# SUSSEX COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM, HAYWARDS' HEATH.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS, 1861.

TO HER MAJESTY'S JUSTICES OF THE PEACE for the County of Sussex, Assembled in Quarter Sessions, held at Lewes, in and for the Eastern Division of the said County, on Monday, the 30th Day of December, 1861, and at Petworth, in and for the Western Division of the said County, on Thursday the 2nd. Day of January, 1862.

THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS of the SUSSEX
PAUPER LUNATIC ASYLUM, appointed at
the Epiphany Sessions, 1861, REPORT

That during the past Year the Improvements in the Building and Fittings of the Asylum have steadily progressed, and the Visitors trust that the Defects mentioned in the last Annual Report will be removed, and all the Alterations completed with the Funds already intrusted to them for that purpose.

The New Works have been found to answer in a very satisfactory manner, and have much improved the working of the Asylum.

The Report of the Medical Superintendent which is transmitted with this Report will show the Numbers of the Patients admitted during the Year, with the numbers of the Discharges, Cures, and Deaths.

At the date of the last Annual Report there were 399 Patients, namely, 172 Males and 227 Females; of these 357 were Patients belonging to the County and the Parishes within it, and 42 were Patients belonging to the County of Kent and Private Patients.

As the number of Patients from our own County continued to increase, the Visitors thought it best to have the Kent Patients removed; and there are now 459 Patients in the Asylum,—228 Males, and 231 Females,—and little accommodation for any addition to that number.

The large increase in the number of Male Patients over the number mentioned in the last Report, notwithstanding the removal of the Kent and other Patients, is mainly occasioned by the admission of 40 Sailors and Marines who were Inmates of Haslar Hospital. The Government Authorities having sent a Medical Officer to inspect our Asylum, and being satisfied with the care and conduct of the Establishment, made a request to the Visitors that they should be permitted to send this number to the Asylum, to which request the Visitors thought it right to accede.

The general state and condition of the Asylum are very good, and it is gratifying to have to report that the Commissioners in Lunacy, at their last visit to the Asylum, stated in writing—

"That the Sanitary Condition of the Asylum was good, and they had satisfaction in reporting most favourably of the state of the Asylum as to Cleanliness and Good Order; and the creditable condition of the several Wards, Beds, and Bedding, and the general condition and management of the Asylum, were very satisfactory."

They reported also favourably of the several Improvements effected since the last Annual Report to which we have already adverted.

The Commissioners pressed upon the attention of the Visitors several Alterations and Improvements, some of which have since been effected; but others, which would be attended with considerable expense, have not been undertaken by the Visitors.

The Visitors feel that the general improvement and good state of the Asylum reflect great credit on the Superintendent, Dr. Lockhart Robertson, who has had the care of the establishment since its commencement; and they have felt it right to mark their sense of his merits by an addition of £100 per annum to his former remuneration of £450, which the Visitors found to be below that given in other Asylums.

We have been enabled during the past year to make a further reduction in the Weekly Cost of Maintenance, which is now 10s. 3d. per head; and we trust there will be no necessity for an increased charge. Looking at the charge generally paid by the Parishes before the erection of the Asylum, of 14s. per head, it will be seen that a very considerable saving to the Parishes in the County has been effected.

The Water Supply continues most ample, and the Engines and Pumps for raising and distributing it have never failed. We have thought it right to purchase a Fire Engine of the best construction for the use of the Asylum, and intend to affix a simple apparatus for applying water in the several Wards in case of Fire, which our Water Tanks already put up will enable us to do at a small cost.

The new Farm Buildings have been completed, and the Farm and Garden much improved in condition, and now yield considerable supplies. (A Report on the Farm Accompanies this.)

The Visitors lay before the Court the Chaplain's Report which accompanies this, and will be read with interest.

Your Committee have also the pleasure of reporting that the conduct of the Officers of the Establishment has been generally good, and the care and attention to the Patients satisfactory.

By the 62nd section of the Act 16 & 17 Victoria, c. 97, the Visitors are bound to lay before the Court of Quarter Sessions, to be holden next after the 20th December in every year, a Report in writing of the state and condition of the Asylum, as to the management of the Asylum, and the conduct of the Officers and Servants thereof, and the care of the Patients therein. Upon these points the present Report will be found all satisfactory. The Visitors are also bound by the same section of the Act to report "as to the sufficiency of the Asylum for the proper accommodation of the number of Lunatics for whom it may be necessary to provide accommo-

dation." On this point the Visitors call the attention of the Court to the continued increase of the Female Patients, which has been uniform from the commencement. In December, 1859, there were 150; in December, 1860, there were 227; in December, 1861, there were 231. At the present time there is only one bed on the Female side unoccupied. Under these circumstances your Committee, in compliance with the Act of Parliament, feel bound to report that the Asylum is not sufficient for the accommodation of the Female Lunatics for whom it may be necessary to provide.

