TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

To Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Sussex, assembled in Quarter Sessions, held at Lewes, in and for the Eastern Division of the said County, on Monday, the 2nd day of January, 1882, and at Petworth, in and for the Western Division of the said County on Thursday, the 5th day of January, 1882.

THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS of the Sussex County Asylum, appointed at the Epiphany Sessions, 1881—

Have the satisfaction of reporting very favourably of the general condition and management of the Asylum.

Few events deserving of record have occurred during the past year—a fact affording the best proof that the machinery of this great Institution is working efficiently in all its branches. The number of Patients in the Asylum at the date of this Report is as follows, viz.:—

These figures, although liable to some modification in the 14 days which remain of the present year, subsequently to the last Meeting of your Committee, point to the following conclusions:—

FIRSTLY—That the high standard of Admissions is fully maintained.

Secondly—That the Discharges are slightly in excess of last year.

THIRDLY.—That the Mortality has been lower than in any year since 1870.

It is also worthy of remark:

FIRSTLY—That there are 4 Males and 37 Females, or a total of 41 more in the Asylum at present than in the corresponding period of last year.

SECONDLY—That the pressure of Patients on the beds still vacant in the County Asylum continues.

There are at present only 16 vacant beds on the Male side, and 10 on the Female side, or a total of 26. There are also 31 Private Patients liable to removal after notice; but careful enquiries as to the circumstances of these Patients, point to the fact that if notice were sent to the relatives for their removal a considerable per centage of their number would be sent back to the Asylum as Pauper Patients, so that not more than one half of the beds thus vacated could be relied upon as available for Pauper Patients.

The necessity for making further provision for Lunatics in the County of Sussex cannot but be regarded with the deepest anxiety.

Your Committee have appointed a Sub-Committee to consider the best steps to be taken to meet the continual increase of Patients in the Asylum, and to report the result to the Committee, but as yet the Sub-Committee have not been able to make a final report.

It is plain, however, that the time has arrived when additional accommodation must be provided in some way or other for the great increase of Patients.

DR. WILLIAMS has been successful, in a few instances, in inducing the Boards of Guardians to retain their chronic and imbecile cases in their respective Workhouses. These, however, the Visitors are sorry to say, form but a small and diminishing proportion of the inmates to be provided for.

The returns of the Farm this year are as satisfactory as may be expected from the past season. The Garden

has been productive, and both Farm and Garden have supplied the labour and out-of-door employment so valuable to Lunatic Patients.

The Committee have completed the purchase of the five acres of land on the northern frontage of the Asylum, and of five cottages and two small pieces of land on the south-west of the Asylum grounds, such purchases being essential to the interests of the Asylum.

The Committee refer the Court to the annexed Report of Dr. Williams, the Medical Superintendent, who continues to discharge his duties with the same zeal and ability as heretofore.

The Staff have during the past year, given great satisfaction to the Committee, and the only change of importance in its numbers has been the appointment of Dr. M. L. Brown, M.B., and M.C., Edin., as Junior Assistant Medical Officer, vice Mr. Allen Maclean, resigned.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

Twenty-third Annual Report. The Medical Superintendent has the honour to submit the Twenty-third Annual Report to the Committee of Visitors.

Numbers on the 31st December, 1880, the Numbers in the 31st Dec., 1880. Asylum were—Male 349, Female 453. Total 802.

Admissions. The Admissions during the year have been—Male 102, Female 120. Total 222.

Discharges. The Discharges during the year have been—Male 59, Female 50. Total 109.

Deaths. The Deaths during the same period have been—Male 35, Female 34. Total 69.

Mean Annual Population. The Mean Population resident during the year has been—Male 360, Female 472. Mean Average 832.

Numbers this day, 31st Dec., 1881) are—Male 357, Female 489. Total 846.

Numerical Results of the year first Table in Appendix A to this Report.

The Numerical Results of the year 1881 yield the following percentages:—

Annual percentage for 1881.

(a) The Discharges (including the cases relieved) are 49.0 per cent. on the admissions of the year.

Excluding those cases relieved, the percentage of Recoveries on the admissions stands at—Male 41.1, Female 28.3. Average 35.5. On the mean number resident it is—Male 12.4, Female 7.1. Average 9.8.

