Note.—It is deemed essential that the House Committee should consist of persons resident within a moderate distance of the Asylum; yet, the occasional attendance of the Visiting Justices of the distant counties would be much desired by the House Committee.

### REPORT

OF

# THE HOUSE COMMITTEE.

THE House Committee of Visitors of the United Counties Asylum in North Wales, in presenting their seventh report, have again the satisfaction of recording the prosperous state of the Institution.

In obedience to the Act, 16 & 17 Vict., cap. 97, sec. 62, they set out by stating that the house is in good repair, thoroughly clean, and comfortably furnished; and that the gas apparatus continues in serviceable order.

The number of patients now under treatment amounts to-

The Committee have pleasure in announcing that, notwithstanding the rise which has taken place in the price of provisions within the last year, they have been enabled, by a system of careful economy, to reduce the weekly charge for paupers from 10s. 6d. to 9s. 4d.; and they are not without hopes that when the annual accounts are made out, there may be a sufficient surplus to justify them in making a further reduction.

The measures adopted, as stated in the last Report, to insure a sufficient supply of water, have proved effectual, and are likely so to continue.

The buildings referred to in the last Report as being unfinished, are now completed and paid for.

The Committee have to regret that they have not as yet been furnished with means to erect suitable stables and cowhouses, in place of the insecure temporary buildings now existing, and which are a constant source of inconvenience.

The Committee, finding that the land already in hand was insufficient for the occupation of the patients and for the supply of the house, have recently taken in addition fourteen acres, at an annual rent of £2 per acre, from Mrs. Barrett; and they have every confidence that this will prove both beneficial to the patients and profitable to the Institution.

The Committee, having entered into contracts for the carriage of coal and other necessaries, have disposed of the horses hitherto in use, and the proceeds have been placed to the credit of the Asylum.

Notwithstanding the watchful care exercised in ventilating the dormitories and day-rooms, it has at times during the hot weather been found impossible to obviate the discomforts arising from the close atmosphere already complained of.

The Committee deem it right to draw the attention of the Magistrates of the several Counties in Union to certain resolutions relative to the Drying Rooms,\* and to the correspondence which took place between the Rev. W. H. Owen and Mr. James Braidwood, superintendent of the London Fire Brigade, in the months of last April, May, June, and July. A copy of the proceedings in question is annexed to this Report.

The committee have pleasure in repeating their warm acknowledgments for the zealous manner in which the Medical Gentlemen, the Chaplain, the Matron, the Clerk, and other officials have continued to discharge their onerous and trying duties.

One melancholy task remains—to record in terms of the deepest feeling their sense of the heavy loss sustained by the Institution in the death of their late respected chairman, John Heaton, Esq.; and the Committee take this occasion of giving a permanent form to their expressions of sorrowful appreciation of his long-continued services, by incorporating into their Report the Resolution unanimously entered into at the Quarterly Meeting of the Committee of Visitors held in this Asylum on the 28th June, 1855.

On that day, Townshend Mainwaring, Esq., being in the chair-

"That, before proceeding to the business of the day, the following tribute to the memory of the late chairman, John Heaton, Esq., be entered on the books of the Institution; and that the Clerk be directed to forward copies of the same to the Hon. Mrs. Heaton, and to Major Heaton, now serving his country in the East:—

"The Committee of Visitors of the North Wales Lunatic Asylum, assembled this day at their Quarterly Meeting, are anxious to give expression to their feelings of deep regret at the public and private loss they have experienced in the death of John Heaton, Esq., for so many years their efficient and indefatigable Chairman. "The Committee, while recording their strong sense of the valuable services of their late Chairman, and of the benefits which accrued to the Institution under his active Presidency, have also a melancholy satisfaction in thus perpetuating the remembrance of his personal kindness to each of them individually. They desire that a copy of this inadequate but sincere tribute of respect should be forwarded to the Hon. Mrs. Heaton, accompanied by the assurance of their unfeigned sympathy in her affliction, and that of the rest of the bereaved family at Plas Heaton."

### APPENDIX.

April 5th. At the adjourned meeting, John Heaton, Esquire, in the chair :-

Mr. Williams was directed to prepare a plan and estimate for increasing the accommodation in the drying room.

April 20th. At the adjourned meeting, Thomas Hughes, Esquire, in the chair:—
The plans for increased accommodation in the drying room were submitted and adopted, and the Architect was directed to procure tenders for carrying the same into effect, with the addition of boarding over the whole of the room.

