T hath beene an order and a collome (amongli the molt ercellentelt and wife Phylitions) to choole the Poone for the principall fignificatrix of the licke perfon, and according but oher motion, scituation, and configuration (with other Plannets) have giuen indgment on the increasing, mittigation, and

alteration of the difeafe.

For Hippocrates (in principio Prognoficorum) speaketh of the Doone, and fapth in this manner. There is a certaine Starre of beauen on which a Philition mult take beed and mark, the purueiance thereof is wonderfull and Dzeadfull. Alfo Galen (in commento de diebus criticis) faith : a Philition muit take beeb ; abuife bimfelfe of a certaine thing that fagleth not, neither Deceiueth, (which the A. Aronomers of Ægipt taught) that is to fay, when the body of the Doone is ioyned with foztunate farres, Dzeabful and fearfull fickneffe commeth to good end. Likewife Aftronomers fay, that among all the other plannets the Poone (in ruling) bath mott power and mailtry of mens bodies : foz as Prolomeus faith (in Libro de indiciss Aftrorum)onder the Poon is contained, ficknes, loffe, feare, harme, and bomage : therfore about the alteration of mans boby, the apoone worketh molt principally: and not with out good caule, foz as All conomers affirme, the bath bominion and goernment of all liquio ; moit fubitances, as the water, ople, & fappe of tras, ec. As the thrice learned Clark Dodo; Dee, in the 103. Aphorifme of his Booke intituleo Libro de quibus da natura virtutibus faith thus Luna potentifima est humidarum rerum moderatrix, humidatifg, excicatrix & effettrix. So we may no leffe affure our felues that the hath superiozity and predomination on the foure humors, Choler, Blood, fleame and Delancholy, which in fubftance are nought elfe but humedious and bapozatiue, although they differ in quality Then

Then as Bbylitions doe bold the opinion that all the infirmities which naturally happen to any perfon (and not by any milchance og fodaine accident) both proceede and come by the diffemperance of thole fours Bumors; fo ive may very well conclube, that if the fuperficies og head of a Fountaine, both alter bis accuftomarie courle ofrunning, then the adiacienticall or belonging freames muft needs differ either in quality og in quantity. So like wife the Bone being passa qualitatis collected and retaineth the good of enill infuence of that plannet to whome the is adiopned of applyeth : as Hermes fatth (in his latromethematikes) Luna vero ftelle (fine benifica fine malifica fuerit) veri fe applicuerit illi Inffragabiter. And bes caule ber ozbe is neareft onto the earth, fendeth bs the bertue and imprefion of the other Plannets : and fo caufeth the mutabilitie and alteration of mens bodies, to good og eaill, according to the nature of that Plannet with whome the is adiopned of configurated, and the part of the Zodiake wherein the is fcituated: For the erpert Whylition mut obferne and marke boin the palleth through the 12. fignes, and thereof thall onder fand much of the alteration of the difeale, by a certaine difference and diffance of part of the Zodiake from the degree the Soone was in, at the infant when the ficke perfon was firft bedride, or tooke his bed, and when the Doone commeth thereunto, that day they thall call critticali, indis ciall or mostall according to the foace or diffance it differeth from the degree of the Zodiake that the Moone pollelled when the partie tooke his bed : which fome men (Deceining them felges) have reckoned and numbred alwaies by a certaine difference of dayes, from the time the party fell ficke, calling the fecond and fift, mostal bayes, the fourth a indiciall or thelving bay, and the 7. and 14. critticall dayes, og fuch like : which is an open and manifelt erroz, fog feeing the Doon (baning an bnequall motion) commeth fometimes to the afore faid parts of the Zodiake a day fooner and othertimes a bay laterift is boyofüble (for he that accounteth by an even number of Dayes) to finde out the true Critticall, Dostall, os Judiciall papes: therefore for the better aboyding of this apparant error. D2 everie figne and degree the Moone is in, there is 16 columbes in the table (caractered with their p20per figures of Algo2ifme, with these letters S. and D. fignifying fignes & degrees) in which the mo2tall, indiciall and criticall daies, both happen in : being noted at the head of the Table thus : Mort : Daies, Iu-

dic: daies & Critic: daies. The ble of this Table is thus: The day and howze knowne is which the ficke perfor tooke his Bed, you mult fearch the figne and the degree the Moone is in(which being found) entring into the Table (in the bitermoffe columbe on the left hand) intituled the partie falling ficke, (bnder the carracter of Luna) you thall finde against the figne and degree the Goone is in, all the Critical, Judiciall, and Goztall dates in their proper Columbes (noted at the head of the Table) during the space of time, the Gone passet through the whole Zodiack of fignifier, to which aforesaid places, when the cometh (during the continuance of § ficknes) then thall be the true Criticall, Judicial, and Goztal daies, as you thall fee them superferibed at the head of the Columbe.

Anexample.

The first day of Pay 1605. A certaine man fickned and tooke his bed, at 6. of the clock in the afternoone, the Pone being then in the 12. begr. of Pifces, now 3 defire to know the Critical, Judiciall and Spotal daies (of that perfon) then entring into the Lable in the bttermall columbe on the left hand, buder the carater of the moone in Pifces, oner against the 12. deg. in the nert columbe, 3 find the 7. degree of Aries, to which when the Pone commeth is a mostall day: 7 in the third columbe, 3 finde the 27. degree of Aries, to which part of the Zodiacke when the Pone commeth, is a Judiciall day. In the fourth columbe, 3 finde the 22. degree of Taurus, which is a mostall time, and in the fift columbe, 3 finde the 12. of Gemini, to which

which place when the Poone commeth, that is a Criticall day. e fo of the reft butill the Poone hath perambulated through the whole Zodiack, s if the difeases cease not in § meane while, after you have gone through the 16.columbes, you must begin againe as you did before : Pote that the time the person taketh his bed, is the first criticall time.

Of the Afpects of the Moone with the Planets.

If you defire to know with what Planets the Poone is configurated of adiogned, you must learne what day and houre the ficke bodie first tooke his bed, of lay downe by meanes of the rage of the difease : ercept the ficknesse came to him at that time, when he was alreadie in his bed, for then you shall observe the time in which the difease began to torment him : which being cracily knowne, you must calculate the motion of the Poone for the time the person fell ficke, confidering that the is to some and applyeth buto a Plannet, two manner of wayes, that is to say either corporally, or by the afpet of the Semidiameters of their bodies called applycation.

Copposall contunction is when the moone is in the fame figne and degree another Plannet is, but the Poone is faid to be radiationally togned to a plannet, when her bodie toucheth his Semidiameter.

Likewise the Pooneis aspected and beheld of a Plannet two manner of waies.

The one is called a perfect afped, as when there is 60. degrees betweene the centure of the Doone and another Plannet, that is fayd to be a true Bertile afpect.

Da when the bodte of the Boone is dilant from another Plannet 90. begrees, is called a perfea quartill afped.

D2 when the moone is elonged iust 120. degrees from an other Plannet, the Poone is faid to beholde that Plannet, with a true Trine alped. And if the centure of the moone be distant 180. degrees from & bodie of an other Plannet, & is named a perfect Opposition.

The other is an unperfect Alpect called applycation, as when a Plannet is certaine degrees different from a true Alpect, only within the lemidiameter of his bodie.

The Semidiameter 3 54 8 09 \$ a Begrees. 02 halfe the beames of 9.9.8.15.8.7.12 Degrees.

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Do that Saturne and Iupiter ertend their forces but to 9. degrees. Mars buto 8. Sol buto 15. Venus and Mercurie almoste buto 8. Lus na buto 12. for if the bodie of the Moone or her alped commeth within the Semidiameter of any Plannet, the taketh or receineth the influence of that plannet (good or enill) to whome the is fo topned or applyeth.

Example.

Suppose the Moone to be in the fourth degree of Aquarius, and Saturne in the 11. degree of the faid figne, then thould the Moone apply to Saturne, for as much as her bodie is within the Semidlameter of his beames. Dr if the moone were in the 10. degree of Taurus and Mars in the 16. degree of Leo, then the should beholde Mars with a Quartile afprot.

But if the Pcone were in the 20. degree of Capricornus and Saturne in the 8. degree of Libra, then thould the Poone bee free from the Quartile of Saturne, for because his malicious nelle ertendeth no faither then the semediameter of his beames (which is but 9. degr.) and their diffance from a true alped is 12. degræs, yet notwith fanbing the ill fortunes both afflict the ficke perfor, when they abiogne, or alped the beames of the Poone, with their Semidiameter (but not intercidenticallie) for the farther the Poone is from their coniunction or alped, the leffe they torment the difeased and contrarily the fortunes (lupiter and V enus) the nearer their bodies or Alped approacheth to the moon, the more they intermeddle their vertues, and the former mittigateth the ficke mans paines.

