The total number in the Asylum at Abergavenny, and in other Asylums, under contract, is the same now as at this time last year, namely:—635.

This is the first year, with two exceptions, since the establishment of the Asylum, in which the numbers have not considerably increased.

The Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum in November last, and they reported very favourably of the condition and management.

In consequence of an informality alleged by the Commissioners to have occurred in the Resolution passed by the Committee of Visitors to dissolve the Union, it has become necessary to convene a fresh Meeting of the Committee to vote again upon the question. This Meeting will be summoned for the First Thursday in February, when it is requested that the Committees of the several Counties and the City of Hereford, will give a full attendance, as a majority of more than a half of the whole Committee of Visitors is requisite to effect the dissolution.

The weekly charge for maintenance has been during the year 9s. for each Patient, and the expenditure having been nearly the same, this rate will be continued for the ensuing year.

A call is made of £500 for the extra expense of maintenance of Patients in Asylums under contract, and of £336 18s. od., for two years' rent of the Villas and land owned by Monmouthshire, the latter sum to be rateably apportioned to the several Counties and the City of Hereford; the former to Counties of Monmouthshire and Herefordshire, and the City of Hereford.

# COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

Foint Counties' Asylum, Abergavenny, 27th November 1869.

We have, in the course of yesterday and this day, visited the Asylum, inspected all its Wards, Offices, Workshops and Premises, including the three Cottages and Farm, and with the exception of one man, who escaped within the last fortnight, and whose name still remains on the books, have seen all the Patients.

The following Table shows the changes in the Patients since the 2nd Nov. 1868, when we last visited the Asylum, and their present numbers.

One man died from fracture of a cervical vertebra occasioned by an accidental fall from a loft, the particulars of which formed the subject of correspondence with our Board. The other deaths were all from ordinary causes.

In the case of the man last referred to, and in those of one male and three female Patients who died from suffocation in epileptic fits, inquests were duly held.

The sanitary condition of the Asylum is good, the Patients registered as under medical treatment being only 11 in the male, and 18 in the female division.

The latest Ward returns relative to employment shew the following results:—

The attendance at Divine Service in the Chapel, which is of dimensions quite inadequate to the wants of the Institution, includes on Sundays, 104 male, and 108 female Patients; and on week-days 53 of the male, and 63 of the female sex.

According to the medical journal, which is fully entered up, since the last visit, 45 male, and 27 female Patients have been secluded, for reasons duly recorded, the former altogether on 104, and the latter on 37 occasions. The duration of the seclusion in four-fiths of the former cases, and nearly all of the latter, did not exceed two hours.

With the exception of two or three noisy women of the worst class, the Patients of both sexes, at the times of our visits, were quiet and orderly.

The personal condition of the female Patients generally was very satisfactory. The clothing of several of the male Patients in wards 5 and 6 was old, tattered, and untidy, and ought to be disused, and kept in a better state. As respects the personal condition of the male Patients, with the above exceptions, we have to report very favorably as heretofore.

No Patients made any complaints on the score of treatment, although many, as usual, appealed to us for liberation.

We found the Wards and Rooms, and the Beds and Bedding throughout the Asylum, in creditable order, and the atmosphere everywhere was untainted.

The accommodation provided for the inmates of the three Cottages and Farm-house, which are now fully occupied, is of a very homely and comfortable description.

In the principal Cottage formerly known as "Glangavenny House," 23 male Patients reside, and in Prospect and Skirrid Cottages, respectively, 11 and 17 female Patients. In the first-named Cottage all the domestic work, including the cooking, is done by the two male Attendants, assisted by Patients.

At the Farm house are 12 male Patients.

Since the last visit additional easy chairs have been placed in some of the Wards.

The want of hand-rails to the staircases, which are steep and dangerous, is a defect calling for special attention.

In the existing circumstances of the Asylum, and the pending questions of dissolution and re-construction of union between the several counties, we have only to add to the observations in our last Report the expression of a hope, that no further delay will take place in bringing the necessary arrangements to a satisfactory conclusion.

