

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#### TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

#### OF THE

### TRUSTEES OF THE STATE LUNATIC HOSPITAL,

#### AT WORCESTER,

#### 1855.

#### To His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable Council of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts :---

The Trustees of the State Lunatic Hospital at Worcester, in compliance with the statute in such case provided, make their Twenty-third Annual Report.

For a particular account of the internal management, and the number and health of the patients, the Trustees refer to the full and luminous statement of the Superintendent, herewith transmitted.

It having become a settled fact early in the year, that the State would soon erect another hospital in the western part of the Commonwealth, and that ours must remain for a number of years with only such improvements as could be made with the means within the control of the Trustees, they have spent much time in devising the best mode of expending the funds in the hands of their Treasurer, which have grown out of small balances of accounts from year to year.

The Trustees first made two bowling alleys in the basement of the south end of the building. These have been a source of great amusement, and some improvement in health to many; especially when the weather was such as to prevent exercise abroad. 6

From an examination of several hospitals, and other institutions for the insane, and by inquiries of superintendents, the Trustees became satisfied that strong rooms, enclosed by brick walls and iron gratings, ought but rarely, if ever, to be used, and were dangerous temptations to the officers of such institutions, as a mode of avoiding trouble from violent patients. There were thirty-six such rooms in this Hospital-twenty-four of which the Trustees have caused to be removed, and in their places have been made four large, airy, and handsome parlors or sitting-rooms, finished in a plain but neat style, and commanding extensive views abroad, where the better part of the patients can sit quietly and read or amuse themselves. The six strong rooms remaining in the female department have none of them been occupied during the summer, and those in the , male department but rarely. That strong rooms are not often necessary, is proved by the fact, that, in the female department, two small girls of nineteen and twenty years of age, have the superintendence of about a dozen of the most excited patients, and by their resolution and kindness keep them under entire restraint.

The barn on the premises, one hundred feet long and forty feet wide, with high posts, stood within forty feet of the main buildings, greatly exposing them to fire. The piggeries, calculated for the accommodation of one hundred swine, were within about the same distance; in warm weather no care could prevent their becoming a great nuisance. They are all removed to a distance of about twenty rods from the main building, where they are much more commodiously situated than before, and they leave the grounds immediately in the rear of the Hospital in a situation to be easily made nearly as ornamental as they are in front.

The halls in the original building, and in most of the additions which have been made from time to time, were long, narrow, without recesses, and generally dark and gloomy. To remedy these evils, as far as possible, we have, in all the halls, caused recesses to be made on the sides affording the best light, by taking away the partitions between two rooms, and between the rooms and the hall, and throwing an arch over the front to sustain the halls above. These recesses are sixteen feet wide, with two windows in each.

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They make the halls comfortably light, and are much occupied by the patients. To partially compensate for the loss of these rooms for lodgings, and to provide associated dormitories for suicidal patients, and those who are afraid to sleep in a room alone, we have caused partitions to be taken out between two rooms in each hall, and have placed three beds in each of the rooms so enlarged.

The before-mentioned improvements are valuable, compared with the expense of them, if pure air, and the comforts and cheerfulness of patients have a tendency to hasten their recovery.

Another more important and more expensive improvement has been commenced, and considerable progress has been made in it-that of warming the building by steam, and forcing ventilation by mechanical power; much in the manner adopted in the hospital at Utica, New York, but with some improvements which the construction of their building did not admit of. Fortunately, our buildings have all been constructed with flues in the walls, by means of which hot or cold air, as the temperature of the weather may require, can be forced into every hall. This will enable us to warm all the air in one large air chamber, and to distribute it as needed in the different apartments. We have much confidence in the success of the plan adopted, and hope we shall be able to carry it through with the funds in our treasury; and we feel the more confidence that we shall be justified in the undertaking, even if we should find it necessary to call on the legislature for a small sum of money when the whole shall be completed, from the fact that a new hospital is soon to be erected in the western part of the State, and if our plan should prove successful, it will enable the committee having that building in charge, so to construct it as to avoid all danger of being under the necessity of making alterations. The experiment (if experiment it is) can be tried with much less hazard here than in a new building. Another important feature attending this improvement, grows out of the present arrangements for cooking, and our exposure to fire. When the original building was erected, a kitchen and apparatus for cooking, sufficient for the patients who could be accommodated in it, were provided. There have since been added, at different times, four wings, with a kitchen to each of

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them—making five separate kitchens, with their several accommodations for cooking—thus occasioning a great waste of fuel and labor, and additional exposure to fire.

