REPORT BY THE DIRECTORS
OF THE
Dundee Royal Lunatic Asylum
TO THE
ANNUAL GENERAL COURT,
JUNE, 1870.

It is with much pleasure that the Directors have to report to this, the 50th Annual Meeting of the General Court, that the Asylum still continues to serve the purposes for which it was instituted, by ministering in some cases to the recovery, and in all to the mental and bodily welfare of its inmates.

The financial condition is most satisfactory. As will be seen from the Treasurer's Report, there has been during the past year a surplus of Income over Expenditure. In addition to this the Treasurer has lately received the balance of the Legacy of £300 bequeathed to the Asylum by the late Lord Panmure, and a sum of £100 left to the Asylum by the late Mr WM. LINDSAY of Peterborough.

The past year has brought with it considerable changes among the Office-Bearers of the Asylum. It is with much regret that the Directors have to report to the Annual Court that Mrs WINGETT, the much esteemed and highly valued Matron of the Institution, died on the 17th of November last.

The following Minute was adopted by the Committee of Management, in which the Directors cordially concur.

"The Committee have to record with deep regret the death of Mrs WINGETT, Matron of the Asylum, which event took place on the 17th inst., and they would at the same time express

their high sense of the able, zealous, and faithful manner in which she has discharged the duties of the office which she has filled for the long period of 29 years. Combining in a remarkable manner great firmness with much kindness in the treatment of the patients, she succeeded in securing their affectionate regard, while in the management of the house she evinced rare powers of arrangement and conciliated the good will and co-operation of all about her. Possessed of great intelligence and high moral powers she took the liveliest interest in whatever was fitted to promote the welfare of the Institution and was at all times ready to aid the Directors in carrying out any plans calculated to ameliorate the condition of those committed to her care. To her judgment and skilful management the Asylum owes much of that reputation which it has so long enjoyed."

On the 17th of February last, Miss BAYNE of Nairn was, out of numerous applicants, and after careful enquiry, selected to fill the vacant office of Matron, an appointment which, from what the Directors have seen of Miss BAYNE, as well as from her high testimonials, they have every reason to believe will be most satisfactory.

The Directors also regret to mention the death of the Rev. JOHN ROBERTSON, who for 34 years was Secretary to the Asylum, a long tenure of office, during which he discharged his important duties with great zeal and fidelity.

Mr ROBERT C. WALKER, Solicitor, Dundee, was elected Secretary in his stead on 10th January last.

It will be seen from the Medical Superintendent's Report that on 21st June last there were 105 Male and 95 Female Patients, in all 200, while at present there are 190 Patients, 35 having been admitted during the year, 11 having recovered, 2 having been transferred to other Asylums, 11 having died, and 21 removed to the Lunatic Wards of the Dundee Poor House.

Every attention continues to be bestowed on the exercise and amusement of the Patients. Those who are suited for such an occupation are employed in gardening and improving the grounds, while the usual indoor occupations are regularly carried on.

The Patients' are supplied with Books, Magazines, Reviews, and Newspapers, and they can enjoy billiards, bagatelle, draughts, and similar amusements. There are also bowling and croquet greens for their use. In addition to these, readings, lectures, and parties in winter, and excursions into the country in summer, supply means of healthful enjoyment and doubtless tend in no slight degree to promote the recovery of the Patients.

The accommodation of the Medical Superintendent having been for some time found to be very inadequate, a house outside of the grounds, in the immediate neighbourhood of the Asylum, has been provided for his use.

The Directors have also to report that to mark their appreciation of the services of Dr RORIE, and of his close and unremitting attention to his arduous duties, they have increased his salary to £400 per annum, this sum to cover Board, Lodgings, &c., formerly paid by the Asylum.

The alterations in laying out the grounds referred to in last year's Report have now been considerably advanced. In addition, the wall facing the Laundry is in the course of removal, and a large extent of painting and papering in the bed rooms and dormitories is about to be commenced with the view of rendering these apartments as cheerful as possible.

The Directors have in conclusion to express their appreciation of the faithful and assiduous manner in which the various Office-Bearers of the Asylum perform their respective duties.

The Secretary read the Annual Report of the Directors.

The Rev. J. C. BAXTER, seconded by Mr JOHN MACKAY, moved that the Report now read be adopted as the Fiftieth Report of the Institution, which was agreed to.

It was further resolved that the Report be circulated, along with the Report of the Medical Superintendent, and the Abstract of the Income and Expenditure of the Institution for the past year.

