in obtaining suitable Cottage accommodation in the vicinity of the Asylum.
- 14.—We made enquiries from other Asylums with regard to the system of Patients' parole, with the result that we have extended the parole to Patients in this Asylum, but they are not allowed to go beyond the Asylum grounds. The Dietary of the Patients, also, we have carefully enquired into, and are satisfied that the food they receive is sufficient and nourishing.
- 15.—The following Table shows the number of Patients in the Asylum at the last Meeting of the House Committee in each of the following years:—

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Worcester County and City Lunatic Asylum,

January 4th, 1907.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in laying before you my fourth Annual Report.

The three Services every Sunday and one every Wednesday, as well as Daily Prayers, have been regularly conducted throughout the year. On Sundays nearly every seat in the Chapel is filled; and the general behaviour of our worshippers at these Services continues to be as usual devout and earnest.

During the Spring, for nearly two months, we were compelled to hold our Services in the Recreation Room, as our Chapel was in the hands of the painters and decorators.

Holy Communion has been celebrated regularly twice every month, once each for the Staff and the Patients-The average number of Communions, made by the Staff, has increased from 28 for the preceding year, to the present present number 41. This increase is chiefly amongst the Male Attendants, and is somewhat explained by the fact that on March 7th last, at Powick Parish Church, Bishop Mylne, at a general Confirmation Service, confirmed 15 of our Staff, whom I had previously prepared.

The Offertories of £3 18s. 10d., received at our Celebrations of Holy Communion, have been divided amongst "The After Care Association," Worcester Ophthalmic Hospital, and Worcester General Infirmary; 10s. 4½d. received in a Missionary Box, entrusted to the care of Mrs. Penny, has been forwarded to the Society for Propagation of the Gospel.

Our Harvest Festival, looked forward to with much interest every year, took place on October 14th. The Chapel was most beautifully and tastefully decorated for the occasion, and the special music, prepared beforehand by our large Choir of 45 voices, was most heartily rendered. The Reverend Barton Allen, Vicar of Kempsey, very kindly preached what has been described as "a simple and effective sermon."

We are very grateful to Mr. Bubb, Deputy Superintendent, who by his musical talent and personal influence with the Choir does so much to make our services bright and hearty; and to the Choir for their loyal and cheerful support of him.

I have attended daily for visitation, and done what I can to impart spiritual encouragement, hope, and cheerfulness, and when our Patients have been discharged (and 114 were discharged last year) I have corresponded with their several Ministers and others, and thus in many instances assisted them to find suitable employment, and to receive that sympathy which they sometimes need to combat public prejudice.

I may mention here that during the last 12 months many of our Patients, with the permission of our Superintendent, have been allowed and encouraged to form friendships by correspondence each one with a member of the "Ladies' Letter Guild"; and these Patients have greatly appreciated it. The value of these friendships is indisputable and full of many possibilities to those discharged recovered.

During the year 97 Patients have died, 39 of whom were buried our Cemetery. The rest were removed for burial elsewhere.

The Library has been open nearly every day, and continues to be regularly used. More Books have been issued during the year than in any one of the last few years; the figure being 1130 or 80 more than the preceding year. The demand is chiefly for light literature. The Books in the open cases of the several Wards have been renewed every four months.

CRICKET.—We played 13 matches during the season, and were fairly successful, losing only three matches.

Having lately had a large part of our ground relaid we can now look forward to more pleasant games.

I am greatly indebted to the Superintendent and his Staff for their usual courtesy and help, which are much appreciated.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to lay my Report for the past year before you.

There has been the usual Service on all the Sundays of the year, and once a month a Mass has been said at 8 o'clock on a Sunday in nearly every case. The attendance has been quite as good as I could reasonably expect, and the behaviour of the Patients has been uniformly good.

Three or four times in the year, on the great Festivals of the Church, I have prepared beforehand and given Holy Communion to as many as were capable of receiving it.

I have visited the Asylum once a week, and been through the Wards and done my best to help the Catholic Patients in the manner most suited to their needs. I have also, whenever summoned, attended the sick and prepared them for death.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the Medical Superintendent, and all the other officials of the Asylum, for their kindness to me in the discharge of my duties.

## [SCHEDULE III.]

# REPORT OF COMMISSIONER IN LUNACY.

Worcester County and City Asylum, Nov. 29th, 1906.

Since the last visit of the Commissioners to this Asylum, in June last year, there have been admitted 382 patients and 230 have been discharged, of whom 162 had recovered, and there have also been deaths of 126 patients. There are now on the books the names of 1213 patients, 539 being males, and 674 females; of these 29 are private cases, and six out County paupers chargeable to six different Unions.

