Fate, and constellation indicative, touching the naturall inclination of Man: Made by Arcandam the learned and expert Astrologian.



the destinie and constellation, is this: First, if yea will know the constellation of any man, take his naturall name, which is commonly called his pro-

per name, and the proper name of his mother, in such sort, as neither of the two names in any wise he changed, or depraced from the vulgar or proper calling (as oftentimes it chanceth by the common appellation of mensionally but that they be perfect, and not diminately and for two causes the name of the mother is taken, and not of the father. First, because

because suc mothers side is more apparent then the fathers. Secondly, although the far ther bee the originall of the conception and generation of the childe, vet the childe, touch ing the body, bath more of the mothers mate ter and substance, then of the fathers. Wet, and oftentimes it happeneth, some part of the fathers feede doth not enter noz ferne, touch ing the materiall composition. For Man is: verily athing active, and by no meanes pali five, and touching himselfe can have no action on. Withereby it consequently appeareth, that t the child, concerning the body, hath more of the mothers substance, then of the fathers. Whereunto a third cause may be added that t for as much as the child is nourithed of the most thers substance, and not of the fathers, that t then the constellation enforcing this effect and figne in the childs bodie, both rather convert the same with the mother, and the body of the mother, then with the father, and the body of the father

And therefore truly and determinately to know and learne the childes fate and confection, his proper name must be taken, together with the natural and proper name of the mother. Then diligently consider every letter of the said two names, and a mong the same, gather the numeral letters, such as significa number, which according to the ancient account are seven: as J. significatione, M. sive, X. ten, L. sifty, C.a hundred, D. sive hundred, A. signification and hundred, A. significations.

Taking

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Taking all and finguler letters of the faid tivo names, aswell the number, as such as fignifica number: then gather the wole fum, which fum fo collected, divide (if it bre possible) by rrix, because of the rrix, constellations of the Starres, or because of the particular fignes celeffiall, which after the ancient manner is the first division of the lignes: And heres by it appeareth, that the principall parts of the particular Starres and fignes ccleffiall, in number arerrix, as hereafter shall appeare. So that the number lignified by the numerall letters of the two proper names aforefaid, oght to be divided by reason of the said signes. And sometimes the said number ooth amount iust to the summe of 29, and sometime excees deth the same, wherein it is to be noted, that either the number both erceed, ozelle it is es quall.

Aftit erceede, then the number ought to be applied, and divided by their builties to the faid lignes, adding to every of the lignes their builties, beginning at the first ligne, which is the head of Aries, and so the rest successively. And wheresoever the last unities shall fall, or be play red, there and in that signe, and in part of the signe, the infant (subose constellation you seeke to know) undoubtedly is borne, and thereby you shall give indgement, and truly pronounce, that in that signe the fate and con-

stellation of the infant consisteth.

potwithstanding, that peraduenture, according to the manner and course of the stars,

times and moneths, some other signe should feeme to have dominion over that nativity. And because that the signe wherein certaines ly the Infant is borne, doth not alone beare rule in the time of the birth, but al ano finguler effectually do concurre, according to the more or leffe in every nativity: fo that eftloones it chanceth, that some signe distinct from that signe appropriate to the moneth, both more effedually rule, and more excellently expresse his effects: Therefore to the intent you map perfectly behold the fate and confiellation of the party that is borne, you must not onely loke byon the figne, allotted and appropriate to the moneth, wherein determinately any is borne: but chiefely you must have respect to that figue, which especially bath dominion as boue others, in the time of the both, not with standing that signe appropriate to the moneth hath the principal effect.

And whether one ligne is more excellent or effectuall then another, you may most certainly and truly know by this art. Let be returned then but o our former proposition, and say, that either the sum of the number signified by the numerall letters of the names aforesaid, both not amount to rriv. or else that it both principally attains to that summe, or is equall, or else exceedeth the same. But now after the agreement a concord of the number, take also the convocation and assembly of the signes celestiall, which are touching their particular parts, priv. as is asoresaid, or pre. as shall be

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faid herafter, beginning at the first particular signe, which is the head of the signe Aries, And wherefoeuer the last unity of this number Chall rest or remaine, that is the special signe as is of most force, in the time of the nativity: but if this number both not lurpalle the number ber of rrie, but thereunto is equall, then the last signe, which is the taile of Pisces, is the chiefest signe at the nativity. Semblably if this number dothercede the number of rrir, then this number is to be divided so many times by rriv, till the number of rriv. be found out: And then for every buity one ligne must be accounted, pelding to every figne his buitp: and then the last buitp, which is rrie, is attribut ted to rrin, and to the last signe which is the taile of Pifces, as was faid a little before, and that signe chiefely hath dominion in the nativity of Infants. But if that number lattly remain ning, be within the number of rrig. then eues ry bnity of this nu mber ought to be diffribus teo to every particular figne, beginning first at the head of Aries: and whereforeur the last bnitp of this number both remine, the same ts the principall figure, and chiefly hath governs ment in the birth of the Infant. Here also ought diligently to be noted, that the celestials lignes may be taken two waies: that is to law, totally, or touching the whole effects of the fame, and are in number but 12. that is to wit, Aries which is the first signe, at which pour must begin, and then follow successively till you come to the figne of Pisces, which is the tivelith)

twelfth) Taurus, Gemini, Cancer, Leo, Virgo, Libra, Scorpio, Sagittarius, Capricornus, Aquarius, Pifces. Doweach of thele lignes, in 1 his whole effect both especially beare rule in the moneth which is appropriate to the same. And enery figne entirely hath dominion over! every moneth, such as thereunto is appointed. And for example, Aries hath dominion in Warch, which is the first moneth, according to the computation of Altronomers. Likewile Taurus in Apzill, and so the rest consequently fucceoing. And although the forelaid lignes! Lingulerly sappropriatly have their moneths especially assigned, as is aforesaid: Vet all thefe 12. fignes in every moneth at all times, every day and houre, every moment, a minute: of an houre, doe concurre in the nativity of e nery byzth, although not equally, yet according to the moze oz leffe: And that figue, which chiefly hath dominion of the nativity, the fame is the constellation of the Infant. Pozeouer, the signe wherein the Infant is borne, al though it bee not that which is appropriate to the moneth, but some other, pet it is easie to be known from the figne particularly appoint ted to the said moneth. Likewise the said fignes map betaken two waies, not entirely, but specially touching their parts, and by ace cepting the same, in such particular wife (chiefly after the reckoning of ancient Aftronomers) they be 26: for five of them, that is to lap, Taurus, Gemini, Leo, Scorpio, Aquarius, are every one of them divided into 3. principall.

pall parts: As into the head, the belly, the taile, and is as much as to fay, into the beginning,

the middle and the end.

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Whereby it followeth, that these five fix gures lo devided, do include fifteene principall partes, for the timestine, make fiftene. And the other feuen fignes, that is to fay, Aries, Cancer, Virgo, Libra, Sgittarius, Capricornus, and Pisces, amongst subom the parts are contained in Virgo, for his table is dinided into twaine, as shall be the wed hereafter, although here it hash but two parts. All which 7. are divided but into two principall parts, to wit, into the head and taile, and so include fouretæne particular fignes: for twice feuen is four eteene. Whereby it manifelly appear reth by the premisses, that the signes particus larly ercepted, are in number rrir, because tistiene, and sourctione, makerrir. Further moze it is to be noted, that in all and enery the foresaid fignes being wolly accounted, acs cording to the manner before remembred, all these twelve are concurrents, either moze oz lesse in the nativity of every Infant. For each man bath in the aforesaidsignes a part and property: as for erample.

The Infant that is borne in Aries, disposeth tis life in that ligne, and in that part of Aries, which is most pliant to his nativity. And specially the part, which, according to the quantity, hath chiefest dominion in that signe, and is the first house of his nativity, which is a significant of life. Ac. And also placeth in the said signe

his spech, wisedome, augmentation of all his inockes, his beginning, his name, and the ocio-

ainall of his life and veeres.

In Tourns is contained the substance of the infant, his gaine or loss, his living, debts, gifts, servants, helper, such as be obedient to his commandements, his witnesses and treature. And this signe, because it is the second

house, signifieth the end of his youth.

Geminiare brethren. This ligne, because it is the third house, is a token of brethren, sisters, friends, neighbours, brethren of husbands, and such as proceede of the mothers side, and sign nisieth the mother her selse. Likewise it is a token of faith, religion, commandements, ambassadours, neives, mutations, small tournies, and a space of life before death approch.

The Cancer, the Infant disposeth his father, disposed her slide; to wit, all his parents on his father slide; to wit, all his ancestors, ascending from the right line males, and his sisters, and other inheritours, except such as are inheristours by the succession of the dead. Also it significant houses, lands, rights, treasures, and shartsoener is hid binder ground, prisons, and prisoners, also such as happeneth to the dead being buried, after the buriall, or without buriall, as estsoones it chances to such as been hanged, beheaded, or otherwise state, and the because it is the fourth house, it signifies beath before he grow to mans state, and the smoot shings.

Leo betokeneth Infants, love, mellengers, novel

nouelties, gifts, rewards, faire promifes, or mirth, goods by the father, and such as thall happen after death, whether it be to praise or

infamp.

In the 6. ligne, which is Virgo, are contained infirmities, and things contrary to health, ferwants, maides, lying, acculation, burighter outnette, places, pulons, mutation from place to place, cattell of small stature. And because this signe is the sixth house, it both insimuate end of life, and all such things as shall happen before old age.

In Libra which is the 7. figne, marriages are contained, milchiefe and perill in marriage, contentions, open enemies, warres, enmitties, theenes, partaking, and oppolition, and enery thing oppolite, participation of marchandile, expedite a finall boyages; and because it is the fenenth house, it noteth the moitie and

end of life toward old age.

