

### REPORT

### OF THE

# COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

THE Committee of Visitors of the United Counties Lunatic Asylum, in issuing their tenth Annual Report, have again the satisfaction of recording the continued well-being of the Institution.

In obedience to the Act, 16 & 17 Vict., cap. 97, sec. 62, they have to state that the house is in good repair and scrupulously clean; and that, taking into account the extent of accommodation, its internal economy will bear favourable comparison with that of any similar establishment in the kingdom.

The Commissioners in Lunacy inspected the Asylum on June the 9th last. They remark in their entry of that date in the Visitors' Book, that "although the Wards were free from offensive smells, they noticed a want of fresh air in most of them;" and amongst other methods for securing a freer circulation, they "strongly recommend that a number of the windows be altered, so that they may be opened wide." Since then, narrow frames, fitted up with glass, and turning upon pivots, have been let into the windows of some of the galleries and dormitories. The result has been in every way beneficial:—a marked improvement having taken place in the ventilation, and a corresponding increase, apparently, in the health and comfort of the patients. It is much to be hoped, therefore, that lights of the same description may, by degrees, be introduced into all the rooms appropriated to the use of the insane.

During the year, a considerable proportion of the rain water, falling upon the roof of the Asylum, has been directed into a large tank, and from thence conveyed to the wash-house. The cost of this has been very small—almost all the work having been done by the patients.

A resolution was entered into at the quarterly meeting held on June 24th, 1858, approving of the plans and specifications for erecting a Joiner's shop and shed in the Gas yard, at a cost not exceeding  $\pounds 61$ . These buildings have been finished, somewhat under the estimate, and are now in use. The removal of the carpenters from the room, previously occupied by them in the house, is a great gain; the present site being much more convenient, and a dangerous occasion of fire done away with.

The field adjoining the river, and held under a lease from Miss Mesham, has been strongly embanked, and the stream forced back into its proper channel. Again, a new wall has been built, to separate another of the fields, held under the same benevolent lady, from the public road which runs parallel to it. The money required to carry out these necessary works amounted to £83 15s. 3d. There can be no doubt that the protection thus secured for a portion of the farm, hitherto undefended, coupled I with the land reclaimed from the river, will soon replace this outlay. Still, care has been taken that no part of this charge shall fall upon the counties in union:—Miss Mesham having considerately allowed one year's rent, viz., £50 10s. 5d. towards the expense incurred; and the Committee having paid the remaining balance of £33 4s. 10d. out of the funds of the establishment. It should be noted that many of the inmates are constantly employed in cultivating the farm and garden :—a salutary occupation for them, and a source of profit to the Asylum.

It was stated in the last Annual Report, that the "Shafts and Cranks leading to the pumps were being fitted and brought into connexion with the steam engine;" and further, that the "Committee trusted the whole would be in working order early in the ensuing year." The expectation them entertained is now realized—the machinery having been completed at the time anticipated, and for many months in active operation; thus relieving the patients from the hateful labours of the capstan, and giving sure promise of effective aid in case of fire. Mr. George Holcroft, consulting engineer, in his report, dated 21st March, 1857, when enumerating the advantages that would follow the erection of a "Steam Engine, Boiler, Pumping water, Washing by steam power," &c., specified, amongst other items, the saving in coal and soap. The Committee have not hitherto felt justified in speaking with certainty on this head. The experience of the past year, however, has shown the soundness of Mr. Holcroft's calculations :—the consumption of coal having been lessened by 40 tons 11 cwt., and that of soap by 419lbs. This too, notwithstanding an addition of 6 per cent to the number of patients in the house.

The washing and wringing apparatus has fulfilled all the conditions which induced the Committee to consent to its introduction.<sup>1</sup>

The Committee are glad to notify that they are enabled to recommend, with the sanction of the medical gentlemen, a reduction in the weekly payment for paupers from 8s. 9d. to 8s. 2d. They rejoice to add also, that the finances of the Institution are, at this present, in a much healthier state than they ever have been at any former period.

The Receipts and Payments for the year have been audited by a public accountant, and strictly scrutinised by two of the committee specially nominated for that purpose. A Statement of Accounts will, as usual, be appended to this Report.

The Committee gladly avail themselves of the present opportunity to reiterate their strong sense of the zeal and humanity with which the Visiting Physician and the Medical Superintendent, the Chaplain, the Matron, the Clerk, and the Attendants employed in the institution, have persevered in the discharge of their arduous and trying duties.

# MEDICAL OFFICERS' REPORT.

To the Chairman and Committee of Visitors of the North Wales Lunatic Asylum.

#### GENTLEMEN,

The Report of the Committee embraces every topic, and almost every improvement, which it would otherwise be our duty to notice.