(b) The Mean Annual Mortality on the total number Mean Annual under treatment is—Male 7.7, Female 5.9. Average Mortality.

The chief event of the year has been the large in- Increase in crease in the number of Patients, due not so much to any great excess of admissions over those of former years as to the small mortality, the death-rate being only 8.2, less than it has been in any year since the opening, the average per centage for the 22 years the Asylum has existed having been 11.2 per annum. It is not to be expected that so low a percentage will hold next year, and therefore this cause of the increase in numbers is so far exceptional; but though exceptional in this sense, it is none the less permanent, so far as filling up the beds in the Asylum is concerned.

There are 379 beds on the Males' side, and 500 on the Females', so that the vacant beds in the Asylum are 22 for Males, and 11 for Females. A few of the Private Patients have sufficient pecuniary means to allow them to be placed in other Asylums, but the great majority of them, if discharged, as the Committee have power to do, would drift back to the Asylum, through the Unions, as Pauper Lunatics.

It is therefore quite clear that this Asylum will shortly be full, and, as for reasons fully detailed in the Annual Report for 1880, any further enlargement of the present building is out of the question, it is evident that provision will have to be made elsewhere for the Pauper Lunatics of the County of Sussex—and that at no very distant date.

It is also evident that this increased accommodation will have to take the form of a New Asylum, complete in itself, with means and accommodation for treating all forms of insanity. It has been suggested that the new accommodation might take the shape of cheap blocks for chronic and harmless Lunatics, who might be kept at a less rate than those in the Asylum at present. But it is found that this is not practicable, because the wards designed for the treatment of acute cases in this Asylum are already quite full, and it is therefore as necessary to provide room for the treatment of acute cases as for the chronic Lunatics, idiots, and imbeciles. The reason for this is not far to seek. During the last twelve years it has been the policy of the Committee, on the recommendation of their Medical Officer, to endeavour to stave off the evil day, now arrived, as long as possible,

by discharging to the care of their friends, and to such Workhouses as would receive them, all the harmless imbeciles and dements, and their places have been filled up by acute and dangerous cases. So that the number of Patients now in this Asylum who would do for treatment in less expensive buildings, and under a less skilled, and therefore less expensive staff of officers, is very small, and probably does not exceed fifty. Unfortunately, these fifty cases belong either to Unions in which the Workhouses are not adapted for the receipt of even the most harmless Lunatics, or either have no friends at all, or, at all events, none able to take charge of them at their homes. Medical Superintendent ventures to point out the gravity of this matter, and the evil that will ensue if means are not taken at once to remedy it. There can be no doubt that this Asylum will have, within a measurable period of time, to refuse to admit any more cases, and if by then fresh accommodation has not been provided, acute cases, as they arise, will have to be retained in the Workhouses, where it will not be possible to treat them properly; or else they will have to be sent at a great expense, and at great inconvenience to the Patients and their relatives, to Private Asylums in the Metropolitan district, or elsewhere. Therefore, not only on the score of humanity, but also on that of economy, it is clear that this matter is not being mooted a day too soon.

The following statistics may be of interest in the consideration of this matter:—During the last decade the Male Patients in the Asylum have increased at the rate of 9.6 a year; the Females at the rate of 14.8. Total 24.4.

The total Pauper Lunatics chargeable to the poor rates of the County of Sussex have increased in the corresponding period at the rate of 5.8 Men a year, and 12.8 Women. Total 18.4. It is evident, therefore, from a comparison of these two sets of figures, that the relative increase in the numbers in the Asylum is greater than that in the County generally.

At the Census in 1871 the Lunatics per 1,000 of the population of the County were 2.49. In the last Census (1881) it was 2.69. This would seem to prove that, without doubt, Insanity, in the County of Sussex at least, is not at all on the increase, as the slight difference between the two periods is fully explained by the longer lives of Lunatics, owing to the increased care bestowed on them, and by the numbers who are now registered as Lunatics who would not have been so classed formerly.

Employment.