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Pote that of the Afpedes the Quarule and Opposition are hatefull and maleuolous Afpeds, espectally the Opposition,

And the Sextile and Trine afpects are fauourable and friently afpects, chiefely the Trine.

The Coniunction is barfable, fo; it is berie good with good plannets, and ertreame euil with ill.

Allo fometimes it thall be necessarie to know the latitude of the Planets.

To know whether the ficke Person shall live or die. If the Doone (at the day and houre the ficke tooke first his bed,) befree from the Conjunction, Quarile of Opposition aspect of Saturne and Mars, the discased person thall not depart by meanes of C 2 that

that fickneffe (especially e if lupiter o? Venus regarde the Moonc with Conjunction, Sextile, o? Trine aspects) for then the ficke thall some recover his health, and so much the rather if the Moone be free from combustion, and augmenting in light and motion. Also the head of the Dragon is of the nature of § fortunes (lupiter & Venus) but not so effectuall in operation.

But contrarpivile, if the Doone be afflidet epther by the Coniunction, Quartile 02 Oppolition of fill fostunes (Saturne & Mars) the ficke that Die, chiefly if Iupiter 02 V enus Doe not affift the moone, o2 if the be combust and Decreasing in light and motion.

Alfo the Dragons taile is of the nature of the ill fortunes, but of himfelfe hath not the interficient force of Saturne or Mars, for as much as it is a line and not a Starre.

Likewife if the moone be in the via combusta, which is from the middeft of Libra butill the middeft of Scorpio, 02 buter the Soume beames, and decreasing in light 02 motion, and applying to Saturne and Mars, eyther by contunction 02 any aspect (chiefly by Quartile 02 Opposition aspect, although their semictameters onely beholde the semiseames of the moone) it threatneth death.

An example.

A cercaine man fell ficke and tooke his bed, the mooone beeing three degrees in Scorpio (decreating in light and motion) Mars 13. degrees in Libra, and Saturne 27. degrees in Sagitarius, and departed when the moone came to the 13 degree of Capricoraus.

To know the times in which the ficke perfon shall feele cafe of his paine, or recouer his health.

Hauing found by the Dodrine alozelaid, that the ficke perfon thall not departe, then as often as the moone meteth with the bodie of alped of the fortunes, (Iupiter of Venus) during the rage of the difease, at that instant the ficke perfon thall bee leuiated and eased of his dolorous paines: the ill fortunes the contrarie, and the first obuiating of meeting of Luna with Iupiter of Venus (on a Criticall, Judiciall, of Sportall day) the difeased perfon thall begin to recouse his health.

Anexample.

Anno Dom. 1605. the 28. of Pay (about 7. of the clocke in the

the tozenoone) a certaine friend of mine fell ficke in his 1Bed: the Boone being then in the 2 Degr. of Pifces (Decreating) Marsi 8. Degrees in Gemini, Saturne 23. Degrees in Sagitarius, Iupiter 26. in Capricornus, and Venns 4. Degrees in Gemini : Dow foz as much as I finde the spoons to be free from the interficient force of the ill foztunes, I judge the ficke thall not bepart : pet he was grievonfly tozmented and affliced, foz becaufe the hatefull beames of Mars his Quartile afped, was within the femidiameter of the Doone, e none of the fortunes Did intermedole their fauorable beames. And inhen the Doone came to the 19. deg. of Pilces (meeting the Opposition of furious Mars) he had a great and mighty fitte of fickneffe, almoft abfolately depriving fence and motion. Alfo be was forely tormented when the Boone came to the 24 Degree of Pifces, becaufe the then behelo Saturne with a fpitefull Quartile afped, after that he began to amend, fozafmuch as that was a mostall day, and lupiter enuironed the Boone with a friendly Sextile afped.

To knowe when and what time the ficke Perfon shall depart and be gricuously tormented.

No Wiff gou finde by the afliction of the Poone at the time the partie fell ficke, that he thall dye, then on the next mostall day that the Poone meeteth with eyther of the ill fostunes Satorne os Mars, by coniunctio, Quartile, os Opposition (applying to the etther cosposally os radiationally) the fick thall dye at that day & house in which the commeth to the interficient point of the Zodiake : which agreeth to the faying of Ptholomeus in the 16. Appositine of his Centilogniums, where the faith we must beheld the motion of gone as the paffeth through the Criticall, Judiciall, and Postall daies, fos if the be in them fostunate, it will fall out well: bufostunate, the contrarie.

An example.

The 17. bay of Pay (Anno Dom. 1605.) A man fell ficke about a 11. of the clocke at night, the Poone being then in the 2. degree of Libra, Sol in the 6. degree of Gemini, Sarurne in the 24. deg. of Sagitarius, Iupiter in the 27. degree of Capricornus, Mars in the 10. degree of Gemini, and Venus in the 22. degree of Taurus : Poin I finde the Poone aflided by the hatefull Quartile afpect of Saturne, E 3 being

being scituated within the malenolous beames of the semidiameter of froward Saturne, whereby J indge that the ficks shall depart: then entring into the Table of Criticall, Judiciall, and Postall dayes, J finde the first mostall day to bee when the Poone commeth to the 27. deg. of the said signe of Libra, yet for asmuch as that degree is free from the oppression of the ill fortunes, J affirme that the licke shall not dye at that time the Poone commeth to the faid signe and begree : Therefore J seeke the next dying day, which is when the Spoone commeth to the 12. degree of Sagitarius, which being affished by the Opposition of Mars, collocated in the 14. degree of Gemini, J sudge be shall dry when the Poone commeth to the 12. degree of Sagitarius : and so be did.

Pote that during the time and permanence of the ficknesse, as often as the Poone meeteth the bodyes or ill aspeas of the bifroyess of nature, so often the diseased person shall seele and suffaine bery sore panges.

furthermoze, some Astronomers affirme, that as long as the Moone decreaseth in motion, so long the griefe thal aggravate, and ware greater and greater.

But Hyppocrates (in Libro de Indicits infirmitat: fecundum lunam) faith thus, when the ficke perfon taketh his bed you must confider whether the Poone departeth out of combustion, for then the ficknesse thall increase untill Luna commeth to Opposition, by reafon that humors increase in mens bodies: and if the beethen with good Plannets, it faileth out well: with epill, the contrarie.

Of the caufe of the difeafe.

T D knowe the caule of the dife Me, you must looke with what Planet the Moone is configurated of adiogned either by confunction of alped and according to the nature and influence of that planet, judge the difeate that afficted the Moone.

The conjunction of any alpede of the ill fortunes both allide the Poone, and the Quartile, and Oppolition, of Sol and Mercury. Poin if Saturne of Mercury oppetie the Poone, the difeale thalbe floine and flack, with laffitude and heavine fle of the limbes : infomuch that the ficke thall fcarce bee able to flirre his body, and the difeale thall them it felfe by little and little, by colones of the body, with

with defluction, debillity, and obfirection : caufing the ficke to awake out of his fleepe fodainly of by flarts. ec.

The ficke perfon (also as Hermes fatth) thall be follitarie, filent, and fearefull, defiring heate, warme cloathes, and darknes, with often fighing, and continuall ofcitation and yauning: the whole fuperficies of the body will be colde and day, and the pulses little and flowe, the cure of fuch, is by thinges that difolue and binde.

But if the Moone (at that time the perfon fell ficke) be aflicted by Mars 02 the Sun, all the superficies and byper partes of the body thall be in extreame heate as if they were insensed and kincled with fice. The party thall bee bery prone and apt to anger, crying-out with scritches and fearce lookes, sometimes inordinately with rauing and franticke fittes 1 as when Choler rautheth by into the head perturbating the braine with biolent beate sc.

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Allo they are very dry and thirky, deliring cold drinke, with spitting and aridity & drynes of the tongne, with loss of appetite, and befire of meate: continually faporing and taking with the tongue: The bifage and face as red as fire, and all the body loaden with superfluity; the pulses are little prefied downes inordinate. Bloodletting butill the fift day, and such thinges as are refrigerative, repercussive, and avoid superfluity are medicinable to the ficke perfor.

Likewife Hermes faith, that they in whofe becumbiture the mon was aflicted of Sol of Mars, chall feele loathfommelle in the mouth and Comack, with paine in the heart, beines, and artires. But continuall feavers, Plurifies, erulceration, and inflamation of the lunges, take their originall of Saturne and Mercury, afflicting the moone in fierie fignes.

