ers being first observed as in former times, it is thought necessary that by the government of the City there be appointed size or fower Doctors at least, who may apply themselves to the cure of the Infected: and that these Doctors bee stipendiaries to the City for their lives: and that to each Doctor there be assigned B3 two

two Apothecaries and three Chirurgions, who are also to be stipended by the City, that so due and true care may be taken in all things, that the people perish not without helpe, and that the Infection spread not, while none take particular care to relist it, as in Paris, Venice, and Padua, and many other Cities.

And if any Doctor, Apothecary or Chirurgion sitpended by the City shall happen to die in the service of the attendance of the Plague, then their widowes surviving shall have their pensions during their

liues.

Men or goods from forreigne infected places.

Te is likewise necessary that there be care taken that neither men not goods may come from any suspected places be yond the seas of the land, without certificate of health, of else either to bee sent suddainely a way, of to be put to the Pest-house of some such like place for forty daies (according to the custome of Italy,) till the certainty of their soundnesse may bee discovered.

Two places for entertainement are to bee provided; one for the found and another for those who are infected.

That the Statutes and good Diders made and formerly published against common Beggars, against all manner of Plaies, Bowling-allies, Jamates, Tipling-houses, Letalls, against the sale of corrupt sieth or sish, may be reused and strictly executed, and that the Skauer gers in generall, and enery particular house holder take care sor the due and orderly cleansing of the streets and private houses, which will availe much in this case.

That Dogges, Catts, Conies and tame Pidgeons be destroyed about the Towne, or to bee kept so sparingly that no offence may come by them, and that no Swine be permitted to range by and down the Streets, as they frequently doe, of rather not to keepe any at all.

To be cautelous vpon any suspition.

Teth his owne liberty, that none will give notice of any suspition of the Plague as gainst themselves; wherefore that must be the Duerseers care, by on any notice or suspition of Infection, by the helpe of the Poctors, Chirurgions, Keepers or Searchers, to sinde out the truth thereof, and so to proceed accordingly, but not to be pend by on the Testimony of women Searchers alone.

The care to be taken when a house is visited.

That boon the discovery of the Infection in any house, there bee presently meanes vied to preserve the whole, as well as to cure the infectted. And that no lick person be removed out of anyhouse, though to another of his owne, without notice thereof to be given to the Duerseers, and to be by them approved: or if the whole be to be removed, that notice be given to the Duerseers of their remove, and that caution be given that they shall not wander about till they be sound.

The house that is known to be infected, though none be dead therein, to be shut bp,

and

and carefully kept watched by moze trully men then ordinary warders, till a time after the partie be well recovered, and that time to be forty dayes at the leaft.

Caution concerning flying into

Because many masters of families, prefently by on the visiting of their houses
before any be dead, by into the countrey to
their friends, by which meanes the plague
is often carried into the countrey: That
no man shall depart his house except it be
to an house not inhabited, and that it be to
an house of such distance as that he may
conveniently travell thither without lying
by the way, much less that hee send his
children or servants and this to be done,
by the approbation of the Duerseers budge
their hands.

Chat such also as remodue into the Countrey before their houses bee bisited, have a certificate from the Duerseers of their parish, binder their hands and seales, testifying, that such persons were not bisited before their remove, that by vertue thereof they may the freelier tracuell in the Countrey, and be more readily

entertained.

That no infected person be secretly conueted out of any house: and in any such misdemenour

demeanour the master of the house, both from which the siche party is sent, as also the master of the house into which the partie shall be received without the licence of the Duerseers of both parishes respectively, shall be severally punished at the discre-

tion of the Duerleers.

Because it is likely that the better sort will not call to them such Doctors as are deputed to the Ture of the plague, by on the sirst falling sick of any in their houses, lest thereby they might draw greater infection by on themselues: if therefore any house so bling other Doctors shall happen to be bissied, that then the Doctor, who shall ordinarily take the care of that house, shall presently cause notice of the said infection to be given to the Duerseers, that care may be had thereof by the Physicians deputed.