May 4th. At the adjourned meeting, Thomas Hughes, Esquire, in the chair:—
Mr. Williams was directed to proceed with the drying room, and Thomas Bartley's tender to complete the same for the sum of £73 10s. was accepted.

June 28th. Quarterly Meeting, Townshend Mainwaring, Esquire, in the chair:—

The correspondence between the Rev. W. H. Owen and Mr. Braidwood, superintendent of the London Fire Brigade, in regard to the danger of ignition in the drying room, having been laid before the meeting, and the Committee having personally examined the alterations already effected in that room, and given the whole subject their most serious consideration—

IT WAS RESOLVED :-

That the Architect be authorized to complete the drying room, omitting the pipes in the upper rooms, and admitting hot air from the room below:—that galvanized iron "horses" be substituted for the wooden horses now in

use:—and that the copper tubing for gas lights be used in the drying room:—and that the wood-work be properly steeped in a preparation of alum.

RESOLVED :-

That the Clerk be directed to inspect the drying rooms in the public institutions in Liverpool, and report the result to the next meeting of the Committee.

July 13th. Adjourned Quarterly Meeting, THE REV. W. H. OWEN, in the chair:-

The Clerk having, in compliance with the resolution of the last meeting, inspected the several public institutions in Liverpool and its vicinity, reported, that with the exception of the drying room at Rainhill Lunatic Asylum, those in the other establishments are within the precincts of each building, and heated to a much higher temperature than it is proposed to introduce into the drying room in this Asylum.

It was ordered, that the correspondence between the Rev. W. H. Owen and Mr. Braidwood be included in the printed statement of the quarterly meeting

to be sent to visitors.

# CORRESPONDENCE BETWEEN THE REV. W. H. OWEN AND MR. BRAIDWOOD.

RHYLLON, June 18th, 1855.

SIR,

I much hope you will pardon the liberty I take in thus trespassing upon you. I am one of the Committee of Visitors of the North Wales Lunatic Asylum—a large establishment located in this neighbourhood. We (the committee) in order to procure increased accommodation in the drying room, recently directed it to be floored horizontally, so as to divide the apartment into two large drying closets for clothes, one above the other—the planking, &c., is of pine, the heat will be generated by boilers at some distance off; and the hot air brought into the drying-room by cast iron pipes.

On inspecting the works a few days ago, I found the heat with the present number of pipes very great; and when the additional hot air pipes are introduced, there seems to me considerable danger of ignition.

My apprehensions have since been increased by a perusal of your evidence before the House of Lords, in 1846, as detailed at page 16 in No. 91, in the article "On Fire and Fire Insurance," in the *Quarterly Review*, for December last.

The works have at my instance been suspended for the present. There will be a general meeting of the Visitors on the 28th of this month, and any information you may have the kindness to give will be most thankfully acknowledged.

We have more than 200 patients in the Asylum, and a fire in such a place would be terrible.

SIR.

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your note of yesterday, as to the drying closet in a Lunatic Asylum.

As I am not aware of the manner in which the drying closet in question communicates with the Asylum, or whether it is within it or not, I can only give a general opinion; viz., That no drying closet in so large an establishment should be within the walls of the building, but placed at a safe distance by itself, clear of all other buildings.

We have had a great many fires in the drying closets of lunatic asylums here, but very rarely in any other part of the buildings: but as they are generally placed in a separate building, the annoyance and inconvenience is comparatively trifling.

Drying closets can hardly be made tolerably safe, except at a most extravagant expense, and therefore the cheapest plan is to place them by themselves; and if they are burned out, there is no great harm done.

# MEDICAL OFFICERS' REPORT.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORTH WALES LUNATIC ASYLUM.

### GENTLEMEN,

The rules laid down for our guidance demand that we should annually report upon the state and progress of the establishment under our care: we therefore proceed to the discharge of that duty to the best of our ability.

The tables appended will show the number of admissions, the discharges, and deaths; by which it appears, that although the admissions have been rather fewer than in the preceding year, the cures have increased. The Asylum has been, we are thankful to say, extremely healthy and free from epidemic disease during the year 1855.

The patients are employed in the manner described in former reports.

In our report of last year, we stated that seclusion in the padded rooms was very rarely resorted to; we have now the pleasure to say that in only one instance was it employed during 1855. We find that maniacall paroxyms are shortened, in duration and violence, more by relative freedom and exercise than by seclusion.

