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S the most louing and gracious care of his M A-IESTIE for the preferuation of his people, hath already bene earnestly shewed and declared by such

meanes and wayes as were thought expedient to suppresse the grieuous Infection of the Plague, and to preuent the increase thereof, within the City of London, and parts about it; so what society of the countres of meanes may be yet remayning which may extend and proue behouefull to the Countrey abroad (where his MAIESTIE is fory to vnderstand that the Contagion is also in many places dispersed) it is likewise his gracious pleasure that the A 2 society of ame

same bee carefully prouided and put in practife. And therefore hauing taken knowledge of certaine good Orders that were vpon like occasion published in times past; together with certaine rules and Medicines prescribed by the best and most learned Phylicians; and finding both of them, to serue well for the present time, his Maiestie is pleased that the same shal be renewed and published: And withall straightly commandeth all Iustices of the Peace & others to whom it may appertaine, to see the said Orders duely executed.

Con N primis, All the Juffices in euery Countie, aswell within the Libers ties as without, immediatly byon Schnowledge to them given, shall allemble themselues together at some one generall place accustomed, being cleare from Infection of the Plague, to confult howe these Dzders following may bee duely put in eres cution, not meaning that any Juffices dwelling in or neere places infected, thall come thither, whiles their comming may be doubtfull. And after their first generall astembly, they shall make a distribution of themselves to sundry limits and divisions, as in other common services of the Countie they are accustomed to doe, for the profecution thereof.

2 firft,

against the Infection of the Plague.

² first they shall inquire, and prefently informe themselues by all good meanes, what Townes and uillages are at the time of such aftemblie infected within every their Counties, and in what Pundred or other division, the sayde Townes and uillages are, and how many of the same places to Infected are corporate Townes, market Townes and uillages, and shall consider of what wealth the inhabitants of the same townes and Parishes are, to bee able to relieve the poore that are or shall be infected, and to be restrained in their houses.

Niem, thereupon after conference bled according to the necellitie of the caule, they thall des uile and make a generall taration, either by charging the Towne infected with one fumme in groffe, oz by charging the speciall perfos of wealth within the same, to be forth with collected for the rate of one moneth at the first, and fo if the lickenelle thal continue, the collection of flike fumme, oz of moze oz of leffe, as time and caufe thall re= quire, and the fame to be every first, fecond, third, or fourth weeke employed to and for the erecutis on of the layd olders. And in cale fome of the faid Townes infected mall manifeltly appeare not to be of sufficient abilitie to contribute sufficient for the charges requilite, then the taration or collection thall bee made of further extended to other parts, of in any other further limits, as by them thall be thought requilite where there thall bee a= ny fuch Townes oz billages fo infected, and bna= ble to relieve themselves. And if the faid Townes be scituated in the bozders and confines of any o= 23 ther

ther thire, then as the Juffices thall fee caufe and neede for the greatnelle of the charge requilite, that the parts of the thire ioyning to the Towness infected be not able, they thall write their letters to the next Juffices of the other Shire fo confining, to procure by collection fome reliefe, as in like cales they are to relieve them, in refpect of neere neighbourhood of the place, and for that the fame infection may bee the better flayed from the fayd adiopning places, though they be feparated by name of the Tountie.

4 Item, they thall cause to be appointed ine: uery Paris as well infected as not infected, certaine perfons to viewe the bodies of all fuch as thall die, before they be suffered to be buried, and to certifie the minister of the Church and Church= warden, oz other pzincipall officers, oz their fub= stitutes of what probable difease the sayd persons died : and the faid biewers, to have weekely fome allowance, a the moze large allowance where the Townes oz Parishes bee infected, during the infection, towards their maintenance, to the ende they which thall bee in places infected, may fo2= beare to refort into the company of others that are found : and those perfons to bee swozne to make true report according to their knowledge, and the choile of them to be made by direction of the Curate of the Church, with three or foure fubstantiall men of the paris. And in case the fayde biewers either through fauor or corruption, thall giue wrong certificate, or thall refuse to ferue bes ing thereunto appointed, then to cause them to be punished

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against the Infection of the Plague. punished by imprisonment, in such sort as may serve for a terrour to others.