That one being dead in any house of the plague, notice be given to the Duerseers, and that the dead party be buried by night in private manner; yet not without the privity of the Minister, Clerk, Bearers, and Constable or Duerseers, and that none enter the bisted house but permitted persons, by on danger to be presently that up themselves, and that there be a bisible marke set by on the outside of the doore,

FD2 the correcting of the infectious aire, it were good that often Bonfires were made in the fireets, and that sometime the Tower Dednance might be that off, as also that there be good fiers kept in a about the visited houses and their neighbours.

Take Rolemary dried, or Juniper, Batleaues or Frankincense: cast the same byon a Chasingdish, and receive the sume or

smoake thereof.

Also to make sters rather in pans to remove about the chamber, then in chimeneies, shall better correct the aire of the houses, adding a piece of old from to the sire.

Take a quantity of Tineger bery firong, and put to it some small quantity of Rose water, ten by anches of Rosemary, put them all into a bason, then take sue of six first stones, heated in the sixe till they bee burning hot, cast them into the same Tineger, and so let the summer be received from place to place of your house.

That the honse be often persumed with Rue, Angelica, Gentian, Zedoary, Set= wall, Juniper wood or Berries burnt bp= on imbers, either simply, or they may bee seeped in wine bineger, and so burnt.

Perfume the house and all therein with this: Slake Lime in Aineger, and aire the house therewith, burne much Tar, Rosen, Frankinsence or Turpentine, both in the private houses, and in the Churches bestoze prayers.

Such apparell as you hall commonly weare, let it be very cleane, and perfume it often, either with some Uriginia Cedar burned, or with Juniper, and if any hall happen to be with them that are visited, let such persons, as soone as they hall come home, which themselves, and agree their clothes in open agree for a time.

Such as are to go abzoad shall do well to carry Bue, Angelica, oz Zedoarie in their

their hands to smell to; and of those they may thew a little in their mouthes as they go in the street, especially if they be afraid of any place. It is not good to be over-fearefull, but it cannot be but bad to be over-presumptuous and bold.

Take Rue one handfull, stamp it in a morter, put thereto Wine bineger enough to moisten it, mire them well, then straine out the inyce, wet a piece of spunge, a toast of browne bread therein, the it in a thin

By inward Medicines.

Let none go fasting forth, everyone according to their fortunes, let them eat some such thing as mayrelist putrefaction.

Some may eat Garlike with Butter, a Cloue two or three, according to the ability of their bodies: some may eat fasting, some of the electuary with figs and Rue hereafter expressed: some may be London Creacle, the weight of eight pence in a morning, taking more or lesse, according to the age of the party; after one hours let them eat some other breakfast, as bread and butter with some leaves of Rue or Sage, and in the heat of summer of Sorvell or Wood-formell.

To fleep Rue, Wormwood or Sage all night in their drink, and to drink a good draught in the morning fasting, is very wholfome, or to drink a draught of fuch drink after the taking of any of the preferuatives will be very good.

In all summer Plagues it halbe good to be Sorrell sawce to be eaten in the mozening with bread, and in the fall of the leafe to vie the inyce of Barberies with bread

Mithridates medicine of Figs.

Take of good figs and walnut hirnels of each twenty foure, Rue picked two good handfulls, of Salt halfe an ounce of fonewhat better: first stamp your figs and walnuts well together in a stone moster, then adde your Rue, and last of all your Salt, mire them erceedingly well: take of this mirture every morning fasting the weight of sixteene pence, to children and weake bodies lesse.

Or this will be effectuall alfo.

Take twenty Walnuts, pill them, figs, fifteen, Rue a good handfull, Cormentill roots three drams, Juniper berries two drams, Bole Armoniack a dram and a halfe. First Camp your roots, then your figs and Seeds, then adde your Walnuts,

nuts, then put to your Rue and Bole; and with them put thereto fire drams of London Treacle, and two or three spoonfuls of wine vineger, mire them well in a stone morter, and take of this every morning the quantitie of a good nutmegg fasting they that have cause to goe much abroad, may take as much more in the evening two houres before supper.

For women with child, children, and such as cannot take bitter things, vse this.

These two last remotes of blood-letting, and strong purgings, are to bee bled the first day that the Patient shall fall sicke as cause shall be to vse the one of the other, (no soze appearing) In which case, if any soze of spots shall appeare, they are both to be forborne.

Vomits.

