THE TWENTIETH

FOR THE YEAR 1872.

THE New Hereford Lunatic Asylum having been completed, all the remaining Patients belonging to that County have been removed from the Joint Lunatic Asylum in the course of the past year.

Notwithstanding, there is not a sufficiency of accommodation for all the Patients of the Three Counties now in Union.

In consequence, the Committee of Visitors have entered into an agreement with the Committee of Visitors of the Herefordshire Asylum, for the latter to receive and board not exceeding 30 Patients of the United Counties at 12/6 a week; and there are at present 17 Patients maintained there under this agreement, besides one at the Fisherton Asylum.

The Lunatics of the Joint Counties, in Asylums, have increased in number by 8 since the 31st of December, 1871, and will, according to all past experience, continue to increase.

The partition walls, dividing the main building into 5 separate compartments have been carried up through the roof, in the case of fire effectually to confine the mischief to one of these compartments. But for this precaution, a fire reaching one part of the roof must have extended without any means of arresting it, to the whole building.

The general increase of wages has necessitated an addition to the salaries of some of the Attendants and Servants.

The administration of the whole establishment has been skilfully and laboriously carried out by Dr. M'Cullough, the Superintendent; by Dr. Glendinning, the Assistant Medical Superintendent; by the Steward and Clerk; and by the Subordinate Officers; and the Commissioners in Lunacy have expressed themselves in terms of high commendation of the conduct and management.

At the same time they point out deficiencies in the building accommodation, which ought to be supplied.

A superannuation allowance of £25 per annum has been granted to the Gardener, who has become

incapacitated in the service; which has been approved and confirmed by the Quarter Sessions of each of the Three Counties in Union.

The Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy, and the usual tables, will be added to this statement in the printed Annual Report, copies of which will be sent to the several Unions and otherwise circulated.

Commissioners' Report.

JOINT COUNTIES' ASYLUM,
Abergavenny, 14th & 15th Octr., 1872.

WE visited the Asylum yesterday, and again this morning, inspecting all the wards and offices, and personally examining every Patient. They are now 431 in number, viz, 196 men, and 235 women.

The admissions, since the last visit, have been numerous. In addition to 82 males and 71 females received under fresh certificates, 38 women have been re-admitted from other Asylums, whither they had been sent, for want of room.

There are now 15 men belonging to the Counties in Union at the new Hereford Asylum, the Justices having effected a contract for the reception of 30 Patients of that sex.

There has recently been a careful measurement of the Asylum, which is found to be capable of affording proper cubical space for 193 men and 245 women; so that at the present time it contains three too many men, and has vacant accommodation for ten women.

There have been 98 discharges, of whom 75 were recovered ; and 121 Patients have been removed, all of whom, except two, went to Hereford. Twenty-five men, and 19 women have died, showing a much lower mortality during the last 16 months than for some years past. The chief causes of death were as follows :—

Inquests were held in three cases. One, that of a man who died from the effect of injuries inflicted by another Patient. The other instances were females, who were found dead, and who died from natural causes. In all but five cases, *post-mortem* examinations were made.

The general health has been good, but within the last five weeks diarrhoea has been prevalent, but has not proved fatal in any case. There has been no fresh attack for about a week.

Fourteen males and 19 females are registered as under medical treatment, and we found 5 men and 11 women in bed. There was no Patient in seclusion, either yesterday or this day. There have been 88

cases of seclusion in the male, and 104 in the female division, applicable to 37 men and 38 women.

We have a good report to make as to the personal condition of the Patients in both divisions, who were remarkably free from excitement, well clothed and clean, and, on the whole, comfortable and contented. In no instance had we complaints from Patients in regard to their treatment. They seem to have the usual means of occupation, 97 men, and 141 women being usefully employed in various ways.

At the Chapel, last Sunday, there were 83 Patients of each sex, and 35 men and 27 women are generally present on week days. The associated amusements comprise balls, concerts, and dramatic performances, which take place frequently. The means of amusement in the wards, especially of the worst class of Patients, are, in our opinion, quite inadequate, and we again draw attention to the subject.

With regard to the recommendations and suggestions offered in the last Report, we find that proper and separate keys have now been provided for the female wards, and a commencement has been made on the mens' side for painting and papering the day-rooms and galleries.

In September last, at a Special General Meeting of the Committee of Visitors, it was referred to a

Committee to prepare a Schedule of the necessary additions suggested by us ; and also of the accommodation requisite for 50 additional Patients.

The question of erecting new Gas Works was also referred to the same Committee, but it appears that their report has not yet been prepared, in consequence of the absence of Dr. M'Cullough, who, at the request of the Committee, in July, 1871, submitted a written statement with regard to the deficiencies of the present Asylum Buildings, and the additions and alterations which were required.