In Scorpio is contained death, feare, fadnette, labour, despaire, separation, aide, aduerfaries, policies, wit, lethall popsons, substance of hereditaments, as well of strangers, as of affinity, such as the heires ought to possesse after death, and signifieth, because it is the eight house, end of life after the approchment of old age.

In Sagittarius, being the ninth house, are expected long tournies, or farre peregrinations, and all things thereinto incident. Also it signifieth faith, religion, wisdome, philosophy, writings, bokes, epittles, newes, interpresentations

tations of dreames, and things to come, great i wonders, much honour and toy. And for as much as this signe is Lord of the ninth house, it signifies a beginning, and also entrance into

halfe of the life.

The tenth house is Capricornus, which pressingurates hungdome, government, authoristly, dignities, officers, and all arts that may be exercised, and whereby a man may be a massifier: it signifies also ecclesiasticalliurisdiction, things stolne or carried away, praise, a famerist prognosticates also mothers, grandmost there, and ancessors of feminine kind, most there in law, and halfe the terms of life.

In the eleventh figne, which is Aquarius, thee birth approprieth his power and prosperous constellation, and it betokeneth praise, honour, great fortune, faithfull friends, aide of Kings; and Princes, treasure, society, and significant

halle the pæres of mans life.

Tifces being the rii. house, both demonstrate: signification of wearinesse, ladnesse, pouerty, privile hatred, deceit, seare, sorrow, lamentation, blasphemy, ambulhments, houses, privilens, captivity, bands, rebuke, and beasts.

meete to ride bpon.

In manner above expected is intreated only of the infant borne in Aries, although the same must be divided and spoken of every signe ascending in the nativity of every birth, and of all other signes, following the signe of the nativity, till by recourse the number of twelve be attained, whether any be borne in Taurus.

Taurus, 02 in Gemini, which is in oeder, and is written the third figne, or in any of the thelue fignes. And therefore you thall diligently note, that enery of the aforefaid houses is in himselfe the first, and hath his second, third, fourth, fifth, firth, feuenth, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, and twelfth house. And this remems ber, because the like whereof we have said of the fignes, the same I would Mould be underfood of the houses. And every house, according to their qualities, hath eleven other hous les belive himselfe, of whom their fignification ons be derined. All which (welbeloued reader) may through the derterity of thy wit, be easily bnderstod, whether the Infant be boine in Taurus, in Gemini, oz in Libra, as before. And so enery man may learne to know by this Art determinately his ofone fate, his proper and passine constellation, not forced of nes cellity, but by the naturall inclination, bes cause, as Prolomeus saith, a wise man thau rule the starres: As much to sav: A wife man map let and prohibit the very future effects, which proceed of the Carres and the influences thereof. And fo, if he will, he may rule the faid Narce and heavenly motions. And therefore for an admonition onto thee, the fapo fars do not enforce and confirmine thee to any thing, ercept it bee such as are procline, and will not follownature, rather then reason, after the maner of bruite beaus. Wherefore for a more ruident boarine and instruction of the premis fes, the scheme or figure here en suing is placed. Arcandam.
The first Celestiall, principall, and entire signe, called Aries.



I p the first treatise, the said signe of Ariess to described, with the efficacy and point thereof. Which Aries is divided into the print

principall parts: that is to lay, into the head and tayle. And this treatife containeth fine chapters. In the first, the head of Aries is described, with the efficacie and fortune thereof. In the second, the tayle and force thereof. In the third, the special sudgement of Aries, according to the male. In the fourth, the sudgement special after the semale. In the fifth and last, the general and total fortune of Aries.

The first Chapter, which is the head of Aries, being the first particular signe celestiall, is called Aluathay, and after some mensopinions, Salhay, having source starres disposed in this manner. There is to be understood, that scholoever is borne in this signe,

touching the disposition of the bost of the *
figne, shall be somewhat ruddy,

have a small belly, nimble and straite, thin and leane of body, and shall also have byon his lest some a signe or marke, and the like byon the lest elbow. And iffortune favour, he shall have a mutable inheritance: That is to say, being once obtained, shall suddenly be lost, and yet in short time shall recover it againe. And this part of fortune is by a certaine nature indistrement. Likewise touching the good fortune, the same shall have many friends, and shall have she evill, and follow the good, employing god deeds byon ingratefull and bothankesullmen. Touching the disposition of the mind, he shall be subtile, politike, and crafty. And concer-

ning

ning infirmities and licknesse, the same shalled more prone to paines in the head then to any other disease, therewith he shall be behemented by beyed, besides which disease the health shall be god and prosperous. And for a more apit advertisement of the fortune of this signe, Therefore to the universall chapter of this signes. Aries, where is intreated the entire effect and generall fortune thereof, and is the fifth chapter of this treatise.

The second Chapter mentioneth the tayler of Aries, or the latter part thereof, which according to the signe particular, is called Allothay, and of some Albuthou. This signe hath source starres, one in the tayle, and three in

manner. Where is to be noted, that

And touching his life and manner thereof, he thall live three? score pieces, and then thall ware sicke, but if he thall dance to recover that sicknesse, he Mall live fourescore peeres, and then dre in his bed. Pozeouer touching ill fortune be thall have a Aripe in his face, either with a fword or Cone, and Chall be afflicted with many mifes ries, so that he Mall receive no commodity Avithout lotte and some hinderance. And concerning prosperous fortune, he shall be happy intillage.

The third Chapter, wherein the indement of Aries is remembred, touching the male and both parts of this figue, because both doe concurre in all the effects determinately, especially concerning the said male. Whatsoever male therefore that is borne in this signe, and in every part thereof, after the disposition of his body, shall have a certaine marke in his shoulder, and in his left sote, as is said be-

fore.

Secondarily, touching the minde, he chalbe of good fromacke, studious, proud, inconstant, and lively: And in his first degree of youth, he shall be very contentious, irefull and shames fast. He shall be very conetous, and shall attaine to great authority in buying and selections,

ling, by reason whereof he Mall deny that he hath any substance, affirming himselfe to be: very poze and worth nothing. Inwardly he hall frett with anger, and cannot keepe it fecret, but btal m ter and disclose the same. Likewise he shall bee a lyer, and falle in woods, faining faire speech, amiable countenance, and obedient gesture, and thereby hide his diffirmulation and falles hood, he thall speake one thing and doe anow ther, promiting golden bills, but performer nothing. Thirdly, touching his life and man ner thereof, hee Hall palle part of his life im great authority, and Chall luffer paine in thee m fromacke, and for a womans take thall fus Naine much forcow. And he Chall received in wounds of foure-foted bealts, as of horsess and such like, whereby he thall bee in dangerr in of death. Also about the three and twenty, and fine and thirty peeres of his age, hee thall beer in in perill of poplon. Dozeover, if he escape cera taine dileases, he thall live till the age of foures in fcore and feuen peres, and three moneths. And the Dunday shall be his contrary day: And in therefore lethin mot walh his head, or put on m any new apparell, 02 begin any notable things to on that day, because all such things having it respect to missortune and manner of lining, are infortunate.

Fourthly, touching the good fortune, her shall

Mall have good lucke to other mens gods. De Mall be made rich by his wife, and Chall attain to great substance. De shall eniop great stoze of cattell, and shall daily encrease to further wealth. He thall wander into farre Counin trepes, for faking both his owne countrey and parents. When he commeth to twenty and thice pieres of age, he thall attaine to better things, and thall have to doe with a matte of money. And being forty pieresold, he thall be of great wealth, and amount to great dignitie: such things as he goeth about to take in hand, Hall be brought to great perfection. Dis promotions of offices he shall exercise with much favour. Dee thall not marry his first wife which shall bee allotted unto him, but another, of whom he thall have noble and wor thy children. He thall love and be daily connersant with the Tatholike Gurch. And to speake universally, such as are borne in the time of the day, thall be fortunate, and in great favour with Princes and Poble men: but if in the night, they be unfortunate.

The fourth Chapter disconcreth the indgement of Aries concerning both parts, and the efficacie of the same, especially touching the Female. Therefore the maide that is borne in this signe, thall have in the mtost of her body before or behind, or by on her feete, certaine naturall markes, and a haire depending down to her feete. Likewise touching the disposition of her minde, the shall be diligent and painefull; She shall be faire, curst, and curious of MB 3 things

She Mall have many children by her hulband, and thall be called a mother of other mens chil den, but her first begotte shall ove. And touch ing her cuill fortune. The thall be hurt of at foure foted beaff, and subject to many perils.

The firth Chapter of this treatile mentioneth the generall fortune of Aries, where it is to be knowne, that the figure Aries, touching both parts, fignifieth fortune in warfare, and the feruitude of others. Likewise fortune in all kinds of merchandise, especially in red things, blody things, and in fire and blod, in the shambles, and in every fact done by fire, it

Concerning the first chapter of this treatise, wherein the head of Taurus is spoken of, which is the third particular figne called Adoldaya, hath feuen farres disposed in this fort: And is to be noted, that thos

foeuer is borne in this figne, first, * touching the disposition of the box * by and binacity, this signe shall * be of colour pure, of body fat, faire and with

out spotte, his lips thicke and hanging dolone, his Cature Chort. He Chall have a beautifull face, his haire long, but very faire, and shall have many marks in his body:but the speciall marke hall be in his necke, because he hall be very happy. De thall have great eves, of colour like a Cat, or blacke. Touching the disposition of the minde, he shall be much aided and fuccoured, and of his aiders thall receive nohurt, he thall be adventurous and of god courage. And touching his life and manner

thereof, he thall be greatly troubled with paine of his heart. The first terme of his life shall be at twenty and foure. The fecond at feuenty: In either of these termes he shall be wonder: full licke, but in the lecond terme he thall luf

in the throte, which if he escape, he thall live to fourescore, but in the end he shall die of the said Apostume. Touching the influence of this figne, he thall be bitten with a Dogge, and Hallhaue a notable fripe with a frone oz yzon. Likewise pou mall understand, that if it chance the Infant be borne early in the more ning, he thall be thick and groffe. And toudying the disposition of his minde, he wall be pleas fant, apt, and bold, and chiefly in his youth, but he shall be of an opzight conscience, and a good companion. If he be borne in the first part of the night, he thall have a great note, and a final head. He thall have many friends, and thall have a delectation in funday kindes of pleas fures.

