An explanation of the Figures of the First Copper-plate.

A. Is the whole Still with all the parts put together.
B. The lower furnace with a Fireftone and a Grate.
C. The Afhhole. D. The Fire-place. E. The Secod Furnace. F. The Balneum. G. The firft Cover. H. The fecond Cover. I. The Body or Cucurbite. K. The Glafs-head. L. A pipe of Tin to be put on the beak of the Head. M. The fhutter of the Fire-place. N. The little Glafs-bottle Inverted containing the Spirit. P. The Lamp made of Tin to burn with Spirit of Wine, SS, The two pipes for the Weigs.

THis Engine or Still I did invent to diftil with it in Balneo Mariæ, and gave a Defeription of it in my laft Book Intitul'd, The Preferver and Reftorer of Health; and there hath been a great Number of them made, by my Direction, fome of Copper, and fome Brafs; but the most part of Tin. The Workman that makes them now is Mr. Edward Peet, Tin-plate Worker, at the Sun in Fleet-street, London.

It ferves also for Boiling and Stewing of Meat, either with Charcoal, or with the Lamp.

The Lamp ferves alfo to warm Meat, or to boil Coffee; It may be put under a Plate or Difh fet upon a little Threfoot; when you use it put some of the Spirit into the Lamp first, then fill the bottle, and put the nose of it into the hole of the Lamp, then having put the Cotten wiegs into the Spouts SS. light the same, and as you have occation, make use either of one wieg, or both: This Lamp is better than those round flat Lamps which when are set with all the Spiritunder the Difh, Plate, or Coffeepot will grow so hot in a little time that the Spirits will evaporate and A A wast exceedingly; this inconvenience is prevented by the use of this Lamp, for it standing without the little Furnace of your Coffeepot the Spirit remains cool : Besides you can see what quantity of the Spirit is consum d out of the glass, which you cannot do with the other Lamp.

An Explanation of the Second Copper-plate.

A. The Furnace or Stove made of Iron. B. The Fireplace. C. The Afh-hole. D. The Copper Vifica or Limbeck. E. The Head. F. The Swan-Neck made of Piuter. G. The Worm-tub. H. The Receiver. I. The Worm out of the Tub. K. Another Copper-head without a Swan-neck. L. A Sand-pan made of Iron to be put into the Stove. Q. A Matrafs or Bolt-head to digeft and extract Tinctures. R. A leffer Matrafs to join into the first to make a duble veffel. T. A Body or Cuburbite made of either Tin or Copper, which is to be put into the Vifica or Limbeck to diffil with in Balneo fome choice Cordial-waters in finall quantity, when you have occafion. WW. The Pipes with a fcrew to pour liquor thro' with a funnel.

For ex-IF you would diftil in Balneo with the faid ample! Body or Cucurbite, put the fame into the Vifica or Limbeck; which supposing the faid Vifica contain fix Gallons, let the Diametre of the Mouth of it be made fix Inches wide; then let the Body or Cucurbite be made fit to go into the fame, into which having put your materials you defign to diftil, and plac'd the fame into the Limbeck or Visica, fill the Vifica up with fair Water thro' the Pipe W. and close it with its forue. Then put on the Head, the top of the Cucurbite being made fo that the fame Head E. may may fit it alfo. Then Lute it well with a Lute made as fhall be taught afterwards, and diffil according to Art. If you have more liquor then your Body or Cucurbite (T.) will contain, pour the tame into it by the Pipe (W.) with a funnel, and to that end put in all your folid ingredients at first, keeping only the liquor out, for fo you need not unlute it to take off the Head, but to put the faid liquor in after you have diffil'd off fomuch of the Water that there be room for what liquor is left. And thus in *Balneo* you may diffil to drynefs, for there is no fear your Waters should taste of burning.

If you will not be at the Charge to have an Iron Stove or Furnace for your Vifica, you may put the fame in Brick-work.

Directions for Luting.

The beft and ftrongeft Lute for your Vilica is thus made. Take a ball of Whiting, fcrape of it with a knife, take of this Pouder one spoonful and a half, of Wheat or Rye flower one spoonful, make a soft past of it with brine or water and a little Salt; put of this with your Finger no more then will close or cover the Junctures of the Head and Visica the less the better, and if you fee that in distilling, any fumes pierce thro put on fome of the 4 ute.

For Luting a Glass head to a Body or Cucurbite, take a Bladder, and cut it in flips about the breadth of two Fingers, put them in fair water to foak a little; then put them upon the Junctures of the Head and Body. Or if you have no Bladder, then cut fome flips of Paper, and foread fome of the pafte upon them with a Knife, and fo apply them.

To Lute and mend the cracks in Glaffes ; take of Bole Armenick, Whitelead, and Redlead of each equal parts, grind them with Linfeed oyl as Painters do their Colours ; apply this with a Penfil, or fpread it ¹t on flips of Linnen, lay it over the craks, 'twill be fo ftrong as to hold any kind of liquor. The fame you may do with quick Lime and Linfeed oyl ground together.

Note, That if you have an Iron Furnace or Stove for your Velica or Limbeck, the lower part of it should be lin'd with a Lute (made of Clay and Sand, or pouder of Tiles) from the Grate upwards to the bottom of the Visica, and this will preferve and keep your Furnace from burning. The Lute may be also made of quick Lime, Sand and fair Water.

And becaufe there are fome diffillations that are to be made in a common Still, there being a great inconveniency in the Heads of those; I thought it good to give the defcription of a Head, by which you may draw a great deal more liquor at the fame time, and with the fame fire than with the common Head. For the liquor or water which is diffil'd in the common Still rifes (being forc'd by the heat of the fire) into the piramidical head in a vapour, where instead of Condencing and refolving into liquor, running down into the Current, finding the head very hot below is forc'd up again, and finding no vent upwards does but Circulate and walte; that is the Reason why so little water is drawn from the Materials in so long a time in the common Stills.

M. Is the Head which I have invented.

N. Is the Neck which goes into the Spout O.

P. Is a Pipe to put on the end of the Pipe O.

And those that have a Worm and Tub, they may put the end O. into the Worm, and then they may distill faster, taking care they do not burn the materials.

If any one fhall defire to have the Copper Still with the Tub and Worm, and the Body or Cucurbite made, If they pleafe to fend to me at my Houfe, at the lower end of Cherry-garden-ftreet near the Jamaica-houfe, I fhall be careful to get it made for them to their fatisfaction. THE

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

Choice, Approv'd and experienc'd Remedies for the cure of most Diseases, incident to Human Bodies, whether Internal or External.

CHAP. I.

Of Cephalik Remedies.

I. Pills for the cure of the Head-ach,

TAKE Pills of Amber half a dram, Rofin of Jalap four grains, Balfam of Peru what fuffices, make four Pills, take three at Night Bed-ward, and if they do not work, early in the Morning take the fourth. Dr. Willy:

Or take Scammony sulphurated ten grains, Antimony Diaphoretick fifteen grains, Cream of Tartar eight grains, mix and make a powder, give it in the Morning in a spoonful of B warm 2. Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Chap. I.

warm Ale, Broth or Panado. This is that which is call'd *Cornachinu*'s Powder, and is an excellent Medicine in any cafe where purging is requir'd.

Other Pills Excellent for the Head-ach.

Take of Pill-Cochiæ, Alæphangine of each a dram, Tartarum Vitriolatum a feruple and half with fyrup of Bettony what fuffices, make twenty Pills, take two at Night, and three in the Morning early; they are not only good for the Head and Eye-fight, but alfo for the Scurvy. Take them twice a week.

II. A Medicine much Experienc'd for the cure of the Head-ach.

Boil a good handful of the leaves of Ground Ivy in a quart of Ale to a pint, take half of it in the Morning fafting warm, and half at Night when you go to Bed: It admirably cures all Head-achs, Pains, Inflamations and Defluxions in the Eyes, Jaundice, Coughs, Confumptions. The Herb ftamp'd and appli'd to a Fellon like a Pultis cures it fpeedily. An Ointment made of it is admirable to cure old Sores and Ulcers, and if they need cleanfing you may add a little Coperas and Honey. Sir K. Digby.

III. To ease the Pain of the Head and cause reft.

Take a Role cake, fry it in Vinegar; then grate

grate upon it a Nutmeg, powder of Zedoary half a dram, Camphir two fcruples, apply it to the Fore head and Temples; you mult molften it with Vinegar as often as it dries.

IV. An other much Experienc'd.

Take red-Rofe-leaves dri'd, mix them with Wheatflower, Vinegar and oyl of Rofes, and fome Houfleek; boil them together until it be thick, fpread it upon a linen Cloth and apply it to the Fore-head and Temples.

V. An other for the Head-ach and Megrim often try'd.

Take of the Ointment call'd Vnguentum deficcativum rubrum, or the red drying Ointment one dram, Mastick powder'd two drams, mix them and make them into a Plaster; which spread upon Leather, and lay it to the Temples, and renew it every other day.

VI. A most Excellent Pill for the Head-ach, Megrim, Vertigo, &c.

Take Extractum Rudij two fcruples, Quercetans Pill of Tartar half a dram, Amber Pillsone Scruple, falt of Tartar, Rofin of Jalap, of each fifteen grains with fyrup of Mugwort, make fixteen Pills, take three or four early in the Morning two hours before you rife, and fleep after them if you can.

VII. A purging VV bey of Excellent use to cure the Head-ach in Person's of a Hot and Bilious Constitution.

[rdoary]

Take two quarts of new Whey, roots of Succory, Fennel, and Parfly of each a handful, the pith being taken out, and the Roots flic'd or bruis'd of Damask-Rofe-leaves a pugil, twelve leaves of red-Sage, three tops of Rolemary and Furnitery; boil it to a quart, then clarify it with the whites of two Eggs beaten and put on the Fire, which will make a cord that will rife with the Ingredients, fourn all thefe off; then take half a dram of Saffron, ty it in a clean Rag, and let it boil a little in it, then fquees it into the Whey, Strain it. It must be made over Night, and to be taken the next Morning cold, divide it into three Equal parts, and take them in three hours time, staying an hour between every draught, and walking after it as much as you can; continue it for three days together. It purges and fweetens the Blood.

VIII. A Drink to cure the Head-ach. Dr. VI'llis.

Take roots of butchers-Broom, the great Burdock, Chervil, Avens, of each an ounce an half; toots of Florentine Oris three drams, dry'd leaves of Bettony, Sage, Vervain, Fluellin of each half a handful, Galingal a dram and half, Raifins flic'd two ounces; boil them in two

two quarts of Water till a third part be confum'd; then add half a point of white-Wine, ftrain it and fweet'n it with Syrup of the five opening Roots, the dofe is fix ounces warm three times a day, www. in the Morning faffing, at four a Clock in the Afternoon, and at Night bedward. For fuch as are of a cold confticution and Flegmatick, add Lignum vite, Saffafrafs and Sarlaparilla. Dr. Willis.

IX. An Effectual Remedy for the Head-ach which has prov'd very Successful.

Make a Decoction of the dry'd leaves of either, Sage, Bettony, Vervain or Rofemary in Fountain-water, and with the Liquor make Coffee with the powder of Coffee-berries, an ounce to a quart.

X. A cruel and Inveterate pain in the Head cur'd in a young Lady.

Take white Hoarhound dry'd, boil it in water as you do Tea, drink it hot three times a day.

XI. A Chronical and Inveterate pain of the Head in a Lady curd.

Take Conferve of Wormwood, Maidenhair, Elicampane of each an ounce, Salt of Wormwood, Tamerisk of each a dram, with B 3 Syrup 6 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Chap. I.

Syrup of Maiden-hair make an Electuary, whereof fhe took two drams every Morning, fafting two hours after it, and every fifth day fhe took two fcruples of Extractum Rudij. By which fhe was cur'd in ten days time. *Riverims*.

XII. An Excellent Broth to cure the Head-ach.

Take a Cock-chicken, stuff it with Frenchbarly, Currans and Capers wash'd from the Salt, few it up and boil it with a piece of Veal, and in due time put into it Agrimony; Pimpernel, Borage, Buglofs, wood-Sorrel, being boil'd, strain it and dissolve in it a dram of Cream of Tartar, and the Infusion of three drams of Sena made in Endive water for twenty four hours, with half a dram of Cloves bruis'd, Drink half a Bint or Pint of it at a time two or three times a day; forbear all Salt and Sharp things, Pepper, ftrong Wines and Strong-waters; let Sleep and Watching be moderate and at convenient hours, forbear Sleeping foon after Eating, for that duls the Head ; let the Head be shav'd. Sir Theodor Mayern. A Blister drawn in the Neck, often cures the Head-ach.

XIII. The Head-ach cur'd in a Bishop of Chester, who was grievously afflicted with it for a long time, and badused many Remedies in vain.

Take Linen Cloths, wet them in cold Water, and lay them over the whole Head, and renew

renew it some times, dipping them again. Sir ' Theodor Mayern.

The Juice of Ground Ivy (vulgarly call'd Ale-hoof) fnuft up in the Nofe, do's purge the Head, and oftencures a very great and old Headach. Sir K. Digby.

XIV, APeriodical Head-ach cur'd in an Honourable Lady.

Take Conferve of the flowers of Cichory, and Fumintery of each three ounces; compound powder of Aron-roots two drams and half, Ivory a dram and half, yellow Sanders, Lignum Aloes of each half a dram; falt of Wormwood a dram and half, Vitriol of Mars a dram, Syrup of the five opening Roots what fuffices, make an Electaury; of which the took the quantity of a Cheftnut twice a day for fifteen days, by which the grew perfectly well, Dr. VVillis.

XV. An Experien'd outward Remedy for the Head-ach.

Take white Poppy-feeds, powder them and mix them with the Yolk of Eggs, and apply it as a Plaster to the Temples and Forehead; it gives ease in the greatest pain of the Head, as I have many times Experienc'd. Dr. Sermon.

8 Choice, Aprrov'd and Experienc'd Chap. I.

XVI. An other for the greatest pain of the Head.

Take a little Saffron, Gum-Arraback, Euphorbium and Myrrh, of each a like weight, reduce them to a fine powder, which temper with the white of an Egg and lay it like a plaster to the Forehead and Temples.

To cure the Hemicrania, which is a painful affection in one part of the Head; fometimes in the Right fide, and fometimes in the Left, fometimes before and fometimes behind.

XVII. A Clister for the Hemicrania.

Take Mallows, Violet leaves, Endive Lettice, water Lillies of each a handful, Damask Prunes twelve, boil them in fountain-Water, what fuffices: To one Pint of the strain'd Ligour add Lenitive Electuary half an Ounce, Electuary Diachatholicon five drams, Oyl of Violets two ounces, mix and make a Clister.

XVIII. A purging Potion for the Hemicrania.

Take Rhubarb thin flic'd one dram, infufe it in Endive-water, what fuffices for a Night, in the Morning strain it, and add Electuary of the Juice of Roses half an ounce, Laxative syrup of Roses half an ounce, mix and make a Potion to be taken in the Morning.

Or

Chap I. Remedies against the Head-ach.

Or take pills of Rhubarb, one scruple, pill Aggregative four grains, with syrup of Rhubarb solutive, make seven or nine Pills to be taken at one Dose.

XIX. A Cordial Electuary for the Hemicrania.

Take Conferve of Bettony-flowers, Borage, Buglofs of each an ounce and half, Conferve of Rofes one ounce, fpecies Diamofc. dulc. half a dram, Letific. Gal. one fcruple with fyrup of Clove-Gilly flowers, make an Electuary, take often of it, efpecially Morning and Evening, the quantity of a Cheftnut.

XX. A Cap or Quilt for the Head-ach, coming of Flegm or Melancholy.

Take Bettony, Stæchados, Marjoram, flowers of Mellilot, Chamomile of each half a handful, Cloves, Nutmeg of each two drams, Galingal, Calamus Aromaticus, Ciprefs of each two drams, mix and make a powder, let it be quilted between red Cloth, but not Callico.

The Tincture of white Amber is excellent in all the pains of the Head and Hemicrania, take from one dram to three drams in black-Cherry-water, Tea, Decoction of dri'd Sage, Bettony, or Rosemary.

When the Stomach is the caufe of the Headach, Elixir Proprietatis, and Minficht's Elixir of Vitriol, are of Excellent use. Dr. VVillie.

CHAP.

10 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch. II.

CHAP. II.

Of the Vertigo and Scotomia.

This Difease is call'd in Greek Exotoma; in Latin Vertigo ex vertendo, quod Caput vertere videtur; for the party that has this Discase thinks all things turn round.

I. Pills for the Vertigo or Swiming in the Head,

TAKE of Crato's Amber pills twenty five grains, rofin of Jalap fix grains, balfam of Peru what fuffices, make four Pills to be taken bed-ward or early in the Morning.

Or take Sulphur of Antimony five grains, Cream of Tartar ten grains, Castoreum two grains, make a Powder to be taken about three or four a Clock in the Asternoon with Governance expecting a Vomit.

To weak Perfons, after the Stomack being fill'd with light food, let Wine and Oximel of Squils be given to two or three ounces, and after let Poffet-drink with Cardus leaves boil'd in it be drank in great quantity, and prefently be thrown up again with a free or fore'd Vomiting: To others give falt of Vitriol, or of the Infusion of Crocus Metallorum.

Chap. II. Remedies against the Vertigo. I.

II. A drink for the Vertigo, Dizziness or Swimming in the Head.

Take Small-Ale-wort, boil in it inftead of Hops, fresh leaves of Misset of the Appletree, in four Gallons of this hang in a bag half a pound of the freshest Peacocks dung, and of Cloves bruis'd three drams, let it be for constant drink.

III. A Powder which bath prov d very effectual in curing the Vertigo.

Take roots of Male-Peony two ounces, flowers of the fame bruis'd and dri'd in the Sun one ounce, the white dung of a Peacock half a pound, double refin'd Sugar two ounces, make a fine Powder. The dofe is a Spoonful, drinking after it a draught of the Decoction of dri'd Sage or Rofemary. Dr. Willw.

IV. A purgative Potion for the Vertigo.

Take of choice Rhubarb two fcruples, Agarick one dram, Sena three drams, Fennel-feed one fcruple, Carraway-feed half a dram, Ginger ten grains, Camels-hay feven grains, Bettony, and Balm of each two pugils, infufe them all Night in water of Bettony, the next morning boil it to an ounce and half, wherein diffolve fyrup of Rofes laxative half an ounce, Extract. Rudij 12 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch. II.

Rudij five grains, water of Cubebs one dram, mix and make a Potion.

V. A Masticatory for the Vertigo.

Take Raifins of the Sun ston'd two ounces, Hysop, Origanum of each a dram, Acori condit. Mustard-seeds of each a dram and half, Pepper, Mastick of each one dram, Hony what suffices make a Masticatory.

VI. An Electuary for the Vertigo.

Take Galingal, Zedoary of each four fcruples, Sage two drams, Ginger preferv'd in the Indies one ounce, Nutmeg, Cinamon of each one dram, feeds of Peony a dram and half, Juniper berries one dram, Mint a dram and half, fyrup of Stæchados what fuffices; make an Electuary, take of it Morning and Evening the quantity of a Cheft-nut.

Or take Mace two drams, Cinamon one dram, leaves of Euphrage one ounce, Stæchados, Lavender flowers of each two drams, white Sugar the weight of them all, mix and make a Powder; the Dofe is a dram.

VII. An other Electuary for the fame.

Take Conferve of red-Rofes an ounce and half, Conferve of Bettony, Rofemary-flowers of each half an ounce, Conferve of Quinces one ounce,

ounce, red-Coral prepar'd half a dram, Species Aromoticum Rosatum a dram and half, with fyrup of Quinces what fufficies, make an Electuary, take often of it especially after meat.

VIII. An other Electuary of great vertue for the Vertigo.

Take Conferve of the flowers of Male Peony fix ounces, powder of its Roots an ounce, of its Seeds two drams, white-Amber, Coral, Pearl, all prepar'd of each two drams and half, fyrup of Coral what fuffices, make an Electuary; the Dofe is a dram and half or two drams, in the Evening and early in the Morning, drinking after it three ounces of the following diftil'd Water.

IX. The VV ater for the same.

Take fresh Misser of the Appletree fix handfuls, Peacocks dung two pounds, Cardamom bruis'd two ounces, Castoreum three drams, prepare and distil them with four quarts of Whey or Posset drink made with white Wine.

X. A Powder for Poor People for the same.

Take of Misletoe of the Appletree dri'd in the Sun and redcu'd to a fine Powder; the Dose is a dram twice a day, in a Decoction of dri'd Sage, Rosemary or Bettony.

The Tincture of white Amber, and spirit of Sal Armoniack or Harts-horn are of Excellent use in this case, and so are the Royal Cephalick drops or Effence which exceed them all, it will be set down in the Chap. of the Apoplexic.

XI. An Excellent Sneezing Powder for the fame:

Take of Tabacco one ounce, flowers of Lillies of the Vally, Marjorum of each two drams flowers of Rofemary, Lavender, Bettony, the Line tree of each a Dram, white Hellebore, falt of Vitriol of eack half a dram, feeds of Nigella one dram, Musk fix Grains, Amber greafe three grains, Oyl of Rhodium fifteen drops, mix and make a fubtil Powder; It is excellent in Catarrh, Rheum, and ftoppage in the Head. Junckins.

XII. An other for a cold Rheum, and stoppage in the Head.

Take an Orange, and pare of very thin the yellow Rind; roul it up conveniently to put up into the Noftrils, turning the innermost fide outward, to be next the Flesh within your Nose; put a roul into each Nostril, It provoks Sneezing, and comforts and strengthens the brain. Sir K. Digby.

XIII. Other Pills of Excellent use for the Vapors and Vertigo, &c.

Take Galbanum, Opoponax, and Bdellium

of each two drams, of the Mafs of Pill Maftick one dram, Oyl of Amber eight drops, mix and make a Mafs for pills, out of each dram make nine pills, whereof take three every Night when you go to Bed.

XIV. An Excellent Cordial against theVertigo; or Scotomia vulgarly call'd Vapores.

Take of black Cherry-water four ounces, Pennyroyal-water, Hyfterick-water, and of the compound Peony-water of each two ounces, fyrup of Lavender one dram, fyrup of Balm an ounce and a quarter, mix them, and take thereof fix Spoonfuls whenfoever you are troubl'd with the Vapores of Swimming in the Head.

XV. Excellent Pills for the fame.

Take of Extractum Rudij two scruples, pills of Tartar of Quercetan half a dram, of Crato's Amber pills one scruple, Rosin of Jalap and falt of Tartar of each fifteen grains, with syrup of Mugwort make fixteen Pills. The Dose is three or sour very early in the Morning, and sleep after the taking of them if you can. They cure the Vertigo, Dizziness or Swimming in the Head, strengthen and clear the Eye-fight.

XVI. Other Pills for the same. Take Hiera Picra simple, make it up into Pills

16 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch III.

Pills as big as a grey Pea with fyrup of Bettony or Mugwort. Take three at a time every fecond or third Night when you go to bed; they are very profitable for the Head and Stomach.

XVII. The Vertigo cur'd.

Dr. Gliffon being grievoufly afflicted with the Vertigo for the space of seven Weeks, his Head being shav'd he apply'd the following Plaster : Take flower of Sulphur, and with the white of Eggs make it into a Plaster and apply it; by which he was cur'd, as he himself related to Dr. Bates.

XVIII. A Balfam of great Vertue for the fame.

Take Deers Tallow, and with the Chymical Oyl of Sage, Majoram, Rofemary, and Amber make a Balfam, wherewith anoint the infide of the Nostrils, the Nape of the Neck, and the Suturs of the Head; Its profitable alfo against the Apoplexie. Mayarn.

CHAP. III.

Of the Apoplexie:

The Apoplexie in Greek and Latin is call'd Apoylexia Sideratio; or Morbus attonitus, because those that are taken with this Disease, lye without Chap.III. Remedies against the Apoplexie. 17

without sense and motion, as if they were stricken with Thunder.

I. A purging Medicine proper for Apoplectick Perfons.

TAke extract of black Hellebore from ten grains to fifteen, Rofin of Colochynthis three grains, or its Tincture two drams, fpirit of Sal Armoniack fix drams, Tartar Vitriolate, powder of Caftor of each ten grains, with Sage water what fuffices, make a Potion, which the Patient may take every third Morning if need require.

II. Pills for the fame.

Take Pills of Euphorbium Cochia minoris Auria of each fifteen grains, Troches alhandal three grains; with the diftil'd water of Marjerom make feven Pills, of which take three at Night and four in the Morning early, especially near the full and change of the Moon.

Ill. A Drink for the fame.

Take midling Ale-wort, boil therein leaves of white fweet fmelling Hoarhound dri'd fix handfuls; Then take four Gallons of the faid Ale where the Hoarhound was boil'd in, and put it in a Runlet and hang in it the following ingredients: Take Anacardium, Cardemoms of each an ounce and half, flice and bruife them and put them in a Bag in the faid Ale. 18 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch.III.

IV. A Chocolate for the fame.

Take powder of the Roots of Male-Peony, Mans-fcul prepar'd of each half an ounce, fpecies Diambræ two drams, make a powder to every paper of which add Cocao-nut-kernels a pound, Sugar what fuffices, make a Confection or Chocolate. Take half an ounce or fix drams of it every Morning in a draught of a Decoction of Sage, Peony flowers or the like.

V. A Cordial powder very prefitable for the fame.

Take powder of the roots of Male-Peony, Mans-fcul prepar'd of each an ounce and half, roots of Zedory, baftard Dittany, Angelica, Contrayerva, of each two drams, make a fubtile powder, to which add the vellow rinds of Oranges and Lemons preferv'd of each two ounces, pound them very fmall and mix them with the powder; Take thereof half a dram or a dram an hour before or after meal.

VI. A Clifter for the fame.

Take Hyfop, Penny royal, Sage, Rue, Herbmercury, Centory, Calaminth of each half a handful, Polypody half an ounce, Anifeed, fweet Fennel-feed bruis'd of each two drams, make of all a Decoction, to a pint of which add of Hyera picra compos'd two drams, Elect. Indi half

half an ounce, Hony of Rofes two ounces, Salt two drams, oyl of Rue three ounces, make a Clifter.

VII. Conferse of Rue which is of great vertue for the Head and Brain, preferving against Apoplenie, Palsie, Vertigo and the like.

Beat two parts of fine Sugar with one of Rue into a fine Conferve; eat thereof in the Morning falting, about the bignefs of a large Nutmeg, drinking after it a little glafsful of the following water, or a Decoction of dry Sage or Rofemary. Sir K. Digby.

VIII. An Excellent Cephalick water against the Apoplexie, &c.

Take tops of Marjerom, flowers of the Linetree, Lillies of the Vally, flowers of Rofemary, Primrofes, Cowilips, Lavender of each three handfuls; you must gather these things every one in their season, and put them in three pints of spirit of Wune rectifi'd, or two quarts of the best Brandy, and a pint of Hungarion water, keep it close stopt till you have all the rest of the ingredients, and when you put in the last, power into them three pints of Orange-flower-water, or of the best Rose-water, let them Infuse eight days longer, then Distil it in Balneo Maria.

This Water is highly commended and efteem'd by the Nobility in France, to fortify C 2 the

the Brain and the Noble parts to prevent as well as cure the Apoplexie, Vertigo, and all Difeafes of the Head and Brain, fweeten it with Loaf-fugar to your taft, and Drink a little wine-glafsful of it at a time. 'Tis profitable alfo against the Palsie.

IX. A choice Electuary to comfort and frengthen the Head and Brain.

Take Conferve of Sage-flowers, Rofemaryflowers, Marjerom, Stæchados, Lavenderflowers of each half an ounce, preferv'd Calamus aromaticus, confection of Anacardina of each two drams, powder of Diambr. Diamofe. of each half a dram, feeds of Rocket, Rue of each one dram, with Oxymel of Squils, or Hopy of Anacardina make an Electuary; the Dofe is the quantity of a Nutmeg every other day, there may be alfo added a few grains of Caftor.

X. Quercetans's Elixir of Life for the Apoplexie, Palsie, Vertigo, &c.

Take Nutmegs, Mace, Cinnamorr of each an ounce, Cloves half an ounce, Orange peels and Citrons of each three drams, Saffran two ounces, rectifi'd spirit of Wind three pints, mix and digest them in warm Sand in a Matrass close stop for some days, shaking it some since, then strain it and keep it close stop. It is a great Cordial, revives the Spirits, cheeps the

the Heart, strengthens the Head and Brain, the Nerves and all the other principal parts, and comforts the whole body; the Dose is from one dram to two drams in either black Cherywater, or Lavender-water simple.

X I. Lozenges very Cordial and profitable against the Apoplexie.

Take species Diambræ two drams, powder of the roots of Male Peony, Zedoary of each a dram and half, Pearls prepar'd a Dram, powder of Amber half a dram, duble refin'd Sugar diffolv'd in Peony-water, and boiled to the confistancy for Lozenges fix ounces, make Lozenges of half a dram, eat one or two of them often in a day at pleasure. Dr. Willis.

Spirit of Sal Armoniack, fuccinated, cotalliated, or impregnated with Mans-fcul or Caftoreum, arc of excellent use against the Apoplexic, and so is the Elixir of Vitriol, and the *Mixtura Simplex*, and above all the Royal Cephalick Effence, all which you will find in their proper places.

XII. A Plaster for the fame.

Take Galbanum, Opopa iax, Pirethrum, Mustard-seeds, Castor, Pepper of each two drams, flower of Sulphur, one dram, Turpentine half an ounce, oils of Rue and Sage 22 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch.IV.

ten drops, powder what is to be powder'd, and make a Plaster, which apply warm to the Head.

XIII. A Sneezing-powder for the same.

Take Marjerom, Bittony, Caftor of each one dram, make a Powder, blow up part of it into the Nostrils with a quil.

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Of the Palsie.

The Palsie is call'd in Greek παραλμσις & πο ρεσις in Latine Refolutio wel Relaxatio, remific, seu actionis defectio. The Palsie is a prevation of sense and motion; not of the whole body, but of half the body; as of the Right side or of the Lest, or some particular part, as the Hand, Arm or the like.

The parts affected are the Brain, and the Spinalis Medulla.

The Palfie is caus'd by reason of many thick and gross humours, stopping the Nerves, and hindring the animal faculty.

I. Purging pills proper for the Palsie.

TAke Pill Cochiæ, Alæphangin. Hieræ compofit. Agaric trochifcate of each one fcruple, mix them and with fyrup of Stæchados, what fuffices make Pills. Chap. IV. Remidies against the Palsie. 23

II. A purging Petion for the same.

Take flowers of Bettony, Cowflips or Primrofes, Stæchados, Sage of each three drams, flowers of Borage, Buglofs of each half a pugil, Cichory, Groundpin, Fumitery of each one pugil, Sena three drams, Fountain water what fuffices, boil it two nine ounces, for three times, of which take for one time four ounces, fyrup of Rofes folutive with Agarick half an ounce, mix them and make a Potion. If need requir this Potion may be given two or three times.

