At the Annual General Meeting of Directors of the Asylum, held in terms of the Royal Charter,—The Earl of Mansfield presiding:

Inter alia-

HE Annual Statement of Accounts prepared by the Auditors was laid on the table and held as read, having been circulated among the Directors.

The Annual Report by the Committee of Management was submitted.

The Report of the Physician Superintendent was submitted and, having been circulated, was held as read.

The Chaplain's Report was submitted.

It was moved by the Chairman seconded by Mr. Thomas, and unanimously agreed to, That the Reports now submitted be approved of and recorded in the Minute-Book of the Corporation; and that the same, or a suitable abstract, be printed and circulated under the supervision of Dr. Urquhart and the Secretaries.

Mr. Kinloch moved—That the following be elected as Annual Directors in room of those retiring, viz.:—Colonel D. M. Smythe of Methven, Hector Macduff Duncan, Esq., Damside, Albert Butter, Esq., Perth, Thomas R. Moncrieff, Esq., Perth, Mr. Butter being appointed a Member of Committee in room of Mr. Kinloch. This motion, being seconded by Mr. Lumsden, was unanimously agreed to.

On the motion of Major Mercer, seconded by Rev. Frank H. Martin, The Earl of Mansfield was re-elected Chairman of the Institution for the ensuing year.

The List of Directors now stands as printed on page 3.

It was then moved by Mr. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Steel, and approved, that Messrs Mackenzie & Dickson be re-appointed Secretaries and Treasurers of the Institution, and that the Chaplain, Auditors, and Matron be re-elected.



REPORT by Managing Committee to Annual General Meeting of Directors of James Murray's Royal Asylum, 14th June, 1909.

The Committee have now the pleasure of submitting the Eighty-second Report on the affairs of the Asylum.

The Annual Statement of Accounts prepared by the Auditors, Messrs. J. & R. Morison, & Co., C.A., and now laid on the table, shows the position of the Institution at 31st March, 1909. The total Revenue for the year was - £16,009 9 10 and the total Expenditure, - 14,631 1 10

showing a surplus of - £1378 8 o

The average income per patient was £119 95 5d, and the expenditure £109 3s 9d.

The sum received for Patients' Board was £13,847 9s, being £259 os 3d less than last year. The average income from Board from 1864 to 1908, inclusive, is £7456 19s 4d.

The patients on the registers at 1st April, 1909, together pay £14,970, being an average board rate of £105 8s 5d.

The ordinary minimum board rate is £84 per annum, but during the past year 42 patients

from the City and County of Perth were maintained at rates varying from £30 to £52, in exercise of the charitable powers conferred on the Directors by the Charter.

The Farm Accounts, which, as usual, will be found with the other Financial Statements, show a surplus of £212 128 5d. The quantity of milk supplied during the year was 9808 gallons.

The Accounts for the Garden show a deficit of £36 12s 3d.

During the past year, the purchase of Pitcullen was completed at a cost, including improvements, of £5386 2s 10d, and it is now in full occupation as a dependence of the Asylum.

Four Cottages for married attendants have also been provided and are giving great satisfaction. The cost of these was £1065 18s 3d.

Dr. Urquhart has raised the question whether a larger payment of debt than is provided for under the scheme adopted by the Directors might not be advantageously made at Martinmas following. The Committee suggest that the question be remitted to them for consideration, with powers.

REPORT of the Physician Superintendent for the Year ending 31st March, 1909, presented at the Annual Meeting of Directors, 14th June, 1909.

General Statistics. T HAVE the honour to present the Eighty-Second Annual Report, together with Tables of General and Medical Statistics.

On the 1st April, 1908, there were 133 persons on the Registers of the Asylum.

Forty-one persons were admitted during the year, of whom 18 were men and 23 were women. In the table of changes in the population, relative to cases, there appear 19 male admissions, and 24 female admissions, 2 of whom were removed unrecovered and soon returned.

Thirty-two persons were discharged, 20 men and 12 women, but one of these women was readmitted and remains resident.

The number of deaths was one only, a woman.

The total number of persons under treatment was 172, and the average daily number on the Registers 134.

On the 31st March, 1909, there remained 69 men and 73 women—total, 142—being an increase of 9 during the year.

At the close of the year 4 patients were resident at Pitcullen, 2 at Mount Tabor Cottage, and 10 at the New Villas. Three were absent on pass. There were 10 voluntary patients, 5 male and 5 female.

