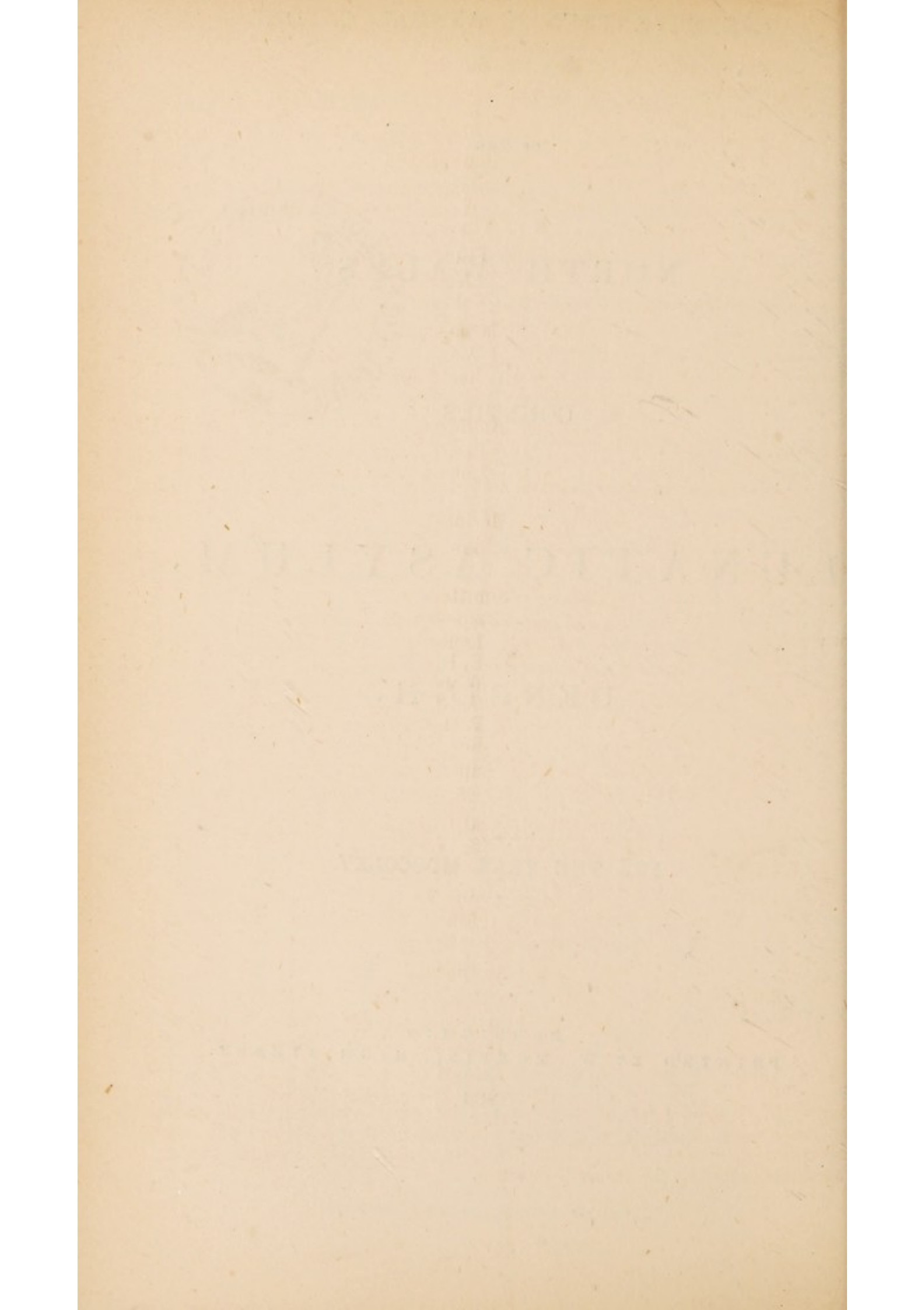

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THE SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORTH WALES COUNTIES LUNATIC ASYLUM.

THE Committee, in issuing their 17th Annual Report, are gratified in again bearing testimony to the general efficiency of the Institution.

In compliance with the 16th & 17th Vic., chap. 97, sec. 62, they have to certify that the House is in good repair, very clean, and adequately furnished.

The weekly cost of the maintenance of patients, for the two last years, was 1864—8s. 6½d.; 1865—8s. 0¼d.

