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# REPORT

OF THE

## COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

### FOR 1863.

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THE Committee, in issuing their 15th. Annual Report, are gratified in being able, this year again, to bear witness to the continued, and progressive efficiency of the Asylum.

In submission to the 16th and 17th Vict., cap. 97, sec. 62, they have to report that the House is in good repair, thoroughly clean, and adequately furnished.

The Medical Superintendent's house, begun in February, is now completed. It was occupied by Dr. Turner Jones and his family early in October. They speak highly of the comfort, and convenience of its arrangements.

The upper stories of the front wing, including the Old Chapel, have been converted into dormitories. These dormitories afford ample space for 50 additional beds. They were first occupied in February last, and have proved to be commodious, and healthy apartments.

The Day and Recreation Rooms on the Female side which, in December 1862 were in course of completion, have been in full use

for many months, and, as anticipated, have tended greatly to the well-being of the patients.

The Works, in the Laundry and Wash House, are sufficiently advanced, to receive the new steam boiler, and to admit of the fitting up of more drying closets, which are much wanted.

The store rooms, erected in the Central Court, are in every way a great gain, and "a most welcome relief"\* to the Steward and attendants.

An additional Rain Water Tank has been finished. It will contain 21,000 gallons. The excavations, &c., were worked by the patients and their attendants. It is right to repeat, that these alterations and additions have been successfully prosecuted, under the superintendence of the Clerk.

"The Tender of Messrs. Clark & Son, for the building of the New Wings, has been accepted. The References adduced by the Firm as to their ability and competence, to execute the works, and the sureties offered, appearing to the Committee to be the most satisfactory." (See Minute's of Committee, Dec. 29.)

In compliance with the recommendation of the Commissioners Lunacy—such recommendation having been earnestly supported by the Chaplain—an Organ has been set up in the New Chapel. On a Brass plate, in front of the Instrument, is the following inscription:—

#### THIS ORGAN

Was Charitably provided for the New Chapel, at the North Wall Counties Lunatic Asylum, by the Ladies—residing in or connected with the five Counties in Union, whose names are here engraved (see page Thirty-seven.) This work of Mercy—taken up and carried into effect by these Compassionate Gentlewomen—was the result of an appeal made to them on behalf of the Inmates, by the Revd. W. Hicks Owen, M.A., Vicar of Tremeirchion, and one of the Visitors of the Institution.

"Blessed are the Merciful for they shall obtain Mercy." Matt. 5.

It is impossible, for any one who has not been present at the Service, to form a just conception of the beneficial results of this Charitable provision. The Organ, so to speak, *leads* the singing, keeps the Voices in Unison, and enables the patients to take their share in the public worship of the Great Father, with becoming reverence and solemnity. Its soothing tones too, are an unspeakable consolation to these afflicted ones.

Sir Watkin Williams Wynn, Bart., M.P., has considerably furnished the Chapel with a Lectern. This—owing to the small space *necessarily* allotted to the Reading Desk—has been found very useful.

In consequence of the death of the late official Auditor, the accounts have not yet been examined. A new Auditor has been appointed. The annual statement of accounts, will have been audited, and verified, in sufficient time to appear in the General Report. The Committee have the fullest Confidence that the accounts will be found as precise and accurate as hertofore.

The Commissioners in Lunacy in their Report of the *21st January*, 1863, have spoken in very high terms, of the valuable services of the Medical Superintendent, and of those also of the Medical Assistant. The Committee heartily concur with the Commissioners in their commendation. They have also to record their warm appreciation of the unwearied diligence, and the judicious manner in which the Chaplain, the Matron, the Clerk, and the other Officials have fulfilled their trying duties.

MEDICAL OFFICERS' REPORT

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*To the Chairman and Committee of Visitors of the North Wales  
Lunatic Asylum.*

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you the fifteenth annual report to which is appended the usual Statistical Tables.

On 1st January, 1863, the numbers in the Asylum were 7 male—female private—106 male—110 female pauper patients. Total 231.

In the course of the year 74 males, and 48 females have been admitted, of whom 11 males belonged to the private class. This shews an increase of 65 upon the admission of the previous years, when through the over-crowded state of the Asylum, several patients were necessarily refused admission, and were therefore temporarily placed in other Asylums.

The discharges during the past year have been 34 males, 21 females—total 55—of these numbers 21 males and 19 females had recovered.

The deaths during the same period were males 18—females 15—total 33.

The numbers in the Asylum on the 31st December, 1863, were 11 males, 7 females, private—125 male, 123 female pauper patients—total 265.