The fortunes (Saturne and V enus) in my opinion doe never ber and torment the ficke bodie, although they beholds the moone with hatefull alpeas, or at the lead wife, never in fuch forte that they caule the ficke to take his bed: for fæing that they are adiutors and reflorers of nature, it is bulkely that they thould become enemies e bettroyers thereof, although fometimes by accidents (as by hatefull alpea) their friendship and familiaritie is refrained.

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Of the effects that the Moone operateth and worketh in euerie figne when thee is afflicted by the ill fortunes.

C. in V. of B. oppressed.

Whofoener taketh his bed, the moone being in the figne of Aries (chiefly becrealing in light and motion) and applying to Saturne 0; Mars (elpecially by Conjunctions Quartile 0: Oppolition) the difeale thall take his originall and beginning of a colde caule, with heavines of the head, and debillation and weakeneffe of the eyes. with diffillation and falling bowne of humors into the breaff, by meanes of a rumeticke head, & fluffing of the throate and pipes with fleame and catarre: The behemency & rage of the griefe thall chiefly ertend it felfe by night, all the intrailes and inward parts thall be erceeding hot, but the fuperficies and ertreame partes thall thiner with colde, with languithing and founding, and loffe of appetite, and fweating in the bead of the night: the Pulfes are weak and inordinate. Thinges that heate, mollifie, and lofe the beily, one reprefie the caule of the griefe, but bloud letting is buryofitable.

And if the moone applie to none of the fortunes, but is within the Semediameter of the bodie of Saturue or Mars, or their ill alpedes, then on the next mortall day, in which the moone meteth with Saturne or Mars, the ficke thall departe : but if the mone be not within the beames of Saturne and Mars, nor their malicious alpeds (efpecially increating in light and motion, and applying to Iupiter or Venus) then on the next time that Luna meeteth with Iupiter or Venus (bpona criticall day, tc.) The ficknette thall abate, or at leaft wife, turne out of one difeafe into another. 'But if Marslikewife obuiateth the moone in manner aforefaid, then the griefe thall be mortal and invincible, for when the moone both come to his diameter, be thall die: after the opinion of Hermes.

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But T bee that lyeth downe, the Poone being in Aries and appiping to Marso; Sol, the griefe that take his originall from the head, with pricking and aking in the pellices of the braine; those perfons thall be tormented with continuall Feauers, neither can they take

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take any cell os fleepe, ercept fomtimes a little fumbring: Theie mouth is hot with intellerabie thirft, the tongue by and troubled with heate, with callidity and draw of the breft, and inflamation of the Liver, tending to a phrenfy and alienation of minde. The pulses are fublated, high a morphinate : The beloing and bealing of thefe perfore, is by letting of blood, and bling of thinges that retrigerate and mittigate.

But if the Moone(especially decreasing in light and motion) be either corporally or radiationally soyned to Saturne or Mars, or their envious aspeas, then the ficke thall die : contrarily if the moone bes free from their semiotameters both corporally e raditionally) chieflie augmenting in light and motion) and applying to Superce of Venus, then the ficke man thall recover his health as asorefaid,

tassertent aus Thee in S,of b oppreffed.

If the Doon (at the encreasing of the Difeale) ronneth through the celefiall figne of Taurus, be afflicted by the Diameter, Afpect, Quartile or Opposition of Saturne (chiefly flow in motion and decreasing) the fickness thall proceed of much Drinking, chrofity or elfe repleation, with frequers comming of obfiruation, and ach of the precordiackes, and artires : with inflamation of the whole body, and erniceration of the lunges : the pulles are lofty, high and inorbinate; E lood letting and fuch things as open and Difolue, profiteth.

And if the Doone bee ioyned to Saturne og Mars, og afflided by their ill afpeds (efpecially diminiching in light and motion) then when the Doone obuiateth og meeteth with Saturne og Mars (og a mogtall day) the licke perfon thall perrift.

But if the be free from their booles ez ill alpeds(chiefly augmenting in light and motion, and applying to the fortunes) then on the nert criticall day ec. That the Poone concurreth with lupiter of Venus, the ficke thall amend.

Batif the moone be configurated to Mars either by Conjunction Bos alpea. the ficke thall take his bod by the meanes of a vifeafe proceeding of blood, and be bered with continual features, and chfruction

findion of the whole body with inflamation of the necke and pole, ache of the bones, with inozdinate watch, informitation, and define of drinke, and coole things. Blod letting and things that extended, mittigate and alwage, are good against the caule of the griefe. And if the biolence of Mars be not resulted by § favourable beames of the fortones, but § the mon must needs inffer his malicious influence, then on the next meeting of bec and the ill fortunes (bpon a dying day) the ficke thall depart. But if the moone be delivered from the intercidentical force of mars (chiefly increasing in light 4 motion, and adjuted by the amtable beames of lupiter or Venus) then the difease thall flake after the next Judiciall 4c. concourse with the Spoone and the fortunes.

The Moone in T. of 5 oppressed.

The Poone in Gemini afflicted by the malenolous influence of Saturne (especially deminiching in light and motion) (hall cause the disease to take his beginning and original, by reason of digillation and much watch, or by lattitude and weariness of the bodie with trauelling or excesse of labour and biolent exercise: The artirs and finewes that (as though they were losed) scarce cleave together, with much debillation and wearinesse of the bodye: the griefe thall foone them it felfe (or as Hermersaith,) after three daies butill the 30. day, the discase thall increase with small freavers, and confomption, and wasting of the whole bodie : Also the discase thall be most tormentable by night with swating e griefe of the fpleame : the pulses are low and little. Distentimes such persons thall have a befurion and falling detune of humors into the armes and legges.

And if the Doone apply to Saturne (either by Coniunction, Quartile, o; Opposition aspect) then on the next congrette of Luna, with the destroyers of nature (bpon an interficient day) the ficke perfon thall give bp his Choaff.

But if the Doone be elonged aboue 9. degrees from the bodie 02 fil afped of Saturne, then the licke fhall not bepart, especially if the moone be increating in light and motion, and defended by the beames of the fostunes : yet the licke fhall bee feeble a long time by meanes of the congellation and toughnes of the matter dispersed through all the bodis.

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The Moone in I. of J. affided.

T 7Do to taketh his bed, the moone being in Gemini, and adtoyned or enimically afpected and beheld of the furious and treful Plannet Mars(efpecially Decreating in light e motion) that perfon thall be violentlie tozmented with amostall and beadly bifeale, proceeding of much ingurgitation of wine and arong brinks, and chollericke matter. The acke perfon thall have continuall and pernicious burning Feauers, with obaructions and Ropping of the beines. The pulles thall be bigh, and inozdinate.

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Blood letting is convenient to the acke bodie. And if the Boons be configurated to none of the fostunes, but applyeth alfo to Saturne (epther by Coniunction, og hatefull afpect,) the ficke perfon thall not escape, bot at the next mostall bay that Lune commeth within the Dangerous confines of froming Saturne, the licke thall yeelde himfelfe a pationer and captime to pale death.

Contrarily if the moone be free from the femidiameters of the ill fortunes (efpecially allifted with the fortunes, and augmenting in light and motion) then on y nert meeting of the moon with lupiter oz Venus (bpon a moztall bay, ac)the bilealeb boby thall fele safe.

The Moone in S. of B. oppreffed.

Anime affliding the moone in Cancer (at the lying bolune of any Dacke and Difeales Berion) benoteth the griefe to come of much bathing in colde water, oz of a concelte, oz behement colde, oz be late Dinking, og fitting long at ftudbr, og fuch like : The ficke perfor hall be bered with the Cough, Catarre and boslenes, and billillatien and falling downe of humoas into the breaft : with obfructions and oppllation of the Pipes, with Feauers, arid and inozdinate: the pulles are lowe and little. And if the moone be becreating in light and motion, and placically adiopned to Saturne, the ficke thall die (chiefly if none of the fortunes allift the moone with their fanourable beames.)

But if the moone be elonged from the beames of Saturne (efpecially increating in light and motion) and fortunately afpected of lupiter og Venus, then on the nert meeting of the moone with the fogtunes byon a Judicall day ec.) nature thall prenaile against the euillhumogslammatorn tittat . good aft to ollembunod : attracum eung. F 2.

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The Moonein S of & affliced.

Higne of Cancer, malefaces by the enill influence of Mars, thall baue a bileafe proceeding of blood or fweet fleame, with enerfion and fourning of the bentucle. Things that refrigerate and coole erselles the griefe.

And if none of the fortunes intermeddle their friendly beames, & Difeafed party thall bardly escape ,especially if the Poone be combuff, og decreating in light and motion.

But if the be adjuted and holpen by the fortunes, then at the nert obuiation of Luna with the refforers of nature Iupiter or Venus (bpon any of the alteration dayes) the rage s fury of Mars thall be emulgated and abated.

