

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# REPORT BY THE DIRECTORS

### OF THE

# Dundee Royal Annatic Asylum

### TO THE

# ANNUAL GENERAL COURT,

JUNE, 1868.

THE Directors of the Dundee Royal Asylum are glad to be able to report that its condition in every respect is on the whole satisfactory.

A considerable improvement has been made during the year in its financial state. At last balance in March, 1867, there was a deficiency of Income to the extent of £310 13s. 6d., in addition to which there were large unsettled claims for Poor's Rates and Police Tax, which, if a change in the law regarding such matters cannot be effected, will remain a permanent burden on the Asylum. As the large expenditure caused by the high price of provisions, and by the removal of the quiet and least costly patients to the Poor House, still continues, the Directors felt themselves under the necessity of making arrangements whereby the accumulation of debt might be prevented. They would have been delighted if this could have been attained by stringent economy and the most limited expenditure, consistent with the prosperity of the Asylum and the comfort and recovery of the patients. And with this view they caused a most rigorous investigation to be made into every department of charge. Every

article of outlay was carefully examined, and the most urgent injunctions were laid on the officers to see that everything obtained for the use of the Institution was good, cheap, and applied to its proper purpose. But though they had reason to believe that these instructions were carefully attended to, they were not able to diminish the expenditure to any appreciable extent. In these circumstances, they were reluctantly constrained to avail themselves of the expedient suggested at last Annual General Court, of raising the rate of payment for Parochial patients. And they are able to report that after negotiations with the District Lunacy Board, they have succeeded in getting an agreement for twelve months from the 31st December last, terminating after that date on three months' notice, under which they are to receive for each pauper lunatic an additional shilling, or 9s. per week, or £23 8s. per annum, from privileged parishes, and 10s. per week, or £26 per annum, from non-privileged parishes within the county; this increased rate being less than the charge of most of similar establishments. But as this extra rate has only been received for three months of the past financial year, its full effect on the revenue has not been experienced. The Abstract of the Income and Expenditure is consequently not so favourable as it may be expected to be when the increase is received for the whole year, especially when taken in connection with the fall in the price of many kinds of provisions. The deficiency of Income is however somewhat reduced; the Abstract showing that the Income has been . £4916 2 3 . and the Expenditure, 5134 19 0 .

The Directors are attending to the repeal of the statute which imposes a tax for Police and Poor Rates on such Institutions; and it is hoped that the efforts made with this view will soon be successful, and that the Income of the Asylum will in future be at least equal to the necessary outlay. The Directors have much pleasure in reporting that the efficiency of the Institution, so far as the health and recovery of the patients are concerned, continues satisfactory. The number of patients has increased; that of the female patients so much, as to lay the Directors under the necessity of refusing three applications for admission. The rate of mortality is about the average, being 5.76, or  $5\frac{3}{4}$  per cent. The percentage of recoveries on the whole number admitted during the year is 39.34 per cent.; the recoveries among the female patients alone being 57.14 per cent.; the proportion of recoveries among the male patients being considerably less than usual. But this is sufficiently accounted for by the nature of the cases which have been admitted during the year.

It is gratifying to record the attention paid to the amusement, recreation, and exercise of the patients by means of balls, dancing parties, readings, billiards, croquet, bowls, excursions, and manual labour, as by such means not only is their recovery promoted, but their condition is rendered more natural and cheerful. And they express their thanks to those parties who have contributed to supply such advantages to the patients, and specially to Mr James Mills for his kindness in furnishing materials for weaving during the present depression of trade.

At a meeting of the Quarterly Court of the Directors, held on the 13th April last, it was unanimously resolved, that "having regard to the results of the treatment of the patients in the Dundee Asylum, the capability of the Establishment and grounds for improvement and extension, and the want of funds, this Board agree that it is inexpedient to proceed further in the meantime with the question of a new Asylum; and that it be remitted to the following Special Committee to consider and report as to any improvement that can be effected on the present building and grounds, with power to communicate with the Board of Lunacy on the subject,—viz.: The Chairman, Provost Hay, Rev. Dr Taylor, Rev. J. C. Baxter, Messrs George Ower and Wm. Thoms; Mr Thoms, Convener, and three a quorum." The Directors express their thanks to the members of the Committee for the manner in which they endeavoured to ascertain the position and cost of suitable localities for the erection of a new Asylum; and also express their hope that the Special Committee will soon be able to report on the important matter submitted to their consideration.

