A Proclamation for suspending the time of healing the Disease called, The Kings Evill, untill Easter next.



Hereas the Kings most excellent Majestie, by His Proclamation dated the sixth day of July last, vid prescribe the times of his healing the Disease called, The Kings Evill, to be Michaelmas and Easter, or with information dayes next before, or next after those Feasts: Reverthes lesse, his Pajestie being new informed, that the Sicknesse increase this many parts of the Kingdome, and foreseeing the danger that may redound to his sarea person, by the consuence of diseased people at this Michaelmas now approaching, hath thought sit surther

to suspend all accesse to his Court and Presence sor Healing, till Easter next, or sourteen dayes before or after the same. And both therefore straitly charge and command all persons what soever, hereby to take knowledge of his Pajesties Royall will and commandment herein; And that none presume until Easter next, or within sourteen dayes next before, or next after the said Feast, to resort to his Pajesties Court or Presence sor healing, under pain of his Pajesties high displeasure, and to be surther punished as that be meet: his Pajesties said Proclamation of the sirth of July last, or any thing therein to the contrary notwithstanding, which never thelesse in all other the Directions and Declarations therein expressed, his Pajestie willeth and commandeth to be duly and strictly observed, under the penalties therein mentioned.

Given at Our Court at Oatlands the second day of September, in the fourteenth year of Our Reign.