The Moone in & of b oppressed. Is whose decumbiture a lying downe the Goone posses the celeftiall figne of Leo(and therin afflicted of Saturne) the griefe thall proceed of blood: the ficke person thall be griened about all § breaff with beate and intention of the heart firinges, with augmenting feauers: The pulses are troubled a out of course, with great heate and feruentnes both inwards and outwards. Things that beate a mittigate, are berg good and commodious to the ficke body.

And if Mars also oppzelle the Boone,oz if the be not fuccozed bnber the winges of the foztunes, then (on the nert moztall day, that the Boon meeteth with the benomous beames of the deftroyers of nature) the ficke thall dys: chiefly if the Boone be combust, oz beminishing in light and motion.

But if Iupiter o? Venus regard the Hoone either copposally of raditionally especially the being free from the Sonne beames, and augmenting in light and motion, for then nature thall get the bidocy of the rebellous humors, e on the nert ambulation of the Hone with the fortunes (on a criticall day) the ficke thall amend.

The Moone in A. of J. afflieted. 1917 1100

The Moone being in Leo (oppzelled by Mars) the griefe thall proceed of inperaboundance of blood, cauling buffable and bncertaine Feauers, with languithing, and founding, and lotte of appetite ; beauinelle of the body, with drowinelle and bead fiere

fleepe bnerpugnable, with extendation and confuming of the whole bodie: weakeneffe, with divers passions and affectes of the hart. Things that are refrigerative e abstringent are medicinable.

And if the Poone applie to the fortunes (chiefly free from combuffion, increating in light, and fwift in motion) the ficke thall not departe: yet the griefe thall bee dangerous by reason of the violent beating and adultion of the blood.

But if the Poone be patt the Opposition and ioyned to the enill beames of Mars diminishing in light and motion : then (bppon the nert interficient day that the Poone meeteth with the bodies of ill aspects of Saturne of Mars) the dileased person wil be forced to yell and sorrender his spirit.

The Moone in m. of b. oppreffed.

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If the Poone be in Virgo affliced by the Conjunction of alped of Saturne (at the time the ficke tooke his bed) the griefe thall proceed of cruditie and indigetion in the Comacke, with ache of the bowels and intraites, proceeding of tough and viscous fleame. Cometimes with head-ache and pricking under the ribbes, feavers, firid and inordinate Things which callifie, mollifie, and diffolue, are curable to thegriefe.

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And if the fortunes alped the Monc (elpectally the being increafing in light and motion, and free from the funne beames) then the ficke perfon that not depart: yet he wil be long fick, by the meanes of the crudde humors which will be long before they are fully ouercome.

But if none of the fostunes beholde the moone, then there is no hope of life, but at the nert meeting with the moone and the ill fostunes (on a Postall day) nature thall bee biterly endamaged and ouercome.

The moone in Virgo (afflicted by the malicious beames of outragious Mars) the lickneffe thall proceed of tharpe and fretting humours, with flure of the wombe, and erulceration of the bowels, with fmall and unfrable Feauers: The pulfes are flowe and thick, with enerfion of the bentricle, a the flomache abhorrings loathing of meate. Things & repreffe the difeafe, are fach as are obfirudius, and expell tharpe fretting humors.

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And if the feuetitie and couelty of Mars be not emulgated and abated (either by the cound con, application, or configuratio of Iupiter or Venus) the ficke thall not escape chiefly the Moone being combuff, and becreating in light and motion.

But if the Goone apply to none of the fostanes he chall bye (on the nest mostall bay) to the fostunes the contrary.

The Moone in ≈ of h oppreffed.

A T whole becumbiture the Poone was collocated in the figne of Libra (and opprefied by the body or alped of Saturne.) The grief thal come of the ingurgitation or inordinate (willing of wine, and frong brinke, with nodurnall and nightly affault and conflict, pains and griefe of the head and breaft, diffillations, cough, t hoarfnes: The breaft greened of laffitude, the fromack diffaining meate, fmall freavers comming by night with a double accede. We thall be continually tormented and afflicted, with remiffion and flacknes of the pulses. Thinges that callifie and heate are bery profitable.

And if the Moone apply to none of the fostunes neither by Conjunction nos alpect, then the ficke thall bye : especially if the Moone be combust, os decreasing in light and motion.

But if Mars allo afflict the Poone, then the griefe thall not turne out of one Difease into an other, but at the nert congression with Saturne 02 Mars (on an intercidentical Day) the ficke person thall by.

The Moone in so of & afflicted.

MARS oppressing the moone in the signe of Libra, will prouoke a difease proceeding of blood; where of will growe intensed freauers, with bigiliation and waking, and inflamation of the whole body. The reamidy in curing of such persons, is by letting of blood, and the blage of such thinges as are bormitable.

And if none of the fortunes regard the Poone (fo afflided) the dileafed perfon will be confiragned to give place to death.

But if the mallice of Mars refragned (by the influence of lupiter o; Venus) the ficke thall not bepart: but at the nert congrette of the spoone with Saturac o; Mars (bpon a indiciall day ec.) the difeated perfor thall be refleced to his pilline firength.

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The Mooneinm of 5 oppressed.

Furthermoze the Doone being in Scorpio of Saturne indamaged (by the enill influence of his poploned coaps) The difeate thall happen by the meanes of erulceration, or of the enil called bubo in the fecrete parts, viz. in anno ant pudenda & c. And if the Doone increase in light and motion, (especially adjuted by Iupiter or Venus) then the ficknesse thalbe overcome.

But if none of the fortunes beholde the Poone neither by Conjunction nor Alped (chiefly deminishing in light and motion) then on the next mortall congression of Luna with the destroyers of nature, dryrie death thall attainte the afflicted corpes of his filly capting.

The Moone in m of & afflicted.

The Poone in Scorpio at the lying downe of the ficke perfor (oppzeffed by Mars) the difease thall proceed of some feruent or bot impollumation or erulceration, the Pockes, Peasels, and Pomeross, Pettilence, Illiacie, and such like.

And if the Doone apply to no fostunate plannet, (but is cosporally os raditionally adiogned to an ill plannet) then on the next meeting of Luna with the defirogers of nature (on a mostall bay) the griened perfon thall depart.

But if the moone be fwift in motion and departing out of combultion (fostunatly affected of lupiter og Venus) the party fall be delivered at the next mostall congrettion of the Poone & the fostunes.

The Moone in 7 of 5 afflicted.

SAturne affliding the Doone in Sagitarius (elpeciaily flow in mo-Stion and decreating) will toyment the ficke body with defluction, of thinne and tharpe biting humors, ach of the finetwes and artiers, refrigerations, with extream horror of a feauer, corripienting, and afflicting the ficke with bouble accesse. The remedy of those is by thinges that mittigate, alwage and heate-

And if none of & fostunes behold & moone to their amiable beams, but is adiogned os applyeth to Saturne os mars, (either by Cojunction as alpede) then the ficke thall not elcape : but at the nest mostall con-

rouffguration of the Doone with the ill fostunes, the ficke thall bepart.

Bat being abiuted of y festones (efpecially increating in light and motion) and free from combuiltion . the ficke mall recover after the nert applycation of Luna and the fostunes on a criticall day, ec.

The Moone in 7. of 3. oppressed.

Ditall and deadly difeafes are bied and ingendered in their bodies, (at whole decumbiture the moone was oppreffed by the fusionce of furious Mars,) taking originall and beginning, of much bainking and repleation :as buffable feauers, comming of Cholierteke matter, folution and loofenes of the wombe: The putles are remille and languidious, and the healing of fuch muit bee by thinges that are refrige ratiue and oblirudine:

If the moone applie to Saturne eyther by Conjunction, Quartile, B2 Opposition, then the griefe thall be bncurable.

But if the Doone be elonged 10. Degrees,o; moze from the hatefull beames of Saturne and Mars, og applying to Jupiter og Venus (especially aumenting in light and motion) the ficke thall bee bifeateb untill the nert Criticall sc. obuiation of the moone and the foztunes, and then he thall be delinered.

De moone in Capricornus (affliced of Saturne and Diminithing inlight and motion) the griefe thall come of a colde caufe, with thinne and fubtil difillations beauines of the breft, and the lunges apprefied with difficultie of breathing . the cough thall greenouflye tozment him by night, with intenfed feauers : Thinges that mittigate and heate, are medicinable.

And if the moone be not faccozed by the congrettion, Coniur Aion og alped of the fogtunes, the ficknelle thall belong, get notwith-Banbing mozt II.

But if the moone be feperated from the femidiameter of his body, p2 eutil afpeo(efpecially augmenting in tight and motion)the on the nert confamiliaritie of the moone (with Jupier of Venus) nature thali prenaile againft the crubas bumors.