The mean daily resident numbers, were 128 males—134 females—total 262, being an increase of 30, upon the average of the preceding year. An Analysis of the admission shews the very unfavourable nature of the disease in the great majority of the cases, viz., 4 Congenital Idiots—5 General Paralytics—13 Epileptics—26 transferred from other Asylums—16 readmissions. Yet notwithstanding these adverse circumstances the per centage of the recoveries ( $32\frac{3}{4}$ ) though

not quite as high will bear a favourable comparison with the mean per centage of former years (38½).

The mean annual mortality, since the opening of the Asylum, has been 8·1 per cent. During the present year it has amounted to 9 per cent. of those under treatment. The average per centage, in the County Asylums of England, being about 11 per cent.

Of the deaths 45 per cent occurred in those admitted in the course of the year. The ratio, 3 to 2, of deaths hitherto existing amongst the males, as compared with the females, has not been sustained. This I attribute to the very low mortality of females during the two previous years, leaving a large number of weak and chronic cases.

No disease of an epidemic character has occurred during the year, the principal causes of death being Phthisis, Maniacal exhaustion, Diarrhœa and General Paralysis.

In accordance with the 44 Sect., of the Lunacy Amendment Act, notice has been transmitted to the Coroner of every death. In one instance only did he think it necessary to hold an inquest. A morsel of bread accidentally passed into the larynx of an hemiplegic female aged 72, suffocation was imminent, an operation Laryngotomy became requisite and was successfully performed. The patient, however, subsequently succumbed to an inflammatory bronchial attack. The Coroner expressed his satisfaction with the evidence adduced, and a verdict of death from natural causes was returned by the jury.

It will be recollected that at the last annual meeting, I reported, as requested, upon that portion of the Lunacy Amendment Act which has reference to the removal of chronic cases to the Workhouses of their respective Union. Since then I have been favoured by the Commissioners in Lunacy with their explanation of the CLAUSE.

“MINUTE.—CHRONIC LUNATICS.—ARRANGEMENTS FOR THEIR REMOVAL FROM ASYLUMS TO WORKHOUSES.

*November, 1863.*

THE Board had under further consideration the provisions of the “Lunacy Acts Amendment Act, 1862,” § 8, as explained by the 2nd

Section of the "Lunacy Acts Amendment Act, 1863," empowering the Visitors of any Asylum, with the approval of the Commissioners in Lunacy and the President of the Poor Law Board to make arrangements with the Guardians of any Parish or Union within the district for which the Asylum has been provided for the removal from the Asylum to the Workhouse of such Parish or Union, and the reception and care therein of a limited number of Chronic Lunatics, chargeable to the same, or any other Parish or Union.

Resolved as follows :

1. The arrangements authorized are, in the opinion of the Board, intended to meet the deficiency of accommodation in Asylums and to enable Visitors, in special cases, to make provision for the immediate reception into the Asylums of all recent and probably curable cases. The Legislature clearly did not contemplate the reception into the Workhouses generally of the Chronic Patients referred to, and the constitution of a number of small Lunatic Establishments; but the selection by the Visitors of one or more Workhouses, in which adequate accommodation, care, and attendance can be ensured. Consequently all applications for the approval of the Commissioners, must originate with Visitors of Asylums; and no such application received directly from a Board of Guardians can be entertained.

2. Proper Rules and Regulations, modified according to circumstances, will be required to be prepared and approved. In the meantime the Board consider and determine that the following conditions are (amongst others) indispensable, and will, in all cases, be insisted on, viz. :

(1.) Separate wards properly constructed, arranged, and furnished for the patients of the respective sexes. The dormitories to be distinct from the day-rooms, and the former to afford cubical space per patient, of 500 feet, and the latter 400. Single bed-rooms to contain at least 600 cubic feet.

(2.) A liberal dietary analogous to that of the Asylums.

(3.) Ample means of out-door exercise and recreation.

(4.) Due medical visitation.

(5.) Properly qualified paid attendants.

(6.) Medical and other Registers ; Records similar to those in use in Licensed Houses."

Fully impressed with their importance as Curative agents in the treatment of the insane, that system of occupation and amusement which has been so succesful in their results, has been strictly adhered to. As special seasons of enjoyment may be noticed the 10th. March, when, in celebration of the marriage of our Prince and Princess, the services of the Volunteer band were obtained a large proportion of the patients male and female were assembled in the new day and recreation room, and a very agreeable evening was spent.

On Christmas day about 180 of both sexes sat down in the same room, to a bountiful repast of roast beef and plum pudding which they seemed to enjoy most heartily. It is a question whether a more frequent assembling of both sexes at the same table might not be attended with very beneficial results.

