In obedience to the 16th & 17th Vic., chap. 97, sec. 62, they have to report that the House is in good repair, very clean, and comfortably furnished.

In addition to the weekly visitation by the members of the House Committee, it was ordered at the first Quarterly Meeting of the present year, "That two members of the House Committee visit the house together, at the least, once in every two months." This, in compliance with 16 & 17 Vic., chap. 97, sec. 61.

The weekly cost of maintenance of Patients for the last two years was —for 1863—8s.  $8\frac{1}{4}d$ .; 1864—8s.  $6\frac{1}{2}d$ .

The new buildings are rapidly progressing, and will be ready for furnishing, &c., early in the spring of the ensuing year.

The Annual Statement of Accounts will be audited and verified, and appended as usual to the General Report.

The Committee have to tender their cordial acknowledgments to Messrs. Graves, Messrs. Colnaghi, Messrs. Hogarth (Haymarket), Messrs. Day (Piccadilly), Messrs. Clary (St. James street)—all of London. These eminent firms have generously presented the Institution with a

valuable collection of fine Prints, &c. These Prints, when framed and set up, will prove a source of great interest to the Patients, and give additional cheerfulness to the Wards and Day Rooms.

The Committee have pleasure in quoting, and in strongly corroborating the following passage from the Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy, dated Saturday, 21st May, 1864; viz., "We are glad to see continued evidence of the success with which Mr. Jones manages this Asylum, and of the efficient help he receives from his Assistant Officer, Mr. Barker, in all his kindly and judicious arrangements for the welfare of the Patients." The Committee cannot conclude this report without recording also their warm appreciation of the watchful and humane manner in which the Chaplain, the Matron, the Clerk, and the other Officials, have discharged their weighty and anxious duties.

### THE

### MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

### GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present you with the Sixteenth Annual Report, to which is appended the usual Statistical Tables.

On the 1st January, 1864, there were in the Asylum 10 male, and 7 female private patients; and 125 male, and 123 pauper patients.

During the year, 37 males and 50 females were admitted; 4 males and 2 females were private patients.

Twenty-six males and 18 females were discharged—of whom 8 males and 1 female had not improved.

Twenty-one males and 12 females have died—3 of the former were of the private class.

The numbers remaining on the 31st December were, private patients—7 males, 6 females; pauper patients—118 males, 144 females. Total, 275.

Of those admitted, 18 had been inmates of the Asylum previously. A large proportion of the admissions were cases of long standing, which may be accounted for by the transfer of the charge of all pauper lunatics, from the parish to which they belong, to the common fund of the union.

Of those discharged "not improved," one male private patient was removed by his friends, and subsequently admitted as a pauper patient; one female was removed to the Bicton Asylum, four were discharged at the request of their friends, and three criminal lunatics were removed to the Broadmoor Asylum, by order of the Secretary of State, Sir George Grey.

Notwithstanding the crowded state of the house, but 6 died of pulmonary consumption; disease of the brain caused death in 18 cases; general paralysis, 6; exhaustion from mania, 5; epilepsy, 4; apoplexy, 2; disease of the facial bones involving the base of the brain, 1. The other

causes of death were diarrhæa, 2; general wasting, 2; disease of heart, 1; bronchitis, 1; congestion of the lungs, 1; ulceration of the bowels, 1; and asphyxia, 1.

No inquest was held during the past year.

As the new wings are now rapidly approaching completion, I would beg to draw the attention of the Committee of Visitors to the insufficiency of the present airing courts. They were small for the number of patients the Asylum was originally intended for. The recent additions have reduced them considerably in size, and they are now quite unequal to the wants of the Institution.

The daily returns show that about 72 per cent of the men are employed (principally in out-door work), and 60 per cent of the females.

The amusements of the patients have been attended to. Among them may be enumerated—the Christmas Ball; a Concert given by the Orpheonist Club, to the members of which my thanks are due; a Ventriloquial Entertainment; and the usual weekly dances.

In conclusion, I have to thank the Committee of Visitors for their continued confidence and support, and to record my warm approval of the manner in which my colleagues have performed their respective duties.

### REPORT

OF THE

### COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

NORTH WALES COUNTIES' LUNATIC ASYLUM,

Saturday, 21st May, 1864.

We have found this Asylum and its inmates, at our visit to-day, in a fair and satisfactory state. There are many obvious discomforts and inconveniences arising from the insufficiency of the present accommodation, which cannot be remedied until the additional buildings in progress are completed; but the temporary arrangements to meet the difficulty have been designed with judgment, and very successfully carried out. The conversion of the old chapel into dormitories, and the appropriation of the rooms of the Medical Superintendent (who entered into occupation of his new residence in October last) have provided for more than 50 patients in the house; and each new wing, now in course of erection, will give space for 75 more. Meanwhile all the patients in the Chester Asylum, and at Haydock, have been brought back; some additions have been made to the private patients, and no applicant for admission during the past year has been refused.

Since the Asylum was visited on the 21st of January, 1863, 12 private patients have been admitted, and the same number have been discharged, while one has died—leaving now here 14. Of Paupers, 136 have been admitted—73 males, and 63 females; 54 have been discharged—32 males, and 22 females; and 44 have died—25 males and 19 females. Of the 12 discharged in the private class, 5 were cured; and of the 54 paupers, all but 13.