III. Other Pills for the Palsie.

Take of the pills of Affaiereth, Cochiæ Troches of Agarick of each two fcruples, with a fufficient quantity of the distill'd water of Sage make ten Pills, whereof take two at Night and three in the Morning.

The next day take Mustard made with Elder Vinegar, and often chew of it in your mouth, in the fame manner you may use Pellitory of Spain, Mustard-seed, or hold in your mouth half an ounce of spirit of Lavender, mixing therewith one or two grains of the powder of Euphorbium, all which have been known of wonderful effect. Dr. Sermon.

For the Palfie, after a Vomit and a Purge duly order'd, the learned Dr. Willis advises to be prescrib'd after the following forms. IV.

IV. An Electuary.

Take Conferve of Garden Scurvy-grafs, and Rocket, made with an equal part of Sugar of each three ounces, Ginger preferv'd in the Indies an ounce, the yellow Peels of Oranges and Lemons preserv'd of each fix drams, powder of the Claws and Eyes of Crabs of each four fcruples, Species Diambræ two drams, Wintershark a dram and half, roots of Zedoary, Galingal, Cubebs, feeds of Garden-Creffes and Rocket of each a dram, spirit of Scurvy-grass and Lavender of each two drams, syrup of preferv'd Ginger what fuffices, make an Electuary, whereof take the quantity of a Cheltnut at eight a Clock in the morning, and at five in the afternoon, drink after it a pint of the folfollowing Decoction.

V. A Decotion.

Take Lignum Vitæ fix ounces, Sarfaparilla, Saffafras ot each four ounces, red and yellow-Sanders, fhavings of Ivory and Hartshorn of each half an ounce; pour upon them two Galons of Fountain water, make it boiling hot, then let it ftand close cover'd all Night, the next Morning boil it to one half, adding crude Antimony powder'd and ti'd in a rag four ounces, roots of the leffer Galingal, Calamus Arematiseus of each half an ounce, Florentine Oris

an ounce, Cardemom fix drams, Corianderfeed bruis'd half an ounce, fix Dates, Liquoris an ounce; make a Decoction and let it be us'd for ordinary drink. At Night when you go to Bed, and early in the Morning, take a Dofe of fpirit of Hartshorn or of Sal Armoniack fuccinated in three ounces of the following distil'd water.

VI. A Cordial-water for the Palfy.

Take of the leaves and roots of Aron a pound, garden Scurvy-grafs, leaves of the greater Rocket, Rofemary, Sage, Savory, Tyme of each four handfuls, flowers of Lavender three handfuls, the peels of ten Oranges and fix Lemons, Winters-bark three ounces, Cubebs, Cloves, Nutmegs of each an ounce, being bruis'd puor to them of white Wine and Brunfwig-Mum of each two quarts; diftil it and mix the first and last water together. After every Dofe of the Electuary the Patient may take fix ounces of Coffee, with the leaves of dri'd Sage boil'd first in the Liquor a good handful in a quart.

-Sometimes inftead of the Electuary for fifteen or twenty days give a Dole of the Tincture of fulphur Terebinthinated, the Tincture of Antimony, or the Tinture of Amber; fome times give the Elixir Propietatis or the Elixir of Peony in a fpoonful of the diftil'd water aforemention'd, and drink after it three ounces of the fame. Dr. Willis.

VII. Lozenges of Excellent use for the Palsie.

Take roots of Zedoary, Gallingal of each a dram and half, fpecies Diambræ a dram, Mufeard-feed and feed of Rocket, Scurvy-grafs and water-Creffes of each half a dram, make a fine powder of all, add oyl of white Amber half a dram, with fix ounces of Sugar diffolv'd in Peony-water, and boil'd to the Confiftency for Lozenges, make Lozenges each weighing half a dram, let three or four be taken twice a day, drinking after it a Dofe of fome one of the Liquors before mention'd.

VIII. The Lady Barington's rare Balfamick-spirit for the Palsie, Apoplexie, Cramp, weak Sinews and old Strains.

Take two quarts of ftrong English Brandy, put into it a pound of the roots of Mafterwort, Sarsaparilla, and Castoreum of each half an ounce being bruis'd a little; of Lavender flowers, and Sage flowers of each half a handful, put them in a fit vessel of Glass, stop it close and set it in warm Sand or in the Sun for four days, shaking it fometimes; then take Camphir one dram, dissolve it in half a pint of rectifi'd spirit of Wine, put the vessel in a cold place to let it cool, then put into it the dissolution of the Camphir, then pour of the Spirit into a glass bottle and keep it close stops. Bathe the part affected with it cold,

cold, rubbing it well in; for the Palfie rub the mould of the Head and nape of the Neck; It is good for fhrunck Sinews, it ftrengthens the Nerves, is good for the Gout, any Crick or Aches, any diftemper that proceeds from cold. For the Head ach rub the Temples and Forehead with it: and in other cafes ufe it twice a day rubing it well in: and that you may feldom open it, keep fome in little glaffes for your daily ufe: you may alfo digeft it in an earthen or ftone Jug or Pitcher glas'd within, which you may fet in a Kettle of warm water.

IX. Dr. Willis's fyrup of Steel for the Palsie.

Take duble refin'd Sugar, diffolv'd in black-Chery-water boil'd to the confiftency for Lozenges eight ounces, adding of Dr. *Willis's* Steel powder'd three drams, ftir them well together on the fire, and then pour to them by degrees Rofemary-water warm'd twelve ounces, let them boil gently for a quarter of an hour, taking off the Froath ; then pour it out warm through a Flannel-bag; the Dofe is a fpoonful in three ounces of the following Palfie water.

X. The Palsie water.

Take roots of Aron, male-Peony, Angelica, Master-wort of each half a pound; leaves of Sage, Rosemary, Marjerom, Brooklime, Watercresses of each four handfuls, flowers of Prim-

Primrofes, Cowflips, Marygolds of each three handfuls, the Peels of fix Oranges, and four Lemons; all being duly prepar'd pour to them new Milk three quarts, Malaga-wine two pints, diftil them in a common still,

Hartman, Becaufe you cannot get all these things at one time, therefore in my opinion you would do better to gather them every one in their seafon, and keep them in strong Brandy a quart, and then instead of Milk to take so much fair Water; for if you distil it with Milk your Water will soon grow sower and be spoil'd.

XI. An Electuary for the same.

Take Conferve of the flowers of Lillies of the Vally, Primrofes, Cowflips, flowers of Sage of each two ounces, Mithridate one ounce, the Brain of a Hair rosted and dri'd, seeds of Peony, Juniper berries of each two scruples, with syrup of Stæchados make an Electuary; the Dose is half an ounce every day.

XII. A drink for the Palsie experienc'd by Dr. Poleman.

Take of Guaiacum four ounces, Bark of the fame and Saffafrafs of each two ounces, Cowflip flowers dri'd, Bettony flowers, Sage flowers and Caffedonia of each three ounces, Juice of the roots of Pompions two ounces, Raifins and

and Figs flic'd of each two ounces, boil them in three pints of Water for half an hour, then let it ftand twelve hours, then boil it again for an hour and half; the Dofe is three ounces three times a day.

XIII. An Ointment for the Palsie.

Take of white Pepper, Pyrethrum of each two drams, Castoreum, Euphorbium of each ten grains, oyl of Chamomil, oyl of Fox of each an ounce, mix and make an Ointment, anoint the Back-bone with it hot before a fire and the parts affected.

I knew a Gentlewoman that was afflicted with the Palfie in both her hands, fo that fhe could not feed her felf, nor handle any thing; fhe was perfectly cur'd by Dr. Moor a German Phyfician by the following means:

Take Unguentum Nervinum, and of the Foctid oyl of Tartar, or Hartshorn of each equal parts, mix them well together, with this fome of it being warm'd the Back-bone was anointed, and the fame well rub'd in before a fire, from the Neck down to the Reins, and the Arms and Hands to the Fingers end; this was done twice a day, viz. Morning and Evening, fhe wore Flannel shifts; her ordinary drink was eight shilling beer with Sage and Rosemary put in the Cask half a peck of each into four Gallons of drink; by these the was perfectly enr'd in the space of half a year, as the ber felf related to me. Hartman. CHAP. 30 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch.V.

CHAP. V.

Of the Cramp, or Convulsion.

The Cramp, or Convulsions is call'd in Greek σπασμές, in Latin Convulcio. It is an involuntary contraction of the Nerves and Muscels.

I. Pills for the Cramp.

TAke of the Fœtid pills, and Sagapen pills of each a feruple and half, Troches of Agaric ten grains; mix and with fyrup of Stæchados, or Bettony make Pills.

II. An Electuary for the fame.

Take of the Conferves of Bettony and Rofemary flowers, Cowflip-flowers of each one ounce, fyrup of Stæchados what fuffices, and fpirit of Caftor two drams, make an Electuary. Give of this Morning and Evening afmuch as a Nut.

III. A Julep for the same.

Take Cinnamon-water, water of the flowers of the Linetree of each one ounce, oyl of Juniper Berries, four drops, oyl of Amber ten drops, spirit Chap. V. Remedies against the Cramp. 31

fpirit of Vitriol two drops, mix and make a Julep.

IV. A Masticatory for the Same.

Take Ginger preferv'd an ounce and half, Muftard, Pyrethrum of each half an ounce, Pepper one dram and half, Caftor, Mastick of each one dram, Calamus Aromaticus two drams, mix and make Lozenges to be chew'd in the Mouth.

V. An Ointment for the Cramp.

Take oyl of Bricks an ounce, oyl of Turpentine, half an ounce, Juniper berries two dtams, Cloves one dram, Nutmeg, Mace of each hlaf a dram with oyl of Wax what fuffices, make an Ointment.

VI An other Ointment for the Cramp.

Take of the Ointment of Populeon two parts, oyl of Spike one part; mix them, and with the mixture anoint well or chafe the part affected.

VII. A Smeeting Powder for the same.

Take Marjerom, Euphorbium, Pellitori of Spain of each two scruples.

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CHAP. VI.

Of the Epilephe or Falling-fickness.

The Epilepsie has many names; in Greek 'tis call'd 'επιλησγια, from 'επιλαμζανω, Retineo apprehendo: for this Difease doth suddenly surprise the mind and senses, and Epileptick persons many times fall down when their fits come upon them.

Hence in Latine 'tis call'd Morbus Caducus, à Cadendo, the Falling-ficknefs.

Those that are taken with the Falling-fickness before ripeness of Age may be cur'd; but they that are taken with it after twenty five years of Age, for the most part it doth accompany them unto death.

I. A Vomit for Infants and Children that are Epileptick.

TAke falt of Vitriol from tengrains to a fcruple, mix it with a little Conferve of Rofes, or in a fpoonful of Canary, or give Wine of Squils with fresh oyl of Sweet Almonds.

II. Other Vomits for the Epilepfie.

Take Crocus Metalorum, or Mercurius Vitæ from

from four grains to fix, Mercurius Dulcis from fixteen grains to a fcruple, grind them together, mix it with the pap of an Apple, or a dram of Conferve of Borrage, make a Bolus :

Or give from half an ounce to an ounce and half of the Infusion of Crocus Metallorum, or Mercurius Vitæ made in Sack. Or take Mynficht's Emettick Tartar from tour grains to fix: Those that are of a more tender constitution may take falt of Vitriol from a scruple to half a dram, and after half an hour let them drink upon it store of Ale-posset-drink, then a quilt or the singer being put into the throat, let Vomiting be provok'd, and sometimes repeated.

III. A Specifick powder for the Falling-fickness.

Take roots of Male-Peony, dri'd and powder'd, from a dram to two or three drams, give it twice a day in the following Tincture.

IV. A Tincture for the fame.

Take Mifletoe leaves of the Oak, (and if that cannot be had, of that of the Appletree) two drams, Peony roots flic'd half an ounce, Caftoreum a dram, put them in a clofeveffel withBettony-water, or fimple Peony water and white Wine, of each a pint, falt of Mifletoe of the Appletree two drams, digeft in warm Sand for two days; the Dofe is three ounces with a dofe of the powder before prefcribed. Thefe things D experience 34 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch.VI.

experience hath prov'd to be very effications, Dr. VVillis.

V. An other powder for the same, greatly commended by some Authors.

Take Castoreum, Opopanax, Sanguis Draconis, Antimony, Peony-feeds of each a like quantity make a powder. Dose from half a dram to a dram, every Morning in Wine or an appropriated Decoction, or in black Cherywater.

VI. An Electuary for the same.

Take Conferve of Male-Peony-flowers, of Lillies of the Vally, of each three ounces, feeds and Roots of Male-Peony powder'd of eack two drams, Coral and Pearl prepar'd and Manffcul of each two fcruples, falt of Mifletoe of the Appletree a dram and half, with fyrup of Coral make an Electuary. The Dofe is the quantity of a Nutmeg Morning and Evening.

VII. A Confection for the Same.

Take roots of Male-Peony an ounce, feeds of the fame half an ounce, Milletoe of the Oak or of the Appletree, Elks-hoof, Mans-fcul prepar'd of each two drams, roots of Angelica, Contrayerva, Virginia Snak-root of each a dram, white Amber, Coral calcin'd of each a dram, falt

falt of common Milletoe two drams, Sugarcandy diflov'd in a fufficient quantity of the Antiepileptick-water of Langius eight ounces, make a Confection. The Dofe is the quantity of a Nutmeg twice a day.

VIII. An Excellent Elixir for the Falling-fickness.

Take Hungarion Vitriol fix pounds, put it in a glafs Retort, and diftil it in Sand for twenty four hours; then Lute the fame Retort and put it into a Reverberatory Furnace, and having a dapted a large Recepient, force over all the acid fpirits by a ftrong fire; Rectifie the whole liquor diftil'd by a Sand heat in a lefs Retort, and keep it in a Glafs clofs ftop'd.

Then take roots of Male-Peony four ounces, feeds of the fame an ounce, Mans-fcul prepar'd, Elks-hoof, red Coral of each half an ounce, Mifletoe of the Oack two drams, reduce them all to powder, put them in a Matrals and power upon them the diftil'd fpirit, ftop it clofe. and digeft it in Sand with a gentle heat for many days, shaking it some times till the Tineture is extracted; then pour of all the Liquor, put it in a Retort and diffil it till only a third part remain, keep that which is diffil'd by it felf: To what remains in the Retort pour an equal quantity of spirit of Wine highly rectifi'd and impregnated with the fame ingredients by digestion; digest them together for fix days in. Horfdung or in a gentle heat of Sand, fo will YOU

you have a Excellent Elixir. The Dofe is from ten to twenty drops, and of the diffil'd Liquor from half a spoonful to a whole one.

IX. A Distild water and Julep.

Take common Vitriol fix pounds, roots of Male-Peony fix ounces, Milletoe of the Oak or of the Appletree an ounce, green Walnuts ftamp'd half a pound; diftil thefe in a glafs Cucurbite with a glass-head in a Sand furnace : Take of this Liquor a pint, water of black-Cherries, and Linetree-flowers of each half a pint, double refin'd Sugar four ounces, mix and make a Julep. The Dofe is two or three ounces twice a day.

X. A Sneezing powder.

Take Marjerom dri'd two scruples, Caster ten grains, Euphorbium two grains, mix and make a Powder.

XI. A purging Potion for the fame.

Take Troches of Agarick four fcruples, infus'd in Oximel of Squils and prefs'd out ftrongly, Castoreum three grains, syrup of Roses Solutive with Agarick an ounce and halt, Balm water what fuffices, mix and make a Potion to be taken in the Morning. and the back and the at of Sauce to Wal

XII. A Powder for the fame.

Take of the roots of Peony two drams, Oris, Elks-hoof, Mifletoe of the Oak, feeds of Peony of each half a dram, red Coral prepar'd two fcruples, of the green Emerald prepar'd ten grains, white Amber half a dram, make a powder.

XIII. An other Powder.

Take the Bladders of Boars with the Urin in it, number two, put them in a Glaz'd pipkin and dry them in an Oven after the Bread is drawn, fo that they may not be burnt, make of them a fine powder, whereof give a dram for a Dofe with Peony-water, prov'd effectual.

XIV. Pills for the fame.

Take of pills Foetid one fcruple, black Hellebore prepar'd, Caftoreum of each ten grains, with fyrup of Stæchados make five Pills.

XV. A Bolus for the fame.

Take of Mans-scul prepar'd a dram and half, seeds of Peon half a dram, Mitheridate two drams, powder what is to be powder'd, make a Bolus, give of this every Morning. Alphonsus Ferrens says he has cur'd a great D 3 many

many Epileptical Perfons by a fimple decoction of Guaicum, being taken twice a day from fix ounces to eight, and a fecond Decoction of it being taken inflead of ordinary drink. If to fuch a Decoction the roots of Peony and other Specificks be added, haply it will be more efficacious. It feems probable that a Salvation powerfully rais'd by Mercury, and afterwards follow'd by a fweating Diet drink, will infallibly cure this Difeafe. Dr. Willis.

XVI. An Experienc'd Anti Epileptick powder of the Liver of green Frogs.

Take the Livers of forty green Frogs that are in the Water, taken a live in the month of *May*, *June* and *July*, until the midit of *August*; lay the Livers upon Colewort-leaves, on the under fide of the Leaves, lay them one by one, then dry them in an Oven after the Bread is drawn, then feparate them from the Leaves, and reduce them to a fine powder, which divide into five equal parts; give the Patient one part in the Morning fafting, in any appropriated Liquor, another at Night two hours after Supper, the third part the next Morning, and the other two parts, one at Night and the other the next Morning, and neither Eat nor Drink till two hours after the taking it.

With this Remedy was cur'd Frederick the 4th Elector Palatine, who was Epileptick from the 15th to the 26th year of his Age. Dr. Hartmannus in his Practical Chymistry.

XVII.

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XVII. An Amulet for the Falling-fickness.

Take a young fhoat of Elder found in a Willow-tree, cut it into short pieces not slit, but whole about half an Inch long; take Nine of them and run them through with a thread, which ty in a Knot and hang it about the Patients Neck, fo that it hang at the Pit of the Stomach upon the bear Scin, some also ty it about the Neck and wear it as a Neck-lace : It may be gather'd at any time of the year, but it is best in the month of September and October, when the Berries are ripe. It is faid that when the Thread breaks, and the Amulet falls down, it fhould not be toucht with hand but with Iron, and be buried deep in the ground and a new one be put on. Dr. Hartmannus fays that many have been cur'd by it, that had labour'd a long time under this Discase. An Honorable Lady lately told me that feveral Epileptick Perforts in Kent had been cur'd by it. Hartman.

XVIII. A Corrected Anti-Epileptick Swallow water.

Take twelve Swallows yet in their Nefts, cafe them whole into a glafs Cucurbite, adding fhavings of Mans fcul three ounces, Caftor one ounce and half, powder of Mifletoe of the Oak or of the Appletree, juice of the roots and leaves of Male-Peony fix ounces, water of the flowers. of

of the Linetree and Lavender of each a quart, Vinegar of Squils half a pint digest them in a gentle fand heat for forty hours, then distil it with a moderate heat in Sand, and keep the Water for use.

This Water has particular vertues against the Epilepsie, Vertigo, &c. the Dose is a spoonful in the fit; and may be continu'd every day, as occasion requires, after the use of General Remedies. Dr. Charras in the Royal Dispensetory.

XIX. En Excellent Anti-Epileptick Oyl.

Take the fhavings of Mans-fcul that died of a violent Death four ounces, Amber pulveriz'd half a pound; mix them and put them in a Glafs-Retort, and diftil them in Sand with a gradual fire, take the Oyl, fpirit Flegm and Volatil falt and rectify it.

This Oyl is highly efteem'd for the cure of the Falling-ficknefs, being given every Morning for a month together, in fome Cephalickwater from three to four, five or fix drops; you may alfo anoint with it the infide of the Noftrils, Temples and the Sutures of the Head. Dr. Charras.

XX. A famous Anti-Epileptick powder.

Take the After-birth of a Woman brought to bed of her first Child (being a Boy) dri'd and cleans'd from the scins one ounce, roots of Male-

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Male-Peony and feeds of the fame of each half an ounce, fhavings of Mans-feul, Elks-hoof, Mifletoe of the Oak, roots of wild Valerian, Perls and Coral prepar'd, Contrayerva-ftone, white Amber, and feeds of Goats-rue of each two drams, mix and make a powder; the Dofe is from half a fcruple to a dram in Cephalickwaters, or it may be mingl'd with folid Electuaries, and continu'd as occasion requires. Dr. *Charrafs.*

XXI. A Sneezing Powder for the same.

Take white Hellebore a dram, Castoreum, Euphorbium of each half a dram, sweet-Marjerom, and Rue of each two drams, mix and make a Powder.

Untzerus highly commends the Gall of a fucking Whelp, that the whole Gall-bladder be taken forth and given in fome Cephalick liquor.

A dram of the dung of a Peacock newly made and Infus'd in a Glass of white Wine over Night; then strain'd and given fasting every Morning from the New to the Full of the Moon.

XXII. An experienc'd Remedy against the Fallingsickness, wherewith Sir K. Digby cur'd a Ministers son at Franckfort in Germany in the year 1659.

Take of the Scull of a Man that died of a violent

violent Death; of the parings of Nails of a Man of each three drams; reduce this to a fine Powder, and grind it upon a Marble stone; then take Polypody of the Oak, dri'd two drams, Mifletoe of the Oak gather'd in the wane of the Moon half an ounce, Mifletoe of of the Tile-tree two drams, Male-Peony roots half an ounce; reduce all into a fubtile powder, then take fix ounces of Sugar, boil it to the confiftence of Sugar of Rofes; then mix all the powders with it, and ftir them well together over the fire to make them well incorporate; then make it up into Lozenges about a dram a piece; whereof give one in the Morning fafting, and another at four in the afternoon, and another at bed time; Continue this till the Lozenges are all fpent. By the use of these he was perfectly cur'd to which I was an Eyewitness, helping to prepare the faid Remedy with my own hands. Hartman, 1971, bis 1

XXIII. An other Experienc'd Remedy for the (ame.

Take true Mifletoe of the Oak, the Leaves, the Berries, and all the tender branches, dry it gently in an Oven after the Bred is drawn, reduce it to a fine Powder; of which give afmuch as will ly upon a fhilling for one of ripe-years; for midle Age a fix-pence; for a Child a groat, give it Mornings and Evenings in Cowflip-water, three days before and three days after the Full of the Moon. By

By this only Remedy was cur'd the Lord Herbert's fon, and many other Perfons of quality. Sir K. Digby relates, that the Daughter of the Earl of Warwick's elder Brother had the Falling-ficknefs in the greatest extreamity; fo that the fell like a logg feven or eight times a day without motion : They had put her into the hands of the ableft Physitians in England, who in effect could do her no good. A Gentleman, one of their Neighbours, under took the cure, and perform'd it by this Remedy.

The best time to gather the Missetoe, is in the month of September and October when its berries are ripe, and in the waning of the Moon.

CHAP. VII.

Of the Incubus or Nigh-Mare.

The learn'd Dr. Wills has given us an ample defcription of the Nature of this Difeafe; but every one has not his Works; I though it would not be a mifs to infert it here.

That the Nature of this Difeafe may be the better known, in the First place let us confider its *Phænomena*. A fit of the *Incubus* or Night-Mare most commonly, and in a manner only feazing us whil'st we are a fleep; is wont to be rais'd for the most part after the stomach's being loaded with food of ill digestion, and laying

on the Back in the Bed; those that are troubl'd with it, feem to perceive themfelves chiefly affected within the Breast, and about the Pracordia: For refpiration being supprest or very much hinder'd, they think themfelves oppreft with a certain weight laying heavily on the Thorux, which weight cheats their imaginations, fometimes with one Aparition, sometimes with another, and when they think to shake it off, or put it from them, by the motion of the Body or Limbs, they are not able to ftir either their Body or Limb any way; but after a long strugling in the Pracordia and sometimes almost to the lofs of Life, at length they awake; and being fully come to themfelves from their fleep, the imaginary weight vanishes on a sudden, and the moving force of the Body is reftor'd; there remaining never the lefs for the most part a trembling of the Heart, and often a very quick and violent viberation of the Diaphragm; afterwards the fit being ended, the deception of the Fancy apprehending the dreadful species of an Incubus or Night-mare comes to be known. Now, the we allow the monftuous species, (which is conceiv'd) of the Incubus to be a mear dream, yet it is manifest that the Præcordia are really affected, and that the motions of the Puls and refpiration are in a manner supprest and letted, viz. In as much as that oppreffion of the Breaft is plainly perceiv'd by many whilft they awake; Nay, as they are freshly stir'd from fleep, and when that is remov'd, trembling of the

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the Heart and Diaphagm enfue; whence it follows, that these parts are cumbred and undergo a great damage. Wherefore, whatfoever others may think, I judge that a fit of the Incubas is caus'd, in fomuch as in fleeping a cettain Incongruus matter is diftil'd into the Cerebellum together with the Nervous Juice, which caufing a heaviness or certain Stupefaction to the fpirits in their first force, forces them presently to forbear a little from the performance of their Functions; fo that by a fecond Lethargy, as it were, rais'd within the Cerebellum the vital Actons fuffer a fhort eclips; during which, partly from the striving of the over charg'd Præcordia. and partly from the blood being very much heapt together, and ftagnating within them that oppression, and sense of an Incumbent weight, as it were, is caus'd : Moreover, becaufe all the other faculties of the whole body depend on the motion of the Heart, Therefore this being hindr'd and supprest, those presently fall into faintings and diforders.

(III)

Tho it be feldom that any Perfon dies of this difeafe alone, yet those that are frequently obnoxious to it, if at any time they are feiz'd with other Cephalick affects, as the Lethargy, Carus, Apoplexie, or Epilepsie, they are in a very dangerous condition, because the Morbifick matter, sent from the Blood into the Brain, easily invades the Cerebellum also, being so difpos'd; so that the Difeas'd suffering an Eclips of the vital Function together with the Ani-

mal,

mal, are brought into a greater danger of Life : Hence it is a common observation, that those that are wont to be frequently troubl'd with the *Incubus* often dy Apoplectical.

An other lifue of the Incubus or Night-mare is wont to be lefs pernicious, that it often leads to the passions of the Heart, and other affects commonly accounted for Hypocondriacal. I have known many troubl'd with the Incubus in their youth, who, as they grew farther in years, being free from that, were affected with a trembling and panting of the Heart, and with other griefs about the Præcordia, and Hypochondres, and very forely with Convultions; we judge the cause of this Morbid change to be, that the Morbifick matter, after having been often wont to be set the circumference of the Cerebellum; at length, making a violent affault, penetrats deeper into fome private place, and paffing its texture, Rushes into the Nerves appointed for the Præcordia. As to the cure of this Difeafe, for as to its fits, because they soon pass away of their own accord, there is no need oft : The Therapeutick method after a provision to be made for the whole, by blooding (where it is proper) and a gentle purge, fugeft to us the chier use of those Remedies which are vulgarly accounted Cephalicks: Therefore the powders of white Amber, Coral, Pearl, Roots of Male-Peony, bastard Dittany, Contrayerva, also Electuaries, Lozenges, distil'd Waters, Tinctures, Elixirs, and other things wont to be

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be prefcrib'd in the Lethargy and Apoplexcie, are good here ; but in the first place a due form of Diet being order'd; let food that is gross, and of an ill concoction, puls and hoary fruits be avoided, nor must the Person indulge himfelf to fleep, studying, or reading presently after scheme fleep : Let large and late suppers, and laying . on the back be forbidden.

Because Infants and Children are often troubl'd with this Difease (a fign of which is, that they are shaken in their sleep, and upon their awake cryout terribly) and having undergone frequent fits of it, often fall into Convulfive affects: Therefore as foon as they feem affected with it, let a due method of cure be us'd to them : Let it be inquir'd concerning the milk they fuck, whether of it felf being without fault, and laudable, it agrees well with their Stomachs? let them not be permited to fleep prefently after having fuckt their fill: Let the Nurfe, using a good form of Diet, take also Morning and Evening a Dole of a Cephalick powder, or Electuary, drinking after it a draught of poffet drink with the leaves of Sage, or Bettony, or the roots or feeds of Peony boild in it : Let the Infants take twice a day a spoonful of an appropiated distil'd water :' Let it have an Iffue in the nape of the Neck, let it lay fometimes on the one fide, fometimes on the other. but feldom or never on the back. Let it wear about the Neek, or on the pit of the Stomach, Cotal, or Bracelets made of the feeds or roots OF

of Male-Peony. If at any time in fleeping being often and forely fhaken, they feem to be dangeroufly affected with this diffemper, let blifters be appli'd to the Neck, or behind the Ears: Evening and Morning let a Dofe of the powder of Gutteta, or fome other that is Appropiated be given in a fpoonful of diffil'd water or Julep.

A Purging Potion proper for Persons troubl'd with the Incubus or Night-Mare.

Take Polypody of the Oak, Senna of each half an ounce, Angelica one pugil, Peony feeds bruis'd one dram, Ginger one dram, Anyfeeds and Carraway of each make an infufion, and gentle decoction inFountain-water what fuffices, in four ounces of the strain'd liquor diffolve Electuarium Diaphenicon half an ounce, or fix drams, make a Potion.

CHAP. VIII.

Of the Lethargy or Sleepy-Feaver.

The Lethargy is nam'd in Greek λήθαργος, in Latine 'tis call'd Veternus.

The Lethargy is an Oblivious difease, in which there is a necessity of sleeping that possesses the party, joyn'd with a gentle Fever, and many

many times adepravation of fenses, especially of the memory.

Dr. *Willis* in this difeafe, for the first thing he orders a smart Clifter, and prefently after the Jugular vain to be open'd rather than a vain in the Arm, because by this means the Blood very much heap'd together, and haply stagnating within the Sinews of the Head, will be more easily reduc'd to an even circulation.

After bleeding, other Remedies are prefently to be apply'd of every kind; let a large Blifter be drawn in the Neck, and Leggs; the Face and Temples anoint with oyl of Amber, let Volatil falt or fpirit of Sal Armoniack be frequently held to the Noftrils, or little bits of Papers or Rags rould up and dipt in it and put up into the Noftrils.

I. A Pultice for the Lethargy.

TAke Rue, Pepper-wort, Crow-foot well pounded together with black-Soap and Seafalt, apply it all over the Feet. Let the Limbs be well rub'd.

II. A Julep for the same.

Take Water of Peony-flowers, black-Cherries, Walnut-fimple of each three ounces, Compound Peony-water two ounces, Cafforeum tied in a rag and hung in the glafs two drams, E mix

Sugar three drams, mix and make a Julep; the Dofe is four or five spoonfuls, every third or forth hour with twelve or fifteen drops of spirit of Sal Armoniack, Harts-horn, or Amber in every dole, or a Dote of the following Powder.

IHI. A Powder for the fame.

Take Male-Peony-roots, Mans-feul, Virginia Snak-roots, Contrayerva of each a dram, Bezoar, Pearl of each half a dram; all prepar'd and made into a fubtil powder, divide it into twelve parts.