#### REPORT

OF THE

#### FARM COMMITTEE.

THE Farm Committee are happy again to report considerable improvement in the condition of the Farm during the past year. The crops, on the whole, have been good, and the Profit on the Farm, after paying rent and taxes, amounts to £176 19s. 1d. The substitution of Lunatic for paid labour on the farm has been attended with complete success; out of an average number of Patients of 30 to 40 so employed, some have proved efficient labourers, and all have derived benefit from healthy labour in the open air.

The application of sewage to the land on a plan recommended by Mr. Mechi has been tried on an area of eleven acres; and the Committee hope that the system may eventually be applied with profit to the whole Farm.

# THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

THE Medical Superintendent has the honour to submit his Annual Report to the Committee of Visitors.

Third Annual Report.

On the 25th December, 1860, the numbers in the Asylum Numbers on the 25th Dec., 1860.

Were 172 Male, 227 Female; Total 399.

The Admissions during the year have been 102 Male, 64 Admissions. Female; Total 166.

The Discharges during the year have been 20 Male, 41 Discharges. Female; Total 61.

The Deaths during the same period have been 26 Male, Deaths. 19 Female; Total 45.

The Mean Population resident during the year has been Mean Annual 192.81 Male, 2.6.82 Female; Total 419.63. Population.

The numbers in the Asylum to-day (December 25, 1861) Numbers this Day are 228 Male, 231 Female; Total 459.

These several numerical facts are summed up in the first Numerical Results of Table in the Appendix to this Report. A similar statement the Year, and also of the total numerical results since the opening of the Asylum of the Asylum.

will be found in Table II.

Annual Per Centages. The numerical results of the year 1861 yield the following percentages:—

a. The Recoveries (including the four cases discharged relieved) are 19.8 per cent. on the admissions of the year. Excluding those four cases relieved, the percentage of recoveries stands at 17.4.

b. The mean annual mortality is 6.2 Male, 4.5 Female; Total 10.7.

Remarks on these Results (Discharges)

The percentage of recoveries this year is a good illustration of the fallacy of comparing the numerical results of an Asylum irrespective of the special circumstances controlling these results. Forty chronic cases were this year admitted from Haslar Hospital, irrespective of the current mental disease of the County. The recoveries, calculated on the total admissions, yield a result of 19.8 per cent., while, if this chance addition of 40 chronic cases to the admissions of the year be left out of calculation (as it ought in any comparative test to be), the percentage of recoveries on the admissions mounts at once to 26 per cent.

Discharges. Twenty-eight cases have been discharged "not improved" during the year. These cases were chiefly Kent Patients, admitted in the earlier days of our existence, with a view of reducing the working expenses of the Asylum, and now removed in consequence of the increased demand made by the County on our beds in the Female Department.

Tabular Statement of Discharges, the cases discharged during the year.

Mortality. The mean annual mortality is again high, being 10 7 per

cent., as compared with 9.5 per cent. in 1860. The average age at death has been 47 years. A reference to the Obituary Table (Table IV.) will show that cases continue to be sent to the Asylum in a dying state; and again, that other cases are left so long without that proper treatment which an Asylum alone can furnish, that they die shortly after admission from symptoms which apparently earlier treatment might successfully have combated. The Medical Superintendent renews his urgent recommendation (even on the score of economy), that all cases of mental disease should at once and without delay be sent to the Asylum. The previous removal of the Patient to the Wards of the Union House is alike injurious to him, and detrimental to the order and comfort of the Union House.

according to Months.

The steady increase in the Female Pauper Patients belong- continued ing to the County is a fact which requires the early attention Female of the Visitors. Already the Female Department contains 6 Patients more than the number which it is calculated to receive, and 31 more than the building was originally constructed for.

On the 25th December, 1859, the number of Female Pauper Patients chargeable to Sussex was 149. In the following December (1860) it rose to 202, and to-day their number is 223.

Inquests.

Two Inquests have been held on cases of sudden death. In the one instance death resulted from an epileptic fit during the night; in the other, from rupture of one of the large vessels of the heart (see Obituary Table IV., Nos. 23 and 33.)

Sanitary Condition of

The General Health of the Patients has been good throughthe Asylum. out the year.

Patients' Work.

The Work of the Patients continues remunerative. According to the results shown in Table VII., and which is calculated at a low average, £1,428 0s. 5d. is the value of the work performed by them during the year. Under Table VII., a, b, c, d, e, will be found the returns of the work of the year in the tailor's, shoemaker's, and mat-maker's shop, in the laundry, and also a return of the needlework done in the wards.

Patients' Amusements

The Amusements of the Patients continue also a subject of interest to the Medical Superintendent, and a valued addition to the curative agencies of the Asylum.