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The Moone in W. of J. afflicted.

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But if Mars afflict the mone in the figne of Capricorne if will pro-Buoke an infirmitie of bomitting, proceeding of cholloricke matter or enill digettion. This difease is dangerous and full of perrill: continual feaners, and buftable, loss of appetite, flure of the wombe, with erulceration & erasperation of the fingers, by meanes of harpe choller and inflamation of the breast: and it is painfull for the ficke person to firetch or furre bis finnowes.

The pulses are remisse and sacke. Things constringentive, and obstructive, are medicynable.

And if the Mone be within the femidiameter of Mars, og mees teth also the beames of Saturne (at that instant) then the partie chall not escape, but at the nert obviation of the Moone and the ill fogtunes (on an interficient day) the licke thall dye.

But if the be elonged from the diameter of the diffropers of nature, lupiter of Venus allo allifting the Moone, the ficke thall recouer.

The Moone in ar. of b. opprefied.

When Saturne oppzelleth the Moone in Aquary (at the lying downe of any licke perfon) the difeafe thall proceed of much watch, laffitude, wearineffe, or violent labour and exercise: The griefe thall infett him vnequally, with remission, and intenfion, vntill the mone come to her Opposition, and then he thall releeue (chiefly) if the fortunes intermedle their fauourable beames.

The Moone in m. of J. afflicted.

If Mars afflict the Mone in A quarius (at the lying dolvne of the ficke perfon) he thall be grieved with a molt acute and tharpe caufe.

And if the Poone apply to any of the fortunes (chiefly increafing in lightand motion) the difeated perfon thall not repart.

But if the Done be corporally or raditionally adiopned or afperce of the ill fortunes, then there will be final hope of life.

The Mone becreating in light and motion, and alfided of Saturne in Pifces, the difeate thall happen of refrigerations & coloe bathings,

bathings, with grievous diffillations, and continuall Feavers, fearcely augmenting byon the ficke, often fighing and pricking of the break, intention of the precordiace and heart-firinges. Things that heate and mittigate both furcor the ficke body.

And if none of the fortunes regard the moone, but the is alpeded and beheld by the bafilicall lookes of furious Mars, or if the Spoone obuiateth also with frowning Saturne, or is within his diameter, then there is no hope of tife (chiefly if the moone be deminified in light and motion) for then at the next congression of § moone with the diffroyers of nature (on a dying day) the ficke perfon thalbe forced to furrender his bitall breath.

But if the moone apply to the fortunes either by Conjunction or alped, the ficke thall releeve after the next mortall concourse of Luna with the fortunes, chiefly if the bee free from combuffion, and augmenting in light and motion.

The Moone in X of & afflicted.

Finally if the Doone be in Pifces afflided of Mars, (either cozposally, og radiationally) and increasing in light and motion (at the decumbiture of any perfon) then thall artife a griefe proceeding of much ingurgitation of wine og firong dyinkes, and of plentitude and cepleasion oppeding the ficke with nodurnall intensions, with head-ache, doting and phrensite, with hurning Feauers, behement thirst, and befire of could drinke. The healing of fuch is first by opening of a beine, and the blage of those thinges that repressed the cause.

And if the Doone be not faccozed by the fortunes, but is endomaged allo by lowzing Saturne, then on the next interficient day that the Doone runeth with Saturne or Mars the ficke thall depart.

But if Iupiter of Venus regard the Doone (with friendly alpen) then on the next criticall, indiciall, or mostall day, that the Doone pertranceth with the bodies or amiable beames of the fortunes, the biolence of the rebellious humors that be biterly ertinguithed.

Pote heere that the Doone apply to any of the diffrogers of nature in what figne fosuer the be, either by contant ion, application, or any afpect : although it be only by the builting and adiogning of their femidiameters, yet it will worke the like operation in dif-

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ealed perfons: but not fo grieuoully not mostally, as the Coniuntion, Quartile, of Oppolition. For if the ill fortunes behold the Some (with Sextile, or Trine alpeds) the difeale thall not be lethall: neither also in unperfect applications, Quartile, or Oppolition: whereas the is elonged, and separated from their beams (especially if the moone be augmenting in light and motion) and alter by the beames of the fortunes.

Allo according to some mens opinions, it profiteth much the Diseased person, if the fortunes or good startes are scituated in the Meridian or Horizon (at the decombiture or lying downe of the sicke body) and so contrary wile it hindreth the grieved person, if the fishe body the soccupy the said places.

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
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Thus much I have thought convenient to write of the indgement on ficke folkes, when the day and houre of the lying downe, or the defto mbiture (of the difeafed perfon) can by any meanes be ferntated or nearely knowne : but if the day and houre cannot be fhewed (in which the ficke toke his bed) then you must contemplate the fortuation and collocation of the Planets, by a Celeffiall figure erected for that time in which the question was bemaunbed, or the difeafe first demonstrated or thewed : which mauner of indicials I will now omit (for breutites fake) butill my next Abdition : committing the gentle Reader in the meane whiles to the documents of G. C. in his Addition to the worke of worthy Darius, intituled The Indgement of the Starres: wherein he hath learneoly and copionfly intreated thereof.

De body of man is composed of foure ellentiall and hetrogentall substances, that is to fay; Fleame, Blood, Choller, and Melancholie: which Dy fitions call Humours of complections, and mirtures of those b foure ample qualities Heate, Colde, Moyfture, and Drineffe: as Heate, and Moyflure &c. which if they erced oz alter that proportion that nature ordeined them at the first (either in qualitie og quantity) then thostly happeneth ficknelle, e bifcrafie.

The qualitie of the foure Humours, and the times appropriated vnto them.

"Leame is the optiginall and primordination of the other Was mours, and is engendered of unperfect digeftion, and is colde and mout in qualitie like the water; and hath molt puillance in Winter, from the eight day of October until the ninth of March, and from the third house of the night butill the ninth of the faide night. This humour is beed in the Liver, and bath his abiding in the Comacke, and is knowne to ercade by thele Signes : Slapinede, Dulneffe, Slowneffe, Beaufneffe, Fatneffe, Cowardifines, Forgetfulnelle, Spitting, Superfluitie in the nole, little appetie, in-Digelion, the fkinne whiter, colder, and fmother in touching then it was wont to be : their Maine lower coloured, and thicker, and the pulfe lower and leffer then it was accuftomed to be, with dzeaming of Raine, Flouds and waters.

DLood is a Humour perfectly concod, the chiefelt nourifier and Deseferver of our humaine nature, and is hote and motifie like the aire, and increaseth in Spilng time, from the tenth of March, to the 24 of April, and bath bominion from the ninth houre of the night, on till the third house of the morning, and hath his abode in 108

the beines, and is knowne to abound by these fignes : the Acines great and full, carnoätie, rednes of skinne, pricking of the temples, lightnesse of heart, the Pulse great and full, breames of red and bloody things, and pleasant conceites : their Arine will be higher coloured and thicker in substance then ordinarily.

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Choller is the clarifier of the other Humours, and is bred of the fabiliance of the meate and drinke erceeingly digell ed and of fome Author is called the froth, or fpume of blod, and is bote and bry in temperature like the fire; and bath power in Summer, from the 25. of April butill the 17. of September, and bath cominion from the third houre of the day butill the ninth houre of the fame: Signes; Leanneffe of body, Collueneffe, Hollownes of the eyes, Fierceneffe, Angrynes, Pellownes of the fature, and fpottell, and pricking in the right fide of the heade, Hotnes, the Pulfe is finife and frong, and their Arine higher coloured and thinners brighter then bluall with braming of fire, lightning, Anger, and fighting, and hath his abitacle in the choffer of the Galle.

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M Elancholie is a Humeur unperfectly concot, and is called the dregs or fediment of the other Humours, and is cold and bry like the Carth: But my opinion is, that pure Pelancholie is a groffe and thicke blod, and is blacke of colour by reafon of the craffitude and thicknes, which happeneth by meanes of indigetion and want of naturall beateto extenuate it, and turne it into pure blot, fo that Pelancholie naturall differeth from blod, chiefly by means of colones, which congealeth and maketh it driver and thicker then blod: neither doe 3 (uppofe.that Pelancholy is altogether fo dry as it is cold, for as much as we finde fewe men in whofe bodres Delancholy onely bath the fuperioritie to erce de in leannes of fiendernes, but are rather of a meane proportion, sc.

