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# FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

# COUNTY AND CITY OF WORCESTER LUNATIC ASYLUM,

Presented to the County Council of the County of Worcester and to the Town Council of the City of Worcester, pursuant to the 190th section of the Lunacy Act, 1890.

- The Committee of Visitors of the above Asylum beg to present to the Councils their Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1907.
- 2.—It is with deep regret that we have to record the death of our esteemed colleague, Ald. Albert Buck, whose sound judgment, ready advice, and help were most valuable, and his loss will be long felt and regretted.
- 3.—Several changes in the Medical Staff have occurred during the year in consequence of the retirement through continued ill-health of Dr. Bubb, our first Assistant Medical Officer, and the retirement of Dr. Veitch, the second Assistant Medical Officer, who had arranged to take up private practice in New Zealand, with the ultimate result that we appointed Dr. Taylor to be first Assistant Medical Officer, Dr. Fenton as second Assistant, and Dr. Thomson, as third Assistant. Our

Medical Superintendent, Dr. Braine-Hartnell, still continues with us, and we desire to express again our thanks to him for his services during the past year. The other Officers of the Asylum continue to discharge their duties to our satisfaction.

- 4.—We append copies of the Reports of the Rev. T. J. L. Davies and the Rev. E. B. Weld-Blundell, who continue their spiritual ministrations to our Staff and Patients.
- 5.—The following is a table of attendances of the Committee of Visitors at the Monthly and Special Meetings, and also at the House Committee Meetings, of which there have been 12 Monthly, 2 Special, and 6 House Committee during the year:—

The Engineering and Agricultural Sub-Committees have also met as occasion required.

6.—Deputations of Guardians from the various Unions have visited their respective Patients from time to time, and have reported favourably on their treatment and on the general management of the Asylum. The rate of maintenance remains at 8s. 2d. per head per week.

- 7.—Two Commissioners in Lunacy made their annual visit on the 25th and 26th February, 1907, and reported very favourably on the care bestowed on the Patients. We append a copy of their report.
- 8.—The question of fire extinguishing raised in the Commissioners' Report has received our serious consideration, and we are about to expend a sum not exceeding £1,200 in the purchase of a fire engine and other appliances, and in carrying out the necessary work incident thereto. This, when established, will, we believe, fully satisfy the requirements of the Commissioners, and relieve us and those upon whom the responsibility of the welfare of the Patients more immediately depends, from all anxiety on account of danger from fire. The work will be carried out by Messrs. Merryweather and Co.
- 9.—Four Inquests on Patients have been held during the year. In two instances the verdict was death from natural causes; of the other two, one was from injuries received from falling, and the other was from being pushed down by another Patient. The Jury at each Inquest stated that they were of opinion that the deceased persons had been properly and skilfully treated, and that no blame attached to anyone connected with the Asylum.
- 10.—We granted to Dr. Bubb, on his retirement, a pension of £98 per annum, and to George Lewis, late a Charge Attendant, a pension of £36 11s. 6d. per annum, and these grants have received the sanction of your respective Councils.
- 11.—On the opening of the Asylum at Barnsley Hall we entered into a Contract with the Committee of that Asylum for the reception there of 200 Patients (100 of each sex) from this Asylum, at the rate of 14s. per head per week, thus enabling us to receive back at our Asylum the Patients boarded out at Cotford, Leicester, and Abergavenny.
- 12.—We have now had the Asylum connected with the Telephone Exchange, which we hope will greatly facilitate the management.



# CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

WORCESTER COUNTY AND CITY ASYLUM,

31st December, 1907

The Visiting Committee of the Worcester County and City Asylum.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,-

I herewith submit to you the Fifth Annual Report of my chaplaincy for the year ending December 31st, 1907.

The Religious Services have been continued as in last year; on every Sunday three services, and on all other days one service, have been regularly held.

The Attendances at all these services have been very good.

Holy Communion has been celebrated in the Chapel twice every month, and more often when the great Festivals have occurred. It is encouraging to note that the number of communions amongst the Staff constitutes a record.