The first entreateth of the head of Leo. The second of the belly. The third of the taile. The fourth

fourth of the indgement of Leo touching the male. The fifth of the female. And the firth of the equall fortune of both.

The first entreateth of the head of Leo, which is the 11. particular ligne, and is called Algebachac, having foure starres

disposed in this forme. And note, that imploeuer is borne in this

figne, first, touching the disposition

De is also couetous and very irefull, and yet not with standing, of much mirth and pattime, in formuch that continually he would be merry and play: he will be a wife man and proper, and the Magicke science will doe him great fead, like wife touching his life and mas ner thereof. He shall be much vered with the headach, in such sort, as he shall be straught of his wit, by reason of the fumes which ascend from the Gall. He chal bepained in his thighs, thiefly in the opper parts thereof. He thall have three principall diseases, the first when he is 13, pæres old: the second when he is 40. years old, if he also escape the second, then the third he thal feele about 48. which also if he reconer, then shall be attaine to 100. peeces, and ejs ther he thall due byon the two:ds point,o: else by some grienous infirmity of the body. And according to his prosperous fortune, he shall palle from one promotion to another, in fo much as among kings and Princes he Chall be familiar and well beloved. He Chall get much treasure, and bring it heaped together. De Hall lose them againe, and at length thall fall in danger and displeasure of some Weere. 02 Pobleman.

The second Chapter intreateth of the belly of Leo, and is the twefth particular figure, be-

ing called Alcomencon, and hath foure fearres formed in this manner. Althere note, that who so ever is borne in this figne, hath a marketious early and bufortunate

cnoffellation.

manner thereof, whether he be borne in the night or day, hath abroad brest, a long face, mallstones, and sender legs, and bath a natural mark in the reines of his back. A outhing his minde, he is of heart proud, or irefull. Horestons he is angry, t is of speech rusticall. He is bery doubtful and suspicious in his doings.

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Touching his good fortune, he thall have no good fate, but by vertue of this figne thall be most unfortunate, as is aforefaid. For he that is borne in this figne, is subject to much trouble: if he be borne in the day, he thall be bery fearefull and timozous when he trauais leth: if he be borne in the night, what houre for ever it be, saving the second, then he shall be of a merry countenance, and shall have a round nose, a stripe opon his head, and a naturall marke bpon hits feete: hee thall be witty, fear full and careleffe: hee thall have thee difeates. whoseliberty, this figure notwithstanding, may be applied to god and to vertue, and to works godly, who also may appeale and mitigate the influence and malice of the said signe. And if he passe and escape the said three difeases, then naturally, and with happinelle enough, hee thall attaine to fourescore and eight peres. In like manner, touching his good fortune, he thall with good successe abide the brunts of malice, and the state of his life. He chall have dominion over his Country, and thall banquith his enemies, although he chall object himselese to many afflictions and dangers, from the which he thall by Gods help right wellescape. From thirtie peeres byward he thall aspire to his better fortune, and then thall fee his fubstance augment. Df honozable personages he thall purchase much wealth. and thereby his house shall be plentifull of monep, abundant of riches. Concerning his ill fortune, he shall have a fall from an high place, and thall have pappe in one of his feete, and by water thall fustaine trouble. He shall not keepe his first wife. Tuelday shall be his contrary day, wherein if he be wife, let him doe no new matter, or begin any enterprise.

In the fifth Chapter is intreated the judges ment

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ment of Leo toudying the female, who according to the manner and state of her body. Shall have a broad breff and finall thighes, which are tokens of bolonelle and foutnelle of flomack. She thall be very mentruous, and fertill es nough, notwith Canding the Chall have but few Chilozen, with certains other conditions of her body, before beclared in the z. particular fignes. After the disposition of her minde, the minde Mall be naturally subtile, witty, and desirous of learning. She Chall be chaffe, Chamefalt, courtlike, diligent, and of god fomacke, by reason whereof, the thall bee very prone and ready to anger, and pet thall be foone againe : in appealed, and notwithstanding her anger, in pet inher own houshold very liberal, by whose ! meanes the house thall be plentifull of meate: m and drinke. And because of her naturall subtilty, the thall be very bold, for as much as whatsoever the heareth or seeth, if it seeme to compaile any subtilty or difficulty of matter, in immediately the will befire to know it. She is liberall, because the cannot keepe close such i things as the bath. She is very lowly and humble:and, if the chance to be spotted with any finne, immediately the will fall bowne: proffrate byon the ground, and humbly afker him mercy & forginenes of her Treator. Concerning her life and maner thereof, the thall fuffer lunaticke pallion, and a notable paine of her heart and fromacke, which if thee escape, the thall live till the be fourescore and five: peeres of age. She thall also be payned in her:

her toes. Shee Mallhaue fufficient reuenges ment boon her enemies: And after her cuill fortune, thee thall have many fortunes. For first, the thall have a fall from an high place. ano her body butt with pron or fire. Tahen the is the and twenty peresolo, the thall be mare ried, and by her hulband attaine to promotion. Her husband thall not livelong, but thalf ove by meanes of poylon or witchcraft, and at length hall marry another, who shall love the dearely. Of her neighbour the shall res ceive dammage in her treasure. When the is twelve veres olde, buleffe the take god theede the thall be deceived by oppetheon by on her body, and shall lose her maydenhead. she thall be troubled in the water, and in danger of life.

Thursday is her contrary day, and theres fore let her doe no notable thing byon that nul day, walh her head, or put on any apparell. And here is also to be noted, that the best remedy to avoide all her misfortunes, is first to addresse her selse by prayer to our Lord God only, with all her heart, and to carry about her precious stones, such as beorient and glisses ring: and then easily the thall overcome all

her miladuentures by Gods helpe.

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The firth Chapter determineth the generall indgement of Leo, and is to be noted, that this ligne bath a lingular fortune in warfare and dominion: belides which, they that bee borne in Leo, have paines in the stomacke, apostumes, and pestiferous agues. Such as be boane

boane to the service of great men, the same this figne presenteth to their service. He shall be fortunate to gold, braffe, horfes, and fuch mer chandife as be of colour reddoct from the midit of Datober to the most of Aprill, and from the midf of July to the midft of August, he shall prosper, other wise not. The fifth treatile of this boke entreateth of the firth entire and Celestiall signe, called Virgo, with the three principall parts there of. The first being the head of Virgo. The second, the first part of the taple, and the third the second part of the same, and is divided into sire

fire Chapters. The first Chapter mentionesh the head. The second, the first part of the tayle. And the third, the second part. The fourth, the indgement of Virgo touching the male. The fifth, the female. And the sirth, the common and indifferent fortune of Virgo.

The first Chapter determineth the head of Virgo, being the source earth particular signe

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called Laxa, and hath five starres in this forme disposed. And he that is borne in this signe, shall be faire and beautifull, and of cornely starture, white byonhis brest, but his haires shalbe red. And force by of this constellation, he is naturally

inclined to have cirled haire and red, and by nature loueth the same, in so much that if he have not such haire of that colour, pet he will feeke to have the same coloured by art. De shall also be naturally marked in the face, belly, thigh, and legge, and byon his right elbow, and the faid marke cannot by any meanes be put away. Concerning the disposition of his mind, he thall be honest, skilfull, apt, thamefast, a los ner of inffice: his minde thall be god, and his voice behement * loud: he shall be as simple, as a Lambe, have no regard or care upon the gods of the world, or the gods of Fortune: he Mall knownothing that is god, nor thall take heede to any man, but thall trustiall men: be thall take no regard of harmes therefulth he might be infected, and that by reason of the fourenaturall markes byon his face, belly, thighes.

thighes, and legges, aforelaid. And by force of the same he shall be very negligent, imploping no care byon his owne affaires, as is as foresaid. But if he would take heed, no doubt he migh being them to god effea: he shall be belirous and couetous: he thall be prefull and sudden, and by reason of his sudden forelight of offence, he thall prevent the anger of his brethren. Touching his life and manner thereof, if this man be borne in the fourth houre of the naturall day, hee shall die without any ficknesse: but if he be borne in the fifth houre, then before his death he thall be very licke: he thall have foure termes or principall fickness les. The first, when he is 15, peeres of age. The second at 22. The third at 36. And the fourth and last at fifty. Likewise touching his good fortune, the man so borne, shall have a and face, and by reason thereof shall eralted, and have great preferment: he thall have Children, and ifhe would ble diligence byon his own butinette, he thould profit very much, especially in tillage. Then he is 26. peeres old, he shall be preferred to honour and dignity: but if he be borne in the first houre of the naturaliday, then he thall be a great King oz Lord. But if in the third houre, then King of all kings, a mighty Soueraigne: he thall have great prosperity, and thall gather to himfelfe infinite treasure: when he is married, his wife thall line but a thost space, the himselfe thall die with her, or within a while after: and although he shall be abundant in children, vet feiv

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few of them thall line. He thall fall into many mileries, because he thall be pained in the belief, or in some other place. He thall moreover be marked in his pring parts. If he be borne in the fourth hours of the natural day, then thall he die suddenly without any disease. He thall be divorced from his wife, wherefore he thall have great heavinesse and sorrow.