CHAP. IX.

Of the Coma and the Carus.

The Coma and the Carus are Certain fleepy affects, viz. a Continual fleepinefs.

An Excellent Pill for the fame.

TAke a Dofe of Amber pills, or pill Cochiæ with Rofin of Jalap, once or twice a weak. At other times going to Bed, and early in the Morning take a Dole of a Cephalick Electuary, or the fpirit of Sal Armoniack, or of the Royal Cephalick Effence, or the Tincture of Amber, in a Cephalick Julep, fuch as you have in the foregoing Chapter of the Lethargy.

At eight a Clock in the Morning and at five in the Afternoon take a draught of Coffee, having

having first boil'd in the Liquor, leaves of dri'd Sage or Rosemary till it aquires a green Tincture, an handful of either in a quart of Water, fimell often to the Volatil falt, spirit of Sal Armoniack or to our Royal Cephalick Effence. Blisters are proper in this case, not only to be appli'd to the Neck but to the Leggs and Arms, and to other parts of the Body by turns.

CHAP. X.

Of the Dilireum, or Phrenhe.

The Phrenfie is call'd in Latine Phrenitis, and Phrenefis, in Greek opevitis.

The Phrenfie is an Inflamtion of the brain, or the meninges thereof, with a continual Feaver, bringing a Delirium.

I. A Julep for the same.

TAke of the Waters of Apples, black-Cheries, and Cowflips of each four ounces, of whole Citrons two Ounces, Pearl prepar'd a dram, fyrup of the juice of Citrons an ounce; mix and make a Julep; the Dofe is three ounces three or four times a day.

II. A Drink for the same: Take of Wood-forrel two handfuls, of Bo-E z rage

rage four handfuls, two Pippins pounded to mash, Sal Prunella two drams, the pulp of one Orange, duble refin'd Sugar an ounce, being bruis'd and pounded together, pout to them of Fountain-water two or three pints, press it out strongly, and put it in a bottle; the Dose is fix or seven ounces, to be taken at pleasure often in a day.

II. Palmarius's Divine drink for the Phrensie, for Squenching of thirst is :

Take Fountain-water with Sugar and Juice of Lemon; Water, or Whey with the leaves of Meadow-fweet, or Burnet infus'd or boil'd in them; an Emulfion of a Decoction of the Roots and Flowers of Water-Lillies, with the feeds of Mellons, Fountain or diffil'd waters, with the pulp of boil'd Pippins diffolv'd in them.

Medicines that induce fleep are often neceffaty in this difeafe (faith the learned Dr. VVillis) but fuch as are ftrong are not proper prefently at the beginning, nor may they be frequently us'd, because fleep caused by Opiats brings the matter more to the brain, and fixes the more deeply.

III. A Cordial drought to induce Sleep in the Phrency.

Take water of Cowflip-flowers four ounces,

fyrup of Meconium half an ounce, Pearl a fcruple, mix and make a draught to be taken at Night bedward, or take white-Poppy-feeds two drams, Sugarcandy a dram and half, being bruis'd together pour to them of white-Poppywater fix ounces, prefs it out and give it after the fame manner.

IV. The Lady Lusons's Remedy to cause Sleep in the Phrensie and Madness,

Take the Gall of a Hare, boil it in white-Wine and let the Patient drink it, and it will make one Sleep till you give him Vinegar.

Outward Remidies which provoke Sleep, are often apply'd to the Temples and Forehead with fuccels; make a Liniment with the oyl of Nutmeg by expression, and ointment of Populeon, to which you may add five or fix grains of Opium; or take a Rose-cake, or of Poppies, with Vinegar and powder of Nutmeg.

V. A Purge proper in the Phrensie.

Take choice Rhubarb two drams, of the Cordial-flowers of each a pugil, Cinnamon, Spicæ of each ten grains; Intuie them in Endive water what fuffices in the strain'd Liquor diffolve Electuary of Roses two or three drams, syrup of Roses Laxative one ounce, mix and make a Potion to be given the day after Phlebotomy.

VI.

\$4 Choice, Aprrov'd and Experienc'd Ch.XI.

VI. A Cordial Potion to induce Sleep.

Take of Lettice and Purflain of each one handful, a white-Poppy-head, Violets, and flowers of water-Lillies of each a pugil, make a Decoction in three ounces whereof being strained diffore fyrup of water-Lillies compound, syrup of red Poppies of each half an ounce, mix and make a Potion to be given at the hour of Sleep.

CHAP. XI..

Of the Mania, or Madness.

Madness in Latine Mania, is an alienation of the mind, or a vehement Delerium, without a Feaver.

1. A Vomit for the same.

TAke fulphur of Antimony from eight grains to ten, Cream of Tartar half a fcruple; mix them by grinding them together, and make a Powder to be taken in a fpoonful of Broth, or Panada, or if it must be given craftily, and the Perfon not knowing it, put it in a crust of white-Bread to be taken in Broth or Milk: Let it be repeated once in four days. Chap. XI. Remedies against Madness.

II. An other for the same,

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Take Mercurius Vitæ fix or seven grains, give it after the same manner, the Emetick Tartar of Mynsicht, Hercules Bovij, may be given after the same manner, Aurum Vitæ or the Solar, and also the Lunar precipitat, are accounted by Chymists Specifick Remedies against Madness, and indeed Mercurial medicines (fays Dr. Willis) in assuch as they work by Vomit and Stool, and often also by Sweat, Urin or Salivation prove egredioutly beneficial : A Copious Spitting and long continuance has perfectly cur'd some mad Persons, Dr. Willis.

III. A Purging Bolms for the same.

Take Extract of black-Hellebore, Calomela. 2005 of each a feruple, make a Bolus.

IV. An other for the fame.

Take Calomelanos a scruple, Diagridium, from twelve grains to fifteen make a Powder.

V. An other for the same.

Take Confection of Hamech, or the Electuary of the juice of Rofes from half an ounce to fix drams, give it in Broth. 56 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch.XI.

VI. A Purging Draught.

Take of Gereons's Decoction of Sena, or the Decoction of Epythymum, (with two drams of the Roots of black-Hellebore) fix ounces, make a draught, or take Pulois Diasena, two drams, give it in Whey.

The spirit of Allum is far better in Mania and Phrensie, then the spirit of Vitriol; as also in burning Feavers; for it is a great cooler.

Sir Theodor Mayern relats, that Angelus Sala told him, that in Mania and Melancholy he had the Tincture of St. Johns-wort for a great fecret, and fome times when the Tincture could not be had, he us d to boil the Tops of St. Johns-wort in Rhenish-wine and small beer, and sound it Effectual.

VII. The Tincture of black-Hellebore for the fame, Dr. Bates.

Take of the Fiebers of black-Hellebore one ounce and half, Calamus Aromatic. two ounces, Galengal half an ounce, Saffran a dram and half, Cardamoms three drams, Canary or Spanifh-wine three quarts, pound the ingredients a little, and digeit them in a Veffel clofe ftopt for twenty hours in a warm place, afterwards in a cold place for five or fix days; then prefs it out and filter it; the Dofe is two fpoonfuls at the time of going to Reft or Sleep, and three fpoon-

fpoonfuls in the Morning for fome days. It is of great use for such as are Melancholy, or troubled with Madness, especially that kind of Madness which proceeds from a deep Melancholy; for which and all Obstructions and Oppressions of the Spleen: It is a very excellent thing. It is also of singular use for the Headach, Megrim and Hemicrania.

An other Author prepares it thus.

The Ingredients being pounded a little, with a little spirit of Wine, put them in a Cucurbite, and pour upon them fo much spirit of Wine that overtops them the breadth of four fingers, distil of the spirit to dryness, in Balnco Maria, or in Sand, And while the ingredients are yet warm, beat them well in a Mortar, fo will they eafily yeild a Tincture ; then pour upon them the fame spirit which you distil'd off and digest it in a gentle heat till the Tincture is extracted, which pour off; and pour upon the Ingredients fomuch Canary as to make up three quarts with the spirit of Wine which you put on at first; digest it for some days, then strain it, and mix this last Tincture with the first; the use and Dose is the same with the other.

Sir Theodor Mayern relates that Dr.Cadman told him, that if white Helebor be infusid, two drams of it in fix ounces of Muscadel-wine, and of the infusion a spoonful being given, gives a gentle Vomit,

Vomit, and evacuats the flimy and tough humors, and looffens the Belly, operats with much fafety; and that which is remarkable, is, that when the first Infusion is taken, if you pour fresh Wine upon the remaining Roots it will have the fame Operation as before; as it is with the Crocus Metallorum.

VIII. A Linement for the same.

Take feeds of Henbane, of white-Poppies of each two drams, roots of Mandrake one dram, Opium ten grains, Saffran fix grains, make them into fine powder; then take oyl of Rofes an ounce, of Chamomil half an ounce, Oyntment of Populcon three drams, mix and make an Oyntment apply it to the Temples and Sutures of the Scul.

IX. An Experienc'd Remedy for Phrensie and Madness.

Take the juice of Sage, of Burnet, and of ground-Ivy, and give the Patient a good glafsful of it. Sir K. Digby.

CHAP. XII.

Of Choice Remidies for Stupidity or Folly.

Take spirit of Sal Armoniack succinated, from fifteen to twenty drops in the Evening and early

early in the Morning, in three spoonfuls of the following Cordial-water, drinking after it seven spoonfuls of the same.

A Cephalick Cordial water, for Stupedity or Folly.

TAke fresh leaves of Misser growing on Appletree fix handfuls, Sage, Rosemary, Savory, wild-Tyme, Calamint, Peny royal, Marierom, the greater Rocket of each four handfuls, roots of Angelica, Masser-wort of each fix ounces, Cloves, Nutmeg, Mace, Cinnamon, Ginger of each an ounce, Zedoary, Galingal, Calamus Aramaticus, winters-Bark of each two ounces, Cubebs, Cardamums, grains of Paradice of each fix drams; all being flie'd and bruis'd, pour to them of the best Canary-wine fix quarts, Stop the Vessel close and let it stand cold for three days, shaking it now and then; then distil it, and mix the first and last running together, and sweeten it with loaf Sugar to your tast.

After the use of spirit of Sal Armoniack succinated for fifteen days, let other Medicines have their turns, for about the same space of time, such as are the spirit of Soot, Harts-horn, Mans-scul, the Tincture of Coral, Antimony, Castoreum, Amber, Quercetan's Elixir of Life, Elixir Proprietatis, spirit of Lavender, &c.

CHAP. XIII.

Choice and Approv'd Remedies against Melancholy.

I. A Vomitory for the Melancholy.

Take Oxymel of Squils an ounce and half, wine of Squils an ounce, fyrup of Tobacco two drams, mix them; If it works not at all or very flowly, provoke Vomiting by drinking plentifully of Poffet drink, having the leaves of Carduus boild'd in it.

Or take of the Decoction of middle-bark of the Elder four ounces, falt of Vitriol from one to two fcruples, Oxymel fimple three drams, mix them, give it after the fame manner.

II. A Purging Potion for Melancholy Perfons.

Take Sena three drams, Epythymum, Rhubarb of each a dram and half, yellow Sanders half a dram, Coriander-feeds two fcruples, falt of Worm-wood half a dram, Celtick-fpick a fcruple, Infuse them for a Night in white-Wine and water of Apples of each four ounces; then ftrain it, and to five ounces of the strain'd Liquor add syrup of Epithymum fix drams, Aqua Mirabilis two drams, mix and make a Potion.

Potion. In Bodies hard to be wrought on, add a dram or two of Fibres of black-Hellebore beaten and steept in Vinegar.

III. Pills for the Same.

Take Qercetan's pills of Tartar, or Crato's pills of Amber half a dram, Rofin of Jalap, or of Scammony fix or eight grains, Tartar Vitriolate ten grains, Gum Ammoniacum diffolved in Aqua Mirabilis what fuffices, make five Pills take four at Night, and if they do not work early take the other.

IV. Other Pills for the Same.

Take Calomelanos, Extract of black-Hellebore of each a scruple, Rofin of Jalap six grains, Gum Ammoniacum dissolv'd what suffices, make four Pills, take them in the Morning with Governance.

The Powder call'd Haly, is greatly commended by Valescus de Terrenta, Bareda and others, and indeed this seems to be a pretty fit Cathartick in Robust bodies.

Take Lapis Lazuly, Agarick of each three drams, Epythymum half an ounce, Scamony a dram, Cloves in number thirty, make a fine powder; the Dofe is from half a dram to a dram in a drought of Posset drink, or in a fingle Decoction of four or five scruples of Epythymum. 62 Choice, Approv'd and Experinc'd Ch.XIII.

V. A Cordial Electuary against Melancholy of Mrs. Rutherges.

Take of the Conferves of Rofes, Borageflowers, Cowflip-flowers, Clove Gillo-flowers of each one ounce, preferv'd Citrons two ounces, Alkermes half an ounce; preferv'd Nutmegs, preferv'd Mirobolans of each half an ounce, Bezoar fifteen grains, Tincture of Saffran half a dram, mix and make an Electuary, with fyrup of Clove Gillo-flowers, adding two or three drops of oyle of Cinnamon; the Dofe is the quanty of a Nutmeg three times a day; drink after it a Glafs of the diftil'd Cordial-water following.

VI. A Cordial diftil'd water against Melancholy:

Take Baum, Borage, Buglofs, Fumitory, Water-Creffes, Brooklime of each four handfuls, Clove Gillo-flowers, flowers of Marygolds, Borage, Cowflips of each three handfuls, the peels of fix Oranges and four Lemons, being all flic'd and bruis'd, Infufe them in four quarts of Whey made with Cider, then diftil them, and mix the first and last runnings together and sweeten it with loaf Sugar to your tast. Dr. Willis.

VII. An other Cordial Electuary against Melancholy. Take Conferves of Clove Gillo-flowers, and

of Borage-flowers of each two ounces and half, Myrobolan Rinds condited fix drams, Coral prepar'd and Pearl of each a dram and half, ivory and Crabs-eyes prepar'd of each a dram, Confection of Hyacinth two drams, fyrup of Coral or red-Popies, what fuffices, make an Electuary; the Dofe is two drams, or the quantity of a large Nutmeg Morning and Evening, drinking after it three ounces of the following Julep, or a Glafsful of the aforefaid Cordialwater. It revives the Spirits, chears the Heart, fortifies Nature, and fweetens the whole Mafs of Blood.

VIII. A Cordial Julep against Melancholy.

Take Water of Cowflip-flowers, black-Cheries of each fix ounces, of Baum four ounces, Dr. Steven's Water two ounces, Sugar fix drams; mix and make a Julep. Dr. Willis.

IX. A very good Powder against Melancholy.

Take Vitriol of Mars, Cream of Tartar, Crabs-Eyes repar'd of each a dram; mix and make a Powder, which divide in nine parts, take one every Morning in the diftil'd Water or Julep before mention'd.

Whey if it agrees with the Stomach, being drank plentifully for many days is often us'd with good effect, by washing away the Salt, and Sulphuros particles of the Attrabilious Blood; Whey 64 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch.XIII.

Whey with Epythymum boil'd in it is egregioufly comended by learned Phyficians.

X. A Chicken-broth against Melancholy.

Make a Chicken-broth, with the roots of Polypody, Chervil, Fennel, Butchers-broom, Ceterach, Hartstongue, Scolopendre, &c. boil'd in it: Take a draught of it in the Morning, and at five of the Clock in the asternoon, with fix grains of Vitriol of Mars disolv'd in it; falt of Worm-wood and Cream of Tartar of each a fcruple. Dr. Wills.

XI. A Bottle drink against Melancholy.

Take Leaves of Borage, water-Creffes of each fix handfuls, two Pippins, the Pulp of two Oranges, pound them together, and pour to them of the beft Cider a pint and half; prefs it out ftrongly, and diffolve in it an ounce of loaf-Sugar; put it in a Bottle; the Dofe is two ounces or more Morning and Evening. It egregioufly contributes to the taking away of the difcrafy of the Blood.

XII. Take Dr. Willis's Steel prepar'd three ounces, Infus'd in a quart of the Cordial diftilled Water at Sect. VI. aforegoing; the dofe is three or four ounces twice a day, by it felf or with fome other folid Medicine.

XIII. An other Drink against Melancholy.

Take filings of Steel turn'd to ruft an ounce; put them in a Glafs, and pour upon it two ounces of the juice of Oranges, let it fland for twelve hours, fhaking it fometimes; then pour it to water of Apples, and white Porto, or black-Chery-wine if you have it, or good mild Cider a quart; take three ounces of it twice a day. Wine made of black-Cherties is accounted egredioufly good againft Melancholy.

CHAP. XIV.

Of the Watching Evil,

FOr the cure of this disease opening of a Vain is proper, also Blisters drawn; let Diacodium and Laudanum in case they agree well, be frequently taken, and mean while that the Opiats give truce, from the violence of the disease, let the cause of it be eradicated, by the use of other Remedies as much as may be : Wherefore day after day, at the Physical hours let things be given that take away the sharpness of the Blood and Nervous juice and restore them to sweetness: In which rank are accounted *Testaceous's* powders, as Pearl, Coral, Crabs-Eyes, and the like Apozems and altering F 66 Choice, Approv'd and experienc'd Ch.XIV.

distil'd waters, of temparate Antifcorbutick, gentle preparations of Steel, spirit of Harts-horn, and above all, Tincture of Antimony, or the Tincture of Metals.

Again as to the removal of the Morbifick caufe of this Watching Evil, we have given it you in the foregoing Chapter of Melancholy; mean while for the immediat removal of that fymptom, as often as it forely preffes, we obferve (fays Dr. Willis) that Opiats will not do, for being given in a good large dofe, they feldom caufe fleep, and render the affected more faint and weak : It often fucceeds better, if going to Bed they take fome gentle and pleafant drink, as efpecially our Ale being clear and mild, or alfo Poffet drink with dr'd Cowflipflowers boil'd in it, or an Emulfion of the feeds of Mellons, and Almonds, in a great quantity, Namely a quart or three pints.

CHAP. XIV.

Of Deafness, Sound and Noise in the Ears. &c.

I. To cure the Pains of the Ears caus'd through cold.

TAke the oyl of Rue and bitter Almonds of each equal parts; being mixt together, wasne a kitle of is in a spoon and drop it warm Chap. XIV. Remedies against Deafness. 67 into the Ears, and stop them with black-Wool dipp'd in the same.

II. An other Excellent remedy for Noife in the Ears.

Take Womans Milk, oyl of Rofes of each three drams, diffolve in it Opium two grains, drop thereof into the Ears.

III. An other for the same.

Take of the juice of fweet Marjerom, two drams, oyl of Cloves one fcruple, mix with it two grains of Musk, or Civet, drop it warm into the Ears, and ftop them with black-Wool dipt in the fame.

IV. An other for the fame ...

Take Rosemary and make a strong Decoction of it in Spring-water, and let the Fume thereof go up into the Ears through a Funnel, and also fering the Ears therewith.

V. An other for the same.

Make a ftrong Decoction of Sage in the Urin of an healthy-Man, or of a Boy and with that fering the Ears, after which put into the Ear a fmall piece of the middle of a rosted Onion, and stop them up with black-Wool; re-

peat

peat this fometimes if need requires.

VI. An Excellent Electuary for Noife in the Ears.

Take Species Diambræ, Aromaticum, Rofatum of each half a dram, with fyrup of Citron Rinds make an Electuary; the Dofe is the quantity of a Nutmeg in a Morning and before Supper. This cur'd when all other means fail'd.

VII. For Deafness.

Take Bees four ounces, Hony one pound, Milk a quart, mix and diftil them in a common still. Drop of this into the Ears and stop them with black-Wool dipt in it.

'Tis faid that it wonderfully hinders the falling of the Hair.

VIII. A Remedy for Deafness that cur'd a Gentle-Woman.

Take Origanum, Rue, Marjerom, Ccltick-Spick, Bay-berries, Juniper-berries, feeds of Fennel, Carraway, Cummin, bruife them and boil them in Wine, let the fume be received into the Ears by a Funnel Morning and Evening, and after ftop them with black-Wool with a little Musk at Night; but in the Morning put Garhick piered through and freept in Hony. In the

the day time also was drawn up in the Nose the juice of Pimpernel, Burnet, and Beets of each a like quantity being mixt.

IX. An Injection for Deafnels,

Take Hony of Rofes three drams, Sack two ounces, make an Injection to be injected warm twice a day. TIM

X. An other for the fame.

Take a green Ashen stick, put one end of it in the fire, and out of the other end will iffue a water which must be receiv'd ; of which drop in four or five drops into the Ears, ftopping them after with black-Wool and a little Civet. And every tenth day take the following Pills.

XI. Pills for Deafnefs.

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Take Pill Cochiæ a dram and half, Rofin of Jalap eight grains, syrup of Roses solutive what fuffices, make twelve Pills. Dr. Willis.

XII. An Ear Tent for Deafness.

Take Affa Fortida diffolve it in spirit of Wine in a brafs-Ladle, add to it Caftor in powder, and Cumminfeeds powder'd of each half a dram, Saffran in powder one scruple, stir them well together till they be well mix'd Al-

adding a little oyl of bitter Almonds to Malax it, make a Mals, take a bit of it at a time, and form it fo as that it may be put into the Ear a pritty way; let it abide there three days and Nights or longer, when you take it out ftop the Ear with black-Wool dipt in oyl of bitter Almonds.

Note, you must ty it up in a fine Sarcenet, or Crape to which fasten a thread, which fasten about the Ear, and by the same you may pull it out. Dr. VVillis.

XIII. An other for the same, by which a Person was cur'd of a Deafness of two months Continuance.

Take Pill Lucis Majores a dram and half, Rofin of Jalap eight grains; with fyrup of Stachados what suffices, make twelve Pills : Take four of them at Bedtime, every other or every third Night : The Hair being shaven from the Coronal Sutur, it was anointed with the following Ointment. Take Aqua Vitæ three ounces, pure Sal-Nitre two drams, oyl of Almonds one ounce; boil them to the Confumption of the Brandy ; then add water of water-Lillies one ounce, then beat them well with a Spattula till they be reduced to the Confiftence of a Liniment, with which was anointed once a day cipecially at Night going to Bed. Dr. VVillis.

XIV. An other Ear Tent which have prov'd Excellent.

Take Civet two grains, Burgundy pitch the quantity of a great Pea, as much white Helebore in fine powder as will make them into a ftiff-pafte; work them well in your hands, and make it in the form of a Clove, ty it up in Sarcenet, put it into the Ear, leave the ftring to go about the Ear; take it out and wipe it, and put it in again and continue it three or four days or longer.

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If Deafnels be from the stoppage of the Ear, or by the Ear-wax, then use first an Injection of white-Wine warm'd with a little spirit or Tincture of Castor.

XV. Excellent Pills for Deafness, Dr. Mayern.

Take of the Mass of Pill Sinequibus, Cochiæ Agragativæ of each two drams, mix them well together; the Dose is a dram, to be taken after the first Sleep, having eaten a light Supper take them in two or three days.

XVI. For Deafness that proceeds from Cold.

Take an Onion, make a hole in it and fill it with the powder of Cumminfeed, roff it under hot Afhes, or put it in an Oven; then prefs out the juice of it, of which drop three or

four drops into the Ear, and stop it with black-Wool, with Musk and Civet of each three grains.

XVII. An Oyl against Desfness.

Take juice of Leeks, oyl of Bitter Almonds, and Laurel of each two ounces; Spicknard, Caftoreum, Coloquintida fhred of each one dram, juice of Rue and white-Wine of each an ounce and half; put all thefe in a Matrafs clofe ftopt, digeft them twenty four hours, in a gentle heat, or in warm-Water; then boil them to the Confumption of the moifture, then ftrain and prefs them out; keep the Oyl for ufe, mixing with it fix grains of Musk.

This Oyl put luke.warm into the Ears, wonderfully helps Deafnels in them that were not born deaf. Dr. Charras.

XVIII. An other much approv'd Remedy for Deafness.

Take a large Eele, cut it into three pieces, flick them with Rofemary and Sage and bake them in an Oven; take of the pure Oyl ftrained and feparated from the gravy, of the beft Hungarian-water of each four spoonfuls, shake them well together, take of this Liqour two spoonfuls; suice of Onyons and of the white ends of Leeks of each one spoonful; put all into a Vial, stop it close and shake them for half

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half an hour to incorporate them well; pour two or three drops of it warm into the Ear, and ly upon your Bed with that Ear upwards that you intend to drop in, ly still for a quarter of an hour; then drop into the other if it require it. It is to be continu'd a month, two or three as you find benefit.

This I had of a worthy Gentleman at Paris, who affur'd me had cur'd with it the Governor of Callaus's Secretary who had been Deaf near twenty years, his Deafness comming of a Sicknefs.

XIX. An other Remedy for Deafness that cometh. of Cold.

Take a ranged loaf of Bread of a mean scant. Im ling, well Leaven'd and Bak'd, cut it a funder in the Middle, and lay both the parts very hot to both the Ears, first laying a linnen cloath double next to the skin as thin as the Patient can endure the heat, and bind them on fast with a Cloth fasten'd to the head, and let it continue as long as the Patient feels any warmth, and then he may take another; If the Cold be great you must use it for two or three Mornings together; take heed of taking cold when you leave them of.

XX. An other Ear Tent to belp the Hearing.

Take Galbanum, Ship-pitch of each two drams,

drams, white-Hellebore in fine powder five feruples, Civet fix grains, mix them; divide the Mass into eight or ten parts, making each into the form of a Clove; which wrap or ty up in a very thin piece of Lawn, fixing a thread to the greater end thereof, for the more eafy pulling it forth again out of the Ear. It is accounted one of the best of Remedies against Deafneis. Dr. Bates.

I. Pills for the Eye-fight.

Ake pill Cochia, and Auriæ of each one fcruple and half, with oyl of Fennel make feven Pills, take three at Night and four in the Morning. and astral at an are seen

II. An Incomparable Water to friengthen and pre-Serve the Eye-fight, which a Bishop us'd, who by the use of it, could read without Spectacles, whereas at fifty be could not.

Take the white of a New laid Egg, beat it in a little Bason that hath a round bottom until it be all in a froath; then let it stand, (leaning the

the bason to one fide) for fix hours; then pour of the clear Liquor, and put it into a little Viol; and put to it as much clear running Hony as there is Liquor, and as much of the juice of Ground Ivy, or Ale-hoof stamp'd and strain'd through a new linnen Cloth; shake them well together, then strain it through the same Cloth, and put it up, and when 'tis clear, put one, two or three drops in your Eyes, every Morning and Night.

III. An other Incomparable Water for the Eyes, call'd break-Spectacle water, in France.

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Take of the blew Corn-flowers, call'd blew-Bottles; gather'd with their cups, and bruis'd, what quantity you pleafe, Infufe them in a fufficent quantity of Snow-water, which for that purpofe you may provide in the Winter and keep it, after twenty four hours Infufion diftil it and keep the water for ufe.

It is wonderfully effectual, not only to cure most Infirmities of the Eyes; but to clear strengthen and preferve the fight, especially of old People; for that reason it is call'd (in France) the break-Spectacle water; because they that use it, need not use spectacles. Some drops of it are to be put into the Eye, Morning and Evening or at any other time. Dr. Charras. You may gather the Flowers in their season and keep them dry.

IV. An other Excellent Eye-water.

Take an ounce of Lapis Tutia in fine powder, steep it three hours in Womans Milk, then drain off the Milk and put on fresh; do thus three times, then steep it three times in white Rofe-water as before : Then take Aloes-Succotrine, white Vitriol of each an ounce, both in fine Powder, Camphir half an ounce, cut and beaten finall with two blanch'd Almonds; put all these into a quart of Sherry-Sack in a Bottle, let it ftand for three days, fhaking it fome times; then filter a little of it, which put in a little Vial; put two or three drops in the Corners of both Eyes, tho one Eye be only foar, do thus when you go to Bed, and once or twice before you rife, opening the Eyes as much as you can that the water may get in.

It cures all heat and Inflamation, Eyes red and Blood (hot, Running or Rheumatick Eyes or Weeping; it must be us'd for a week or two. It also ftrengthens the fight cures and prevents the Pin or Web. Being fnuft up in the Nostrils it opens ftoppage of the Nose and purges the Head; It will keep good feven Years, and when 'tis half spent pour a Pint of Sherry-Sack to it, and shake it well together and it will be as good as the first,

V. An other Excellent Eye-water. Take white Vitriol two drams, Barberries husk'd

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husk'd three drams, Rofe and Fennel water each one pint, boil them with a gentle fire to the Confumption of half, then add Camphir three drams, filter it through gray paper; and keep it for ufe. It takes away Films, Spots, Pearls, and other things which dim the fight.

VI. An other VV ater against Heat, Inflamation, and sharp Rheum of the Eyes.

Take Rofe, Plantin and Fennel water of each two ounces, Tutia prepar'd two drams, Fennelfeeds beaten half an ounce; mix them and keep it in a Glafs clofe ftopt; when you use use it strain a little of it, and wash their Eyes with it two or three times a day.

VII. An other precious VVater for the Eyes.

Take ground-Ivy, Celandine, and Dafies of each one handful, stamp them with a little Sugar-Candy; then add half a pint of Rosewater; then press it out, put it in a Bottle, and keep it for use.

It is commended to be one of the best Eye. Medicines that can be made; It takes away heat and Inflamation, Spots, Webs, Itchings, and Smarting in the Eyes; it strengthens the Sight.

VIII. An other Remedy to draw back Rheum from the Eyes.

Take a red Colewort leaf, as much in quantity of red Sage, and a little bay-Salt, ftamp them together, and put it in a linnen Cloth, and lay it in the Nape of the Neck; use it two or three Nights together.

IX. An other.

Take Rofe-water one ounce, of white-Wine a Spoonful, Tutia one dram, Aloes Hepatic, and white-Sugarcandy of each twenty grains, all in fine powder; put all into a Bottle, fhake them well together; drop thereof into the Eyes.

X. For a Stroak or Blow in the Eye.

Take juice of Smallage, juice of Fennel, and the white of a New laid Egge; beat them well together, and apply it to the fore Eye.

XI. An other for the Stroak or blow in the Eye

Stamp Wormwood with the white of an Egg, and apply it warm three days together; then wash with Plantain water.

A some what sharp but often trid Medicine to take off the Pearlen the Eye.

Take of the juice of Celendine, and mix it with about an equal part of pure Hony; and of this mixture imploy a drop, or at most two at a time, letting it fall upon the part affected Morning and Evening.

XII. For Heat and Inflamation of the Eyes.

At Night when you go to Bed anoint the Eyes with a drop of the oyl of Fennel, then take Pills of Cochiæ, and Auriæ of each one fcruple and half with three or four drops of the water of Fennel, make feven Pills, whereof take three at Night and four in the Morning.

XIII. An other for the same.

Take of the Pills call'd Alæphanginæ, and Extract of Rudij of each one fcruple, with two or three drops of the oyl of Fennel, make five Pills, whereof take two at Night and three in the Morning : Repeat either of them as need thall require. Dr. Sermon.