On February 27th two members of the Staff, previously prepared by me, were confirmed by Bishop Mylne at Leigh Parish Church. The total amount of the Offertories received at these Holy Communion Services was £5 1s. 3½d., and this sum has been divided amongst the "After-Care Association," Worcester Ophthalmic Hospital, and Worcester General Infirmary.

Our Harvest Festival was held on October 6th, when the Rev. G. F. Williams, Rector of St. Nicholas, Worcester, was kind enough to come and preach. The Chapel on this, as on all other great Festivals, was very beautifully and appropriately decorated. The whole service, with its special music, was most heartily rendered.

During Lent the Revs. Conan Davies, C. Hughes, and A. M. Manley, were our special preachers.

Our Choir practices, always well attended, have been held on every Thursday throughout the winter months only, but, since the resignation of Mr. Bubb, Deputy Superintendent, under the auspices of Mr. Leek, one of our Attendants. I feel thankful to Mr. Leek and the Choir for their lively interest and loyal co-operation with me. Mr. Bubb's resignation was a great loss to us.

I have attended daily for Visitation, and, as far as possible, ministered as I should in an ordinary parochial charge.

During the twelve months 86 Patients have been discharged recovered, and I have commended each one to his or her respective Minister at home.

The Ladies of the "Letter Guild" continue to take a kindly interest, more especially in our friendless Patients, and have sent gifts of money, etc., to them, which have been delivered with the Superintendent's approval.

The Library has been opened daily. Thirty books having been recently added, brings the total number to 1,369. Fewer books have been issued than in last year, which I account for by the transfer of a great many of our Patients to Barnsley Hall Asylum.

The books in the Ward cases have been periodically renewed.

125 Patients have died, 59 of whom were buried in our Cemetery; the rest were removed for burial elsewhere.

Twelve Cricket Matches have been played. Our team won 10 of them.

I desire to record my appreciation and thanks to you for the favour you have lately shown me, and to the Superintendent and the Staff for their kind help and interest in my work.

# ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Chairman and Visiting Committee of the Powick Asylum.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,-

I have the honour to submit to you my Report for the past year.

A Service has been held on all the Sundays of the year, usually at 11.45, but once a month Mass has been celebrated at 8 oclock. The attendance of the Patients has been as good as could reasonably be expected, and their behaviour during the Services has been quite satisfactory.

Three or four times a year, on the great Festivals of the Church, I have administered the Sacraments, and admitted to Holy Communion as many as I considered capable of receiving it.

Besides Sundays, I have visited the Asylum once in the week, and have done what I could to help the Catholic Patients according to their needs. When summoned I have attended the sick, prepared them for death, and administered to them the last rites of the Church.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the Superintendent, the Medical Staff, and all the other officials of the Asylum, for their courtesy and kindly assistance in the discharge of my duties.

# REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Worcester County and City Asylum, 26th February, 1907.

We have during yesterday and to-day paid our annual visit to this Asylum, which continues to be maintained in proper order.

We found the Wards warm and comfortable, care being taken to render bright and pleasant the older day rooms and corridors.

The Dormitories and bedding were also very clean and in good condition. Some of the Wards, however, were overcrowded, more especially Male 3 Ward, in which there are a good many dangerous and troublesome patients, and only four Attendants to preserve order. This fact points to the urgent need of the additional accommodation, which will shortly be provided by the opening of the new Asylum—Barnsley Hall.

There are on the books of the Institution the names of 1,187 Patients, in the proportion of 529 Males to 658 Females. Of these, 27 are private patients, and one woman is chargeable to Newcastle-on-Tyne. As many as 84 patients are now boarded out at the Leicester Borough, Cotford, and Abergavenny Asylums. We have seen all the patients in residence, eight being absent on trial, and can report favourably on their dress and personal tidiness. With a few exceptions among the more troublesome patients, the behaviour of the inmates was quiet and orderly.