During the last two summers there has been a great deficiency in the supply of water. At the quarterly meeting, held Oct. 14th, 1864, it was ordered "That the Reservoir be deepened by at least six feet." Every effort has been made to carry out the directions of the Committee. The works have been diligently prosecuted during the dry season. The result, so far, is most satisfactory. The Reservoir has been enlarged, and it will now contain an additional 250,000 gallons of water—equal to 31 days' supply. It should be added that the excavations are far from being finished; yet there is every confidence that little, or no danger, exists of a deficiency of the water supply for the future.

The whole of these works have been executed by the patients and their attendants, under the effective superintendence of Mr. Robinson. The saving of expense, thus secured to the Visitors, has been very considerable.

The new Buildings are completed, and partially occupied. The Committee have been enabled to receive patients from out counties at an advanced rate of payment. The profits, thus realized, will be transferred to the Furnishing account.

New wash-hand ranges for the Lavatories have been ordered. They will be fitted up for use in the course of a few months.

At the quarterly meeting held on the 31st of March, 1865, it was Resolved,—

“That the Trustees of the Ablett fund be requested to advance to the Committee of Visitors of the North Wales Counties Lunatic Asylum, by way of Loan to be repaid with Interest, the amount vested in the 3 per cent consols, towards furnishing the new Wings—viz., £921 0s. 9d.”

The Committee deem it right to insert also the following Resolution, unanimously agreed to at the same meeting, “That the sum of Fifty pounds be granted to Mr. Robinson, the Clerk, for his efficient assistance in acting as Clerk of the Works, and superintending the erection of the new buildings and alterations.”

The Commissioners in their report, bearing date, April 10th, 1865, conclude with the following words; “We are glad to record our opinion, that the condition of the Asylum, is very creditable to the zeal and ability of Dr. Jones and his assistants.”

The Committee, while corroborating this statement, would also express their sense of the judicious manner in which the Chaplain has fulfilled his duties.

THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

GENTLEMEN,

I have again the honor, for the Seventeenth time, to present to you my annual report.

On the 1st January, 1865, there were in the Asylum, 7 Male and 6 female private patients, 118 male and 144 female pauper patients. Total 275.

During the past year, there were admitted 7 male and 5 female private patients—48 male and 59 female paupers. Total 119. The admissions are rather in excess, of former years, but this is accounted for by our having received for a time 20 female pauper patients from the Shrewsbury Asylum.

Eighteen male and twelve female patients, were discharged cured,—15 males and 18 females have died, and 19 females were discharged, not improved,—18 of them being the patients belonging to Shrewsbury.

The per centages of cures and deaths have averaged those of previous years.

The cause of deaths has been principally Phthisis, General Paralysis, and Exhaustion. There now remain in the Asylum 9 male and 10 female private patients, 138 male and 154 female paupers,—making a Total of 311.

The Daily average of patients was 306, being an excess of 35 over last year. The Asylum has been perfectly free from any disease of an epidemic character, and the general health of the patients good. The only casualties that have occurred have been the falling of two

Epileptic patients whilst in a fit; each of them fractured a leg, but both have now recovered.

In my last report I drew the attention of the Committee to the confined area of the Airing Courts. This is also noticed by the Commissioners in Lunacy; and, as the patients are now more numerous, it has become a necessity that they should be enlarged as soon as may be.

I would also call the attention of the Committee to the insufficient accommodation in the Chapel. On Sunday, the 7th inst., there were present 95 male and 70 female patients; the consequence was that it was inconveniently crowded; and had there been more accommodation, many more patients could have attended. I would also suggest that, now we have more English patients, a few more of the Services should be in English.

We find great difficulty in obtaining the Services of suitable attendants, more especially females. The communication is now rendered so easy by railways that competent female servants seek for situations in the large English towns, thus securing to themselves higher wages and greater advantages. I would therefore strongly recommended that our present scale of payment to the attendants, both male and female, should forthwith be advanced. It is of the utmost importance, in an institution such as this, that there should be a body of efficient officers, and trustworthy servants. I would also recommend that the attendants, as is the case in other Asylums, should annually be provided with a suit of uniform.

Having, during the past year, been requested by Mr. Townshend Mainwaring to try and ascertain the cause of the great amount of Insanity in Wales. I find it impossible to arrive at any satisfactory conclusion. The causes assigned in the certificates of the patients when admitted are very vague and frequently wanting altogether.

I have compared the number of patients confined in this with other County Asylums, and I find we have fewer in proportion to the population than most other Asylums, as shown by the following table, according to returns made on the 1st January, 1865.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

NORTH WALES COUNTY ASYLUM, *10th April, 1865.*

Since our Colleagues' visit in the month of May, 1864, 38 Male and 62 Female Patients have been admitted; of these 8 were of the Private Class, and 20,—all women—were removed from the Salop Asylum, and chargeable to that County.