XIV. An other for the same.

Take the White of a New laid Egg, and as much Rolewater, beat them together with one grain 80 Choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Ch.XV.

grain of Camphire, fpread it upon fine Tow and apply it to the Eyes, and when it is dry, make it moist again with the aforefaid Medicine.

X V. An other for the same, of wonderful vertue.

Take white Vitriol half an ounce, white Sugarcandy one ounce, Camphir two drams being beat to powder, add thereto of the diftil'd water of Eyebright, and Fennel of each one pint; boil them in a New Pipkin to the Confumption of the forth part, when cold put it in a Glafs, and keep it clofe ftopt for ufe; dip a Linnen rag in it and apply it to the Eyelids, being fhut.

XVI. To cure the Cataract or Pearl in the Eyes.

Take white Vitriol two drams,; one race of white Ginger; Camphir, one fcruple, difolv'd in one Spoonful of Aqua Vitæ; put them altogether in fix onnces of Rofewater in a Glafs well ftopt and fo let it ftand for three weeks, then drop of it into the Eyes Morning and Evening; and you will find it a very good remedy to take away the Cataract.

XVII. An other for the Cataract, and Pin and and VVeb.

Take one dram of the finest powder of Liquoris, Chap. XV. Remedies for fore Eyess

quoris, of Ginger half a dram; being mixt well together, blow a fmall quantity thereof into the Eyes with a quill.

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XVIII. An other for the same.

Take good store of Creckets, which commonly are in Bakehouses; bruise them well, and strain out the juice; drop one drop of it into the Eye three times a day; and tho the Patient be almost blind he shall be restord.

XIX. A Drink which cares all Pains, Inflamations, foreness and Defluctions in the Eyes and much experienc'd by, Sir K. Digby.

Take a Good handful of Ground-Ivy, leaves and stalks, wash it and swing it in a Cloth; then shred it and stamp it a little; then boil its in a quart of Ale to a pint; then strain it, and take half a pint of it in the Morning fasting, and the other half at Night going to Bed. It is admitable also to cure the Head-ack, Coughs of the Lungs, Confumptions, small Stones, Sand or Gravel, Jaundice, Obstructions of the Liver and spleen. You may make provision of this Herb when it is in the Flower, and keep it dry.

XX. An Excellent Eye water of Dr. Maxius.

Take a pint of Lime water, put it in a clean G Cop-

Copper Pan or Kittle that is not tinn'd, put into it one dram of Sal Armoniack in powder, flir it well together; and let it fland twelve hours till it be of a Saffarn colour; in this Liquor difolve fine Aloes two drams, filter it and then diffolve in it Virgin Hony half an ounce, and keep it close ftopt. 'T is one of the beft Remedies vet known for Dimnefs of the Sight, Weaknefs of the Eyes, Pin and Web, Pearls, and other Infirmities of the Eyes, as Red and Bloodfhot, Heat and Inflamations, Rheums and Cataracks.

The Lime-water how to make it right, will be fet down in the Chapter of the King's Evil.

XXI. An Excellent Eye-water of Dr. Willis.

Take Camphir one dram, cut it very fmall, put it in a Bottle with the juce of a Lemon, let it ftand all Night clofe ftopt, the next Morning put to it phlegm of Vitriol half a pint, fhak them well together, and keep it clofe ftopt for ufe; when you ufe it ftrain a little of it and warm it in a Spoon, dip a Linnen Cloth in it and wet the Eve-lids with it, and the Temples a prity while Night and Morning. 'Tis alfo good in Burns.

XXII. A Pultis for a Strock, Contusion or Bruise about the Eye : Often provid.

Take the white of an Egg, and beat it to an

Oyl; then take green Rue stript and beaton like a Conferve, mix them together and apply it on Tow.

XXIII. A most Approv'd Ointment for the Eyes.

Take Ointment of Rofestwo ounces, Virgin Hony an ounce, choice Aloes, and Sarcocol, three days Infus'd in Womans Milk without ftiring, but changing the Milk once a day, of, each two drams, powder of white Troches of Rhafis, Bol-Armenic, and Tutia prepar'd, of each four fcruples, white Vitriol and Sugarcandy of each one dram, powder of Saffran, Myrrh and Olibanum of eack two fcruples, choice Opium fifteen grains, grind all thefe together upon a Marbelftone to a most fmooth and impalpable Ointment.

It is Excellent for all infirmities of the Eyes; put a large drop of it into the Eye when you go to Bed, and let it melt and fleep upon it; in the Morning wash with Plantin, or Rose water. Dr. Charras.

XXIV. An Incomparabe Water for the Eyes, compos'd by the learned Monsieur D' Aquinchief, Physician to the present King of France.

Take Tutia of Alexandria thrice quencked in Rofe water, and ground upon a Porphir, Cloves Powder'd of each one ounce and half, white- $G \propto$ Sugar-

84 Choice. Approv'd and experienc'd Ch.XV.

Sugarcandy one ounce, Camphir, Aloes of each a dram and half; put them in a Glafs, and pour to them two quarts of Sack, white Rofe water half a pint, waters of Celandine. Fennel, Eye-bright, and Rue of each two ounces, fhake them well together, ftop it clofe, and fet it in the Sun for fifteen days fhaking it now and then.

This Water is very Effectual against all Infirmatics of the Eyes; use only the clear water pouring out a little of it for the present use, and leaving the rest upon the setlings.

XXV. An other Excellent Water for the Eyes, which is accounted the Lady lvccs Receipt.

Take one pound of well burnt quick-Lime in whole lumps, put it in a large Earthen pan, and pour upon it clear Rain-water three pints, ftir it well together after the Lime is flack'd; then pour off the clear and filter it, and add thereto two fpoonfuls of wood-Lice bruis'd alive, let it ftand twelve hours close ftopt; then filter it again. If you do it in a clean Copperpan not Tinn'd within, the Water will be more Effectual to the purpose then if you do it in an Earthenpan.

CHAP. XVI.

Of the Effects of the Mouth and Throat.

I. A Mouth-water for swell'd Gums, and other Di-Jeases of the Mouth.

Take of the midle Bark of Elder, and Elm of each half an handful, Savory, Sage, hedge-Multard, garden-Creffes of each a handful, Roots of Pellitory of Spain two drams; chopp them and bruife the Roots, and boil them in three pints of Lime-water to a quart, ftrain it and add Hony of Rofes two ounces, mix and make a Gargile.

II. An other for the fame. anoly and

net bas, then add Houve

Take Broom afhes, the prunings of the Vine, Tartar Calcin'd with Nitre, of either which you pleafe; make a ftrong Lixivium of them by boiling in water, take thereof three pints, in which boil Sage, Savory, Tyme, and Rofemary of each a handful, ilrain it and pour it hot on two handfuls of Scurvy-grafs, cover it clofe, and let it ftand three hours, waft the Mouth with it warm, and Gargle with it.

III. A famous and long tri d Medicine for the Scurvy and other Difeafes in the Mouth.

Take powder of the Leaves of Columbines, and of Spearmint, Sage, Nutmegs, Myrrh of each two drams, burnt Allum half an ounce, virgin Hony four ounces or what fuffices, make an Ointment, with this anoint the Gums when you go into your Bed. Dr VVillis.

IV. A Mouth-water to prevent the Flesh of the Gums to grow loofe and fall from the Teeth.

Take tops of Bramble and Cyprefs-leaves, Sanicle, and Cuckoe-flowers of each a handful, boil them in Smiths-forge-water three pints to a quart; then strain and filter it through a Hannel-bag; then add Hony two ounces, and wash the Mouth with it often warm.

V. As other to prevent the falling out of the Teeth.

Take Bark of the Roots of the Sloe-fhrub an ounce, Tormentil-roots and Biftort of each a handful, Pomgranat-rines and Ballauftians of each half an ounce, boil them in three pints of Fountain water; then ftrain it and add Allum three drams and Hony two ounces.

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VI. A Linement or Ointment to prevent the falling out of the Teeth.

Take powder of the Roots of Florentine Oris, Leaves of Sage and St John s-wort of each two drams, Bol Armenec, Sal Prunellæ of each a dram, warm vergin Hony what fuffices, incorporate them well by ftiring; Anoint your Gums with it as directed in Sect. III. aforegoing.

VII. A Liquor much Experienc'd to fasten loose Teetb and preserves the Teetb and Gums, &c.

Take of Roch-Allum one dram, Bol-Armenec two drams, Myrrh half a dram, pulverife them and put them in a Bottle, and pour upon them a pint of Claret-wine, wash the mouth with it three times a day.

VIII. An other for the Teeth and Gums.

Take Vitriol Camphorate (vulgarly call'd Capt. Grean's Powder) an ounce, put it in a Bottle and pour upon it a quart of Fountain-water, fhake them well together; then being fettled use it.

IX. An Opiate made with the faid Powder.

Take Vitriol Camphorated, burnt Harts-G 4 horn 88 Choice, Approv'd and experienc'd Ch.XVI.

horn of each a dram, Nutmeg half a dram, Hony what fuffices, mix and make an Opiat.

X. An other Opiate to cleanse and whiten the Teeth us'd by the Nobility and Gentry in France.

Take Pumice-ftone burnt, white-Coral, Cuttle-fifthbone, burnt-Harts horn, Florence Orisroots of each an ounce, Sal Armoniack two drams, reduce them to a fine Powder; then grind them upon a Marble-ftone, with fomuch Hony of Rofes as will make it into an Opiate wherewith rub the Teeth: Ths Powder may alfo be us'd dry; and you may aromatife either of them with a few drops of oyl of Rhodium.

XI. An other Powder for the Teeth, call'd the Ladies Dentifrice.

Take Chryftal Glafs prepar'd, a dram and half powder of Bricks, or rather of burnt Oyfter-fheils, of Pumice-ftone of each half an ounce, Coral red and White, Cuttle-fifthbone of each two drams, Pearl (or rather raw clean Oyfterfhels) Cloves of each one dram : To which add Hony of Rofes what fuffices, and make a foft Paft. If the Teeth be very foul the Medicine must be us'd five or fix times in a day, and afterwards every time after Eating, wash the Mouth with Wine.

A learned Author fays that those that delight in white Teeth, ought always after Meals to

wash their Mouth with fair water, and once or twice a Week to rub them with the following Powder :

Take white Coral, and fine clean Oifterfhels both in fine Powder, and rub your Teeth therewith, they will be very White.

XII. A Gargle for the Scurvy in the Gums,

Take Crab-verjuice, and Scurvy-grafs-water of each equal parts; add a little Hony and Allum and Gargil therewith.

XIII. An other wash against the Scurvy in the Teeth and Gums.

Take Biftort roots, feeds of Scurvy-grafs of each two drams, Allum one dram, Maftick three drams, boil in fair water what fuffices to a quart, ftrain it and add Hony of Rofes, two ounces, mix and make a Lotion, Gargel the Mouth and Throat therewith, and wafh the Teeth with it; if the Gums be Ulcerated four or five times a day or oftner.

Note, that before you use this Wash you ought to rub your Teeth with the following powder.

XIV. A Powder for the Scurvy in the Gums.

Take falt of Scurvy-grafs, or Wormwood, Mace of each a dram, dry Sage fix scruples, burnt-

burnt-Allum two drams, falt decrepitated two fcruples, mix and make a fubtile powder, to which add Hony of Rofes what fuffices, mix them and rub your Teeth with it, and then wash with the Liquor before you fet down.

The Ashes of Tobacco or of the Stalks is of Excellent use to cleanse the Teeth and to make them White.

XV. A Wash to preferve the Teetb, Sound, Cleen and White.

Take a pint of Hony, a pint and half of Vinegar, Sage-water half a pint, boil them together and there with wash the Mouth and Teeth every day, chiefly after eating.

XVI. A Remedy for a fore Mouth, or Cancker.

Take of Grocers Treacle a Saucerful, burnt Allum, and Bay-falt of each the quantity of a Nutmeg, boil them a little together and then diffolve of it in Water, and wath with it.

XVII. An Excellent Gargle against Inflamations of the Mouth and Throat, desparate Quinsies, Thrush, &c.

Take Poppy-water, Plantin-water of each an ounce, Clarified juce of Self-heal two ounces, Hony of Mulberries fix drams, Saltpetre, half an ounce, mix them and Gargarife with it sften warm. XVIII. Chap. XVI. Remedies for fore Mouths. 91

XVIII. An other for the same ofton tri'd.

Take Album Græcum two drams, Liquorice fcrapt one ounce, Rock-Allum one dram, boil them a little in Rofe, Poppy, and Self-heal water of each what fuffices, then ftrain it, take of this Decoction a pint Diamoron, and Dianucum of each half an ounce, mix and make a Gargle to be us'd often in a day.

XIX. An other Excellent Remedy against Ulcers of the Mouth and Throat.

Take the diftil'd water of Elder-flowers;
 Plantin and white-Thorn-flowers of each equal parts, diffolve therein as much Venice Soap as a Walnut, fweeten it with a little fyrup of Mulberries, and Gargle the Mouth often therewith;
 If these take no effect, add thereto a little Egip-flacum.

XX. An other for the same.

Take Plantain-water eight ounces, Hony of Rofes, and fyrup of Mulberries of each two ounces, Sugar of Lead fix drams, Roman Vitriol one dram, mix them and Gargle the Mouth often withit.

XXI. An Experienc'd Remedy against the Quinsy and soar Throat.

Take the powder of Album Græcum, Wheat-flower

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flower of each equal parts, oyl of Camomile half an ounce with a fufficient quantity of Hony, make them up into a Plaster and apply it. Dr. Sermon.

XXII. A Deglutination for a fore Threat.

Take Quince Kernals, Damask-rofe-leaves, boil them in fair water what fuffices, make a fyrup which use with a Liquorice-stick.

XXIII. A most Excellent Gargarism against all Distempers of the Mouth and Ibroat.

Take the inner Bark of the Elm-tree new gather'd four ounces, Fountain water three pints; cut the Bark fmall and boil it to one half, ftrain it and add fyrup of Rasberies and Mulberries of each an ounce and half, mix them.

It is good against Roughness, and foreness of the Tongue, Thrush, Inflamations and Ulcers, Gargle the Mouth often with it.

XXIV. An affect of the Mouth call d a water-Cancker, in a Child of two years of age cur'd.

My Author being call'd to fee this Child, he found betwixt his upper Lip and the Gum, an Ulcer, which had begun there about four days before, it passing prity high upwards, being hollow, hard, paining, black and imelling ill: He matters not whither this affect be call'd a Gan-

Gangreen, with Hildanss, or a Cancer with Battus, or the Ulcer Noma, with Cornelius Vander VVar den : But he fays that this Evil runs on very quick, and may kill the Difeafed in a fhort time, as he hath found by Experience; for the cure of it he prefcrib'd the following Ointmeut, for refifting the corrofive acid:

Take Venice Treacle two drams and half, *Ægiptiæcum* a dram and half, Gum-Lac, fpirit of Sal Armoniack of each two fcruples, fpirit of Scurvy-grafs two drams, mix them and make a Linement, and with it a little fpirit of Wine; being warm'd the part affected was wafh'd with it fix times a Day, and lint dipt in it was put on the fore; by this foal Remedy, he cur'd not only this little Child, but hath cured many others, and that in a fhort time.

CHAP. XVII.

Of the Tooth. Ach.

I. An approved Medicine for an aking Tooth that is Hollow.

TAke black Pepper in fine powder two parts, double refin'd Sugar powder'd one part, mix them, and melt them in a Brafs-Ladle over a gentle heat; make it into pills of the bignefs fit for your purpofe, and when they are cold they will harden, and may be imploy'd when your pleafe to the part affected. II. 94 Choice, Approv'd & Experinc'd Ch XVII.

II. An other Experienc'd Remedy against the Tooth-ach.

Take Roots of Pelytory of Spain two drams, Ginger, Olibanum of each half an ounce, red-Sage, Henbaneseeds bruis'd of each one dram, Pepper, Opium of each a scruple; boil these in a point of Vinegar, strain it, and hold thereof in your Mouth : It gives present ease in all pains of the Teeth.

III. An often try'd Remedy for the Tooth-ach.

Take a little Cotten, and inbibe it with Lucatella's Balfam melted in a fpoon and put it in the hollow Tooth.

IV. An other for the same.

Take of Roman Vitriol one dram; diffolve it in a pint of fpring-Water, and hold thereof in the Mouth.

V. An other for the same.

Take the bone of the left-fore-leg of a Toad, and hold it against the aking Tooth; It aswages the pain thereof in an instant.

VI. A Past or Opiate to aswage the Tooth-ach. Take Camphir two drams, Opium one dram,

dram, Castor half a dram, powder them, mix them with fyrup of Clove Gillo-flowers and make a past; whereof put a little in the hollow Tooth, and leave it there; renewing it as often as need requires. Dr. Chartafs.

VII. A famous and Effectual Tincture for the Tooth-ach. Dr. Bates.

Take Guaiacum two ounces, Pelitory of Spain, Pomgranate-shels, Gall, seeds of Henbanc, and Staves agre of each half an ounce, Cloves, Ginger, Long-Pepper, Olibanum of each one dram, Tobacco, Sage, Horsemint of each two scruples, Brandy three pints, mix and digest them in warm Sand, then strain it; a little of this is to be held in the mouth, and kept in for a while, then spit-out, and take a fresh.

CHAP. XVIII.

Of Destempers of the Breast and Lungs, as Hoarsness, Asthma's, Coughs, and Consumption of the Lungs.

I. An approv'd Remedy for a Hoarfness.

TAke one leaf of Virginia Tobacco, cut it fmall, and Infuse it in a pint of fair water for twelve hours; then strain it and boil it up with

with brown Sugar candy to a Syrup; the Dofe is a spoonful in the Morning fasting, and at Night: 'Tis also good for Coughs and shortness of Breath.

II. An other for the same prescrib'd by Dr. Barkfdale for an Eminent Lord's which prov'd very effectual.

Take Gum Ammonicum diffolv'd in Vinegar of Squils two drams, Myrrh fo prepar'd, purifi'd Galbanum, Sulphurvive of each one dram, Millepedes prepar'd, Fæcula of Aronroots,Oris of each one dram,Saffran five grains, Balfam of Peru and Tar of each equal parts, what fuffices, make a Mafs of Pills of each two fcruples, make fix Pills; which quantity was taken firft in the Morning, again at four afternoon, and laft at Night, after which every time he dranck two ounces of the following water.

III. A VVater for Cold and Hoarsness.

Take Marfh-mallow-roots, Briony, Orisof each two ounces, Liquoris bruis'd one ounce and half, leaves of Hoar-hound, Arfmart, Ground Ivy of each two handfuls. Cinnamon one ounce, Saffran two drams, heat them altogether and Infuse them in a quart of Milk, add Hony two ounces, let it stand twelve hours, then distil it in an ordinary still: The same course hath cured others besides the said Lord.

-IV. A Pectoral Drink for a Cold, Hoarfnefs and Cough.

Take roots of Marsh-mallows, Fennel and Gout-wort of each an ounce, leaves of Mullen, Colts-foot, Bettony, Maiden-hair, Scabious of each one handful, twenty fat Figs flic'd, Raifons of the Sun flic'd four ounces, seeds of Anis and sweet Fennel beaten of each two ounces, Liquorice bruis'd five drams, boil them all in three quarts of Water to two quarts, to the strain'd Liqour add Hony four ounces, boil it again till it be perfectly fcimm'd : Of this was taken fix ounces warm thrice a day. Dr. Barks-, dale.

the V. A Pectorol Ale for a Cold, Hoarfnefs and Cough; &c. prefcrib'd for a Lord.

Take Satla Parilla half a pound, Infufe it in watm water two gallons for twelve hours, boil it to fix quarts; then take Roots of red Fennel and Gout-wort of each two ounces, Roots of great Fig-wort four ounces, leaves of Bittony Mullen, Scabious, Agrimony, Maiden-hair of each tour handfuls, Raifons flic'd one pound, boil them together in the fame Liquor till there be wafted five pints and ftrain it, to which add three Gallons of new Ale, and when tun'd up, hang in the Veffel, Liquoris, feeds of Anis, fweet Fennel and Angelico of each two ounces H

bruis'd, when 'tis fit to tap, let it be for ordinary drink.

VI. A Pectoral drink for a Cough prescrib d for on Lond on Eminent Lord.

Take leaves of Maiden-hair, Mullen of each three handfuls, Hyfop one handful, Anifeeds beaten three drams, Raifons flic'd four ounces, boil them in three pints of Barly-water to a quart; to the straining add Sugarcandy four ounces; Clarify with white of Eggs, and take three ounces of it warm, three times a day.

VII. Pectoral Lozenges for the fame.

Take Lohoch Samum & Expertum an ounce and half, Sugarcandy fix ounces, Species Diatragacant. Frigid. a dram and half, fine powder of Liquorice two drams, FlorenceOris-roots, a dram and half, Mucilage of Quince-feeds fufficient to make Lozenges each weighing a feruple, keep one always in the Mouth.

VIII. Other Pectoral Lozenges good also in Casarrhs.

Take Liquorice two ounces, Calamus-Aromatiins, Roots of Florentine Oris, Galingal of each one dram, Ginger two icruples, Carrawayfeeds two drams, Elecampane one feruple, Sugarcandy one pound, teduce all to a very fubrile Yowder

Powder, to which add Chymical oyl of Anifeed twenty drops, mix it well and with Mucilage of Guin Tragant made with Hylop-water, make Lozenges.

Hoarsness, Shortness of breath, and Consumption.

Take a pound and half of Sugarcandy, boil it in a fufficient quantity of Spring-water, till it will flick to the end of your fingers, then add to will flick to the end of your fingers, then add to have a flick to the powder of Liqourice, Elecampane, Anifeed, Angelicafeeds of each half an ounce, powder of Florentine Orice, and flowers of Sulphur of each two drams, Chymical oyl of Anifeeds fourty drops; make Lozenges according to Att. Dr. Sydenham who calls them family Lozenges.

X. An Excellent Pectoral fyrup against a Consumption of the Lungs, order'd by an able Physician for an Eminent Lady.

Take Ceterach, Maiden-hair, Colts-foot 3 Anifeeds, Liquorice of each an ounce, Scolopendre, Lung-wort, Knot-grafs of each one handful, Elecampane half an ounce, thifty large Raifons flit, fifteen fat Figgs flic'd, two Radifhes cut fmall; fhread the Herbs fmall, and bruife the Roots and feeds, put them all in a large Pipkin, and pour thereon five quarts of Spring water, let it boilgently uncil two quarts H 2

be confum'd, to the ftraining put 2 pound and half of duble refin'd Sugar, clarify it with whites of Eggs and make a Syrup; whereof take a ipoontul by it felf three or four times a day; let it run eafily down your Throat, you may take of it alfo at any time in the Night when the Cough urges.

X.I. An other Excellent Pectoral Syrup for Asthma's, or difficulty of Breathing and Coughs.

Take of Raisons flic'd half an ounce, Polypody of the Oak two drams, Liquorice, feeds of Carraway, Anis, fwcet Fennel, and Tobacco of each two drams, Oaken-mols one pugil; leaves of Hore-hound, Hylop of each one ounce, Garlick bruis'd one Head tied in a ragg, and hung in the veffel; boil all these in a pint and half of Barly-water to a pint, toward the end add of the best Vinegar three ounces, strain n and add Hony and Sugar of each halt a pound and Oxymel of Squils four ounces. The Dofe is one spoonful three times a day, viz. in the Morning falling, at four a clock in the afternoon, and at Night going to Bed; you may alfotake it in the Night time when there is need, letting it go eafily down your Throat, or take it with a Liquorice-flick. XII. A Pettoral distil d VV ater against Consumptions.

Take Scabious, Pauls-Bittany of each two

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handfuls, Maiden-hair, Sage, Hylop, Hore, hound, Liver-wort of each one handful, flowers of Borage and Buglofs of each one handful Elecampane, Florence Oris, Roots of Parily of each half an ounce, Anifeeds, sweet Fennelleeds, Nettle-feeds, Cinnamon, Saffran of each a dram; being cut and bruis'd pour to them three quarts of good old Wine, let it stand close ftopt for a week, then diftil it, to the Water. diftil'd add Sugarcandy what fuffices, Spanishjuice of Liquorice one ounce, falt of Tartar fix drams, drink thereof two or three times a day one ounce; It not only opens Obstructions of methe Lungs, helps Coughs and spitting of blood, hubut also gives ease in all pains of the Stone.

XIII. A Pectoral Grup for those that Spit-Blood, Mr. Boil to Sir K. Digby,

Take Comfry-roots fix ounces, leaves of Plantain two handfuls; beat them well together, then prefs out the mice, which ftrain and let it settle, then boil it up to a syrup with Sugar, and clarify it with the white of an Fgg.

XIV. An other Remedy for Spitting of Blood.

Take leaves of Colts foot half a handful, flired it very finall and fry it with a little Bacon; then put to it the volk of an Egg, and ftir it well together; eat it in the Morning fasting, continuing it for fome time. XV.

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XV. A rare Medicine against a Consumption, the much decay'd therewith.

Take two quarts of new red Cows-milk, the more ftroakings the better; put it in an Earthen veffel of three quarts, with fyrup of Rofes and brown Sugarcandy of each two ounces, ftop it clofe and fet it in an Oven with Houfholdbread, take of this twice or thrice a day warm: If you add to it fyrup of ground-lvy two ounces it will be better.

XVI. An Electuary for the Cough, and Rheum falling upon the Lungs.

Take Conferve of Rofes, half an ounce, fyrup of Violets one spoonful, Hony three spoonfuls Olibanum in fine Powder, and flower of Sulphur of each one dram, beat and mix them well to an Electuary, of which take often in the day upon the bruis'd end of a Liquorice stick.

XVII. The excellent Snal-water against Consumptions and Hectick Feavers, Dr. Harvy.

Take of Garden-Snails with their shells, efpecilly those that are about Vines a pound, wash them well with Water and a little Salt, then wash them once or twice more with fair Water to wash of the Salt, bruise them with their shells in a stone Mortar to a Mash, add to them

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them ground lvy, Speedwel, Lung-wort, Scabious, Burnet, Colts-foot, and Nettletops of each a handful; Liquorice half an ounce, Dates fton'd twelve; of the greater Coldfeeds, and Marfhmallow-feeds of each one dram and half, Saffran a feruple; put them into a new glaz'd Pipkin, and pour on them a quart of Springwater, faften the cover clofe to the Pipkin by pafting it round with Dowe; let it ftand twelve hours in a Kettle of hot Water over the fire, then ftrain and prefs out the Liquor, and diffolve into it while it is warm, a quarter of a pound of Clarfi'd Hony; put it in a bottle, and keep it in a Celler. The Herbs mult be fhred, the feeds and Liquorice bruis'd fmall.

XVIII. To make the fyrup of Turnips against Coughs and Consumptions.

Take a quantity of Turnips par'd, bake them in an Oven with Houshold bread, then prefs out the Liquor, which strain through a Flannel bag, to a quart of this Liquor put a pint of Hysop water, and with two pound and half of broun Sugarcandy make a syrup.

Dr. Salmon orders it thus: To a quart of the Liquor of Turnips put half a pint of Brandy, and two pounds and half double refin'd Sugar, make a fyrup by diffolving only: I judge it would be better inftead of the Brandy to take fo much Anifeed water.

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XIX.

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XIX. To make the fyrup of Garlick against Cough, Hoarseness, difficulty of Breathing and Consumption.

Take Cloves of Garlick ten or twelve in miniber, peel them and cut them in Slices, Anifeeds bruis'd half an ounce, Elecampane Ned three drams, Liquorice two drams; put them in a Matrafs, and pour to them a pint and half of good Brandy, digeft them in warm Saud for two or three days; then ftrain it and put the Liquor in an Earthen Pan Glaz'd, put into it double refin'd Sugar a pound and half, put the Bafon upon a chafendilh of Coals, and when the Liquor is warm fet it on fire, and when the Liquor is warm fet it on fire, and whil'ft it burns ftir it; then ftrain it through a Plannel-bag, and keep the fyrup for ufe.

X.X. The fyrup of Dia Sulphur of Dr. Willis.

Take Sulphur prepar'd after Dr. Willis's manner, afterwards fet down, half an ounce, the belt Canary wine a quart', digeft them in a Matrafs clofe ftopt in warm Sand for twenty eight hours, then take double refin'd Sugar, two pounds, diffolve and boil it in water diffil'd of Elder-flowers, to the confiftency for Tablets; then pour to it by little and little the wine ting'd with the Sulphur whil'ft warm, let it boil a fittle on the fire feimming it; then ftrain it through a Flannel bag, you will have a moft delicate Syrup of a Gold colour, and of great efficacy

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efficacy against the Cough and other affects of the Lungs, fo there beno Hectick Feaver.

XXI. Dr. Willis's preparation of Sulpbur.

Take Flower of Sulphur four ounces, melt them and add to them pure falt of Tartar one ounce and half, feir and mix them well with a Spatula; then take it from the fire and let it cool and keep it for ufe. It ferves for making the fyrup of Sulphur before mention'd, and alfo the following Tincture of Sulphur.

XXII. To make the Tincture of the faid Li-

Take of the aforefaid Liver of Sulphur two ounces, fpirit of Wine rectified one pint, digeft them together, then filter it. It is a very great pectoral, cures most difeases of the Breast and Lungs, as Coughs, Colds, Wheesings, Shortnels of Breath, dificulty of Breathing, Ulcers of the Lungs, Confumptions, Greathing, Ulcers

Take of the aforefaid fyrup of Sulphur, three ounces, Water of Earth-worms can ounce, Tincture of Saffran two drams, make a Cotdial and Pectoral mixture; whereof take a fpoonful going to Bed and early in the Morning.

Take Tincture of Sulphur two drams, Liquid Laudanum Tartariz'd a dram, fyrup of the juice of ground-Ivy two ounces, Cinnamonwater

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water two drams; the Dofe is a fpoonful at bed time, and if the Perfon does not fleep, an other towards Morning, Dr. Willie.

XXIII. An Excellent Pectoral drink for Coughs and Colds us'd by an Eminet Lady.

eparation of Sulphur

Take Hyfop, Raifons flic'd, and Figgs of each a handful, Anifeeds bruis'd two fpoonfuls, Coltsfoot a good handful cut fmall, boil them in one Gallon of Spring water to two quarts, towards the latter end put in a good flick of Liquorice bruis'd, then ftrain it and diffolve in it four fpoonfuls of Hony, drink thereof warm four or five fpoonfuls at a time in the Morning, in the afternoon and at Night.

XXIV. An Excellent Pectoral mead for the Breaft and Lungs.

Take Hony one Gallon, Water four Gallons, boil them together for two hours with the following ingredients : Take Reafons flic'd four ounces, Elecompane-roots two ounces, roots of Fennel, and Marsh-mallows, Polypody of the Oak of each one ounce, Maiden-hair, Coltsfoot, Sage, Bittony, Scabious, and Hysop of each one handful, Anifeeds bruis'd one ounce; when it is cold Tun it and 'twill work of its own strength.