The second Chapter entreateth of the first

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Alecaneth, and hath five Starres *
Chaped in this forme, and is the 15.
particular figne. Theologuer is *
borne in this Signe after the bordies disposition, and first according *

to the quantity: hee thall be high in Nature: he hall have a broad and large face, and a beautifull, a long and great beard, a faire note. After the qualitie of the fame, he shall have faire haire, narrow eves, and all his body Mall be white. He shall be naturally marked in the forehead, in the opper lippe, by on his Moulders, the palme of his hand, in his belly and guttes. After the disposition of the minde, he Mall be wife, his counfell thall be heard and apt to every thing. He thall be low: ip, god, devout, and shall love to be praised. He shall by nature attaine to live 62. væres. and shall die before he be old. And touching his god fortune, he shall have two wines, which I hall be very hibitantiall and rich, infomuch as by them he shall possesse great riches. Likewise he shall be very apt to enery thing which

which hath a good end. Concerning his euiti fortune, he shall be bitten of a dogge in the face, and on his body: he thall have few chilpren, and they thall not be long lined, but thall by ope in Chort space. Further, all such things as we we knoken of this Chapter, are generall, and the trenerally belong to all such as are borne in his figne. If the party borne in this figne haps ben to be borne byon the Friday, then he thall aue great missortune. If he be borne in the hight, then be thall have a naturall marke by on the crowne of his head, the bell v, the face of wte, and thall have great feete. And touching he disposition of the minde, he shall be an bo right man walking juffly, seldome erceding he path of equity. Likelytle he thall have two rifeales especiall, whereof the first shall be then he is foureteene veeres of age. The o her at fine and fifty, or at threelcore and eight, ind thall die in his owne house, but the cause if his deaththall be a Aroke with year, or a wood. After his good fortune, he thall marry to wives, and one of them thall have a very mall necke. Like wife he shall have much by meanes of his children. Also touching his enill ortune, in old age he thall fal into the aldom of man of honour or power, and thall be ffrice sen with yean, and in his own house thall dre of the faid froke. In getting of riches be thall ake much paines and labour, and Crangers hall enjoy the fruits of his trauaile.

The third chapter entreateth of the second last part of the tayle of Virgo, called Aliena, being

being the 16. ligne particular. There is to be noted, that wholoever is borne in this figne. touching the disposition of his body, and the quality thereof: bee thall have a faire fature. and a fimple countenance: he thall have at naturall figne not able to be put away, bponi his right elbow. According to the dispositions of the minde, he thalbe honest, apt to learning. wife, god anothamefall: he thall be very com uctous in tillage, but in other affaires he thall be remiffe and negligent, whereas if he would take beede, he thould greatly profit. Likewifer touching his life, he that is borne in this figne. and especially if he beborne in the fifth hourer of the day, he chall naturally have 3. lickness les, whereof the first thall be when he is 12. pieresold. The second when he is 32. pieres old. And the third and last then he is 40. verest old. If he chance to escape the 1. which will be very dangerous, then he thall be afflicted with the 2. which if he escape, then he chall attaine to the 3. And touching his fortune, before he bor 6. he thall attaine to certaine honour and of fice: he thall have many children, and thall profit greatly intillage, as is aforesaid. And if her would be carefull a diligent, he should greatly profit in all matters: his evill fortune is, that helhallfall into many troubles, by reason ber Thall be much pained in the belly, or by some other meanes shall be extremely bered. He Thall have a stripe byon his head, or his face. or bpon both, but notably in his pring parts, there he shal be greatly pained. And although

His unfortunate day is Fryday, and that day ever is somewhat infortunate: his good fortune is toward the South, and therefore lethim dispose his affaires that way, together with the doze and bed. The same is naturally of the melanchos like complexion, and is of nature cold and Dep: Therefore his apparell ought to be of some parke or black colour.

The fifth chapter touchesh the iudgment of Virgo concerning the female. Therefore note, that the maide or woman borne in this figue, shall bee marked in the said places as is described

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described in this Chapter precedent. Touch ing the disposition of her minde, the thall bee witty, Chamefall, chaffe, gentle, beneuolent, and glad to please all men, whereby the chall be beloned of all menibut the shall be somewhat curff, and that onely belongeth to her euill foz tune. About 17. pecres of age the thall mare ry, anoher first husband the shall not love, tho shall die, and afterwards marry the fecond: her first childe shall be of excellent beauty: the shalve entrapped with many for owes. She shall suffer divers maladies, which if the escape, she shall line 70. yeeres, 6. moneths and s. dapes: her fortunate dapes be Wed nelday and Sunday: her infortunate day is Saturday: therefore upon that day let her be gin no new worke, but abstaine from all notas ble businesse. They that beborne in this signe, as well men as women, thall fuffer much paine in their thighes, feete and head. Her fortune is towards the South, ec. as in the former Chapter, and both kinds thall be like rall.

The firth Chapter compaileth the common foatune of Virgo: where is to be noted, that they boane in this ligne, have their foatune in tillage, and all things generally thereunto appertaining, especially in all things that bee sowne. They be subject to paines of the thighs and feete, as fishulaes and such like, ache in the head, dropsie, the sire or collicke, besides others before mentioned. And amongst other countries, they shall visit the city of Jerusalem,

ther countries adtopning. And their god fortune or chiefe dominion is toward the South. Their fortunate dayes are Sunday, Tuefday, and Mednelday. Their infortunate day is Friday and Saturday, but Friday, to them that be born in this figne, is ever infortunate. He that is borne in this figne as aforefaid, is melancholike, cold and dry. And therefore let him weare blacke apparell, or such as be of darke colour, and of no light colour, because this figne is altogether mediancholike, that is to say, earthly.

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the effect of the seventh celevial signe called Libra, and is divided into five Chapters. The first determineth the head of Libra. The second, the taile of Libra. This signe hash but onely the said two principal parts. The

third Chapter mentioneth the indgement of Libra touching the male. The fourth, touching the female. The fifth and last, the generall and common fortune of Libra.

The first chapter of this treatise intreateth of the head of Libra, which is the 17. particular signe, and hath source starres disposed in

this forme.

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Wee it knowne therefore, that abosoever is borne in this ligne, first touching the proportion, and disposition of his body, hee shall be faire in the face, well favoured, painefull and learned. As concerning his life and manner thereof, he thall suffer paine in his head, heart, and gall: he thall have a paine in his necke, and in histopats. De thall have their speciall diseases. The first when he is 15. yeres old, which if he recover, he shall have the second at 38, which if he likewise escape, he thall attaineto 80. peeres, and then thall lufter his last and finall infirmity: touching his good for tune, being borne in the second houre of the naturall day, he thall be the chiefest of all his kinne, and although he be of power and aus thozity, pet the execution thereof thall not be profitable and prosperous: he, after his enill fortune, Halllose his first wife : he shall be in danger of the Aword, therefore let himtake and heede thersof.

The second Chapter of this 7. treatise argueth of the taile and later part of Libra, which is the eighteenth particular signe, called Alcabenech,

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benech, having two starres bispoled in this fort. Where note, that wholoever is borne in this figne, touching the disposition of the bos ov, thall be beautifull, and thall be naturally marked in the head and mouth, or neeve the mouth: he shall be hurt opon the mouth, and his face thall be red, his haire fmoth and red. Touching his cuill fortune he thall be hert with a fword: he thall liefe one of his boncs: he thall die ei ther by the Aripe of a Aword, or else of the pain of the belly: he challfall into a riner, but thall rife againe, and thall be in danger of fire, and in the end of higlife thall fustaine powerty.

The third chapter entreateth of the indgement of Libra touching the male: where note, that whosveuer shall be bosne in this signe,

Towards Arangers he will ble flattering words, and flucte communication, but towards his owne fernants, if they be enil, he will ble tharpe and croked woods: he thall be suspected of a great crime, but it thall be so close, as it cannot be proved : he thali suffer a great paine in his necke, topnts, and belly, and Mall have three especiall sicknesses. The first thall be when he is 15. veres of age. The fee cond when he is 38. And the third when he is 90. at what time he thall die. Concerning his god fortune, in his youth he thall be neither pozenozvich, but afterwards he shall accuinulate buto himselfe great substance: he shall occupy and have to doe with other mens mos nep:he that triumph over his enemies. The first chapter describeth the common and universall fortune of Libra, Where note, that

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that Librahathhis fortune in beaffs equitable oz apt to be rioden, especially if they be of colour ubite. Likewise Libra his fortune is in all faire things, and in the bargaine's thereof, especially if they be white, and generally in beautifull things belonging to worldly beclas ration, diefly to womens apparell, and in all things proceeding from the water, and in all things that be transported from a farre, and that be of smallest waight. They borne in this figne, are aboue others given to imbrace learning and the Audy of the Sciences. The god and fortunate daies are Munday, and Friday. The bufortunate day is wednesday. They borne in this signe, shall be troubled with infirmities and diseases of the belly, as with the discentery, licentery, aripings, and other paines proceeding of winde, and thickly about the backe bone. They be naturally of fanguine complexion, and thereby hot and molf. And because he is fortunate in things that be white, therforelet him vie white apparell. The good fortune of this figne is towards the West. And therefore his house, bed, and all his affaires, such as be notable, are to be directed that wav.

The eighth treatise enteteth of Scorpio, the eighth signe celestiall, and containeth sire thapters. The first speaketh of the head of Scorpio. The second of the belly. The third of the taile. The fourth of the indoment of Scorpio touching the male. The fifth touching the female.

generall fortune thereof.

