REPORT BY THE DIRECTORS

OF THE

DUNDEE ROYAL LUNATIC ASYLUM

TO THE

ANNUAL GENERAL COURT,

JUNE, 1875.

THE Directors, in submitting the fifty-fifth Annual Report, have pleasure in stating that the Institution under their charge still continues in a state of undiminished efficiency.

During the past year the Directors have at last succeeded in carrying out an object which they have long had in view: they have purchased a site for the erection of a New Asylum. The farm of Westgreen, acquired by them from Mr Clayhills Henderson of Invergowrie, is situated near Liff, and commands a beautiful and extensive prospect of the River Tay and surrounding country. The farm consists of 78 acres, or thereby, and the Directors have the option of purchasing 17 acres of the adjoining farm of Whitelawston, belonging to the same proprietor, within a certain number of years, which can be taken advantage of if found to be necessary.

Another important object has lately engaged the attention of the Directors. The Original Charter of Incorporation, however suitable to the circumstances in which it was obtained, had been found in several respects inapplicable to the present state and requirements of the Asylum. They accordingly applied sometime ago to the Privy Council for a New Charter, as

mentioned in their last Report; and, after a good deal of difficulty, they are glad to be able to report that they have succeeded in obtaining it.

During the year the Directors have received two Legacies: one from the Trustees of the late Mr T. Weston Miln of £20, free of all expenses; and another of £10 from the Trustees of the late Mr Peter Anderson, Shipowner, Tayport, also a share of the residue of Mr Anderson's Estate as allocated by his Trustees, amounting altogether, after deducting expenses, to £10 14s 11d. They have likewise received a Donation of £1 from the Kirk Session of Lintrathen by the hands of the Rev. Charles Chree.

It will be observed from the Medical Report, that on 15th June last there were 184 Patients in the Asylum, 93 males and 91 females, while at present there are 207 patients, 88 having been admitted during the year, 36 having recovered, 15 having died, 6 having been removed to the Lunatic Ward of Poorhouses, 5 to other Asylums, and 3 to the care of friends.

During the past year the Directors have raised the rate of Board charged for Pauper Patients sixpence per week. This higher rate did not come into operation until 1st January, 1875, so that the increase affected only three months of the financial year, which ends on 31st March. It is hoped that this increased rate of Board will next year meet the deficiency of Income, which during the past year has been £203 6s 4d.

It is satisfactory to the Directors to be able to report that the different officials continue to discharge their duties with the utmost zeal and efficiency.

The Secretary read the Annual Report of the Directors.

The Chairman moved that the Report now read be adopted as the 55th Report of the Institution, which was agreed to.

It was further resolved that the Report be circulated along with the Medical Report and the Abstract of the Income and Expenditure for the past year.

MEDICAL REPORT.

21st JUNE, 1875.

AT the date of last Annual Meeting the number of patients resident in the Asylum was 93 males and 91 females; total, 184. Of these, 57, namely, 29 males and 28 females, were private patients, and 127, namely, 64 males and 63 females, were paupers.

88 have since been admitted, of whom 38 were males and 50 females; 16 were private cases, or patients the expense of whose maintenance was defrayed by their relatives or friends, and 72 were pauper patients, received from the parishes of Dundee, of Liff and Benvie, Kinnettles, Rescobie, and Mains and Strathmartine. The total number under treatment has therefore been 272.

Of these, 36 have been discharged recovered, namely, 15 males and 21 females; 3 have been removed, not recovered; 5 have been transferred to other Asylums, and 6 to the lunatic wards of Poorhouses. 15 patients have died, of whom 9 were males and 6 females.

The percentage of recoveries calculated on the number admitted is therefore 40.9, while that of the deaths on the whole number under treatment is 5.55. The average age at death is 42.8 years.

23 of the patients admitted were found to be suffering from mania, 23 from dementia, 22 from monomania, 12 from melancholia, 3 from puerperal mania, 2 from general paralysis, 1 from chronic mania, and 1 from epilepsy. In one case the patient appeared to be feigning insanity.

As regards the physical condition of these patients on admission, only 42, or less than one-half, could be said to be in good health; 10 were in an indifferent or weakly condition, but without any well-marked disease; 19 were frail, 12 frail and paralytic, 2 frail and emaciated, 1 scrofulous, 1 frail and epileptic, and 1 in a dying state. 5 were over 60 years of age, 1 having reached the advanced age of 76. This patient is still in the Asylum, and will probably recover.

Beyond the unusually frail state of the majority of the patients admitted, none presented any peculiarities requiring special notice except two cases, which perhaps deserve to be more fully referred to. One was that of a female, who had shown strong suicidal tendencies, and who for several days before admission had refused to take any nourishment, on the ground that she could not swallow it. Although this is by no means a rare form of delusion, yet this patient exhibited also certain obscure symptoms, which led me, before administering food to her, to make a careful examination of her throat. The result was the detection of a hard substance firmly fixed in the œsophagus, nearly on a level with the top of the sternum. It was farther found that, in consequence of the amount of inflammatory action, it could neither be extracted by forceps, nor pushed downwards into the stomach. A consultation was then held with Drs. Nimmo and Greig, when esophagotomy was decided upon as the only means left of affording any prospect of benefiting the patient. This operation Dr. Greig successfully performed. The foreign body, which proved to be the foot or knob of a mahogany tea-caddy, 14 in. in diameter, was removed, but mortification shortly afterwards supervened, and the patient died ten days after admission.