.VXX creand Ivy two ounces, Ciman on-

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XXV. A Pectoral distil d water againgst a Congb.

Take ground-lvy, Colts-foot, Oak of *fernfalem* of each three pound, Hyfop, Rofemary, Pennyroyal, Horehound of each a pound and half, Elecampane, Liquorice of each a pound and half, Florentine Orice twelve ounces, Figs flic'd three pound, Saffran, Anifeed, fweet-Fennelfeed of each half an ounce, Brandy five quarts, Fountain-water three Gallons, digeft them a while, and then diftil by a Vefica with a Worm and Tubb. This Water ferves for making the Magistral fyrup of Balfam de Tolu.

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XXVI. A Pectoral Milk-water.

Take Garden Snails bruis'd one pound, Hogs-blood two pound, Maiden-hair, ground Ivy of each three handfuls, Harts-tongue two handfuls, Liquorice, Anifeeds bruis'd of each three ounces, Raifons and Figs flic'd of each four ounces, Milk warm from the Cow fix quarts, mix and diftil them. It is profitable againft Coughs, Colds, obstructions of the Lungs, and fhortnefs of Breath.

XXVII. An other Pectoral water of great vertue.

Take roots of Elecampane, of round Birthwort 108 Choice and Experienced Chap. XVIII.

wort of each three ounces, Roots of Flour de Luce an ounce and half. Florentine Oris, Parfly, Fennel-roots, Liquorice of each one ounce, green Tobbacco, four handfuls, Paul-bittony, Scabious, Colts-foot, Hyfop, Maiden-hair, Hore-hound, Carduus Ben. of each one handful, Jujubes, Sebestens of each thirty in number, Figgs and Dates flic'd of each fixteen, feeds of Tobaccothree drams, Nigella one dram, Net-tles, garden-Creffes, Mustardfeed, Linfeed of cach two drams, Bayberries fix drams, powder of Gudiacum eight 'ounces, Venice' Turpentine diffolv'd in the volks of Eggs two ounces and a half, white-Wine four Gallons; digeft three days, then diffil and ty in a rag fixty Hoglice bruis'd and hung by a thread in the Recipient.

All the Ingredients are to be gotten green that can be ; It is very powerful for Afthma's Coughs, and Tartarous Difeafes of the Lungs and Reins, &. Dofe two opnees twice or thrice a day. Note that you ought to draw only four quarts fo will you have a fine and Spiritous Liquor.

XXVIII. A thickning Labach for a Cough.

Take oyl of fweet Almonds one ounce, fyrups of red Poppy, Purflain, Jujubcs, and Loboeb Sanum of each half an ounce, Plowers of Sulphur three drams, Sugarcandy what fuffices, mix them in a Marbel Mortar for the fpace

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fpace of an hour, keep it in a Gally-pot for ufe. It is to be taken freqently with the bruis'd end of a Liquorice flick: Note that if you have not a Stone Morter, you may do it as well in a Bafon with the back of a Silver Spoon.

XXIX. A Loboch in a thin Rheum, or Distillation.

Take Conferve of red Rofes two ounces, fyrup of Poppies and Jujubes of each an ounce, Olibanum, Maftick, and Amber of each a dram, express'd oyl of Nutmegs fix grains, mix them and make a Lohoch, which is to be lick'd often with a Liquorice stick.

XXX. A Medicine for Afthma's or a difficulty of Breathing.

Take blew Corrans one pound, tops of Nettles two handfuls, boil them in two quarts of Water to a quart, and let the Patient drink often thereof.

D. VVI XXXI. An other for the same.

Take a fea-Onion rosted, beat it well with a sufficient quantity of Hony, give of it to the Patient the quantity of a Nutmeg at a time. It is of excellent use.

XXXII. A Remedy for shortness of Breath or difficulty of Breathing. Dr. N. Take of the Mass of Stomach-Pills with Gum.

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Gum one scruple, make three Pills to be taken carly in the Morning, sleeping after them, and two hours after take three ounces of the Pectoral Decoction warm, in which half an ounce of Manna hath been diffolv'd; Repeat this two or three times, staying two or three days between every time.

Afterwards take Anifeeds powder'd one feruple, falt of Amber ten grains, Gum Ammoniacum one dram, Balfam of Peru what fuffices, make Pills of a middling fize; whereof take three every Night in a spoonful of Balfamick fyrup.

XXXIII. An other for the same.

Take fyrup of Hore-hound and Garlick of each an ounce an half, Tincture of Saffran and Caftor of each two drams, mix them and take about a small spoonful at a time.

Or take Tincture of Gum Ammoniacum, three drams; the Dole is from fifteen drops to twenty in a fpoonful of fyrup of ground lvy, or of the Balfamick fyrup.

Or take Tincture of Sulphur three drams; the Dose is from seven drops to twelve or twenthe same manner.

XXXIV. An excellent Remedy against a Consumption.

Take white Rofe-water one ounce, white Sugar-

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Sugarcandy fix drams, the Yolk of a new laid Egg, new Milk warm from the Cow, or made fo, a quarter of a pint; being beaten and well mixt together, let the Patient drink it all at once, repeating the fame Morning and Evening for fome time together.

XXXV. An other Excellent Remedy against a Consumption.

Take all the blood that will be had fourth of a Swine if his full ftrength, ftir it as it is drawn forth, that it may not congeal; To which add powder of Cloves, Cinnamon, Mace and Ginger of each an ounce, Saffran, Rofemary flowers of each two drams, and forthwith diftil it in a glafs Cucurbite, with a very gentle fire; the Dofe is from three fpoonfuls to fix or eight, fweeten'd with Sugarcandy or Sugar of Rofes.

XXXVI. An other for the same.

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Take Flower of Brimftone and Olibanum of each one feruple, Saffran three grains, put them into a Pippin the coar being cut out; then roft it and let the Patient eat it with white Sugarcandy for ten or twelve days together.

XXXVII. An other for the same.

Take white Wine three plats, Sugarcandy four

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four ounces, Elecampane one ounce, Colts-foot two ounces, Violet flowers one ounce and half, Roots of Angelica ten drams, all being cut and bruis'd very finall, boil them in a ftone Bottle clofe ftopt (the Cork being ty'd down with a piece of ftrong linnen Cloth) for three hours in a Kettle of water, and open it not till it be cold, then ftrain it; the Dofe is three or four fpoonfuls first and last and in the afternoon.

With this very Medicine after I had gently purg'd a Painter, I perfectly cur'd him in a few days, tho he was fo far gone in a Confumption, that he was look'd upon as a dead Man by all his friends. Dr. Sermon.

Sugar of Rofes drunk in new Milk is alfo of admirable ufe.

XXXVIII. A kind of Marmalet against a Consumption.

Take nine Cloves of Garlick, boil them in a pint of Mead till they be tender, then take twelve Pippins, Coddle them till they be tender, then make a fyrup of the Liquor you boil'd the Garlick in , with one pound of Sugar; make pulp of the Pippins which mix with the fyrup: 'Tis a kind of Marmalet, of which take the quantity of a Nutmeg, Morning and Evening, and often in the day.

XXXIX. To a Person in a Consumption, the learned Dr. Sydenham advises to take ten drops

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drops of Ballam of Sulphur anisated in a spoonful of powder of Sugarcandy twice or thrice every day, and often keep in the Mouth one of the Lozenges at Sect. IX. of this Chap.

X L. A Loboch against a Confumption.

Take of Oyl of fweet Almonds two ounces, fyrur of Maiden-hair and Violets of each one ounce, Sugarcandy a fufficient quantity; make a Lohoch by a long mixing and beating of it in a Bafin of white-ware.

For ordinary Drink in a Confumption, the ingenious Dr. Salmon commends fair Water to be always drank (even at Meals) where the Conffitution willbear it, or Milk and Water, or a diffil'd Milk-water, all fermented Liquors being abfolutely nought: Now and then the Patient may take the quantity of a Cheftnut of this Electuary.

Take Indian green Ginger preferv'd eight ounces, cut it very fmall with a Knife, and beat it very fmall into a Mafs in a ftone Mortar, add to it flower of Sulphur two ounces, fine powder of Elecampane roots one ounce an half, clarifi'd Hony enough to make it up into an Electuary; take of it as often as the violence of the Cough returns. This likewife is a thing of good ufe. Take of fubtile powder of Elecampane roots one ounce, fyrup of Elecampare roots four ounces, pure oyl of Olives five ounces, 'mix them well together; the Dofe one in fpoon-

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fpoonful in the Morning falting, and at four in the Afternoon.

Or this, Take of subtile powder of Elecampane, flower of Sulphur of each one ounce, fyrup of Anifeed, pure Florence oyl and Olive of each eight ounces, mix them well together by fhaking; the Dole a fpoonful now and then. Dr. Salmon upon Sydenham. In a thin Catath, Rheum or Diffillation upon the Lungs you may prefcribe thickning Lohoch. Of this kind is the following : Take of fyrup of Poppies and of Lettice of each eight ounces, fyrup of Purflane two ounces, Liquorice, Elecampane, Jefuits Bark, Catechu, all in fine powder of each two ounces, spirit of Wine two ounces, Nutinegs in powder one ounce and half, mix and make a Lohoch, of which let the Patient take a little often in a day upon the bruisd end of a Liquorice flick. Salmon in Sydenham.

CHAP. XIX.

of Affects of the Stomach.

I. Pills for the pain in the Stomach.

Ake of the Pills of Hiera with Agarick two drams, oyl of Nutmegs and Juniperberries of each five drops, mix them together and make thereof Chap. XIX. Remedies for the Stomach. 115

thereof fifteen Pills, of which let the Patient take two at Night, and three in the Morning, until they are all spent.

II. An other for the fame.

Take Species Hiera picra one ounce, falt of Tartar, or Tartar Vitriolate two drams, Cochinele one fcruple, infufe them in Sherry-fack a pint, for fome days, fhaking it often in a day; filter it; the Dofe is an ounce and half to two ounces, or two or three fpoonfuls before eating. It is excellent against crudity and pain of the Stomach. If you give three ounces of it half an hour before the fit of a Tertian Ague it cures it, and fometimes alfo a Quartan.

III. Dr. Lower's Excellent Stomatical TinEture;

Take tops of the leffar Centory, Cammomile flowers, leaves of Agrimoni of each one handful, feeds of Citron and of Carduffeeds of each three drams, flowers of Marygolds four pugils, Jentian roots half an ounce, filings of iron turn'd to Ruft four ounces; being cut and bruis'd pour to them of the Alectuary Milkwater three pints, of the compound Wormwood water one pint, mix them and let them ftand for two or three days, fhaking the Veffel often in a day; the Dofe three ounces Morning and Night. It ftrengthens the Stomach, takes away the pain thereof, caufes a good appetite I 2 and 116 Choice and Experienc'd Chap. XIX.

and a good Digestion, cures the Green-sickness and provokes the Terms, if taken for eight or ten days together.

IV. An Electuary to comfort and strengthen the Stomach, and sweeten the Breath.

Take Sage to handfuls, Rofemary flowers an ounce an half, Cloves fix drams, Cinnamon a dram, Nutmegs one feruple, all in powder clarifi'd Hony what fuffices, make an Electuary; Dofe the quantity of a Nutmeg in the Morning, drinking after it a glafs of burnt Claret, or of the following Stomatical Claret-water: 'Tis good alfo for the Head and Brain.

V. A Stomach and Cordial Claret-water.

Take Cinnamon bruis'd four ounces, Cloves, Ginger, Cardamons, Galingal, all bruis'd of each half a dram, put them in a Glais-bottle, and pour upon them two quarts of Brandy, Role-water a pint and half, let them ftand cold for fix hours or longer, then ftrain it and fweeten it with Loaf-Sugar: It is very pleafing to the taft, and fortifies the Stomach and the Noble parts, expels and diffipiats Wind, and caufes a good Apetite and a good Digeftion; Dole a spoonful or two.

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VI. The Lord Chefter-field's Excellent digestive-Powder, to comfort an strengthen the Stomach.

Take of the beft fweet Fennelfeed well clens'd half an ounce, Corianderfeeds one ounce, fhaving of Harts-horn and Ivory of each half a dram, Cinnamon and Pearl prepar'd, or Crabs-Eyes of each half a dram, reduce them all into a fubtile Powder; then mix with them Sugar of Rofes two ounces, white Sugarcandy three ounces alfo in fine Powder, mix them well together; Dofe fo much as will lay upon the point of a Knife: Keep it in a box in a warm place.

VII. A Cordial and Stomachical Drink for weaknefs of the Stomach, and want of Digestion.

Take three pints of good Claret Wine, half a pint of Mint-water; Cinnamon and Nutmeg of each half a dram, Loaf-Sugar fout ounces; bruife the ingredients, and put all in a Stone-bottle, ftop it clofe, and ty down the Cork with a ftrong Linnen cloath, fet it in a Kettle of hot Water for twenty four hours, but let not the Water boil, then ftrain it, Drink of it warm a Sack glafsful at a time.

VIII. A Cooling Stomachal Mint-water of my Lady Newport.

Take Angelica one part, Mint and Cardus I 3 Ecn.

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Ben of each four parts, Wormwood two parts fhread fmall and bruife them a little, and put them in an ordinary ftill, and pour upon them enough new Milk to foak them, but not to have the Milk fwim much over them; diftil this as you do Rofe-water, ftirring it fometimes with a ftick to keep the Milk from growing to a Cake, fweeten it with fine Sugar to your tafte, and drink a Wine glafs full of it at a time. It is an Alexitary Milk-water.

IX. An other digestive Powder for the Stomach of Dr. Bates.

Take chips of Oranges (that is the yellow thin Rind) candi'd, and cut finall four ounces, feeds of Anis, Carraways and Fennel of each two ounces, Aromaticum Rosatum, half an ounce, fait of Wormwood one dram, powder of Spearmint, two fcruples, Sugarcandy the weight of them all, mix and make a Powder not to fine; the Dose is one dram after every Meal. It warms and strengthens the Stomach, and caufes a good digestion, expelling wind, preventing crudities, and withal causes a sweet Breath.

X. The Stamical Elixir of Vitriol of Quercetan.

Take Cinnamon, Ginger, Cloves of each three drams, Calamus Aromaticus one ounce, Galingal an ounce and half, leaves of Sage and Spearmint dry'd, of each half an ounce, Cubebs and

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and Nutmegs of each two drams, wood of Aloes, Citron peels of each a dram, make all into a fine Powder, and put it into a Bottle, and pour upon it a pint and half of fpirit of Wine, a pound of oyl of Vitriol, and Sugarcandy three ounces; extract a Tincture by digefting in the Sun for twenty days; the Dofe is from ten to twenty drops in any proper Liquor.

It wonderfully comforts and ftrengths the Stomach and Bowels, creats an Appetite, cautes a good digeftion : It preferves from the Epilepfy, and Apoplexie, and other cold Difeafs of the Brain.

XI. An other Stomah Elixir.

Take the diftil'd oyls of Cinnamon, Cloves, Worm vood, Citron and Orange peels of each fix drops, mix them well with refin'd Sugar fix ounces, put this in a Bottle, and pour upon it fpirit of Wine rectifi'd, Mint and Orangflower-water or Rofe-water of each fix ounces, fhake it well and make an Elixir. It is very profitable to warm, comfort and ftrengthen a week and cold Stomach, as also to fortifie all the noble parts; the Dofe is half an ounce, or a fpoonful in proper Liquors.

XII. A choice Stomichal Tincture of Worwood compound.

Take Calamannus Aromaticus, Orang-peels, I 4 of

of each three drams, Citron-rinds two drams, Cinnamon one dram, Cloves half a dram, common Wormwood three handfuls, Cardus Ben. two handfuls, tops of the leffor Centory, half a handful; being cut and bruis'd, pour to them in a Matrafs fpirit of Wine, a quart and four ounces, digeft for eight days, then ftrain it and keep it for ufe.

This is a noble Stomatick, Cordial and Cephalick, It is admirable to correct the weakness, coldness, and windeness of the Stomach, want of Apetit and in digestion ; It cures the Vertigo, Megrim, Head-ach, (from a cold caufe) preferves against Apoplexic, Palfy, Convulfions; It cheers the Heart, revives the Spirit, repreffes Hypochondriack Melancholly, is good against Vapours, and fits of the Mother. It rectifies the cold and moift diftemper of the Womb and the weekness thereof, which are commonly the caufe of Barrenness, the Dose is from twenty drops to half a fpoonful in Wine, Ale or Beer. The Author directs to take it at Meals as well as at other times; It may also be taken in the Morning in warm Ale or Purle, cating a piece of bred and butter, either before or after it. Junckins.

XIII. A Cordial Water for the Somach, and to expel Wind.

Take leaves of the best Tobacco, outward rind or peels of Oranges of each fix ounces, Winter-Cinnamon fix drams, Aniseeds an ounces

ounce and half, Sack a point and half, Brandy a pint; digeft and diftil in Balneo Mariæ with great care. It is excellent in the Colick, pains of the Stomach, want of Apetite and digeftion; the Dofe is one fpoonful before cating, and gives cafe upon the fpot.

CHAP. XX.

Of choice, Anti Scorbuticks, or approvd and experienc'd Remidies against the Scurvy.

I. A purging Apozem against the Scurvy.

TAke of Polypody of the Oak, Elecampane of each one ounce and half, Wall-fern, Agrimony of each one handful and half, tops of Wormwood one pugil, Currens one ounce, Sema fix drams, Agaric a dram and half, white Tartar one dram, Ginger two fcruples and half; boil them in Fountain-water what fuffices; in a pint of the ftrain'd Liquor diffolve fyrup of Rofes folutive an ounce and half, mix and make an Apozem; divide it in three Dofes for three Mornings. Dr. Harvy.

II. A purging Powder against the Scurvy of the Same Author.

Take Cream of Tartar two scruples, flowcr

er of Sal Armoniach chalibeated ten grains, Scammone fix or eight grains, mix and make a Powder to be taken in the Morning fafting, in two or three fpoonfuls of warm Ale or Broth.

III. Pills against the Scurvy.

Take Sena two drams, Niter Tartaris'd one dram, Rofin of Scammony one fcruple, oyl of Cloves ten drops, fyrup of Buchthorn-berries what fuffices, mix and make a Mafs for Pills; the Dofe is one dram in the Morning early. Dr. Harvy. The preparation of the Niter Tartaris'd will be fet down afterwords.

IV. Others of great vertue of the fame Author.

Take of our Aloes prepar'd, or of Aloes Rofat. half a dram, Tartar vitriolate one fcruple, Rofin of Jalap five grains, oyl of Cloves two drops, fyrup of Rofes folutive what fuffices, mix and make feven Pills, let them be guilded and taken in the Morning early in Bed.

V. The form of a Decoction of little trouble, and left charge, but of great virtue against the Scurvy.

Take Guaiacum two ounces, Saffafrass one ounce, falt of Tartar one dram, boil them in Fountain-water two quarts to one quart, in the strain'd Liquor infuse leaves of Scurvy-grass four handfuls, Brook-lime two handfuls, Wormwood

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wood half a handful, Orang-peels two drams, ftrain it and put it in a Glais-bottle; the Dole is four ounces three times in a day at the Phyfical hours.

VI. In the Winter when herbs are scarce, I have frequently recommended this following with good success.

Take leaves of Scurvy-grafs four handfuls; Juniper-berries one ounce, ftamp them together in a ftone-Mortar, pouring upon them by little and little a pint of fmall-white-Wine, then prefsit out hard, and put the Liquor in a Glafsbottle, which will be clear when fetl'd; the Dofe three or four ounces twice or three times a day. Dr. Harvy.

VII. An Anti Scorbutick Liquor by expression of Juices.

Take leaves of Scurvy-grafs what quanty you pleafe, water-Creffes, Brook-lime of each half the quantity, ftamp them in a ftone-Mortar, then prefs it out ftrongly, in this Liquor, in two pints of it infufe Winters-bark half an ounce, Orang-peels two drams, Saffran half a dram, digeft in a Matrafs clofe ftopt for twelve hours in warm Sand or warm Water; then being cold ftrain it and put the Liquor in a Glafs bottle for ufe; the Dofe four ouncestwice a day.

III.

VIII. An Anti Scorbutick Liquor by Infusion.

Take roos of Horf-radifh one ounce, Jention two ounces, water-Creffes two handfuls, leaves of Germander, Soap-wort of each one handful, roots of Zedoary one dram, tops of Centory one pugil, make an Infusion in Water of Saffafras and white Wine of each one pint for twelve hours, then strain it; the Dose three or four onnces.

IX. An Excellent Anti Scorbutick Spirit.

Take Horf-radifh-roots three ounces, Saffafras, Winters-bark, Orang-peels of each half an ounce, Wormwood one pugil, Sal Armoniac two ounces, cut and bruife them and pour to them a pint of white-Wine, digeft for twenty four hours, then diftil it in a Glafs body, putting half an ounce of quick Lime at the bottom; you must first put at the bottom fome of the ingredients, and then put the quick Lime upon that, and then put in the reft; the Dofe twenty or thirty drops in any convenient Liquor.

X. An other Excellent Anti Scorbutic Spirit.

Take Juniper-berries, Elder-buries of each four pounds, feeds of Scurvy-grafs, Carduus and

and garden-Creffes, all bruis'd of each two pounds, Juice of Scurvy-grafs, water Creffes, Brook-lime, Arfmart, Mony-wort, Celandine and Fumitory of each two pounds, Horfredifirroots bruis'd one pound, put them all in a fit veffel, and mix with them a pint of Aleyeft, fet them in a warm place to ferment for two days ; then diftil it and keep the first fpirit by it felf, and the fecond Water that shall follow the Spirit, by it felf. This Spirit is excellent for the cure of Scorbutic Diseases, for it fweetens the Blood, procuring its due Circulation, it opens Obstructions, is good against fmall Stones, Sand and Gravel, whether in the Kidneys or Bladder; the Dofe is a fpoonful in the Morning in Ale or Beer, or in the fecond Water that follows the Spirit. Dr. Charras.

XI. An other Anti Scorbutic Spirit.

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> Take bark of Fraxinel, roots of Tamarisk, and Capers of each an ounce and half, Polypody of the Oak two ounces, Horf radifh three ounces, Scurvy-grafs, water Creffes, Brooklime, Sorrel, Scolopender of each three handfuls, Lorrel-berries, Juniper-berries of each fix drams, tops of Centory, one handful, Goof dung an ounce, feeds of Citron, Cardus, and Hemp of each half an ounce, Cloves, Giuger, Cinnamon, Nutmeg of each three drams, being flie'd and bruis'd digeft them with Wine of Elder-berries, or white-Wine one gallon, and

and three pints of good English spirit for three days, then distilit.

A certain practitioner was very fuccefsful in his practice, in mixing all his Medicines with this Spirit: 'Tis an excellent Menftrum to make Elixir Proprietatis with, as fhall be taught hereafter,

XII. To make the plain spirit of Scurvy-grass.

Take English Brandy, call'd proof spirit, put it into yout Still, then put into it somuch Scurvy-grass (when it is in the flower) speedily bruis'd it, as it can contain; put on the still head and lute it close, and let it stand three hours, then distil it with a refregeratory, faving the first half of your spirit which you put on, and that is call'd the plain spirit of Scurvygrass; then continue the distilation so long as it runs with any strength, and keep that by it felf till you distil the same again. You will do better not to bruise it, but to put it whole, because in the bruising of it it looses its Volatil-falt.

XIII. To make the Purging Spirit of Scurvy-grass, call d the Golden Spirit of Scurvy-grass.

Take of the plain spirit of Scurvy-grass a pint, put it in a Matrass, to which add Jalap grosly powder'd three ounces, stop it close and digest it in warm Sand, for twenty four hours,

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or till you fee it is of a Golden colour ; then being cold, firain it, and put it in a bottle for ufe. The Dofe either of the Plain, or of This is from twenty to thirty or fixty drops in Ale, Beer, or Wine, in the Morning; But it ought to be curioufly given to fuch as are of a hot and dry confitution, or a Cholorick habit. In grofs bodies and where humours abound, give the purging Spirt. Some make this purging Spirit with the Rofin of Jalap, but the Root it felf is better ; the way to make it with the Rofin is thus : put one ounce of the Rofin of Jalap into a pint of the Spirit, and digeft them together.

XIV. To make a purging spirit of Scurvy-grass with Gumme Gutte, or Cambogia and Jalap.

Take of the Golden spirit of Scurvy-grass a pint, put it into a Matrass with an ounce of Cambugia in powder, shake them well together; but the Cambugia will never dissolve in the faid Golden Spirit nor in the Plane, altho you should keep themalong time in digestion; now to make it dissolve put in a few drops of good spirit of Sal Armoniac, which will cause it to dissolve speedily.

This is a fecret known but to fewy and ist and excellent Remedy against the Dropsie, the Dose is from twenty to fixty drops in any proper Liquor.

XV.

XV. An excellent Anti Scorbutic Liquor by expression of Juices.

Takethe Juice of both forts of Scurvy-grafs, white-Wine, and Juice of Oranges of each one pint, mix them and put it in a Bottle, it will be clear when fettled; takethree or four spoonfuls of it Morning and Evening.

XVI. An other.

Take Juice of Lemonds, Sorrel, Brooklime, water-Creffes, Fumitory, and white-Wine of each an equal quantity; put it in Botles and when 'tis clear drink of it as before directed.

XVII. An other excellent Drink against the Scurvy.

Take Brook-lime, water-Creffes, the leffer Celendine, Wormwood, and Fumitory of each one handful, red-Dockroots one pound, Horfredifh four ounces; being cut and bruis'd boil them in a fufficient quantity of fmall Ale, and a quart of white-Wine, to the Confumption of athird part, ftrain it, and when cold put it in-Bottles; the Dofe a quarter of a pint Morning and Evening.

XVIII

XVIII. An Anti Scorbutic Wine with Juices. &c.

Take Juices of Scurvy-grafs, water-Creffes, Brook-lime, Sorrel of each a quarter of a pint, Rhenifh-wine two quarts, put it in a Bottle, add roots of Horf-redifh, Elecampane, and red-Dock, all cut in thin flices of each an ounce and half, two Nutmegs bruis'd; put all into a Bottle, ftopt Clofe, and keep it Cool. This is commended to be an Infaliable experiment to purefy the Blood and perfectly cure the Scurvy; the Dofe is a quarter of a pint at a time. Sezoderus.

XIX. An Anti Scorbutic bottle Drink:

Take leaves of Scurvy-grafs one handful, Rafpins of Horf-rediffi-roots half a handful, winters-Bark bruis'd two drams, Infufe them in a quart of Cider, or Cider and Scurvy-grafseach a pint, ftop the Bottle close, the Dofe from fix to eight ounces, twice a day.

XX. An other:

Take of Horfe redifh-roots rafp'd two drams, leaves of Scurvy-grafs twelve in number, Raifons flit fix in number, half an Orange cut in fmall bits, put them in a Glafs-bottle, and pour on them a quart of fmall Ale, ftop it close,

let it be your ordinary and conftant Drink, and therefore at the fame time you may prepare other fix Bottles in the fame manner for your use; and after fome days fix others.

XXI. An Anti Scorbutic Liquor which may be us'd in stead of this bottle Drink.

Take roots of Horf-rediff, and feeds of Scurvy-grafs of eack half an ounce, leaves of garden Scurvy-grafs two handfuls, the pulp of half an Orange; pound them together, pouring upon them by little and little half a pint of white-Wine or white Porto, then prefs it out gently, and put it in a Bottle; the Dofe three or four fpoonfuls in every draught of ordinary drink. Pound it with as much fpeed as you can.

XXII. Pills Excellent against the Scurvy.

Take Aloes Succotring, Gum Ammoniacum of each two drams, diffolve them in Tincure of Jentian what fuffices, adding Philophical spirit of Vitriol twenty drops, strain it and evaporate to the thickness of Hony, then add the compound powder of Sena three drams, of our Chalibeat Salt two drams, Niter Tartarifate a dram and half, Bezoard Jovial, two scruples and half, oyl of Amber fifteen drops, Elixit Propietatis what suffices, mix and make a Mass for Palls, the Dose from a scruple to a gram,

dram. Dr. Harvy fays he hath feveral times prefcrib'd them, with a fuccefs fuitable to the excellency of its Ingredients, they may be continued for eight, ten or fourteen days together.

XXIII. An Excellent preparation of Alloes. Dr. Harvy.

Take Aloes Succotrinæ grofly powder'd one ounce, of red-Rofes dry'd a dram and half, fpirit of Salt fourty drops, fpirit of Wine not rectifi'd, fomuch as will over top it the breadth of four fingers, digeft in warm Sand for twelve hours, then ftrain it, and evaporate to the confiftance of an extract; to which add oyl of Cloves twenty drops; the Dofe from fifteen to fixty grains. The Dr. has this preparation in his Book call'd, the Difeafe of London, or a new difcovery of the Scurvy. He fays, that this preparation he hath frequently experienc'd to exceed all others.

XXIV. The preparation of the Franckfurt Pills, invented by Dr. Hartman Byer, which to this day are accounted of great vertue against Scorbutic Distempers.

Take Alocs Succordinæ half a pound, Burtage-water a pint and half, digeft for twenty four hours, then ftrain it and evaporate to a due confiftence; to which put purifi'd Juice of Carduus Ben. eight ounces, digeft again for fix K 2 hours,

hours, strain and evaporate to the Confistence of a Mass for Pills: They are to be taken before a light Supper, from sitteen to thirty grains or a dram. Some instead of the Burrage-water, dissolve them in the Juice of Violets. And thus I prepare them.

XXV. Prince Ruper's Receipt to prepare the faid Franckfurt Pills.

Take Violets pickt, beat them to mash in a ftone-Mortar, then prefs them out in a prefs, pull the dry Mass to pieces, upon which pour Rose-water, stir them well about, then press it again; repeat this till you have a pint of Liquor, in which dissolve Aloes Succotrinæ one pound by a gentle digestion, stiring it some times, then strain it and evaporate to the Consistence for Pills.

They gently purge and carry off all Offenfive humors, as Choler, Phlegm and Melancholy, and that not only from the Head and Stomach, but from all parts of the Body, they open Obfiructions of the Liver, Spleen, Mefentary Womb, excite an appetite, and caufea good digeftion; they Operate without the least perturbation of Humors, alteration of Body, change of Countenance, impair of strength, or any its attendance; they render the Body vigorace and prompt to Motion; but they are prejudicial to all hot and dry Temperaments, least and this liabits of Body, and fuch as are finds.

fubject to bleeding at the Nole, or the Hæmerhoids, or excellive Menstrua.

XXVI. The manner to prepare the Elixir Proprietatis, as it is directed by the College of Physicians of the Hage in their Dispensatory, Fol. 106.

Take Aloes Succotrina, choice Myrrh, Englifh Saffran of each an ounce, powder them grofly, and put them in a bolt Head with a long Neck, pour upon them fpirit of Wine rectified, a pint and half of oyl of Sulphur rectified fix drams, ftop it up clofe, and digeft in Balnio Maria for fourteen days, fhaking the veffel fometimes, then ftrain it, and keep it in a glafs for ufe. It is beyond all objections a great Anti Scorbutick, the Dofe is from fifteen to twenty or thirty drops in Wine.