Recognising, as the Medical Superintendent does, how greatly the well-being of the Patients, their prospect of restoration to reason, their physical condition, and the quietness and good order of the House generally, depends on the employment of as many of them as possible, the same careful attention has been given as in former years to this subject, and, as heretofore, with satisfactory results. The nature of the employment has been varied as much as possible, and this experience seems to show to be very important. A town-bred artisan, such as a tailor, admitted in a low state of bodily health, if sent out daily for a little gentle employment in the garden generally becomes greatly improved physically, and concurrent with the physical improvement often comes gradual restoration to reason. So also a rustic, tending towards dementia, if put to

learn a trade often brightens up considerably; whereas if sent out to work in the Farm or Garden, employment that he had been used to from birth, would set to work at it, and perform it, mechanically, and it would have but little benefit on him. A great deal has been written lately on this subject in Scotland, and Scotch Asylums have been much lauded for the attention they have given to the subject, and the results they have obtained; and the persons so writing would seem to think that they have struck out quite a new mode of treatment. This, however, is a matter that has long been considered of primary importance in this and many other Asylums in England. whereas the chief mode of employment in Scotland seems to be the very crude one of emptying the wards out on to the Farm, in this Asylum each individual case is carefully studied, and the employment allotted to each case guided somewhat by the Patient's physical and mental condition. Of all employments, doubtless the most useful and beneficial to the majority of the Patients is work on the Farm and Garden, and in fine weather 100 Male Patients are regularly so employed in this Asylum; but that it can be possibly beneficial to town-bred artisans, and servants, and shopkeepers, to turn them out of doors in all weathers for many hours every day, nolens volens, does not appear to be likely.

It is stated in the Journal of Mental Science that in the Scotch Asylum where this system is most successfully carried out, 409 Patients out of 486 are employed, and apparently for the Men the chief employment is Agricultural, and for the Women, Laundry work. The Medical Superintendent has gone most

carefully into the matter as regards this Asylum, and finds that of the 846 cases in the Asylum on December 31st, 674 are habitually employed in some useful occupation, and that for the Males there are 16 varieties of employment, and for the Women six. Of the 357 men in the Asylum, on December 31st, all but 81 had been usefully employed during the year, and out of these 81, seventeen were sick, twenty-three were hopelessly demented, four were blind, three were nearly ninety years of age, and two were paralysed, leaving twenty-four who could not be induced to employ themselves, or were too violent to be allowed to do so. Further details will be found in Table XI, in Appendix.

Thus it will be seen that, taking into consideration the much larger number of Patients with Organic Brain Disease and Epilepsy, of Idiots and Imbeciles, in the Southern Asylums over those in Scotland, this Asylum does not compare unfavourably with the Scotch Asylums in the matter of the employment of the Patients, and the Medical Superintendent believes he is correct in stating that the varieties of employment are much more numerous.

Coroner's Inquest. A Coroner's Inquest was held on the case of J. B., a chronic dement, who had swallowed some pebbles, which passed into an old hernia, caused obstruction, peritonitis, and death. The Jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence, as there could have been no suicidal intent.

Deaths.

The only other death that calls for special notice is that of S. P., a female aged 55 years, who was admitted from the Ticehurst Union with a severe self-inflicted wound in the throat. She was in a state of

great exhaustion, due partly to the wound, and partly to the extreme melancholia from which she was suffering. She never rallied, but gradually became weaker, and died on the twelfth day after admission. Fourteen of the deaths are due to Progressive Paralysis of the Insane, and of them seven occurred in Females, an unusually large proportion, as this disease is comparatively rare in Females; indeed, in some Asylum reports it is hardly ever found stated as a cause of death in that sex. Sussex, for some unknown reason, appears to be rather exceptional in this particular.

Thirty-six post-morten examinations have been held Post-morten Examinations. during the past year. These are much fewer than they ought to be. It is fully recognised by the Medical Staff how important, from all points of view, such examinations are, being, as they undoubtedly are, a safe-guard to the Patients against undetected ill-usage, and an aid to the Medical Officers in their treatment. Every endeavour is therefore used to induce the relatives of the Patients to agree to them, but there is such a great objection in this county amongst the poor to what they consider this desecration of the dead, that even in the cases where post-mortem examinations have been made, consent has only been obtained with great difficulty.