There are now resident in the Asylum 536 men and 666 women; three men and eight women are out on trial, and 45 male patients and 40 female are boarded out, 35 males being at Cotford Asylum, and 30 females at Leicester Borough Asylum, and 10 of each sex in Abergavenny Asylum.

Of the 1202 resident Patients, I have on my visit yesterday and to-day seen all with the exception of one man, who is at the isolation hospital suffering from Scarlet Fever, and have given to every one an opportunity of speaking to me. From the women I received many appeals for discharge, and in Female Ward No. 13 four women, in particular, complained of ill-treatment received by themselves and other Patients in the Ward from the Nurses. I fully went into these charges, and can find no justification for them. The Women in the other Wards were generally free from complaints, but were somewhat noisy, especially in Wards 2 3, and 5, but this is probably due to a great measure to the overcrowding which still prevails in the Asylum, and which is greater on the female side than on the male. The total sleeping accomodation, estimated as in the return made to the Board is for 530 Males and 638 Females, the numbers in residence to-day, as before stated, being 536 and 666 respectively.

The Men were much quieter and contented, and free from complaints other than a few appeals for discharge.

The general condition of all the Patients as regards their personal appearance and dress was quite satisfactory.

I am glad to hear that the Barnsley Hall Asylum will be opened in the spring of next year, which will relieve the present overcrowded state of this Asylum.

The general health of the Institution is very fair, seven men and 12 women being in bed at the time of my inspection two of the latter suffering from Colitis, and one man from Scarlet Fever.

Eighty-one per cent. of the 126 deaths were followed by post mortem examinations. Nearly a quarter of the total of these deaths were due to Phthisis; I hope that it will be found that this high proportion will be lowered when the overcrowding is done away with. There were nine deaths from Colitis, of which there have been altogether since the last visit as many as 71 cases among the Patients, and five among the Staff. These cases have been isolated as far as possible in the single rooms in the Wards, but I understand that the Visiting Committee have not taken any further steps towards the erection of any buildings for the more effectual isolation of those so attacked. The other instances of Epidemic or Zymotic Disease since the last visit have been three from Scarlet Fever, two in June of last year, and one at the present time. Only one Inquest has been held, the verdict of the jury being that the Patient, a man, died from the effects of a fracture of two ribs due to an accidental fall, and acting upon a constitution greatly weakened by General Paralysis of the Insane.

There have been 15 serious casaulties of a non-fatal character; they were all fractures of bones and none call for special mention.

There are no Bed-sores among those in bed at the present time, but 5.5 per cent. of those who died presented them.

From the returns presented to the Board for 1905 the percentage of Epileptics remaining in the Asylum at the end of the year was 16.2, which is considerably above the average in Asylums generally.

The Dinner to-day consisted of potato and meat pie. I saw it in the kitchens, and again in several of the Wards. It was of very good quality, and much appreciated by the Patients.

From the returns for last year the very good percentage of 53 Patients attend the Religious services; for the Roman Catholics, of whom there are at present 54 in number, a Service is held every Sunday, and Mass once a month by the Roman Catholic Chaplain, who is paid for his services. For the Nonconformists, now 185 in number, no special services are provided.

The number of Patients attending the weekly Entertainments was for 1905 rather below the average in Asylums generally, but this is probably accounted for by the small room in which they are held.

The percentage of those who walk out beyond the Asylum Estate is good, and of those usefully employed is about the average.

There is no record of mechanical restraint since the last visit; 59 Patients have been secluded on 199 occasions, for a total of 856 hours.

The Buildings generally are in very good order, the Wards being bright and well supplied with Plants and Flowers, with Books and Papers. Some of the Wards on the male side require redecoration, which I understand will soon be put in hand. I noticed a bad smell arising from the discharge pipes of the washing basins in the lavatories in some of the Wards on both sides of the house; this should be attended to.

Since the last visit of the Commissioners new Decker Ovens and a steam Kneading Machine have been erected in the Bakehouse, and improvements have been effected in the Laundry by the enlargement of the Female Issuing Room, and the erection of a new foul Washing Machine.

The Chapel also has been entire redecorated.

Since the last visit one Charge Attendant has died, and three have left, while four other Attendants have been dismissed, but none for misconduct immediately affecting the Patients. From the returns for 1905 the proportion of Day Staff to number of Patients was rather weak, being in the proportion of 1 to 12.4. The percentage of Attendants with service of under one year was very satisfactory, being 17 per cent., while of those of over five years' service the very good percentage of 47 is also returned.