The following twenty-six parishes, the parishioners of which have contributed £20 or more to the funds of the Asylum, are entitled to have their pauper patients admitted into the lowest class, and are accordingly charged the lowest rate of board ; but no other parish, since 1823, can claim the privilege. The parish of St Andrews was privileged in 1837, and the parish of Kingsbarns in 1852, to have each one patient only in the Asylum at the lowest rate of board.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

20TH JUNE, 1870.

The statistics of the past year are as follows :—

On the 21st June, 1869, the date of last Annual Meeting, the number of patients on the Asylum Register was 200 in all, viz.,—105 males and 95 females. Thirty-five patients have since been admitted. Of these 22 were males and 13 females. Eight were private patients, that is to say, the expense of their maintenance was defrayed by their relatives or friends, and 27 (18 males and 9 females), were pauper cases from the following parishes, viz.—20 from Dundee, 5 from Liff and Benvie, 1 from Monifieth, and 1 from Kinnettles.

Of the patients who have left the Asylum 11 were discharged recovered ; 2 were transferred to other Asylums ; and 21 were conveyed to the Lunatic Wards of the Dundee Poorhouse.

The deaths include 11 patients—7 males and 4 females.

The per centage of recoveries calculated on the number admitted is therefore 31·43, while that of the deaths calculated on the whole number under treatment is 4·68.

Nine of the patients admitted were found to be labouring under attacks of melancholia, six were suffering from mania, nine from monomania, one from idiocy, five from dementia, and five from general paralysis.

As regards the physical condition of these patients 21 were in good health, 13 were more or less frail, and one was paralytic. One patient aged 74 years was on admission so helpless that he had to be carried from the reception room to bed, where he still remains.

Five of the patients admitted had been, at one time or other, under treatment in this Institution, and it is gratifying to find that two of these had continued sane and useful members of society for 21 and 22 years respectively.

As already stated, the obituary contains 11 entries. In three instances death arose from paralysis ; in six from general paralysis ; in one from albuminuria ; and in one from apoplexy. The average age at death was 45 2-11 years.

On this, as on many former occasions, the mortality has occurred chiefly among those recently admitted. Two deaths took place of patients received since January last—four of patients admitted in 1869, and three of those admitted in 1868. One patient who died was admitted in 1866 and one in 1842.

Of the patients transferred to the Lunatic Wards of Poor-houses, 13 were males and 9 females, making a total of 137 so removed since December 1864.

The treatment of the patients continues to be conducted on the principles so frequently and fully explained in former reports. It will suffice on the present occasion to state that there has been no falling off in the means of occupation, recreation, and amusement. On an average 50 males and 60 females have been daily industrially employed. About 60 males and 65 females attend divine worship in Chapel on Sundays, while the same number take part in the associated amusements. In connection with this it has to be recorded that, to the Rev. Dr Watson and to the Rev. Messrs J. C. Baxter and C. A. Piper, for their valuable and instructive lectures, our best thanks are again due.

RATES OF BOARD.

The following is the present rate of Board ; subject, however, to such alterations as the Directors shall judge proper, and which must necessarily vary according to the state of the funds and the expense of the establishment. The Board in all cases must be paid quarterly, and in advance. Before the entry of a patient, the Board is to be paid up for one quarter.

The First Class : paupers belonging to the parishes that have contributed to the erection of the Asylum. The Second Class : all other paupers. Every patient who is certified by four respectable householders to be unable to pay 10s 6d of Board per week, or whatever rate of Board may be fixed by the Directors to be paid by Class Third, and to have no relation to be able to pay this rate of board, shall be considered a pauper, and admitted in Class Second ; but if the patient shall belong to any of the twenty-five parishes* that have contributed £20 and upwards to the erection of the Asylum, such patient shall be admitted into Class First.

A Physician's Fee on admission is payable by the several Classes of patients as under :

When a patient is admitted, the board, as fixed by the Directors, shall be paid in advance to the Medical Superintendent, until next quarter-day ; and afterwards in advance quarterly to the Treasurer, on the 1st day of January, the 1st of April, the 1st of July, and the 1st of October. No part of any payment in advance except in the cases of paupers shall be returned, except in special cases to be judged of by the Weekly Committee ; and if any patients, who have been removed shall return to the Asylum, they shall be admitted in the same manner as if they had never been in the Asylum, and pay accordingly. If not removed within a year, the above fees to be repeated annually at the date of admission, as long as the patient remains in the House.

No Fees are paid for Paupers.

The patient shall have no claim to remuneration for work done in the House.