The weekly Winter Balls have been regularly held. Summer Cricket replaced them. Several picnics were made to Ditchling Common, where more than 100 Patients on each occasion spent the day. The Christmas and Anniversary Celebration on the 25th July have also been much appreciated by the Patients. The Venerable Archdeacon Otter preached the Sermon on the Anniversary Day.\* The

Chairman and several of the Visitors were present on the occasion. The weekly Sunday Walk into the country is also much enjoyed, while the orderly behaviour of the Patients when out is, in the opinion of the Medical Superintendent, an example worthy of imitation by the labouring population around.

Considerable progress has been made in the General Manage-Management and Organization of the Establishment. The ment. Rules and Regulations of the Committee of Visitors (16 & 17 Vict., cap. 97, § 53) were approved at the General Meeting on the 27th April, 1861, and they have since been rigidly enforced.

The Medical Superintendent has the satisfaction of report-New Works. ing the complete and unqualified success of the new Engineering Works intrusted to Mr. Hadon, of Trowbridge, viz., of the new Drying Closet and Warming Apparatus in the Chapel and Refractory and Sick Wards, and of the Hotwater Tanks, as also of the Baths, Water Closets, and Urinals, supplied (in porcelain) by Mr. Finch, of Adam Street, Adelphi.

The Roman (hot air) Bath, erected under the same roof Roman Bath. as the new Drying Closet, has already proved a valuable therapeutic agent, particularly in cases of Melancholia.

The Balance Sheet for the year (audited by the House Balance Sheet, &c. Committee) is herewith annexed.

A Table of the contract prices of Provisions, and of their total consumption, is also appended.

Conclusion.

The Medical Superintendant has, in conclusion, to record his cordial approval of the manner in which the Officers of the Asylum have performed their respective duties. He has also to express his satisfaction with the conduct of the Attendants and Servants of the Asylum during the past year.



### THE

### CHAPLAIN'S THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

At the close of another Year the Chaplain desires to submit Third Annual Report to the Committee of Visitors.

Divine Service on Sundays during the Year has been sunday regularly celebrated. The orderly, and in many cases the devotional, behaviour of the large body of Patients who attend Public Worship, is highly satisfactory; their demeanour is, at least, as quiet and decorous as that of other Congregations of Persons in their own station of life. Many of the Patients join in the responses, chants, and hymns, and follow the reading of the lessons in their Bibles or Testaments. Occasional remarks made in the Week by the Patients on the subject of the Sermons, show that, in some of the hearers, interest has been awakened.

The numbers at the early Week-day Prayers is smaller week-day than on Sundays, and the Service, perhaps, is less satisfactory, from the absence of most of the more intelligent Patients, on the Male side, who are engaged in the Wards, Workshops, &c.

In addition to the regular Chapel Services, a short Service, ward consisting of exposition of Scripture and Prayer, is held on Thursday afternoons in one of the Male Wards, for the special benefit of Patients who, from whatever cause, do not attend

Public Worship. Should it be deemed desirable, a similar Service will be established on the Female Side of the House.

Burials.

Up to the present date 30 Funerals have taken place in the Cemetery during the present year. The gradual improvement of the appearance of the Burial Ground, can hardly fail to exercise a beneficial influence on the minds both of the Patients themselves, and of the many relatives and friends who, from time to time, are in attendance at Funerals.

General Intercourse with Patients. By visits to the Male and Female Wards, and by more private conversations with selected Patients, in his Room on Sundays, the Chaplain endeavours to maintain friendly intercourse with those committed to his pastoral care.

Classes.

The large Male and Female Classes which assemble twice on each Week (the former on Monday and Thursday evenings, the latter on Tuesday and Friday afternoons) form a feature of no ordinary interest in the Chaplain's department of duty, and the manifest pleasure taken by many of the Patients in their attendance and progress is abundantly encouraging. An elementary "History of England," and Wood's "Common Objects of the Country," have already furnished a course of instruction. Guy's Geography is now being read.

An Evening Class has recently been established for the purpose of conference with the Attendants and others of the Household on the Female Side of the House. The object in view by the Chaplain in holding these Meetings will be rather an improving acquaintance with an important class among his flock than the direct communication of instruction.

Rev. W. Jackson.

On the 9th July the Rev. W. Jackson, Vicar of Heathfield,

Sussex, kindly delivered a very interesting Missionary Lecture to a large audience in the Recreation Hall.

On 25th of the same Month (St. James' Day) the Second Commemoration Day.

Anniversary of the opening of the Asylum was observed.

Divine Service was held at 11. The Rev. W. A. Fitzhugh,

M. A., Rector of Street, read the Lessons, and the Sermon on the occasion was preached by the Venerable Archdeacon Otter, D.D.

The Choir, under the direction of Mrs. Mortlock, assemble choir, regularly for practice on Saturdays. The Singing, though simple in character, is yet earnest and careful.

A considerable addition has recently been made to the Library. Library from the fund appropriated to that purpose.

The Chaplain trusts that this brief notice of the various Conclusion. duties within his province may be satisfactory, as rendering some account of the discharge, however imperfect, of his Office.