The admissions, discharges, and deaths will be found in the accompanying tables. We had the satisfaction in our last Report to allude to the paucity of deaths in this Institution, as being nearly the smallest of any other Asylum in the kingdom. We regret that we are not on the present occassion able to repeat this gratifying statement. The excess of mortality, however, over the former and other years, has arisen from no epidemic causes; but from the much larger proportion than usual of patients falling victims to those diseases which have proved such scourges amongst the insane at all times-general paralysis, pulmonary consumption, and debility. One cause of death originated in a lengthened maniacal paroxysm, which nothing could control; and the patient sank from exhaustion. Another death was caused by an accidental collision between two of the patients; by which one of them received an injury, which ended fatally. A coroner's inquest was held, the circumstances fully investigated, and a verdict of "accidental death" recorded.

We have had frequent occasion to call the attention of Medical men and Parochial officers to the heedless manner in which patients are sent into the Asylum, when there is no human or rational hope of their obtaining any relief from any treatment, however judicious. Many have been received during the last year in a dying state; thereby inflicting on the parishes the serious and unnecessary expenses of removal from their homes, and swelling the list of deaths. The recommendation of the Commissioners in Lunacy, in their last report, that the airing courts should be more extensively planted, will be carried out in the spring—the proper time for such operations. We beg to draw the attention of the visitors to the subject of night watching, so frequently and urgently recommended by the Commissioners.

In consequence of the existing stock of clothing, bedding, &c., being ample, and the judicious economy observed in the management, and the material reduction in the price of provisions, we have the gratification of recommending a further reduction in the weekly rate of payment for pauper patients chargeable to the Counties in Union from 8s. 9d. to 8s. 2d. per week.

The male patients have been employed principally in the cultivation of the land, removing fences, making walks, and in enlarging the airing grounds. The females are occupied mostly in needlework and household duties.

The amusements of the male patients are bowls, quoits, &c., in the summer; and cards, dominoes, &c, in the winter. The females are as heretofore indulged with frequent excursions into the surrounding country, and in the evening amuse themselves with dancing, singing, reading, &c.

The ball, so long and and so joyfully looked forward to by the patients, passed off with more than usual zest. It was more numerously attended by the patients than on former occasions; but circumstances prevented the attendance of many friends who have hitherto assisted us, which was a source of much disappointment to the patients. We strongly advise that these assemblies, which appear to be so thoroughly enjoyed and followed by such beneficial results, should occur oftener during the winter months.

We gratefully acknowledge the support we have so cordially and uniformly received from the committee; and we beg to bear willing testimony to the assistance and co-operation of the matron, Mrs. Shaw; and to the zeal and activity of our clerk and steward, Mr. Robinson.

### REPORT

OF THE

# COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

### NORTH WALES COUNTIES LUNATIC ASYLUM, June 9th, 1858.

THERE are now 199 patients here; of whom 97 are men, and 102 women—these numbers include 27 private patients.

Several patients were in bed at the time of our visit, and in a very feeble state; but the general condition of the establishment is now healthy. The number of deaths since the last visit has been large; although no disease of an epidemic character has prevailed. We observe that phthisis has been the cause in ten cases; and that several patients have died within a short time of their admission.

Fifteen private, and forty one pauper patients have been admitted.

We found the patients, with few exceptions, in a quiet and comfortable condition; and no one was in restraint, which indeed is never employed. Seclusion is but rarely resorted to, and only one man was in seclusion to day.

The wards were clean and in good condition, and the bedding comfortable.

A change has lately been made in the arrangement of the day and dining rooms, which has been apparently very successful. The rooms formerly used as dining rooms are now converted into day rooms; and the patients are assembled in the galleries at meal times.

Although the wards were free from offensive smells, we noticed a want of fresh air in most of them, and we strongly recommend that a number of the windows be altered, so that they may be opened wide; and also, that other openings be made in the roof, and near the floors.

We think that the airing courts should be more completely planted, and that the proposition to remove some of the walls should be carried out; and that those walls, which are allowed to remain, should be planted out, and be covered with creeping plants. The steam-engine is now completed, and is found very useful in pumping and washing.

We regret to find that no system of night nursing has yet been adopted. We have so constantly had occasion to notice the beneficial effects resulting from a well regulated night watch, that we must again urge the subject on the consideration of the Committee; and, as an additional argument, we would call the attention to the fact that, since our last visit in August, 1857, two patients have died in the night, no one being present at the time of their death.

We recommend that all the rooms, especially those for the private patients, be better furnished, and rendered more cheerful by the introduction of pictures, flowers, birds, &c., with a view of promoting order and good conduct among the inmates.

It is evident that the inmates receive very good attention from those having the management of the establishment.