The Patients, discharged within the above period, have amounted to 19 Men and 18 Women, 4 of the whole number being Private Patients, and there have been 24 deaths viz., 15 of the Male and 9 of the Female sex.

There are to day in the building 133 Males and 174 Females, of whom 10 Males and 6 Females are Private Patients.

We have seen them all and inspected their Wards. The Patients were in a very quiet, orderly state, and their personal condition satisfactory.

Several of the Women were in bed locked in their rooms, but only one of them was considered to be in seclusion, and intended to be reported as such.

We think, however, that whenever a Patient is locked in a room during the day time, the fact should be recorded in the Medical Journal, and this view we have enforced in all the Asylums within our jurisdiction.

There are some old feeble cases in the Infirmarys, but in general the Inmates seem to be in good bodily health. By the last return, it appears that 13 Men and 10 Women are under Medical treatment.

Accurate records are kept of the numbers employed, from whence it appears that, of the Men, 36 are without occupation; of those who

are employed, 27 work in the Garden, 29 in the Wards, and there are 2 Joiners, 2 Painters, 4 Shoemakers, 3 Smiths, and 2 Tailors, &c. Of the Women, 77 are not employed, and 91 are employed.

The principal means of occupation, in this division, are found in the Wash-house, Workroom, and Kitchen.

The Chapel Services are held as usual on Sunday, and during the week on Wednesday and Friday.

On Sunday the Chapel is quite filled, and more Patients would be there if it would hold them. The week-day Services are attended by between 40 and 50 women, and a somewhat smaller number of men.

The records of seclusion shew that, in the period which has elapsed since the last visit, 5 men have been secluded on 11 occasions, and 13 women on 28 occasions.

There has been no case of instrumental restraint.

The principal causes of death have been general paralysis and phthisis, but in one case a Patient died from asphyxia, a portion of bread and butter having become fixed in his throat; no inquest was held by the Coroner in this case.

We had reason to be satisfied with the generally cheerful and contented appearance of the Patients, whose demeanour proves, that they are treated kindly. The attendants and nurses seem respectable, but their number in proportion to the Patients, is too small. The night attendance continues to prove very effectual in diminishing the number of wet and dirty beds, and in affording assistance to Patients, who may be taken ill or attacked with epilepsy, during the night. We have inspected the new Wards, which are completed so far as the building is concerned, but at present contain only some beds on the upper floor, and they are as yet only occupied at night.

These Wards will afford very good accommodation, and we hope they will be fitted up and furnished without delay, and that the furniture will not be of a heavy cumbrous description, but consist of such articles as are usually found in ordinary dwellings.

The water closets are very ill placed, as they have no direct communication with the open air, and are very dark; some change should we think be made in them. The door between the Attendants' room and the dormitories should have glazed panels, and they should be so hung that they may be readily opened.

Hand-rails are wanted to the staircases, and more of the windows should be made to open.

The Airing Courts, on either side, will be found much too confined for the numbers, who will use them, when these Wards are occupied, and it would be well at once to remove and set back the walls which now bound them on the North and South. Some part of the old building requires paint, &c., and we believe that the necessary work will be shortly commenced. Attention is given to provide various means of amusement for the Inmates, and the large room is frequently used for dances and other meetings. It would be desirable that some further decorations should be made to this room, and wooden skirting boards should be placed around, as in the Work Room.

In conclusion we are glad to record our opinion that the condition of the Asylum is very creditable to the zeal and ability of Dr. Jones, and his assistants.

THE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORTH
WALES LUNATIC ASYLUM.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to report, for the information of the Committee that the Sunday and week day Services at the Chapel were regularly performed during last year—the average attendance on Sundays being 149, and on week days 90.

The behaviour of the Patients in Chapel has been very satisfactory; they enter with apparent earnestness into the Services—some of them joining heartily in the singing, and taking their part readily in the responses.

There is reason to believe that the Chapel Services are an edifying exercise to the Patients. They have a very remarkable effect in soothing and tranquilizing, for the time, some of those who during the rest of the day use violent language, with scarcely any intermission. During my week day visits to the Wards, it has been my constant endeavour to speak such words of comfort to the afflicted Patients, as their several cases seemed to require. In reviewing the events of the past year in connection with my duties as Chaplain, I do not find that anything has transpired of a prominent or peculiar character which demands special notice; I have therefore but little to add to the Report which I had the honor to present to the Visitors last year.

It is my duty gratefully to acknowledge the friendly co-operation which has been afforded to me by the Medical Superintendent, the Matron, and the Clerk; more especially are my warmest thanks due to Mr. O. Robinson for his efficient but gratuitous services as Organist.