Melancholie reigneth in Paruelt, ftom the 18. of September, Ontill the eight of October, and hath dominion from the ninth houre of the day, butill the third boure of g night, e is perceaued by these fignes: Fearefulnes without cause, dreadfull imaginations, fretfulnes, Roughnes of Ikinne, Leannesse, Blacknes, or wannesse of colour, Informitation, Dreames terrible, Baltnes of the mouth, Sollitarines, the Palfe little, with Arinemore Decoloured

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and thinner then acculioned, and hath his mantion and abiding in the Septeene.

And thus much of the temperature and qualitie of the foure Qumeurs, not copropted of altered, by the medling of one with the other.

How the foure Humours are distributed in mens bodyes.

The foure Humours are proportioned and diffributed in mens bodyes two manner of wayes : (that is to wit) totally, and particularly :

Totall or generall diffribution, is when one of them only hath the predomination and superioritie, as he in whole body choller solvercedeth, is called Cholericke ac.

But particularly they are distributed after 12. fundy wayes, as followeth:

In some mens bodyes, Choller only ercedeth the other Humozs, and that man I call Chollericke

And in some, Tholler bath che principall dominion, and Melancholy ercedeth the other Humaurs, and such a person 3 call shollericke Welancholy.

But in fome men, gelancholy bath the foueraigntie, and Choller bath fome Dominion, and those 3 call Belancholly chollericke.

In fome, Belancholy folgercabs, & fuch perfons 3 terme De-

Inother, Belancholy hath the fuperiozitie, and blod-feme bominion, and they I call melanchollike Sanguine.

In other, blod furmounteth, and melancholy bath the nert dominion, and fuch perfore I nominate fanguine Belancholike.

And in other, 15 lob only raigneth, and fush I call Sanguine.

But in other, Blod ercebes and fleame hath perticipation with it, and thole I call Sanguine flegmaticke.

Alfo in fome, Fleame forpalleth, and Bloo hath fome dominion, fuch I call degmaticke Sanguine.

In other some, fleame onely hath the preheminence, and such 3 sall flegmaticke.

And in other fome, fleame bath mattery, and choller fome Domination: fuch perfons I call flegmaticke cholericke.

Alio in fone mens bodyes, Choller bath the principall foueraign-

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tie, and fleame somewhat ercedeth the rell, and such I call chole, ricke flegmaticke.

Pereat the ignorant perchannce will finde fome matter to fpurne, becaule I have devided the complexions of men into fo manp fundry proportions: yet be that is acquainted with the fecret operations of nature e knoweth the original caufe of a mans complections, and also observeth the diversitie of mens colours, the funbry proportions of their bodies, and bariety of conditions : Gall plainly perceive, that nature bath many wayes differibuted them, and not onely by foure manner of proportions, as I will herefollowing beclare at large.

Of the originall cause of mens Complexions.

The completion of man proceedeth not of any naturall proceedtion received from his parents at the time of his conception, nor of the milke of the mother or Aurie, where with the Infant is nourifhed (as fome boe imagine) But is infused and proportioned according to the Celeficial bodyes, renolting ouer our Horizon at the nativitie of the Infant : for that Signe or Signes, which is colocated in the alcendant or Horrofcope, will certeinly demongrate and thew of what completion the native is: for if you fince in the first house a flerie figne only fortuated, you thall sudge that perfort to be chollericke of Completion.

But if you finde in the Borrolcop the molt part of a fierie figne, and fome of a earthy, then you thall call that perfon chollericke melancholicke, of complexion.

And if the latter op least part of a fierie figne possesse the alcen-Dant, with the more part of an earthy, you may call that perfor melancholicke chollerick.

Alfo if an earthy Digne occupy the whole Dozrofcope, that man Gall be melancholicke.

Daif you finde in the first Doule the most part of a earthy Signe and fome of an airie, that perfon thall be metancholike fau-

But if the leffer part of an earthy Bigns and the moze of an attie poffeffe the afcendant, that man thall be languine melancholick.

Likewife if you finde an airie figne occupping the whole alcenbant, you thall call that man Sanguine of complexion.

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If the most part of an airie figne and some of a watery Signe be in the first Pouse, then the complexion of that man thall bee languine flegmaticke.

D2 if the latter 02 leaft part of an aftle Signe poffesse the afcenbant, and the beginning and greater part of a loatery, the Infant bome at that time thall be flegmaticke sanguing of complexion.

In like manner, if a watery Bigne onely fulfill the Horriscope, that person thall be flegmaticke: ercept Cancer which is sanguine chollericke, and Scorpio flegmaticke sanguine.

But if you finde in the first Poule the most part of a waterie Signe, and some of a fiery, that per son thall be Flegmaticke chollericke.

Allo in whole alcendant was leated the least part of a waterie Bigne, and the moze part of a fierie, the native thall be chollericke flegmaticke of complexion : which afozefaid documents, I have found true by erperience and often obferuations : ercept fome Dlanet be feituated in the afcendant, for then you muft mingle the nature of that Planet with the qualitie of the Signe, occupying 02 poffelling the culpe of beginning of the horrifcope. But if any man fand boubtfull whether the Infant receiveth his complexion (of the nature of that part of the Zodiacke, which is colocated in the Dozrofcope) I will him to make tryalt by obferuation, for thereby I my felfe haue not onely difcerned the triplicitie that the partie was borne buder, but fometimes alfo the very Signe afcendant, only by biewing the complexion, + fature of the perfon, whe as no other confellation as afosefaid worked the contrary : but if the houre of the nativitie cannot by meanes of oblinitie be recited, then you thal indge the complexion of the perion by these figures followina.

Infallable Signes to difcerne of what Complexion any perfon is whatfoeuer.

The Cholerick man for the most part is little and thort of ffature. which happeneth as 3 suppose either by reason of the fewnes of bapours and fumofities engendered, or els because that the radicall moulture, whereave the bertue nutrative and begitable is suffeined, is by the operation of firong heat and brynclle orginae to the centure, and there partly consumed (as fire whole nature

nature choller hath attraded moy fince to it felfe, and dyyeth it bp, fo that the superficies and er ream parts fir etch not in length, neityer wave big og fat, becaule of befection of naturall moitfure, as in aged perions (in whom radicall molfare is becaled) groweth no mozerbis fkinneis rough and hot fir touching, and his body berg batrie, their colour is bei wirt yeallow and trb, with a certaine glifering og glowing like fire: fuch perfons foone have beards, and the colour of their haire is red og Alboane. As touching their conditions they are naturally quick-witted, bold, bnthamefaced, furious, haltie,quarrelfome,trefull,fraudulent,guilfull,fout,arrogant,eloquent, couragious, graceles, cruell, craftie and brionffant:light in mouing, tellers, mockers, watchfoll; and flatterers, apt to leafings ec. their eyes little and hollow; Alfo the bertue of concotion is in them bery frong, infomuch that he may bigelt moze then be appetiteth, his Wulfe is fwift and Arong, his Uzine yeallow as gold and thin in fubitance; as touching their egestion, they are often colline, and their ogder red, and tritled : they breame of fire, fighting and anger, of lightning & Dzeadfull bzenning of the ayze, by the meanes of hot and byy fumofities and bapouts afcending from the flomack into the head, which troubleth the braine and bertue imaginative.

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Signes of a chollericke Melancholick man.

Cholerick melancholick men, are higher of ffature then Cholerick, becaufe biolent heat is in them moze remiffe and flacke; whereby fumolities are the moze engenozed, and radicall mouture the leffe walted, yet they are little and leane of body by realon of ozynes, with fain rough and hard, meanly hairie, and temperate in fæling; their colour is palifh, dzawing toward a bzimflone colour, foz in it is fane a little thewe of yeallowneffe, they have not beards to fome as chollericke men, and the colour of their haire is reddiff oz light Albozne; as touching the conditions oz naturall inclination of fuch perfons, they are not altogether fo pzegnant witted, bold, furious, quarrelfome, fraudulent, guilfull, pzodigall, fout, eloquent, and couragious, as cholericke men, neither to bigilent, graceles buconffant, adulations, fivift and fcoznefull as they: yet they are fulpitious, fretfull and niggardifh, and moze folitarie, fundious, and curious then Cholerick, and retaine their anger lon-

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ger: the vertue of digettion is mettly firong in Inch perfons, and their pulle is lefter and flower then in chollericke perfons, his by ine is yellow and thinne, their egeftion is yellowith and hard, and they dreame of falling from high places, of robberies, murders, barmes proceeding of fire. flighting and anger, and fuch like.

Signes of a Melancholicke chollericke man.

