# FIFTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

#### OF THE

#### COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

#### OF THE

#### COUNTY AND CITY OF WORCESTER LUNATIC ASYLUM,

Presented to the County Council of the County of Worcester and to the Town Council of the City of Worcester, pursuant to the 190th Section of the Lunacy Act, 1890.

1.—The Committee of Visitors of the above Asylum beg to present to the Councils their Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1908.

2.—Dr. Braine-Hartnell continues to discharge the duties of Medical Superintendent to our satisfaction. In July last Dr. Taylor, the Senior Assistant Medical Officer, resigned, and we appointed in his place Dr. Fenton, who had up to that time been our second Assistant Medical Officer. We promoted Dr. Thomson to fill the vacancy caused by the promotion of Dr. Fenton. We experienced some little difficulty in obtaining a suitable third Assistant Medical Officer, but eventually we appointed Dr. Chella Mary Hankin to that office, and we trust that the experiment of appointing a lady will be satisfactory.

3.—We append copies of the Reports of the Rev. T. J. L. Davies and the Rev. E. B. Weld-Blundell, our Chaplains.

4.—The following is a table of attendances of the Committee of Visitors at the Monthly and Special Meetings and also at the House Committee Meetings. The numbers of Meetings held during the year are :—12 Monthly, one Special, six House Committee.

The Engineering and Agricultural Sub-Committees have also met as occasion required.

5.—Deputations of Guardians from the various Unions have visited the Asylum during the year and have reported tavourably on the care and attention given to Patients. The rate of maintenance remains at 8s. 2d. per head per week.

6.—The Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum in June last and we append a copy of their report.

7.—The Asylum has now been equipped with a Fire Engine, and other Fire Appliances, at a total cost of £1,017 9s. 11d.

8.—Only one inquest has been held during the year. This was necessary owing to a Patient (who was of advanced years) accidentally falling and sustaining a fracture of the left thigh. 9.—We have had under careful consideration the question of the lighting of the Asylum. The present system of lighting is not only very inadequate for the requirements of the Asylum, but is also out-of-date and costly in its working. We are about to expend a sum not exceeding £1,850 in the erection of a new Gas Holder, and supplying and fixing new machinery and fittings in connection therewith.

10.—The following Table shows the number of Patients in the Asylum at the last meeting of the House Committee in each of the following years :—

### CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

WORCESTER COUNTY AND CITY ASYLUM, DECEMBER 31st, 1908.

The Visiting Committee of the Worcester County and City Asylum.

#### MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Sixth Report. There is nothing extraordinary to report upon in the religious history of our Asylum during the past twelve months. The daily routine of my duties gives little room for variety, or for striking events. My labours are mainly directed with a view to comfort and to implant faith in our fellow creatures, and to establish a real relationship between us. To accomplish this end, I pay Pastoral Visits every day to them; place at hand a plentiful supply of Bibles, Prayer Books, and Hymn Books; read prayers daily; hold two full Services on Sundays; as well as short Services in the Hospitals. I am glad to record the attendance at these Services has been good.

In Lent, Rev. A. M. Manley, Rector of Leigh; Rev. C. Hughes, Vicar of Powick; and Rev. T. Davies, Rector of Peopleton, preached; and at our Harvest Festival, held on October 11th, Rev. G. F. Williams, Rector of St. Nicholas, Worcester, preached. The above arrangements, which somewhat resemble the religious life of a Parish without, must surely help to make our Patients feel less acutely their isolation. Holy Communion has been celebrated at least twice every month. The average attendance of our Staff has been very slightly less than last year, but I am glad to say that the number, communicating at any one time, has never fallen below 19. I quote this figure, not because I believe the spiritual life can be exhaustively tested by statistics, but because it is some indication of it, for our Lord has laid down the principle that we shall be known by our fruits. With regard to the Patients communicating, the Superintendent very kindly gives me every assistance, that we may admit only those who understand the nature of this Sacrament, and are likely to be devout.