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XXVII, To prepare the Elixir Propietatis, Dr. Harvy's way.

Take Alocs Succotrinæ, choice Myrrh of each an ounce, bay-Salt well dri'd fout ounces, diftil in a glafs Retort in Sand; to the Liquor diftil'd put fpirit of Wine rectifi'd a pound and half, fpirit of Salt rectifi'd one ounce, Englifh Saffran an ounce, digeft in warm Afhes for four days, then pour it off.

XXVIII. To make an Anti Scorbutic Elixir Froprietatis. Dr. Chatras's way. Take Aloes Succotrinæ, choice Myrrh, Eng-K 3

lifh Saffran of each four ounces, Powder them grofly, and put them in a Matrafs with a long Neck, and pour upon them of the Anti Scorbutick fpirit at Sect. X. of this chap. four pints, ftop the Matrafs clofe and fet it in digeffion in warm Sand for eight days; then pour off the tincted fpirit, and pour upon the remainin Mafs one pint of new fpirit, digeft as before, then ftrain it out and prefs it hard, mix both the Tinctures together, and then draw off the fpirit in a Sand-bath with a moderate fire, till a third part only remain, and when the veffels are Cool preferve the Elixir : When 'tis to be us'd mix with it a third or fourth part of the Volatil fpirit of Harts-horn.

This Elixir is highly efteem'd in all difeafes that proceed from corruption of Humors; but it is chiefly us'd for the cure of the Scurvy; for it purifies the Blood, and quickens the floath of its Circulation; the Dofe from ten to twenty drops in Wine or fome other proper Liquor.

XXIX. A purgin Elixir Proprietatis with Rhuburb of Junckins.

Take Aloes Succotrinæ an ounce and half, choice Myrth one ounce, Englig Saffran half an ounce, Rhuburb thin flic'd three ounces, Mallaga-wine or Canary two pints, spirit of Sulphur rectifi'd half an ounce, powder the ingredients grofly, and digest them for fourteen days, schaking the veffel from time to time, then strain it and keep it for use.

It is an Excellent Anti Scorbutick, and profitable in all Malignant Feavers, and Contagious Difeafes, yea in the Plague it felf there cannot begiven a better purgin Medicine; and alfo in Hypochondriack affects in Men, and Hyfterick in Women it is greatly prevailing, and is a Medicine of great Vertue.

Note, That instead of Malago-wine you may make use of either of the Anti Scorbutick spirits at Sect. X. or XI. of this chap. Hartman.

Note, That if you make the Elixir Propietatis as is directed at Sect. XXVII. aforegoing, Charras advifes to digeft it in a very gentle heat for two months, during that time the accidity of the fpirit of Sulphur, will mortify and correct the most part of the bitterness of the Aloes and Myrrh, and will bring the Elixir to perfection, and make it proper for the ule for which the Authors commend it, and particularly Crollins who calls it the Balfom of the Antients, and fays it contains all the vertues of Natural Balfom, necessary for the prefervation of Humain Bodies, especially of old Men and Women; he commends it as a wonderful Remedy against all Diseases of the Lungs, againft Malignant, and Peftilencial Feavers, and Contagious Diffempers, and peftilent Airs, to ffrengthen and cure the pain of the Stomach, to cure the Head-ach and the Virtigo, to ftrengthen the Memory, to be a prefervative from the Gour, Stone and Paliy, to cure Quartan-K 4 Agues,

Agues, to prefere Youth and lengthen out old Age, to cure and confolidate Wounds and inward Ulcers; and in a Word by an occult quality to overcome all Scorbutick Difeafes, Hypochondriack melancholy in Men, and Hyltetick affects in Women by fupprefling, and cartying off the Vapours. You may mingle with one part of it, a third or fourth part of good fpirit of Harts-horn highly rectifi'd, which will qualify the fharpnefs of the fpirit of Sulphur by uniting with it, and fo to be administr'd to patients whole diftempers are to be imputed to the excels of Acids, as is practised by Judicious Phylicians well feill'd in the grounds of difeafes.

XXX. An Excellent Menstruum to make Magif terial Anti Scorbutic Tinctures and Elixirs withal. Dr. Willis.

Take rectifi'd spririt of Wine alcholiz'd a pint, spirit of Victriol rectifi'd fix ounces, mix and distil them in a glass Report in Sand, with three cohobations, that is pouring the spirit distil'd again into the said Report, and distilling again twice; then keep it for use well stopt.

Elixir Propietatis is more easily and better prepar'd with this compound Menstruum, than the vulgar way. fays Dr. Willis.

XXXI. To make an Excellent Anti Scorbutic Elixir with the aforefaid Menstruum.

Take winters-Bark, Lignum-Aloes, Galin-

gal of each two drams, Cinnamon, Cloves, Cubebs of each a dram, feeds of Bifhops-weed and water-Creffes of each half a dram, being bruis'd put them in a bolt Head with a long Neck, and pour upon them of the aforefaid Menstruum enough to cover them three fingers over, digest in warm Sand for three days; then sover days in the sov

XXXII. An other Anti Scorbutic Elixir.

Take white-Amber, gum-Ivy, Carranna, Tacca-mahacea of each a dram, Saffran half a dram, Cloves, Nutmeg of each two fcruples, being bruis'd put them in a bolt Head, and pour to them of the aforefaid Menstruum, and extract a Tinture as before; the Dose twenty drops, the Tincture of falt of Tartar is likewife a fit Menstrum to extract Tincturues, and make Elixirs withal.

XXXIII. A comfortable, strengthening Stomachical Electuary against the Scurvy.

Take Conferve of Rosemary-flowers, Sageflowers, Roman Wormwood of each an ounce, Quercetan's Stomical powder of Aron one dram, Zedoary, winters-Bark of each half a dram, Elixir Propietatis forty drops, fyrup of Citronpeels what suffices, mix and make an Electuaary, whereof take the quantity of a Chestnut every day two hours before cating. 34.

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XXXIV. An other Anti Sorbutic Electuary.

Take Cerufe of Antimony four ounces, double refin'd Sugar twelve ounces, mix them and make a Powder, to which add fyrup of Eringo-roots four ounces, or what fuffices to make a white Electuary; the Dofe is two or three drams twice a day, increasing the Dofe daily to fix drams at a time. It is also good against the Dropfy and Jaundice, and purifies the Blood; Drink after every Dofe fome of any of the Anti Scorbutick Liquors. 'Tis good also against a Gonorea and the Whites.

XXXV. An other easy prepar'd Electuary against the Scurvy.

Take leaves of Brook-lime fix ounces, wood-Sorrel two ounces, double refin'd Sugar eight ounces, pound them, adding powder of fweet Fennelfeeds half an ounce, Ivory in fine powder two drams, Sal Prunnelle a dram and half, with fyrup of the juice of Brook-lime, make an Electuary; the Dofe the quantity of a Cheftnut. Dr. Willis.

XXXVI. A Excellent purging Scurvy-graft Ale.

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Take Sena eight ounces, roots of red-Dock, Burdock, Moncks-Rhubarb of each four ounces, choice

choice Rhubarb two ounces, winters-Bark fix drams, Saffafrafs two ounces, Liquorice four ounces, feeds of Anis, Fennel and Carraway of each fix drams, Juniper-berries an ounce and half, Bittony, Marjerom, Rofemary, Fumitory, Sage of each two handfuls, Agrimony, Harts-tongue, Liver-wort, Groundpine of each one handful, Raifons flit half a pound, two Oranges fluck with Cloves; being all duely prepar'd, hang them in fix Gallons of Ale and fmall beer, to which add the juice of Scurvy-grafs, and water-Creffes of each a pint an half to be put in after it hath done working.

XXXVII. An other Scurvy-grass Ale of great vertue against the Scurvy.

Take five Gallons of imall Ale-wort, before it is boil'd, boil in it Tops of the Pine tree, Firr, or the raipings or fhavings of either of their Woods, then after it hath wrought put into the vefiel the Roots of fharp pointed Dock (vulgarly call'd red Dock) dri'd and bruis'd two pounds, (than which) certainly there is no Remedy more Excellent against the Scurvy (fays the learned Dr. *Willis*) leaves of Brook-lime, water-Creffes and Horf-redifh, in the boiling of it add leaves of Carduus dri'd.

of Capers, and Tammarish of call dhi

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XXXVIII. The Earl of Linfy's Scurvy-grafs Ale, whereby he was cur'd both of the Scurvy and Dropfy.

Take of Sea-Seurvy-grafs, half a Peck, Sage cight handfuls, Horf-radifh-roots rafp'd one handful, Wormwood two handfuls, feeds of Seurvy-grafs two ounces, Raifons flit two pounds, Bittony one handful, the peels of two Oranges, cut the Herbs imall and bruife the feeds, and put all into a thin bolter-Bag, and hang it in twelve Gallons of new imall Alc; when it hath done working and hath ftood a week, drink of it. The faid Lord took a good draught of it in the Morning fafting, at leaft two hours before eating, and an other at Night. and fometimes alfo at Meals; It caus'd a good digeftion of his Meat, fortifi'd his Stomach, and made him more vigorous. Sir K. Digby.

XXXIX. An other purging Scurvy-grass Ale good also against Melancholy, and Vapours.

Take Polypody of the Oak two ounces, roots of Sparragrafs, Burrage, Buglofs, Sorrel, Cichory, and of red-Dock-roots, Elecampane and Grafs-roots of each half an ounce, the inward Bark of the young fprouts of Afh, Bark of Capers, and Tammarisk of each three drams, Liquorice, Epithymum of each a dram and half, Maiden-hair, Agrimony of each two

two good handfuls, Flowers of Broom, Burrage and Buglofs of each a handful, the four greater and leffer cold feeds of each four drams, Sena eight ounces, Rhubarb one ounce, Mechoacan roots and ounce and half, feeds of Anis, fweet Fennel and Carraway of each fix ounces, fhavens of Ivory and Harts-horn, yellow-Sanders, Saffafrafs of each half an ounce, Ginger two drams, one Nutmeg grated, prepare them all duly and hang them in fix Gallons of fmall Ale, and when it hath wrought you may put in the Juices of the following Herbs : Take both forts of Scurvy-grafs, Fumitory, Agrimony, Cichory, Burrage, Baum, Mugwort, Liverwort of each a handful, stamp them together and prefs out the Juice.

X L. An other purging Scurvy-grass Ale of Dr. Butlers.

Take Sea and Garden Survy grafs of each a Peck, Sena Polypody of the Oak of each four ounces, Sarfaparilla fix ounces, feeds of Anis and Caraway of each half an ounce, Liquorice two ounces, Agrimony-Maiden-hair of each two handfuls, being all prepar'd, hang them in four Gallons of new Ale, after four or five days you may drink of it, and when it begins to grow stail, bottle it, and keep it in a Celler : You may prevent its growing stale by putting into it stavings of Harts-horn and Ivory.

XLI. An Excellent Scurvy-grass Ale order'd by Dr. Willis for Madam Ducke.

Take of red-Dock-roots two pounds, of Sca and Garden Scurvy-grafs, half a Gallon, Brooklime, water-Creffes half a Gallon together, twelve Oranges cut in pieces, Heath fuch as grow on Commons two handfuls, bruife the Roots, ftamp the Herbs fpeedily and hang them in fix Gallons of new Ale, fo foon as it hath wrought drink of it.

XLII. A Chalk-water to correct tharp and scorbutic humors, order'd for Madam Ducke by the aforefaid Dr.

Take of the whiteft Chalk in Powder two ounces, put it in a Glafs or Jugg, and pour upon it two quarts of Water, three Figgs flic'd, and Liquorice bruis'd one dram, ftir them well together, and let it ftand twenty four hours, then drink of it three times a day, a quarter of a pint at a time.

XLIII. An other Scurvy-grafs Ale much approv'd.

Take Succory-roots, yellow-Dock-roots of each three ounces, leaves of Agrimony, Tammorisk, red-Sage of each three handfuls, Graden Scurvy-grais four handfuls, Tops of Pine and

and Firr tree, or the fhaving of their Woods of each two handfuls, Juniper-berries, and wild Dancus feeds bruis'd of each two ounces; bruife the Roots, cut the Herbs finall, and hang them in three Gallons of Ale, when it hath done working drink of it.

XLIV. A Diet drink to Cool and Clear the Blood, and to correct sharp bumors.

Take Figgs, Raifons flic'd of each four ounces, feeds of Anis and fweet Fennel bruis'd of each three ounces, Liquorice two ounces, Cinqfoil two handfuls, Mallow-roots and Fennelroots of each three ounces, boil them in four quarts of Water, for a quarter of an hour, then itrain it and fweeten it with fix ounces of Sugarcandy, when 'tis cold put it in Bottles, Drink of it three times a day.

XLV. A very profitable Medicine against the Scurvy.

Take roots of Scorzonerz, and Groundpine of each half a handful, burnt Harts-horn two drams, Raifons flie'd half a handful, boil them in three points of Water, till a third part be Confum'd: To the strain'd Liquor (when cold) add Rhenish-wine half a point, and put it into a Bottle, put into it leaves of Scurvygrass and Brook-lime of each half a handul, prefery'd Orange-peels flie'd small or stampt half

half an ounce, make a close and warm infusion for fix hours; then strain it and keep it close stopt for use; the Dose is a glassful twice a day, after any of the Anti-Scorbutick Electuary, or Lozenges. Dr. Willis.

XLVI. An Infusion by it felf of Excellent use against the Scurvy.

Take leaves of Scurvy-grafs a handful, Horfredifh-roots rafp'd half a handful, winters-Bark bruis'd two drams, put them in a veffel of Glafs, and pour to them white-Wine two pints, or Cider and water of Scurvy-grafs of each a pint, let them Infuse in a Celler for three days; the Dose is from fix ounces to half a pint after a folid Anti Scorbutick Medicine, as Electuaries or Lozenges. Dr. Willis.

XLVII. A Whey against the Scurvy.

Take leaves of Scurvy-grafs, and water-Greffes of each four handfuls, Succory and Sorrel of each twelve handfuls, ftamp them, and add Corrianderfeeds bruis'd an ounce, pour to them common Whey of Milk five quarts, ftir them well together, and let them ftand clofe cover'd in a Cool place for fix hours; then ftrain it and prefs it out, and add to this Liquor juice of Cevil Oranges a pint, then clarify it with the whites of Eggs, and while it is warm Sweeten it with double refin'd Sugar; the Dofe is a pint rwice

twice or thrice a day, viz. In the Morning fafting, at four in the afternoon and at Night. If the Patient refuse it in so large a Dose, let him take only three quarters of a pint.

XLVIII. An other Anti-Scorbutic Whey good alfo for Distempers of the Liver.

Take Fumitory, Succory, Endive of each three handfuls, Liver-wort two handfuls, Agrimony, Sorrel, Harts-tongue, Burrage, Buglofs of each a handful, Carrawayfeeds bruis'd one dram, ftamp the Herbs, and pour upon them Whey made the common way, almost three quarts, ftir them well together, and then prefs it out hard, Clarify it with whites of Egg: Tis not only a fingular Anti-Scorbutick; but 'tis good for fuch as are troubled with Blotches, Boyls, Itches and other breakings out in a hot conftitution of Body, 'tis good to give to young People, and Children in the Spring time, and helps fuch as have the Rickets.

XLIX. A Wine of the Juices of Anti Scorbutic Herbs.

Take of the Juices of both forts of Scurvygrafs, Brook-lime and water-Creffes of each a pint, Juice of Oranges a pint and four ounces, fingle refin'd Sugar twelve ounces, put this into a Gallon runlet, with a tap in it, laying it in a Celler keeping the little bunghol open, of flight-

ly ftopt that the Liquor may ferment a little, when it hath done working draw it into Bottles: It will be of a grateful tafte; the Dofe is a fpoonful in every draught of Ale, or four ounces of it at a time by it felf, twice a day. When you bottle it put into every Bottle a little lump of Sugar, and a Clove flit in two.

L. Excellent Anti Scorbutic Lozenges for nice Perfons.

Take Winters-Bark finly powder'd, Crabs-Eyes prepar'd of each a dram and half, Pearl prepar'd half a dram, double refin'd Sugar diffolv'd in a fufficient quantity of Water of Earth-Worms, and boil'd to the Confiftency for Lozenges fix ounces, fpirit of Scurvy-grafs two drams, make Lozenges of half a dram each; take one of them twice in a day, drinking after it an appropriated Liquor.

LI. Cordial, stomachal and Anti Scorbutic Lozenges, as they are prepar'd and fold by the Oxford Appothecaries.

Take rinds of Oranges, Lemonds, Citrons, all preferv'd of each one ounce, preferv'd Eringo-roots, half an ounce, Pine-nut-Kernals, Pistick-nuts of each twenty, fweet Almonds blanch'd ten, Anifeeds powder'd half an ounce, Ginger preferv'd two ounces, Species Aromatisum Rofatum, Nutmegs of each a dram and half, Roots

Roots of Galingal a dram, Cloves ten, Amber-greice four grains, Musk and Civet of each two grains, double refin'd Sugar diffolv'd in Rofe-water and boil'd to a Coniffency for Lozenges a pound and half, make Tablets. They are alfo prevailing against Wind in the Stomach.

cold habit of Body.

Take of Conferve of Garden Scurvy-grafs, two ounces, Conferve of Wood-Sorrel one ounce, Compound powderof Aron fix drams, ivrup of Oranges a fufficient quantity to make an Electuary, of which let him take as much as a large Nutmeg in the Morning, and as much at five a Clock in the afternoon, and the like quantity at Night, drinking after it fix fpoonfuls of the Horf-redifh-water Compound at Sect. LV. following, or that at Sect. LVI.

Or diftil a Water of freth Garden Scurvygrafs by it felf for the fame purpofe. A handful of frefh Scurvy-grafs being wafh'd, and dri'd in a cloth and chew'd in the Mouth, the juice fwallow'd and the remainder fpit out, will cure the Scurvy and any Itching or fharp humor in the Blood, and cure the Scurvy in the Mouth, Ifus'd every Morning fafting, an continued for fome time.

Distil'd Anti Scorbutick-waters, because they are a neat and Pleasant Remedy, are in a man-L 2 ner

ner all in all amongst Anti Scorbutick prescripts : I shall here give you three or four forms of such as are commonly us'd by learned Physicians.

LIII. An Excellent distil'd Anti Scorbutic-water.

Take leaves of both Scurvy-grafs, Brook-Lime, Water-Creffes, Tops of Broom of each four handfuls, leaves of Germander and Ground-Pine of each two handfuls, Roots of Horf-radifh a pound, Aron-roots, Angelica and Mafter-wort of each four ounces, the Peels of four Cevil Oranges, and as many Lemonds, *Calamus Aromaticus* an ounce, Cinamon, Cloves of each half an ounce; being flie'd and bruisd, pour to them of the beft Cider eight pints; le them infufe in a veffel clofe luted, for 24 hours, then diffil them in a Limbeck, with a refrigratory. You may alfo do it in a Comon Still, if you have fuch a one as I have given the defeription of.

LIV. An other Anti Scorbutic distil'd water, which may be made in the VVinter season, owhen Herbi are scarce.

Take leaves of Scurvy grafs four handfuls, tops of Brooms, of the Pine tree and Juniper of each three handfuls, the middle Bark of Elder and Afh of each four ounces, Roots of Horfsediff and Polypody of the Oak of each three ounces,

ounces, the Peels of four Oranges and as many Lemonds, Winters bark four ounces, flice and bruife them, and pour to them of white-Wine, Cider, Whey, or Elderberry-Wine, either of them eight pints; after two days infufion diftil it.

LV. An other Anti Scorbutic-water, call'd the compound Horf-redish-water.

Take Garden and Sea Scurvy-grafs of each three pounds, ftamp them and prefs out the Juice of them with as much speed as you can; to which add juice of Water-Creffes and Brooklime of each three quarters of a pint, to this mixture add two quarts of white Porto, fix Lemonds cut into small flices, fresh Briony-roots two pound. Hors redish roots one pound, Winters-bark four ounces, Nutmegs two ounces, steep them all for three days, then diftil it in a Limbeck with a Refrigeratory, Bucked-head, or a Worm.

Hartman, In steed of white Porto you may take Wine made of Elderberries, which is of it felf an Anti Scorbutick.

LVI. An other Anti-Scorbutic distil d water.

Take Roots of Horf-rediff rafp'd or bruis'd two pound, Scurvy-grafs twelve handfuls, Aron-roots one pound, Spearmint, Sage, Water-Creffes and Brock-lime of each fix handfuls, E 3

feeds of Scurvygrafs a little bruis'd half a pound, white Port Wine fix quarts, (or Ederberry wine) diftil it in a Common itill, and referve only the first three quarts. Dr. Bates.

Note, that if you have a Common still you may have the Head of it alter'd and made as I have given the Description, with which you may draw two quarts whilst you can draw but one in the Common. Hartman.

Thefe Waters are not only previlent againft the Scurvy, and all Scorbutick Cafes; but they are alfo very profitable for the Dropfy, finall Stones, Sand and Gravel in the Reins or Bladder, Stranguary and Stopage of Urin; they are fome times fuccefsfully prefcrib'd and usd in the Palfy, they are good againft the Green-Sicknefs, open obftructions of the Liver, Spleen and Lungs, and purify the Blood; the Dofe two or three fpoonfuls in Renifh-Wine, or Goosberry, Corrans, Cherry or Elderberry-Wine; for they are all of them Anti Scorbutick, and much cheaper.

LVII. Dr. Harvy's Nitrum Tartarisatum.

Make Antimony Diaphoretick the common Way, with three parts of Salt-Peetre to one of Antimony, both powder'd and mixt exactly, and cass into a red-hot Crucible by little Ladlesful covering the Crucible after every injection of the faid Mixture ; having injected all, cover the Crucible, and having fill'd the Furnace

nace with Coals, stop it up close, and let the matter Calcine till the Coals be burnt out. The Mass being yet warm, powder and put it in a large Bason, on which supposing the Mass to be a pound in weight, pour about a quart of warm-Water and stir it well about ; then let it stand four or five hours, that the powder may fettle; pour off the Water into an evaporating glafs, adding to it half a pint of diftil'd Vinegar, evaporate it to a Pellicle, and fet it in a Cool place to Crystallize for three or four days, gather the Crystals, and evaporate the remaining again to a Pellicle; then fet it again to Cry-Itallize as before, repeat this still as is shot into Cryftals that will thut; and this is the Dr.'s Nitrum Tartarifatum, whereof he gives from half a scruple to two scruples, and fays it hath perform'd affects in the Scurvy and fome other Chronical Diftempers, which could never be expected from the Arcanum Duplicatum Tartarum Visriolatem, or fuch Heamaphroditick preparations; for besides its Penetrative, Incisive, Detergent, and deopilative qualities, it does retain a proportion of Antimonial Salt, Centrical Sulphur, and a true Idea of what ever excellent Faculties Antimony in its best preparations is enricht with, fo that there is fcarce any impurity (whether Manifelt or Latent) in the Blood or Bowels, that can escape its Energie; but when you have made use of as many ounces of this Nitrum Tartarifatum as I have : I doubt not but you will have caufe to give the fame Char-44

Charracter of it I have exprest. Dr. Harvy in his book call'd the Difease of London or a new discovery of the Scurvy.

LVIII. Anti Scorbutic Pills of Dr. Juncus.

Take of the Mellagoge Pill of Quercetan a dram and half, Extract of the leaves of Sena half a dram, Rolin of Jalap one dram and fix grains, Tartar vitriolate thirteen grains, volatil falt of Amber one feruple, feeds of Garden Creffes, Scurvigrafs and of Mustard of each half a dram, and with the Elixir Proprietatis what fuffices, make a Mass for Pills; the Dose is from a feruple to half a dram.

LIX. An Excellent Anti Scorbutic Physical VVine. Dr. Silvius.

Take Garden Scurvy-grafs, water-Creffes, Wall-Rue of each one handful, Roots of Horfredifh, and Polypody of the Oak of each two drams, Sena one ounce, the Yellow Peels of Orangestwo drams, beatten Cinnamon a dram and half, crude Tartar three drams; being cut and grofly bruis'd, put them in a ftone Jugg, and pour upon them four pints of French and Reuith-Wine. Drink a Glafsful of it in the Morning.

X. TELLS LAND

a Tertardaran as I have : 1 doubt

L'X: Sir John Micletwait's Anti Scorbutic Elixir.

Take Sena four ounces, Roots of Jalap, Scamony of each an ounce and half, Rhubarb, Hermodactils, Galingal of each two drams, Anifeeds, Carrawayfeeds, Juniperberries of each four fcruples, Turpeth fix drams, fpecias Aromaticum Rofatum two drams two fcruples, falt of Wormwood, falt of Steel of each two drams, Bark of Saffafrafs, fix drams, Saffron four fcruples, falt of Tartar, and Scurvy-grafs of eauh four fcruples, fpirit of Scurvy-grafs one pint, and fpirit of Wine rectified three pints, Diffolve the Salts in a little fair Water, for they will not diffolve in the fpirit of Wine, digelt and make an Elixir according to Art; the Dofe is from thirty drops to half a fpoonful.

It is excellent in the Collick, opens obliguetions of the Liver and Spleen, provokes the Courfes, prevails against small Stones; Sand and Gravel, Dropfy, Gout, yellow Jaundice, Vapours and Fits of the Mother; It sweetens the Blood.

LXI. An excellent Anti Scorbutic Ale.

Take Succory-roots, yellow Dock-roots of each three ounces, leaves of Agrimony, Tammarish, red Sage of each three handfuls, Garden Scurvy-grass four handfuls, the Tops of Pine and Firrtree of each two handfuls, Juni-

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perberries bruis'd two ounces, put them all in a thin Bag, or a close Net, and hang them in three Gallons of Ale, when it hath done working drink of it, you must bruise the Roots, and cut the Herbs small.

CHAP. XXI.

Of Choice approv'd and experienc'd Remedies for the Cure of the Dropsy.

I. Excellent Pills for the Dropfy. Dr. Bates.

TAke Rofin of Jalap, Scammony, Rhubarb, Cambogia, Calomelanofs of each half an ounce, Ammoniacum (prepar'd with our blew Flower de Luce) three drams, Tartar vitriolate two drams, Mastick one dram, Saffran two scruples, spirit of Turpentine fourty drops, with fyrup of Buckthorn-berries what fuffices, make a Mass for Pills; the Dose is two scruples, or more in ftrong People: They work briskly and ftrongly, and may be given in the Morning fasting, twice a Week with observations as in other purges; but because that fuch melting purges, much weaken the Bowels, it is necessary in the intervals to exhibit ftrengthners, some times a Dose of Lawdanum at Night going to Bed, at other times a Dole of Tincture of Marfs, which things admirably fortify the Bowels; as the Ingenious Dr. Sal-П. mon well obferves.

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II. A Powder for the Dropfy.

Take the feeds of Cichory, Afh-Keys, Burdock, red-Nettles, Pafly, Fennel, Alexander of each half an ounce, Pellitory of Spain three drams, Salt Prunella Juniperberries of each one ounce, reduce them to Powder; the Dofe is one dram in four ounces of white-Wine, or Elderburry Wine if you can have it, take it every Morning and Night.

III. An Excellent Drink for the Dropfy.

Take of the Innerbark of Elder, red-Sage, Ground Ivy, Smallage, roots of Fennel, Aron, Polypody of the Oak, Scurvy-grafs, and Brook-lime of each half a pound, the beft Juniperberries bruis'd one pound, Ginger flic'd thin an ounce, bruife the Roots and Itamp the Herbs with as much fpeed as you can, and hang them prefently in four Gallons of Ale when it hath done working, fuch as are able may then add fome white-Wine, Renifh-Wine, or Elder-wine (which is better) if you can have it. Drink of it conftantly.

IV. A Decoction for the Dropfy.

Take of the Bark of the Roots of Elder, two handfuls, Saffafras, and Sarfa Parilla of each two ounces, Winters-bark, Winter Cherries of 156 Choice and Experienc'd Chap. XXI.

of each an ounce and half, feeds of Alexander beaten one ounce, being cut and bruis'd, boil them in fix quarts of white-Wine to the confumption of two quarts, when 'tis half cold ftrain it; the Dofe is four ounces Morning and Night.

V. An other very good Diet drink for the Dropfy.

Take Polypody of the Oak fix ounces, Bark of Lignum Vitæ three ounces, Saffafrafs four ounces, Sena fix ounces, Anifeeds bruis'd three ounces, Epithymum, Stechados of each half an ounce, Raisons flit half a pound, Hermodactils three ounces, Agarick, Rhubarb, Chinaroots of each half an ounce, prepare them all, and infuse them in two Gallons of Ale, and fix quarts of white-Wine, let them infufe all Night, then boil it with a gentile fire for two hours and half, when tis cold strain it; let the Patient drink of it three times a day at the Phyfical hours, half a pint at a time. Boil the remaining ingredients in Alc, and drink of this fecond Liquor at Meals, and when you are thirsty drink no other Liquor but the two.

Let your Diet be Roft-meat of Mutton, Fowel, and Rabit, but not Veal, eat often Raifons of the Sun with Biskets inflead of a Supper. Sir K. Digby.

VI. An other Experienc'd drink for the Droply. Take of the Inner green rind of Elder, and

of the young thouts of Ath of a years growth of each two handfuls of Wormwood one handful thred them very fmall, and put them in a ftone Bottle, or Glafs, and pour on them Ale and Bear of each two quarts, White-Wine or Elder-Wine two quarts, ftop it clofe and let it ftand three or four days, thaking it now and then; then ftrain it and bottle it up into quart Bottles, ftop them clofe, it will grow very quick and pleafant. Drink of this at Meals, and all times when you have need to drink; Dr. Williams to Sir K. Digby. The mixture of the feveral Liquots will caufe the Patient to make Water in a bundance.

VII. A notable cure of a desparate Dropsy perform'd by Dr. Farrat upon an Emiment Lord.

prepar'd and put them in

Having well purg'd the Patient first, with fome fit purge to carry off waterish Humors, the Dr. order'd him the following Diet of Garlick : Make fome moderate Broth of Mutton, Capen or Hen, but not Veal, it must not be too strong of the meat, nor too week, but such as you may drink all the day, for you should drink no other Liqour.

You must make but two quarts of Broth at a time, for it will not keep, and for this quantity, you must take a Gallon of Water, into which put above a handful of Garlick, Rosemary, Tyme, Penny-Royal, sweet Marjerom, Fennel-roots, Parsly-roots, also Currans and some Salt. And

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And after fome days taking the Broth, put into every draught you take of the Broth, a spoonful or more of the juice of raw Garlick stampt and prest out : But if you cannot bear it always to tak this Broth, then use the following Diet drink or Decoction.

wo Take Sarfa Parilla twelve ounces, Chinaroot five ounces, Saffafrass, three ounces; put them in a Pipkin, which fet in a Kettle of hot Water for four hours, then through away this Water, and stamp the Ingredients, and boil them in ten quarts of Fountain-water in a veffel close cover'd till four quars be cofumed : Of this Decoction drink without any other Liquor but the Garlick broth, taking fome times the one, and fome times the other. Or take all the aforefaid Ingredients in the fame manner prepar'd and put them in a Bag, and hang them in a clean veffel fill'd with Beer, to every ounce of the Ingredients you must take a quart of Beer. Either of these is only in case you cannot bear the use of the Garlick-broth; which alone will difpatch the cure much the fonner, if you can bear it.