We have so located the preparations for warming and ventilation, that a kitchen may be erected in the rear of the centre building sufficiently large for the whole establishment, and in which the cooking can be principally done by the same steam which warms the halls. This would greatly reduce the amount of fuel now consumed, and would remove all the fires from the main buildings. This, with the improvements now in progress, the Trustees are confident would render the existing Hospital as safe and convenient as the construction of the buildings will admit of—and they hope, satisfactory to the community. But they have not the means of carrying out this suggestion, and must leave it to the discretion of the legislature.

The Trustees, in closing their Report, regret to be under the necessity of stating that Doctor Chandler, who, for the last ten years, has discharged the arduous and difficult duties of Superintendent of the Hospital, has come to the conclusion to retire from the institution. We avail ourselves of this occasion to bear testimony to the fidelity and signal ability with which Doctor Chandler has discharged the duties of his position, and to the great success which has attended his labors during the whole peried of his superintendence; and we cannot but regret that the institution is to be deprived of the benefits of his care, skill and ripe experience in a most interesting department of medical science. Doctor Chandler's resignation was presented on the first of October, but to take effect on the first of April next.

The Trustees have appointed Doctor Merrick Bemis, who has been a physician in the Hospital during the last eight years, to be the successor of Doctor Chandler.



#### Twenty-third Annual Report of the Superintendent to the Trustees of the State Lunatic Hospital.

GENTLEMEN :—This is the tenth time I have had the honor of detailing to you the yearly transactions of this institution. Although the daily routine of duties and events branches off into various departments, there is a great sameness in the general aspect of hospital life from year to year.

In review, the first feature in our history of the past year that presents itself, is the very great preservation of our large family from serious accidents and wasting sicknesses. For this great immunity, we are ever ready to acknowledge the protecting hand above us that aids us in all our efforts for good.

The great alterations that were commenced in the summer, for a more efficient and healthful mode of heating and ventilating, has necessarily increased our cares and our duties, and has interfered to a considerable extent, with the out-door liberty we could give our inmates. But it has been cheerfully submitted to in the anticipation of the luxury it would give us, when completed, of being fanned by it in winter with fresh warm air, and in summer with cool air. This arrangement for heating this hospital will also, I trust, tend to allay the apprehensions of those in charge of the institution of a great share of the danger of being consumed by fire. On this subject our fears have often been keenly alive ; the danger of fire has been our greatest source of anxiety in the winter months. The new method of heating will remove all furnaces and stoves from the building; the boiler fires are to be under ground and fifty feet from any part of the hospital. Danger of fire from them can hardly be apprehended. When all the kitchens shall

be merged in a new one, as has been suggested, in the rear of the centre building, all fires will be removed from such parts of the hospital as shall be occupied by the patients. The kitchen and bakery will require an anthracite fire each. Steam can be made to do much of the cooking and all of the heating of water for baths.

The alterations commenced last spring, of making a parlor in each ward, have been nearly completed. These parlors add much to the cheerfulness of the wards. This change in the wards was often talked about by my predecessor, twenty years ago. In the old part of the hospital, the parlors have been made in the same place and in the same way he contemplated. But the obstacle in the way of its being accomplished then, was that the hospital was crowded and the room could not, in his view, be spared. These parlors or recesses, made on the sunny side of the galleries, and midway, by removing the partitions in front of and between two adjoining dormitories, let in light and air, and make a cosy nook for the inhabitants of each ward to assemble in.

In the two upper stories, where there were rooms for the noisy and violent, the partitions have been taken out, and now four spacious rooms are finished off. They will serve for sitting-rooms, parlors for the adjoining wards or work-rooms, or for associated dormitories, if the hospital should again be excessively crowded. Although we have had on the average about fifty patients more than our present accommodations are fitted for, we do not feel the pressure, because it was but a little while ago that we had an excess of more than two hundred and fifty. When we were so badly crowded we felt obliged to occupy every nook and corner of the hospital—the strong rooms even. With a surplus of only fifty, we get along without using our strong rooms much—none for the past year on the female side of the house.

The use of the strong rooms on the male side has been confined to a few patients. The two who have occupied them most, were brought to us almost directly from other hospitals from which they had been ejected. Their personal habits are so noisome, and their mental capacity so limited, that efforts to improve their condition avail so little, we have felt compelled to seclude them in these rooms for the good of others and their

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own good too. Other patients have been in these rooms to the amount of one per cent. of our male patients.

The barn and piggery have been moved into the east garden, as you very well know, by your direction, and by the superintendence of some of your Board. They have been put in order; the barn sets up seven feet from the ground, which affords a shelter for the cows and gives room for a deep cellar for vegetables. These buildings are now beyond the reach of offence to the inmates of the hospital.

