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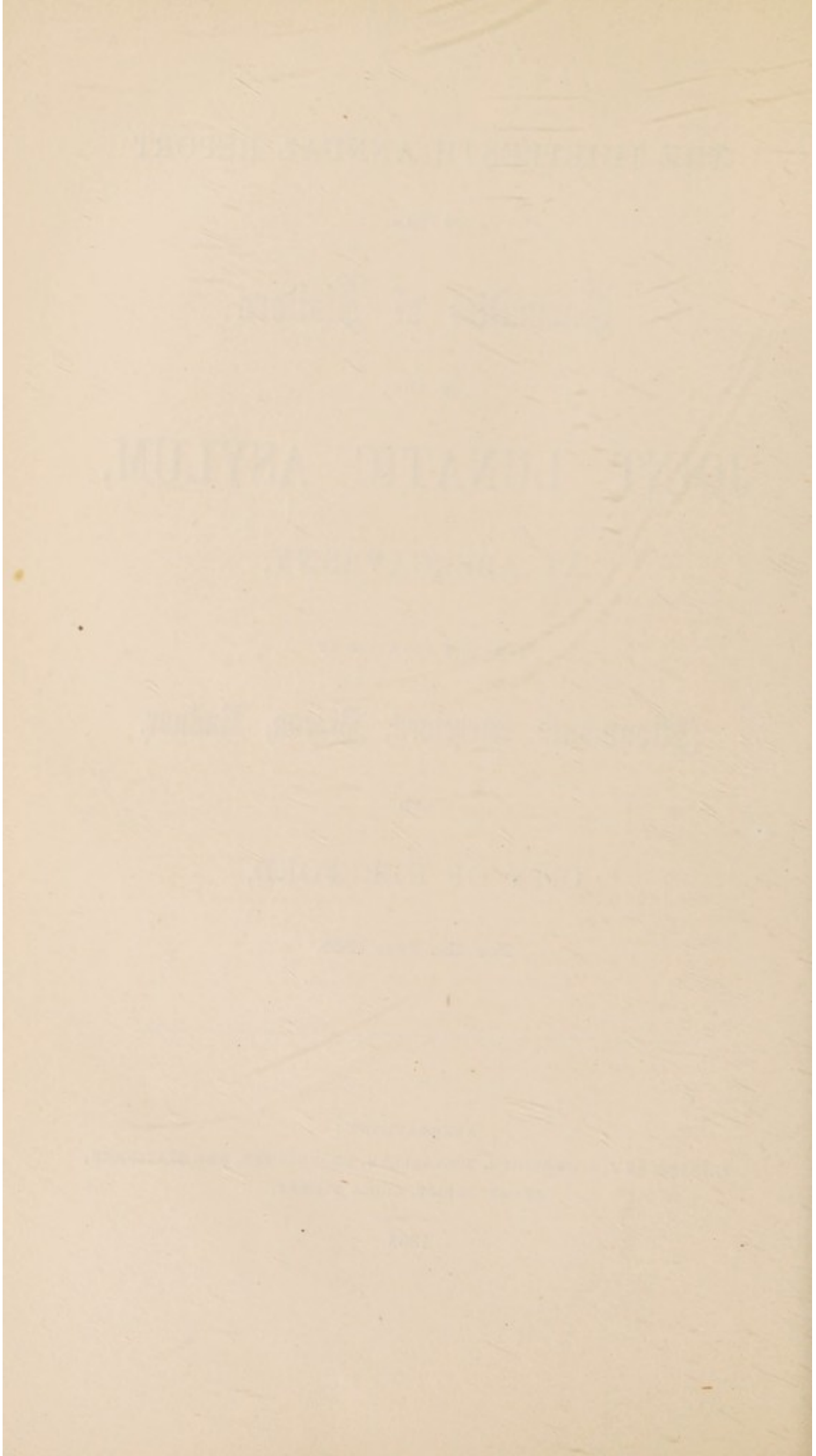

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THE THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF
The Visiting Justices
OF THE
LUNATIC ASYLUM, AT ABERGAVENNY,
To the several Courts of Quarter Sessions
FOR THE
UNITED COUNTIES AND CITY OF HEREFORD.

The Committee of Visiting Justices of the United Counties' Asylum, at Abergavenny, in making their Annual Report to the Quarter Sessions of the four Counties and City of Hereford, have to report that during the past year the management of the Asylum, under the able superintendence of Dr. M'Cullough, has been perfectly satisfactory to the Visiting Justices and to the Commissioners in Lunacy, who have inspected it, and given favourable reports on the state of the patients and general management.