Dr. M'Cullough continues to devote his best energies to the discharge of his responsible duties, as Superintendent, in which he is ably assisted by Dr. Chapman.

## REPORT

OF THE

# MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

For the Year 1869.

The Medical Superintendent has the honour of submitting to the Committee of Visitors his Report for the year 1869, together with the usual Statistical Tables.

On the first of January last, there remained under treatment in this Asylum, 507 patients, 221 males, and 286 females. During the year there have been admitted 154, viz.:—68 males and 86 females. Deducting the re-admissions of patients who had been under contract in other Asylums, which artificially swelled the admissions in 1868, the admissions were 8 less than in that year, though 10 above the average of the ten preceding years.

The total number under treatment during the year, was 661; and the average number resident was 509, viz.:—221 males, and 288 females. The highest number resident at one time, was 521, in October, and the lowest, 496, in July.

The number discharged recovered, was 73, 26 males and 47 females, being in the proportion of 47.4 per cent. of the admissions. This is the largest number that has hitherto been discharged recovered in one year. Twenty patients were discharged relieved, and 15 were transferred to other Asylums, under contract.

During the year 41 deaths have occurred, 23 of males and 18 of females, being in the proportion of 8 per cent. of the average number resident. This is a lower death-rate than in any previous year, with the exception of 1865, when it was 7.4.

At the beginning of the year, 126 patients, 68 males, and 58 females, were boarded under contract in other Asylums. Numerous changes have occurred amongst these during the year. Nine males and five females have died, one male has been discharged relieved, and one escaped. At the end of the year there remained 61 males and 63 females, being a decrease of 7 males, and an increase of 5 females, during the year, or a net decrease of two.

In this Asylum, there was an increase during the year, of 5 males, while the females continued the same. Of the total number chargeable there has thus been a decrease of 2 males and an increase of 5 females, or a net increase of 3 during the year. Compared with the large increase of the previous year, 35, this is a very satisfactory result, especially at

a time when we are so much pressed for accommodation. We would not be justified in concluding, however, that a further increase is not likely to occur, or that a number of admissions equal to those of the past year would not cause an increase of numbers. When a large increase takes place in one year, the changes by recovery, death, &c., in the additional number of new cases, correct the tendency to increase in the following year. It is therefore necessary to calculate the average increase over large periods, in order to estimate the probable increase in future. In the five years ending 1859, the increase was 101, or at the rate of 20.2 per annum; in the following five years, the increase was 117, or 23.4 per annum; and in the last five years, the increase has been 158, or 31.6 per annum. The total increase during the 15 years, has been 376, or an average of 25 per annum.

We have again been exempt from epidemic or contagious disease, during the year; and the health of the patients generally has been good.

The experience of another year fully confirms the success of the cottage or villa residences. These, together with the farm, accommodate 63 patients, or 12 per cent. of the number in this Asylum. They are drawn, however, from the whole number chargeable, and constitute about 10 per cent, of that number. I am not aware that this system has been adopted to the same extent, and with the same absence of restriction, in any other English Asylum.

Great as are its advantages in a certain class of cases, I am inclined to think it could not be extended to a much larger proportion of the patients, without such an addition of restrictions and safeguards as would take away its chief advantages.

No addition has been made to the number of beds, which continue the same as at the beginning of the year, viz.:—225 for males, and 284 for females, total, 509. The average number resident has been slightly greater than this, so that there has been no margin of vacant accommodation. At the end of the year, the males were one, and the females two, in excess of the estimated accommodation.

I thank the Committee of Visitors for their continued kindness and support, which greatly lightens the anxieties inseparable from my duties. While from all the Officers of the Institution I continue to receive the most efficient help, I feel especial pleasure in acknowledging the very able and indefatigable assistance I have received from Dr. Chapman, for a period of nearly six years. What such assistance is, what it is to be able to rely, not only on zeal and assiduity, but on judgment and discretion, those only who are in my position can fully appreciate.

# CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Joint Counties' Asylum, January 13th, 1870.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to lay before you my Report for the year 1869.

The attendance in Chapel has been much the same as in former years.

