# The first part.

Ake Sage of vertue, Rue, (other= wise called Herb-grace) Eldera leaves, red Bramble leaves, and wormewood, of each of them a good handfull, ftamp them all together, and then straine them thorow a fine linnen cloth: & put to the juice a quart of perfect good white Wine, and a good quantity of white wine Vinegar : mingle them all together, and put thereto a quarter of an ounce of white Ginger, beaten to final powder, use todrink this Medicine every morning faiting ( for the space of nine dayes together) the quantity of a spoonfull at a time, and this will (by Godshelpe) preferve you for the space of a whole yeare. The

The Kings Medicine for this present yeare against the Plague of the soule, and the effect thereof.

Ake the berb of Tertue, (the doing of god, Pfal. 34. 14.) and the berb of Patis ence (other wife called a wapting byon the Lozo, Pfal. 37.7.) where with pollelle your foules, Luke 21. 19. In feed of Herb-grace, take another, called Chrifts grace : and in the place of Gloer-leaucs, Elders Examples, following and imitating the Clears of Frael, I Chron. 21. proffrating pour felues before the maieffie of God. Let not two things be the ingredients of this Spirituall kings Medicine, which are in the corporall, the Bramble and the Wormewood. Leaue out the proud Bramble, and his leaves, for he would exalt himfelfe above the other trees, Indges 9 #5. Decondly leave out alfo the bitter worm howd of hate, anger and envie: and accoading to the counfel of God (the belt jahplician) Deut. \$9.18. Let there not be among you any room of bitterneffe and Wormewood. In feed of theis two, take the humble Figgetree and his leaves, who would not exalt himfelfe above others, Indges 9. 11. Mingle herein the broad Figge-leaves of lowlineffe, humbling your Gives under the mightie hand of God, 1. Pete

Miethis ( ] fay) not for the space of nine dayes together, but the whole yeare, yea all the dayes of thy life. So continuing in the Lozd, Phil. 4. 1. and being not weary of well doing, 2 Thef. 3. 13. And this will ( by Bods belpe) pre= ferue you from the Plague of the foule, and the infection of the world. I fay not a whole yeare ; but all the life time, till again & the future refurrection, both with bady and foule, thou mayeft lius eternally.

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F it fortune, that one be striken with the Plague before he have taken the former Medicines : then take the things rehearfed and put thereto a' poonfull of Bettony water, and as much Scabin us water, and a pretty quantity of fine Trealeand temper them well together, and let the Patient vie to drinke it often, and it will excell the venome or poyfon forthwith. But if the Botch doe happen to appeare, then take a good quantity of Elder-leaves, red Bramble leaves, and Mustard-seed : stampe them well together, and make a Plaister thereof : apply it to the fore, and it will draw forth all the venome and corruption.

#### The second part of the Spirituall Medicine.

Fit fortune, that thou art firiken with the Plague, before thou hast taken in the former Kings Medicine of repentance, then take she things afore rehearled : and left in thy affliaion thou wax impatient, put thereunto, not the Balme of Gilead, Jerem. 46. 11. But the Spirituall Treacle and Mithridate of the confideration of Gods will and Providence, Pfal. 39.9. opening not thy Mouth because hee doth it : and holding that, nothing can happen whto thee without his appointment. Further, that thou shouldest not distrust or despaire of the remisfon of thy finnes, of the health of thy foule, and of the goodneffe and power of God the Phyfician ; In fleed of Betony water, put thereunto a good quantity of that Aqua Benedicta, of that ble fed water of Gods mercy, praying with David, Take away, O Lord, the trespasse of thy fervant, 2. Sam. 24. 10. and wash me that I may be whiter than frow, Pfal. 51. This will coule the heat of thy confcience, and comfort thy weary bones. Adde as much of the water of life, Ich. 4. 10. which is powered into our bearts by the holy Ghoft, unto everlasting life. Fetch it by prayer, of Christ the Phyfician and Doctor of our soules : for hee doth give