No complaints were made to us calling for special mention.

From the Returns made to our Office, we learn that as many as 16.7 per cent. of the patients were suffering from Epilepsy at the end of last year. The attendance at the Religious Services for the past year was very good—a fair proportion of patients being also present at the weekly Entertainments. The record of employment is also satisfactory.

The dinner, which we saw served to the patients in the Wards yesterday, consisted of Irish stew and bread, and appeared to be relished by the patients.

In this connection we would draw attention to the fact that, save in one or two instances, no lunch is provided in this Asylum for the workers. We cannot but think that this regulation might properly be altered, and we make this suggestion, knowing that the provision of lunch as an additional inducement to work has proved to be most satisfactory in its results in the great majority of the Asylums in the country.

Since the Institution was last visited, 53 patients have been admitted, 38 discharged or removed, of whom 26 had recovered, and 41 have died.

No inquest has been held, and the deaths have all been the result of natural causes, which, it is satisfactory to find, were in 88 per cent. verified by post-mortem examination.

No patient at death presented a bedsore, which is creditable to the nursing. Nearly 20 per cent. of the deaths were due to Phthisis.

There have been six serious casualties, namely, five fractures of bones and a dislocation of the shoulder. They were all the result of natural causes exce<sub>t</sub> t in one instance, in which a man sustained a fracture of two ribs through the violence of another patient.

Dysentery, which has been prevalent in this Asylum for some time past, and has given rise to trouble and anxiety, has attacked 13 patients since the last visit. But we can report that at present only two patients are suffering from the disease, and that apart from these the health of the Institution is satisfactory.

Altogether we found 10 men and 31 women in bed, but most of them were either cases of senile debility or patients with colds.

There is no record of the employment of mechanical restraint, but 15 patients have been secluded on 29 occasions for 138 hours in all. The staff of Attendants and Nurses is numerically weak, there being only one Attendant to every 12.4 patients, instead of one Attendant to every 10 patients—the proportion which our Board regards as adequate. The record of service is very satisfactory, only 12 per cent. of the men and 16 per cent. of the women having records under one year, while as many as 58 per cent. of the former and 28 per cent of the latter have been in the service of the Asylum more than five years.

We gave yesterday an alarm of fire, which was promptly responded to by the Brigade, but we were disappointed to notice that the pressure of water appeared less than formerly—two jets of water hardly reaching the crest of the roof of the lower buildings. We venture to suggest to the Committee that this matter demands very serious consideration.

The state of the Case Books and other Medical records is creditable to the Staff.

### THE FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# Medical Officer & Superintendent.

To the Committee of Visitors of the Worcester County and City Asylum, at Powick.

### MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,-

I have the honour to present the Report for the year ending December 31st, 1907. The Financial Statement for the year ending March 31st, 1908, for which Mr. Hadley, the Asylum Clerk, is responsible, is also attached. You will observe that the Statistical Tables, which are appended, are different from those we have usually used. They are based on the recommendations of the Medico-Psychological Association. By their use it is hoped that facts concerning insanity may be systematically grouped together, and our knowledge of the causation of mental disease increased, and the curative treatment of patients thereby benefited.

The changes that occurred among the Patients were as follows:—

The number of patients at the end of the year was 175 less than at the beginning. Eighty-one patients boarded out

at Cotford, Leicester, and Abergavenny were returned in August, October, and November. One woman who was too ill to remove still remains at Abergavenny. In August 100 male and 100 female patients were transferred to the new County Asylum at Barnsley Hall, near Bromsgrove, since which date nearly all the recent cases have been sent to Barnsley Hall, with the exception of those from Dudley and Worcester. The average number resident was 498 males and 598 females—total 1,096. The total number under treatment was 665 males, 792 females—total 1,457.

Admissions.—One hundred and thirty-one males and one hundred and twenty-seven females, total two hundred and fifty-eight, were admitted during the year.