Item, the houses of such persons out of the which there thall die any of the plague, being fo certified by the viewers, oz other wife knowen, oz where it thall bee buderflood, that any perfon remaineth licke of the plague, to be cloled bp on all parts during the time of reftraint, biz.fire weeks, after the sichnesse be ceased in the same house, in cafe the faid houses to infected thall be within any Towne having houses neere adiophing to the same. And if the infection happen in houses dif perfed in Willages, and seperated from other houfes, and that of necellitie, for the leruing of their cattell, and manuring of their ground, the faide perfons cannot continue in their houses, then they to be neverthelelle restrained from resorting into company of others, either publikely og pais uately during the faide time of reftraint, and to weare some marke in their oppermost garments, oz beare white rods in their handes at such time as they thall goe abroad, and if there be any doubt that the matters and owners of the houses infected, will not duely observe the directions of thutting by their doozes, specially in the night, then that there be appointed two of three watchmen by turnes, which thalbe f worne to attend and watch the house, and to apprehend any person that shall come out of the house contrary to the order, and the same persons by order of the Juffices, shall be a competent time imprisoned in the flockes in the high way next to the house infected : and further. moze, some speciall marke thall be made and fired to

to the doozes of every of the infected houles, and where any such houses shall be Innes of Alehouses, the signes shall be taken downe for the time of the restraint, and some crosse or other mark set bpon the place thereof to be a token of the schenesse.

6 Jtem, they thall have good regard to chufe honeft perfons that either thal collect the fummes affelled, or thall have the cuftodie thereof, and out of the faid collection to allot a weekely proportion for the finding of bictuall, or fire, or medicines for the poorer fort, during the time of their reftraint. And whereas fome perfons being wel disposed to yeeld almes and reliefe, will be more willing to give fome portions of bictual, as come, bread, or other meate, the fame thall be committed to the charge of fome special perforts, that wil honeftly and truely preferue the fame, to be difiributed as they thall be appointed for the poore that are infected.

7 Jtem, to appoint certain perfons dwelling within the townes infected, to prouide and deliuer all necellaries of bictuals, or any matter of watching or other attendance, to keepe fuch as are of good wealth being reftrained, at their own proper coffs and charges, and the poore at the common charges : and the fayde perfons to appointed to be ordered, not to refort to any publike affembly during the time of fuch their attedance, as allo to weare fome marke on their byper garment, or to beare a white rod in their hand, to the end others may auoide their company.

8 Item,

against the Infection of the Plague.

Item, that in the Shire towne in every 8 Countie, and in other great townes meete for that purpole, there may bee prouision bespoken and made, of such preferuatives and other reme= dies, which other wife in meaner townes cannot be readily had, as by the Phylicians shall be prefcribed, and is at this prefent reduced into an Aduile made by the Phylicians, and nowe printed and fent with the fayd Diders, which may bee fired in market places, byon places bluall for such publique matters, and in other townes in the bodies of the parish Churches, and Chappels, in which aduile onely fuch things are prefcribed, as blually are to bee had and found in all Countreys without great charge of coft.

9 Jtem, the Ministers and Curates, and the Churchwardens in every Parish, shall in writing certific weekely to some of the Justices, reliding within the Pundred or other limit where they serve, the number of such persons as are infected and do not die, and also of all such as shal die within their Parishes, and their diseases probable wherof they died, and the same to be certified to the rest of the Justices at their alsemblies, which during some convenient time would be every one and twenty dayes, and thereof a particular booke kept by the Clerke of the Peace or some such like.

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10 Item, to appoint some place apart in each Parish for the buriall of such persons as shall die of the plague, as also to give order that they bee buried after Summe setting, and yet neuertheles by day light, so as the Curate bee present for the B obser-

observation of the Rites and Ceremonies prescribed by the Law, forefeeting as much as conveniently he may, to be distant from the danger of infection of the person dead, or of the company that shall bring the corple to the grave.

11 Jtem, the Juffices of the whole Countie to allemble once in one a twenty dayes, to examine whether thole orders bee duely erecuted, and to certifie to the Lords of the privie Councell their proceedings in that behalfe, what Townes and Utillages be infected, as also the numbers of the dead, and the discases whereof they died, and what summes of money are tared and collected to this purpose, and how the same are distributed.

12 Jtem, the Juffices of the hundred, where any such infection is, or the Juffices next adioy= ning thereunto, to allemble once a weeke, to take accompt of the erecution of the said Drders, a as they finde any lacke or disorder, either to reforme it themselves, or to report it at the generall allem= blie there, to bee by a more common confent rc= formed.

13 Item, for that the contagion of the plague groweth and encrealeth no way more, then by the ble and handling of luch clothes, bedding and other fuffe as hath been worne and occupied by the infected of this difeale, during the time of their difeale: the layd Juffices thall in the places infected take fuch order, that all the faid clothes and other fluffe, so occupied by the difeased, so some as the parties difeased of the plague are all of

against the Infection of the Plague.