give it to quench our thirst, John 4. 14. Put hereunto thy Baptisme water, representing the blood of Chrift lejus : It is one of the three witneffes I John 5. Affuring thee of the remission of thy fons. Leave out Scabious mater : I meane that Scabby-holy-water, with the Bulles and Indulgences of the Anti-christ: forit will make thee to i get scabs and fores in thy foule, and bee vnto thee, not the water of Life, but the water of in Death. Adde also a good quantity of that in comfortable Treac'e of hope, with the confideration of the future glory, being fure that thy Redeemer liveth, and that thou shalt fee him the with thine eyes, 100 19.25. Mingle and temper thus well together, this Patience, Faith, Confidence and Hope, and let the Patient that is infected with either of them both, vieto drink this Kings Medicine often:let all hislife . ( in health or in fickneffe ) be a continuall reis, pentance and Meditation of those things, & it in will expell the venome of his fin, of impatiin ence, distrustfulnesse, and immoderate feare. But if the filthy botch of impatience, distrustfalnesse, and immoderate feare doe happen to de appeare : then in steed of Elder-leaves, take a good quantity of Elders examples : the Faith of Abraham, Patience of lab, the hope of David, and take (my brethren) the Prophets for an example of patience in fuffering adverfity, Sam, IV.

Sam. 5. 10. Further, take also the Mustardfeed of Gods word, Math. 13. 31. with the excellent commandements, admonitions, promifes, and comforts contained therein : mingle these together, confider upon them, make a Plaister of them, apply it to thy fore, it will draw forth the venome and corruption of impatience, distrustfulnesse, and immoderate feare. The Mustard feed, as Plinie doth witnesse, is both purgativum, & Curativum, it purgeth the body of ill humours, and cureth the venemous biting of a Serpent : Even fo the Spirituall Muftard feed of the Word, purgeth' and avoydeth the evill humours of the foule, and healeth the venemous biting of that old Serpent the Devill.

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# Sundry Medicines for the Plague.

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Those that feare the Plague, and are not Infected, let them take of this drinke bereafter following, which is twife in every weeke halfe a spoonfull at a time : it hath beene observed, that never any one dyed of the Sicknesse, that did take it in time.

T Ake three Pints of Malmesse, a handfull of Rue, as much of Sage, boyle these to a quart: then strain out the herbs, & then take an ounce of Long Pepper, Ginegar and Nutmegs, all beaten small in a Morter, and put into the Wine, and boyle it a little, then take it off, and put into it one ounce of Mithridate, two ounces of the best Treacle, and a quarter of a pint of Aqua-vite, and put all into the Wine and so keepe it.

#### Thevse ofic.

If any be infected, take one sponefull of itas soone as the party doth presume himcelfe infected, luke-warme, and so goe to bed, and sweat two or three houres, and then dry the body well, and keepe warme, and sinke no cold drink, but warme drinke and Cawdels,

Cawdels, and Pollet drinke with Marigold leaues, and flowers, when the party hath fweat s is well dryed with warme cloathes, and fo long as the party is ill, take a fpoonfull morning and eucning.

## These things ought duly to be looked nnto, viz.

TE is very conventent that you keepe your houles, freets, yards, backlides, links, and kennels fweet and cleane, from all Ganding Puddels, Dunghils, and corrupt moy-Aures, which ingender Kinking lauours that may bee noplome, or breed Infects on : no2 luffer no doages to come running into your houles : neither keepe any (ercept it bee backward in some place of open av 20, for they are bery cangerous, and not luffera. bls in time of ficknelle, by reason they runne from place to place, and from one house to another, feeding byon the bucleaneft things that are caft forth in the Areets, and are a molt apt cattell to take infection of any ficks nelle, and then to bying it into the house.

#### To cat.

lete Cat Sorrell Maped in Ainegar, in the Ingg nogning falling, with a little bread and rea utter : Sorrell fauce is also bery holefome Geb? gainst the same.

To drinke. Take Rue, Wormewood, and Seabius, fleep't in bar: Ale color

Ale a whole night, and drinke it fasting every morning.