The Musical part of our Services has been well maintained under the conductorship of Mr. Leek, and he has been well supported, especially at the weekly practices, by all the choir.

LIBRARY.—I have been able, with the £5 you lately granted, to purchase for our Library 120 volumes of light literature, such as is commended by the Commissioners in Lunacy. Many of them have been written by the celebrated authors: Max Pemberton, Stanley Weyman, A. Hope, and Braddon. 1062 books were issued in the twelve months.

OUR CEMETERY, which was opened in July, 1901, contains at the present time 339 graves. It may be interesting to know these graves occupy less than one half of the whole ground. The 37 interments that have taken place this year, are below the average of past years. I sincerely hope that at your January meeting you will definitely decide to plant a few miscellaneous shrubs alongside the paths, as well as the old roadway, as you will thus be making God's Acre beautiful, and at the same time having regard for those who have their loved ones buried here.

CRICKET.—We played 16 matches with neighbouring teams last season and won 13 of them. These matches relieve much of the monotony of Asylum life, evoke great interest, and enable us to put into practice that good maxim that a healthy body is the source of a healthy mind.

I desire to acknowledge the kindly help of the Superintendent and other members of the Staff, variously rendered me in my official duties.

#### To the Chairman and Visiting Committee of the Powick Asylum.

#### MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have again the honour of submitting to you my Report for the past year.

As in former years Service has been held on all the Sundays of the year. The Service has usually been held at 11.45, but once a month Mass has been celebrated at eight o'clock. The attendance of the Patients has been as good as could be reasonably expected, and their behaviour during the Services has been satisfactory.

Two or three times in the year, on the great Festivals of the Catholic Church, I have admitted to the Sacraments as many as I considered capable of receiving them.

Besides Sundays, I have visited the Asylum once in the week, and have endeavoured to help the Catholic Patients according to their needs. I have also attended the sick, when summoned, prepared them for death, and administered to them the last rites of the Church.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the Superintendent, the Medical Staff, and all the other officials of the Asylum for their courtesy and kindly assistance in the discharge of my duties.

#### [SCHEDULE III.]

## REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

#### WORCESTER COUNTY AND CITY ASYLUM, POWICK, 24TH JUNE, 1908.

Since this Asylum was last visited by Commissioners, on the 26th February, 1907, 266 patients have been admitted; 342 have been discharged or removed, of whom 86 had recovered, and 131 have died. The result of these changes has been a considerable reduction in the number accommodated in the Institution, the total of those whose names are on the books being now 980, as compared with 1,187, at the last visit. Of the 980, 436 are of the male and 544 of the female sex.

The opening of the new Asylum at Barnsley Hall has been the means of relieving the overcrowding which had prevailed here for some time previously. In August last 100 of each sex were removed thither under a reception contract approved by the Secretary of State, this course having been adopted in order to avoid certain difficulties which had arisen.

There is now, according to the estimate furnished to our office, sleeping accommodation for 95 males and 85 females beyond the numbers on the books, and surplus day accommodation for somewhat fewer on the male and somewhat more on the female side.

Twenty-nine patients are of the private class, for whom the weekly charge is 15s.; there is one out-county pauper for whom the charge is 14s. per week; for those chargeable to Home Unions the maintenance rate is 8s. 2d. a week. The recommendation made by our colleagues last year with regard to the improvement in the supply of water for the extinction of fire has been carried out in an effectual manner, a new 6in. fire main having been laid from the reservoir, from which 4in. mains are carried round the whole of the old buildings, and a quick firing boiler and "Gem" engine having been fixed near the reservoir. We tested the operation of the new system to-day, when the pressure proved sufficient to carry a good jet of water well over the top of the ventilating tower.

The re-flooring of Female Ward 13 and of portions of three other wards with pitch pine has been completed during the period.

We found the wards and dormitories in good order throughout, bright and well kept, and the beds and bedding clean.

