
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MEDICAL REPORT.

AT the beginning of the year 1869, there were resident in the Aberdeen Asylum four hundred and twelve (412) patients, divided into one hundred and ninety-four (194) males, and two hundred and eighteen (218) females.

During the year there were admitted seventy-seven (77) men, and ninety-one (91) women ; in all, one hundred and sixty-eight (168) new cases.

The total under charge amounted, therefore, to five hundred and eighty (580) ; being an increase of fifty (50) patients over the gross number for 1868.

The average resident number was four hundred and twenty (420) ; ranging from four hundred and fourteen (414) on 1st January, to four hundred and thirty-two (432) on 1st October.

One hundred and thirty-two (132) were removed, and twenty-two (22) died.

During no previous time therefore, have the operations of the House been on so extended a scale, both as

to admissions and removals; although the results may some years have been more fortunate, and the general course of events less disturbed by untoward circumstances. The deaths have numbered twenty-two (22) only; which is a remarkably low mortality. Twelve (12) died from cerebral diseases, or affections of the head; seven (7) of thoracic diseases, or affections of the chest; none of abdominal disorders; one (1) of gradual exhaustion of vital force; and two (2) by the unusual way of suicide or accident. The Eleventh Report of the Board of Lunacy Commissioners shows the average mortality of the insane in the Asylums of Scotland, to have been only about 8 per cent. on the number resident; while in the Aberdeen Asylum it at the same time shows that the mortality was much beneath the average, being little more than 3 per cent. In the table subjoining this Report, the mortality is rated at 5·2 per cent., having been calculated, not on the gross number resident, but on the more correct statistical principle of deducing it from the mean number resident.

Of 132 patients removed, 55 were discharged recovered, and a still greater number in various degrees of improvement such as to render an enforced deprivation of liberty unnecessary, or the medical treatment of the Asylum no longer requisite. This class of removals has been much swollen last year by the large number of patients transferred to the recently-opened wards for incurable cases in the various Poorhouses of the District;

a movement which, while it may in some degree lessen parochial expenditure, is not otherwise beneficial to the community, and capable of telling unfavourably both on the financial and the medical history of the Institution. During the year, 7 persons were transferred to the Buchan Combination Poorhouse, 13 to the Poorhouse of St. Nicholas, and 28 to that of Oldmachar ; in all 48.

To counterbalance 154 removals from all causes, 168 cases have been admitted, which will be found classified in the usual manner in the tables appended to the Report, in relation to age, social position, and medical history and condition. The items of information on which some of these tables are founded, are doubtless often not of the highest value for their exactness, and, probably, no particulars given are less to be depended upon as true and adequate, than those which are most likely to interest as representing the exciting causes of the disorder. A large proportion of the cases, however, falls into well-defined groups, in relation to certain physical states. Of these, the most numerous class, this year, have been that in which *intemperance* was the associated condition, a class twice as numerous as any of the others ; next the *epileptic*, nine in number ; the *paralytic* and those in whom morbid mental symptoms succeeded cerebral disease. After these, cases arising from *child-birth and nursing*, cases connected with *disordered sexual functions*, cases developed in *phthisical and scrofulous subjects*, disordered manifestations result-

ing from *climacteric change*, and lastly, decay of mind, from *old age*. These groups always form marked divisions in the annual admissions of every Asylum, and make up more than a third of the whole number of the new entries for 1869.

The pressure for admission of patients as boarders at the lower rates, and of patients belonging to the parishes of the District, was very great, and taxed to the utmost the capacity of the Establishment. The demands made for transference of incurables from the Asylum to the local Poorhouses have for some time back relieved this pressure, and probably may continue to do so for some time to come, as also may, perhaps, the temporary practical operation of a doctrine which has set in as a fashion of late amongst some of those who concern themselves critically in the welfare of the insane, that many of them may be much better out of an Asylum than under such regimen and care, as sensational writers say they sometimes find within them.

The Hospital was formally and carefully inspected by the Lunacy Commissioners thrice during the year. Commendation was given to the quality of food supplied to all classes, the adequacy of the diet, the comfortable and becoming character of the clothing, the cleanliness of the establishment, the tranquility of the patients, and notice taken of the small rate of mortality; while fault was found with the overcrowded state of some parts, and with the consequent disorderly arrange-

ments at meals, and it was suggested that a dining hall should be added to the Asylum, as exists in all the newly-erected District hospitals ; an improvement, however, more than usually difficult, architecturally, in an old Institution, and less than ordinarily suitable where the inmates are not conveniently all of one grade, as in a County or District asylum. The crowded state of the House, undoubtedly, is such as to point to the necessity of further enlargement for the accommodation of District cases, and of the lower class of private patients, and also as a step preliminary to several desirable internal improvements.

The various tables subjoined for the year 1869, have been carefully compiled by Dr. R. Alexander, one of the present resident Medical Assistants, and will be found to contain all the statistical information usually appended to the annual Report of the Asylum.
