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# REPORT

OF THE

## COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

FOR 1870.

A Resolution was passed on the 14th October last, at a Committee Meeting, accepting the offer of the Denbigh Water Works Co. "To

connect, for the sum of £3 per annum, a pipe not exceeding 3 inches in diameter to their main, for the purpose of supplying the Asylum with water in case of fire."

The Engine and Pump, at present in use, are now about to be repaired. The Committee have deemed it expedient also to obtain an Auxiliary Pumping Apparatus, which will be fitted up before the close of the present year: thus doing away with all danger of any deficiency of motive power.

At a General Meeting of the House Committee, held on the 16th December, it was resolved:—

"That the Medical Superintendent and Clerk be directed to proceed either to Cork or Wakefield, to inspect the Turkish Baths at the Asylums there, and to report upon the desirability of establishing such in this Institution, and to place that report, with the estimate of cost, before the next Annual Meeting."

The Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum on the 24th September last. They have entered so fully into all the details of the alterations and improvements, &c., which have been carried into effect during the past year, that the Committee conclude it will be more satisfactory to all who are interested in the efficiency of the Institution, to refer them to the Commissioners' Report, which is annexed.

The Committee are gratified again in being able to record their warm approbation of the energetic and humane manner the Medical Superintendent, the Assistant Medical Officer, Chaplain, the Matron, and the Clerk have severally discharged their responsible duties.

R E P O R T  
OF THE  
COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

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DENBIGH COUNTY ASYLUM,  
*Saturday, 24th September, 1870.*

WE have found this Asylum in very creditable and satisfactory condition at our visit to-day: much done since our colleagues visited last year, and more in progress, to add to its efficiency in various departments, and make suitable provisions for its inmates. The defects at that time observed in the water-closets have been completely remedied; and the suggestion made for the still further lowering of the wall, and sloping and turving the ground, in front of the kitchen-windows, has been carried out. The large airing-courts have had further improvement in the way of laying out and preparation for the planting with trees and shrubs which we hope will now very shortly be proceeded with; and the imperfect works then adverted to in connection with the Reservoir have been completed with excellent effect, and the supply of water, with all the disadvantage arising from the drought in the present summer, found to be thoroughly abundant for all the wants of the Asylum.

Other Amendments during the last year, having in view the increased comfort and more sufficient recreation of the patients, should also be mentioned. The large day-room adjoining the work-room on the female side, which is used as the room for dancing and other associated amusements, has been rendered more suitable for its purpose by the insertion of two large cheerful windows in the west wall, and by a dado all round it of varnished pine. A full band has been organized among the attendants, the Committee making liberal contributions for this additional enjoyment to the patients. A



bowling green has been formed upon the land in front of the Asylum on the male side, and a corresponding piece will be set apart on the other, for out-door assemblage and entertainment of the inmates of both divisions. It was satisfactory to us to notice also as we passed through the wards to-day, that fresh papering and painting are every-where in progress, or about to be undertaken.

The admissions since the 22nd of May, 1869, have been 184, of whom 166 were paupers, 74 males and 92 females; and 18, or 10 males and 8 females, belonged to the private class. The discharges have been 91, comprising of private patients 6 males and 8 females, and of the pauper class 28 males and 49 females; out of all these cases 71 having been entered as recovered. The deaths in the same interval have been 79, including one male private, and of the pauper class 45 males and 33 females. There was nothing unusual in any of these deaths, nor was any inquest held to be necessary; the principal causes having been general palsy and epilepsy, phthisis, other disorders of the brains and lungs, disease of the heart, senile decay, and general exhaustion and debility. As many as 31 are ascribed to the latter cause; and this indicates sufficiently the continuance of this very objectionable practice, which we have so frequently condemned, and which still so largely prevails in the districts connected with this Asylum, of delaying to bring to it the unfortunate persons who most require treatment here, until it is too late for them to derive any advantage from it.

The number to-day are 392,—200 males, of whom 10 are private patients; and 192 females, of whom 12 belong to the private class. We saw them all; and thought their personal appearance as to dress and otherwise, really good in both divisions. In both there was freedom from excitement, and in particular we may say that we never saw a more quiet, orderly, set of men. We saw dinner served among them—meat-pie and rice; and though here and there the meat was hardly in proportion to the crust and the rice, it was not bad fare, and it seemed to be liked. We ought to have remarked in connection with the numbers, that they comprise 44 Abergavenny and Chester patients, who are charged under contract twelve shillings and ten pence a week (the present asylum charge being eight shillings and ten pence), and that there are besides a fair number of vacant beds on both sides.

The records of employment shew a larger proportion of men than of women usefully and regularly occupied, 40 of the latter

doing needle-work, 25 being in the kitchen and laundry, and 26 in the wards and elsewhere, while of the men 72 work out of doors, 12 in the shops, and 53 in the ward and laundry. The average attendance at the chapel services seems to be 134 of both sexes in the morning, and 111 in the afternoon. From the medical records, which are well kept, we learn that there are 18 patients—7 males and 11 females—at present taking medicine; and that in the interval of nearly 16 months since the last visit, 6 men have been secluded for periods amounting altogether to 62 hours, and 5 women for 67 hours. A new Assistant Medical Officer, Mr. James, of whom the best expectations have been found by Mr. Jones, has lately entered on his duties here.