As to the mental condition of those who attend Divine worship, allow me to state that many of them are quite sane. Since the opening of this establishment, 953 persons have been discharged as recovered, and 172 as relieved. Now of the former of these, it can be remarked, that, during the time their recovery was being confirmed, they differed mentally in nothing, while attending Chapel, from a sane congregation. Then again, as they approached convalescence, it can be easily understood that they were becoming more and more capable of receiving religious instruction. From this it appears

that a Chaplain's flock in an Asylum consists, in the first place, of sane people, and of those who are drawing near to a state of sanity.

The class of Patients here being considered are known as the curable. During the past year, the number of these discharged as recovered was 73; there were also 20 discharged as relieved. Here then we have 93 persons, about the competency of the greater part of whom to engage in Divine worship there can be no doubt whatever.

The next class calling for notice are the incurable. It must not be supposed, in regard to many of these, that they are always insane, for they have lucid intervals, sometimes of long duration. Then there are several in this class, who, although always of unsound mind, are, nevertheless, quite remarkable for their deep religious impressions; while there are others who, being not so much marked by this characteristic, yet express a strong desire to attend Chapel, and are distinguished for their good conduct while there. Forming a rough estimate, it would not be far wrong to say that there are eighty of the three kinds of incurable Patients here described.

Then it has to be considered that there are 39 Attendants, not to mention other officials, who, owing to the nature of their very arduous duties, can but seldom attend a place of worship out of the house.

Adding these numbers together they come to 212, to which has to be added a certain number out of the 41 deaths for the year. But then as it is not advisible to draw the line too hard between those who are *clearly* in a fit state of mind to receive religious impressions and those who are *verging* on this state, Chapel accommodation should be provided for a larger number than this; the Commissioners, I believe, say for three-fourths of the inmates of an Asylum.

Those who partook of the Holy Communion, during the year, were between forty and fifty.

I have to thank the Committee for allowing £12 to be spent in the purchase of books, £6 17s. 6d. for Bibles, Testaments, and Prayer Books; and £5 2s. 6d., for additional books for the Library. Of the latter many were procured second-hand, at a cheap rate. They were all selected with some care by Dr. M'Cullough and myself.

The number of burials in our cemetery, during the year, has been twenty-six out of forty-one deaths.

The amusements, comprising Readings, Music, and Dramatic performances, have been duly attended to. They have been encouraged by the active co-operation of Dr. Chapman, Miss Bishop, and several of the Attendants, who are ever most ready to tender their services. On the whole, amusements

provided for several evenings every week, at a moderate amount of labour, are to be preferred to those on a grand scale, which take months to get up, provided the Patients have no means of passing the evenings agreeably, while the latter are in course of preparation. It is desirable to have both, but if both cannot be managed, then it is clearly to be seen that the first should have the preference.

The additional allowance to Working Patients is thus divided :- Bread and Cheese, with half a pint of Beer or Cider in the morning, and half a pint of Beer or Cider in the afternoon.

On Tuesdays the Meat and Vegetables are made into an Irish Stew, and occasionally Rhubarb, Suet, or Meat Puddings are substituted, On Saturday the Meat is made into Peas Scup.

The Female Patients in the Refractory Wards and those resident in the Laundry Building, are each allowed half a pound of Bread weekly extra The Rations are sent to each Ward in Bulk, and are there divided by the Attendant among the Patients resident, according to their

respective requirements; by this practice, very little, (if any) waste occurs.

The Tea and Coffee is made by the Attendant in each Ward—each Female Patient being allowed 14oz. Tea, 41b. Sugar, and 1pt. Milk weekly.

each Male Patient being allowed 2oz. Coffee, 4oz. Tea, 41b. Sugar, and 1pt. Milk weekly.

Five days in the week the Patients have two kinds of Vegetables—Potatos always; the second vegetable consisting of whatever may be in

season, such as Cabbage, Brocoli, Beans, Peas, Turnips, Carrots, Parsnips, &c. An equivalent in Cheese is often given in lieu of Butter for Supper.