The maintenance charge per head per week is for Home Patients 8s. 2d., for Out-County Patients 14s., and for Private Patients 15s.

I regret that through the indisposition of my Colleague I have had to pay my visit alone, but I have been much assisted during my inspection by Mr. Braine-Hartnell.

#### THE FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# MEDICAL OFFICER & SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Committee of Visitors of the Worcester County and City Asylum.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the Fifty-Fourth Annual Report, being that for the year ending December 31st, 1906. The usual Statistical Tables for that period are appended. The Financial Statement for the year ending March 31st, 1907, prepared by Mr. Hadley, the Asylum Clerk, is also attached.

The changes that occurred among the patients were as follows:—

The number of patients at the end of the year was the same as at the beginning, as, however, 20 male patients have been boarded out at the Cotford and Abergavenny Asylums, the increase is equivalent to 20 patients during the year. The average number resident was 542 males and 660 females, total 1,202. The total number under treatment was 665 males and 792 females, total 1,457.

Admissions.—One hundred and twenty-five males and 133 females, total 258, were admitted during the year. Twenty-five men and 37 women, as far as could be ascertained, had had previous attacks. This means that 24 per cent. or roughly one-quarter of all the admissions had previously suffered from mental disease. Direct heredity was assigned as a cause in 13.6 per cent., and a taint in collateral branches of the family, as responsible for 17.4 per cent. Intemperance in drink was given as a cause in 12.0 per cent.

Forty three of those admitted during the year have been discharged "recovered." Sixteen have died.

DISCHARGES.—Forty-nine males and 65 females, total 114, have been discharged "recovered," being at the rate of 41.88 per cent. for males and 52.84 per cent. for females, total 47.50 per cent. on the number admitted, excluding transfers from other Asylums. This compares favourably with the rate 37.02 per cent. for all Asylums as set forth in the last Blue Book of the Commissioners.

Ten male patients were transferred on May 2nd to the Monmouthshire Asylum, at Abergavenny, and 10 male patients to the Somerset Asylum, at Cotford, on Nov. 3rd. The rate of maintenance was in each case 14s. per head per week.

DEATHS.—Fifty-one males and 46 females, total 97, died during the year. This is at the rate of 8 per cent. on the average number resident. Phthisis is responsible for 29.9 per cent. This is a marked increase compared with former years, and is in part attributable to the overcrowded state of the Wards. Colitis claims 5.1 per cent., which is a great improvement on recent years. Senile Decay for 17.5 per cent. Pneumonia, which was very prevalent in the winter, for 10.3 per cent.

The following is a short summary of the causes of death.

Post-mortem examinations were made in 78 out of 97 deaths, or at the rate of 80.4 per cent.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.—One male and one female died. One female was transferred from the pauper class, leaving at the end of the year 10 males and 16 females, total 26.

Of the criminal class there was one male at the beginning of the year. Three males were admitted, two of whom, at the expiration of their sentence, were transferred to the pauper class, leaving on December 31st, two criminal patients.

INQUESTS.—One inquest was held on a male patient, who from a fall had sustained two fractured ribs. The jury returned the following verdict: "That the said A.C. died from the fracture of two ribs, due to an accidental fall, and acting upon a constitution greatly weakened by General Paralysis."

ACCIDENTS.—Apart from the accident mentioned above there were eight cases of non-fatal injuries, all due to falls or struggles with other patients. They were as follows:—Three of fractured ribs, one of the arm, two of the leg, and two of the fingers. From time to time, as these occurred, your Committee have been supplied with full details.

Escapes.—Four patients effected their escape. All were recaptured within a period of time, varying from 15 minutes to 5½ hours.

BIRTHS.—Three women were admitted in a pregnant condition, all have been confined; one died, the second has been discharged "recovered"; the third remained a patient at the end of the year.

Health.—One case of Typhoid Fever occurred in a male patient, who made a good recovery, and has since been discharged "recovered." There were three cases of Scarlet Fever; two women and a man. The latter case ended fatally. Colitis has not been so marked. The deaths from this cause being only 5·1 per cent. as against 13·5 per cent. the previous year. I regret the presence of so much Phthisis. The death rate this year from this disease was 12·6 per cent. heavier than last year, and points to the fact that the overcrowding in the Wards ought to be reduced. I would suggest to your Committee that, as is done in other Asylums, we should make provision for the open-air treatment of this disease.

STAFF.—The changes during the year have been numerous. Mr. Manning, the 3rd Assistant Medical Officer, resigned on being promoted to be Senior at the Cambridge Asylum. Dr. J. A. Taylor was appointed in his place. He came in September and has proved himself an efficient and hard working colleague. Miss McKay, the Head Female Attendant, resigned. Miss Alice Brown, the Deputy Head Attendant, was appointed in her place. Miss F. Brown was promoted to be Deputy.