Seven Male Patients escaped beyond the grounds Escapes. during the year, one on two occasions, but were all re-taken and brought back to the Asylum, most of them within a few hours. Considering that during the summer as many as 100 Patients were often out working in the grounds at one time, the Medical

Superintendent thinks this number of escapes not excessive. There was no escape on the Female side.

Accidents.

The year has been happily free from any serious accident, and beyond a certain number of bruises and black eyes, the only casualty calling for record was a fracture of the radius in a quiet patient, who slipped up and fell by accident.

Commissioners in Lunacy. The Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum on the 6th and 7th of June, and left a very flattering report, which is published in full in the Appendix.

Conclusion.

The only change in the Officers has been the resignation of Mr. Allan Maclean, Junior Assistant Medical Officer, and the appointment of Dr. M. L. Brown in his stead. Dr. Brown entered on his duties on August 24th, but having subsequently been appointed on the Staff of the Colney Hatch Asylum, sent in his resignation on December 22nd, and the vacancy is not yet filled up. There has been the usual change amongst some of the junior members of the general staff, but it has not been above the average, whilst the senior members are much as they were a year ago. Medical Superintendent again tenders his thanks to Dr. Worthington and the other Officers for the ready assistance they have invariably afforded him in the management, both medical and otherwise, of the Asylum.

Fifty Burials have taken place during the year.

Burials.

The Savings Bank is a great success, and has Savings Bank. proved of much value to many of the depositors, especially in some cases of sudden misfortune.

The Chaplain desires to thank all the staff for their Conclusion. assistance and support in the various duties of his office.

METEOROLOGICAL REPORT.

With the exception of the great fall of snow which took place January 17th to 20th inclusive, there has been nothing calling for special remark during the past year.

The total rainfall of the year amounted to 28.45 inches. The number of wet days was 172.

The least monthly rainfall, viz., o.76, occurred in April, differing, however, but very slightly from the rainfall for May, which was o.80. These were, of course, the two dry months of the year.

The largest amount of rain in any twenty-four hours fell on October 22nd, on which day exactly one inch of rain fell here.

The greatest heat in the sun, viz., 158.7°, was registered on June 26th. The greatest cold was recorded on January 22nd and 23rd, on each of which days the Thermometer, 4ft. above ground, went down to 8.0° Fahrenheit.

REPORT OF THE

VISITING COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Sussex County Asylum,

Haywards Heath,

Fune 7th, 1881.

We have to-day finished our statutory inspection of this Asylum, last visited by Members of our Board on the 22nd May, 1880, and we can, with perfect truth, echo the laudatory remarks made on that visit. The Establishment is in excellent order, and the Wards exhibit strict cleanliness, much comfort, and sufficient attention to cheerful decoration. The Medical Superintendent took possession of his new house in January, and the Wards obtained by conversion of his apartments in the main building have been occupied since September by 30 convalescent Pauper and quiet harmless Private Patients. The house is satisfactory, and the new Wards are an admirable addition to the Asylum. A work in progress is an enlargement of the Female Dining Hall, so as to seat about 100 more women. The Patients on the books are to-day 825, of whom 358 are Males; 467 are Females. These figures include 32 Private cases received at low rates, nearly all from

Sussex, and most of whom would be forced to return as Paupers if discharged as Private Patients; also 67 Paupers from Non-contributing Boroughs, some of whom only could be taken into Asylums as convenient for them as this is. We observe that the Committee in their Annual Report, dated 31st December, 1880, look forward to the necessity for further provision at no distant date for the Lunatics here admitted. This is proper, but there are contingencies which may postpone that necessity. We agree with them that such provision should be made elsewhere than in this Asylum. At the request of Dr. Williams we looked at a plot of land, five acres or thereabouts, in front of the Asylum, and across the high road, which is, we understand, now for sale. We think that no one viewing the land could doubt the desirability of its purchase by the Committee; if not bought by them now, we believe that, later, they will be compelled to purchase at an enhanced price, in order to protect themselves from a nuisance to the Patients. The Admissions since the Commissioners' last visit have been 251, the Discharges 152, the Deaths 79. The chief causes of death have been, as usual, Brain Disease, General Paralysis, Epilepsy, and Diseases of the Heart and Lungs. There has been no suicide or fracture of a fatal kind, and Coroner's Inquests have been two only; the verdicts were respectively "Congestion of Brain and Lungs" and "Peritonitis, with Obstruction of the Bowels by swallowing stones." Both these cases were sometime back communicated to our Board, and call for no comment here. The Recoveries have been 88, out of 152 Discharges. We, however, notice that in 1880 there were 44 Re-Admissions. That fact does not, of course, show that discharges were premature; how long