The average rate of admissions from 1865 till Admissions. 1908 inclusive is 32.87 per annum. This year 43 names have been entered on the Registers of the Asylum, 2 fewer than in 1908. The preponderance of gentlemen no longer continues.

Thirty-seven patients were received for the first time; 4 returned relapsed, after having been discharged recovered; I returned on recrudescence of mental disorder; and I as above indicated should not have been removed to require re-admission. One of these relapsed cases was treated to recovery in 1896. Four patients were transferred from other Asylums, and 7 more had previously been in other Asylums. Of the 41 persons admitted 36 were found subject to physical diseases more or less severe, and I died within a short time after reception. The average age on admission was 39.00 (compared with 46.93 in 1908), and 3 were over 60 years of age (compared with 8 in 1908). While the average age on admission was 39.00 years, the average age on the first attack of the mental disorder was 31, 17 having occurred in adolescence. The records of the year have been exceptional in a smaller number of senile cases.

The causes of insanity as discovered on Causes of Insanity. admission were ascertained more or less precisely in nearly every case. Twenty-five were hereditarily predisposed to mental derangement, while 12 belonged to families of neuropathic tendencies, and near relatives of 3 were markedly alcoholic. Thirteen had been subjected to mental stress of a severe nature, but each of them presented such a history as showed that they were inherently unable to withstand the anxieties under which

they had succumbed. The nervous failure in one evanescent case, consequent upon severe railway injuries, was apparently not complicated with any neuropathic family history.

Curability.

The number of curable patients admitted may be stated at 21, making allowance for possible improvement and temporary recoveries in certain doubtful cases, and of these 10 have left recovered, or are already convalescent. Twenty were indubitably in hopeless condition in this respect, owing to advanced degenerative diseases of vital organs or congenital defects. No fewer than 14 had previous attacks of insanity, besides 6 of such a nature that periodicity of mental disorder had been established. Five were re-admitted for the first time, and 1 for the fourth time.

Of those who were admitted during the first attack of insanity, 5 men and 11 women were received within three months of the inception of the malady; of those who were admitted relapsed, 8 men and 4 women were received within three months of the recurrence of the malady. These mainly constitute the curable cases.

Physical Diseases. The usual list of physical diseases was noted as causative of, or complicating the mental malady, especially diseases of the heart, kidneys, and digestive system. Influenza was assigned as a causal factor in three cases admitted last year, but more important conditions existed in all of these. Eight patients were received consequent upon habitual drunkenness; but, as usual, other antecedent determining facts were ascertained relative to the occurrence of actual insanity in all of them.

Six patients required constant supervision on account of suicidal tendencies, and 10 were reported as dangerous to others.

Those admitted came from the following Former localities:—7 from Perth, 15 from the County of Perth, 2 from Edinburgh, 3 from Glasgow, 2 from Forfarshire, 6 from Fife, 2 from other parts of Scotland, and 4 from England. No application from the County of Perth was refused, and, as in former years, due consideration was shown to indigent patients of the class and from the locality prescribed by the Charter of Incorporation, but seven such applications from other parts of the United Kingdom could not be entertained.

The general Recovery Rate of the Asylum Recovered. during the years 1865-1908 inclusive is 34'45. This year it is 20'93 (compared with 28'89 last year) on the number of admissions: 36'84 for men and 8'33 for women. Altogether 9 patients left the Institution restored to health, besides 2 who, having been convalescent on discharge, have since recovered. Of these the average duration of residence was 9 months. The shortest period was little over 2 months, and the longest period 4 years. As usual, a general and satisfactory increase in body weight was noted among the recoveries.

There is not much opportunity for the surgeon in the treatment of the insane, but two operations were performed on epileptic patients received last year. One had long suffered from suppurative disease of his ear, and, consequent upon surgical interference, his fits and maniacal excitement have

ceased since October, and the patient has been restored to his home. The other had been rendered insensible by a blow on his head in boyhood, and his skull was opened in the hope of finding a local cause for his epilepsy and mental deterioration. The results were, unfortunately, negative. There has been no improvement.

Unrecovered.

Of those cases (24) discharged unrecovered, 7 were transferred to other Asylums, 2 for the benefit of change and 5 having been unable to pay the minimum Rate of Board charged here. Five were returned to family life with good results; 3 were sent to private care; 6 were returned against advice to home care with untoward results; 1 has been sent to another Asylum, and 2 have returned here relapsed.

