

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# ANNUAL REPORT

OF

## THE VISITING JUSTICES

#### OF THE

## Joint Counties' Lunatic Asylum, Abergavenny,

To the several Courts of Quarter Sessions, for the United Counties of

MONMOUTH, BRECON, & RADNOR,

FOR THE YEAR 1875.

THE Commissioners in Lunacy, who visited the Asylum on October 14th, expressed themselves well satisfied with the condition and conduct of the establishment; and the Committee of Visitors cannot speak too highly of the management of the Asylum and Patients by the able Superintendent, Dr. M'CULLOUGH, the Assistant Surgeon, Dr. GLENDINNING, the Housekeeper, and other officers.

During the last quarter, the discharges and deaths have exceeded the admissions by 5; but in the course of the whole year there has been an increase of 7 males and 15 females: the admissions of females, which were unusually few in the preceding year, having proportionately increased in the year just passed.

The infirmary wing, and the single room block, giving an addition of 70 beds—all on the male side —and the block of new offices, authorised by the several Courts of Quarter Sessions, at the October Sessions, 1873, are now completed; and the work is very satisfactory, and does great credit to the builder.

The 37 male patients formerly boarded in the Hereford Asylum, have now been brought into the Abergavenny Joint Asylum. The numbers now in the Asylum are : Males, 248; females, 259-in all There is one female patient at Fisherton 507. House. There are now 15 vacant beds on the male side; and the females are 14 in excess of the accommodation. In consequence, the Visitors have entered into a contract with the Cheshire County Asylum, Macclesfield, to receive and board not exceeding 50 patients, of either sex, according to convenience, at the rate of 14/- per week. This is 3/6 in excess of the charge made in the Joint Counties' Asylum, which excess will be charged to the several counties on building account. No change is about to be made from the present charge to the Unions, viz., 10/6 per week for maintenance. A call of £600 is made upon building account, for

repairs, &c., and maintenance of out boarded patients, proportionately divided to the several counties in union, according to agreed scale of—

15/1 from Monmouthshire ;3/5 from Breconshire ; and

1/6 in the  $\pounds$  from Radnorshire.

The Visitors apprehend that they will be compelled to ask the several Quarter Sessions for authority to increase the female department, as the male department has been increased, unless some new legislative provision is made for the less costly treatment of certain classes of patients.

## COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

## Joint Counties' Lunatic Asylum, Abergavenny, 30th October, 1875.

VISITS made yesterday and this day enable us to report that this Asylum is still in a condition very creditable to the United Counties. The pressure for male accommodation has now been met by the approaching completion of the additional buildings in progress at the date of the Commissioners' inspection on the 26th of September of last year.

The patients whose names now appear in the Statutory Books of the Asylum are 493; of these 263 are males, and 257 are females. Besides these, there are chargeable to the Joint Counties, maintained in other Asylums, 17 men and 1 woman: making the total in Asylums 511; *i.e.*, chargeable to Monmouthshire, 381; to Breconshire, 93; and to Radnorshire, 37. The 17 men are at Hereford Asylum, but they will be re-admitted here in the course of a few days. After those men shall have been brought back, and the beds on the male side in excess shall have been duly reduced in number, there will remain 10 vacancies in the male division; on the women's side, the inmates now exceed by 12

the proper accommodation. The question of further provision for females is therefore one which urgently calls for consideration and action by the Committee. The records of the Asylum inform us of the following changes among the patients :—

The rate of mortality has been somewhat above the average in County Asylums, but there is nothing in the causes of death calling for special remark. The following table sets forth the assigned causes :—

Post-mortem examinations were made in 46 instances. Coroner's inquests were held in the cases of 4 male patients. In three of them the deaths were sudden, but due to natural causes; in the fourth, the patient had been admitted in a dying state from dysentery, and the jury expressed an opinion (which was forwarded by the Coroner to the Guardians) that the patient was unfit to bear removal to this Asylum.