The first Chapter entreatesh of the head of Scorpio, which is the 19, particular signe, cal-

led Alchait, and hath senen starres
in this manner: where note, that
whosoever aswell male as semale *
being borne in this signe, first, *
touching the disposition of the book *

dp, is well coloured, and hath much haire: his body faire and white, fauing that his note is foule and deformed, his evebrowes narrow, and his chekes small: he bath a markenaturall not far from his note, bpon his left fote and thoulders. Also the like byon the palme of his hand, and byon the leg: he shall be courteous of speech, discrete and profitable in many artes: he shall be beloved with his parents, neighbours, and friends, and especially with his parents, and such as he los ueth, he shall liberally enrich with much gods and honour. The second Chapter maketh declaration of the belly of Scorpio, which is the 22. particular signe, having thee ***
Narres shaped in this forme: for this some is borne in this signe, shall be faire.

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and not pet pure white, but mirt, somewhat dis posed to red; and shall bee red headed: his mouth and head thall be great, and thall be of a meane and comely fature the Chalbe a great pratter, and notable letherous, angry, and therein very vehement: his anger shall be dif poled to milchiefe, and ready to revengement, much like an adder and although he be one day merry, vet another day hee thall bee fad: hee thall doe much mischiefe. Likewise touching his life and manner thereof, first, in his backe he thall suffer much paine: he shall be natu rally afflicted with an infirmitie in his heart and stomacke. Thee especiall sicknesses hee Mall have during his life: The first, when he is 15. yeares of age: the second when he is 36. the third and last, when he is 49. wellous to contradictories) that is to far, to in-Tice and burighteoulnelle, to lolle and gaine. to truth and falshood, and all by reason of the concurrants of the opposites and contrary fignes, and pet not with ffanding the figne that is of greatest force, shall beare the chiefe rule touching the premises. Touching instice, he Mall be naturally given to honeffy, he shall be iust and of much equitie, and in all his affaires greatly inclined to instice. And touching the contrary, hee Chall bee a great inventor of newes, a tale-bearer, a lier, beceitfull, envious and falle; prone to deceit, as well by his loke, as by his laughter. He thall be full of discord, and a fower of debate, thiefely amongst bre= thren and friends, whereby it appeareth that he is naturally enclined to iniquitie and unright iteoulnelle, and craft, and deceit, not with frans ding his nature also to the contrary. But vet the figne of most force, as aforelaid, both prins cipally beare rule in his nativitie. And to fap any thing touching his life and manner therelof, touching his future inclination, wee cammot, for almuch as the concourse of the Garres in this nativitie are adverse. Likewise concerning his god fortune or indifferent for tune, this man at one time thall want, and at another time thall have fufficient. Dee thall baue three wines, the first shall be a Widow; the other two thall be Wirgins, but the last Malbury him. And some affirme, that he that is borne about the end of this figne, shall bee of neither kind, oz both (that is to lap) as well male as female.

The fifth liane declareth the effect of Scorpio, concerning the woman which hath her res course to the parts of this signe before mention ned in each chapter. Potwithstanding ouer and belides the premiles, thus much is to bee

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spoken.

spoken. For first you hall note, that she hall be of a friendly condition, obedient, feruiceas ble, fearefull and Chamefall: Shee Chall bee weathfull, and have him in deadly hatred, that both her any displeasure: She thall have childeen by their husbands, and with them shall live in great felicitie: She thall vanquith her enemies, but pettill the be thirty peres of age, the thall fultaine much licknes: nevertheles, of Cattell the thall have abundance, and many people halbe bnder her gouernment: but pet in her youth the that abuse her body in playing the harlot, if the force of the imminent constellation do take his effect, the Chalbe bitten with a dog, and in the end shall be blind. Of her bee threnland parents the thall receive much frous ble. Saturday chall be her bufortunateday, therefore by on that day let her not walh her head, put on any new garments, or doe any other fact. The firth chapter entreateth of the generall fortune of Scorpio: therefore thep borne in this figne, are naturally mover, flegs matike, or languine; and such thall be lingus larly fortunate of all things that be of colour red, and buying and felling of all fuch. The like fortunate in things facible, or to be forged in the fire, ertrahible, 02 fifereunto belonging, and in marchandile of unknowne things; & there fore as much as hee can, let him weare such garments as be red. The like fortune in Warfare and Tillage, and in all beafts belonging to the fame: fortunate in hospitalitie, whether it bee done for money lake, lucre, or for Gods sake.

fake. The infortunate dayes be Thurlday and Saturday; the rest bee god, especially Tuesday. He thall be insected with the Thirage or gout in the hands, & it Saturne bee found to be ascendent, then he shall have great paine in the toes. His fortune is toward the South, & therefore let him dispose his affaires that way, as also his chamber doze, bed, and window.

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The ninth treatile maketh relation of the ninth celestiall and principall signe, called Sagittarius, which is divided into two parts (that is to lay) the head and taile, containing sine Chapters. The sirst intreateth of the head of Sagittarius. The second, of the taile. The third, of the judgement of Sagittarius concerning the male. The fourth, of the semale. And the sisth and last, of the generall fortune there of. And over and besides the said sine Chapaters, there is a generall rule next after the second Chapter, not with standing the generality mentioned in the end of this Treatile.

The first chapter intreateth of the head of Sagittarius called Albaham, and hath eight

startes fallyoned in this manner. Where note, that inholoeuer * * * is borne in this ligne, first touch: * * * ing the disposition of his body, * * hall a beautiful body comely to

behold, long and tall, and throughout beautifull, alittle head, a thick face, a faire nose, white teeth and thort. Upon the left part of his head, he shall have a stripe, and the like byon the crowne of his head, his lefthand, his singers, armes, and teates, and against his heart. Decis nimble, wife on his feete, and very expedite in running: heeshall have a natural marke byon his privile members: hee is of colour blacks, whose face shall be like to them that have the grænesicknesse. Louching the disposition of the mind, heeshall by nature have a god wit, and a sharpe, and therewishall con-

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L'ant and firme. De thall loue wife men, and thall embrace all such as bee of discretion: therefore touching this part of nature, and the naturall constellation, bearing rule in this nativitie, he chall acquire unto himselfe posses ston with wife men. And although that bee have a covetous mind, naturally disposed to auarice, by reason of the concourse of certaine Starres, pet by meanes of the dominion of this ligne, he thall be trudious of good things, and thall be enclined to bertue, and especially to the vertue of liberalitie: And therefore her thall not bee much inclined to the opposite oz confrarie, noz yet to extoat other mens gods. And because principally he is bent to vertue, it will follow, that he thall be of great author ritie, and exalted in high degree of honour. Mozeover, although he benaturally inclined to liberalitie, and not to rapine or ertortion, yet he thall be procline and given to many be ces, that is to lap, to pride, couetoulnelle, leches rie, and gluttonie, and thiefly to pride, little es stæming of other mens doings, oxfapings, bery haughtie, infomuch, that what soever ques Rion any doe aske of him, he shall get no and Owere at his hands, and by reason of his pride aforefaid, he shall be a great cauiller, lier, chider, and full of contention. He Chall have a bes ry pestiferous and benemous tongue. And als though he be naturally inclined to a certaine spice of liberalitie, for that he will couet to pos lesse nought briustly, pet he shall be desirous to get substance, and couetously to enjoy it; mereby F 4

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whereby consequently it appeareth, that wolf ly he is not given to covetousnesse, but to cers has taine spice thereof, to a desire to have. Like wife, he is enclined to lecherie: For with three women specially he shall have to bo, but some times by natures impediment, hee Hall not protect his feede, although he be very desirous thereto. De is much disposed also to gluttony, thiefly to eating of hearbes, and in his meate doth greatly love them. Furthermore note here, that the premittes doe not onely belong to the Dan, but to the Moman also subject to that constellation. Concerning his life and the manner thereof, he thall be long ficke, and thall have a paine in his heart : hee Mall have their specials sicknesses: the first when hee is twentie peeres of age: the fecondition he is 47. the third and last, when he is 80. Touching his good fortune, he thall bee in great estimation and honoz. Hethall have many children, and amongst all, he shall have a twinne, or two borne at one birth, and of them he thall feethe third generation. De thall attaine to his fathers inheritance. In all his affaires he thall prosper, seeing daily his gods encrease: hee thall come into the world with his owne flar, (that is to lav) he thall enion all things according to the influence of his figne: he Chail fall into ariner, but he Chall escape drowning: he thall tole the most part of all his goods, and shall fall into the hands of his ene my, and sometimes into the hands of a womana sheesenemie: he shall be bitten with a beaff

beaft in the middelt of one of his fingers of his right hand, and thall die an erile out of his countrey: his most dearest friend beloved above others he thall leefe, and he thal be wonderfully troubled with divels and other spirits.