The causes of death present nothing unusual, excepting in one case, where an inquest was held upon a death which had ensued from inflammation after an operation successfully performed. The rest were chiefly from general palsy, epilepsy, phthisis, and diarrhea. Of patients of all classes there are in the Asylum to-day 268;—being in the male division, 129; and in the female division, 139.

We found the women, as usual, both in their dress and the comfort of their wards, in a better condition than the men; but an improvement in this respect was not to be looked for until the opening of the new wings The men's dining arrangements are now necessarily defective. On the other hand, the regular association of nearly 100 of the women in the Recreation Hall of the south airing court, to which reference was made in the last entry, has added materially to their comfort; and we trust that, upon the completion of the new buildings, it will be found practicable to associate, from time to time, and especially on Sundays, large parties of both sexes at dinner. Besides the appropriation of this room as a female dining hall, it has been frequently used, since its completion, for dances, and other purposes of recreation to all the patients; and such means of amusement appear to have been sufficiently afforded.

The returns of unemployed are about 35 of the men, and 60 of the women; and it would be desirable to reduce this latter number as much as possible. As it is, we learn with pleasure, that very nearly all the stockings used in the Asylum are knitted by the patients.

Among other changes observable since the last visit, is a judicious alteration of the baths (at the present time in progress), by substituting tin for slate, and by providing a large bath-room for each division, containing 4 baths each, besides the single separate baths for each corridor. The Laundry also has been enlarged and made more efficient, by new steam and drying closets, and hot water supply. And there has been an introduction of another kind of closet into the dormitory occupied by very troublesome patients (we refer to "Smith's portable patent drycloset") which has been used with so much advantage that its more extended use appears to be desirable.

The Chapel attendances average upwards of 140, which, to the full are as much (unfortunately) as the Chapel will hold; and the effect of the services has been greatly increased by the new Organ, purchased since the last visit in accordance with a recommendation then strongly made, and found to have been most beneficial. There has been no restraint since the last visit; and the seclusion does not seem to have averaged more than 3 men and 4 women during 3 months—the occasions being infrequent and for short periods. To-day, 17 patients are entered as under treatment The Night Watch has increased in efficiency; last for bodily disorders. night's returns showing no dirty Beds; and of wet Beds, 3 on the Male, and 5 on the Female side; the straw beds having been further reduced in both divisions. We are glad to see continued evidence of the success with which Mr. Jones manages this Asylum, and of the efficient help he receives from his assistant officer, Mr. BARKER, in all his kindly and judicious arrangements for the welfare of the Patients.

### THE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

### TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORTH WALES LUNATIC ASYLUM.

### GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to report, for the information of the Committee, that the services at the Chapel on the Sundays and week days were regularly performed during the past year.

The average attendance was 73 on week days, and 132 on Sundays.

The number of Patients who attend on Sundays is in excess of the accommodation which the Chapel affords: the crowded state of the male side must be a source of discomfort to the patients, and cannot but be very unfavourable to attention and devotion in the case of persons whose minds are but ill-adapted to contend with such physical inconveniences.

I have occasionally observed that in the overcrowded seats there was an apparent restlessness and irritation among the Patients, which was not visible among those who had more room.

As the Chapel is too small for the number of patients at present at the Asylum, and a large increase of patients is to be expected when the new Buildings are opened, it is to be hoped that the Committee will take an early opportunity of considering how the Chapel may best be enlarged so as to provide adequate accommodation.

Many of the patients seem thoroughly to appreciate the Services; and those who are able to do so, join readily in the responses, as well as in the hymn tunes and chants. They consider it a privilege to be allowed to attend Chapel; and, judging from their earnest attention, there is every reason to believe that they are influenced by a proper spirit, and derive real comfort and consolation from the work in which they are engaged.

During my intercourse with the patients in the wards and airing courts, it has been my endeavour to administer to them, from time to time, such advice and consolation as their several cases seemed to require;

and I am glad to have grounds for hoping that my efforts have not been entirely in vain.

My visits are invariably received by the patients with readiness, and it appears to be a source of comfort to many of them to feel that they have free access to their Minister, whenever they are troubled in mindle and need his advice.

I have recently had the pleasure of receiving from former patients letters full of gratitude for the attention paid to them while they were inmates at the Asylum: letters of enquiry are also frequently addressed to me by the relatives and friends of the patients, and I have reason to believe that comfort has been received from the answers returned. I have had occasion, during the past year, frequently to attend the bed-sides of the sick and dying, and it has often cheered me to witness how the minds of the afflicted inmates have, in some instances, been comforted by the consolatory influences of religion.

The excellent organ recently erected in the Chapel has been a great acquisition, and has helped to produce a marked improvement in the musical portion of the service, which appears to have a very soothing influence upon the minds of the patients.

My best thanks are due to Mr. O. Robinson for his efficient and gratuitous services as Organist during the past year. He has regularly attended the Sunday Service and the week-day practisings, though he did so occasionally at considerable personal inconvenience.

It gives me pleasure to bear testimony, also, to the cordial support and co-operation which I have on all occasions received from Dr. Turner Jones, and Dr. Barker, as well as from the other officers of the Institution. They have always shown a readiness to aid me in my endeavours to promote the moral and spiritual welfare of those who have been entrusted to my ministerial care.