Two legacies have been received during the year: one of  $\pounds 100$ from the late Mrs Patrick Scott, Nethergate; and another of  $\pounds 200$  from the said Patrick Scott, Esq., whose legacy and usefulness to the Asylum are recorded at length in a minute of date 30th Sept. 1855.

The Directors have also received notice of a legacy by Miss Margaret Young, Cupar Fife, consisting of the fourth part of her estate, moveable and heritable, which fourth part, after deducting special legacies, is estimated about £2000. These sums will materially aid in reducing the debt, and consequently the annual interest thereon, and will enable the Directors the more easily to adopt whatever measures for the improvement and enlargement of the Asylum may be recommended by the Special Committee.

The thanks of the Directors are justly due, and cordially given, to the Consulting Physician, the Medical Superintendent, the Matron, Chaplain, and the servants and attendants, for their attention to their several duties. Through their instrumentality, by the blessing of the Great Disposer, who both wounds and heals, some of the patients have been restored to the blessing of reason, others have been partially benefited, and the condition of all has been alleviated and improved. And it is not to be forgotten, that those who are serviceable in promoting the recovery of the insane are following naturally in the footsteps of Him who supernaturally healed all diseases, and whose work it is to confer on men the gift of a sound mind.

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# AT THE ANNUAL COURT OF DIRECTORS OF THE Dundee Royal Lunatic Asylum, HELD IN THE TOWN-HALL OF DUNDEE, On MONDAY, 15th JUNE, 1868,– ALEXANDER LOW, Esq., IN THE CHAIR,–

The Rev. Dr. TAYLOR read the Annual Report.

The Rev. Dr. GRANT, seconded by Mr J. MACKAY, moved that the Report now read be approved of, and circulated as the Forty-eighth Report of the Directors, along with the Report of the Medical Superintendent, and the Abstract of the Income and Expenditure of the Institution for the past year; and that the thanks of the Meeting be given to the Rev. Dr. TAYLOR for drawing up the Report. The motion was unanimously agreed to. THE following twenty-six parishes, the parishioners of which having contributed £20 or more to the funds of the Asylum, are entitled to have their pauper patients admitted into the lowest class, and are accordingly charged the lowest rate of board; but no other parish, since 1823, can claim the privilege. The parish of St Andrews was privileged in 1837, and the parish of Kingsbarns in 1852, to have each one patient only in the Asylum at the lowest rate of board.

# MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

15TH JUNE, 1868.

AT the date of last Annual Meeting, the number of patients in the Asylum was 83 males and 99 females, 182 total. 61 patients have since been admitted, of whom 26 were males and 35 females; 24 have been discharged recovered; 12 removed, not recovered; 14 have died; and 1 is at present absent on probation. The numbers remaining, viz. 94 males and 97 females, show an increase for the year of 9 patients.

The percentage of recoveries calculated on the number admitted is therefore 39.34, while that of the deaths calculated on the whole number under treatment is 5.76. It will be observed that while the rate of mortality is thus again about the average, the proportion of recoveries is this year considerably below what has usually been obtained in this Institution, a circumstance due in a great measure to the unfavourable character of the male cases admitted.

Taking the female patients alone, the percentage of recoveries amounts to 57.14.

Of the 61 patients admitted, 15 were supported by their friends, and 46 by the following parishes, viz. Dundee, Liff and Benvie, Kirriemuir, and Mains and Strathmartine.

Of the male patients admitted, 6 were suffering from more or less advanced paralysis, 3 from chronic insanity of more than two years' standing, 3 from epilepsy, and 1 was in a dying state. Although only 3 patients have been refused admission, considerable difficulty has been experienced in meeting the demands for accommodation not only for female patients at the lowest rates, but also for private cases of both sexes. On the female side, indeed, not only has all the available space been occupied, but on one or two occasions the patients have been for a few days in excess of the estimated accommodation.

Of the patients who have left the Institution, 36 in number, 24 were discharged recovered, 8 were removed to the Lunatic Wards of Poorhouses, 1 was transferred to the District Asylum for Perthshire, 3 were removed by friends, and 1 was discharged on probation.

In consequence of the numerous applications for the admission of female cases, every effort has been made to procure the removal of those not likely to benefit by treatment or residence in the Asylum, and also to discharge those who could be regarded as at all likely to remain well.

