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

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ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

To Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Sussex, assembled in Quarter Sessions, held at Lewes, in and for the Eastern Division of the said County, on Monday, the third day of January, 1870; and at Petworth, in and for the Western Division of the said County, on Thursday, the sixth day of January, 1870.

The Committee of Visitors of the Sussex County Lunatic Satisfactory con-Asylum, appointed at the Epiphany Sessions, 1869, have the Asylum. satisfaction of reporting, as heretofore, very favorably of the general condition and management of the Asylum. They refer the Court to the annexed report of the Medical Superintendent and to the statistical tables appended thereto for information as to the details of the year's history.

The steady annual increase in the numbers of the pauper Continued inlunatics chargeable to the County, to which in their tenth crease of lunatics. annual report the Committee directed the attention of the Court, still continues.

It may probably be in the recollection of the Court that Former enlargethe Asylum was originally constructed for 400 patients in Asylum.

equal numbers. On the opening in 1859, by a change in the
distribution of the wards, Dr. Robertson arranged the
numbers at 225 of each sex. In 1862 the overcrowded

state of the female wards compelled the then Committee of Visitors to obtain authority to enlarge the Asylum for the accommodation of 100 additional female patients, and in June, 1864, the works were completed. By a re-arrangement of the classification, the accommodation on the female side was increased to 340 beds.

In 1866 it became necessary to enlarge the Asylum for the reception of additional male patients, and 145 more beds were obtained, making the total for males 370.

The beds on the male side have only been gradually occupied by county patients, but there are in the Asylum, as was reported last year by the Committee, 60 male patients from the Hanwell Asylum, under contract.

Want of room in the Female Wing.

On the female side, however, the beds have filled so rapidly that, out of 340 there are but 8 now vacant, and the construction of the Asylum is such as entirely to prevent the appropriation of any part of the Male Wing to the use of female patients.

Specially of single rooms.

The Medical Superintendent has also strongly pressed on the Committee the want of sufficient single rooms for the sleeping accommodation of the restless patients.

Proposed new block building. The Committee, after a careful consideration of the whole question, feel compelled to submit to the Court that a further increase of accommodation for female patients is urgently needed, and they recommend that a block containing 50 single rooms, with the necessary rooms for nurses and for the reception of stores, &c., should be built, and that a day-room should be added to the laundry for 50 patients.

By such an arrangement the increased accommodation, so much required, will be obtained, and the requirements for single rooms will also be met.

The Committee have had plans of the proposed building Plans. and alterations prepared, as also an estimate of the probable expense, which amounts to about £3,600.

The plans and estimate have been submitted through the Approval of Secretary of State Commissioners in Lunacy to the Home Secretary, whose formal approval has not yet been obtained, but the Committee are assured by the Commissioners that his assent will be given within about a week from the 3rd of January, and the Committee trust that this Court may be adjourned until the 18th of January, that the plans and estimates may then be submitted for its approbation also.

The Committee have great pleasure in stating that for the Method of defraypurposes of the proposed new works it will not be necessary ing the cost. to ask for any pecuniary aid from the county rates, as it is proposed, with the sanction of the Court, to apply from the building fund accumulating under the provisions of the 25 and 26 Vic., c. 111, s. 6, the sum required for defraying the whole cost. The Committee feel confident that by a continued careful administration of the funds of the Asylum the profits accruing yearly from the out-county and non-contributing boroughs will enable them again to augment this fund, the balance of which is required to carry on the current payments of the establishment.

The Committee have to record the retirement in October Retirement of the of their Chairman, Edward Smith Bigg, Esq., who had filled Chairman. that office since 1859, to the great credit and advantage of

Election of his successor.

the Asylum. The Committee venture to record their sense of the loss which the Asylum sustains in the withdrawal of Mr. Bigg from the active control and management of its affairs. They elected James Henry Sclater, Esq. to succeed Mr. Bigg in the chair.

Retirement of the Head Attendant (Male Department).