As we shall have to refer to the report of the Commissioners in Lunacy, in the course of our observations, it is now given.

"DENBIGH COUNTY ASYLUM, December 15th, 1855.

"There are at present 195 patients in this Asylum:—viz., 14 males, and 95 females, private; and 75 males, and 97 females, pauper patients.

We have seen them all. They were quiet and comfortable, well clothed, and clean in their persons.

The patients appear to be generally in good bodily health; but a few of the females are keeping their beds. One male patient only was in bed to-day.

We learn that 64 of the men and 70 of the women were pretty regularly employed. Of the men—about 16 occupy themselves in the garden, 20 at the pump, 11 at shoemaking and carpenters' work, and 17 in the wards.

The females are principally employed in the kitchen and laundry, and in needle work. Prayers are read twice a week, and on Sunday.

The wards were throughout clean and well ventilated, and the bedding of good quality. We recommend, however, that an under blanket should be placed on each bed.

The tile flooring on the lower wards is worn in some places, and we recommend that wooden floors should be gradually substituted.

The work room for females was somewhat over-crowded, and we think it would be well to establish a system of occupation in each of the day rooms.

We also recommend that one of the division walls between the airing courts on each side should be removed: the materials thus obtained might be usefully employed in building stables, which we understand are much wanted.

Since the last visit of the Commissioners, in September, 1854, the new laundry has been completed, and workshops have been erected; the supply of water has also been increased, and is now found to be ample.

We are much pleased to learn that fourteen acres of land have recently been rented for the use of the institution, and we are of opinion that this addition to the means of occupation will tend materially to the benefit of the patients, and be of service to the establishment.

Seventy six patients have been admitted since our last visit: 72 have been discharged, and 28 have died from various causes.

We have signed and examined the various books, which appear to be kept with care and regularity.

On the whole, the condition of this establishment is good and creditable to those engaged in its management.

The Committee will observe, that the Commissioners recommend the removal of the wall between two of the airing courts on both sides of the house, and that the materials should be used in the erection of the long-required cow-houses and stables. We cordially concur in this suggestion, and we would willingly dispense with all the walls which confine the patients within such narrow limits; but the unprotected state of our grounds for the want of a boundary wall militates against such a proposal, as daffording too great facilities for escapes.

Another recommendation by the Commissioners is, the removal of the tile flooring now fast falling into decay, and the substitution of wood oflooring. We have very long been dissatisfied with the tile flooring; the booldness and dampness of which we are convinced are very injurious to the linealth and comfort of the patients. As the expense will fall gradually upon the Counties, we trust no opposition will be made to this most essential measure.

As the house is now very crowded, and additional space is urgently required, we propose that the ovens in the basement story be removed and placed in the kitchen, now nearly useless and only used as a dining-room for servants; by which a good day-room already floored with wood, and unoccupied in consequence of the fire-place being blocked up and used as a flue for the ovens, will be rendered available.

The consumption of coal is very considerable, and the Asylum is exposed to the chances of much fraud from the want of a weighing machine on the premises, not only for coal, but for weighing hay, straw, manure, and other articles. We therefore, strongly advise the erection of a machine without delay; we are informed that the cost will be about £36.

In the course of last summer we were enabled to reduce the rate of payment for pauper patients from 10s. 6d. to 9s. 4d. a week, notwithstanding the high price of provisions. We have now the satisfaction to recommend a further reduction from 9s. 4d. to 8s. 9d. This saving to the establishment has been accomplished by a complete revision of the diet table, without infringing in the least upon the comfort of the patients, and without producing the slightest dissatisfaction amongst them.

We are convinced that the land so kindly and considerately purchased and rented to the Asylum by Mrs. Barrett, at the instance of the present to Chairman of Quarter Sessions, will prove a very valuable boon both as a matter of profit to the Asylum, as well as affording additional sources of occupation and amusement to the patients.

Although the Committee of Visitors have feelingly and eloquently expressed their regret at the death of our late lamented Chairman, we hope we may be allowed to add the sincere tribute of our sorrow on the loss of one who gave us his confidence and his undeviating support from the opening of the Asylum to the day of his death.

Our grateful acknowledgements are due, and are hereby proffered to the Committee of Visitors for their continued kindness and support, and our thanks are no less due to our efficient colleagues in office—the Reverend the Chaplain, the Matron, and House Steward—from whose services we continue to derive the most able assistance.