The favourable opinion we have frequently expressed of Mr. Jones's superintendance of this Asylum, and his kindly care for all classes of the inmates, has been strengthened by this visit. And as to the general visitation and management, we have to add, that, while there are quarterly and monthly meetings of the Committee for transaction of general business, at the latter of which patients reported for discharge are seen, the visiting magistrates take it also in rotation, week by week, singly to visit the wards and see all the patients therein. There are occasional exceptions, but, generally, this is the rule observed. The Committee in their last report, we remark, give high praise to their clerk and steward, Mr. Robinson; and what we have seen to-day of the interest and the part taken by him in the improvements going on, has convinced us that this is well merited praise.

# MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

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TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORTH WALES  
COUNTIES LUNATIC ASYLUM.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my annual Report for the 22nd time of the admissions, recoveries, and deaths that have occurred during the past year.

The number of Patients in the House on the 31st Dec., 1869, was 9 male and 12 female private Patients; 183 male and 182 female paupers; total, 386. During the year 27 males and 37 females were discharged, of whom 23 males and 30 females had recovered. 31 males and 32 females have died. The number of Patients remaining on the 31st Dec., 1870, was of the Private Class, 11 of each sex, and of the Paupers 188 males, and 194 females.

The principal cases were General Paralysis, Epilepsy, and Phthisis, (diseases to which the Insane are so liable). No Case requiring investigation by the Coroner occurred during the year.

The mortality was greater than in any previous year, but the state of many of the Patients upon admission was very unsatisfactory, several living only a very short period, some never being able to leave their beds. The Establishment otherwise has been entirely free from any infectious disease.

By direction of the Committee Mr. Robinson and myself visited the Asylums at Cork and Limerick for the purpose of investigating the construction of the Turkish Bath. At both it was very highly spoken of; at the former we were not fortunate enough to find the Superintendent at home, but were kindly shewn over by the Clerk and

Steward. At the latter we saw Dr. Power, who considered it was of the greatest benefit as a curative in almost all cases of Insanity, especially when combined with melancholia, scrofula, and rheumatism, and especially in the early stages of consumption, not only in arresting, but also in curing the disease.

We also visited a large Institution at St. Anne's purely Hydrostatic, where the Turkish Bath was in full operation. Several patients with whom we conversed, all spoke in the highest terms of the benefit they derived from it. From what I heard, and the small opportunity I have had of witnessing its operation, I am decidedly of opinion that when the prejudice against it subsides, it will be come an adjunct to all large Institutions. As a means of cleansing it is found to be the cheapest mode adopted.

In the early part of the year the Committee of Visitors kindly allowed the purchase of Brass Instruments for the purpose of forming a band amongst our attendants, who, from great perseverance, have really become good musicians, and afford much pleasure to the Patients at their weekly dance.

Amusements and Recreations have been conducted as hitherto.

I have again to tender my warmest thanks to the Chairman and Committee of Visitors for the kindness I received, and also to the officials for their zealous co-operation.

# THE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

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TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORTH WALES  
COUNTIES ASYLUM.

GENTLEMEN,

I have again the honour to state, for the information of the committee, that the chapel services have, during the past year, been performed without any intermission. During my visit to the wards and airing courts, it has been my constant endeavour, as hitherto, to minister to the afflicted inmates such advice and consolation as their several cases seemed to require. The good behaviour and attention of the congregation at the Asylum Chapel is fully equal to what can be witnessed in any parochial church. The attention paid to the service and sermon is often manifested by the appropriate remarks afterwards made to me upon what they have heard. Indeed there is abundant evidence to prove that the permission to attend the Sunday and week-day services, continues to be regarded by the patients as a valuable privilege, of which they are anxious to avail themselves. Bearing in mind the malady from which our congregation is suffering, occasional interruptions might reasonably be expected; but it gives me pleasure to be able to testify that no single instance of unseemly conduct has occurred during the period of divine worship to break in upon the harmony and devotion of that sacred hour. Many of the more intelligent and thoughtful inmates of the Asylum have thanked me again and again in the warmest terms for the pleasure and spiritual blessings which our services in chapel and in the wards have afforded them. The musical portion of the service continues to be much appreciated by the patients, many of whom join heartily in the singing. The Welsh are naturally fond of music, and it is often very touching to notice the effect produced upon some of them by the singing of one of the old Welsh hymn tunes. The plaintive melody seems to touch a mysterious chord within them; and the old familiar tune, in which they had been accustomed heartily to join in church or chapel in early life and happier days, once more awakens up within them, for a time at least, a spirit of adoration and

praise. I continue to receive additional testimony of the comfort derived by the inmates from the small hymn-books and prayer-books which the committee were so good as to place at my disposal for distribution among such as could take care of them. It has been my lot during the past year to witness, with satisfaction, many instances of the patience and submission exhibited by the inmates under their heavy affliction, and the readiness with which they listen to religious counsel and advice. I cannot but look forward with hopefulness to the future of this institution, with a strong conviction that it will go on increasing in usefulness, and prove to be, as heretofore, in many ways a real blessing to those who have been brought into it by the Providence of God. My best thanks are justly due to Mrs. TURNER JONES, Miss ROBINSON, and Mr. OWEN ROBINSON, for the efficient manner in which they have conducted the chapel choir. I would also gratefully acknowledge the ready assistance invariably rendered to me by Dr. TURNER JONES, and the other officers of the Institution, in the discharge of my duties as chaplain.