This table more fully illustrates the fact that the inhabitants of the State nearest to hospitals, avail themselves of their privilege of sending their insane to these institutions, in a very much greater proportion than those do who live more remote. The admissions here from the county in which it is situated, are about one hundred per cent. greater than they are from the same number of people in the western counties, although the habits of life, the liability to insanity, and the means of support are very similar. The crowded residence of the cities and the hazardous employments of the sea-faring people undoubtedly tend to the increase of insanity. A few have come to us the past year, from the south-eastern counties. They were mostly those who had been in this institution at some former period, and preferred coming here.

As appearances here now indicate that a change in the current of the finances is taking place, in consequence of the very great expenditure of money for the improvement going on, it may be well to state, for the encouragement of those who shall soon take our places, the prosperity of the institution in this respect, the last nine years. Ten years ago the Treasurer reported that "there had been paid out the sum of \$10,181.02, which is to be met by receipts subsequent to Dec. 1st, 1845, and the current expenses of the hospital are to be paid from the same source." That debt of \$10,000 was a source of much anxiety to the Trustees when the superintend-

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ency of the Hospital devolved upon the writer. But, as the institution was full of patients, and the price of their support was at a high point-\$2.50 per week-the way to extricate ourselves seemed obvious-to practice a little economy, and to lop off any useless expenditure. Two of the seven kitchens were soon broken up, their fires went out, and their cooks ceased to draw pay. More than \$500 per annum was saved to the institution, and no patient was affected by the change. Recently two more kitchens have been closed, by which six or eight fires have gone out, and their cooks ceased to draw pay ; and with very little trouble the boarders are provided for elsewhere. At least \$1,000 will be saved by this last closing up of kitchens, annually. Economy demands that there should be only one kitchen in this Hospital. It is but a little more labor to prepare, and it takes but a little more fuel to boil, a peck of potatoes, than it does half a peck. By strict economy, the debt was soon paid off, and a surplus began to accumulate, although the price of board was three times lessened by direction of your Board. It was our intention to infringe upon the comforts of the patients in no particular, but in many ways, as may be seen by my former reports, we have added many conveniences for their happiness, and have increased the value of this establishment, as may be supposed, by our after paying The debt of . . . . . . \$10,181 02 . The item of expenditure for "improvements and repairs," in institutions of this kind, when they are kept up with the spirit of the age, will always be large. But nothing like that we have expended here the last nine years.

The causes of insanity are permanent and occasional. The permanent causes are such as have been exerting their influence in all time and among all people—as ill health. The occasional causes are such as become endemic in certain nations more or less limited in time and space—as the Tulip Mania of Germany.

Spiritualism of the present day, is of the last class of causes. This singular mental phenomenon, has, for some few years, engaged a part of the minds in this vicinity, and some few cases have been brought to us the past, as well previous years,

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arising, it was supposed, from investigating its phenomena and from believing in its supposed truthful revelations of the future state of existence. If it was true that this process of investigation did really open to the mind any knowledge of the world to come, not revealed to us by the Scriptures—which many of its votaries assert and believe—then it would be a cause calculated in the highest degree to engage, excite, and disturb the mind. But it has been said by those best prepared to investigate closely, that the responses through the mediums contain no ideas of this or the next world, that were not then, or had not previously been, in the mind of some one present. It may be a new faculty of the mind, but its field of operations lies this side of the grave.

The whole number of admissions is 4,956. Of these there have been 2,284 recoveries. The admissions increased gradually, until this year, although accommodations for the insane elsewhere in this State, had been supplied to an extent far beyond any probable increase of the insane. The increase of this malady in the last twenty-three years, was produced by the greater number of exciting topics that have been agitating the public mind. But there has been an apparent increase greater than the real. As the community has acquired more knowledge upon this subject, it has put a more charitable construction upon the unnatural acts of its members, and more readily recognized their delusions, and prepared comfortable quarters for their custody and cure, which has drawn forth from seclusion the unfortunate members of many an afflicted family. The admissions in thirteen and a half years of my predecessor's term of office, were 2,463, and in mine, of nine and a half, 2,493.

The whole number of recoveries is 2,284, which is about fortysix per cent. of the admissions. The per cent. of recoveries the last nine years corresponds almost exactly with that of the first thirteen. The deaths have been about eleven per cent. of the admissions. These results compare favorably with those of similar hospitals in this country and in Europe.

The accommodations for each sex here have always been nearly equal, and the admissions have been so too, while few or none have kept out on account of the sex. The admissions have been, males, 2,451; females, 2,505; which is about the relative proportion of the sexes in the community.

