THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

CHESHIRE COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

TO HER MAJESTY'S JUSTICES OF THE PEACE FOR THE COUNTY OF CHESTER, IN GENERAL QUARTER SESSIONS ASSEMBLED.

IN compliance with the requirements of the Lunacy Act, the Visiting Justices of the Cheshire County Asylum, beg to submit the following report of the proceedings connected with this Establishment during the past year.

At the date of the Report made for the year 1859, the additions to the Asylum, consisting of accommodation for 100 male and 100 female patients, together with the Chaplain's house were in a state of forwardness, and the Committee have now to report the entire completion of the works.

The building for the female patients was finished in June last, and that for the males in September, and both are now partially occupied by patients.

The Committee have much pleasure in adding, that these buildings, now they are complete, have not only met with their own approval, but with that of the Visiting Magistrates and Superintendents of other Asylums; and the Commissioners in Lunacy, at a visit recently paid to the Asylum, made the following entry respecting them:

"We have carefully inspected these wards, and we are of opinion that they will afford most excellent accommodation. The rooms are large and cheerful, well lighted by sash-windows, and all of them are 13 feet high. They are warmed by open fire-places, and are plastered throughout. Proper bathrooms are provided, and in the male side there is a good kitchen with the requisite store rooms, and an oven large enough to bake bread for the whole establishment. So far as we can judge, the works are substantial and well finished, and we are glad to learn that they have been completed, including all fixtures, for the sum originally estimated, viz., £8,000, or at the rate of £40 per patient. We hope that no time will now be lost in supplying the necessary furniture, so that these wards may be occupied and the crowding now observable in the older wards diminished. We think that on the female side, it will be found necessary to provide fire-places or stoves in the upper galleries, so as to warm them during the winter.

"We are glad to be enabled again to report very favorably of the condition of the Asylum. The progressive improvements which have been effected in it are very creditable to Mr. Brushfield."

During the progress of these works, the attention of the Committee was directed to the urgent necessity that existed for providing a more plentiful supply of hot water for bathing and other purposes, and also of increasing the facilities for washing and drying of the clothing and bedding of the patients.

To enable them to do this, a grant was obtained from the Sessions in June last, for the purpose of erecting a steamengine and boiler, and complete steam apparatus, for washing and drying the clothes. This machinery has been in operation for some weeks, and answers remarkably well for all the purposes for which it was required. The total cost of these works was £1353.

The Rate charged to the Unions and Parishes during the past year, for the care and maintenance of patients, has been 8s. 2d. per head, per week.

One or two alterations have taken place in the salaries of the officers, that of the Superintendent having been raised from £350 to £400 per annum, and that of the Chaplain (to whom prior to the erection of the house, £250 had been paid), is now fixed at £200. On the 18th inst. Mr. Henry Lewis Harper, of St. Luke's Hospital, London, was elected Assistant Medical Officer, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Henry Lewis.

The Committee have much satisfaction in bearing testimony to the continued efficiency and zeal of the various officers connected with the establishment.

REPORT

OF THE

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT FOR THE YEAR 1860.

My LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit to your notice the usual Annual Medical Report, accompanied with the customary Statistical Tables.

On January 1st, 1860, there were 310 patients in the Asylum; in the course of the year there were 132 admissions; the discharges amounted to 65, of which number 47 were recoveries; and there were 47 deaths; so that at the end of the year there remained 330 inmates, being an increase of 20 beyond the corresponding period of the previous year.

The admissions were 13 in excess of the year 1859. Of the 132 new cases, about one-fifth were of the ages of 50 and upwards; and the bodily condition was, in one-half of the entire number, weakly or bad, but even this proportion was more favourable than that of the preceding year. The number of cases in which there was the slightest probability of a cure being established was 48, being 36 per cent. of the admissions; of these 24 have already been discharged recovered. Amongst the incurable class 14 were the subjects of epilepsy, and 21 of general paralysis; this latter disease was wholly confined to male patients, and as the number of males admitted was 70, the proportion affected by this fatal and incurable disease amounted to 30 per cent. The readmissions amounted to 8 only, of which number 3 had been discharged in 1853, 1 in 1856, 2 in 1858, 1 in 1859, and 1 in 1860.

The number of recoveries was relatively greater than in 1859, and considering the comparatively small proportion of curable cases admitted, the per centage, whether calculated on the admissions, or the total number under treatment, must be looked upon as very fair. Of the 47 recoveries, 28 were discharged within six months of their admission. There were 47 deaths, and in 17 instances the ages of the patients were 50 years and upwards. The ages of those who died from general paralysis ranged from 33 to 49 years; the proportion of deaths from this particular disease was rather less than in 1859, being only about one-fourth instead of onethird; this diminished proportion is to be looked upon as fortuitous, as the number of patients suffering from this disease, and resident on the last day of the year was much above the average, so that it is probable the mortality during the ensuing year from this one cause will be much greater. The per centage of the mortality on the total number under treatment was 1-31 less than during 1859.

The non-restraint system of treatment has been rigidly enforced, and even the instances of seclusion have been very few; during the past year only three patients (all the subjects of epileptic mania) have been secluded, on five different occasions, the aggregate period of which was 32½ hours.

The new male and female wards have been brought into operation, more particularly the female one, and the overcrowding of the old wards has thereby been remedied.

The recreation, amusement, and employment of the patients have continued as heretofore to engage the best attention of the officers.

I cannot close my report without acknowledging the valuable assistance ever rendered me by Mr. Henry Lewis, the late Assistant Medical Officer, and sincerely to regret that duties elsewhere should sever his connection with this Institution. To the Chaplain, Matron, and other Officers, my best thanks are also due for their warm co-operation in the general management.
