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De Aucenes most excellent Paiestic being credibly enformed that the infection of the plague is at this present greatly increased and dispersed as well in the Citie of London and westminster, and other places neere adiogning to the same, and also in divers other parts of this Bealme. And considering that great perill and danger might ensue, not onely but o her Paiesties royall Person, but also to her most lowing Subjects, if the people of all sorts, and out of all partes of this Bealme should repaire and resort together sor their suits and causes the next Terme commonly called Trinitie Terme: Path therefore thought good by the aduste of her privile Counsell and Justices of her Courts at westminster to adjourne part of the same Terme, That is to say, from the second Beturne of the saide Terme commonly called Octabis Trinitais, butill the fourth Beturne of the same Terme commonly called

Tres Trinicatis, And that to bee for such causes onely, and for such intent and purpose, as hereafter is declared. And therefore her Maiestie doeth hereby signific and declare, that her will and pleasure is, that writes of adjournement shall directed to the Justices of either Benche, and to the Judges of all other her Maiesties Courtes to whome like writes have bene blually directed, Giving them authoritie to adjourne the sayde Terms from Ocabis Trinitatis nept, butill Tres Trinitatis then nept following. And the saide Adjournement to be made the first day of the sayde Ocabis Trinitatis, called the day of Essoynes.

And whereas her Daielly conlidering in her princely wifedome what great prejudice might grow to many her good and louing fubicets in their causes and suites, if the next Terms thould be wholly adjourned, hath therefore by the aduss of her saide Counsell and Justices, determined to have some part thereof to be holden and continued for some sewe daies in the beginning and ending of the same as is aforesaid. Her highnesse most gracious intention in that behalfe is, that the same daies for which some part of the said Terms is to be holden, that be beed only for the better expediting and continuing of causes and suits, and returning and suing out of Processe, a for such other like things, which may be performed and done in the absence of the parties by their Atturneis. And therefore her Daiesty doth by this her Proclamation signisse to all her louing subjects that her will and pleasure is, that during the said Terms there thall not be any trialles by Juries of any sudgements by on Demurrers, or special verdicts, or such like, in any of her Dighnesse Courts of Kings Bench. Common Pleas, or Exchequer. And also that there shall not be any indiciall hearing or determining of any causes or matters in any of her Daiesties Courts of Starre-chamber, Chauncery, Exchequer chamber, Court of wardes, Duchie-chamber, Court of Requests, saving only orders to be given in the same last mentioned Courts the sire, second and third dayes of the same Terms tor the better directing a continuing of causes, and that no partic that neede to be present in person for any such causes or suites, but the same may be attended and done by their Atturneics.

And her Maiellie doth hereby further notifie and declare, that no party thall be compelled, or neede to appeare in person in any of her Maiellies said Courts at any time during the saidenert Terme, but may make their appearance by their Atturneis, saving onely in cases of outlawrie, and other the cases mentioned in the proviso hereafter following. And also that no Juries, or anie whom the same may cocerne, halbe compelled or neede to appeare in any of her Dighnes Courts at wellminster at any time during the said Terme, so, any cause or matter what some conference only.

Provided nevertheless, and her Maichies pleasure and commandement is, that all Collectors, Receivers, Shirists and other Accomptants, and all other persons, that should or ought to accompt or pay any summe or summes of money in any of her Maichies Courts of Exchequer, Court of Wardes and Liveries, oresher Dutchie of Lancaster, or in any of them, or enter into any accompt in any of the sayde Courtes shall repay to the accustomed places at well minuter, and there to pay and do in every behalic as though no such Proclamation of Adiournement had been e hador made.

And her highnesse further pleasure, and commandement is, that all Shirites hal returne their wittes and processe, against all such Accomptantes and debters at the dayes therein appointed. And if any person or persons, who ought to accompt or pay any summe or summes of money to her Daiestie in any of the Courtes and places asoresayde, doe make default therein, that then her Dighnesse more money to her Daiestie in any of the Courtes and places asoresayde, doe make default therein, that then her Dighnesse make default, or be measured to be duly and orderly served, and returned by the Shiristes and Officers thereunto apporting his such that make default, or be negligent in serving, executing, or returning of any the writs and Processes of the then every such Shiriste, and other Officer thall incurre such paynes and penalties as by the sayde Courtes thall bee taxed and assesse. Willing and commanding all and every her Daiesties Sheristes, and other Officers, ministers, and Subjects, to whome it doth or thall appertaine, and by this her Dighnesse Courtes at well-minister, in the sayde Crastino Trinitatis, and Tres Trinitatis, then and there to be holden and kept, as if this Proclamation had not bene had as they will answere to the contrarte at their persis.