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of them either well recouered of dead, be either burnt and cleane confumed with fire, of els agred in fuch fort as is prefcribed in an especial article conteined in the Aduife let downe by the Philicians. And for that peraduenture the loss of fuch apparel, bedding and other fluffe to be burnt, may be greater then the poore estate of the owners of the fame may well beare : it is thought bery good and expedient, if it be thought mecte it shall bee burnt, that then the fayd Juffices, out of fuch collections as are to be made within their Counties for the reliefe of the poorer for that bee infected, allow also to them such fumme or fums as to them shall be thought reasonable, in recompense of the loss of their fayd fluffe.

14 Item, the fayd Juffices may put in erecution any other Diders that by them at their generall allembly thalbe dettiled and thought meet, tending to the preferuation of his Maiellies fubfects from the infection : and to the end their care and diligence may the better appeare, they thall certifie in writing the faid Drders newly deuifed: and if any thall wilfully breake and contemne the fame of any of the orders herein fpecified, they that either prefently punish them by imprisonment, or if the perfons to contemning them, thall be of fuch countenance as the Juffices thall thinke meete to haue their faults knowen to his Matellie, or to the Councell, they thall charge and bind them to appeare before bs, and the contempt duely certis fied, that there may be a more notorious tharpe erample made by punishment of the same by order ofhis Maiettie.

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15 Item,

Orders to be observed

15 Jtem, if there be lacke of Juffices in some parts of the Shire, of if they which are Juffices there shall be for the time absent, in that case the more number of the Juffices at their assembly shall make choice of some convenient persons to supplie those places for the better executio here of.

16 Item, if there be any perfon Eccleliafticall or Lave, that thall hold and publich any opinions (as in some places report is made) that it is a bain thing to forbeare to refort to the Infected, or that it is not charitable to fozbid the same, pzetending that no perfon thall die but at their time prefired, fuch perfons thall be not onely reprehended, but by order of the Bishop, if they bee Ecclesiasticall, thall be forbidden to preach, and being Lay, thall be allo enjoyned to forbeare to btter fuch danges rous opinios by on paine of imprilonment, which thall be executed, if they thall perfeuere in that er= rour. And yet it thall appeare manifeltly by these Deders, that according to Christian charity, no perfons of the meaneft degree that be left without fuccour and reliefe.

17 And of these things about mentioned, the Juffices thall take great care, as of a matter specially directed and commaunded by his Maiettie byon the princely and naturall care hee hath conceiued towards the preservation of his subjects, who by bery dilorder, and for lacke of direction do in many parts wilfully procure the increase of this general contagion.

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An aduise set downe by the best learned in Physicke within this Realme : Conteining Jundry good Rules and easie Medicines, without charge to the meaner fort of people, as well for the preferuation of his good Subjects from the Plague before infection, as for the curing and ordering of them after they shalbe infected.

Preferuative by correcting the aire in houses.



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SARS Alte Rofemarie dited, of luniper, Bay-leaues, 02 Frankincenfe, caft , the same on a Chafendish, and receite the fume of Imoke ther= of: some aduise to be added Lauander, 02 Sage.

Allo to make fires rather in Pannes, to remove about the Chamber, then in Chimneys, thall better correct the arre of the Poules.

Take a quantity of Vineger bery ftrong, and put to it some small quantitie of Rofewater, ten bzaun= ches of Rolemarie, put them all into a Balen, then take five of fire Flintstones, heated in the fire till they be burning hote, caft them into the fame Vineger, and to let the fumes be received from place to place of your house.

Perfuming of Apparell.

Cuch apparell as you thall commonly weare, let it bee very cleane, and perfume it often either with

with some redde Saunders burned, or with luniper. And if any thall happen to be with them that are bilited, let such perfons as soone as they shal come home, shift themselves, and aire their clothes, in open aire for a time.

Preferuation by way of defence in open aire, and common affemblies to be vfed outwardly.

I s good in going abroad into the open aire in the fireets, to hold fome things of fweet fauour in their hands, or in the corner of an handherchife, as a fponge dipped in Vineger and Rofewater mired, or in Vineger, wherein Wormewood, or Rue called alfo Herbegrace, hath bene boyled.

Preservative by way of inward medicine.

Take a quantitie of Rue, of Wormewood, of of both, and put it into a pot of bluall drink, close stopped, let it lie to in steepe a whole night, and drinke thereof in the morning fasting.