In this statement our own suggestions were embodied, and several requirements were added, as to the necessity for which we fully concur. Amongst these the necessity for providing better means for extinguishing fire was specially named, and since then something has been done to prevent the spread of flames, by dividing the Asylum into sections and providing iron doors ; but, in the event of a fire breaking out in the building, there are no adequate means of extinguishing it. This is a subject requiring very early attention. The staircase, on the female side, leading down to Nos. 5 and 3 wards, is very dark, and something should be done either by means of a skylight, or borrowed light from the adjoining dormitory, to render it more safe and convenient. We also suggest that hand-rails should be fixed here, and in all other staircases at present

without them. Throughout the wards we found everything very clean and in good order. The bedding was particularly comfortable and abundant; and altogether the condition of the Asylum was very satisfactory.

R E P O R T
OF THE
MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT
FOR THE YEAR 1872.

THE Medical Superintendent has the honour of submitting to the Committee of Visitors his Report for the year 1872, together with the usual Statistical Tables.

On the First of January last, there remained under treatment in this Asylum 492 Patients—209 males and 283 females. Of these, 86 females were chargeable to Herefordshire, while 40 females, chargeable to the counties of Monmouth, Brecon, and Radnor, were boarded, under contract, in other Asylums; so that the number of Patients chargeable to the Counties which form the present Union, were, at the commencement of the year, 446, viz., 209 males, and 237 females. During the year there have been admitted 153, viz., 64 males and 89 females. Of these, however, 38 females were re-admitted from other Asylums, where they

had been boarded, under contract; and one female was admitted from Herefordshire, so that the true number of admissions was 114, viz., 64 males and 50 females. Of these, 95 were admitted for the first time. These numbers are above the average. The total number under treatment during the year was 645, and the average number resident was 450, viz., 204 males and 246 females. The highest number resident at one time was 493, in March, and the lowest, 427, in June. The number discharged recovered was 58, viz., 26 males and 32 females, being in the proportion of 37.8 per cent. of the admissions. Excluding the re-admissions from other Asylums, the proportion of recoveries was 50.4 per cent. During the year 38 deaths have occurred, 18 of males, and 20 of females, being in the proportion of 8.4 of the average number resident. This is more than 2 per cent. below the average, and lower than it has been in any previous year, with the exception of 1865 and 1869. During the last six months of the year, twelve deaths only occurred.

In Table V., shewing the causes of death, it will be observed that the chief decrease is in diseases of the brain. This arises partly from the fact that, owing to the absence of cold weather, and other causes, a number of Patients, in an advanced stage of disease, lingered on until the end of the year, making it probable that there will be an increased

mortality during the ensuing year. It is necessary to point out, however, that during the time a large number of Patients were boarded out in other Asylums, the position of this Asylum was exceptional, as the Patients who were sent out were, as a rule, chronic cases, in fair bodily health; those who were feeble, or labouring under disease likely to prove fatal, being kept here. The mortality being calculated on the average number resident, this of course tended to increase the per centage of deaths in this Asylum. The cases of consumption have again been rather numerous, six deaths having occurred from it. There has been no contagious disease, and no serious epidemic during the year. The removal of the female Patients to the Hereford Asylum commenced on the 18th of March, and was completed on the 18th of April; and on the 19th of April the last of the Female Patients, boarded in other Asylums, were brought back here—thus completing a series of transfers which had been going on since 1863, and leaving in this Asylum chargeable to the three counties now in union, 216 males, and 235 females—total 451. As this number of Male Patients was 23 in excess of the sleeping accommodation here, it was necessary to provide for them elsewhere, and a contract was entered into with the Visitors of the Hereford Asylum, under which 17 Male Patients are now boarded there. During the year there has been an increase in the numbers

chargeable to the three counties of ten males, and a decrease of one female, being a net increase of nine. At the end of the year there remained in this Asylum 202 males and 235 females—total 437. The males are nine in excess of the sleeping accommodation, while there is room for ten more females.