We saw all the patients whose names are on the books, with the exception of five men and three women absent on trial, and gave to each the opportunity of talking to us and making complaints if so disposed, but heard no complaints calling for notice. Their health is generally good, 20 women and but five men being confined to bed. Their dress and personal condition were satisfactory.

A dinner of fish and potatoes was served in the wards during our inspection yesterday, which seemed to be fairly popular; some of the workers were served with meat.

From the returns furnished to our office we learn that in 1907 the proportion of patients usually attending the weekly religious services continued to be very good, and that attending the weekly entertainments up to the average. The proportion usefully employed was also good.

Mechanical restraint has since the last visit been employed in the case of one male patient, on four occasions, for a total of  $32\frac{1}{2}$  hours, and seclusion in the cases of 57 patients, on 148 occasions, for  $283\frac{1}{3}$  hours in all. The causes of death have been verified by post-mortem examination in the satisfactory proportion of 88 per cent. Amongst these causes were general paralysis, 5.3 per cent.; phthisis, 14.5 per cent.; and senile decay, 20 per cent. There have been four deaths from dysentery, all of females, and a male patient has died from typhoid fever. Bedsores were present at death in 4.5 per cent. of the cases.

Nine inquests have been held. One concerned a female patient who committed suicide while absent on trial; another was on the case of a female who died the day after admission from heart failure due to pressure of a large mediastinal abscess, accelerated by the shock of the passage of the stomach tube. Of the remainder, four were cases in which death was directly or indirectly due to fractures of bones from accidental falls; and three were deaths from natural causes. Particulars of each of these cases were reported to our Board at the time.

As regards zymotic disease, there were many cases of influenza in the winter months on both sides of the Asylum, amongst the staff as well as the patients. Dysentery has not been so prevalent this year as formerly, the total cases recorded since the last visit being 31, of which 16 were on the female side. The fatal case of typhoid fever is the only instance of that affection which has occurred, and the origin of the attack could not be traced. There have been nine cases of facial erysipelas, and one of varicella. One of the male attendants has been attacked by diphtheria.

The serious but not fatal casualties have been numerous. They include two cases of attempted suicide, both of male patients, one in which serious injuries to throat and neck were inflicted with a piece of glass, the other in which the head and shoulder were severely cut and bruised and the clavicle fractured by the man throwing himself under a cart while out walking on the farm. In addition to these there have been 15 instances of fractured bones, the majority caused by falls, either accidental or in fits, or by being pushed down by fellow patients. But in one case fracture of the skull, and in two cases fractures of ribs, were caused by assaults by fellow patients, whilst the causes of a broken rib in a male patient and a broken finger in a female patient could not be ascertained.

The staff of attendants and nurses is of more adequate strength than at the last visit, being for day duty in the proportion of 1 to 10.8 patients. Their record of service continues to be good. None have since the last visit been dismissed or allowed to resign on account of misconduct.

The case books and medical reports are well kept.

## REPORT OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUDITOR.

To the Chairman and Members of the Visiting Committee of the Worcester County and City Lunatic Asylum.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I have to report that I have concluded my audit of the Accounts for the year ended the 31st March, 1908, of the Worcester County and City Lunatic Asylum.

The total amount received on the Maintenance Account was £31,061 0s. 11d. This included a sum of £1,400 14s. 11d. received from Contributory Authorities under Section 269 (9) of the Lunacy Act, 1890, in respect of accommodation at other Asylums. £999 11s. 0d. was received in respect of Private Patients.

The rate per head for the maintenance of Pauper Patients was 8s. 2d. per week.

The expenditure on the Maintenance Account was £32,408 17s. 10d., which included £5,843 11s. 10d. paid to other Asylums for Patients under contract, and £438 3s. 2d. the excess of weekly charge on Out-County, Private, and Criminal Patients, transferred to the Building and Repairs Fund Account.

The Balance in the hands of the Treasurer on the Maintenance Account at the end of financial year was £4,893 5s. 10d., which included £3,000 placed to a Deposit Account. The receipts on the Building and Repairs Fund Account, including the sum of £438 3s. 2d. transferred from the Maintenance Account, was £2,125 18s. 7d., and the expenditure was £2,112 17s. 1d. There was a balance of £789 0s. 2d. in favour of the Treasurer and Clerk on this Account.