The Committee have to report the retirement of the head attendant of the male department, Mr. R. W. Knox, who, in consequence of serious ill health, resigned his office in September. The Committee recommended him to the Court at the Michaelmas Quarter Sessions for a pension of £80, being two-thirds of his salary and allowances, under the provisions of the 16 and 17 Vict., c. 97, s. 57, and of the 25 and 26 Vict., c. 111, s. 12 and 13. They desire here to record their sense of the zeal and ability shown by Mr. Knox in the performance of his duties since the opening of the Asylum in 1859, and they much regret the circumstances of his retirement.

General Conduct of the House.

The Committee have pleasure in reporting that the conduct of the officers and servants has continued good during the year.

The Farm.

The employment of many of the male patients upon the farm has tended to maintain them in good bodily health, and the Committee have the satisfaction of reporting that the farm during the year has yielded a considerable profit.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Medical Superintendent has the honour to submit his Eleventh Annual Eleventh Annual Report to the Committee of Visitors.

On the 31st December, 1868, the numbers in the Asylum Numbers on the were 322 Male, 325 Female. Total 647.

The admissions during the year have been, Male 60, Admissions. Female 68. Total 128.

The discharges during the year have been, Male 29, Discharges. Female 32. Total 61.

The deaths during the same period have been, Male 35, Deaths. Female 29. Total 64.

The mean population resident during the year has been, Mean Annual Male 320, Female 333. Mean Average 653.

The numbers in the Asylum this day (31st December, Numbers thisday, 1869) are Male 318, Female 332. Total 650.

The several numerical results are summed up in the first Numerical results of the year.

Table in the Appendix to this Report.

The Numerical Results of the year 1869 yield the follow-Annual per centages ing per centages:—

(a.) The Discharges (including the cases Relieved) are 43.7 per cent. on the admissions of the year. Excluding those cases Relieved, the per centage of Recoveries stands at Male 35.0, Female 36.7. Average 36.0.

Mean Annual Mortality. (b.) The mean Annual Mortality is Male 10.9, Female 8.7. Average 9.8.

Asylum Statistics

The Tables of the Medico-Psychological Association have been again this year introduced as an appendix to this report. These tables are now being generally adopted by the English County Asylums, and promise thus in the course of years to furnish a valuable collection of statistics relative to the Insane Poor of England.

Sanitarycondition of the Asylum.

The Sanitary condition of the Asylum throughout the year has been good.

Inquests.

Two inquests have been held during the year.

I. James Emery was found dead in bed on the morning of the 28th of June. A post-mortem examination showed that a large aneurism of the aorta had burst, causing instantaneous death. A verdict was given accordingly.

II. Mary Ann Coussins committed suicide by hanging on the 22nd December. She went out at 2.30 p.m. with the other patients on to the terrace. She did not return with them, and was not missed until 5.30 p.m., when she was found hanging to a beam in the pea fowls' house on the terrace. She was then quite dead, and all attempts at inducing respiration failed.

A coroner's inquest was held on the 23rd December, and the verdict of the jury was"That Mary Ann Coussins committed suicide by hanging, and we think from the evidence of Dr. Williams that had the nurse attended to her duties to count the patients when returning her life might have been spared; and we further think the position of the pea fowls' house suggested the temptation to her mind."

The nurse who is thus censured was doubtless much to blame; but as she has been here many years, and has always conducted herself extremely well, the Medical Superintendent thinks that he met the demands of the case by fining her £2, and stopping her leave for a month.

The pea fowls' house was at once taken down, and an order was issued to each nurse, attendant, and servant to exercise increased vigilance, and to take greater care in counting the patients in going out and coming in.

On the 23rd May, W. B., a male patient chargeable to Escapes. Brighton, escaped from the walking party, and although traced to London he contrived, with the aid of his friends, to evade being retaken.

On the 30th of June E. J. made his escape between the hours of 2 a.m. and 4 a.m. in the most ingenious manner, and notwithstanding the vigilance of the county police no trace of him has been found. He was sent to the Asylum from Lewes Prison.

On the 31st August F. R. escaped from the working party on the farm. He was retaken by the county police on the 8th of September.

The tenth commemoration of the opening of the Asylum Commemoration Day, 1869.

was held on the 25th July. The annual sermon was preached by the Rev. William Powell, M.A., Oxon., Rector of Newick.