Two instances may be mentioned, however, which show how difficult it sometimes is to provide for the disposal of patients out of the Asylum who are apparently quiet, but who have not completely recovered. The patients referred to had been fourteen months and two years respectively resident in the Asylum, had gradually recovered to a certain point, had become quiet and industrious, and had continued in this state for six months. Their friends were anxious to do their best to take care of them, and so authority for their discharge on probation for six months was obtained. One was removed home, but on the following day was brought back in a state of violent maniacal excitement ; while the other, before she could be removed, suddenly showed symptoms of insanity too marked to permit of her being discharged.

As already stated, the obituary record contains 14 entries, 6 being of male and 8 of female patients. Of these, 7 were admitted since 1st Jan. 1867, two in 1865, one in 1864, one in 1863, one in 1854, one in 1851, and one in 1847.

The causes of death were paralysis, old age, cardiac dropsy, hæmatemesis, phthisis, and apoplexy. The average age at death was  $52\frac{11}{14}$  years. Two patients had reached the advanced age of 77, and one 86 years. It is also worthy of notice that of those who died from paralysis two were females, and also that the number of female patients at present in the Asylum suffering from paralysis is unusually large.

Such, briefly, are the results of the past year.

To refer to the means employed in bringing these about would be but to recapitulate what has so frequently been noticed in former Reports. It will suffice to say that the beneficial effects of the usual balls, dancing parties, lectures, and other forms of recreation, have shown the importance which justly attaches to this department of the treatment of the insane, and the utility of such means in restoring the diseased mind to a more healthy mode of action. These entertainments were varied as much as possible, so as to secure the greatest amount of interest on the part of the patients. Exhibitions of dissolving views were particularly enjoyed by many, while efforts of a higher and more intellectual class, such as lectures on the "Microscope," and on "Enoch Arden," secured considerable attention from others. The most popular meetings, however, were the weekly readings from Her Majesty's Journal of her Life in the Highlands. The reading and writing classes also assisted in relieving the dulness of the winter months, and were found otherwise beneficial. The billiard-room has been in almost daily use, and the new piano has been much appreciated, and has supplied a want previously much felt. Two zoetropes, made in the Asylum, have also contributed to the general fund of amusement. Out-of-door recreations have been necessarily to a certain extent limited, but bowls and croquet instruments have been in much request. Walking parties, of from eight to ten at a time, have been almost daily sent into the country, and have been found very beneficial, not only in bringing the mental faculties of the patients in contact with new and healthy influences, but also in lessening that feeling of detention and confinement, which many are apt to experience and complain of. These walks were extended to fully three-fourths of the patients.

In connection with entertainments of a more special character, thanks are again due to the members of the Horticultural Society and guardians of the Baxter Park, for their kindness and courtesy in securing for nearly one hundred inmates a private inspection of the magnificent floral exhibition of last year. Nor must Mr. Mills' kindness, notwithstanding the general depression of trade, in keeping the weaving shops in operation, be allowed to pass unnoticed. The servants and attendants continue to merit the confidence reposed in them.

### RATES OF BOARD.

The following is the present rate of Board—subject, however, to such alterations as the Directors shall judge proper, and which must necessarily vary according to the state of the funds and the expense of the establishment. The Board in all cases must be paid quarterly, and in advance. Before the entry of a patient, the Board is to be paid up for one quarter.

The First Class—paupers belonging to the parishes that have contributed to the erection of the Asylum. The Second Class—all other paupers. Every patient who is certified by four respectable householders to be unable to pay 10s. 6d. of Board per week, or whatever rate of board may be fixed by the Directors to be paid by Class Third, and to have no relation to be able to pay this rate of board, shall be considered a pauper, and admitted in Class Second; but if the patient shall belong to any of the twenty-five parishes<sup>\*</sup> that have contributed £20 and upwards to the erection of the Asylum, such patient shall be admitted into Class First.

A Physician's Fee on admission is payable by the several Classes of patients as under :---

When a patient is admitted, the board, as fixed by the Directors, shall be paid in advance to the Medical Superintendent, until next quarter-day; and afterwards in advance quarterly to the Treasurer, on the 1st day of January, the 1st of April, the 1st of July, and the 1st of October. No part of any payment in advance except in the cases of paupers shall be returned, except in special cases to be judged of by the Weekly Committee; and if any patients who have been removed shall return to the Asylum, they shall be admitted in the same manner as if they had never been in the Asylum, and pay accordingly. If not removed within a year, the above fees to be repeated annually at the date of admission, as long as the patient remains in the House.

### No Fees are paid for Paupers.

The patient shall have no claim to remuneration for work done in the House.