This Garlick-broth is for all obstructions and fuperfluity of cold, raw humors (clogging the brain) as well as for the Dropfy.

Hartman. Sir K. Digby made the bargain between the faid Lord and the Dr. which was Five hundred pounds; and I heard Sir K. Digby fay, that after twelve or thirteen days the Patient began to Pifs in great abundance, and very Ch. XXI. Remedies to cure the Dropfy. 159

very Stincking, Noisum, roaping matter; and continuing the Remedy, the faid Lord was perfectly cur'd

VIII. An other experienc'd Remedy by which, both the Dropfy and the Scurvy has been cur'd.

Take Wormwood, Maiden-hair, Bettony, Fumitory of each one handful, red Dock-roots-Madder-roots of each three ounces, Polypody of the Oak two ounces, Horf-radifh-roots half a pound, Sena five ounces, Rubarb flic'd thin two ounces, Mace, Nutmegs, Galingal, and Cloves of each two drams, Mechoacan-roots thin flic'd and Hermodactils of each two ounces, Saría Parilla four ounces, being flic'd and bruis'd, put them all into a Bag of bolter-cloth, or into a close Net, and hang them in fix Gallons of small Ale, with a pint and half of juice of Water-Creffes, and two pints of juice of Scurvy grafs, after five or fix days drink of it as oft as you pleafe : Note, the veffel must not be quite full leaft it should work over.

IX. The Dropfy cur'd in a young Woman by the following.

Take Elecampane, Liquorice, Pauls Bettony, Roman Wormwood, flower of Sulphur, Sugarcandy, Conferve of Rofes of each half an ounce, and of the beft fallet Oyl what fuffices, make an Electuary; the Dofe is the quantity of 160 Choice and Experienc'd Chap. XXI.

of a Chestnut three times a day. 'Tis good alfo for shortness of breath, Hoarsness, Cough and Confumption of the Lungs.

X. A despar'd Dropsy cur'd in a Gentleman, by the following, after many Remedies taken in vain.

Take Elecampane, Roots of Smallage, Fenncl, Flag roots, or blew Fower de Luce of each an ounce and half, Jentian and Afarumroots, Squils of each a dram, of the Inner bark of Elder an ounce, Saffafrass fix drams, Rhubarb two ounces, Jalap half an ounce, Steel prepar'd with Tartar, tops of Wormwood, Agrimony, Ground Pine, Maiden hair, all dry'd of each two drams, Centory, Broomflowers of each a dram and half, Cinnamon two drams, Spicknard half a dram; being all cut and bruis'd, infuse them in fix quarts of white-Wine, or of Elder wine for three days, Inaking the veffel often; whereof the Patient took a pint every Morning fasting, by this he was perfectly cur'd. Given me by this worthy Mr. Parker of Gravefend, who new the faid Gentleman very well, his Belly and Leggs being prodigioufly swell'd.

XI. The Dropfy cur'd by Sir George Wakman in Sir William Rook.

Take crude Antimony in powder, four ounces, Sea Wormwood cut small two handfuls, Garliek

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Garlick stampt three handfuls, put them in a bag of bolter-cloth, and hang them in ten Gallons of very strong Ale. The proportion of Mault to make this Ale, was two Bushels to make ten Gallons.

XII. An other Experienc'd Remedy for that Dropfy call d Anafarca.

Take of the Afhes of Broom, Wormwood, or of the Cuttings of Vines burnt to whitenefs, and fifted four ounces, put them in a glafs-bottle, and pour on them a quart of white Wine, ftop it clofe and fet it in a Kettle of cold Water, then hang it over the fire that the water may be warm, keep it fo for three or four hours, ftrain it; the Dofe is from fix ounces to eight twice a day. If you have the conveniency of a fand Furnace, you may make the digeftion in that.

XIII. An other for the fame.

Take falt of Tartar made with Niter three ounces, melt it in a Crucible till it look blewifh, powder it in an Iron Mortar whilit it is hot, put it speedily in a Matrass whilst it is yet warm, and pour upon it a pint and half of good strong English-Brandy, Water of Snails, and Earthwormbs of each four ounces, stop it close, and digest in a warm Sand for two days, then pour of the clear Liquor; the Dose is two or three ounces, with four ounces of the Decoction of Mi Roots

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Roots of Butchers-broom, and Burdocks made in Ale. For ordinary drink, take the Afhes of Broom, burnt to whitenefs and fifted two pounds, Saffafras three ounces, Galingal one ounce, Juniper-berries, and Daucus feeds bruis'd of each an ounce and half, put them in a bagg and hang them in four Gallons of Ale, after feven or eight days begin to drink of it.

XIV. A much approv'd Diet drink to be taken in flead of Beer, by the constant use of which many Persons almost given over, have been perfectly cured of this kind of Dropsy.

Take of Guaiacum, Saffafrafs of each four ounces, roots of Florentine Orris (Calimus Arimaticms, Gallingal, Elecampain of each an ownce and half, Juniper-berries, and Lawrelberries of each two ounces, feeds of Anis, Carraway, fweet Fennel, and Coriander of each an ounce, Long Pepper, Cubebs of each an ounce and half, Cloves, Nutmegs, Ginger of each half an ounce, Jamaica Pepper two ounces, dri'd leaves of Sage-vertue, Wood Sage, Calamint, Agrymony of each a handful, Liquorice four ounces, being fli't'd and bruis'd, boil them in four Gallons of Fountain-water to half, then ftrain it, and when 'tis cold bottle it up in Glafs-bottles for ufe. Dr. Willis.

XV.

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XV. A Medicine for the Dropfy, and Scurvy, which has had very good fuccess in some Persons of Quality.

Take of Sea-Scurvy-grais half a Bufhel, Roman Wormwood, and common-Wormwood of each two handfuls, red-Sage three handfuls, tops of Rofe mary one handful, pick them and wafh them in fimall Beer, dry them with a Cloth, bruife them in a Mortar, then put them in a Jugg, with two quarts of Sherry-Sack, and four quarts of Renifh-wine, or of Elderwine if you can get it, put into it half a pound of filings of Iron turn'd to ruft, and tied in a linen Kag, and of Horf-redifh-roots rafp'd, two bandtuls, let it ftand five days, then as you drink it ftrain it, and drink a Wine-glafs of it in the Morning fafting, and another at four a Clock in the alternoon.

XVI. An Experimented Medicine for the Drophy, faid to be an Infaliable cure.

Take of the best Mustardfeed bruis'd, ty'd up in a bagg, leaving room for the Swelling, steep it fourty eight hours in as much white-Wine (or Elderberry-wine) as will Cover it, then strain it and put it in bottles, drink a quarter of a pint of it every Morning fasting, and you will foon find the good Effects of it.

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XVIL

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XVII. An other Medicine wherewith the Dropfy has been cur'd.

Of a Bushel of Mault make eight Gallons of Wort, in which boil (instead of Hops) tops of Broom dri'd a convenient quantity, when it has done working let it be your ordinary drink.

XVIII. An Efficatious purging Electuary for the Dropfy call'd Afeities, by Dr. Silvius.

Take Rofin of Jallap, two drams, Tartar vitriolated a dram, extract of Rhubarb two drams, Efula a dram and half, Gallingal powder'd a dram, Conferve of English Oris-flowers four ounces, with syrup of Peach-flowers what fuffices, make an Electuary; the Dose is from half a dram to a dram and half or two.

XIX. An other admirable purging Medicine in the Drop/y.

Take Elaterium, three grains, Rofin of Jalap fix grains, or powder of the root of Jalap ten grains, Pulvus Sancti, or Dia fenæ half a dram. mix it with white-Wine fix ounces, and give it for a Dole in the Morning.

XX. An Excellent Tincture of Scurvy-grass compsund, for the Droply.

Take clean filings of Iron four ounces, red-Sage,

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Sage, Agrimony of each three handfuls, leaves of Sea Scurvy-grafs two pound, Garden Scurvy-grafs three handfuls, Wormwood, Rofemary of each two handfuls, Horf-radifh-roots four ounces, cut all finall and add to them white-Wine and Cherry-Wine of each two quarts, let them infule cold in a veffel clofe ftopt for three days, then ftrain it. It has cured many fick of a deplorable Dropfy accompanied with the Scurvy, even when they have been paft all hope, and after that many other Medicines had been us'd in vain; the Dofe four ouncestwice a day. Infread of white-Wine you may take Elderburry wine if you can have it.

CHAP. XXH.

Of Choice Approv'd and Experienc'd Remea dies for the Stone, Sand and Gravel, in the Kidneys or Blader, Strangury and floppage of Vrin.

I. An Excellent Cliffer, fur the Stone in the Kidneys.

TAke Pellitory of the Wall, Maiden-hair, Herb Mercury, Mallows and Marshmallows of each a handful, Fennel, Parsly, Linfeed bruis'd of each three drams, Bran, Roots of Flower de Luce of each an onnce, boil them Ma

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in a fufficient quantity of Water to the Confumption of one third part, then ftrain it, take of this Liquor one pint, to which add Hony of Rofes, Caffia newly drawn of each an ounce, Hiera Piera half an ounce, oyl of Rue, Cammomil, and Dill of each an ounce, Sal Prunella one dram and half; mix and make a Chif. ter. Dr. Sermon.

II. A Remedy to help the Stone in the Bladder.

Take the Stones of Hips dri'd, beat them to powder; the Dofe is two drams at a time in tour ounces of white-Wine. It will provoke Urin much and bring away small Stones and Gravel.

Or take the powder of Ivy berries, red Nettle-roots of each an ounce, S al Prunella half an ounce, mix them; the Dofe is four fcruples every Morning in four ounces of white-Wine.

III. An other for the same.

Take of the diftil'd Water of Onions two ounces, fpirit of Juniper one ounce, the powder of Wood-lice one dram, fyrup of Marshmallows one ounce, mix them and make a Potion, which drink every Morning fasting for fome time together.

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IV. An experinc'd Medicine of excellent use against the Stone.

Take of Caffia newly drawn, oyl of fweet Almonds of each half an ounce, *Diaphænicon* two drams, powder of Rubarb fitteen or twenty grains, powder of Liquorice half a dram, fyrup of Violets one ounce, with a fufficient quantity of diftil'd Water of Mallows, make a Potion which let the Patient take all at once in the Morning warm.

V. An other very good Remedy for the same.

Take Holly-berries bruis'd, boil them in Wine or Ale, fweeten it if you pleafe with Hony and drink thereof. It fmoothens the paffage, and caufeth finall ftones, Sand and Gravel to come away to admiration. Dr. Sermon.

VI. An other for the same very good.

Take the Juice of Radifhes, and Moufear of each equal parts, mix them and take two or three ounces every day Morning and Night.

VII. An other very good Remedy against small Stones, Sand and Gravel in the Kidneys.

Take of Mallows, and Pellitory of the wall of each a handful, sweet Fennelseeds, Grumwelseeds bruis'd, Raisonssilic'd of each an ounce, M 4 Liquo-

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Liquorice half an ounce, ten Figs flic'd, boil them in a quart of new Milk, then ftrain it and make a poffet of it with white-Wine and fmall Ale of each three quarters of a pint, drink thereof at pleafure, half a pint at a time with a fpoonful of fyrup of Marsh-mallows in every draught.

VIII. A Remedy to brake and brink away the Stone, Sand and Gravel, Invented by the Empours Phylician.

Take the fhels of an Eftridg-egg pulverife it, and digeft it in fpirit of Salt until it be diffolv'd, then filter it and keep it for ufe; the Dofe is twenty or thirty drops in white-Wine or Ale. It is good alfo against stoppage of Urin, it expels Water in the Dropfy, provokes the Terms, and fome times purges by Stool.

IX. The Lord Denbigh's Remedy against the Stone, unco which he attributed his cure, as he told su K. Digby.

Take a good ounce of Mellonfeeds, and near a quart of fmall quick-beer, and a little Rhenifh-Wine, brew the chief quanty of the drink with the yelks of fix new laid Eggs, and draw the Milk out of the Mellonfeed with an other part of it, and a little fpirit of Clary, and as much virgin Hony as will fweeten it; then mingle and brew altogether, and drink a large draught thereof. X.

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X. A Remedy to expel small Stones, Sand and Gravel, which the Lady Digby, Sir K. Digby's Mother usually took and found the greatest benefit by.

Take the leaves of Golden-rod when it is in its greateft vigor, dry them in the fhade, and when you are troubl'd with the Stone and Gravel, take one ounce thereof (made into fubtile powder) in a fmall glafs of white Wine and Milk of each a like quantity; repeat this as often as there is caufe for it.

When the Herb is fresh and green, you may boil a handful of it in Whitewine posset drink, and drink it in stead of the dried Herb, which is to keep all the year.

XI. An other Remedy for the Gravel. Stangury and stoppage of Urin, which Sir K. Digby usually took and found great benefit by.

Take the white of a new laid Egg, beat it till it be all in froth, then let it fettle, pour off the clear Liquor, and mix it with two fpoonfuls of white Wine, and four fpoonfuls of red Rofewater, and one ounce of Sugarcandy in powder, take it in the Morning fafting, and an other at Night when you go to Bed, continuing it for feven days.

Hartman, I have often prefcrib'd this Remedy with great fuceels, for perfons troubl'd with the Gravel and stoppage of Ulrin.

XII.

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XII. An other Remedy for small Stones, Gravel or Sand in the Kidneys.

Make a poffet of a quart of Milk, with Ale and white-Wine, then firain it and boil in it parflyroots, leaves of Pellitory of the Wall, and Mallows of each a handful, water-Creffes half a handful, two fprigs of Tyme, Liquorice bruis'd one ounce, boil it to a quart, fweeten it with Sugarcandy, and drink a draught of it in the Morning and in the afternoon.

XIII. An experienc'd Remedy for stoppage of Urin.

Take a black Flint-stone make it red hot in a strong fire, then put it in a pint of white-Wine, cover the pot and let it stand for a quarter of an hour; then let the Patient drink it clear off.

XIV. A Remedy of great vertue against the Stone, Strangury and stoppage of Urin.

Take the Stone of the Wild Hips, being well dri'd, make them into fine Powder; the Dole is two drams, in four ounces of white-Wine.

XV. An other of Great vertue.

Take Stons of Hips, Snail-shells, and shells of Hassenuts, Liquorice, and brown Sugarcandy of each a like quantity; make of them all a fine

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fine Powder; the Dofe is two drams twice a day drinking after it any convenient Liquor. Junckins.

XVI. An other for the same.

Take the powder of Ivy-berries, red Netleroots of each an ounce, mix them and take a dram or four feruples every Morning in four ounces of white-Wine.

XVII. An other very profitable for the fame.

Take the diftil'd water of Onions a pint and quarter, Juniper water one ounce, powder of *Millepedes* one dram, fyrup of Marth-mallows one ounce, mix them and make a potion; drink it in the Morning fafting, and continue it for fome time together.

XVIII. An other experienc'd Remedy for the Stone-Collick, Strangury and stoppage of Urin.

Take Sena an ounce, Ginger, Anifeeds, Liquorice, Mace, Netlefeeds and baftard-Saffran of each a dram, Cinnamon a dram an half; reduce them all into a fine powder, and take a fpoonful thereof in Poffet drink, wine or Broth. 'Tis good alfo for the Droyfy.

XIX

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XIX. A Remedy for the Stone, which (as it is reported) did diffolve and bring away the Stone in the Bladder.

Take Millepedies, vulgerly call'd Woodlice a good quantity, wash them with white-Wine, then put them in a good glaz'd pipkin, cover it and past it close, and set it in an Oven after the bread is drawn, then reduce them to powder, to which put as much white-Wine as it will drink up, put it in the Oven again, then inbibe it again with white-Wine, and put it in the Oven again; repeat this a third time, then mix it with Strawberry water, and twenty drops of oyl of Vitriol dry it once more in the Oven, and keep it in a glass close stopt. Of this powder the Patient took four fcruples mix'd with one spoonful of Brandy, and a litte Broth made of Cifers, in the Morning fasting, the effect of it was thus: The Patient was in great pain for the space of two hours, and after five hours past, he made a little Urin but very thick, the Second day having taken this Medicine again, his Urin was much thicker than the First, the Third day he voided a great deal of Sand; but continuing taking the Medicine, the Seventh day he voided fo much Sand that his Urin was full of it, and the Ninth day the Patient was perfectly cur'd. The cure was perform'd in a Printers fon at Room. Sir K. Digby.

XX.

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XX. An other Remedy for the small Stones, Gravel and Sand.

Take the red berries of How thorns (call'd Haws) when they are ripe; dry them and beat them to powder and fearce them finely; take a ipoonful of this powder in a glafs of white-Wine in the Morning fafting, and you shall never be troubled with the Stone as long as you take it.

XXI. A distil d Water much Experienc'd and approv'd to be Excellent for the Stone and Gravel.

Take Haws freed from their flalks two Gallons, brufe them well, and add to them roots of Philopendula and Saxifrage, Horf-redifh rafp'd, and Saffafrafs of each a pound, put upon them fo much white-Wine' as will cover them, flir them well together and let it fland cold four hours fliring it now and then; then diftil it in a Rofe ftill, adding fo much Milk to each Still as will cover the matterials; the Dofe is a Wine glafsful fweetn'd with fyrup of Marfh-mallows. A Gentleman ufe to take a glafsful of it and ride upon it. It brought a way many fmall Stones.

XXII. An other Water of Haws compound.

Take ripe Haws, bruife them well, add to them

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them roots of Mafh-mallows, Liquorice of each eight ounces, Reftharrow three ounces, leaves of Parietary, Winter Cherries of each twelve ounces, Mint two handfuls, feeds of Common Daucus four ounces, of Coriander two ounces, bruife the Roots and Seeds, pour upon them Milk warm from the Cow fix quarts, diftil it in a Common Rofe ftill taking of the head, and ftirring it fome times, by reafon the Milk Curds and Clods ; the Dofe is four ounces fweeten'd with fyrup of Marfh-mallows. It is an excellent thing againft the Stone, Sand and Gravel. You may take with this Water, the powder of Snail-fhels and Bees a fcruple, or of the powder of Woodlice a fcruple, or the powder of Winter Cherries.

This Water will be yet better if you diftil it with Parfly or Arfmart water inftead of Milk; for if you diftil it with Milk it will foon turn fower and be fpoil'd.

XXIII. A Powder much approved for the Stone, Strangury and stoppage of Urin.

Take fresh shells of Snails (those that are of a redish colour are best) drie them in an Oven after the bred is drawn, reduce them to a fine powder; then take Bees, and drie them in like manner and reduce them also to a fine powder; take of this powder one ounce, the powder of Snails two ounces, mix them well together, and keep it in a vial close ftopt for use; the

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the Dofe is fo much as will ly upon a fix pence in a quarter of a pint of Parfly or Arfmartwater, or in the diftil'd water of Haws, take it in the Morning fasting, or at any time when there is a need, and fast two hours after it.

XXIV. A very remarkable cure of Stoppage of Urin.

A Man having been grievoully afflicted with ftoppage of Urin, for leveral days, fo that he could neither make Water nor go to Stool, he had taken many Medicines for it prefcrib'd by feveral Able Phylicians, which all remain'd in his Body and fwell'd him, adding but more to his mifery; fo that he was in great danger of his Life.

He was advis'd at laft to fend for a plain Country-Man, who us'd to cure Horfes and Cattle, when they could not ftall; who, when he came to him took Nine live Bees and put them in a draught of Beer, and after the Bees were drown'd in the Beer, he gave it the Patient to drink, who with in a little time after he had taken it, made Water in a bundance, and alfo went to Stool.

XXV. The Queen Mothers Appothecarry's secret for stoppage of Urin.

Take the thin yellow rind of Lemonds, dry them and powder them finely, take of this powder

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powder fo much as will ly upon a fhilling in a glafs of white or Renifh-Wine or in Ale. This was told me by one who was himfelf cur'd with it. Hartman.

XXVI. An other experienc'd Remedy to expel small Stones and Gravel, Obstructions and stoppage of Urin.

Take Crabs Eyes prepar'd, Egg-fhells prepar'd (thole after Chichens are hatch'd are beft) afhes of a Hare or the Bones burnt and powder'd, Wood-lice, Sal Prunella of each fixteen grains, Opium one grain, mix them for a Dofe, and take it at Night going to bed, drinking after it a glafs of warm Renifh-Wine, or fair water fweeten'd with Hony, or the Water diftil'd from Bean fhells, and fweeten'd with fyrup of Violets which is alfo excellent to temper the fharpnefs of Urin.

XXVII. An other for the same.

Take the little gray bird call'd Wagtail, the whole bird Calcin'd, and the Afhes Bones an all powder'd and drank in any proper Lipuor, is of wanderful effects against stones and Gravel, whether in the Kidneys or Blader. Dr. Scroderm.

XXVIII

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XXVIII. To expel small Stones and Gravel, a profitable powder.

Take a quantity of Bees, dry them, reduce them to powder, then take Eggfhells after Chickens are hatch'd, make of them alfo a fine powder, then take powder of Tyme; take of thefe three powders of each equal parts, mix them, and let the Patient take thereof in any proper Liquor, as Radifh-water, which of it felf is faid to be a prefent Remedy.

XXIX. An other for the same.

Take the shells of Snails, diffolve them in distil'd Vinegar, and make a Magistery. It has no less vertue in the expelling of small Stones and Gravel, than the Magistery of Eggshells.

XXX. An other for the same, by which an Eminent Lord found much benefit.

Take the Gum of the Cherry-tree, diffolve it in white-Wine and drink it.

XXXI. An other to which some Physicians attribute great vertue.

Take the feed of Medlers made into fine powder; whereof take a dram in any convenient Liquor. N XXXII. 178 Choice and Experienc'd Chap. XXII.

XXXII. An other for the same.

Take a large Radish stamp it, and steep it in fix ounces of Rhenish-wine for a few hours, then press it out hard and drink it.

XXXIII. An other approv'd Remedy for the Stone and Gravel.

Take a pint of Luke Olives (which are the Imalleft of Olives) and eat the meat of them, then dry the Stones and beat them to powder, and take as much of the powder as will ly heap'd on a fhilling, and drink it down with a little white Wine for three Mornings together.

XXXIV. A Remedy for the Stone-Collick.

Take the red berries of Haythorn (Haws) of Eglantine or Hips being ripe, Afh-Keys, Liquorice and Anifeeds of each a like quantity, make of them a fine powder; the Dose is a fpoonful every Morning in Rhenish-wine for three Mornings together.

XXXV. An other for the same.

Take of Broomfeed, and Ashen-Keys of each equal parts, dry them and beat them to powder, whereof take a spoonful in Wine.

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XXXVI. An other for the Stone.

Take Acorns and dry them but not in the Sun, then greet them as you do a Nutmeg, and drink the powder down with a little Wine.

XXXVII. An other Remedy most Effectual against the Stone.

Take of the Five opening Roots of each an ounce and half, Burdock-roots one ounce, Tops of the Pine and Firtree of each an ounce, Grumwell-feeds an ounce, Juniper burries fix drams, of the four greater Cold feeds of each two drams, being flic'd and bruis'd, boil them in three pints of Fountain-water, adding towards the latter end white-Wine twelve ounces, to the ftrain'd Liquor add fyrup of Violets three ounces, fpirit of Turpintine diffolv'd with Sugar one dram, mix and make an Apozem; drink thereof Morning and Evening fix ounces at a time.

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GHAP. XXIII.

Of Choice, Experienc'd and Approv'd Remedies for the cure of the Collick.

I. The Lady Faunce ber excellent Pills for the Collick, Vapours, and Fits of the Mother, prefcrib'd for her Ladiship by Dr. Bouls.

TAke Gum Ammoniacum two ounces, Aloes Rofat fix drams, Tartar vitriolate four feruples, Storax Calamita one dram, diffolve thefe in the following Menstrum.

Take Rhubarb thin flic'd one ounce, powder of Diarbodon Abatis, Aromaticum Rofatum, of each two drams, Infufe them in half a pint of the juice of Lemonds, or in the Compound Jentian water for twenty fours hours, then ftrain it by preifing it hard; in this ftrain'd Liquor diffolve the Ingedients aforefaid, then ftrain again, and evaporate it to the confiftance of a Mafs for Pills, whereof take two fcruples, of which make five pills, take three at Night when you go to bed after a light fupper, and two the next Morning early.

The faid Dr. commends them to be the belt and most elegant Pills in the World, he advis'd the faid Lady to let them be in frequent use with her, she being much troubl'd with the Collick,

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lick, Vapours, and Fits of the Mother. They alfo ftrengthen the Head and Stomach, clear the Eye light, open Obstructions, cure the Green-fickness and yellow Jaundice, purify the Blood, and prevail against the Scurvy, Dropfy and Gout. I copi'd them out of a Book of Receipts which her Ladyship lent me. Hartman.

II. Other Pills Against the Collick of Dr. Bates.

Take powder of Rue, Sal Gem of each equal parts, Hony what fuffices to make a Mass for Pills; the Dose is half a dram at Bed-time and in the Morning fasting for sour days in every Month. It is an approv'd Medicine for the cure of the Collick.

III. An other excellent Medicine, much experienc'd and commended by Dr. Harris for the cure of the Chollick and griping of the Guts.

Take two, three, or four ounces of choice Rhubarb flic'd thin, and infuse it in a quart of Cinnamon, or Anisced-water, stope the bottle close and keep it for use; the Dose is five or fix spoonfuls of it at a time, and repeat a second Dose an hour after the first. In the Melancholly and Phlegmatick bodies, the Dr. fays he commonly uses the Infusion of Rhubarb and Jentian together. He says he has given it to Women with Child, attended with signs of N 3 Mis-

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Mifcarring, who have happen to fall into the Collick, and it has always given them immediate relief, more fafely and fuddenly then ever he could find from the best preparations; fome doe infuse the Rhubarb in Juniper water.

IV. An other for the fame, by Mr. Boylc.

Take two ounces of Rhubarb, four ounces of Jentian flie'd thin, and put them in a bottle with two pints of Anifeed or Juniper-water, ftop it close and let the Roots fleep along in it; the Dofe is two fpoonfuls at a time, and repeat a fecond dofe an hour after the first in the fit of the Collick.

V. An other by the fame Author.

Take of Dr. Stephens's Water, Plague-water, Juniper-water of each half a pint, infuse in it in a bottle Rhubarb thin flic'd two ounces, when you take it shake the bottle, and take a bout four spoonfuls at a time.

VI. An other for the fume.

Take an ounce of the feeds of ftinging Nettles, bruife them, and boil them in a quart of good Claret-wine, then ftrain it, and give of it a wineglafsful at a time warm, two or three times a day when there is need.

VII.

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VII. An other for the same.

Take the Hart of a Hare, dry it and powder it, and take a fpoonful of the powder in a draught of Warm white-Wine in the Morning fasting and last at Night.

VIII. An other faid to be a present Remedy.

Take of the powder of Yarrow one dram, in a glass of warm Wine.

IX. An other for the wind Collick and griping of the Guts.

Take Holly-berries half an ounce, stamp them, and pour to them half a pint of Ale, strain it and drink it as hot as you can.

X. An other for the fame.

Take Castlesoap scrap'd two drams, put it in a glass of white-Wine, make it warm and drink it.

XI. An other for the Same.

Take Liquid Laudanum Tartaris'd from fixteen drops to twenty, give it going to reft in a fpoonful of the Water of Camomil flowers, and drink after it fix fpoonfuls of the fame: Let N 4 it

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it be repeated every other or third Night, if the pains are very preffing.

XII. An other for the same, Excellent.

Take the Water of Cowflip-flowers three ounces, fyrup of Meconium half a dram, Aqua Marabilis two drams, mix them and take it going to Bed.

XIII. A Medicine that bath been prov'd of by many for the Hysterick, or Mother Collick, and the Stone also.

Take Fennelseds, Corianderseds, Parslyfeeds, Carrowayseeds and Gromwellseeds of each one ounce, the Lesser Gallingal one ounce, the Cods of Sena two drams, Spicknard, Tyme of each two drams, make of them all a fine powder; whereof take a dram for a Dose in warm white-Wine Morning and Night, and and in all manner of fauce that you eat with your meat.

XV. An other much experienc'd for the fame.

Take of the folution of Opium Tartaris'd from fixteen to twenty drops; Dr. Willis fays it is wont to be of chief use with him; which Medicin I have truely given to some Persons, long and miserably troubl'd with this Disease, some times for a long time, one while every Night, an

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an other while every other Night with good fuccess : It is Liquid Laudam Tartaris'd.

Tincture of Antimony, and Tincture of Amber, and other altering Remedies prefcrib'd in affects of the Head, have place here. And above all the Effencial Tincture of Vi-

pers.

XVI. For the Collick and griping of the Guts.

Take Sage and Mint, boil them in a fit proportion of Claret-wine, then strain it and sweeten it with a little Sugar.

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CHAP. XXIV.

Of choice, approvd and experienc'd Remedies for the Gout.

I. Purging Pills for the Gout, call'd Pil. Rafin.

TAke of the best Aloes half an ounce, red Roses dri'd to scruples, Hermodacts pill'd a dram and half, Diagridium a dram, Hony of Roses what suffices make pills.

II. Other purging Pills for the Gout of Dr. Bates.

Take chosen Caster in fine powder half an ounce, white Amber, Germander, Ground-Pine of each fix drams, volatil Salt of Amber, Cerufe of Antimony, Balfom of Tolu, Opopanax of each an ounce, roots of Butterbur three drams, choice Turpentine two ounces, Terebinthinated Balfom of Sulphur what fuffices, mix and make a Mass for Pills; the Dose is half a dram, twice a day for two or three Months together, drinking in the mean while as common drink a Decoction of the Roots of Butterbur, Sarfa-Parilla, China root with Raifons of the Sun flit, &c. They are not only a fpecifick against the Gout, but also against Shime, Sand, Gravel or Stone, whether in the Reins

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Reins or Bladder: Or you may drink of the Decoction of Archangel flowers dri'd and boil'd in water as they do Tea.

III. Other purging Pills against the Gout.

Take Calomelanos twenty grains, Rofin of Jalap or Scammony three grains, ovl of Cloves one drop, Balfom of Peru what fuffices, make three or four Pills for one Dofe. Dr. Wille,

In purging, what Soleander prefcribes, happily may be of fome moment; viz. by putting a plafter, or fome other defensive Medicine on the place, to hinder the falling of the Humour to it.