The Rev. W. O. Knight, Roman Catholic Chaplain, resigned his post owing to his removal from the district. The Rev. E. B. Weld-Blundell was appointed in his place.

Mr. Westbury, Assistant Clerk, was appointed Clerk to the Barnsley Hall Asylum—promotion which was well merited. Mr. Jackson, Superintendent's Clerk, was promoted to be Assistant Clerk, and Mr. W. Longden was appointed to Mr. Jackson's vacant post.

Henry Price, Carpenter Attendant, who had been in your employ for over 32 years, resigned owing to ill-health. He was granted a pension of £59 10s. 2d. per annum.

I regret to have to report the sudden death of Thomas Vaughan, Charge Attendant, which took place in the Worcester Infirmary a few days after his admission. He left a widow and several young children. As the law now stands your Committee could not, as they were desirous of doing, grant her any assistance.

Nine Nurses who had been many years in the service of the Asylum resigned, some to take up other work, some to be married, and one from ill-health. The latter I regret to say has since died.

One Male Attendant was suspended from duty and subsequently discharged by your Committee for absenting himself from the Asylum without leave.

One Laundry-maid was prosecuted for theft. She was sentenced to three months' imprisonment. With these two exceptions I can speak well of the conduct of the Nurses and Attendants during the past year.

I am indebted to my medical colleagues for their ever ready help and assistance, and for the interest they take in the amusements of the patients.

The heads of the other departments deserve my hearty thanks for the manner in which they supervise the work allotted to them, and for the interest they display in the welfare of the Asylum.

Commissioners in Lunacy.—Barnard T. Hodgson, Esq., a Commissioner in Lunacy, visited the Asylum on November 28th and 29th. His Report, which was considered satisfactory, will be found in Schedule III.

General Matters.—The charge per patient per week was 8s. 2d.

The average cost per head per week was 7s. 9d. for the year ending March 31st, 1907.

The average cost per head per week, including interest on loans, repayment of capital and sums granted by the County and City Councils for General Repairs, was 9s. 0\frac{1}{8}d.

During the year the ovens in the Bakehouse were entirely rebuilt by Hunt, of Leicester. A Kneader and Engine were also placed in the Bakehouse. The result has been on the side of economy and an improvement in the quality of the bread.

A machine for rinsing the foul clothes has been placed in the Laundry. It has proved most useful and efficient.

Owing to the overcrowed state of the issuing room in the Laundry on the female side, the same has been enlarged. Another maid has been added to the Laundry Staff, with certain special duties.

A wall pump has been placed in the Engine-house for the purpose of feeding the boilers and to relieve the Donkey pump which requires repairs.

Sir Tollemache Sinclair, Bart., has kindly given a Graphophone and 36 records for the use of the patients. The same has been much appreciated.

I regret to have to record the death of Major Grice-Hutchinson, a Member of the Committee. I would wish to associate myself with your Committee in the expressions of regret at the loss sustained by the Asylum through his death.

The following Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum:—Droitwich, Dudley, Kidderminster, King's Norton, Martley, Shipston-on-Stour, Stourbridge, Tewkesbury, West Bromwich, Worcester. Some Guardians apparently do not think it necessary to visit their patients except at long intervals. This, I must say, I consider a mistake, and would urge all Guardians to visit their patients at least once a year.

The Farm shows a profit of £669 9s. 4d. on the year.

In conclusion I beg to tender my thanks to your Committee for the kind consideration and assistance which you have always afforded me.

### Conditions under which Private Patients are admitted into the Asylum.

- I. The charge for Patients coming from, or having a settlement in, some Union in the County or City of Worcester is 15s. a week, payable quarterly in advance.
- II. The charge for maintenance covers all ordinary expenses, but in cases of prolonged bodily disease an additional weekly charge may be made to cover the cost of special medicines and stimulants.
- III. In the event of the death or discharge of any Private Patient before the maintenance moneys, paid in advance, have been exhausted by effluxion of time, the balance will be refunded to the person who made the last payment in respect of such Patient.
- IV. The Patients may wear their own clothes, but will have the same accommodation in all respects as the other Patients.
- V. Application for the admission of a Patient on the private class must be made in the first instance to the Medical Officer at the Asylum, who will supply all the various blank forms for the order and medical certificates.
- VI. The excess charge made for Private Patients beyond the ordinary pauper weekly rate of maintenance is carried to the credit of the Repairs Account.