Viz., 196 males and 254 females.

In addition to these, there are under contract, reported last year, 30 female patients in the Worcester Asylum, the extra cost of whom, beyond their maintenance and clothing, or one-fourth part of their total expense, is charged to the four counties and city of Hereford.

There are also, under a fresh contract made with the Dorset Asylum, 30 male patients in that Asylum, at a cost of 11s. 6d. per week, the extra cost of whom will, in like manner, be charged to the counties and city in union.

The total number chargeable to the joint counties and city is 510, being an increase of 33 patients beyond the number at the date of the last annual report.

There has been an unusual diminution in the deaths during the year, which in part accounts for this increase.

The contract with the Worcester Asylum will expire in October next. The Committee are negotiating for a continuance of the contract; the renewal of which is at present uncertain.

The question of enlarging the Asylum is still undetermined.

There are at the present time seven vacant beds on the males' side, and two beds on the females' side.

There is a possibility of accommodating six or seven more patients, either male or female, in the Lodge, which has become vacant by the removal of the Clerk and Steward to a residence out of the establishment.

The average weekly expenditure for patients during the year has been about 8s. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. each.

The weekly charge for patients in the ensuing year will be 9s. per head per week.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

JOINT COUNTIES' ASYLUM,

21st July, 1865.

We have officially inspected the Asylum this day. It now contains 477 patients, of whom 230 are men, and 247 are women. There are also two men and three women absent on trial. We have personally examined all the patients remaining in the house, except one of each sex, who are away for a few days. The condition of the patients, when seen, was quite satisfactory. They were clean and well dressed, and their conduct very orderly. No one was in seclusion; and, judging from the entries in the Medical Journal, seclusion is very sparingly used, and for short periods only. With respect to the bodily health of the patients, we find that during the past winter the mortality has been unusually small, the number of deaths recorded being only 13 of the male, and 11 of the female sex.

In two instances inquests were held, but no blame was attached to the authorities of the Asylum, in either case.

The discharges have been 32 in the male, and 39 in the female division, and of these 13 men and 24 women were recovered.

We found a considerable number of patients of both sexes employed in the various offices, and workshops, and the register shows that the average numbers regularly and usefully occupied are 147 of the male, and 175 of the female sex.

On Sundays 107 males and 102 females attend the services in the Chapel, and between 60 and 70 of each sex are

present on week-days. Balls, readings, and other means of assembling patients of both sexes together are regularly kept up.

Out-door games and amusements are also encouraged during the summer months, and pic-nics, and walking parties are frequent. The stock of amusing books is still scanty. We were pleased to hear all the more intelligent patients speak very favourably of their treatment, and not a single complaint was made by any of them. The dinners to-day consisted of boiled mutton, with potatoes and carrots, all of very good quality. The broth formerly given on one day in the week has been changed to pea-soup, and is stated to be liked by the patients. The Visitors have recently concluded an agreement with the Committee of the Dorset Asylum for the reception of 30 male patients, and that number will be removed very shortly. The payment for these patients will be 11s. 6d. a week. The removal of these patients will relieve the great crowding now existing in the men's wards, which contain at least 22 more patients than they were constructed to accommodate. On the women's side there are still vacancies for nine patients.

As on the occasion of our former visit, the men's wards presented a less cheerful aspect than those in the female division; but we learn that orders have been given for the papering of two wards on the male side, and the improvement will be gradually made in all.

We have again to report very favourably of the visitation and management of the institution, and its present condition is most creditable to Dr. M'Cullough and the officers and others by whom he is assisted.

REPORT
OF
THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT
FOR THE YEAR 1865.

The Medical Superintendent has the honour of submitting to the Committee of Visitors his report for the year 1865, together with the usual Statistical Tables.

On the 1st of January last there remained under treatment 448 patients—212 males and 236 females. During the year there have been admitted 133, viz., 67 males and 66 females, being 16 more than in the previous year, and four less than the average of the eight preceding years.

The total number under treatment during the year was 581, and the average number resident was 458, viz., 210·8 males and 247·2 females. The highest number resident at one time was 481 in July, and the lowest, 445 in October.

The number discharged recovered was 50—24 males and 26 females, being in the proportion of 38·3 per cent. to the admissions. Thirteen patients were discharged relieved, and two, in addition to the 30 sent to the Dorset Asylum, were discharged not improved.