A Elancholicke cholericke men are fall of fature, by reafon I that naturall beate is feble, and thereby are many fumolities engendzed, but yet they are littleand flender of boby, becaufe of batneffe, therefore their (Binne is rough and hard, and cold in touching: they have but very little baire on their bodies, e are long without beards, by meanes of colde which floppe the pozes , and fufferett not the matter whereof haire is engenbzes to come forth : alfo they bave much superfluitie in the nole : their colouris pale, matomed inith alittle nigritute og barkneffe. As concerning their conditionsithey are gentle, giuen to fobatette, folitarie, Cubious, boubtfull. auarous, hamefalt, timerous, Lubbozne, fretfull, pensue, contrant, and true in action, with a depe furmile, and wit flowe, with oblinionines, their baire is browne and thin, their Digeftion feble and leffe then their appetite, the Palfelitle and Backe, their Elzine fubcitrine and thinne, and their egeltion is fallow and fomething foft, with breaming of falling botone from bigh places, fearefull breams and funday banifies.

Signes of a Melancholy perfon.

M Elancholick men are meane of flature, and feldome bery tall, for erceffe colde doth binde the fubffance and fuffereth it not to firetch in length: and although melancholly be dry in temperature, yet they are not little and flender of body, the occafion is (as I imagine) of erceffe cold (by meanes whereof much fuperfluitie is engendered) which fomewhat delayeth the drines, for melancholicke men are full of fleame, and rumaticke matter. Ebeir colour is bufkith and finarftith pale, their fkinne is rough, and cold in fæling, they have bery little or no haire on their bodyes, and are long without beards, yeafometimes beardleffer the colour of their baire

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haire is witkith and flaren: As thouthing their conditions, they are naturally constous, felfe-lovers, cowardith, fearefull without caule, pullianimous. folitarie, carefull, lumpith, inhumanious, felbome mercy of laughing. Coute, flubborne, ambitious, envious, fretfull, obtinate in opinions, of a disps cogitation, millruffull, fulpitious, bered with dologs of the minde, and dreadfull imaginations (as though they were infelfed with euilt fpirits) and are bery fpightfull, curious, fquemith, and pet Slovens, having fmall regard of hanfomenes, high minded, and berg maisficall in behaniour, and retains their anger long, the bertue of concotion is in them berg fieble, yet they have goo appetite to their meate : their Elsine is palith and meane in fubflance and obtale, their order is clayith coloured and broken, and they dreame of dreadfull things, terrible billons, and bathnes.

Signes of a Melancholike fauguine man.

Elancholicke Sanguine men are bigher of fature then me-Llancholicke, foz in them naturall beat is temperate, where. toge fumofities and radicall moifure is meanly engendered, wherby they are meanly bigge, flethie, and firme of body stheir colour is after a barkift reb, their fkinne nelther baro no; rough but temperate in beat and foftnelle, and not bery barrie, they have beardes about 21. pares of their age: As touching their conditions, they are more liberall, bolder, merier, leffe ftubborne, and not fo coward-Dify. folitarie, and penfine, as melancholike perfons, neither to bered with cuil imaginatios as they are:alfo they are gentle. fober. patient, troffie, mercifull, and affable : and to conclude, fogalinuch as this complection is temperate in qualitie, fo likewife it is bone in conditions; foz bertue is a meane betwene to ertreames: Their brine is light faffronith coloured, and meane in fubfrance, their pulfes are temperate in motion, and their ozder reddit and lofe, with breames pleafant, and many times respondent to trueth, their bigettion is meanly frong.

Signes of a Sanguine Melancholicke man.

Swell compace with brines and artires, fieldie but not fatte, they have

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haue fkiane mittly finnth and hote in fäling, and are fomeinhat baitie, and for ie have beardes the colour of their haire is barke alborne, their chekes red, fhadowed with a luteall colour. Their conditions are much tike buto a Sangaine mans, but they are not altogether fo liberall, mery and andations, for they have as it were spice of the inclination of melancholly perfons : their Palfes are great and full, Arine yellow and means in subfance, with order reddith and fomething lose, with dreaming of depe Pits, Wels and fuch like, their digettion is indifferent.

Signes of a Sanguine man.

Sanguine men are of middle forme, their bodyes are well compoled, with large limbes, fieldie, but not fatte, with great beines e artiers, with fmoth fkins, and hote and moiff in fæling, the body hairie and fone hearded, their colour is white intermeded with reducte in the chekes, their haire is browne or fleren: as touching their conditions, they are merry, liberall, bountifull, mercifull, curteous, holde enough, lecherous, truffy, faithfull and of god behauiour: a little thing will caufe them to weepe, and as fone as it is bone, no farther griefe flicketh to their hearts : which is contrarie to Pelancholicke men, for they cannot weepe although it be a matter that concerns them neere, but yet the cogitation thereof is imprinted in their bearts : the Sanguine man bath god appetite and quicke digeffion: his Trine is yellow and thicke, and his order red and firme, his Pulfe great and full, and dreameth of red things, and plealant conceits.

Signes of a Sanguine flegmaticke man.

SAnguine flegmati ke men are bigher of fature then Sanguine, Sbecaule moze superfluities are engendzed in their bodyes, and are of subEance much like bnto Sanguine, their haire is flaren oz ligt Albozne, their colour is like rea, but not intermedled as Sanguine arc: as fouching their conditions, they are leffe liberal, soder, e not fo lech raus, nez so bold as Sanguine are, not so hairie: their baine is subcittine and mease in subff ance, their Bulles moderate, build god appetite, and sigefficie indifferents their of the root in one

one place and white in another; breames of figing in the aire, and falling downe from fome mountaine oz bigb place into water oz Inch like.

Signes of a flegmatick Sanguine man. Louis des grates and the particulation of barries (a

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ELegmaticke Sanguine men are meane of fature, and fometobat große of boby with a fmoth and foft fkinne, and cold in touching :their bodges onhairie, and long without beards, their baire is light gellow og fleren, s plaine and fmoth: Their colour is neither white nog red, but meane betwene both:of conditions, neither bes ry mery, no; much fab, not liberall no; ceuetous, not much aubatious, neither very fearefull ac. The vertue of digeftion is in them fomewhat flacke, and leffer then their appetite, their pulfes are low and little, with breaking of order, and dreaming of fundry fables.

Signes of a Flegmaticke man.

ELegmaticke men are hoatter of fatore, for although much bapois and superfluitie is engendied in their bodyes, yet by means of colones, the lubffance is bounde flaide fro fretching in length, and ret mopfture dealeth it felfe inbacaoth, a maketh them groffe e fatte : their beines and artiers arefmall, their bodyes without baire, they have little beardes, their baire is fieren, their colour is whitich, with fmoth fkinne and colde in touching; As concerning their conditions they are very bull, beauy, flouthfuil fiepy, forget. ful.cowardilb, fearcfall, couetous, felfe-lovers, flow of motion, thamfalt & lober : in them the bertue of olgellion & appetite is berg feble (foz befed of naturall heate) their Bulfe is little and lowe, and their Wine pale and thicke, with egeftion thinne and broken: Bzeames of water, ac.

Signes of a Flegmaticke Chollericke man.

Legmaticke chollericke men are tall of fature and not fo bigge and fat as fiegmaticke, and are more battie, and fconer haue beards: their haire is light Alborne.in ivhich is fome thow of yellow and are temperate in listing. As touching their conditions, they are nimbler, bolder, and kinder then flegmaticke, and are not fo Diowlie,

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besivie, and Auggilh as they are, but merrier, and quicker witted, their face is for the most part full of yellows freckles, and their colour white thadowed with yellownells, their appetie and digelfion is indifferent : their Pulles are moderate and full, their Unine subcitring and means in substance, with order yellow and thickilly, Dreames of fivinining in water, snow and raine.

Signes of a Cholericke flegmaticke man.

CHollericke flegmatickemen are meane of flature, firme and flrong of body, and neither fat nog leane, with great legges and their fkinne hairie, and moderate in fæling, their haire is yellowifh, and their colour is flane og yellowifh : their conditions is not much different from Chollericke men, but they are not altogether fo furious and bold as they, neither fo prodigall, and guilfulls for Fleame doth fomewhat delay the heat of choller, their digeflion is perfect, their Palfes fwift, and their brine light faffron and thinne, their egeflion yellow and hard, with dreaming of battels, frife, lightning and bot water.

The opperation that eating, drinking, reft and exercife worketh in every Complexion.

Mich eafing & Dainking in cholerick perfons (if not ercé bingeffate of the bodie, foa of much failing & abflinéte commeth great betriment to thole perfons, foa it debilateth nature, columeth & body, engendaeth chollericke matter, and fendeth bp fower and bulancage bapours into the mouth, and baedeth aduftion of humoas (elpecially little eating of meates apt and eafie to bigeft) foa if a Chollericke man will paeferne his body in health, let him eat a meane quantitie of meats hard to befie, and a god deale of meates that are fone digefted. Alfo moderate dainking of finall dainke both much paofite, foa it coleth biolent heat which inflameth & burneth, s engendereth natural moiffure which will humed the agred and dayed parts by the rage of choller.