The value of the Farm Stock at the end of the year was £4,492 0s. 0d.

Application was made to the Local Government Board, and sanction obtained, under the Local Authorities (Expenses) Act, 1887, for a payment of £10 10s. 0d. made to Mr. W. W. Huddleston, Farm Bailiff, for "special grant of salary."

I understand that the Committee have still under consideration the form of Stock and Stores Accounts now in use at the Asylum, and I trust that before the commencement of the next year a new set of Accounts will be adopted.

In conclusion, I have much pleasure in stating that the Accounts of the Asylum have been well kept by the Clerk.

## MEDICAL OFFICER & SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Committee of Visitors of the Worcester County and City Asylum, at Powick.

#### MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present the Report for the year ending December 31st, 1908. The Financial Statement for the year ending March 31st, 1909, for which Mr. Hadley, the Asylum Clerk, is responsible, is also attached. The usual Statistical Tables are also appended.

The changes that occurred among the patients were as follows :---

The number of patients in the Asylum at the end of the year was thus 70 less than at the beginning. One female patient who was boarded out at Abergavenny, and who was too ill to be removed when the others were transferred, was returned on August 14th. In February four males and two females who were boarded out at Barnsley Hall Asylum were returned here, as they were not resident in Unions stipulated in the Contract. Other patients were sent in the place of these. All through the year any vacancies which have occurred through death or discharge in the 200 patients boarded out at Barnsley Hall have been filled up. Fourteen males and nine females have thus been sent.

The average number resident was 435 males, 544 females, total 979.

The total number under treatment was 496 males, 611 females, total 1,107.

ADMISSIONS.—Thirty-three males and 50 females, total 83 patients, were admitted during the year. The direct admissions numbered 26 males, 44 females, total 70. The chief causation in these was as follows:—Insane Heredity, 15.7 per cent.; Alcohol, 11.4 per cent.; Stress of different sorts, 18.5 per cent. The percentage in which no reliable history can be got is large—30 per cent. It is to be regretted that those who come with the patients either cannot or will not give fuller details. Twenty persons, 8 males and 12 females out of the 70 direct admissions have had previous attacks, a percentage of 28.57 per cent.

Of those admitted during the year seven have been discharged "recovered." Ten have died.

DISCHARGES.—Eighty-four patients, 41 males, 43 females, have been discharged during the year. Of this number 20 males, 30 females, total 50, have been discharged "recovered"—a percentage of 76.9 males, 68.1 females, total 71.4. This high percentage is caused by the small number of the admissions on which the percentage is calculated.

DEATHS.—Thirty-five males and 34 females, total 69, have died during the year, being at the rate of 7.04 per cent. on the average number resident. Phthisis is responsible for 18.8 per cent.; Pneumonia for 5.8 per cent.; General Paralysis for 10.14 per cent. as against 4.8 per cent. last year; Old Age for 17.4 per cent. There has been no death from Colitis. Full details of deaths will be found in Table D2.

Post-mortem examinations were made in 59 out of the 69 deaths, or a percentage of 85.5.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.—On January 1st, 1908, there were 11 males and 16 females—total 27. Four males and two females were admitted. One male and one female were transferred from the pauper class. Two males were transferred to the pauper class. Two males and three females were discharged. Two males and one female died, leaving at the end of the year, 10 males, 15 females—total 25.

As regards criminal patients there were on January 1st, 1908, two men. Two men were admitted. One man was discharged "recovered," and one man was transferred to pauper class at the expiration of his sentence, thus leaving two men at the end of the year.

INQUESTS.—Two inquests were held, and the Jury in each instance returned a verdict in accordance with the evidence—that the accidents, one a fractured sternum and the other a fractured thigh, were both caused by accidental falls, and exonerated the Staff from any blame.