Died.

The percentage of Deaths on the average number resident was '74, the average rate of the Institution being 6.27. Such a low rate of mortality has not occurred since the opening of the Asylum in 1827. The patient died of exhaustion of mania within a fortnight of admission, with all the symptoms of an acute toxic condition of a virulent character. The actual number of deaths was I (at the age of 41), as compared with II last year.

It is hoped that the Scottish Asylums' Laboratory will be efficiently maintained to aid us in the study of our clinical cases, and to advance the scientific treatment of our patients. It is evident that experience, gained by means of the Laboratory, during the past twelve years, has led to proposals which will develop this

part of our work in various Scottish institutions, specially with the intention of more directly correlating what is done at the bedside with what is done in the laboratory. These proposals demand highly specialized skill and aptitude, and we must look in that direction for further progress. I would urge, however, that, in so far as possible, any revisal of methods should be inclusive of the continued support of the Central Laboratory already established by the Scottish Asylums generally, and that these local undertakings should be closely in touch with it, if not actually subsidiary to it.

The average daily numbers on the Registers Average during the year were:—Certified male patients, Registers. 64.79; female, 60.48; Voluntary male, 3.65; female, 5'35: Total, 134'27. This shows an increase of '07 compared with last year, and an increase of 34.43 over the average daily total since 1864, which is 99.84. The lowest number occurred in August, 1908 (128), and the highest (143) in March, 1909.

The condition, as regards curability, of the patients remaining resident on 31st March was more favourable than at the same date last year. Hope may be entertained for the recovery of 17 cases. Ten were of suicidal tendencies, and 22 were dangerous to others. Eleven were epileptic, and 2 laboured under general paralysis. Sixteen were more than 60 years of age, besides twenty who have passed 70. The usual list of bodily diseases complicating the mental disorders was recorded, especially the great number of cardiac affections and allied degenerative changes of vital

organs. Considering this large proportion of aged and infirm patients and the low mortality of the year, the members of the Nursing Staff are entitled to due recognition of the care and attention with which they have performed their duties.

Occupations and Amusements.

The occupation of patients has had due attention as in former years. It is difficult to find suitable employment, yet the average of the daily returns may be stated at the satisfactory number of 78. I hope that work will soon be found in completing the access to the villas and replacing the defective curling-pond, both of which undertakings are now desirable.

The usual amusements and recreations have been sustained, and the lengthy list of these include entertainments organized by Mr. Bryson, Mr. Graves, Mr. Richardson, and Mr. Taylor. The Chaplain and others have contributed to the social life of the Institution, and Directors have been present at several of our festivities. To these gentlemen our thanks are due.

There were 405 driving parties, and 558 visits were paid to patients. The number of visits has greatly increased. Last year they were stated at 432. This is a fortunate development, nevertheless I believe that it is an omission in the enactments governing our procedure that there is no statutory obligation laid upon those personally responsible for the detention of patients to visit them at convenient intervals. The more intimate and discreet the knowledge of our hospital methods, the better it is for the patients and staff.

Twenty-seven patients were at Elie, the house having been kept open from 28th April till 20th

November. This late date was necessary owing to our removal to Pitcullen. It was only then that it was ready for occupation.

There were no entries in the Register of Restraint. Restraint and Seclusion during the year, and no patients broke parole and failed to return to the Institution in accordance with their undertaking. The average number of patients entrusted with that liberty was 45. There was no escape.

The General Health of the establishment has been satisfactory, and the body weight of the patients has been well maintained, as ascertained by periodical examinations of the records. There was no epidemic disease. One case of erysipelas, and one of a suspicious eruption on the skin occurred. Both were recently admitted patients, and recovered satisfactorily from these maladies.

General

There was no serious accident, and com- Accidents. paratively few slight injuries among turbulent and feeble cases. One records these matters with thankfulness.

The General Management of the Institution General Management. has proceeded on the usual lines, approved by experience. Indeed, the year has been singularly uneventful, and there has been little of special interest to report. For a long term of years reconstruction and additions have been in progress, leaving only inconsiderable undertakings to be completed, if it should be decided that the accommodation is not to be augmented.