As to the causation of the mental disease in the direct admissions, which numbered 75 males, 80 females, total 155, we find that Heredity was assigned as the cause in 21.3 per cent. Intemperance in drink was given as a cause in 13.5 per cent., an increase in this respect of 1.5 per cent over last year. Epilepsy in 9 per cent. and Senility in 6.4 per cent. Thirty-seven persons, 17 males, 20 females, out of the 155 direct admissions had previous attacks—a percentage of 23.87.

Twenty-four of those admitted during the year have been discharged "recovered." Twenty-one have died. Two male patients were admitted with injuries, self-inflicted.

DISCHARGES.—Thirty-seven males and thirty-three females—total seventy—have been discharged "recovered." This is at the rate of 49.33 per cent. for males and 40 per cent. for females, total 44.51 per cent. on the admissions, excluding transfers from other Asylums.

In July last 100 males and 100 females were boarded out at the new County Asylum at Barnsley Hall. The charge was at the rate of 14s. per week per head. One woman was discharged as "Not Insane."

Deaths.—Fifty males and seventy-five females, total one hundred and twenty-five, died during the year. The number of female deaths is the highest since the opening of the Asylum. The percentage of deaths on the average number resident is 10 for males and 12.5 for females—total 11.4—which is the highest since 1886.

Pneumonia is responsible for 11.2 per cent. Phthisis for 15.2 per cent., as compared with 29.9 per cent last year. Colitis for 3.2 per cent., as against 5.1 per cent.; Senile Decay for 15.2 per cent. The diminution in the death-rate from Phthisis and Colitis is a gratifying feature, and may be, in part, attributed to the overcrowding of the Wards being lessened by the transfers to Barnsley Hall. Full details of the causes of death will be found in Table D2.

Post-mortem examinations were made in 110 out of 125 deaths, or at the rate of 88 per cent.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.—On the 1st January, 1907, there were 10 males, 16 females—total 26. During the year two males and two females were admitted. Two males were transferred from the pauper class. Two males were discharged, one male and two females died, leaving on December 31st, 11 males and 16 females—total 27.

Of the criminal class there were two males on January 1st. Six males were admitted during the year. One was discharged "recovered"; three transferred, at the expiration of their sentence, to the pauper class; two died; leaving at the end of the year two criminal patients.

INQUESTS.—Six inquests, two on male and four on female patients, have been held at the Asylum. In each case a verdict was given in accordance with the medical evidence.

ACCIDENTS.—Apart from the three cases with injuries on which inquests were held, there have been 16 non-fatal injuries, all due to accidental falls or struggles with other patients, with the exception of one case, in which a male patient sustained a fractured rib in a struggle with an

attendant, whom he had attacked with homicidal intent. They were as follows: One of fractured skull, two of the nose, one of the collar-bone, four of the arm, five of the ribs, one of the hip, one of the thigh, and a dislocated shoulder. As each arose your Committee were acquainted with full details.

Escapes.—Seven patients escaped. All were recaptured in from 20 minutes to 20 hours.

BIRTH.—One woman who was admitted in a pregnant condition was confined. She has since been discharged "recovered."

Suicide by hanging. The Coroner's Jury returned the following verdict: "Suicide whilst of unsound mind." If we had not seen the account in the daily paper we would have remained in ignorance of the facts of the case. Two male patients made determined attempts at self-destruction. Both, I am glad to say, made a good recovery from their injuries. Both are still in the Asylum.

Health.—The health of the patients has been better during the last year. The deaths from and cases of Colitis and Phthisis have been fewer in number. There was one case of Typhoid Fever, in a male patient, which ended fatally. One male attendant had an attack of Diphtheria, from which he made a good recovery. There have been four cases of Erysipelas. I would suggest to your Committee that provision be made for the open-air treatment of Phthisis.