But much drinking of Grong drinke, and hot wines are biterle to be elchewed, for they inflame the liver, and ingender burning Feauers.

Feavers, Beaicks, Erulcerations, and chollericke Buttels, and the bot dropfie called Afheires, ec.

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Duch erercile and labour allo both hurt the Chollericke perfon, for it breedeth Inflamations, adultion of bumors, & Jauders, cuerflowing of the Galle, Confumptions, Pedicke Feauers, Tympanies, Collivenelle, and Tercian agues.

The Collectche melancholicke man may well observe a meane measure in eating and drinking, eschewing meates hard to digest, for such engender tough steame in their bodies.

Let him daink god daink measurably, but let him avoid ercelle of small dainke because it engendaeth congealed fleame and opillateth the pipes sc. And of Grong daink, for it breedeth salt fleame, Itches, and Grulcerations.

Doderate erercife is bery convenient to fuch perfons.

at the list balles and all a

But in Delancholicke cholerike perfons, much eating, byinking, Band reft, are thie champions firining against nature, and engendereth tough and congealed fleame, darkeneth the skinne and increaseth Doppew, oppillateth the pipes, corruppeth the Lungs, and bredeth the Lysicke, and Bledings, Hentosity, Chollicke and torments of the wombe sc.

(And if they will conferue their bodies in health) Let them eate and dainke fparingly, and ble firong dainke and hot wines in fmall quantitie: but let them anoid erceile (chiefly of fmall dainke) for that cooleth the L tuer, quencheth naturall heat, hindreth digettion, bredeth the Dropfie, a repleateth the body with flegmaticke matter, obnebulateth the memorie, and repleateth the head and pipes with fuperfluitie: and after every litle cold taken in the fæte, bresbeth rumes and ache of the mombe. Alfo the immoderate ble of frong brinke, bredeth falt fleame corrupted with choiler, caufing Jtches, and Paurigines.

The Pclancholicke perfon must biterly anoid ercesse in eating and dainking (especially of meates hard to digest, and small brinkes) and ble abstinence, and a bery sender viet, with meats apt to conced, and hot brinkes that helpeth digestion. Spuch ingurgitations of meates and brinkes engendereth

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crudity, and rawnelle of the Romacke, with corrupt and tough congealed fleame, caufing the breath to flinke, head-ache, toth-ach, oblivious field, thore the breath to flinke, head-ache, toth-ach, oblivious fleamers, flures, the flinke, consumption of the Lungs, quarten Feavers, flures, the flinke to Choliack pattion, and the Drophe, called Ypolarca and such like.

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Boderate erercife is very falubations to fuch perfens, foz it helpeth digettion and expelleth phantafies and imaginations, and rofresheth the spiritual members.

Sanguine melancholicke men are of a fironger constitution then Spelancholicke, and may eate melurably of meate light of digestion, and drinke indifferently of Grong drinke: but excessed (chiefly of meates indigestive and small drinke) both fill the bodie with fleame and bentositie, and engendreth thicke and blacke blood.

Poderate exercife confolidateth their bodies, purifieth their blood and clarifieth their fkin : and the like is to bee buder fod in Pelancholicke Sanguine perfons.

Sanguine men néo not be very scripulous in their diet, so that Sthey ercéde not to much out of measure : soz in them the digestiue vertue is most robust and stronge, perfectly concosting the meate and dzinke : such persons may eate measurably of meats bard to defie, r a god quantity of meats which are some digested.

Allo they may drinke a god quantity of smale brinke, but er, celle engendereth clammie and sweet fleame, which oppliateth the pozes and conduits of the body, and ingendereth feauers, the cholicke and flone, and torments of the backe.

The inordinate blage of frong drinkes and hot wines doth inflame the blod, e brædeth hot rumes, Saint Anthomes fire, iquimfles, Plarifies, kings euill, Apoftumations in the Liver, and red Pimples in the face.

Likewife biolent erercife is to be efchewed, for it enflameth the Liver, chafeth the blod, and engendreth the Pellow Janders, ouerflowings of the Galle, and Ephemer feavers.

Is Sanguine flegmaticke men, digettion is meanely flrong, and they may eate and drinke well of meats and drinks of god temperature and apt to digettion : But much ingurgitation of meats and

and blinkes ingendereth thinne and watery blod, the Imall Pore, Ervicerations.cholicke tc.

Let them drinke measurably of drinkes meanely firong, but erceffe of fmall brinke, maketh the colour the whiter, and their bo-Dies the groffer, and filleth the breat with fuperfluttie, and engenbereth Dropfies, Boutes, Ache of the ioynts, Apopleries, Lytharge, and duines of memorie.

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The erceffe blage of fronge bainke, both worke the like effed as in Sanguine men but not altogether fo biolently : moderate erercife is very profitable. saldi al anoison mini ai chippens cintor of

Beman in whole body deame hath the luperiozitie, and blod bath fome bominion ouer the reft of the Damours , let bins Beep a lender diet, and beware of the repleation : for much esting and brinking in fach perfons maketb the fkin talunie, with rawnelle in the fromacke, and repleateth the body with citrine and yellow choller.and foiner fleame, and engendereth the gealeis, builety the wit, abateth courage : let fuch ble bote wines and frong Dzinkes in imall quantity, foz ercelle Dzinking is to be efcheweb; for it maketh the fkin greenith or tawnie, and engendreth bropfies, Coutes, Dockes, and fleame, arcene choler, t bnfanoury fumes in the mouth. Let them ble erercife, fog it clenfeth their bodies of fuperflutties.

"Leamaticke men of all other ottabt to ble a bery fmall and fen-L ber byet, for the blage of abainence and falling belvetb the blacflue bertne, and clenfeth the body of groffe and bnconcoged Bumours:

But contrarily, much eating and blinking quencheth naturall heate, bindereth bigeftion, and repleateth the body with groffehumots and fuperfluitie, brebeth Oitches and bentofitie ec.

If they will conferue their bodiesin health, let them eate and brinke verylittle, and bis meates that will fone be digefted, and ftrong brinke and hot wines.

But let them aboide ercelle of bainking for that engendzeth Duotibians, the Drophe called Lencoflemna, Falling fichnette, Boutes, Greene lichnelle, Humes, Catarres and fuch Difeales as are brevof indigettion. Bucherercifealfois bery falubzious to the

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the bodges of fach perfons, for it ertenvateth grotte Hamors and erpelleth them by fruet and other enacuations, quickneth the memorte, fritreth by courage, and clarifieth the fain.

Flegmaticke cholericke men are of a ftronger nature then flegmaticke perfons, (for in them the bertue of Digestion is quicker) and may observe a meane order of dyet, but erceffe filleth their bodies with yellow choller, a such diseases as proceed thereof.

Allo much erceffe of dzinking engendzeth cozrupt matter, Morbus gallicus, fiftula, sc.

Doberate erercife is commobious to this complexion.

Chollericke flegmaticke perfons are of Gronge conflictution, te may eat and ogink a goo quantitie, flender oyet e abstinence both worke the like operation in them as in chollerick, but not fo outragiously.

Buch erceffe of ftrong brinke inflameth the blod, and ingendereth yellow Jaunders, and Plurifyes.

Let them ble one ercercife moderatly: but beware of violent labour.

Dére is to be noted (gentile Reader)that eract subgement cannot be given byon a mans complexion by any one of the aforefaide tokens, foz as much as they are all variable and changeable :yet of reft.the colour is moff certaine in our Dcean climats, and in health. full perfons, but forreine Climes and ficknes altereth the colour : alfo the Stature, Trine, Pulle, and Dzber of a perfon, changeth after the ozder of byet and health of the partie : alfo the conditions altereth fometimes when grace worketh above nature, or when fome fortunate Blanet is Lozd of the nativity And as for breams, they are altogether variable, one while proceeding of fome inordinate mufing and thinking of a thing, whereby the bertue cogitine is troubled, and imprinteth the fame in the braine, fometimes of the bumoz bred and engendzed in the fomacke, euspouring into the bead : & other whiles the illufion of cuill fpirits, or by the Renelation of and Angels. And to conclude, a mans complexion altereth according to age and diet of the perion, as naturall beat aug-

The beft Remedie, for such an accident, as by experience hath bin approace, is this, take a handfull of Cardus Benedicus, and frampe it small, e temper it well with halfe the white of an Egge, and therewith make a plaisfer, laying it on flaren herdes, binding it hard to the eye, where it shall ly etill it be dryed, and then apply another : and so consequently ble it til your patient be throughly whole: this is also a present remedie for the eyes that are blodthen.
