MEDICAL REPORT.

The annual period which is referred to in the Medical Report required to be laid before the present General Meeting of Managers of the Aberdeen Lunatic Asylum, embracing a term which had elapsed previous to the Reporter's entry on the office of Medical Superintendent, it has been thought best to confine the review of the operations of the Institution to such numerical statements as suffice to exhibit its statistical history during that time. These are afforded in a series of Tables compiled, in a great measure, from the materials left behind by Dr. Campbell, the previous Superintendent, and will be found to give a full and very favourable representation of the efficiency of the Hospital under his management.

At the commencement of the year there were two hundred and fifty patients remaining in the Hospital, of the curability of a great proportion of whose cases an unfavourable estimate was formed; during the succeeding twelve months ninety-five other cases were added, of a very miscellaneous character, making a gross number of three hundred and forty-five patients, of whom, at the termination of the year, two hundred and seventy-one still continued under the guardianship and treatment of the Institution. Eighteen of the seventy-four removals are attributable to death. Of the remaining fifty-six all but two may be said to have been benefited, forty-two qualified for full emancipation, and twelve so far improved as to allow removal by their friends.

During the progress of the year the number of patients resident in the House kept steadily increasing—the smallest number being at the commencement, and the highest at the termination of the time specified. The mean number resident was two hundred and sixty-three.

The Tables appended are, in most particulars, similar to those in former Reports, and uphold conclusions consistent with prevalent scientific doctrines on the characteristics of the disease. They exhibit the medical results not only of the past but of the thirty-one preceding years; a classification of the admissions in reference to the districts from which the cases have been sent; the ages, sex, social condition, and occupation of the patients; the forms and complications, and the mental, physical, exciting, and predisposing causes, and previous duration of the disease; a view of the more important features in the recovered cases; a detailed obituary; a classification of the cases remaining in the House; and an appended list of articles of clothing which have been made by its inmates during the past year. The proportion of cures is above that of the former year, and much about the average in such Institutions in this country, while the mortality is some-Amongst the peculiarities are noticeable a less curawhat less. bility, in the female cases, a greater relative amount of married patients in the Table of social conditions, an entire absence of cases of Dementia in the list of recoveries, and a greater than ordinary proportion of cures amongst older cases. The Reporter has to bear testimony to the excellent working order in which he found all departments of the Hospital on taking charge; and, in conclusion, begs to return his thanks to the Visiting Managers for their support and encouragement, and to the Consulting Physician, for his cordial co-operation, as also to acknowledge the efficient assistance afforded him by the resident and non-resident officials generally, in the discharge of his duties.