In the afternoon Mr. Basil Young gave his yearly enterment. The weather was most favourable.

Patients' Amusements.

The other recreations have been continued as usual, including the weekly winter balls, occasional entertainments by strolling players, the Christmas celebrations, picnics to Ditchling Common, excursion parties to Brighton and the Crystal Palace, and what perhaps is most valued by the greatest number of the patients, the Sunday walking parties of about a hundred of each sex into the country.

Retirement of the

Grant of a pension to Mr. W. R.

Knox.

Head Attendant Mr. W. R. Knox. retirement, through serious ill-health, of the head attendant Mr. W. R. Knox, an officer who, from his appointment at the opening of the Asylum in 1859, has contributed much by his ability and diligence to such success as has attended the work in the male department. The Medical Superintendent would here express his sense of the liberal recognition made by the Visitors of Mr. Knox's services in their recommendation to the Michaelmas Sessions that a pension of £80 a year—being two-thirds of his salary and allowances—be granted to him under the provisions of the pension clauses of the lunacy acts. Such liberality will, he believes, act as a stimulus to others to follow Mr. Knox's single-minded devotion to his duty. (See Note at end of this Report).

Death of the

Engineer.

The house has also sustained another loss during the year in the death of George Grist, the engineer, on the 29th of July. He was appointed in 1860.

The appointment in May of Dr. Newth, as a qualified Appointment of apothecary, has contributed to lessen the heavy work which the yearly increasing number of patients throws on the Medical Superintendent and the Assistant Medical Officer.

They both venture to assure the Visitors that they shall endeavour to acknowledge the consideration thus shown to them in renewed efforts to fulfil the varied duties of their office.

Note.—Mr. Knox died at Forest Hill on the 18th January, aged fifty-two. A memoir *In Memoriam*, written for private circulation by the Rev. Henry Hawkins, concludes with the following well-deserved words of praise:—

[&]quot;Long will it be before that portly form, dressed with soldier-like neatness—that fair open, honest countenance—that voice, with its familiar northern accent, are quite forgotten in that Asylum in which he so long worked. Taking his rounds through the Wards—sitting in conversation by some patient's side—in his room surrounded with the various appliances for the patients' comfort—leading the summer pic-nic party along the Wivelsfield Road—or seated, near the camp fire, on the grass on Ditchling Common—regulating the Wednesday amusements in the Recreation Room—superintending the patients' meals in the beautiful Dining Hall—conspicuous in the lower field on the July Commemoration Day—in many places, where Now his place will know him no more, his presence will rise up before the mind's eye.

[&]quot;After a visitation of severe suffering, he has, we trust, entered into rest. The county has lost a valuable servant—his official superiors a subordinate in whom entire reliance could be reposed—his fellow workers an honest, intelligent colleague—the attendants a just and sympathising overseer—the patients a kind-hearted friend.

[&]quot;Sincere regard for his memory, the result of many years association with him in labours, has led the writer of the above lines to pay this simple tribute for remembrance." He administered to Mr Knox, in his last illness, the Holy Communion, at his own request, in company with his devoted wife; and he read the Order for the Burial of the Dead at his funeral at Christ Church, Forest Hill.

Sussex Lunatic Asylum,
Haywards Heath, January 29, 1870.

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

The Lord Chancellor having been pleased, on the 13th inst., to appoint me to the office of Visitor in Lunacy, vacant by the death of Sir Charles Hood, I respectfully beg leave to resign into your hands the trust which since 1858 (a year previous to the opening of the Asylum) has by your Board been confided to me.

Knowing as I do that the Haywards Heath Asylum stands second to none, in the estimation of the Commissioners in Lunacy, and of the medical profession, both at home and abroad, I may on this occasion say that already the work which I began here has in my hands greatly prospered. Still more fully am I aware, and most explicitly would I record, how

entirely this success is due to the unvarying support which I have received from the Visitors, whose generous confidence has indeed transmuted my anxious efforts into assured success.