In the moral treatment of the insane we recognize the principle of giving the largest liberty and the greatest freedom from restraint in each case, consistent with the security of the individual and safety of the community. Until our grounds and avenues were obstructed by mechanics and laborers in the prosecution of the changes going on in the institution and about the yards, our patients got out in parties to walk, to play games, to loiter about the grounds and to work in the gardens and fields, in large numbers, every pleasant day. And still, they are out a good deal, and even help some in the improvements. The carriage from the city takes out parties of ladies daily to ride, and games of checkers, cards, chess and ten pins,

are put in requisition day and evening. We have, for reading, a library of miscellaneous books of three hundred volumes, in one of the most quiet wards on each side of the house, besides the one in the centre, for the use of the patients. Of newspapers, we obtain one hundred and fifty copies each week. Editors of the papers in this city lay us under great obligations in this matter; and the proprietors of the following, have, for years, contributed much towards the happiness of our household, by generously sending their daily or weekly sheets to this hospital.

Mr. Charles Whitney gave us a rich treat in his oratorical impersonations, in the afternoon of Thanksgiving day, in our chapel. Religious services have, for more than seventeen years, been regularly sustained in our chapel; and, for more than fifteen of it, by our present able and interesting chaplain. These public services have become one of the marked features of the institution, and they could not very well be dispensed with. They present to the insane, by the importance of the subject, and by bringing to mind former associations connected with them, strong and very efficient motives to self-control, for the hour, at least; they help to break up the monotony of the Sabbath day in our wards, when respect for its observance keeps the inmates from taking recreation out of doors as on week days, and they impart instruction to all, and consolation to the troubled spirits of many.

Useful manual labor is the best of all means to promote and to secure health. Almost every one might find some kind of employment here, if his wish was to do so. But very many of our household do not, from their peculiar state of mind, feel inclined to work. And yet, about one-half of our patients perform some kind of labor, more or less useful. For plain work, the patients are ready and very efficient. One day this autumn the patients, with one hired man, dug, took off the tops, and put into the cart, four hundred and eighty bushels of carrots. Some are ingenious mechanics. Two have assisted the carpenters most of the season. One gentleman has made all the soft soap-three hundred and fifty barrels a year-and some of the bar soap, for five or six years. He has gathered the materials, made and distributed and attended to the economical use of it. No one can make better soap than he does. Two have made our baskets for years, and have supplied themselves in part with clothing. One female has made pantaloons and vests to supply the demand in our family. The females make the shirts and knit the stockings; they wash and mend; they cook, and they help about all our domestic affairs. The patients do considerable manual labor; but still, there are many idle ones. Some arrangements were contemplated early in the year to introduce whip lash braiding. That is an employment at which many could work, and about which no dangerous weapon need be used. The many alterations that were made in the wards interfered with that project for the time. It is the best employment I can think of to introduce among our patients in-doors.

On the first of January last, Thomas Hill, the Steward, retired from the services of the institution. He was judicious, correct and attentive to the duties of his office. Since then, Dr. Edward A. Smith has been Steward. He has opened the books, and has established the new system of keeping the accounts, as determined upon by your Board last year. By this system, the several items of expenditure are arranged under separate heads, and are placed in a permanent form, so that each class of expenses or the whole amount may be seen at a glance, from quarter to quarter and from year to year. The labor has been done with great accuracy and in a beautiful style.

My assistants, Drs. Bemis and Smith, have been very efficient. They have been ever ready to assist me in every way, and they have taken full charge of their departments. I do not see how the hospital could spare their services. They are skilful, kind and judicious; and they enter into the spirit of, and adopt whatever is new and valuable in the treatment and management of the insane.

To Miss Reid I am under great obligation. She has had ten years' experience in her present duties, and in providing for the wants of the household, and in her intercourse with our large family. She has rendered valuable service by her great discretion and judgment.

The Supervisors, Mr. and Mrs. Mirick, have identified themselves with the moral management of the insane here, through a service of seventeen years. They have always been very kind and attentive to the patients, and prudent and faithful to every duty.

Of the attendants and assistants, several have remained in the institution many years. They are of the most worthy and respectable class in society. Their duties are peculiar and arduous, although not often laborious. As long as their ambition to do well keeps up, and their patience holds out, the institution is glad to retain them. In conducting the affairs of this hospital sixty-one persons are now employed, which is about two to every eleven of its patients. This is a much larger force than is employed in most hospitals of this kind. Of these, ten men and eighteen women are devoted exclusively to the care of the patients, as attendants and nurses upon their wants, and stay by them day and night. The other persons employed all work with or associate with the patients daily.

Whatever may have been said against this hospital—and most of what has been said about its defects, has been so said as an excuse to make it still better—it has always afforded, and does now, with all the progress made in others, a residence as comfortable and as cheering, and as healthful to the patient, as any similar institution in this country.