To prouoke bomit, with two ounces of Kanck Oyle, or Walnut Oyle, a spoonerfull of the Juice of Celendine, and halfe a spoonfull of the Juice of Radish roote, or two spoonfuls of Orymel of Squils with Posset drink and oile.

Medicines expulsine.

The poison is expelled best by sweating prouoked by posset ale made with sennell and Marigolds in winter, and with Sorrell, Buglosse, and Borage in summer, with the which in both times they must mingle London Treacle, the waight of two drammes: and so to lay themselves with all quietnesse to sweat one halse houre, or an houre if they be strong.

first apprehension, Bur seeds, Cuchencely, powder of Parts horne, Citron seeds one, or more of them, with a few graines of Camphire, are good to bee given in Carduus or Dragon water, or with some Treacle water.

Take five of the handfuls of Sorrell that groweth in the field, of a greater quantity according as you wild iffill more of leffe of the water thereof, and let it lie infused of freeped in good bineger the space of twenty soure houres, Then take it off and day it with a linen cloth, and put it into a limbeck, and distill the water thereof, and as soone as you finde your selfe touched with the sicknesse, drinke soure spoonfuls of the said water with a little sugar, and if you be able walk byon it butill you sweat, if not, keep your bed, and being well covered provide your selfe to sweating.

of the Phyficians.

Take of the root Butter-burre, otherwise called Pestilent-wort one ounce, of the root of great Waterian a quarter of appounce, of Sorrell an handfull, boyle all these in a quart of water to a pinte, then straine it, and put thereto two spoonesnils of Uineger, two ounces of good Sugar, boyle all these together until they be well mingled: let the infected drink of this so hot as he may suffer it, a good draught, and if he chance to cast it by againe, let him take the same quantity straight way upon it, and provoke himselfe to sweat.

De the Infected may take one deam of this powder following. Take Sugar of Roses foure ounces, Ginger two ounces, Camphire one ounce, make these into fine powder, keep it made by into Balls with Wine.

Take of the powder of good Bay-berry, the huske taken away from them, before they be dried, a spoonfull; let the Patient drinke this well mingled in a draught of good state Ale or Beere, or with a draught of white wine, and go to bed, and cast him-selfeinto a sweat, and sorbeare steep.

Take the inward Bark of the Alb-tree one pound, of Walnuts with the greene outward hels to the number of fiftie, cut these small; of Scabious, of Aeruin, of every

drams, powre byon thefe the strongest uineger you can get soure pintes, let them a
little boyle together byon a very soft sire,
and then stand in a very close pot well stopt
all a night byon the embers, after distill
them with a soft sire, and receive the water close kept. Give but the Patient

two ownces of this water to drinke, and
let him bee provoked to sweat, and every
eight houres during the space of twenty
foure hours give him the same quantitie to drinke.

Care mud bee taken in the ble of thefe sweating Cordialis, that the party infected sweat two or three houres, if hee haue Arength, and asep not till the Eweat bee ouer, and that hee haue beene well wiped with warmelinen, and when he hath been dried let him walb his mouth with water and bineger warme, and let his face and hands bee walked with the same: when these things are done, give him a good draught of Broath made with Chicken or Dutton with Rolemary, Thyme, Soz rell, Succory and Marigolds; or elce mater-grewell, with Rolemary and Winter= Sauory, or Thyme Panado feasoned with beriupce or inyce of wood forrell. for their deinke let it be fmall Beere warmed with of the Physicians.

with a tolle, or water boiled with Carraway feed, Carduus feed, and a crust of bread, or fuch posset drinke as is mentioned before in the second medicine; after some nutriment let them sleepe or rest often washing their mouth with water and bineger.

These Cordials must be repeated once in eight, ten or twelve houres at the fur-

If the partie infected bomit by his medicine, then repeat it presently, or else give him two or three spoonefuls of Uineger of Squills, or Drymel of Squills with, poset drink, and then after proceed.

Medicines externall.

Vencatories applied to the armes, intide of the thighes, or about the bottome of the calle of the leg, will draw forth the benome: but the bee of these requires the direction of the Doctors deputed.

for the swelling buder the eares, armepits, or in the groines, they must bee alwayes drawen forth and ripened, and

These Tumois, and much more the Carbuncles and Blaines doe require the care and skill of the expert Chirurgion: but not to leave the poorer fort destitute of good remedies, these following are very good.

lining Cocks, Dennes, Pigeons, or Chickens, and holding their vills, hold them hard to the Botch or Ewelling, and so keepe them at that part untill they die, and by this meanes draw out the poison. To breake the Tumor.

