He Kings most Excellent Maiestie, finding that the infection of the Plague is at this present in sundry places of the City of London, and neere adiopning to the same, though not (God be thanked) with the mostalitie of great numbers ; yet to dispersed in divers of the best and most open streets of the said City, as do give inst cause to doubt, that the contagion thereof, by great refort of people, might be further speed, as well in the City, as into other parts of the Realme, whereby danger might ensue both to his Royall person, the Queene his dearest wife, and his Royal issues and to his most louing Subjects repairing

thither for their Suits and caules: Dis Maiellie, for these necellary confiderations, and hoping that the infection wil, by the goodnelle of Almighty God, with the coldnelle of the yeare, and fuch wholefome Dyders as are taken in his faid City, the rather ceale by the adjournement of part of this next Cerme of S. Dichael now at hand, from the Vas of the fame, butil the fourth Beturne of the faid Terme called Menfe Michaelis nert comming. Dis Datellie therefoze, of his especiall fauour and clemencie, is pleased and contented, to adjourne the lato Terme of S. Dichael, that is to lay, in and from the Vtas thereof, but the faid fourth Beturne of the faid Terme, called Menfe Michaelis nert comming ; which his Daiekie lignifieth to all and lingular his louing Subjects of this his Realme, to the intent that they a every of them. which have caule of commandement to appeare in any of his Highnelle Courts at meliminiler, in of at any day of time from and after the faid Vias of S. Michael, may tary at their dwellings, or where their bulinelle other wife thall lpe, without reforting to any of the faid Courts for that caule, before the faid Menie Michaelis nert comming, and that with out incurring danger of forfeiture, penaltie, or contempt towards his Bighnelle in that behalfe. And neuerthelelle his Dateflies pleafure is, That two of his Juffices, that is to fay, of either Bench one, thall the firft day of Dichaelmas Terme, called Octabis Michaelis, according to the ancient order of the Lawes, heepe the Effoignes of the faid Octabis Michaclis. At which V tas of S. Dichael, 102, its of adiournement halbe directed to the faid Juffices, giving them author ritie to adjourne the faid Terme of S. Dichael, that is to fay, from the Vtas thereof, butill the fourth Returne, as before is faid. And the faid adjournement thall be made in the first day of the faid Vtas, commonly called, the day of Cf. folgnes. And further his Daiefties pleafure is, That all matters, caufes and Suits, depending in any of his other Courts betweene party and party, as in his Dighneffe Courts of Chancery, Starchamber, and Erchequer, Courts of Wards and Liveries, Duchy of Lancaller, and Court of Requells, thall have continuance, and the parties thall have bay from the bate of these prefents, butill the faib fourth Returne, as before is faib.

Douided alway, and his Daielties pleafure and commandement is, Chat all Collectors, Beceivors, Sheriffes, and other Accomptants, and all other perions, that hould of ought to Accompt of pay any fumme of tummes of Doney in any of his Daieflies Courts of Erchequer, Court of Wards and Liueries, and of his Duchie of Lancafter, or in any of them, og to enter into any Accompt in any of the faid Courts , thall repaire buto the accultomed places at meliminfler, where his Dighnelle bath appointed luch Officers and Miniflers, as for that purpole his Daieffie bath thought erpedient, and there to pay and doe in every behalfe, as though no fuch proclamation of A diournement had bene had or made. And his Dighnelle further pleasure and commandement is, That all Sheriffes thall returne their maits and Proceffe againft all fuch Accomptants and Bebtors, at the dayes therein appointed. And if any perfon or perfons, who ought to accompt of pay any lumme of lummes of Doney to his Maiellie in any of the Courts and places aforefaid, do make default therein, That then his Dighneffe 101 tits and Droceffe halbe awarded and fent foorth against euery fuch perfon and perfons, and the fame to be duely and otherly ferued, and returned by the Sheriffes and Officers thereunto appointed , in fuch like maner and forme, as the fame fould have bene, if this prefent proclamation had not bene made. And if any Sheriffe o; other Officer thall make befault, o; be negligent in feruing, erecuting, or returning of any the maits and procelle alozefaid, That then every fuch Sheriffe and other Officer, thall incurre fuch paines and penalties, as by the faid Courts, o; any of them halbe tated and affelled ; moilling and commanding all and every bis Maiellies Sheriffes, Officers, Minifters and Subicets, to whom it doeth of thal appertaine, to obferue and heepe their allemblies and apparances with all their Returnes and Certificats, in his Dighnelle faid Courts at weffminfler in Menfe Michaelis nert comming, then and there to be holden and kept, and there to bee their Offices and dues ties in every behalfe, in like maner and forme, as they thould or ought to have done, if this prefent proclamation had not bene had og made, as they will answere to the contrary at their perils.

Giuen at our honour of Hampton Court the two and twentieth day of September, in the feuenth yeere of our Reigne of Great Britaine, France and Ireland.

PLAGUE ORDER issued by James I at Hampton Court in 1609, adjourning Michaelmas Term in the Courts because of the plague.