#### Another.

The root of Enula-Campana, beaten to powder, is a speciall remedie against the Plague, being drunke tasting.

#### Another.

If any feele themselves already infected, take Angelics water mixt with Mithridatum, drinke it off, then goe to bed and sweat thereon.

# Another speciall Prefervative.

Take an Egge, mike a hole in the top of it, take out the white and the yolke, and fill the shell onely with Saffron, rolt the shell and Saffron together, in embers of Charcoles butill the shell was yellow : then beat shell and all together in a Poster, with halfe a sponsfull of Mustard-seed : pow io some as any suspition is had of Infection. diffolue the weight of a French Crowne in ten sponsus of Poster Ale, drinke it luke-warme, and sweat byon it in your naked bed.

## Drinke for ordinary Dyes.

So neere as you can, let the Patients ordinary drinke

#### For Vomiting.

Vomiting is better than bleeding in this afe, and therefore provoke to Vomit so neere is you can.

## To provoke Vomit.

Take three leaves of Eastrabecea, stamp it, and drinke it in Rhenish wine, Ale, or Posset Me.

If the party be full of große humors, let imblood immediately boon the right arme, n the Liver beine, or on the median beine, i the fame arme : so as no lore appeare the rR day.

## A very whole some water to be distilled.

Steepe Sorrell in Vinegar foure and twenhoures, then take it out, and dry it with a men cloth, then fill it in a Limbeck, drink oure spoonfuls with a little Sugar, then alke upon it till you sweat, if you may : if ot, keepe your bed, and sweat upon it. Use his before supper ou any evening.

If the Patient happen to be troubled with by Swellings, Botshes, Carbuncles, let him Iweat The Kings Medicines fweat moderately now and then.

## Outward Medicines to ripen the Sore.

Take the root of a white Lilly, roft it in a good handfull of Sorrell, ftampe it, and apply it thereto very hot, let it lye foure and twenty houres, and it will breake the fore.

#### Another.

Take a small quantity of Leauen, a handfullof Pallowes, a little quantity of Scabias, cut a white Onyon into pieces, with halfe a dozen heads of Garlick, boyle these together in running water, make a Poaltus of it, and then lay it bot to the soze.

#### Another.

Take a hot Loafe, new taken forth of the Oven, apply it to the fore, and it will doubt leffe breake the fame : but afterward buy the fame Loafe deepe enough in the ground for feare of any Infection : for if either Dogg or any other thing doe feed thereon, it will infect a great many.

## For Ayring Apparell.

Let the Apparell of the difealed perfon

be well and often walhed, be it linnen o; wollen : o2 let it be ayzed in the Sunne, o2 over Paus of fire, o2 over a Chafingdith of Soales, and fume the same with Franking tense, Juniper, o2 d2 ied Rolemary.

## To preferve from the Infection of the Plague.

Take Garlick, and péele it, and mince it nall, put it into new milke, and eat it ulting.

#### Totake the Infection from a house Infected.

Take large Onyons, peele them, and lay ree or foure of them upon the ground slet emlie ten dayes, and those peeled Onyith is will gather all the Infection into them at is in one of those Roomes : but bury ofe Onyons afterward deepe in the ground.

Against the new bring Feaver.

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If the Patient be in great heat, as molt mmonly they will : take of faire running ater a pretty quantity : put it on a Chaingdift of Coales, then put thereinto a good hantity of Sunders beaten to powder, and 18 let

let it vople halfe an houre betwen two diffes : that done, put a couple of foft linnen clothes into a diff, wet the clothes well in water and Sounders, and apply the fame. To hot as you can fuffer it to your belly.

To procure fleepe to the fick Perfonsshat are difeafed, either with the . Plague or the hot Feaver.

Take of womans break-milke a good quantity, put thereunto of the like quantity of Aqua-vicz, Airre them well together, and moysten therewith the Temples of the Patient, and his Polethrils, lay it on with some feather, or some fine thin ragge.

Butter-milke in this contagious time is generally holfome to be eaten, and is a good Prefervative against either the Plague or the mestilent Feaver.
