THE Committee, in issuing their 19th Annual Report, are gratified in again recording their testimony as to the increasing efficiency of the Institution.

In compliance with the 16th and 17th Vict. Chap. 97., Sec. 62, they have to certify that the House is in thorough repair, very clean, and comfortably furnished.

The Steward's House, which was both small and inconvenient in its arrangements, has been enlarged. The money allowed for this purpose has been judiciously expended, and the house is now fitting and commodious.

The water supply during the Summer has been ample. The reservoir works are, however, not yet completed, the patients having been much occupied in forming and enlarging the airing courts.

The female airing courts are finished and in full use. They have already contributed much to the happiness and comfort of the inmates. The progress of those on the male side is being actively prosecuted. The grounds are being laid out, and the whole of the works will, it is hoped, be completed during the winter.

The Committee of Visitors have entered into a satisfactory contract with the Visiting Justices of the Abergavenny Asylum, for the reception of 25 male patients, up to September, 1868.

The Visitors assembled at the Quarterly Meeting held on the 11th October last, requested the House Committee "To obtain information as to the expediency of Erecting a Brewery and Bakery, for the use of the Asylum, and to report the result of their inquiries at the next Annual Meeting." In pursuance of this Resolution, directions were given to Mr. Robinson, the Clerk, to visit some of the leading Asylums, and to procure every information, as to the working and advantages of these departments.

At the General Meeting of the House Committee, held on November 15, the Clerk reported that he had Visited **two** County Asylums and several Private Establishments, and made every inquiry. The Committee, deeming the Report satisfactory, directed the Clerk to procure an Estimate of the Probable Expense of adding a Brewing and Baking Establishment to this Asylum, in order that the same might be considered at the Meeting to be held on the 20th December.

The Clerk, in pursuance of the directions given, produced at the Meeting held on the 20th December, Plans and Specifications, &c., of the proposed Brewing and Baking Establishments. These were carefully considered, and the following Resolution was unanimously adopted, viz :—

"That a Brewing and Baking Establishment would be very desirable and highly advantageous. That the Plans and Specifications now produced be submitted to the Annual Meeting, coupled with a strong recommendation that the work should be forthwith taken in hand and completed."

The Committee deem it right to state that one of the female attendants—for a wilful breach of the Rules of the Establishment in regard to the kindling of fires, and having thereby imperilled the safety of the house—was summarily dismissed. Another female attendant was reprimanded for neglecting her duties. With these two exceptions, all the other attendants have well performed their work, and have given the Committee every satisfaction.

The Committee, in conclusion, have to offer their cordial acknowledgments to the Officers of the Institution, for the perseverance and humanity with which they have fulfilled their several duties.

I BEG again respectfully to submit to the Committee of Visitors, for the nineteenth time, my Annual Report.

The number of admissions were much fewer than the previous year.

The per-centage of cures upon the number of admissions has been greater than upon previous years.

The mortality upon the numbers present was much as usual ; but it is much regretted that many patients are still sent to the Asylum in the last stage of exhaustion, several never having left their bed until overtaken by death.

During the past year three inquests have been held ; but it is gratifying to state that in each instance the verdict returned was from natural causes.

The causes of death were—from consumption, 16 ; exhaustion, 9 ; general paralysis, 8 ; debility, 9 ; epilepsy, 8 ; fever, 1 ; disease of kidney, 2 ; cancer, 1 ; disease of knee-joint, 1 ; disease of heart, 2 ; apoplexy, 1 ; paralysis, 1.

Since the commencement of the present winter, an arrangement upon moderate terms has been entered into with the Volunteer band for their services once a-week, from seven to nine o'clock, which has been the source of great amusement to the patients.

Of a Sunday evening Reading and Singing classes have been formed, and hitherto we have been indebted to Mr. Robinson for the use of his Harmonium. I would therefore suggest to the Committee of Visitors, that one should be purchased by the Institution.