Takea great Onion, hollowit, put into it a figge, Rue cut finall, and a dram of Menice Treacle, put it close stopped in a wet paper, and roste it in the embers. Apply it hot but o the Tumor, lay three or foure one after another, let one lie three houres

Take two or three rolled onions, a Lile the root or two rolled, a handfull of Scabious rolled, foure or flue figs, a piece of leaven and a little Rue, stampe all these together, if it be toodry, put to it two ounces of oile of Lillies, or so much falt butter, make a pultesse, applie it hot, after it hath lieu three or soure houres, take it off and burne it, and apply a fresh pultesse of the same, if it proue hard to breake, adde a little burnt copperasse to the pultesse.

Applie an actuall of potentiall Cautery, laying a defensative of Boie-Armonisack, of Terra Sigillata, mired with Uineger and the white of an Egge, round about the tumour, but not opon it.

Take three or foure Cloues of Barlick, Rue halfe a handfuil, soure figges, Grong Leaven, and the Soote of a Chymney in which wood hath beene buent, of each, E 3 half

halfe an ounce, Mustard feed two drams, Salt a dram and a halfe, stampe these well together, and applie it hot to the soze: You may put thereto a little falt butter, if it be too dry.

Take Leaben halfe an ounce, Radish Rootes the bigger the better, an
ounce and an halfe, Mustard Seed two
drams, Onions and Barlick rosted, of
each two drams and a halfe, Menice Treacle, or Mithridatum, three drams, mire

Dereas in the first peere of the Reigne of our late Sousraigne, King lames of happy memozy, ouer this Realme of England, an Acte was made for the charitable reliefe and Dedering of persons infected with the Plague: whereby Authority is given to Indices of Peace, Maiors, Bayliffes, and other head Officers, to appoint within their Cenerall Limits Craminers, Searchers, Watchmen, Beepers, and Buriers for the persons and places infected, and to minister unto them Dathes for the performance of their Ditices. And the same Statute also authorifeth the giving of other Directions, as un= to them for the prefent necessity shall feeme Something of the to of \$ 310 annual good

good in their discretions. It is therefore boon speciall consideration thought very expedient for the preventing and ausyding of the Infection of Sicknesse (if it shall please Almighty God) which is now dangerously dispersed into many places within the City and Suburbes of the same: that these Officers following bee appointed, and these Orders hereafter prescribed bee duely observed.

Examiners to be appointed in euery Parish.

FIrst, It is thought requisite and so oz=
dered, that in enery Parish there be one,
two.oz moze persons of good sozt and credit,
chosen and appointed by the Alderman, his
Deputy, and Common Councell of enery
ward, and by the Justices of Peace in the
Counties, by the name of Examiners, to
continue in that Office the space of two mo=
neths at least: and if any sit persons so appointed as a sozesaid, shall resule to bnder=
take the same, the said parties so refusing,
to bee committed to pzison butill they shall
consome themselves accordingly.

That these Examiners bee sworne by the Alderman, or by one of the Justices of the

Watchmen.

pointed two watchmen, one for the day and the other for the night: And that these watchmen have a speciall care that no person goe in or out of such infected houses, whereof they have the charge, by on paine of severe punishment. That there bee a specialicare, to appoint women Searchers in euery parish, such

as are of honest reputation, a of the bell fort as can be got in this kinde : And thefe to be fmorne to make due fearch and true report, to the bimost of their knowledge, whether the perfons, whose bodies they are appointed to Search, doe die of the Infection, oz of what other difeates, as neere as they can. And for their better allitance berein, foralmuch as there bath beene heretofoze great abute in mifreporting the difeate, to the further spreading of the Infection: It is therefore ordered, that there bee chosen and ap= pointed three able and discreet Chirurgions, belides those three, that doe already belong to the Delthouse: amongst whom, the Citie and Liberties to be quartered, as the places lie most aut and convenient: and every of thefe lire to have one quarter for his Limit: and the faid Chiruraions in every of their Limits to toyne with the Searchers for the biew of the bodie, to the end there may bee a true report made of the difeate.