During the year, 34 deaths have occurred—18 of males and 16 of females, being in the proportion of 7·4 per cent. of the average number resident. This rate of mortality is much lower than in any previous year, the lowest death rate hitherto having been 9·2 per cent., and the average about 11 per cent.

In February one of the female attendants was attacked by scarlet fever, and about three weeks after one of the male patients took it. With this exception, there has been no disease of an epidemic or contagious character, and the health of the patients generally has been good.

The number of male patients having increased much beyond the accommodation, 30 were sent to the Dorset Asylum, under contract, in August. One of these has since died. No change has occurred during the year in the 30 female patients in the Worcester Asylum. Including the numbers in these Asylums, there remained, at the end of 1865, 511 patients—225 males and 286 females. This is an increase of 13 males and 20 females, total, 33, during the year.

This large increase, though arising partly from the low mortality, represents, however, the increase of two years, as the numbers did not increase in 1864. During the last four months of 1864, 23 patients only were admitted, so that at the end of the year the numbers were brought below the natural level, and the proportion of curable cases—which are mainly drawn from recent admissions—remaining in the house was comparatively small. Consequently, the number discharged recovered in 1865 was below the average. During the last four months of 1865, on the contrary, 43 patients were admitted. Nearly all these remained in the Asylum at the end of the year, so that the proportion of curable cases is now considerably larger than at the corresponding period of last year.

The admissions were 16 more than in 1864, and 26 less than in 1863. Though the admissions vary so much from year to year, yet it will be found that for the eight years preceding 1865, by taking the average of two consecutive years, there is little difference in the numbers.

The average of the eight years being 137. The admissions of the past year, 133, are therefore slightly below the average.

Much valuable information will be found in Table IV., which is now given for the first time. It gives the history of each year's admissions since the opening of the Asylum, so that of those admitted in any year it may be seen how many have been discharged recovered, relieved, or not improved, and how many have died up to this time, and how many now remain. The changes which have taken place during the past year, in those admitted in each year since the opening of the Asylum, are also given.

The only case of death which calls for remark was one in which rupture of intestine was produced by a kick from another patient, causing death two days afterwards. An inquest was held in this case, and in three others, cases of sudden death from epilepsy and disease of the heart.

Of the 50 patients discharged recovered, 23 were in the Asylum less than six months, and 38, or more than three-fourths of the whole, less than twelve months.

Thirty of the patients admitted had been previously in the Asylum, and of these, 27 had been discharged recovered. Four were re-admitted within a month from the time of leaving the Asylum, two of these having been discharged at the request of friends, not recovered. The remaining 26 had been out of the Asylum for periods varying from three months up to twelve years, 18 having been away for more than a year, and 13 more than two years.

Of those admitted, 33 had previous attacks of insanity,

17 of these having had one previous attack, and 16 more than one.

There was a reasonable prospect of recovery in 85 cases, or 64 per cent. of those admitted. This is about the usual number of curable cases. As I have pointed out on previous occasions, in the years in which admissions are very numerous the increase arises chiefly from chronic incurable cases being sent in, and not from an epidemic of recent curable insanity.

In Table XIV, showing the forms of mental disorder, the most notable fact is the diminution in the epileptic and idiotic cases, only 10 of these classes having been admitted during the year, while in 1864 the number was 19, and in 1863, 24. It may be a question how far this was caused by the increased charge for maintenance during the year.

At the end of the year there were seven or eight beds vacant on the male side of the house, while the number of female patients was exactly equal to the accommodation. Anticipating a want of room for women, the Committee, at the general meeting in December, authorised the lodge to be fitted up temporarily for six or seven patients. This will probably meet the demand for some months at least. Judging from the present state of the house, if the admissions are not above an average, I do not anticipate a very large addition to the numbers during the current year.

During the year, occupations and amusements have been carried on as usual, and continued efforts have been made to improve the state of the Asylum generally. I cannot express too strongly the efficient and kindly assistance I continue to receive from all the officers of the institution—an assistance which lightens many labours and cheers many anxieties.

REPORT OF CHAPLAIN, 1865.