ACCIDENTS.—These number eight in all. They were as follows: — Three of fractured ribs, one of the thigh (inquest), one of the ankle, one of the forearm, one of the wrist, and one of a finger, all caused accidentally or by the violence of other patients.

ESCAPES.—Three patients escaped, one twice, and on the second occasion not being captured within the statutory period, was discharged. The other two were recaptured in 20 minutes and one hour respectively.

HEALTH.—With the exception of 11 cases of Colitis and four of Erysipelas, the health of the patients has been good. One of the children at the Home Farm developed Diphtheria. He was promptly sent away. There was an outbreak at the School he attended. STAFF.—There have been some changes in the Medical Staff. Dr. Taylor, the Deputy Superintendent, left in September, having obtained an appointment in the Colonial Service. Dr. Fenton was promoted to be Deputy Superintendent and Senior Assistant Medical Officer. Dr. Thomson became Second Assistant. Dr. Steward was here for some time as locum and left to take up the post of Second Assistant Medical Officer at the Devon County Asylum. In November Dr. C. Mary Hankin, who had had previous Asylum experience, was appointed Third Assistant Medical Officer.

The changes among the other Members of the Staff have been of the usual kind—some to marry, others from a desire "for a change." The general conduct of the Staff has been good. I am indebted to the heads of the different Departments for their loyal help and for the interest they display in the welfare of the patients and the good of the Asylum.

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.—Dr. Coupland and L. L. Shadwell, Esq., two Members of the Board of the Commissioners in Lunacy, visited the Asylum on June 23rd and 24th. Their Report will be found in Schedule III.

GENERAL MATTERS.—The charge per patient per week has been 8s. 2d.

The average cost per patient per week for the year ending March 31st, 1909, was 9s. 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d. The average cost per patient per week including interest on loans, repayment of capital, and sums granted for general repairs by the County and City Councils, was 11s.  $1\frac{1}{2}d$ .

Messrs. Merryweather & Sons have put in a "Gem" quick-steaming Fire Engine and laid a new system of fire mains round the Old Building, connecting it with the mains round the Annexe. A pressure of 70lbs. to the square inch can be got and water can easily be thrown over the highest point of the building.

The Factory Inspector visited the Asylum on December 19th. His recommendations have been carried out.

A Yard at Broadfields Farm has been covered in at a cost of £167 0s. 0d., to facilitate the feeding of cattle, etc.

Fifty Cider Fruit Trees have been received from the National Fruit and Cider Institute and have been planted.

The following Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum :—Alcester, Bromsgrove, Droitwich, Dudley, Kidderminster, King's Norton, Martley, Stourbridge, Tewkesbury, Upton-on-Severn, West Bromwich, Worcester.

The Farm shows a profit of £759 Os. Od. on the year.



On Wednesday the suet pudding is served with treacte or sugar, rhubarb and fresh fruits being added when in season.

Puddings or Tarts are given twice weekly. If preferred 6 ozs. Coffee is given in lieu of Tea. When necessary 12 ozs. Salt Butter is issued instead of 8 ozs. Fresh.

#### Conditions under which Private Patients are admitted into the Asylum.

I. The charge for Patients coming from, or having a settlement in, some Union in the County or City of Worcester is 18s. a week, payable quarterly in advance.

II. The charge for maintenance covers all ordinary expenses, but in cases of prolonged bodily disease an additional weekly charge may be made to cover the cost of special medicines and stimulants.

III. In the event of the death or discharge of any Private Patient before the maintenance moneys, paid in advance, have been exhausted by effluxion of time, the balance will be refunded to the person who made the last payment in respect of such Patient.

IV. The Patients may wear their own clothes, but will have the same accommodation in all respects as the other Patients.

V. Application for the admission of a Patient on the private class must be made in the first instance to the Medical Officer at the Asylum, who will supply all the various blank forms for the order and medical certificates.

VI. The excess charge made for Private Patients beyond the ordinary pauper weekly rate of maintenance is carried to the credit of the Repairs Account.