And furthez, that the laid Chirurgeons thall biffte and fearth such like persons as thall either send for them, or bee named and directed but o them, by the examiners of energ Parish, and informe themselves of the

difeate of the faid parties.

And forasmuch as the said Chirurgions are to bee sequestred from all other Eures, and kept onely to this disease of the Infection: It is ordered, that every of the said Chirur=

Chirurgions shall have twelve pence a book fearched by them, to bee paid out of the goods of the party searched, if he be able, or otherwise by the Parish.

Orders concerning infected houses and persons sicke of the Plague.

Notice to be given of the Sicknesse.

as any one in his house complaineth, either of Botch, of Purple, of Swelling in any part of his body, of falleth otherwise dangerously licke, without apparant cause of some other disease, shall give knowledge thereof to the Traminer of health within two houres after the said signe shall appeare.

Sequestration of the sicke.

A S soon as anyman shalve found by this Examiner, Chirurgion or Searcher, to be sick of the Plague, he shall the same night be sequestred in the same house. And in cass he be so sequestred, then though he after—wards die not, the house wherein hee sick—ned, shall be shut by for a moneth, after the bse of due Preservatives taken by the rest.

Ayring the Stuffe.

FOr sequestration of the goods and Auste of the Infected, their Bedding, and Apparell, and hangings of Chambers, must be well

well arred with fire, and such perfumes as are requisite within the Infected house, before they be taken agains to vie: this to be done by the appointment of the Examiner.

Shutting vp of the house.

prisonment: Andifany Broker or other persion shall buy any Bedding, Apparell, or osther Stuffe out of any Infected House, within two moneths after the Infection hath been there, his house shall bee that by as Infected, and so shall continue that by twenty dayes at the least.

No person to be conveyed out of any Infected house.

If any person Usated doe sortune, by negricent sooking buto, or by any other meaners, to come or be conveyed from a place infected, to any other place, the Parish from whence such Party bath come, or beene conveyed; byon notice thereof given, whall at their charge cause the said party so United and escaped, to bee caried and brought backe agains by night, and the parties in this case offending, to be punished at the direction of the Alderman of the Ward, and the Justices of the Peace respectively; and the house of the receiver of such visited person to be thut by so, twenty dayes.

That every house visited be marked with a Red Crosse of a foot long, in the middle of the doore, evident to bee seene, and with these bruall Printed words, that is to say, Lord have mercy upon vs, to bee set close over the same Crosse, there to continue until sawfull opening of the same house.

That order be taken, that no Hogs, Dogs, or cats, or tame Pigeons, or Conies be suffered to be kept within any part of the City, or any Swine to be, or stray in the Streets or Lanes, but that such Swine bee Impounded by the Beadle or any other Officer, a the owner punished according to the Act of Common Councell, and that the Dogs be killed by the Bog-killers, appointed for that purpose.

And for the better execution of these D2= ders, as also for such other directions as that be needfull, It is agreed that the Justices of the City and the Counties adiopning doe meete together once in ten dayes either at the Sessions house without Pewgate, or some other convenient place, to conferre of things as shall be needfull in this behalfe.

And enery person neglecting the duety required, or willingly offending against any Article or clause contained in these Orders, he to be severely punished by imprisonment, or otherwise, as by the law he ought.

A Proclamation for quickning the Lawes made for the reliefe of the poore, and the suppressing, punishing, and setting of the sturdy Rogues and Vagabonds.

Hereas many excellent Lawes and Statutes with great inogement and providence
have been made in the
times of Dur late deare and Royall
father, and of the late Ducene
Elizabeth, for the reliefe of the impotent and indigent Poore, and for the
punishing, suppressing, and setting
of the sturdy Rogues and Nagabonds.

bonds, which Lawes and Statutes, if they were duely observed, would be of exceeding great ble for the peace and plenty of this Realme, but the neglect thereof is the occalion of much disorder, and many infusterable abuses. And whereas it is fit at all times to put in execution those Lawes which are of so neces fary, and so continuall ble: yet the apparant and visible danger of the Pestilence, (vnlesse the same by Gods gracious mercie, and Dur provident endeuours be prevented) both much moze require the same atthis prient.