JOINT COUNTIES' ASYLUM, ABERGAVENNY,
January 11th, 1866.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

Being frequently asked what good can be done by a clergyman among the insane, I took the trouble, on a certain day, to go through the house, ward by ward, in order to ascertain, as nearly as the nature of the case admits, how many patients there were in a fit state of mind, on that day, to join in devotional exercises with a certain amount of understanding and appreciation of what they were about. The conclusion arrived at, after the rejection of several doubtful cases, was that there were fully two hundred of the class mentioned. This number consists, say, of monomaniacs, of those who are insane only at intervals, of those who are far advanced in convalescence, and of those who are about to be discharged as recovered. The chapel-goers, however, are not found exclusively among these two hundred, for several who are in a doubtful condition as to their ability to join intelligently in Common Prayer, regularly attend chapel; while those who are deemed sufficiently rational to do so include some who cannot be induced to go, exhibiting in this way, perhaps, the peculiar warp with which their reason is affected. The only ground of exclusion from chapel is misbehaviour while there. Exclusion for misconduct in the wards, provided the patient is anxious to attend Divine Service, and is likely to be quiet, is objectionable, and is not resorted to. It is not wise to judge too decidedly as to who

among the insane are unfit for receiving religious impressions. It is well known that incurable inmates, who have been goaded by neglect and active cruelty into a worse than savage condition, before they are brought to a Public Asylum, can be trained so as to be, in their best moments, tidy in their persons and orderly in their behaviour; and bringing such patients to chapel serves, if it does nothing else, to foster in them habits of self-control and decent conduct.

The average number of patients who have attended chapel during the year has been nearly as follows:—On Sundays, males, 103; females, 105; total, 208: on week-days, males, 57; females, 65; total, 122.

The number of patients who partake of the Holy Communion is about twenty-five; and those who did so, the last time it was administered, were all women. The females have always been considerably in excess of the male communicants, but why there should be twenty-five of the one sex, and not one of the other, I do not understand, especially when several of the latter were personally invited to come.

Singing classes are held twice a week, and we have once more been able to regain that competency for part-singing which, by a rapid succession of changes among the nurses and attendants, we had, for some months, lost. Readings are given during the winter months once a fortnight, and several of the patients who are able to read well enough are invited to do so. Monday and Tuesday nights are set apart for recreations of another character. In addition to these, there are occasional concerts, theatrical and other performances. Acknowledgments are due to the Medical Assistant, the Housekeeper, the Head Male Attendant, and several of the nurses and attendants, for the active part which they take in promoting the enjoyment of the inmates.

The book-cases seem to answer very well, and a much greater number of books are placed in them than, before the introduction of these cases, were usually entrusted to a ward. I have to thank the Committee for an allowance of £10 for the purchase of additional books for the library, in compliance with the suggestion of the Commissioners at their last visit. A portion only of this sum has yet been expended. There is a difficulty in meeting with cheap copies of the kind of books recommended. Eligible works are either too expensive, or, if cheap, are rarely to be met with except in paper covers, which are much too frail for the use of our people. I have also to thank the "Society for the Gratuitous Supply of Cards, Rolls, Handbooks of Scripture Truths, &c.," for an unsolicited grant.

The Cemetery has been so far put in order that it has only to be sown, in the spring, with grass-seed, and to have some additional shrubs, out of the grounds, planted in it, to be complete. The sum of £2, allowed for the procuring of shrubs, has been expended in its ornamentation, and in a few months it promises to present an appearance suitable to its character. Grave-marks of a simple kind have been adopted, each bearing a number corresponding to the Register of Burials. It is worthy of notice that the interments during the year have been fewer than in any year since the opening of the Asylum—that is, fewer even than when the number of patients was lowest.

The additional Allowance to Working Patients is thus divided;—Bread and Cheese, with half a pint of Beer or Cider in the morning, and half a pint of Beer or Cider in the afternoon.

On Tuesdays the Meat and Vegetables are made into an Irish Stew, and occasionally Rhubarb, Suet, or Meat Puddings are substituted.

On Saturdays the Meat is made into Peas Soup.

The Female Patients in the Refractory Wards and those resident in the Laundry Building, are each allowed half a pound of Bread weekly extra. The Rations are sent to each Ward in bulk, and are there divided by the Attendant amongst the Patients resident according to their respective requirements; by this practice very little (if any) waste occurs.

The Tea and Coffee is made by the Attendant in each Ward—each Female Patient being allowed 14oz. Tea, 4lb. Sugar, and 1pt. milk weekly; each Male Patient being allowed 2oz. Coffee, 4oz. Tea, 4lb. Sugar, and one pint of milk weekly.

Five days in the week the Patients have two kinds of Vegetables—Potatoes always; the second Vegetable consisting of whatever may be in season, such as Cabbage, Brocoli, Beans, Peas, Turnips, Carrots, Parsnips, &c.

An equivalent in Cheese is often given in lieu of Butter for Supper.