In all Sommer plagues, it shall be good to ble Sorrel fauce to be caten in the morning with bread. And in the fall of the leafe to ble the inyce of Barberies with bread also.

By the constitution of the heart, the bital spirits being weake, and the naturall heate feeble, in which case things Cozdial are to be bled.

Mens bos dies are apt to take infes ction, either

ake of good Figges not wormeaten, cleane wathed, of Walnuts the kernels cleane picted, of either of them an hundled, of the leaues of green Rue, other wife called Herbegrace, the weight of ii. s. of common Salt the weight of iii. d. cut the Figs in pieces, and fampe them & the Walnut hernels together in a moster of marble os wood a good space, butill they be bery finall, and then put the Rue leaues buto them, ftampe and ftirre them well together with the reft, last put in the Salt and ftampe and firre thefe things toge. ther, butill they be incorporated and made of one substance. Df the which take the quantitie of ii.oz iii. Figges every mouning faiting, to children the halfe will ferue, and bee that lifteth to increase oz diminich the substance of this medicine, chall ealis ly doe it, by taking of a greater of leffe quantity of the limples according to a due proportion.

A well approoued Medicine to preferue.

Take of the finest cleare Aloes you can buy, in colour like to a Liuer, a therfore called Hepatica, of Cinamon, of Myrrhe, of ech of these the weight of iii. French crownes, or of rrii. d. of our money, of Cloues, Maces, Lignum Aloes, of Mastick, of Bole Oriental, of ech of these halfe an ounce: mingle them together and beate them into a bery fine powder. Df the which take euery morning falling the weight

weight of a groate of this in white wine delayed with water, and by the grace of God you thall be late from the Plague. No man which is learned, if he eramine the limples of this medicine whereof it confliteth, and the nature and power of them, can deny but that it is a medicine of great efficacy against the Plague, and the limples whereof it is made, are easily to be had in any good Apothecaries shop, ercept Bole Oriental, which is bled in the stead of true Bolus Armenus,

Take a drie Figge and open it, and put the kernell of a Walnut into the fame beeing cut very fmall, three or foure leaves of Rue commonly called Herbegrace, a come of Salt, then roft the Figge and eate it warme, fast iii. or till. houres after it, and vie this twife in the weeke.

Take the powder of Turmentil, the weight of bi. pence with Sorrel oz Scabious water in Sommer, and in Winter with the water of Valerian oz commondzinke.

De elle in one day they may take a little Wormwood, and Valerian with a graine of Salt. In another day they may take bit. og bitt. berries of luniper, deged and put in powder, and taking the fame with common deinke, og with deinke in which Wormewood & Rue hath ben fleeped all the night.

Allo the triacle called Dietessearoum, which is made but of 4. things of light price easie to be had.

Allo the roote of Enula Campana, either taken in powder with dzinke, oz hanged about the bzeft.

Likewile a piece of Arras root kept in the mouth as men palle in the freetes, is bery good Cordiall. Take fire leaues of Sorrell, wath them with water and Uineger, let them lie to fleepe in the faid

water

of the Physicians.

water and Uineger a while, then eate them falling, and keepe in your mouth and chewe now oz then either Stewall, oz the roote of Angelica, oz a little Cinamon.

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Take the roote of Enula Campana being layde and fleeped in Uineger, and groffe beaten, put a little of it in a handherchiefe, and fmell to it if you refort to any that is infected.

Tor women with child, or fuch as be delicate and tender, and cannot away with taking of Medicines.

Make a tolt of white or of the fecond breade as you thinke good, and sprinkle on it being hotte a litle good wine Uineger, made with Bole leaues, and for want of it, any good common or bled Uineger, and spread on the tolt a little butter, and call thereon a little powder of Cinamon, and eate it in the morning fasting. The poore which cannot get Uineger nor buy Cinamon, may eate bread and butter alone: for butter is not oneiy a preferuative against the Plague, but against all maner of poysons.

when one mult come into the place where infectious perfons are, it is good to fmell to the roote of Angelica, Gentian, 02 Valerian, and to chew any of these in his mouth.

Another preferuative for the poore. In that be good to take an handfull of Rue, and as much common Wormewood, and by use them a little: and put them into a pot of earth of time, with so much Usineger as shall couer the herbes: keepe this pot close couered of stopt, and when you feare any infection, dippe into this Usineger a piece of a sponge, and cary it in your hand a smell to it, of elle put it into a round ball of Yuorie of Iuniper

niper made full of holes of the one fide, carying it in your hand ble to fmell thereunto, renewing it once in a day.