At present, however, there does not seem to be necessity for enlargement on any considerable scale, for the Commissioners show yearly no increase in the number of private patients in Scotland in proportion to the population; and for the last four years our average numbers on the Registers have remained about 134. There is therefore no need to discuss this matter further than to remind the Directors that we have lost accommodation for five patients at the higher rates by the change from Kincarrathie to Pitcullen. By adding three bedrooms, etc., to the Pavilion at Pitcullen this loss will be so far made good.

As usual, painting and repairs have been executed in various parts of the buildings in order to maintain them in a condition of efficiency. The East Hospital has been thoroughly cleansed and decorated, and the West Hospital is now being similarly treated.

New hot water tanks have been introduced, so that there is an ample supply in all parts of the building at all times.

The main building has long harboured rats, which seem to come and go at different seasons of the year. A skilful attempt has been made to shut them out and to force those which remained into traps, and this nuisance has certainly been abated. The virus administered last year proved ineffective.

Pitcullen has been occupied by ladies since last November. The structural alterations were trifling—mainly the provision of a bedroom for the Matron and a pantry for the housemaid. The roofs and rain-water conductors required repair, and the whole house was painted and

papered. The stables were altered and enlarged, and coach-houses and motor shed were erected.

It should be mentioned that the Attendants' houses have been in occupation for a year, and that they are reported satisfactory in actual use. The system of heating derived from the kitchen fire has been successful. Unfortunately the Gannochy Road has not yet been repaired by the City authorities, who were found liable for its upkeep by the Court of Session.

The Factory Inspector visited the Laundry in accordance with his instructions, and indicated certain improvements which he recommended. These were for the protection of the workers using machinery, and have been adopted, viz., hinged covers for hydro extractors, guards for rollers, and protection for gauge glasses.

The Gardener reports that the results of the Garden. year were better than those of 1907-8. The spring crops were satisfactory, but the autumn and winter vegetables failed owing to the dry weather. Fruit did well, with the exception of gooseberries and apples, injured by the disastrous effects of the severe frost of 24th April. Much time was occupied by the change to Pitcullen and the removal of the greenhouses at The Murray, and an extra gardener was found necessary. Half the vines were cultivated, but those which got no special attention yielded a good supply of grapes for cooking.

The stock on the farm was kept in good con-Farm. dition, and there were no losses. The Pitcullen parks afforded feeding for nine young cattle instead

of four as usual, but gave no more profit. The mid field, which was broken up two years ago, yielded nearly a sufficiency of potatoes and turnips for our use. The hay crop is likely to last until the grass is grown. Cows and pigs have been selling at high prices. It has been thought proper to charge the milk supplied at 9½d a gallon.

The Staff.

The changes in the Nursing Staff have been few in number, and almost represent a minimum. Only 2 charge nurses left us; the resignations (11) therefore are represented almost exclusively by those occurring in the lower grades of the service. One attendant left for adequate reasons, 2 to enter private nursing, 3 unsuitable, and 1 found drunk on duty. One nurse resigned to enter on general hospital work, 1 to enter on private nursing, 1 unsuitable, and 1 died. Nurse Corlett's long illness referred to in the Report of last year could only have this sad result. I am informed that her residuary legatee is to place a window to her honoured memory in the Chapel, with the consent of the Directors.

The length of service of the members of the staff may be summarised as follows:—3 have served for more than 30 years, 2 for more than 20 years, 13 for more than 10 years, 14 for more than 5 years, and 24 for more than 2 years.

Mr. Knight has succeeded Mr. Henry as Chief Attendant and Storekeeper. He entered the service in 1888 and has remained here since then, with the exception of a period of three years, when he enlarged his experience in the Royal Edinburgh and Paisley Asylums.

The Reports of the Visiting Commissioners in Lunacy are presented herewith.

Only those who are conversant with the details of the work done here can appreciate the responsible and arduous nature of the service, and can fully understand the thanks and gratitude which I endeavour to express on the conclusion of each year; however formally they are conveyed, I feel assured that the Directors know them to be sincere.

REPORTS

OF THE

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY

FOR THE YEAR.

REPORT BY DR. JOHN MACPHERSON.

JAMES MURRAY'S ROYAL ASYLUM, Perth, 27th October, 1908.

THE Asylum was last visited on the 9th April of the present year.

There are at this date 132 patients on the Registers, of whom 124—63 gentlemen and 61 ladies—are certified and 8—3 gentlemen and 5 ladies—are voluntary inmates.