The patients now suffering from the chronic diseases usually prevalent in Asylums are not above the average number, and the present health is fairly good. Last week those registered as under medical treatment were 14 males and 36 females. At the time of our visit, 5 men and 12 women were in bed, and 2 of the latter sex were secluded. During the 13 months which have occurred since our last visit, there has been, according to the Medical Journal, no "restraint," and 3 men and 12 women only appear to have been secluded; the former on three occasions, and for a total duration of 8 hours, the latter on 28 occasions and for 151 hours. It has not however been the practice here to record as "seclusion" the locking of patients in their own rooms by day, where the window shutters have not also been closed. We have pointed out that all cases of compulsory isolation by day should be recorded as "seclusion" in the Medical Journal, wherein the qualifying conditions can also, with the reasons, be stated.

We have seen every patient. The clothing of both sexes is decidedly good in quality, also warm in texture, and in fair condition. Personal cleanliness also receives proper attention in each division. The patients are distributed thus : the great majority in the main building; 9 men occupy the farm-house; 23 a detached cottage; and 2 small villas respectively accommodate 17 and 11 women. The staff of attendants consists, by day, of a Head Attendant; 15 other men and I woman on the male side of the main building; of the Bailiff and his wife at the farm; and 2 men at the cottage; of the Chief Female Attendant and 14 female subordinate nurses for the women's division of the main building; of a laundress and 4 laundry maids in that department; and 3 women at the villas. Besides these, there is a night attendant of each sex. At present there is no continuous night supervision of epileptics, but we are glad to hear that Dr. M'CULLOUGH entertains the idea of making such an arrangement as soon as practicable. We saw the patients chiefly in-doors, and their conduct was, with a solitary exception, quiet and orderly. The case excepted was a woman, suffering from a sudden access of furious mania. Our attention was directed to a young imbecile girl, named Mary Ann Morgan, who would, we think, be a very favorable subject for education and training in an Idiot Asylum. We trust that the Visitors may be able to induce the Guardians of the Union to which she is chargeable (Crickhowell) to give her this advantage, since it may possibly result in so far developing her mental and physical powers as to enable her to earn her own livelihood.

We were present in some of the wards during dinner and at tea-time, and we tasted the food supplied to the patients. The dinner consisted of excellent pea-soup, bread, and beer; the tea was of fair strength and good quality. No complaint was made to us on the subject of food or general treatment, and Dr. M'CULLOUGH reports well of the attendants.

Employment is found for 130 men and 175 women. Of the former, 47 work on the land, 28 as artisans, 3 in the wash-house and offices. Of the women, 36 assist in the laundry and wash-house, 49 others are occupied by needle-work, and 9 serve in the kitchen and offices. The laundry is a complete establishment, having its own day-room and dormitories ; and it appears to work well In our passage through the wards and dormitories we noticed no want of order, cleanliness, or ventilation; and the single-rooms were all as they should be. The state of the bedding deserves praise, and the allowance of blankets is liberal; but we think that an underblanket should be given on the male side, as on the female, to every patient. For the epileptics (57 in number-of both sexes) the introduction of some low bedsteads is desirable, and a few couches in the male day-rooms would, for such cases, be also found

useful. The tiling in the corrider in No. 5 Male Ward has not yet given place to a plank floor, but its removal is, we understand, under consideration. The general comfort of the day-rooms is, we may say, studied, and with much success.

The Chapel accommodation is what it was insufficient. The average attendance at the two Sunday Services is 212, of both sexes; at the Week-day Service the number is 77. A few male patients occasionally, by permission, attend a Roman Catholic Chapel in the neighbourhood.

On enquiry into the amusement and out-door exercise of the patients, we learn that the dances are weekly, and take place in the small day-room of the laundry; and there are also given monthly concerts or theatrical entertainments, and occasional readings. The men have a cricket ground and bowling green, and croquet is provided for the women. For the recreation of both sexes, a brass band also exists.