we have therefore thought it fit, by the advice of Dur Privie Councell, by this Dur publike Proclamation, straightly to charge and command, that all our louing Subjects in their severall places, doe use all possible care and diligence as a principall meanes to prevent the spreading, and dispersing of that contaging, and dispersing of that contaging.

ous ficknesse, to observe and put in due execution, all the said Lawes made and provided against Roques and Hagabonds, and for the reliefe of the truely pooze and impotent people. And that all Irish Rogues, and Magabonds be forthwith apprehended, wherefoeuer they thall be found, and punished. and fent home according to a former Proclamation, heretofore published in that behalfe. That all Houses holders of whose persons, or at Whole houses any such Clagrants chall be taken begging, doe appres hend, or cause them to be apprehended, and carried to the next Constable, ozother Officer to be punished, according to the Lawes. And that they forbeare to relieve them, thereby to give them incouragement to edtinue in their wicked course oflife. That

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That the Julices of Peace in their severall places throughout this Kingdome be carefull either by Prouost Parchals, or by the high Constables, or otherwise by their good discretions effectually to prouide, that all Rogues and Tagas bonds of all forts be fearthed for, apprehended, punished and suppres sed according to the Law. And that onceenery moneth at the least, a conuenient number of the Justices of Deace in enery severall County and Division, chall meete together in some convenient place in that divis uision, and take account of the high Constables, petty Constables, and other Officers within that Divilion, how they have observed the Lawes and Our commandment touching the Premittes.

And that they severely punish all such as shall bee found remisse or negligent in that behalfe. And wee doe hereby strictly charge and com-

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mand as well all and lingular Tustices of Peace, Constables, Head bozoughs, and other Dur Officers and Ministers, as also all Dur los uing Subiects of What estate 02 de gree soeuer, to ble all diligence, that all and every houses of places which are or thall bee vilited or infected with the licknesse, bee carefully thut by, and watch and ward kept over them, that no person or persons within those places doe goe abroad, or depart from thence, during the time of fuch Ailitation. And whereas wee have lately commanded a Booke to be printed and published containing certaine Statutes made and enacted hereto: fore for the reliefe of the Poore, and of Souldiers and Wariners, and for punishment of Rogues and Ca= gabonds, and for the reliefe and oz dering of persons infected with the Plague, and also containing cers taine Deders heretofoze and now lately conceived and made concerns ing health: All which are necessary to be knowen and observed by Dur louing Subjects, that thereby they may the better auoid those dangers which otherwise may fall byon their persons or estates by their neglect thereof: wee have thought it fit hereby to give notice thereof to all Durlouing Subjects, to the end that

that none may pretend ignorance for an excuse in matters of so great importance. And wee doe hereby declare, that whosoever shall be found remisse or negligent in the execution of any part of the Premisses, shall receive such condigne punishment for their offence, as by the Lawes of this Realme, or by Dur Prerogative Royall can or may be justly instituted by on them.



We it enacted by the authority of this prefent Parliament, that from and after the faid featt of Cafter nert, enery parifb within this Realme of England and Wales, shall be charged to pay weekly fuch a fum of money, towards the reliefe of fick, hurt, and maimed Souldiers and Pariners, that to have bin as afore is faid, or that lofe their Lims, or disable their bodies, hauing bin Preff, and in pay for her Materies feruice, as by the Justices of Beace, or the more part of them. in their general quarter Sellions, to be holden in their leuerall counties, next after the fealt of Cafter nert, and to from time to time at the like quarter Sellions, to bee holden next after the featt of Easter, peerely mall be of energyarish. appointed, so as no parish be rated about the fumme of ten pence, noz buder the fumme of two vence weekely to be vato, and so as the totall fumme of fuch taration of the Barithes, in any County wherethere thall be as boue fifty Parishes, doe not exceed the rate of fire pence for energ Parish in the same Countie, which summes so taxed, wall be geerely affelled by the agreements of the parithioners

Mozeover, her highnesse said Attourney further informed this Honourable Court, that sithence the said Proclamation, survey Decrees have beene made and taken by this Court, as well for the procrating, pulling downe, and defacing of divers new buildings: as also for reformation of devisions of Tenements: All which notwith standing, sundry wilful and desorbedient perfons, continue in their contemptuous manner of buildings and divisions: by meanes