I deeply feel this parting with you. I never can forget the courtesy—I may almost venture to say the friendship—which has, without exception, been extended to me by the Justices during the twelve years I have been a servant of the County of Sussex. Conscious of many shortcomings, I may yet say to you to-day, that I have always earnestly striven to show myself worthy of your great favour.

The week-day service in the chapel at 8.35 a.m. has been week Day Serdiscontinued; in its place has been substituted a short service in each of the dining halls directly after the patients' breakfast. In this way many patients, attendants, and nurses are present who could not possibly have joined in the service in the Chapel. This arrangement is also unaffected by the weather.

Burials.

The Commemoration was kept on Saturday, July 24th. Commemoration The sermon was preached by the Rev. W. Powell, M.A., Rector of Newick, the lessons were read by the Rev. R. Wyatt, M.A., incumbent of S. Wilfrid's. The choir was led by Mr. White, of Cuckfield.

The classes have been continued this year as usual, except-classes.

Library.

The Library is renewed from time to time by purchases from some of the great London libraries, and forms a source of constant enjoyment and refreshment to many of the household.

Visits to Wards, &c.

The wards, workshops, and infirmaries have been regularly visited on the prescribed days and the required hours, besides on such other occasions as have seemed desirable.

Choir.

The Choir improved considerably, under the instruction of Mr. White for a short time in the spring

Absence of Chaplain. During the Chaplain's absence on leave in December, the services on Sunday have been taken by the Clergy of St. John's School, Hurst.

Conclusion.

The Chaplain desires to express his thanks for the cordial support he has received from the Medical Superintendent and the whole staff in the discharge of his duties.

METEOROLOGICAL REPORT.

The past year has been somewhere and by somebody styled "The year of heat," not as a year remarkable for extremely high temperature, but as one of unusually high mean temperature. It will be seen from the accompanying table that the mean heat of the year last past at this place was not so high as for the previous year; and that, while July, though drier than any month in 1868, was not so hot as the former July, March and December were colder than any months in that year.

January and February were marked by very mild, damp weather. By the beginning of March all the wall-fruit trees were in full bloom. On the morning of the 8th of that month the thermometer on the grass sank to 16°, and the blossom was entirely destroyed.

May was the wettest month of the year, no less than 4.32 inches of rain having fallen in that month. The whole rainfall of the year amounted to 30.61 inches, against 27.78 inches in 1868.

The greatest fall in the twenty-four hours occurred on October 18th, amounting to 1.23 inches.

The table of observations corresponds with that of last year in its arrangement for purposes of comparison.

REPORT BY THE VISITING COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Sussex Lunatic Asylum,

Haywards Heath,

16th and 17th June, 1869.

Our inspection of this Asylum has occupied two days, in the course of which we have seen and examined every patient, and have visited all the wards and offices. There are now 649 patients on the books, of whom 322 are men and 327 are women. Three of the former and one of the latter are away on trial. These numbers leave 48 vacant beds in the male and 13 in the female division.

Since our colleagues' visit a year ago, 123 males and 61 women have been admitted. Amongst the former are included 60 patients removed from Hanwell, whom the Committee have consented to receive on the understanding that they have the power to determine the arrangement at any time. Of the patients discharged 18 were men and 31 women, of whom 10 men and 27 women were recovered. There have been 63 deaths, 35 in the male and 28 in the female division, the principal causes being diseases of the heart and brain, phthisis, senile decay, dropsy, &c. On the bodies of two female patients inquests were held, the verdict in both instances being death from natural causes. As to the case of Ellen Hood, however, who died after being

packed in the wet sheet, on the day of her admission, for the relief of acute maniacal symptoms, some correspondence ensued between Dr. Robertson and our Board. No blame was attached to the Medical Officer by the jury, who found that the patient died from disease of the heart and lungs; but the case was one strongly illustrating the importance of ascertaining with the utmost certainty that the heart and lungs are quite free from disease before resorting to such a remedy as the wet sheet, and the communication from our Board contained some suggestions for the avoidance of such accidents in future. The present sanitary state of the Asylum is satisfactory, and only 7 male and 9 female patients are under medical treatment. Very few were in bed during our visits.