Staff.—The past year has seen many changes in the Medical and Nursing Staff. I much regret to record the resignation, in August last, of Mr. W. Bubb, Senior Assistant and Deputy Superintendent, through ill-health, after upwards of 13 years' service. He showed such high principle in all he undertook and did that he proved himself a most reliable, efficient, and loyal supporter. His influence for good was most marked. By his resignation I have lost not only a most dependable colleague, but a firm friend, and the Committee of Visitors an officer whom it will not be easy to replace. He was granted a pension of £100 a year by your Committee. This was reduced to £98 by the County Council.

Dr. Veitch, Second Assistant Medical Officer, resigned in April, after upwards of eight years of good service. He left to take up private practice in New Zealand. He carried with him the best wishes of the Staff and Patients.

Dr. J. A. Taylor was first appointed to be Second Assistant, and then promoted to be Senior Assistant and Deputy Superintendent. Dr. Fenton was first appointed as Third Assistant, and subsequently became Second Assistant. Dr. J. H. Thomson, who had been some time at the Earlswood Asylum, was, in November, appointed Third Assistant.

Miss F. Brown, Deputy Head Female Attendant, resigned to be married. Miss E. Hanks, who had charge of one of the Hospital Wards, was appointed in her place.

George Lewis, charge attendant, resigned through ill-health. He was granted a pension of £36 11s. 6d. per annum. Many changes took place among the nurses and attendants. Various were the reasons for leaving. Four left to go to the New Asylum at Barnsley Hall.

I am indebted to the heads of the various departments for their help, support, and the interest they take in the work and the recreation of the patients.

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.—Dr. E. Marriott Cooke and H. F. Giffard, Esq., two of the Members of the Board of the Commissioners in Lunacy, visited the Asylum on February 25th and 26th. Their Report will be found in Schedule III. Their suggestion as to the improvement in the means for protection against fire has been considered by your Committee, who have had expert opinion from Messrs. Merryweather and Sons. As a result of their report an application has been made to the County and City Councils for a grant not exceeding £1,200 for the purpose of better protecting the Asylum and its inmates from an outbreak of fire.

General Matters.—The charge per patient per week was 8s. 2d.

The average cost per head per week for the year ending March 31st, 1908, was 8s. 68d.

The average cost per head per week, including interest on loans, repayment of capital, and sums granted by the County and City Councils for General Repairs was 10s. 03d.

During the year the Asylum has been placed in telephonic communication with Worcester.

Several of the Wards have been re-floored with pitchpine, a matter that had required attention for some time past, but, owing to the overcrowded state of the Asylum, it was impossible to carry out till the removal of patients to Barnsley Hall.

The well in the Engine House has been cleaned out. This was undertaken by Messrs. J. Wood and Son, Worcester.

Several Fire Extinguishers, Harden Star and Minimax, have been purchased and placed in the places most liable to fire.

The following Board of Guardians have visited the Asylum: Cleobury Mortimer, Bromsgrove, Dudley, Evesham, Kidderminster, King's Norton, Martley, Pershore, Solihull, Stourbridge, Upton-on-Severn, Worcester. Their Reports expressed satisfaction with the condition and treatment of their patients.

The Farm shows a profit of £1,340 19s. 7d. on the year.

### Conditions under which Private Patients are admitted into the Asylum.

- I. The charge for Patients coming from, or having a settlement in some Union in the County or City of Worcester is 15s. a week, payable quarterly in advance.
- II. The charge for maintenance covers all ordinary expenses, but in cases of prolonged bodily disease an additional weekly charge may be made to cover the cost of special medicines and stimulants.
- III. In the event of the death or discharge of any Private Patient before the maintenance moneys, paid in advance, have been exhausted by effluxion of time, the balance will be refunded to the person who made the last payment in respect of such Patient.
- IV. The Patients may wear their own clothes, but will have the same accommodation in all respects as the other Patients.
- V. Application for the admission of a Patient on the private class must be made in the first instance to the Medical Officer at the Asylum, who will supply all the various blank forms for the order and medical certificates.
- VI. The excess charge made for Private Patients beyond the ordinary pauper weekly rate of maintenance is carried to the credit of the Repairs Account.