I have to thank Mr. L. W. Lewis, (Llew Llwyvo) and his choir for the kind manner in which they volunteered their services of Musical entertainments for an evening concert.

It is proposed that a series of musical entertainments (one of which has already taken place) should be given during the ensuing year. It is right to add that these entertainments will be carried out by our own officials.

The new organ in chapel has been found of very great benefit in tranquilizing patients and increasing their interest in the public service. The organ has been ably and gratuitously presided over by Master O. Robinson, son of the Clerk and Steward.

I have again to thank the Chairman and Committee of Visitors for their kindness and consideration during the past year, and also my colleagues in office for their effective co-operation.

REPORT  
OF THE  
COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

---

NORTH WALES COUNTIES ASYLUM, 21st Jan. 1863.

Since the visit on the 30th January, 1862, there have been 52 admissions, 34 discharges, and 19 deaths. Of these under the first head 6 were Private Patients, under the second 6 were Private, and under the third 2 were Private. Of the 34 discharged 5 had not recovered. All the deaths were from natural causes the principal being Phthisis, Epilepsy, and Paralysis.

In the Asylum on our visit to-day there were 231 Patients, 113 in the Male Division, and 118 on the Female side, of whom in the former 7, and in the latter 8, belong to the private class. The numbers in this class have been greatly restricted during the past year, for reasons pointed out in the last entry; but as soon as the contemplated additions are made, for which the building will be begun almost immediately, Private Patients will be again received as formerly according to the understood agreement with the subscribers.

We found the Patients in both Divisions very quiet, and their state upon the whole satisfactory. The women were in a better condition personally than the men, having generally more means of occupation, and their wards being cheerfuller, and having more domestic furniture. It is proposed however, when the new additions are completed, to assimilate both sides more nearly in this respect; and we recommend that, in the lower flagged galleries, which unfortunately cannot be boarded because of the ventilation shafts underneath, matting should be placed.

The new Chapel has been opened since the last visit ; and considering the existing number of Patients, and that there will be an addition of two hundred more, by means of the new buildings, it is greatly to be regretted that such limited provision for religious worship should here have been made. Though this Chapel was assumed to have been built for 200, it will certainly not accommodate more than 150. At present the attendances are not large ; averaging little more than 100 of both sexes on Sunday, and at the Wednesday and Friday Services about 55.

The old Chapel has been turned into two very good dormitories, containing each 15 beds ; and in these, as throughout the Asylum, we found excellent provision of beds and bedding, and everything in the best order. The number of straw beds on both sides is now reduced to sixteen, that being about the average of wet and dirty Patients. The Night Watch continues to be effective, and it would contribute much to the comfort of the Male Infirmary, if, by means of an arrangement, now adopted in many Asylums, a married man and his wife were placed in charge of the sick inmates.

A spacious general Recreation Hall has been provided since the last visit by means of a detached shed, or building, erected in the South Airing Court, which supplies also an adjoining workroom for Female Patients. This hall has been used with good effect for concerts and dances ; and here on Christmas day 140 of both sexes dined together. As yet it is necessarily in an incomplete state ; as are other parts of the old building in which alterations have been lately made ; but in due time they will be rendered more comfortable. By these changes, and appropriation of the rooms formerly occupied by the Medical Superintendent, space will be made for 60 Patients ; and by the new buildings it is proposed to add 75 beds in each division ; but the present over-crowded condition of both sides will be relieved to the extent of 28 beds, 14 in each, before any new Patients are received ; and this will restrict the space immediately available to about 32 beds.

Among other additions to the comfort of the Inmates, since the last visit, hand-rails have been put to all the staircases.

The Routine of occupation, out-door exercise, and amusements continues as usual. The Women are taken out in parties twice a week beyond the Asylum, and the Men every Sunday.

Of the Men, 78 are regulary employed; and of the Women 77. There is no restriction of the visits of Patients friends in this Asylum to particular days. At all times, including Sundays, this permission is kindly given .

Restraint is never employed here. The instances of seclusion since the last visit have been few, and limited to 8 Patients, five Men and three Women; of which the majority have been on rare occasions and for very short periods.

Under Medical treatment, to-day we found 19 Patients, of whom 14 were in bed; but there was only one serious case. The health of the Asylum is very good, and the mortality of the past year was below the ordinary average.

No successor has been appointed to the late Dr. Lloyd Williams. The much preferable arrangement has been made of a Resident Assistant Medical Officer. This gentleman, Mr. Barker, appears to take an interest in his duties; and we cannot speak too highly of the evident zeal, and personal sympathy and kindness to the Patients, evinced by Mr. Jones in his superintendance of this Asylum.