The second Chapter describeth the condition on of the taile of Sagittarius, which is the twenty fourth particular signe, called Albeyda, and

it hath seven starres fired in this

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manner. He that is borne in this * * *
figne, first touching the disposition *

of his body; hee shall have a body ***

comely, rudov face, red haire, narrow epe-browes, epeslike a cat, hee thall bee bolo and beautifull to behold, naturally mars ked byon the head, his left fide, and byon his right notivill. After the disposition of the mind hee thall bee very ready to anger, and therem also thall be sudden, and the paine being past, be will be some appealed: he thall be of an ercellent wit, and naturally given to the erercife of riding and thoting: he thall not be circums spect in his doings, not pet foresæing in things that may happen: he thall have much paine in his guts and in his head, especially he thal fuffer the feuerall ficknelles: The first when he is 21. peeres old: the fecond, when he is 62. peeres of age: and the third, when he is 80. And touching his god fortune, if hee doe not take away, or remove the naturall marke which thall bee byon his right buttocke, oz right nostrill, then his consellation thall bee prosperous. Wit if the said marke be violent-

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ly removed from the place, then his fate thall be hindred and empeached: he shall be valiant in armes, and therein also bidozious. But if the houre of Saturne doe concurre with Saturne in his nativitie, he Mall be impotent by reason of the influence of that planet, & there fore thall with great labour attaine to any commoditie, and with much difficultie acquire: his former god lucke. But pet notwithstan. ding the impediment of Saturne, if the markes! aforefait bee not taken away, vet he thall obe taine the victorious feates aforefaid : but if his: mother perhaps one take away that marke from the places aforelaid, forme euill hap map chance bato him; for he Mall have muchadoe; to repell the influence of Saturne. The fair markes doe behemently relift the malice of the planet by reason of their notable vertue; fo that Saturne shall doe no great hurt, al though he doe somewhat hinder. And touching the euill fortune of the man borne in this ligne: of Sagittarius; he shall be in many troubles: he hall be burt with hot burning von the hal be in danger of theeues, not onely by travels ling by the way, but also in Cities: he shall ale to lote and forgoe many pollettons purchated by himselfe, which shall bee confiscate and take ken from him through the malice of certaine naturall markes, whereof one thall be in his fones, and another byon his left fide, by force whereof, hee shall shortly after lose his sight. Likewife, thou thalt have in remembrance this rule following, touching the taile of Sagittarius,

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tarius, generally appertaining to all men borne in this tigne. 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fubtile and very warie about his doings, fo that he will not disclose his secrets to any ma, but secretly will keepe them to himselfe, and the same will very finely keepe hid in his brett for that almost hee is mistrustfull of all men: he hall be with many vices encumbred, because hee isnaturally given to bee agreat fornicator, and one that will bee some angry, and when his anger is once done, then he will otter much faire and gentle talke somewhat iopned with conetournes: hee thall be scabbie, and very full of itch. He shall be affected with two notable and firong ficknesses; the one when hee is three and thirty precess of age, which thall be so behement, that hee thall frand in great hazard of life; which if he escape, then hee thall have the fecond, which thall happen then he is four elcoze and eight peeres of age, thereof he thall ove. Semblably, touching his god fortune, the first childe that he shall have, thall be a sonne. He thall have to his friend a Peere of a Kealine, with whom he thall owell in household, and thall possesse other mens gods. In like manner touching his enill foza tune, heeshall beein vanger of three severall fraies, and her that thould be his first wife, hee Mall not enion; and by the malice of others, he thall bee in displeasure with his friend afores faid, and pet in the end he fhall overcome their malice, and be reconciled to his friendship as gaine. De thall be hurt with yzon, buleffe was rily he take heed thereof.

Sunday is his contrary day, therefore on that

terpzife, noz wash his head, noz put on any

new apparrell.

The fourth Chapter of this present Treas tile describeth the indgement of Sagittarius touching the female. Anoheere to learne for to know the disposition of her body, you must repaire to the chapters of the head and taile of Sagittarius, which is before recited, where pour thall find many things spoken of the female borne in this ligne. And touching the disposis tion of the mind, the thall be very much given toarts of Pagicke, and to Witchcraft, and by reason of the subtiltie of her wit, thee shall put the same artes in practice. She shall be ves rp curif, carefull, mercifull, child-bearing, and a great lyer. She thall incurre great perill, especially for one offence that the thall come mit for which offence thee thall beebrought to iudgement: which perill if the escape, then thee mail live till the be the escore and eight pieres old: the thall fully accomplish her fate. And ale though thee bee subject onto much malice and danger, vet the thall obtaine the victorie ouer them all. She thall have two hulbands, where of the second thall be the better. Sunday thall be her infortunate day, and for that cause let her attempt no new enterprise, or other noble or new thing.

The fifth and last Chapter makesh rehears sall of all the generall fortune of Sagittarius: And first, the man borne in this signe, shall be fortunate both in the Law of God, and also in

The one halfe of the life shall be fortunate, and the other halfe bufortunate, not only in daves! and houres, and in moneths or weekes, but al to in whole veeres, by the number of fire; that is to lap, by lire and lire; lire god peeres, and fire bad veeres.

The male or female that is borne in this moneth, hath his special fortune placed in the Mest; and therefore towards that part of the world, let him dispose all his doings concerning his bouse, his done and his bed, and all

of Capricornus.

The first Chapter entreateth of the head of Capricornus, being the 24. particular signe, and is called Astadab, which hath

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three Stars disposed in this manner. Where is to be noted, that the man borne in this signe, touching the disposition of the body, hath a faire body, and comely fa-

thioned, especially in his youth, it shall not be properly blacke nor white, but somewhat given to bee red. Heshall be naturally simple, lears ned, and wife: and pet not with Canding very incredulous, and hard of beliefe; informach as he wil belieueno man, although he sweare: he thall be angry and cholericke, and in his anger bery novous and hurtfull, a man of blod, and greatly thirsting after the blod of his ene mies: so that if he chance to have the superio oxity over his enemies, he will destroy them all, 02 the most part of them, if not with his owne hands, pet by the meanes of others. He thall be very crafty and fubtile, and that bre fainedly, and pet in his doings and true deas ling, very inft, and a great louer of truth, do ing the thing that he goeth about, with much thought, although therewith some crast bee included.

included. Dis gate and going very crafte, al though outwardly it thall not appears; Titho in his age thall be very profitable and goo to many. This man both naturally love the trim ming of his body, and hath so great delight in his olune beauty, that he thall thinke none to be like unto himselfe. And his speciall respect Mall be towards his head his beard and haire. Likewife, by reason of the vehemency of his naturall complexion, he is by nature much in clined to fleepe after meate, and at the table, which commonly he putteth in practife. Like wife, touching his life and manner thereof; touching diseases and sicknesses, there is no thing to be found certaine in this Chapter. And yet in the fourth Chapter, where the indgement of Capricornus is entreated concerning the moman, it is read, that they borne in this figne, thall have on speciall and princip pall difease when he is twenty and nine veres of age, which if he escape, he wall line till he be an hundred and eight veeres of age. And touch inglicanelle; he thall be naturally diseased. and fingularly affected with the paine of the heart and fromacke, whereof he shall ove. Alfo touching the enill fortune of this figne, ve Mall understand, that they borne in this signe, that is to lay, in the head of Capricornus, aco coeding to the force of the conffellation, he thall be deprined of one of his members, and some of his teeth.

In the second Chapter of this tenth treastile is expressed the tayle of Capricornus, which

is the 25. particular Signe called Actraldabor, having two Starres placed in this-fort, where is to bee noted, mo that whosveuer is borne in this figne, after the disposition of his body, he thall be very beautifull, white and from haired, faire eyes, hiseped took beoines well made, his colour pellow, and Malli bit benaturally marked in the face, and also im his body with many funday markes: that is his to fap, about his necke, and neere onto him epe: he thall have thost lippes, in so much that the for the thortneffethereof, when he speaketh, her this thall thew all the teeth in his head: he thall bee well learned, and somewhat bent to be proud. which thall bappen even by nature. He thall bee the a fower of come bon other mens labours: that is to fap, he blethother mens doings too it the commendation of himselfe: heeshall destant pife all men, and be a great praifer of himfelf. despising others, and greatly standing in his own conceit: he shalbe irefull and fierce in dans ger, infomuch that he shall be greatly offended in with his owne parents: he shall bee very less to cherous, and a louer of all forts of women, and especially be shall commit abultery whith nines funday women, besides all other single a coms mon women, and notwithstanding this his areat defire and affection to women, some times by witchcraft and forcerp, he thall be letted from committing fornication with dia ners women. Likewise he thall be a notable great drinker. But not with Aanding the vices aforea

aforesaid, whereuntone thall be much apt and inclined : pet he thall be a tuft man, and much inclined to instice, a despiter of enils, and a great louer of his companions. And there he thall be naturally given to be a deinker, pet in his meate and diet he shall be very spare and temperate: he shall seele great paine of his bead: but pet the second paine, that is to sap, the paine in his belly, thall be great in him : he thal also in his going be troubled with a paine in his legge. Also he shall have eight speciall ficknesses. The first, when he is 14. peresolo. The second, when he is twenty. The third, when heeis 21. The fourth, when he is thirtp. The fifth, when he is fix and thirty. The firth, when he is four and forty. The fewenth, when he is fire and forty. The eighth, when he is threescore. Then by force of his constellation on, he shall die through the weakenesse of his members. Dozeoner, touching his god for tune, he thalf have two formes, and thalf res ceive inheritance from his progenitors. And his end thall bee better then his beginning: be thall be naturally given buto the merchans diles of Goates, and therein thall be both for tunate and lucky, if hee will diligently follow the same trafficke. Likewise, touching his euill fortune, he Chall be subject to the hand of bis enemies: he thall be deprined of one of his members, and thereby thall be mained; and before the time his of beth, he that fuffer many and funday great troubles at the hands of no blemen.