it was ere relapses occurred is a very pertinent question. During the interval between 22nd May, 13 Patients have been sent out to Workhouses; of these one only has been returned. One only also has been sent back out of 27 discharged to care of friends. The Female General Paralytics here are 6, as against 11 Males. The latest register in the Asylum Books informs us that the Epileptics are 45 in the Male, 43 in the Female department. Eight men and four women appear to be actively suicidal. We saw all the Patients, save three women absent on leave. Their conduct, under inspection, was quiet and orderly, dress very satisfactory, and personal cleanliness remarkably so. Bathing in this Asylum is twice weekly. A very small number of each sex were in bed; the night supervision is good. In the Epileptic and Suicidal Dormitories, each Dormitory has two Night Attendants. Dr. Williams considers that it would not be safe to have attendants sitting up alone there. Each Infirmary has also a Night Attendant, and there is a general Night Attendant besides for each division. The staff in personal charge of the Patients is, we think, numerically sufficient both by day and night. The Attendants and Nurses seem to be well paid, well cared for, and judiciously selected. The result is what might be expected, viz.:-that they keep their situations longer than elsewhere; and of them we heard no complaint which even sounded plausible. the Women's side two Nurses are boarded by the Committee, and paid for by a benevolent lady, to train them for attendance on Private mental cases elsewhere. We are glad to see that pensions to Incapacitated Attendants are granted by the Committee. It is most superfluous to say that the Patients' welfare must largely depend in every Asylum upon the character and conduct of the Attendants, and that frequent changes in any staff must increase the difficulties of Asylum management, and must be mischievous to the Patients. Wet Packing has been resorted to here in the cases of six men and four women, the former on 28 occasions, for 103 hours in the aggregate. The latter on 27 occasions, for 82 hours. No Wet Packing has been prolonged beyond four hours, and generally it has been for a much shorter time. One of the women so treated has also been Dry Packed nine times, altogether for 36 hours; once only so long as six hours. There has been no other restraint of a mechanical kind. As to Seclusion, two of each sex have been each once so treated, never longer than seven hours. At the present time nine men and as many women are registered in the Medical Journal as taking medicine. Those taking sedatives at night are not included in the cases registered in the Journal, but in the Case Books. There are, however, 41 Males and 74 Females taking medicine for functional derangements. The total number of men employed is 246; the women thus made useful are 335. Dr. Williams considers that the out-door employment of the men is a great aid to their recovery, and the Farm of 247 acres is worked at a considerable profit. Seventy-four Females assist in the Kitchen and Vegetable Room. The Shops attract many Patients, and they turn out much valuable work. By the Males much has been done lately in re-decorating, painting, and cleaning the interior of the Asylum, and the furniture for the New Wards was all made by Patients here. Yesterday we saw 10 Male Patients in the Shoemaker's Shop, 13 with the Tailor. There has been no change in the Dietary. The dinners were yesterday seen by us in each Dining Hall; such of the food as we tasted could not be properly objected to. Amusements and exercise are organised as heretofore; there is much variety in the former. The Airing Courts are kept in excellent order, and the views from the same are, at this time of the year, most beautiful. Weather did not permit us to visit the Farm, but we inspected the detached Hospital. There are now 10 Male ordinary Patients occupying it, as it is not just now required for its chief purpose. The Mortuary would be improved by shelves, curtains, and the introduction of a few chairs, but this is a detail to which we are sure Dr. Williams will give attention without any pressure on our part. The whole establishment is indeed in a high state of order, and we can only end, as we begun, our Report by praising those concerned in bringing the Asylum to its present condition.