Since the previous visit, 22 patients have been admitted; 7 have been discharged recovered (including 2 voluntary patients who left the Institution); 14 were discharged unrecovered; and 1 lady died.

The cause of death is registered as exhaustion from acute mania, and a *post-mortem* examination was held.

There are no entries in the register of accident, of escape, or of restraint and seclusion.

The staff of nurses and attendants continues to be large and effective; the proportion of day attendants—excluding officials—being 1 to 3.3

patients, and of night attendants 1 to 16. Out of a total staff of 47 attendants, 7 men and 5 women resigned, and 5 men and 7 women were engaged.

Two patients were absent on pass and 5 ladies are still at the sea-side house at Elie, pending the alterations on Pitcullen House. With these exceptions, all the inmates were seen and were all given an opportunity of making any statement they pleased. Beyond natural references to the prospects of liberation on the part of a few of them, there were no complaints of any kind, and none of them requested a private interview. The impression formed was that the patients as a whole were as happy and contented as the circumstances of their enforced confinement could possibly permit.

Five gentlemen and 7 ladies were confined to bed, some of them labouring under the infirmities of age, others on account of serious nervous or physical ailments, and one or two for purposes of rest in pursuance of the treatment of acute mental disease.

Excepting one lady who was labouring under acute mania, there was no noise or excitement in any of the wards during the visit.

Twenty-five gentlemen and 23 ladies usually attend Divine Service in the Chapel on Sundays, and 32 gentlemen and 25 ladies attend the associated amusements during the week.

The Asylum was found everywhere in excellent order, bright, cheerful, and comfortable. The wards are liberally supplied with literature, and with the usual accessories which are likely to interest or amuse the patients.

Useful employment is found for 81 of the inmates, several of whom are interested in and benefit by the work they do.

Pitcullen House is being prepared for the reception of patients, and promises to afford an excellent and quiet home for the class that formerly occupied Kincarrathie House. It is smaller than the latter, but Dr. Urquhart is of opinion that, judging from the average number of resident patients during the past five years, it is sufficiently large for the requirements of the Institution.

The case books and the official registers were examined and found to be well and correctly kept.

REPORT BY DR. JOHN FRASER.

JAMES MURRAY'S ROYAL ASYLUM, Perth, 14th April, 1909.

THERE are 66 gentlemen and 66 ladies on the Registers of the Asylum as certified patients. Of these, 3 ladies are absent on pass, and 1 gentleman is absent for the day. There are 5 gentlemen and 5 ladies at present in the Asylum as voluntary boarders. The total number on the register is 142.

The changes among the certificated patients since last visit are as follows:—9 gentlemen and 13 ladies have been admitted, 3 gentlemen and 1 lady have been discharged as recovered, and 3

gentlemen and 7 ladies have been discharged as unrecovered. No death has taken place. Two gentlemen and 1 lady have been admitted as voluntary boarders, and 1 lady, resident in that capacity, has left.

It has not been found necessary to resort to the use of mechanical restraint or seclusion in any case during the period under review. Two casualties are recorded, neither of which was of serious character. There has been no escape.

It is noted with satisfaction that the changes among the nursing staff have since last visit been few, only 1 attendant and 2 nurses having resigned, and I attendant and I nurse having been engaged. There has been no dismissal. The staff is maintained at very good strength, the proportion for day duty being 1 to 4 in the gentlemen's division and I to 3.2 in that of the ladies. The night staff consists of 3 attendants and 4 nurses. The record of service among the attendants is excellent, 4 having served over 10 years, 6 over 5 years, 4 over 2 years, and 8 less than 2 years. Owing principally to the tendency of the nurses to proceed to general hospital training their record of service is not so satisfactory-3 out of 25 have served over 5 years, 9 over 2 years, and 13 under 2 years. Six attendants and 3 nurses hold the certificate of the Medico-Psychological Association for proficiency in mental nursing.

A block of four houses has been built, on a suitable and convenient site, for married attendants. Each home contains 3 rooms, and in their arrangements every requirement as to comfort has been met. In providing these houses the Directors have

adopted the surest means of inducing trustworthy and efficient attendants to remain permanently in the service of the Institution.