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The third Chapter determineth the indues ment of Capricornus, touching the male. And for the manchild borne in this signe, there is: nothing found certaine touching the disposition on of his body in this chapter, and thereforee recourse must be made to the signe wherin there male childe is borne; that is to lay, to the heate of Capricornus, ozelle to the taile, and there there truth concerning his corporall disposition may be found. And pet not with flanding (over and belide the premiles) such one bath a little head, hollow eves, and a foft freeth, And touch inghis minde, he thall be very incredulous and hard of beliefe, infomuch as them that Iweare, and confirme their favings with oath. he thall not credit. And therefore like as here thall not believe others, even to it is meet than others thall be as hard of beliefe to him, anti Mall not credit his words, though hee binder them with eathes. De thall naturally be vern subtile and secret in all his affaires, and there in he shall be a subtile and a crafty deceiver and a bold lufferer and bearer of advertities Likewise he is naturally curious, irefull, and therein bery sudden and mischieuous. bling a mischienous and bugracious fomacke, and therefore with great difficulty hee Chall rec turne to his former quiet. And not with stam ding the aforesaid vices, he shall be naturally given to be civel, honeff, aimiable and pleafanti Mozeover touching his life and manner there of he thall be full of ficknesse: but if hee ell cape the very behement ficknesse (which shall happ

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happen when hee is twenty peeres of age) hee Mall line by force of his constellation, 58. peres, unlette some naturall impediment of any particular of universall cause opposite do occurre anohappen. His life thall be thortes ned by reason of the truncation and cutting offlome of his members: he thall be married to two wines, and the second he shall marry when he is one and thirty veeres of age, which Mall be his better wife, by whom he Mall be greatly enriched: he thall enter into other mens labours, and enion goods gotten by o thers: he shall treade the ground of many countries, and at length thall returne to his owne countrep, and to the place of his natiuis ty, with great gaine and substance: he shall have to doe with much treasure, and chall eniov part thereof.

And as concerning his entil fortune, he shall suffer much advertify in the place where he was borne. And for that he is naturally subtile and of a mischievous minde: he shall suffer much trouble, and pet shall overcome it well enough. His first wife shall die before he be 31. peeres old. Sunday is his contrary and unfortunate day. Therefore upon that day let him attempt nonew fact, or any notable enterprise. He seemeth to be of a melancholike complexion, and therefore he hath his fortune chiefly disposed toward the sporth part. Here thou shalt diligently note, that he which is borne in this signe, shall be borne in adultery. And this signe, shall be

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The fourth Chapter of this tenth treatife, describeth the indgement of Capricornus touching the female. And thoushalt note that the woman borne in this signe, bath nothing in this present chapter that is certaine, touching the disposition of the body. And therefore lake in what part of this signe soener she be borne, there thou shalt finds her naturals and

corporall disposition.

and there with also thou thalt have recourse unto the next Chapter ensuing, and the differ rence thalt be found to be areat betweene both the kindes; for almuch as the bodily dispositive on, as well the flature, as the other compositi on of either kinds are indifferent and equall. Mozeover, touching the disposition of the unive, The woman chilo borne in this figue, thallbe bery wife, and a giver of god counfell, informed as by reason of her great wifedome and confideration, the chall be acceptable to all forts of men. She thall attaine to a good fate and constellation towned with much top; and meane of her wit. She thall bring her devices to god effect. She thall be naturally of mentobe of curlt heart, very hot and wilfull, specially in those things touching the disposition of her wit, and policy, and thereby very delicous to know such things as be most plealant unto her. With her neighbors, and specially fuch as be most acquainted with her, the thall be very courteous and friendly. She that

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be some abalhed, and desirous to see the world, and therefore thall tranell in buknowne play ces. She thall receive hurt of a foure-foted beaff, whereof if the escape, the Challtick foures fcoze pæres. Likewise touching her gwd for tune, the thall be called a mother of children. for that by force of her conffellation, the that! be chilobearing and apt to children, especially to Somes: The Challallo be abundant in foure forted beaffs, and after the is past the age of 40 peres, her time following thall be more profperous. And concerning her euill fortune, the thall be hurt of foure foted beatts, and thal be very fearefull upon the water: her lucke of uer her cattell Mall not be very prosperous. Sunday is her unfortunateday, and therefore byon that day let her attempt no special mats ter, especially of any great effect.

The fifth Chapter of this tenth tread tife, having his title of the generall and bninerfall fortune of Capricornus, is thiefly fortunate aprosperous in husbandry, and in all kinds of beatts and cattell concerning the fame, and in all waighty and ponderous matters touching earth, and that which is possible to be done with earth, with Crones, with woo, and the hides of the bealts before remembred. Likewise in buying and selling of graine, and other heavy matter abundant byon the earth, and especially growing in the same. This signe is prosperous in dull and heavie beaffs, as Affes, Swine, Dren, and such like, and in all kinde of workes pollible to be done 05 4 with

with great and painefull labour. The man borne in this figne thall be more healthfull in travell then in doing nothing. Likewise this figne over and beside the particular events, is much disposed to impositumes of the stomacke, to the cough, and to instantions of the liner. Also his time touching his indifferent fortune, is divided into two principall parts, not onely in dayes, weekes, and moneths, but also in pieres; for the time is divided by the number of sine, because continually there that be sine good vieres and sine bad. This signe also extendeth his fortune towards the South; and therefore let him dispose all his whole as

faires (if hee minde to prosper) that way; and from that time let him ble to weare blacke garments.

Arcandam. Aquarius the eleventh Celestiall and principall Signe.



The 11. treatise making mention of the 11. signe called Aquarius, is devided into three particular parts, comprehending sire severals. The first, containeth the head of Aquarius. The second part, the belly. And the third, the taile. The fourth, the male.

The fifth, the female. The firth and late, the common and generall fortune thereof.

The first Chapter maketh declaration of the head of Aquarius, being the twenty sirth particular signe, hathtwo starres

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framed in this fort, and is called Aftrad. There is to be noted, that * Wholoever is borne in this figne,

thall be beautifull in his face and body, bauing anaturall marke in the head, the breft and left fote: the colour not altogether white, but somewhat disposed to blacke, and as the colour of honer. Touching the dispolition of the minde, very tearned, but natue rally brings, and a over of much wrong, very delirous to walke after meales. And not with Standing the naturall inclination to the doing of lozongs: he is of nature godly, pitifull, pas tient, and a loner of companions, and pet he is somewhat enclined to the contrary, as to implety and godlinelle, iniquity, and right: burighteousiesse, instice ano mercy. Desgall be so pittifull, that he shall accuse no man, but rather be an excuser. His chall naturally suffer an itch in the head, and a paine of the heart: he thall have two naturall ficknesses. The first, when he is twenty pieces of age. The fecond, when he is fifty: he thall be greatly ho noured, and from many troubles which he thall fuffer, almighty God thall mercifully deliver him. And his fortune thall be indifferent: that is to fav, sometimes having sufficient, and at other times also be maillacke. Also a dog thall grie:

grievously bite him byon his thigh or leg: he shall wander into a strange land, and in the midst of his wealth and substance much advertity shall happen.

The second Chapter of this present treatise bescribeth the belty of Aquarius, which is the

27. particular figne, called Alchadabra, and hath twelve Starres formed in this fort. Whosever is borne in this figne, thall have a goody body,

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well complexioned and made. And this Body thall be white

naturally, thall have some naturall mark in his face, backe,

and elbow. His body thall be naturally full of holes, and that have been his head a blow or stripe with a sword or dagger. This man also thall be very wife, meeke, chaste, and thannefast, and thall imbrace truth and bertue: he Mall feare God, and defire to doe rather good then euill, to which god qualities he is naturally given. And by reason he is tender, he thall have no naturall force to do any actua all or corporall labour, and confequently not ginen to walke much. He thall be pained in the reines of his backe, and that have 3. difeales, the first, at 29. the second, at 37. and the last, at 90, veres of age. Concerning his god fortune, although he thall eniop in his ownecountrep, no kinde of office or promotion, vet in a frange countrep he thall attaine to much honour. Toncerning his enill fortune, he

he chall suffer much trouble, and sunday discommodities over and besides the viting of a dogge, or some other beach, either by on his arme, or legihe chall have much entil fortune by meanes of his parents, for they shall be taken from him by death, and from them shall receive no kinde of inheritance or substance. And by force of this constellation, he shall end his life in a Grange country, and in the water.

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The third chapter of this treatife describeth the taile of Aquarius, being the 27, particular

figne of heaven, and is called Algassarall, which hash two Sarres placed in this manner. Withere is to be noted,

that phospeuer is borne in this figne. First, touching his bodies dis polition, Mall be faire of body, and of a rud. dp face, thost in Cature, and somethat bold. Touching the quality of the mind, he shall be naturally very letherous, and greatly given to the love of Momen, behemently defiring their company. A great furfetour, greatly oc cupping himselfe in banquetting and belly there, frequenting the same without measure: he chaive very couetous and decirous to have; for what he feeth, he will couet to have. Which bices not with Canding, vet ginen to quietnes, greatly embracing peace, and concord, and much abhoring discord, avoiding the meanes thereof as much as lieth in his volver. Like wife, he wall be indued with a certaine fren fy, and hall by a naturall licknes in a frange countrep

countrep yeld fourth his breath. Three principals termes or diseases he shall suster. The first when he is twenty yeares of age. The second, when he is sine and forty, and shen he shall be in great danger of death; but if hee escape the same, he shall line an hundred and twenty yeares, and three dayes. Likewise touching his good fortune, hee shall line a long space with his wife, and shall get much substance and riches: and although hee shall have great losse, yet hee shall have plenty. Touching his cuil fortune, hee shall be without a head, and deprined of his parents and brother: in a strange countrey he shall end his life, as before is remembred.