The structural works in progress appear to have somewhat interfered with the extended out-door exercise of a large proportion of the patients, as many as 80 men and 197 women never going beyond their airing courts. This is a subject of regret, though the courts are very well kept, and we hope that as soon as practicable, Dr. M'CULLOUGH will arrange for a regular daily walk to be enjoyed by such of both sexes as cannot be usefully employed, excepting only those physically unable to take such exercise, and the very few too disorderly to be taken. The new buildings on the male side, which are well arranged (and the work is well executed), are nearly completed. One of the wards was occupied yesterday. These additions will provide 70 beds, of which 28 will be in single-rooms; there will also be new and cheerful day-rooms for 2 of the old, as well as for the new wards. Much-needed waterclosets, bath-rooms, lavatories, and sculleries will also be provided. The deficiency in these last named offices still remains in the old wards generally, and we hope that this defect, often noticed in previous entries, will now soon be remedied.

Making enquiry into the means existing for the extinction of fire, we hear that the only provision upon the premises consists of several fire engines distributed through the wards; but there are no means of throwing a stream of water over a burning roof. A water main (with the requisite hydrants, &c.) laid on from the town reservoir, for exceptional use in the event of fire, would appear to be the most satisfactory arrangement, and we commend this important subject to the consideration of the Visitors.

In conclusion, we have much pleasure in again bearing testimony to the praiseworthy manner in which the welfare and general comfort of the patients are attended to, and to the ability and good judgment shewn by the Superintendent in the management of the Asylum.

## REPORT

OF THE

## MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

## FOR THE YEAR 1875.

THE Medical Superintendent has the honour of submitting to the Committee of Visitors his Report for the year 1875, together with the usual Statistical Tables.

On the First of January last there remained under treatment in this Asylum 445 patients-201 males and 244 females. In addition to these, 40 males and I female were boarded in other Asylums, so that the number of patients chargeable to the Counties which form the present Union was, at the commencement of the year, 486-241 males and 245 females. During the year, besides 37 males re-admitted from the Hereford Asylum, there have been admitted 140, viz., 67 males and 73 females, being one more than in the previous year. The total number under treatment during the year was 622, and the average number resident was 461, being 30 more than in the previous year. The

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highest number resident at one time was 508, in December, and the lowest, 438, in May. The number discharged, recovered, was 49, viz., 16 males and 33 females, being in the proportion of 27.6 per cent. of the admissions ; but deducting the re-admissions from the Hereford Asylum, the recoveries were in the proportion of 35 per cent. of the ordinary admissions. During the year, 52 deaths have occurred, 33 of males and 19 of females, being in the proportion of 11'2 per cent. of the average number resident. This is slightly above the average though 2 per cent. less than in the preceding year. Diseases of the brain caused death in 24 cases, 14 of these being paralysis of the insane. The health of the patients generally was good.

At the beginning of the year 40 male patients were boarded in the Hereford Asylum under contract. During the year 3 of these died, and the remaining 37 were brought back to this Asylum as soon as the new buildings were sufficiently advanced for their reception in the end of October and beginning of November. There has been an increase during the year in the numbers chargeable to the three counties of 23, viz., 7 males and 16 females. The total number chargeable is now 509, viz., 248 males and 261 females.

The most important event of the year has been the completion of the principal additions to the male wards, which have supplied not only the much-wanted increase of accommodation, but by increasing the proportion of single rooms, day rooms, &c., have added much to the efficiency of the arrangements. I am glad to be able to report most favourably of the comfort and convenience of the new buildings.

These additions have provided for 70 male patients; but when the patients were brought back from Hereford, and the overcrowding relieved, only 15 vacant beds remain. The female wards were much crowded during the last few months, and at the end of the year the numbers were 15 in excess of the accommodation. Arrangements which have been in progress for some time, for boarding patients under contract in the Cheshire County Asylum, at Macclesfield, have since been carried out, and 15 female patients have now been sent there.

The admissions have again been high. Since the separation from Herefordshire, four years ago, the admissions, omitting the re-admissions of those who had been boarded out in other Asylums, have been as follows :—

It will be seen that there has been a steady increase in the number of admissions, and on referring to Table III, it will be found that the admissions are now much the same as they were ten or fifteen years ago, when they included those from Herefordshire, which were about one-third of the whole. I have so often referred to the legislative and other causes which tend to foster the admissions, that it is unnecessary to do so again.