A To be vsed after Infection taken.

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Dras much as the caufe of the Plague ftandeth rather in poylon, then in any putrifaction of humors as other agues doe, the chiefeft way is to mooue fwea- 00

tings, and to defend the heart by some cozdiall thing.

Suppositarie.

If the patient bee coffine and bound in his bodie, let him take a Suppositarie made with a litle boyled Honie, and a little fine powder of Salt, and so taken in at the fundament, and kept till it moue a ftoole.

An excellent Medicine made without charges.

Take of the powder of good Bayberies, the hulke taken away from them, befoze they be dried, a spoonefull: Let the Patient drinke this, well mingled in a draught of good stale Ale or Beere, which is neither source nor deade, or with a draught of white Wine, and goe to bed and cast himselfe into a sweate, and forbeare size as is aforesaid.

An other foueraigne remedie, that is a stilled water.

Take the inward bark of the Ashe tree, a pound, of Walnuts with the greene outward shelles, to the number of fiftie, cut these smal, of Scabious, of Veruen, of Petimorel, of Housseeke, of euery one a handfull, of Saffron halfe an ounce, powze bpon these the strongest uneger you can get foure pintes,

of the Physicians.

vintes, let them a little boyle together bpon a bery foft fire, and then it and in a bery close pot well fout all a night byon the embers, afterward difill them with a loft fire, and receive the water close kept. Biue buto the Patient laide in bed and well couered with clothes, two ounces of this water to drinke, a let him be prouoked to fweate, and every five houres, during the space of twentie foure houres, give him the same quantitie to dzinke. This Medicine for the worthinelle thereof, and because it will fand the maker thereof in little charge, it shall be bery well done to distill it in Summer when the Walnuts hang greene on the tree, that it may be ready against the time that occation fertieth to ble it.

1. Bloodletting.



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f the Patient be ful of humours which be good, let him immediatly be let blood byon the Liner beine in the right arme, oz in the Median beine of the fame arme (if no fore appeare) in the first day.

2. Medicine purgatiue.

FD2 the Pooze take Aloes the weight of fire pence, put in the pappe of an Apple : and for the richer Pilles of Rufus to bee had in euery good Apos thecaries thop. After letting of blood and purging (as thall bee needfull) fome of the forenamed Cor= dials are to be bled.

These preparations thus bled the first day that the Patient mall fall licke, as caufe mall be to ble the one oz the other (no foze appearing) in which cafe if the fore thall appeare, they are both to bee fozbozne, 12

forborne, the next is to ble all meanes to expel the poylon, and to defend the heart by Cozdials. Medicament expulsine. 2.

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De poylon is expelled belt by sweatings pro= noned by poffet Ale, made with Fenel and Marigolds in Winter, and with Sorrel, Bugloffe and Borage in Summer, with the which in both times they must mire the Triacle of Diateflaroum, the weight of ir. d. a fo to lay themfelues with all quietnelle to sweat one halfe houre, oz an houre if they be frong. for they that be neither full of bus mours not corrupt in humours, neede neither purging noz letting of blood, but at the first plunge may mooue themselves to sweate with Cordiall things mirt with such things as moone fweate, and are befoze declared.

What is to be done when there is any rising or swelling in any part.



Den if by these three meanes the poy= fon be expelled outward by botches, carbuncles of markes, called Gods markes, according as nature doth er-

pell, fo must the further proceedings be, prouiding fill, that they continue fill in the ble of the cozdiall and moderate sweating now and then, all the time that the fozes be in healing, which must by the Surgion bee handled with great discretion.

Medicines to be vied in ordinary diet. I T is thought that the powder of Parts home hath aspeciall prerogatine, to be bled all the time

time of their lickness in their broths, and supping, which in Sommer must ever have Sorrell, Borage, Buglasse, and in winter, Betony, and Scabious, or Morfus Diaboli, and if their habilities do not serve, let them ble it with Aleburies made with a little Nutmegge, or one Clove, or with Cawdels in like maner made with Cloves, Maces, Nutmegs, Sanders or such like.

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Both to preferue and cure the fickneffe. T Ake an egge and make a hole in the toppe of it. take out the white and yelke, fill the thell with the weight of two french crownes of Saffron, rolt the faid egge thus filled with Saffron buder the embres, butil the thell begin to ware yellow, then take it from the fire, and beate the thell and Saffron in a moster together, with halfe a fpoonefull of APuttard feed, take of this powder a french crown weight, and as foone as you fulpect your felfe infected, diffolue it into ten fpoonefuls of poffet ale, and drinke it luke warme, then goe to bed and prouoke your felfe to fweating.