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The fourth Chapter entreateth of Aquarius indoment touching the male. And to learne the disposition of the body, recourse must bee made to those things that be reported in the three chapters before mentioned, where very largely is intreated the particular fortune of Aquarius. Duer and belides, he shall have great audacity of speech. Semblably touching the disposition of the minde, and specially concerning his life, he thalbe couetous, lectrerous, prone to anger, contentious, a lier; because he thall speake one thing, and doe another, and that thall be by force of his principall constellation. Potwithstanding the said vices, he thall be very wary and circumfrea, wife, politicke, truffing in his owne wiscome, and thall have a certaine excellency of art and knowledge. Carefull over his affaires even from

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from his youth, fingularly beloned, Court like, honest, and good. Honest he shall be. for that he thall be conversant with the hos nest. Good he shall be by vertue of the con-Wellation, and therefore naturally enclined to godnette, fingularly imbracing all things god and honest. Dercifull, for that he shall extend the same to such as have neede of mercy, spe cially opphanes and widdowes, to whom he shall not onely be pitifull, but a benefactour and defender. He thall wander into many places, and thereby, by little and little shall be enridged. Likewise touching his life and man ner thereof, he thall have two special sickness fes. The first, when he Hall be 36, peeres of age, which hall be very behement and danges rous, whereof if he be acquitted, then he thall feele the other, when he is 90, peeres of ace: and of that last disease without faile be shall die. Inlike manner, touching his good for tune, he shall be happy, for that he shall bee skilfull in art and knowledge, whereby he shall attaine to preferment: he that have the charge of many and divers fummes of money, and by a ftrange man thall (buloked for) entop great treasure. And concerning his entil for tune, his abode Mall not continue in the place of his owne nativity, but wandzing abroad. thall perambulate trangeplaces, and in them Mall continue. And not with Amoing, this his peregrination and dwelling in fuch places, is moisterent either to good or entil fortune: therefore as feemeth to me, it tendeth indifferently both

both to good and evill fortune. We that is thus bome, his first wife shall not long tarry with him, and after the is dead, all things thall have more prosperous successe with him. And the losseals of this wife, as specially I doe note, feemeth not to me to belong to enill fortune. but to indifferent. Likewise byon the water he shall be very unfortunate, which by nature he thall abhore: he thall be enterapped with many and funday dangers, and amongst of thers specially with his wife and woman. Sa turday is his contrary a buhappy day. There fore byon that day he must attempt no notas ble enterprise or fact, nor vet byon that day walh his head, put on new garments, or dog other nouelties remembred and spoken of in

the treatife before.

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The fifth Chapter of this eleventh treatife, describeth the judgment of Aquarius touching the woman. And here is to be noted, that the woman borne in this figne, touching the dispos fition of her body, thall be delicate and tender, and by force of this constellation thall have a marke in her right hand. She Gall be true. faithfull, constant, witty, and of a good complerion, and disposed to all goodnesse, special ly to mercy and pitty. Likewise touching her felse and manner thereof, thee thall have a great disease in her eyes, and shall have two speciall licknelles, wher of the chiefeff and most dangerous thall be when thee is eight preres of age. And the second the thall have (if the chance to escape the first when the is four escape

pieres old, and then thall die according to the eff at of this constellation. Also touching her god fortune. The thall abound in children. She thall be enviched with other mens gods, and Mall attains to an indifferent wealth. Then the is 15. veres of age, fortune thall favour her better, and the chall enion a better crate. Aduch euill fortune hal happen unto het in hertime, and amongst others, her god name thall be blotted with infamp, and shall be demed with the corruption of her virginitie, and Mall have erverience of Arange places, and be bervodious to her enemics. Her first husband thall put her from him. She thall be burt with fourefoted beafts, or thall be very necrethe lame. But it fremeth to me the thall pattine-

ly receive hurt or danger.

The firth chapter entreateth of the common and generall fortune of Aquarius, which confisseth especially in tillage, and in beats meete for tillage together, and in all beaffs of great quantity and fatnelle, as Alles. Adules. Bine. Dren, and such like. Likewise, fortune inbuildings, in earth, in Cone, in wood, in hises of beafts, especially the beafts before remembred. Furthermore, it is commanly, and for the most part fortunate in those things which be done with great labour and exercise, most part fortunate toward the West, theres fore they must dispose their affaires that way. The Sunday is unfortunate for them, there fore that day let them not one any new notas ble worke, as is faid in the other treatifes. Thev

They shall be bered with long Feuers, Augitiotans, a cold. According to the vertue of the constellation, their time is divided into 15: so that the first 15, pieces going before, are god and lucky: the 15 peres following, are bntucky and bnfortunate: and neverthelesse in the god fortune of the first 15, pieces, the Sunday is alwaies bnfortunate. As touching the good fortune of the first 15, pieces, among the bnfortunate daies, the Tuelday and saturday have the principall popul in the god fortune. The twelfth treatile of this boke speaketh of the twelfth and last principall signe of Beauen, called Pisces, and is divided into two principall parts, the head and the taile. This treatile containesh five chapters. The first maketh mention of the head of Pisces. The second

ment of Pisces for the Male. The fourth of the indgement of Pisces for the Male. The fourth of the indgement of the Female. The fifth and last, of the common fortune of Pisces, both of the Male and Female together.

The first Chapter maketh mention of the head of Pisces, which is the 29 particular signe

of Heaven, called Algasaysar, and containeth two Stars thus set. He shat is borne in this signe, shall be white and soft of body, and namely, of a white face the shall have a large

breff, a comely beard, a faire fores head, faire eves, more blacke then wite: he thall have many naturall markes on his body, by the which, according to the vertue of the constellation ruling, he shall be naturally inclined to fivelity and wisedome, but rather he thall be faithfull and wife indeede. Mozes ouer, he shall have a naturall marke byon his elbow, or in his forte, and shall peraduenture lose one of his members, or else it thall faile him: he thall be of a smiling countenance, merry, and louing pleafure anoplay, natural to enclined to equity: but pet couetous, accoze ding to the conicture taken of his consellation. And though he be naturally subject to the paine of his head, he thall be healthfull, of a found wit, and of a wholesome complexion. By the vertue and livelinelle of his complerio on, he shall line naturally theéscore and ten pseres without any notable ficknesse, fauing the head ache, which he Mall oftentimes have.

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As concerning his good fortune, he thall get in much money, and pollette many pollettions, he thall have three wives, and thall be trough bled with the third. When he thall be in publike office, many would hurt him, and pet thep shall doe him no hurt, because of their weakes nelle, and finally he thall lurmount them: for their enup and malice thall have no power as gainst him. As concerning his evill fortune, he shall fall into many advertities and troubles, by his consfellation: pet not so, but that all these foresaid things in these chapters be generall as touching the influence, and efficacy of the signe, and that they doe appertaine generally to all that be borne in this signe. Foz if it chance that any be borne in the third houre of the day, as touching the disposition of the body, he thall have a naturall mark in his nostrels, thall have long eyes: concerning the disposition of his minde and wit, he shall be a very suspect man, hard of beliefe, and therefore not believed. As concerning the maner of his living, he chall have a great licknesse and fer a vent in his nostrels, so that by the ferventnesse of it, he thall ope where he was borne: he thall have three grievous licknelles. The first at 27, pieres: the second, at 54. the third, at 60. and then thall dre of that ticknelle, if he escape the other two, ozelse be in great danger. As concerning his good fortune, although by the effect of the constellation, he should fall into a river, pet he shall be saved from it, and shall rise out of it agains if he fall in, which thing belongeth

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longeth to his good fortune: he thall have manp children: he thall be mighty, and rule in To lands. By the mercy of God, and the godnette of the constellation, he shall escape from all his troubles: as concerning his suill fortune, he Mall fall into a river, as is aforefaid: and also into the hands of a mighty man, and into much trouble. Det not with francing that these things doe appertaine to his euill fortune, they thall have good iffue and end: for hee thall bee deliuered from these berations, as afore is saio. Whereof it followeth, that this fortune is enill by accident. Furthermore, because of the marke that hee thall have in his notizels, hee Mallbury his parents, which he that lofe according to his constellation. Thich thing belongeth formewhat to his enill fortune. De thal lofe forme of his tempozal gods, which he thall have goften with great labour, and thall wholly bee spopled of them, 03 of the most part of them.

The fecond Chapter maketh mention of the

taile of Pisces, which is the thirtieth and last particular signe of Peauen, called Lauten, having twentie Starres, set and disposed in this manner. We that is borne in this signe, being in the first houre of the day, thall be faire of loke, having faire eyes, faire face, and faire of all his body. We thall naturally have many marks.

Asconcerning the mind and wit, he thall bee wittie

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wittie and prudent, and amiable, his voyce ivell founding, and liberall more toward frangers then to his neighbours. Strangers thall have much riches of him that is thusborne. De Chall have their vehement sicknesses: the first, at twenty and eight pæres: the second, at fiftie and live: the third and last, at four escore perest flue months, at the fecond houre of the fifth moneth: he Hall be a good while without children in wedlocke, pet he thall have many: he thall have a charge in a trange countrep; but he thall dwell in his owne native country: and if it chance he be borne at the fecond houre, then as touching the disposition of his body, he thall be marked in the breff, and in his finger. Asconcerning the disposition of his mind, he Mallhaue naturally all the lignes and marks that he thall have, which is borne in the first houre, or in another, fauing the fecond houre; for he that is borne in the second houre, is nat turally liberall, and pet conetous. Asconcers ning the manner of his life, you mult say of him that is borne in another houre, as of the other that is borne in the second houre of this figne: hee thall bee abundant in victuall and riches: he hall out-line two wines that he hall marry, by whom heeshall have his gods and possessions: he shall be mightie and strong by Sea and by Land, and thall have a sonne of power and might, of whom he thall see great things, and thall have generation of him. Some of his members thall bee diminished, and if heelcape fuch a pattion, he thall fall no moze

more into it, which thing appertaineth to his good fortune: anofinally, he thall bee belivered from all advertitie. Touching his evill fortune, he thall lose some of his goods hy violence: he thall fall into a river, whereout hee thall rise againe, and thall take no hurt at all, as is aforesaid: he thall come into the hands of a puissant man, from whom he thall be delivered: hee thall lose by violence much riches which he had gotten, without recoverie, or hope

of recouerie.

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The third Chapter determineth of the iudges ment of Pisces for the male.
