He village wherein' thefe wonderfull and wholefome Wells are, is called Hornbausen half a mile distant from Ashersleben and two miles from the City of Halberstadt, standing in a bottome or valley, betweene two little Hills, one towards

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the East, and the other towards the West, confisting at this prefent not of above fifty Boores or tenants, whereas in former times there were at least a hundred and fifty of them.

The Ministers name is Friderick Seligman; who was borne at Brunswigg. There are now fix Wells in the A 2 faid

faid Village, whereof but three are used. The first as being the head ipring on the fifth day of March. 1646. and was discovered by a youth comming from schoole who accidentally will into it with one of his legs. He that first of all dranke of it was one, that had beene troubled with an Ague for a long time, and in a very thort time after he had drunke of ir, he recovered. The fecond fpring on Midsummerday the 24. of Iune. And the third and fourth few dayes after. The fifth and fixth on the even of our Ladyes Visitation, but especially the fixth, during the time of publicke devotion. The first is as large, as a round table the fecond and third halfe as large but they yeeld all three fuch a quantitie and aboundance of water, that it is a wonderfull fight to all that have bin there. There is a distance of forty paces or thereabouts betweene each of these Wells. Concerning their vertues, effects and operations, it is certaine, that they are most miraculous, and answerable to the reportes that have bin noised both within the Empire, and dispersed beyond Seas, It is most true, that one Girle of Mansfeld, which was dumbe and deafe, from her youth did recover, fo that the was heard of many, when the faid after with good sense and understanding this passage of the Scripture, The Blood of Iesus Christ doth cleanse us from all our fins. Likewise a certaine Man, who was blind, and used to begge before the Gates at Leipzig, hath beene seene of some within few dayes, testifying that he could fee with one of his eyes all things, and full as well as any Man that is sharpesighted. In fumm, such wonderfull Cures happen every day, As the weekely thankfgivings after the Sermon, doe give a fufficient teftimony of them. Therease now

(3) Not long agoe, as wee are certainly informed, there hath been publick thanks-giving for the recovery of a hundred and twenty feven perfons at once, whereof there were thirty feven that had the Falling fickneffe. And a woman with a crooked back, which thee had twenty yeares. And laft moneth there was another publick thankes-giving faid for fourefcore perfons, which were all cured of very ftrange Difeafes and Infirmities.

Befides, the three principall Wells are not of one tafte, notwithstanding they are of one colour; The first is counted for the sweerest, and for this reason, it cannot be transported farre over land; The other is very falt, having fixe or eight Springs, with a fandy ground, not above a yard distant from a brooke; The third is of a middle tafte between the first and second. The water of the fecond is especially good, and excellent for any outward hurts and fores. There are many that have been reftored to their former fight (as the publick thanksgivings for them doth teftifie) which had loft their fights quite by the small pox; And we received but just now Letters from the Schoolemaster there that informe us that already fix hundred ficke bodies, of feverall difeafes, were recovered by drinking of the faid Wells for the space of eight or nine dayes. Certainly those that have been there prefent relate, that Gods wonderfull workes, might, power, mercy and goodneffe is evidently to be seene there, in these infirme and diseased Creatures, which by the drinking of this precious Water, were made whole, especially that were afflicted with these ficknesses following. As with the Gout, Feavers, Agues, Deafneffe, French pox, Crook-backs, A 2 Wormes,

Wormes, Blindneffe, Dumbneffe, Cholicke, Swollen legges, lameneffe in fhoulders, hands and feet, Scurffed and fcabby heads, all forts of old feftered hurts, Biles and fores, Plurefie, fore eyes, Dropfie, dif-jøynted limmes, and ftrained Sinewes and veines, ill ftomacke, Palpitation or beating of the heart, Apoplexi, Palfic, bitings of Dogs, broken armes or legs, Shooting in the head and eares, Short and dim fight, Tooth-ach, Convulfions, Bruifes and falls, Fiftulaes & running fores, Melancholick thoughts, Leprofie, defects in the Liver and Lights; Coughs, Headach, bloody Flux or iffue, Ruptures, Wennes, Carnofities, Impoftumes in the Kidneys, Cancers, Guidineffe, with many other, Difeafes and infirmities, which would bee too long to fpecifie.

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Moreover, there are at this prefent above five thoufand perfons come there, of all forts, ranke and condition from all parts of Germanie, as Nuenberg, Aufpurg, Munchen, Hanburg, Bremen, Stetin, Crc. with a world of Coaches and Wagons; fo that Travellers fometimes find difficultie to be furnifned with Horfes. His Highneffe the Prince Elector of Brandenburg, with his Mother and Aunt, Her Majefty the Queene of Smeden, are gone thither; And wee are informed that Generall Torftenfon, (who by reafon of his indifpofition in his body, was conftrained to refigne his Command to Wrangel) went thither in a Litter, and came away on horfe-back fully recovered.

Befides, we are of late informed, that by Gods infinite power and mercy those three principall Wells are multiplied and dispersed into fifteene all at a distance of fourty paces one from another. They write also, that the

(5) the Phyfitians have diffilled the fame Water, and found pure gold thereby. It is to be feared, that if men fhould not be fatisfied with the grace and mercy of God, that God fhall withdraw his bleffing, and turne it into a judgement. And for the obtaining of Godsbleffing, at fet houres in the morning, at eight of the clocke, and in the evening at 3, prayers are duly and conftantly performed in the prefence of fo many thousand perfons who altogether fall downe upon their knees, praying with the Minister after this manner following.

Lmighty God, mercifull Father, wee thy weake, discased, infirme and miserable children doe appeare here with sad, afflicted, and distressed countenances before thy most holy throne of Grace, bowing the knees of our hearts, acknowledging and lamenting our manifold enormous sinnes and transgressions, where with we have sinned against thee, O most righteons God, proveded thy wrath,

which is like the burning and confuming fire, and drawne upon our felves, all forts of judgements and plagues; so that then hast not onely vified as with the Sword Perfecution, Dearth and other panish ments, but also haft chastened, handled and afflicted our bodyes with feverall Diseases, Sores and Infirmities, and thereby hast fulfilled, wherewith then hast threatned us in thy Word long agoe; that whofoever sinneth against his Creatour, shall fall into the hands of the Physician. Now, Lord, mee must confesse, that wee have not onely justly deserved all these, but yet farre greater and heavier judgements ; yea, withall that them also in the middest of thy wrath and indignation dost shew mercy, for if those wouldest have dealt with us after our deferts, thou mightest have totally consumed and destroyed us in our fins, without giving us any respight for our repentance; whereas thou bast bin pleased not onely to prolong our dayes, that we might repent of our finful micked courso of life, but also as a loving Father, to chaftile and humble us with thy Fatherly rod of difeases and infirmissies, like as a temporall Fasher deth chastife his fonnes, that thereby 166

Morcover, O most merciful Father, fince these hast been pleased to shew thy selfe thus glorious and wonderfull through thy infinite goodnesse and grace in this place towards us unworshy and miferable finners, by giving and discovering unto us such a precious and powerfull remedy for the recovery of our health, whereby already great wonders have beene wrought, jo that wee are not able to expresse our thankefulnesse unto thee in all eternistie.