To the Committee of Visitors my sincere acknowledgments are offered for the confidence shown me, and to all the Officials I return my cordial thanks for their support.

REPORT
OF THE
COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

NORTH WALES ASYLUM,
6th May, 1867.

WE have this day visited the Asylum, and inspected all its wards and premises. We have to record the following as the changes in the Patients since the 21st May, 1866, the date of the last visit, and their present numbers :—

One male patient committed suicide by strangulation. No inquest having been held, the case formed the subject of correspondence between our Board and the Committee of Visitors.

The remaining deaths were from general paralysis, phthisis, and other ordinary causes.

In one case, that of a male patient belonging to the borough of Chester, for special reasons an inquest was held, and a verdict returned of death from disease of the lungs. Of the Pauper patients, thirty-one are from the Chester, and fifteen from the Abergavenny Asylum, received under contracts, renewable annually with the Visitors. It is proposed to receive, if required, ten more patients from the latter Asylum. The number agreed to be received from Chester is not limited.

The Female side of the Asylum may now be considered nearly full. There are more vacant beds in the Male division.

The new wards on each side are completely furnished and in occupation, and afford excellent accommodation for the numbers of patients for whom they were designed.

The ordinary weekly charge for Pauper patients is 8s. 2d., and that for out County patients 12s. 10d. The Private patients generally pay from 15s. to 25s. per week.

The patients last registered as under medical treatment, were seven in the Male, and fourteen in the Female division.

In the former, at the time of our visit, eight, and in the latter as many as twenty-eight, patients were in bed.

As respects the Female patients keeping their beds in No. 6 Ward, seventeen in number, and many of uncleanly habits, an additional Nurse is required; and we are informed that a third Nurse, whose place is now vacant, is about to be engaged.

Adverting to the staff of Nurses, we are strongly of opinion that two are not sufficient for the proper care and supervision of the patients, thirty in number, and for the most part of a very troublesome class, in No. 4 Ward.

The Chapel, which is quite inadequate to the requirements of the Asylum, accommodating only 150 patients, is crowded at both the services, Welsh and English, now performed on Sundays; and we trust that the necessity for its enlargement will receive the early consideration of the Visitors.

According to the Medical Journal, the patients secluded since the last visit have been ten in the Male, and twenty-four in the Female division; the former altogether on eleven, and the latter on forty-five occasions, and many of each sex for several days consecutively.

We found two women in seclusion, one of whom, although constantly locked into her room and kept in bed on account of her destructive propensities, has not hitherto been so entered in the Journal.

Connected with the New Wards good spacious airing-grounds are in course of being laid out, by the removal of the walls near the buildings, and the enclosure of the adjoining garden. The Female airing-ground is bounded by an open iron palisade.

More carpeting is still required in the Day-rooms and Dormitories referred to in the last Report, and linoleum or matting in the Corridors with tiled floors.

We trust that no unnecessary delay will take place in carrying out the recommendation that the lower portion of the walls of the Female recreation room be boarded, and the upper parts plastered and painted, or papered.

We further advise the construction of an open covered way from the new Female Wards to the detached building referred to; and we repeat the recommendations, that Windows be opened in the west wall of the Recreation and Work rooms. Hand-rails have been fixed to the several staircases, and proved a great convenience.

Partitions have not as yet been introduced between the Baths in the general Bath rooms; nor have any regulations been prepared, and hanging up for the guidance of the Attendants. The Attendants in both divisions have been provided with appropriate uniforms.

There are still many straw beds, most of which are too short.

Papering and painting, which in some parts are much required, are in progress. The walls in some cases admit the damp.

The Ventilation in several rooms, occupied by dirty patients, is very imperfect.

More illustrated and entertaining books, and means of indoor amusement, are needed.

Some of the women at the time of our visit, were excited and noisy: the men were, without exception, quiet and orderly.