In Table VI., shewing the length of residence of those discharged—recovered—it will be seen that 60 per cent. were discharged within six months, and 78 per cent. within nine months of admission ; while only 14 per cent. of the recoveries occurred amongst those who had been in the Asylum more than a year. With regard to Table X., shewing the probable causes of insanity in those admitted, I may remark that it is often difficult or impossible to trace any reasonable cause. The causes assigned are often fanciful, and unless some connection with the alleged cause can be traced, I think it is better to return the cause as unknown. Thus of the 95 cases admitted for the first time, the cause is stated to be unknown in 34. Of the remainder, while only 9 are assigned to moral causes, 52 are assigned to physical causes. This difference is even more marked in previous years : in 1871, 7 cases were assigned to moral, and 81 to physical causes ; while in 1870 the proportion was 7 to 90 ; and in 1869, 4 to 77. Thus, in these four years, while only 27 cases were assigned to moral causes—such as grief, anxiety, &c.—300 were

assigned to physical causes affecting directly the bodily health. This is probably very different from the popular belief on the subject which is apt to attribute mental diseases to mental causes. The cases, however, in which a mental cause can be distinctly traced are the exception ; while, in the great majority, there are evident defects in bodily structure or function. I am glad to say that no serious casualty occurred during the year. The liability of such a population to such occurrences, and the feeling that something untoward may happen at any moment, necessarily gives rise to a feeling of anxiety, from which it is scarcely possible ever to free the mind.

I again beg to thank the Committee of Visitors for their continued kindness, and the support they give me in the discharge of my duties. From the Officers of the Institution I continue to receive the most efficient help.

Chaplain's Report.

ABERGAVENNY,
Joint Counties' Asylum,
Jany. 9th, 1873.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,—

Regarding these reports simply as an annual record of the Chaplain's performance of his duties, and not as containing any new facts or comments worthy of publication, I beg to state that during the past year the Chapel Service has been performed once daily on week-days, and twice on a Sunday, except when, for a few weeks in the summer, leave was obtained to have the service held on Wednesday and Friday only, and once on a Sunday.

The wards have been periodically visited, and attention bestowed on those Patients who seemed particularly to need it, and to derive benefit from it.

The Holy Communion has been administered four times during the year. In many Asylums it is administered more frequently, and I have seldom detected any reason why, in this respect, any

difference should be made between the Patients in an Asylum who are communicants, and the inmates of any other public institution.

The number of funerals during the year has been 31, out of 38 deaths. The proportion between the number buried and the number removed is unusual. For instance, in 1866 the burials were 29, out of 47 deaths ; in 1868, 27 out of 45 ; in 1871, 51 out of 71.

The stock of Bibles, Testaments, and Prayer-books will be adequate for the next three months, or more,

The allowance of £5 for fresh books for the Library has been expended as advantageously as circumstances permitted. The books were purchased at greatly reduced prices, and such books were selected as seemed most likely to be read, without being of a noxious character. The Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge has voluntary offered a grant of books and pictures, but they have not yet come to hand.

The locks of the present book-cases are about to be changed, so as to permit books to be taken out by an Attendant only, at the request of such Patients as can read. The present locks admit of being opened by a small stick or pipe-stem, and, in consequence, many, in want merely of paper, open the book-cases and wantonly destroy the books. This

causes the Attendants to put the books out of sight, in their own rooms. The back wards, with the exception of Bibles and Testaments, &c., are supplied only with damaged copies of books, of which there has hitherto been too large a proportion. But when the new locks are placed on the book-cases, there will be more encouragement to expose books to view in them.

The associated amusements have, with the co-operation of Doctor Glendinning, Miss Bishop, and others, been carried on as heretofore. They include part-singing, dancing classes, readings, dramatic entertainments, and out-door games.

The great event of the year has been the removal of so many Patients to the new Herefordshire Asylum. That the Herefordshire Patients possess serviceable qualities which are missed, and the absence of which has somewhat altered the tone of the establishment, is, I believe, an impression which has been produced on other minds than my own.

The additional allowance to Working Patients is thus divided:—Bread and Cheese, with half a pint of Beer or Cider in the morning, and half a pint of Beer or Cider in the afternoon.

On Tuesdays the Meat and Vegetables are made into an Irish Stew, and occasionally Rhubarb, Suet, or Meat Puddings are substituted.

On Saturday the Meat is made into Peas Soup.

The Female Patients in the Refractory Wards and those resident in the Laundry Building, are each allowed half a pound of Bread weekly extra.

The Rations are ~~served~~ to each Ward in Bulk, and are there divided by the Attendant among the Patients resident, according to their respective requirements; by this practice, very little, (if any) waste occurs.

The Tea and Coffee is made by the Attendant in each Ward—each Female Patient being allowed 1½ oz. Tea, ½ lb. Sugar, and 1 pt. Milk weekly; each Male Patient being allowed 2 oz. Coffee, 4 oz. Tea, ½ lb. Sugar, and 1 pt. Milk weekly.

Five days in the week the Patients have two kinds of Vegetables—Potatoes always; the second vegetable consisting of whatever may be in season, such as Cabbage, Broccoli, Beans, Peas, Turnips, Carrots, Parsnips, &c.

An equivalent in Cheese is often given in lieu of Butter for Supper.