The patients were found in a highly satisfactory condition. Great tranquillity prevailed throughout the Asylum, a circumstance which the comforts, which are liberally provided for the patients, contribute largely to bring about. All that was seen during the visit bore evidence of the great care and ability in the treatment of the patients. The observing and recording of the medical and other details which may elucidate the nature of every case is carried out in this Asylum in an extremely elaborate and efficient manner. Six patients of each sex were confined to bed; the rest appeared to be in good bodily health. There are 12 patients on parole beyond the grounds, and 29 have the privilege of parole within the grounds; these figures show the spirit in which the Asylum is managed. Fifty-eight patients attended Divine Service in the Asylum Chapel last Sunday. The decoration of the Chapel has been completed, and the beauty of its interior cannot fail to add effectively and beneficially to the influence of Divine Service. Fifty patients are usually present at associated entertainments, and much is done for the amusement of the patients by encouraging them to join in both outdoor and indoor games. Of the 47 gentlemen registered as employed, 16 are actively engaged daily in field and garden work. A large number of patients have drives: during 1908 there were 310 driving parties.

The hospital wards in the ladies' division have been most tastefully repapered and redecorated,

and a similar renovation of the hospital section in the gentlemen's division is now in progress. The other parts of the Asylum were, as usual, found in admirable order. Pitcullen House, the accommodation of which resembles that of a wellappointed private mansion, is occupied by 5 ladies. By relinquishing Kincarrathie, five beds for gentlemen at the higher rates of board were lost, and arrangements to replace them had to be made in one of the villas and in the main building. At present the accommodation for gentlemen at the higher rates is hardly adequate, and should the admission of this class increase, the most desirable method of providing further accommodation will fall to be considered. It is understood that the Pavilion in the grounds of Pitcullen could, by internal reconstruction, be made into a suitable and comfortable house for two gentlemen at these rates.

It cannot be too often stated that the charitable action of the Asylum confers pecuniary benefits of a liberal character on the County of Perth by the reception of patients belonging to the middle classes at low and unremunerative rates of board. The minimum rate is £84, but there are 36 patients belonging to the City and County of Perth who pay only from £30 to £52 a year.

The highly satisfactory state in which the Asylum was found gives assurance that Dr. Urquhart continues to discharge the duties of his office with unabated energy and efficiency.

The books and official registers were examined, found written up to date, and correctly kept.

JAMES MURRAY'S ROYAL ASYLUM, PERTH.

HIS Asylum and Pitcullen House are healthily situated amidst picturesque surroundings, on the Hill of Kinnoull, in the immediate vicinity of Perth. They stand in the midst of extensive Pleasure-Grounds, surrounded by the fields of the Home Farm, and command unrivalled views, extending over the valley of the Tay to the range of the Grampians. The central position of Perth makes it accessible from all parts of Scotland.

Being an Endowed Institution and a Chartered Corporation, under the management of a statutory Board of Directors who have no pecuniary interest in its prosperity, the profits on each year's transactions have been devoted to modernising and perfecting the original fabric of the Asylum, in order to render it an efficient Hospital, as well as a comfortable Home, for all classes of Private Patients.

An important modern supplement to the resources of the Institution is the erection of two wings for the reception of Acute Cases. These have been fitted with every improvement in the means of treatment of the Insane. Consumptive patients are separately treated in Sanatoria.

The Directors have purchased the beautifully situated Mansion-House of Pitcullen, in the neighbourhood of, but distinctly separated from, the Asylum. It is in use as a Convalescent Home and for Patients of the Higher Class suffering from the milder forms of mental disorder. "Seven Gables," Elie, was purchased for the use of the Patients in 1893, and Mount Tabor Cottage has been taken on lease for the accommodation of those requiring separate treatment, Two new Villas having been lately erected,

there are now vacancies for all classes of private patients. The various buildings of the Establishment at Perth are connected with the National Telephone Company.

The Distinctive Features of this Institution are, that it receives no Paupers; that Ladies are employed as Nurses; that it contains a limited number of Patients, permitting of Individualised Treatment; and that it is developed as a Central Hospital for the treatment of acute and difficult cases, with Succursal Houses for those less seriously affected, thus permitting of the classification of patients according to their mental condition. Special attention is devoted to the occupation of the Patients; there are ample means of Amusement; and the utmost liberty, with due regard to safety, is accorded. Carriages are kept for the use of those Patients for whom such exercise is desirable.

No Publicity is implied in the proceedings connected with the admission of Patients, nor in the term "Royal Asylum."

The Directors have every confidence in referring the friends of those requiring treatment to the Reports of the Commissioners in Lunacy.