We have again a most favourable report to make of the condition in which we found all the wards and the establishment generally. In addition to the cleanliness which everywhere prevailed, there was an amount of attention given to comfort and cheerfulness which had evidently the best effect on the conduct and demeanour of the patients, who were wonderfully free from excitement even in the wards where the more unfavourable classes were placed. We saw no special dresses in either division, and all the clothing was clean and good. The patients, who continue to be bathed, and also have exchange of body linen twice a week, were personally in a very satisfactory condition.

A woman apt to become excited at the sight of strangers was placed in a single room as we passed through her ward, but this was the only case of seclusion on either of the days of our visit. A careful record is kept of every instance of

this kind, the total amount of which, considering the number of recent cases admitted, is not large. Restraint is never employed.

At our two visits we saw about 300 of each sex assembled in their respective dining halls. Yesterday the dinner appeared to give general satisfaction. To-day in the male division, when the food consisted of what in the dietary is called Irish stew, but which more resembles soup thickened with rice, we heard many complaints, and much of it remained uneaten.

We are strongly of opinion that meat in a solid form should be substituted at least on one of the three days when soup or stew is now given.

The weekly allowance of meat to each patient appears to be sufficient. We press the matter somewhat urgently, because it was the only subject on which we had any complaints.

The arrangements for useful occupation remain as before reported. There are 60 men who work on the land and 50 in the workshops, and about 60 others find employment in the wards and offices. Of the women fifty are regularly engaged in the washhouse and laundry, 70 assist in the kitchen, dining halls, sculleries, and household work, and 100 work at their needle.

The patients' recreations are well attended to, and the weekly balls, somewhat restricted for want of a larger room, but at which 150 are usually present, have been continued during the winter. Other entertainments have also been given, and on the 25th July the yearly fête was held as usual. Besides eight picnics to a neighbouring common, attended by

about 100 patients of each sex, a large proportion are taken beyond the Asylum precincts for extended walks in the country.

In the wards, too, there is a very liberal provision of books, periodicals, and games, and we were particularly struck with the profusion of flowers which were distributed in all the day rooms and galleries. The Chaplain, besides conducting the usual services in the chapel, devotes himself to giving regular instruction in writing, geography, and arithmetic, holding a class twice a week in each division. The present attendance does not average more than 14 of each sex; but we trust it will be found practicable to increase these numbers.

The attendants are in the proportion of 1 to 13 patients in the male, and 1 to 14 in the female division. There are two night nurses for the women, but only one for the men. Considering the present large numbers on this side of the house, we strongly recommend the appointment of a second without delay.

We notice various improvements since the last visit. The suggestion then made to enlarge the sculleries and attendants' dining rooms in connection with the new halls has been carried out. The new dormitories on the male side have been papered, and a similar improvement will be carried out in the women's wards. Ward No. 3 on this side has been newly papered and painted, and the old iron windows replaced with wooden sashes of improved construction, and affording ample means for ventilation. We observe that in their report to the Quarter Sessions for January, 1869, the Justices refer to the continual increase in the number of female patients, and to the probable want of farther accommodation within a limited period. Dr. Robertson has pointed out to us a site

on which he thinks it would be desirable to build should an enlargement be decided on, and we see no objection to its use for this purpose.

As there is a great want of single rooms on the women's side we have suggested that the corridor of communication which will be required should be so built as to have rooms of this description on one side. Any increase in the numbers will, however, we fear, render necessary an extension of the laundry.

For the men, some increase in day room space seems to be wanted, and this might probably be best obtained by the construction of a third storey over the workshops; better means of classification would also be secured by this means. We have made enquiry as to the disposal of the sewage, and find that the whole of it continues to be most successfully and profitably distributed by irrigation over the land, and that no inconvenience has been experienced from the absence of separate channels for conducting away the storm water, the whole of which, as well from the airing courts as from the roof (excepting of two blocks collected for use in the laundry), flows through the main drain on to the farm. Less than six acres, cropped with Italian rye grass, suffice to clarify and absorb the entire quantity of sewage.

The very excellent condition and management of this Asylum continues to reflect the highest credit upon Dr. Robertson, who, we are glad to find, has recently received additional assistance by the appointment of an apothecary and dispenser.