The personal condition of the Male patients, as to clothing, was not so satisfactory as that of the Females; many of whom, we were glad to find, have been provided with neat woollen dresses, which are about to be generally introduced in the Female division.

To revert to the cases of patients who are much in bed during the day, we suggest, for their comfort, more furniture of an ordinary kind, as chairs and small tables, bedside carpets, and commodes; also some reclining chairs for the feeble.

The Female patients, to the number of seventy and upwards, walk out in parties beyond the grounds on Tuesdays and Fridays. About eighty or ninety of the Men are taken out for walks on Sundays.

The Dinners, on the day of our visit, consisted of what is termed soup, but very poor and tasteless, with bread.

We strongly recommend the substitution, on Mondays, of meat in a solid form.

Upon the completion of the Reservoir, now in course of enlargement, the supply of water will be ample. The Reservoir will require to be carefully fenced off, for the protection of the patients.

The Kitchen, and Offices in connection therewith, are rendered very dark and gloomy by the proximity of the Area wall ; and we suggest, as an easy and effectual remedy, the lowering of the wall and embankment several feet.

Upon the whole, the result of our visit has been to satisfy us of the desire of DR. JONES, and the Officers acting under him, in every way to promote the comfort and benefit of the patients.

THE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORTH WALES
COUNTIES LUNATIC ASYLUM,

GENTLEMEN,

In making my Annual Report to you of the duties connected with my office as Chaplain, I have little that is new to add to the Report I had the honour to make to you last year.

There has occurred no interruption in the regular course of Chapel Services, which consist of one English and one Welsh Service, with a Sermon after each, on Sundays, and of Prayers on Wednesdays and Fridays.

The same degree of attention and reverence which I have remarked upon in my previous Reports still prevails; and I can confidently say that, with very many, these Services are a great source of comfort. Often has this assertion been made to me in course of conversation with the patients, and many feel it to be a disappointment when prevented by illness or other causes from attending Chapel. Frequent have been the assurances given to me of the great consolation derived by these afflicted persons from the preaching of the Gospel.

I have made it my duty regularly to visit the wards for the purpose of administering consolation and encouragement to those most in need of it. As a rule, the patients, both sick and aged, are glad to hear a portion of scripture read to them, and they join heartily in the prayers; they have received my ministrations very thankfully, and seemed fully to appreciate my attempts to cheer and comfort them by friendly and sympathising conversation.

A visit from their minister seems acceptable, and if it has no better effect, it helps to keep up that spirit of cheerfulness and contentment which it is so desirable to promote, as far as possible, among the afflicted inmates of an Asylum.

Every successive year of my labours among those entrusted to my care here, impresses more deeply upon my mind the conviction that a belief in the truths of Holy Scripture has a beneficial and curative effect upon their minds, and that a large proportion of those who are now insane would never have become so, had they been able to enjoy the consolations of religion in the various trials and temptations of life. While it must be admitted that an earnest endeavour to soothe, comfort, and instruct the afflicted inmates of an Asylum ever brings with it its measure of reward, still it will readily be believed that to minister thus closely to minds diseased must also constitute the most trying part of a Chaplain's duties.

Discouraging and naturally depressing as the duties of an Asylum Chaplain sometimes are, yet cheering gleams of sunshine do occasionally break in upon him to encourage him on with his work, and to lead him to hope that his labours will not be in vain. One or two such instances I have now in my mind, where there was exhibited the deepest gratitude for every little act of kindness shown to them, combined with thorough resignation, and entire reliance on the goodness of God. It has been my privilege to kneel at the bedside of some whose sad malady had marred their enjoyment of this life, but whose death was yet full of expectation of unmixed happiness in the world to come.

My best thanks are due to Mrs. Turner Jones and Mr. O. Robinson for their much valued assistance in conducting the musical part of the Chapel Services.

I have also gratefully to acknowledge the cordial support and co-operation which I have invariably received from Dr. Turner Jones, and the other Officers of the Institution, in the discharge of my ministerial duties.