The other case, that of a male pauper patient, presented difficulties of a different, but equally rare character, arising from uncertainty as to his identity. He was taken off the streets of Dundee, conveyed to the Police Office, and sent to the Asylum as insane. Beyond his own statement that he is Louis Napoleon, and that he had just arrived from the island of St. Helena, nothing whatever has as yet been discovered as to who he is, or whence he has come.

Of the patients discharged recovered, 11 had been under treatment for periods varying from seven weeks to three months; 9 from three to six months; 3 from six to nine months; 6 from nine months to a year; 5 from one to two years; 1 from two to three years, and 1 from three to four years.

The obituary register contains 15 entries, referring to 9 male and 6 female patients. In four cases death resulted from general paralysis, in two from paralysis, in two from epilepsy, in one from chronic bronchitis, in one from pneumonia, in one from suffocation, in one from serous apoplexy, in one from mortification, in one from apoplexy, and in one from senile decay. Of these patients, nine may be said to have been moribund on admission. One has been already referred to. In another instance the patient had been seized with epilepsy, and become unmanageable. He was sent to the Asylum in a dying state, and expired two days after admission. A female patient was found on admission to be suffering from symptoms of serous apoplexy, and died eight days thereafter; while six cases showed well-marked symptoms of confirmed and more or less advanced general paralysis.

In the case of death from suffocation, the patient was found dead on the attendant entering her bed-room in the morning, with the sleeve of her night-dress tightly wrapped round her neck, but neither torn nor knotted. Death had no doubt resulted from the above cause, but whether this was the result of suicidal intention, or merely of misadventure, cannot with certainty be affirmed. She had, on two occasions, been an inmate of the Asylum, but although occasionally excited had never shown any suicidal symptoms. If her death was therefore suicidal, it can only be accounted for as the result of one of those destructive impulses which are at times suddenly developed in the minds of even the most harmless insane, sometimes assuming a suicidal and sometimes a homicidal character, and rendering all precautions useless.

It is satisfactory to be able to report that the unusual

severity of the past winter did not materially affect the health of the inmates. As precautionary measures, the clothing of the patients was carefully examined; the bedding and blankets when necessary increased in weight; and fires kept burning in all the corridors, &c. during the night; with the result that, beyond a few slight colds, no actual illness could be ascribed to this cause.

The character of the resident population still continues to be injuriously influenced by the removal of the quieter patients and by the large influx of paralytic and bad cases. One result of this is, that of the pauper patients at present in the Asylum nearly 40 per cent. require single or separate bedrooms; and as there is every probability that the causes which have given rise to this result will now continue in permanent operation, this will require to be kept prominently in view in providing accommodation in the new Asylum.

The mode of treatment pursued in this Institution has been so fully and frequently referred to in former Reports, that it is now unnecessary to enlarge much on this topic. It will be sufficient to state that every year confirms the experience that in many cases, especially those of recent origin, the usual medicinal remedies may act powerfully in restoring the mind to its healthy state; while in others, and in the more confirmed and chronic cases, improvement can only be effected by those usually classed as moral remedies, namely, occupation, amusement, exercise, instruction, and the regular habits induced by continued residence in the Establishment. No small benefit is in this way supplied by the laundry, sewing-rooms, schools, garden work, and the other workshops, which afford employment for a large proportion of the inmates; and also by the more agreeable, but equally beneficial means of distraction—the balls, entertainments, parties, picnics, &c. which have gone on with their usual regularity.

In connection with this matter, it is with regret that it has to be recorded that in consequence of the removal of the patients engaged in weaving, it has been found necessary to suspend this form of occupation, which has so long been a characteristic feature of the Dundee Asylum. In the meantime the shops have been converted into dormitories, to meet, as far as possible, the increasing demand for accommodation.

The servants and attendants, in the discharge of their responsible duties, continue to merit the confidence reposed in them.



When a patient is admitted, one Quarter's Board and the Physician's Fee, as fixed by the Directors, shall be paid in advance to the Resident Physician, and afterwards in advance quarterly to the Treasurer, on the 1st day of January, the 1st of April, the 1st of July, and the 1st of October. No part of any payment in advance, except in the cases of paupers, shall be returned, except in special cases to be judged of by the Weekly Committee; and if any patients who have been removed shall return to the Asylum, they shall be admitted in the same manner as if they had never been in the Asylum, and pay accordingly. If not removed within a year, the above fees to be repeated annually at the date of admission, as long as the patient remains in the House.

No Fees are paid for Paupers.

The Patient shall have no claim to remuneration for work done in the House.