To be vied in the first time of the ficknesse. A Pother is to take five of fire handfull of Sorell, that groweth in the field, of a greater quantity according as you will distill more of less of the water thereof, and let it lie infrised of thesped in good Unneger the space of foure and twentie houres, then take it off and drie it with a linen cloth put into a Limbecke, and distill the water thereof: And alsoone as you finde your felfe touched with the schnesse, drinke foure spoonefuls of the faid water with a little sugar, and if you be able.

able, walke byon it butill you doe fweate, if not, keepe your bed, and being well couered, prouoke vour felfe to fweating, and the nert day to take as much againe of it a little befoze supper.

Item, to prouoke bomit with two ounces of ranke oyle, or walnut oyle, a spoonefull of the iuice of Celendine a halfe a spoonefull of the inice of radice root, to that the party Infected do walke and not fleepe, is better then any letting of blood, oz any purging. for the dileale neither can luffer agitation of humors, nor when one is infected, hath no time to bleede oz to purge.

S Outward Medicines for to be applied to the fore.

The first.



Ake of Scabioust wo handfuls, fampe it in a ftone mozter with a peftell of ftone if you can get any such, then put buto it of olde swines grease salted, two ounces, and the yelke of an egge, ftampe them well toges

ther, and lay part of this warme to the fore.

The fecond.

Ake of the leaues of Mallowes, of Camomill flowers, of either of them an handfull, of Linseede beaten into powder two ounces, boyle the Mallow leaves first cut, and the flowers of the Camomill in faire water, flanding aboue a fingers breadth, boyle all them together, butill all the water almost be spent : then put thereunto the Linfeede, of Wheate flower halfe an handfull, of swines

of the Physicians.

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Twines greafe the fkins taken away three ounces, of oyle of Roles two ounces, flirre them still with a sticke, and let them all boyle together on a fost fire without smoke, butill the water be beterly spent, beate them all together in a moster, butill they be well encosposated together, and in feeling smooth, and not rough: then make part thereof bot in a dish set by a chasindish of coales, and say it thicke by a limmen cloth applying it to the soze.

> Another excellent Medicine to ripen and bring out the fore.

Take a white Onion cut in pieces, of fresh butter isi. ounces, of Leven the weight of ris. d. of Mallowes one handfull, of Scabious if it may be had one handfull, of Cloves of Barlicke the weight of rr. d. boyle them on the fire in sufficient water, and make a pultesse of it, and lay it warme to the soze.

Another.

TO the fore it felfe doe thus. Take two handfull of Valerian, three rootes of Danewort, a handfull of Smalledge, or Louage, if you can get it, feethe them all in butter and water, and a fewe crummes of bread, and make a pulteffe thereof, and lay it warme to the fore butill it breake.

Anotherforthe fame.

If you cannot have these herbes, it is good to lay a loafe of bread to it hot as it commeth out of the ouen (which after ward that he burnt or buried in the earth) or the leaves of Scabious or Sorrell rolted, or two or three Lillie rootes rolted buder embers, beaten and applied.

A generall

A generall medicine for all fortes of people taken with the plague, to be had without coft.

Take of the roote of butter burre, otherwife called petilent wort, one ounce, of the roote of great V alerian a quarter of an ounce, of Sorrell an handfull, boyle all these in a quart of water to a pint, then fraine it and put thereto two spoones fuls of Vineger, two ounces of good Sugar, boyle all these together butill they be well mingled, let the infected drinke of this so hotte as he may suffer it a good draught, and if hee chance to call it bp as gaine, let him take the same quantitie fraights way bpon it, and prouche himselfe to sweate, and he shall find greathelpe.

Time of continuance apart from common assemblies.

Such as have beene infected, thould keepe their house without being conversant with § whole, butill the sozes that have left running and be perfectly whole and sound, which in sanguine and cholericke persons will bee healed sooner, then in melancholike and flegmatike complexions.

Such perfonsinay not well be conversant with them which are not infected, for the space of onemoneth.

Infected clothes.

The Contagion suspected to remaine in cloths, either wollen of linnen, cannot wel be auoyded by better meanes, then by fire and water, by often washing and airing the same in frostes, and summe shine, with good discretion, and burning the clothes of small balue.