The progress of extensive additions and alterations necessarily caused much inconvenience, and demanded increased exertions and vigilance from all. These were cheerfully rendered, and I have much pleasure in thanking the officers for their cordial help. I beg to thank the Committee of Visitors, and especially the Building Committee, for the kindness with which they received my suggestions for increasing the efficiency of the Institution.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Joint Counties' Asylum, Abergavenny, January 13th, 1876.

MR. CHAIRMAN & GENTLEMEN,-

I have the honour of submitting to you my Report for the year 1875.

The Services in the Asylum Chapel, with the exception of such omissions as were mentioned in the quarterly reports, have been held as enjoined by the Rule.

The wards have been periodically visited; and they are all, more especially the new ones, adequately supplied with Bibles, Testaments, Prayer Books, and Hymn Books. For the purchase of some of these, I have to thank the Committee for an allowance of £5 4s. 2d.

The number of funerals performed during the year has been 26, out of 52 deaths. The Cemetery being now almost completely filled, Dr. M'CULLOUGH will, I presume, bring before you a plan for rendering it available for further burying. It has occurred to my mind, that in cases where the relatives of the deceased can afford to remove the bodies, so as have them buried in their respective parishes, or even in the Abergavenny Cemetery, but have no inclination to do so, some pressure should be put upon them to induce them to do this, in order thus to lessen the number buried in the Asylum ground.

The amusements, with the exception of the Readings, which, when frequently given, fail to attract a male (not a female) audience, have engaged full attention. In addition to the daily and weekly recreations, these have consisted chiefly of Dramatic Performances and Concerts; Mr. PERRY, the Farm Bailiff, occupying, in the latter, a prominent part.

Mr. LANCY, a professional reciter of great ability, residing in the town, gratuitously gave an entertainment to the inmates this Christmas, and greatly delighted many of them. At the same time, he observed, that some, more especially among the men, confronted him with a dull, impassive countenance, which if met with among a sane audience, would have a disconcerting effect upon the reciter. Upon the preacher these sad faces have a different influence; for with him they seem, at all events, to be more in sympathy, and as if their possessors were inwardly exclaiming-'Ah! life with us is too serious a thing for laughter.' We are also indebted to Mr. FRANCIS for acting as accompanist to Mr. LANCY, and even lending his piano for the occasion. It is much to be regretted that there is not such an instrument belonging to the establishment. It could be made of great service, and would not cost much over the sum already allowed for the purchase of a barrel organ, never yet procured, and very difficult to obtain of a suitable character.

The Band has acquitted itself in a manner deserving of all praise. It has now, for some time, gained a degree of efficiency adequate to the needs of the establishment.

The Singing Class, during the season for in-door recreations, has met weekly for practice; but as we are now to lose the valuable services of Miss BISHOP, who plays the harmonium and leads the singing during Divine Service; who also leads the female singers in the glees and part-songs, some difficulty will be experienced in the working of this department; unless indeed a successor to Miss BISHOP be secured who, in time, may be trained into that state of efficiency which has gained for Miss BISHOP the responsible position for which she has now been selected.

The additional allowance to Working Patients is thus divided :-Bread and Cheese, with half a pint of Beer or Cider in the morning, and

half a pint of Beer or Cider in the Afternoon. On Tuesdays the Meat and Vegetables are made into an Irish Stew, and occasionally Rhubarb, Suet, or Meat Puddings are substituted. On Saturday the Meat is made into Pea Soup. The Female Patients in the Refractory Wards and those resident in the Laundry Building, are each allowed half a pound of Bread weekly extra. The Rations are sent to each Ward in Bulk, and are there divided by the Attendant among the Patients resident, according to their respective

requirements ; by this practice very little (if any) waste occurs. The Tea and Coffee is made by the Attendant in each Ward-each Female Patient being allowed 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> oz. Tea, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>lb. Sugar, and 1 pt. Milk weekly; each Male Patient being allowed 2 oz. Coffee, <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> oz. Tea, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>lb. Sugar, and 1 pt. Milk weekly. Five days in the week the Patients have two kinds of Vegetables-Potatoes always; the second vegetable consisting of whatever may be in season, such as Cabbage, Brocoli, Beans, Peas, Turnips, Carrots, Parsnips, &c. An equivalent in Cheese is often given in lieu of Butter for Supper.