IV. A Remedy wonderfully axtol'd by Rodericus a Fonfeca against the Gout.

Take the Roots of black-Hellebore, the fibres half a dram, flick an Apple with it, then roft it and eat it : Vomiting with those with whom it uses to be fase an easie, does well also in this Disease, for which end the Emetick Tartar of Mynsicht, fulphur of Antimony, Mercurius Vitæ, Hemetick Wine, Gutta Gamba, may be given.

In a fit of the Gout, powder of Stones, Bones and Shels, and also of fmall vegetables do good (fays the learned Dr. Willis) which being faid to be the Antidotes of this Disease, fubdue all particles, and fermenting with them

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as it were, and at length being fubjected, fend them forth by Urin and Sweat.

V. A Powder against the Gout.

Take of Gascon's powder two drams (or of the powder of my Lord Abbingtons) which see in its place, Ivory, Roots of bastard Dittany, and of Male Peony of each a dram, Lignum Aloes, yellow Sanders of each half a dram, makea fine powder; the Dofe is from half a dram to a dram, mixt with the juice of Alkermes, drinking after it fix spoonfuls of the distil'd Water of red Poppies, or of the Decoction of dry'd Archangel-flowers, or take of the faid powder fix drams, Conferve of Clove Gillo-flowers, and Bettony-flowers of each an ounce and half, Diafcordium two drams, fyrup of Meconium what fuffices, make an Electuary; take thereof two drams Morning and Night, drinking after it a difh of the Decoction of Archangel-flowers. Dr. Willis.

VI. A Fomentation for the Gout.

Take of white-Wine-vinegar, Boys Urin, Sack, and Spirit of Wine of each a pint, add to them of Common Salt one handful, mix and make a Fomentation.

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VII. An other approv'd outward remedy to ease the pain of the Gout.

Take the oldest Tallow you can get, (if it be but a year old it will ferve) and Garlick of each equal parts, stamp them together and spread it upon Canvas, an lay it on. It eases and aswages the pain, and draws out the Humor to admiration.

VIII. A Discursive, and a tractive Plaster for the Gount, which has cur'd many.

Take Franckincense, Ship-pitch of each fix ounces, Turpentine, oyl Olive of each one ounce, mix them and make an Emplaster and aply it. It is excellent to open the Pores and draw out the Humor.

IX. An other remedy which has done wonders especially in the Hot Gout.

Take the Chymical oyl of Wax and Myrrh of each equal parts, mix them and anoint the parts therewith. Dr. Sermon.

X. Mr. Wickenden's rare Balfam, which be ufnally made use of and found great benefit by.

Take of the young fprouts of dwarf Elder in the month of March, when they fpring up out of

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of the ground, and are about a fingers length, four handfuls, stamp them to marsh, and boil them in a pound of Hogslard over a soft fire for two hours; then strain it and press it out hard, and put it up in a Gally-pot for use.

Hartman. With this Balfom I have cur'd many Perfons of Numnefs and Raiging pains in their Hands and other parts, after they had us'd many remedies in vain.

XI. A Poultice to ease and assuage the raging pain of the Gout.

Take a quantity of the whiteft part of Pidgeons dung, mix it with an equal part of good Muftard, temper it with a little Vineger, take the greate of a Puppy fo much as will make it into an Ointment; then take a pint of Garden Snails, ftamp them with their fhells to a mafh with a handful of Parfly, then mix and incorporate all well together, and fpread it upon Leather and apply it. Snails and Parfly allone ftampt together to a mafh and appl'd, is good for the Hot Gort.

XII. An experienc'd Bath or Fomentation or Fomentation for the Gout, which a certain Counceller in Germany frequently us'd with great fucces.

Take the herb Mullin (in Latin Verbaicum) dry the whole plant, the Stalk, Leaves and Flowers cut very fmall, make a ftrong Decoction

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tion of it in Smiths forge water, which put into a Tub with two or three handfuls of powder'd Chalk; into this Bath he put both his Feet as warm as he could endure it, and with the Herb he Fomented his Leggs, Knees, and Hands, thus he continu'd till it grew cold; then a hole being dug in the Ground he caus'd it to be buried therein, Herb and Liquor an all ; This he did when ever he perceiv'd any fymptom of an approaching fit of the Gout, and this course always prevented the fit, and freed him of it for half a year. I heard him fay that if he did not use this Remedy, he should have very fevere and raiking fits, which would confind him to his Bed and Chamber, for a Month or fix Weeks. He always made provision of the Herb in the Month of June when it is in the Flower. Hartman.

XIII. A Police that will ease and aswage the raging pain of the Gout, Marvelously.

Take Garlick and Housseek of each equal parts, stamp them together and apply it.

XIV. An Anodine Poltice for the Gout.

Take of the Leaves and Roots of Mallows, and Marih-mallows, pound them, add Milk and the crums of Bread make a Cataplasm and apply it.

XV.

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XV. An other Anodine Cataplasm that has been found effectual in taking away the raging pain of the Gout in Hands and Feet.

Take of Common black Soap four ounces, the yelks of three Eggs, beat them well together with as much Rye-flower as will make it a fit Cataplain, which apply to the place affected.

XVI. A distil'd Water to Foment withal for the Gout.

Take the Contents of a Bullocks Paunch newly kill'd, diftil a Water from it with a Common Still; with which Foment the parts affected.

A certain Gentleman often troubl'd with a fevere Gout, faid, that in the cruel Tortures of that Difeafe, had always prefent eafe from this Remedy, as he told Dr. Willis. Against exftream Tortures of the Gout outward Narcoticks fome times ought to be us'd.

XVII. An outward Narcotick.

Take leaves of Henbane, and Hemlock of each three handfuls, put them into boiling water, and affoon as they grow tender take them out, bruife them, and add powder of the flowers of Camomile to drams, the yelk of an Egg, mix them and make a Cataplasm.

XVIII.

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XVIII. An other for the same.

Take Tincture of Saffron made with the fpirit of Wine four ounces, Camphir and Opium. of each a dram, digest them in warm Sand in a Matrass close stopt till they are dessolved, anoint the part griv'd with this Liquor.

XIX, An other for the same.

Take a new white penny Loaf, pouder of Saffron and Opium of each one dram, make it moift with the oyl of Scorpians, and apply it as a Plaster.

XX. An other for the same.

Boil the Crums of white bread in new Milk, add thereto fome yelks of Eggs, and apply it.

XXI. An other for the fame.

Take Wheat-bran, and Elder leaves of each three handfuls, boil them in a fufficient quantity of wholfome Boys Urin, add thereto the fat of a Loin of Mutton, or Hogs Lard, and apply it warm, changing it twice a day.

Or, take red-Poppies and pound them finall, and mix therewith a little Vineger and apply it Plaster ways.

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XXII. An other for the same.

Take the fine pouder of Bay-bearies, Ginger, fallet Oyl and white wine-Vineger of each half a pint, boil them together to the Confumption of the Vineger, add white Wax and Deers Tallow what fuffices; make an Ointment.

XXIII. A Plaster of wonderful use to ease the Pain of the Gout.

Take Diapalma, Paracelfus, Oxycracium, of each an ounce, Opium fix drams, make a Plaster by melting them together, adding a little Oyl of Wax.

XXIV. Pills for the Gout.

Take pouder of Ground Pine fix drams, Crabs Eyes two drams, Venice Turpentine what fuffices, make fmall Pills; take three or four of them in the Evening and Morning, for thirty or fourty days, drinking after it of the following diftil'd Water two or three ounces.

Take leaves of Ciprefs, tops of Fir, Milletoe of the Appletree of each fix handfuls, roots of Avens and the great Burdock of each a pound, the peels of ten Oranges and fix Lemonds, Nutmegs, Mace of each an ounce, being flie'd and bruis'd, pour to them fresh Milka-Gallon, diffil is in a Common Still, and let

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the first and last water be mix'd. Or distil a plain Water from the leaves of the great Burdock, which pour on fresh leaves twice or thrice. Dr. Willis.

XV. An Electuary of good use against the Gont. Dr. Sydenham.

Take the Conferves of Garden Scurvy grafs one ounce and half, Roman Wormwood, the yellow of Orange peels'of each an ounce, preferv'd Angelica, and Nutmegs of each half an ounce, Venice Treacle three drams, pouder of Aron-roots compound two drams, and with a fufficient quantity of fvrup of Oranges make an Electuary : Of which let the Sick take a quarter of an ounce twice a day, drinking after it five or fix fpoonfuls of this following diftil'd Water.

Take Horfe-radiffi-roots flic'd thin three ounces, Garden Scurvy-grafs twelve handfuls; Brooklime, Watercreffes, Sage, Mint of each fix handfuls, the yellow peels of fix Oranges; two Nutmegs bruis'd, Braunfwick-Mum, fix quarts, mix them and diffil in a common Still till three quarts of Water is come off, which keep for ufe. Our Elixir or Tinture of Mettals with Gold and Tincture of Antimony are things beyond compare. And above all the Noble Tinture with Gold and Antimony of the Illuftrious Prince Rupert.

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CHAP. XXV.

Of Remedies for the cure of the Sciatica or Flip-Gout.

I: A draught for the Hip-Gout.

TAke the Electuary call'd Cariocoftinum half an ounce, Troches of Albandal five grains; mix them with two or three ounces of white-Wine, and drink it off fafting, repeating it as need fhall require.

Il. An other for the fame.

Take the pouder of a Mans-feut that was never buried, Hermodactils, Sena and Turbith of each two drams, Scamony fulphirated one dram, being made into a fine pouder, give the Patient one dram at a time in the diffil'd Water of Fumitory; or in a fpooriful of Broth or Poffet-drink:

H.I. An other for the fame.

Take Scammony prepar'd with Sulphur two femples, Mercurius Duleis one feruple, mix them and make it into three dofes: The ftronger may take it at twice as afore directed; which will root out the Humor that canfes this difference.

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IV. An outward Remedy for the Sciateca.

Take Caftle Soap, scrape it and diffolve it in spirit of Wine or Brandy, and anoint the Hip well with it before the fire.

V. An other for the fame.

Take Oyl of Foxes half an ounce, Oyl of Ericks, and Earth-Worms of each an ounce, Oyle of Turpentine and St. Johnswort of each an ounce and half; with a fufficient quantity of Virgins Wax, make an Ointment, and use it as atore directed.

VI. An other for the same.

Take the Oyl call'd Petrolei, Oyl of Bricks, Juice of Dane-wort, Turpentine of each an ounce, Oyl of Earth-Worms an ounce and half, Brandy half an ounce, melt them together, and anoint the griev'd part hot therewith. Or apply the Plaffer for the Gout at fect. X.

VII. An other for the same.

Take Rofin, or Ship Pitch, Burgundy-Pitch, the Plafter of Paracellus, and Bees wax of each an onnce, Verdigreafe in fine pouder half an ounce, melt them together, ipread it upon Sheeps leather and apply it.

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VIII. Pills for the Sciatica or any kind of Gout.

•• Take Aløes and Hermodactils of each one dram, Diagridium half an ounce; reduce them to a fine pouder, whereof take every Morning one dram for a formight; Or if you cannot take the pouder make it into Pills with fyrup of Rofes folutive.

The Lady Crifp her purging pouder is also very good for this Diftemper, which will be fet down in the Mifelania.

CHAP. XXVI.

Of choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Remedies for the Pleurify.

I. TAke a Pippin open it on the top and take out the Core, then fill it with white Frankinfence (Olibanum) ftop it clofe with the piece you took out and roft it, then take of the fcin and beat it to math fo that it be well mixt, and let the Patient take it all at once; It is an Infallible cure. A dram of the pouder of Olibanum well mixt with the pap of a rofted Pippin and caten, doth the fame thing with lefs trouble.

II.

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II. An other for the same.

Take three of the bigeft round Balls of fresh Stone-Horsdung, brake them in pieces, and boil them in a quart of white Wine to a pint, then strain it, and sweeten it with Sugar, let the Patient take a good draught of it warm, and keep him warm in his Bed : Or insufe the balls, of Horsedung being bruis'd in a pint of Water of Cardus for a small time, then strain it and use it as aforesaid. It powerfully disperses and abates the pain of the Pleurisy, and other pains and stickes of the side.

III. An other for the same.

Take white Henfdung, and Stone-Horfedung of each half an ounce, infufe them for fometime in fix ounces of Cardus Water warm, then ftrain it and let the Patient drink it warm all at once.

IV. An other for the same.

Take the flowers of Dill, Mellilot and Camomile of each three handfuls, Bran, Fennugreek, Linfeed and Mellonfeeds bruis'd of each an ounce and half, boil them in a fufficient quantity of Water, and Foment the part grieved therewith as hot as the Patient can endure it, with Flannel cloths or a fpung dipt therein. O_A V. 200 Choice and Experienc'd Chap. XXVI.

V. An other for the same, in case bleeding cannot be admitted.

Take fine Wheat flower, make and bake a Cake of it, which cut through the middle, parting one fide from the other; fpread upon the crum of each of them Treacle or Methridate, and apply each fide of the half to each fide of the Patient; and use at the fame time either of the drinks made of the Horfedung, or the apple rosted with Olibanum.

. V.I. An other Infaliable Remedy for the fame.

Take a Boars tooth, reduce it to pouder, and give it the Patient in Barly-water, or in a Pectoral Decoction, often tri'd.

VII. An other for the Pleurify.

Take fix Acorns dri'd in an Oven, after the bread is drawn, add thereto five grains of long Pepper, make it into a fine pouder, and let the Patient drink it in Ale or Wine bloodwarm.

VIII. An other excellent for the same, and for other Inflamations and Obstructions.

Take the waters of Hyfop and Fennel of each two ounces, Vinegar of Squils fix drams, fpirit of Wine rectifi'd, half an ounce, Crabs-Eyes one

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one dram, Sperma Ceti and Mummy of Alexandia of each one fcruple, Laudanum four grains, with fyrup of the five opening Roots an ounce and half, mix them and let the Patient take a fpoonful at a time, once in five or fix hours.

IX. An other for the same.

Bleed on the Affected fide, and take away ten ounces of Blood. then take red Poppy-water four ounces, sal Prunellæ one dram, fyrup of Violets one ounce; mix them for a draught to be taken Imediately after the first Blood-leting. Dr. Sydenbam.

X. An other for the same much transcending.

Take Cardus-water four ounces, fpirit of Sal Armoniack half a large fpooniul, white Sugar enough to fweeten it : It gives eafe almost upon the fpot, and is to be repeated once every five or fix hours, till the pain abates, or is gone. Dr. Salmon in Sydenbam.

XI. An other for the fame.

Take blanck'd Almonds five, feeds of Mellons and Pompions of each half an ounce, white Poppyfeeds three drams, Barly water one pint and half, Rofewater half a fpoonful, make an Emulfion and fweeten it with Sugarcandy; Dofe four ounces every four hours.

XII

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XII. An other for the fame.

At Night give this: Take white-Wine four ounces, Liquid Laudanum fifteen or twenty drops, spirit of Sal-Armoniack thirty drops, white Sugar enough to sweeten it. Dr. Salmon.

XIII. An other specifick Remedy for the same, which seldom fails of giving Relief in an hours time.

Take juice of Camomile fix ounces, spirit of Sal Armoniack two drams, mix and give it the fick at once; which you may repeat after four hours Dr. Salmon in Sydenbam.

Oyl of fweet Almonds, by it felf, or Linfeed Oyl alfo may be given.

CHAP. XXVII.

Of Selected, Approv'd and Experien'd Remedies against the yellow Jaundice.

I. An Excellent Medicine for the same.

TAke of the leaves of Celandine one handful, Wormwood, St. Johnswort, Tops of Centory and Cardus of each one handful, the inner Bark of Elder three drams, Turmerick two drams, Goof-dung dried and pouder'd, Saffron

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of each a dram, a few Lemond peals, being cut and bruis'd infuse them in a quart of Renishwine for twenty four hours; the Dose is four ounces, Morning and Night.

II. An other for the same.

Take Caftilfoap one ounce fcrap'd, boil it in a pint of Ale to half, take it in the Morning fasting for three times. This is highly commended by *silvius*.

III. An other for the same.

Take of the best Rubarb fifteen grains, Saffrontwelve grains, Dia prunis Solutive, the Electuary of the juice of Roses of each three drams; make them up into a Bolus with fine Sugar, and take it two or three times one after another, especially if the Body be of a very ill habit.

IV. An other for the same.

Take Celandine one handful, tops of Sea-Wormwood and Centory of each half a handful, the beft Madder-roots an ounce, Cinnamon half a dram, Saffron twelve grains; make a warm and close infusion for twelve hours in a pint of white Wine; strain it and sweeten it with Sugar, and drink it every Morning and fast two or three hours after it.

V.

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V. An other for the fame.

Take Castlesoap scrap'd very small half an ounce, the best English Saffron dri'd and rup to pouder one dram, mix them together, and put it into three or four Pippins the Coars being taken out, rost them by degrees'; then take off the Skins and mix them well together, and take thereof the quantity of a large W alnut first and last until it be all taken; and if need require repeat the same, for I will affure you that it is a very Excellent Medicine. Dr Sarmon.

VI. An other for the same.

Take Sheeps dung newly made one handful, the Bark of the Barberry tree, half a handful infule them in Ale and white-Wine mixt together, of each a pint for twelve hours; ftrain it and dring half a pint of it in the Morning fafting, take it for fix or feven days together if occation require.

The fame vertue has Stone-Horfdung infus'd in the fame manner, and to my knowledg have both done great cures So has Woodlice, forty or fifty of them being bruis'd and infus'd all Night in white Wind, and in the Morning ftrain'd and taken fafting for fome days together. Dr. Sermon.

A live Trout or Tench cut open and appl'd to the pit of the Stomach for fome time, is faid

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to be an Infallible Remedy against the Jaundice. The dung of Gees that eat grass in the spring time being dri'd and made into fine pouder, and a dram of it taken in white-Wine has cur'd in a few days. So has the white part of Hensdung taken in the same manner.

Vomits are Medicines molt commonly of good effect in a new Jaundice whilft the tone and ftrength of the Vilcera hold (fays the learned Dr Wills) for as much as they both eafe the Stomack of its offenfive load of vilcous Fleagm with which it is in a manner always oppreft in this difeafe, and like wife by irritating the veffels which convey the Choler, and ftrongly fhaking the ductus's of the Liver, they clear them of their ftoppages, and bring the Choler to pafs by the ways it formerly was wont.

Take the infufion of Crocus Metallorum, from half an ounce to fix drams, Vineger of Squils an ounce, Oximel fimple half an ounce; make a Vomit to be taken with governance. Sometimes it is proper to give the Evening before the following mixture, as a preparation to facilitate the Vomiting.

Take Pouder of the Roots of Afarabacca, Fecula, of Aron Roots of each a feruple, Tartar-Vitriolat'd half a feruple, Oximel fimple an ounce, mixt them.

An other Vomit.

Take Sulphur of Antion my feven grains, Scam-

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Scammony fulphurat'd eight grains, Cream of Tartar ten grains, make a Pouder, give it in a spoonful of Panado.

Or take nine leaves of Afarabacca, being bruifed, infute them in three ounces of white Wine, prefs out the Juice, and give it in the Morning with governance.

Or takeCambogia in fine pouder eight grains, Tartar Vitriolat'd seven grains, make a pouder.

Or give the Emetick Tartar of Mynficht, from tour grains to fix, in Conferve of Rofes. Purging Medicines have place in this Difeafe, whether it be new or inveterat'd.

VII. A Purging Medicine for the faundice.

Take Electuary of the Juice of Rofes three drams, Rhubarb a dram, Salt of Worm wood, Gream of Tartar of each ten grains, Syrup of Rhubarb what fuffices make a Bolus.

VIII. An other for the same.

Take Roots of fharp point'd Dock an ounce, tops of Sea Worm-wood, and of the leffer Centory of each two pugils, Gentian and Tutmerick of each two drams, yellow Sunders a dram; boil them in a pint and half of fountain water, to a pint, towards the end, add of the best Sena fix drams, of the best Rhubarb three drams, Agarick a dram and half, Coriander Seeds two drams, white Wine two ounces; let them

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them boil clofe cover'd for two hours, then ftrain it and let it fettle till it be clear : The Dofe is from four ounces to fix, with Syrup of Rhubarb an ounce, Water of Earth-worms three drams, make a Potion to be taken for three or four days together, or every other day.

IX. An other for a weaker Constitution.

Take choice Rhubarb two drams, Agarick trochifcat'd half a dram, Cinamon and Ginger of each ten grains, make an infufion in white Wine and Succory water of each three ounces, cover it clofe and keep it warm for three hours; then ftrain it and diffolve in it Syrup of Rhubarb an ounce, Water of Earth-worms two drams, or take Rhubarb a dram, Salt of Worm-wood a feruple, make a Pouder and take it for a dofe.

X. An Excellent and often try'd Medicine for the Jaundice, of any kind black or yellow, of Dr. Farrar:

Take eight ounces of chofen Currans well washed and picked from all the little stalks; put to them one ounce of choice Rhubarb in fine pouder, beat them together in a Mortar for feven or eight hours into a perfect Electuary, whereof take the quantity of a small Walnut every morning fasting, and at night.

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It purifies the Blood, strengthens the Liver wonderfully, and if continu'd, carrieth away the pecant humors of the Body. And from my own experience I can affirm that it is a sovereign Remedy for a Flux or Loosfness, as well as for the Jaundice. Hartman.

XI. An other Purging Medicine for the same.

Take Pill Ruffi a fcrupe, Extractum Rudij half a fcruple; make four Pills, let them be taken in the Morning with Governance.

Take Elixir Proprietatis an ounce, give 20 drops in the Morning, and at five in the afternoon in a glass of white Wine or Sack.

After the fame manner the Tincture of Antimony, or Salt of Tartar are often given with good fuccefs; also Mixtura Simplex in a larger Dofe.

XII. The famous Medicine of Gefner for the Jaundice.

Take Roots of the greater Netles a pound, Saffron a fcruple, bruife them well and extract a Tincture with white Wine; The Dofe three ounces in the morning for four or five days.

XIII. An other like to the former of Dr. Joel.

Take Roots of the greater Celandine flicd two handfuls, Juniper Berries bruised a handful,

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ful, infuse them in a pint of Rhenish Wine, then press it out : The Dose is four ounces twice a day.

The Juice of white Hoar-hound is mightily commended by *Diescorides* for the Cure of the Jaundice.

XIV. An other for the same, highly commended by Silvius.

Take Hempfeeds bruifed an ounce, boil it in a quart of Milk, then strain it, and drink thereof warm two or three times a day. This cur'd a Lady of Quality.

Many Perfons in the Jaundice, being troubl'd with a great Weakness and frequent Faintings, stand in need also of Cordial Remedies.

XV. A Cordial in the Jaundice.

Take Aqua Mirabilis half a pint, Water of Earth-worms four ounces, Syrup of Orangpeels of the Confectioners two ounces, mixt them : The dole is two or three ounces.

XVI. An Anodine Cordial to cause ease and rest in the Jaundice.

Take Aqua Mirabilis and Water of Earth-Worms of each an ounce, Diacodium fix ounces, Tincture of Saffron half an ounce, mixt them : The dose is a Spoonful or two late at Night. P Spirit

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Spirit of Sal Armoniack and of Harts horn, alfo the Flowers of Sal Armoniack, volatile Salt of Amber and of Harts horn are fuccefsfully given. Take Spirit of Harts horn ting'd with Saffron, three drams : The dofe is from fifteen drops to twenty in a proper Liquor, as Rhenifh Wine.

XVII. A Powder against the Tellow-Jaundice of Dr. Batc.

Take Goofdung gather'd in the Spring time, dry'd in the Sun and finly pouder'd two ounces, the beft Saffron one dram, white Sugar-candy two ounces, mixt and make a Pouder : The dofe is two drams twice a day, in Rhenifh-Wine for fix days together. Or take Turmerick, white Tartar, filings of Iron turned to ruft of each half an ounce, Earth-Worms dry'd, choice Rhubarb of each two drams, mixt and make a Pouder. Dr. Lowers Stomachal Tin-Eture of Steel, is alfo of Excellent ufe, which fee in its place.

XVIII. A Sympathytical Cure of the Jaundice.

Take the fresh Urin of the Patient made at one time, Ashes of Ash-wood so much as suffices; mixt them and make it into a passe, and form it into three Balls of an equal bigness, put them in a close place near the Fire or a Stove, when these Balls grow dry and hard, the Jaundice

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Jaundice vanishes : The learned Dr. Willis fays that after this manner he has known this Difease fuccessfully cur'd when it was grown inveterate, and would not yeld to other Remedies.

CHAP. XXVIII.

Of select'd, approv'd and experienc'd Remedies against the Kings Evil.

I: A Diet-Drink good for the Kings Evil, all old Ulcers, Catharrhs, Rickets.

TAke unquench'd Lime a Gallon, put upon it five Gallons of Water, let them stand for four and twenty hours; in which time stir it twice or thrice, when it is clear and settl'd, pour it clear off, let it settle again twelve hours, then pour it of again, then put the Lime-water in an Earthen steen, and hang in it the following bag. Take Sassafastrass shav'd, Aniseed, Liquorice bruis'd, Roots of Butterbur of each half a pound, Mace half an ounce; take of this drink fix ounces in the Morning fasting; five ounces at four in the asternoon, and five ounces last at Night.

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II. An other Diet-drink for the Same.

Take Elder bark, Smallage, Clivers, Herb Robert, Soap-wort, Fumatory, the leaves and roots of Pile-wort of each three good handfuls, Polypody half a pound; being cut and bruis'd, put them in a close net, and hang them in fome convenient quantity of New Beer or Ale (you cannot well make it too ftrong of the Herbs) and let it work together; when it hath done working drink of it for your ordinary drink, and you will have no caufe to find fault with me, Dr. Sermon. Hartman, If you put in with it a pint of Wood-lice bruis'd, it will be better.

III. An other for the same.

Take the Roots of Filipendula and Pilewort of each two drams, Tanfy, Moufear, Pimpernel of each one dram, Round Birthwort, Roots of Hotfe-radifhes and Soap.wort of each half a dram; Cut and bruife them, and boil them in three pints of white-Wine to the confumption of the third part, firain it, and add thereto of Oximel fimple three ounces, of which let the Patient drink a quarter of a pint at a time, three times a day.

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IV. An excellent Plaster to disolve, mollify and digest, concost, Attenuate the Scrophulas Tumors or Swellings, hard Knots and Kernels, commonly call'd the Kings-Evil.

Take Galbanum diffolved in Vineger fix ounces, Emplafter of Mellilot, Diachilon fimple of each three ounces, yellow Wax two ounces, white Turpentine one ounce, Saffron fix drams, mixt and make an Emplafter. It is alfo very prevalent againft Palfies, Numnefs and Weaknefs of any Member; It eafes the most vehement Pain of the Head, Stomach, Shoulder, Sides and Joints arifing from wind or fome cold intemperature of the part : It is alfo excellent to root out the Corns on Feet, if continu'd for fome time and the Corns cut first.

V. An other for the fame.

Take the Plaster of Frogs with Mercury, fpread it upon Linnen-Cloth, and apply it to the parts affected; but be fure to purge now and then in the use of it, or make use of the Emplaster of Diachilon with Gum, or the Plaster of Galbanum, for they are very good to diffolve the Tumors; but the first and second neglect not. If those Sores chance to break, as often times they do, foment the Sores with a Spung dipt in Lime water.

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VI. An Excellent Drink for the Kings Evil.

Take the inner Bark of Elder, Smallage, Herb Robert, all in pouder, of each two fpoonfuls; boil them in a Gallon of Wort, then let it stand and clarify : The dose is a pint three times a day.

In cafe of a swelling after it is broke, take Elder-leaves, bruise them, and apply them after you have somented with Lime-water.

VII. Sir Kenelm Digby's Wound-drink for the Kings Evil, Fistula, Corroding Ulcers, or old Soree.

Take Sage, Rue of each a good handful, after they are well pickt from the Stalks, chop and bruile them a little, but loofe none of their Juice; put them in a thin Bag of Bolter-cloth, and hang it in four Gallons of fmall Ale new, at the fame time take three hundr'd of live Sows or Wood-lice, bruife them with a little white Wine, then prefs them out and put the Liquor to the Ale, put their skins into the Bag with the Herbs; after it hath wrought drink of it at Meals, and at all times when you have occasion to drink, and continue the use of it till vou are Cur'd, drinking no other Liquor all that time : And to make it more greatful to the tafte you may add one fourth part of white Wine : Before one Veffel is near spent prepare an other, that you may always have onc

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one under an other; and keep a flender and wholfom Diet, for bear eating Salt Meat and Hifh. With this Drink Sir Kenelm Digby cur'd the Daughter of Sir William Curtius, at Francfort in Germany, in the Year 1959. of a corroding Ulcer in her Leg, after many Remedies ufed in vain, which had fo mortified the place, by the long continuance of it, that the Leg was fhrunk and was fhorter than the other by at leaft two Inches.

VIII. A Diet-drink for the Kings Evil preferib'd by an able Phylician for Mr. Barnet, where with were Cur'd three of his Children of great Swellings about the Jaws and Ibroat, as he told me himfelf.

Take Sarsa Parilla, bark of Lignum Vitæ of each three ounces; China-root, Polypody of the Oak, Saffafrass, and sweet Fennel-seed of each two ounces, Elecampane one ounce, Stechadoes half an ounce, of the turnings of Lignum Vitæ four ounces; infule them in three Gallons of Fountain-water hot for twelve hours, then strain off the Liquor, and beat the ingredients to mash in a Mortar; then put them in the Liquor again, and put to them three ounces of Crude-Antimony in pouder ty'd in a Linnen-rag, boil it for an hour or two; then put into it Maiden-hair and Liquorish bruiled of each two ounces, tops of Rofemary two handfuls, of Archangel-flowers four haudfuls, let them boil an hour longer; then PA

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then take it off the fire, and when 'tis half cold ftrain it, and put into it Sena two ounces; let it infufe twelve hours, then ftrain it again : Drink a good draught of it in the Morning fafting warm, and at four in the afternoon, and laft at Night; continue the ufe thereof till you are Cur'd.

Note, The Patient during the use of this Drink, must abstain from all gross Meats, as Beaf, Pork, Bacon, or any Salt Meat or Fish, as also from Milk, Butter and Cheese. After the first Dose in the Morning he may eat a Mess of Water-grewel about two hours after. You may apply the Plasters afore mentioned during the use of this Drinck.

IX. An other Drink for the Kings Evil, thô broken out in divers places.

Teke Herb Robert, Mug-wort, Smallage, and Agrimony of each four handfuls; fhred them and ftamp them a little; then take three hundred live Millipedes or Wood-lice, bruife them with a little white Wine, then prefs them out, an put their husks among the Ingredient, which hang in a Bag, or a clofe Cabadge-net, in four Gallons of new fmall Ale; then put into it the Liquor of the Millipedes; After it hath wrought drink of it at Meals, and at all times, drinking no other till y m are Cur'd, which may be in three weeks or a mont'n. The Author fays it hath Cur'd thofe

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those that had the Evil or Sores broken out in feveral places, and some in every Joynt, drinking no other drink for a month at Spring an Fall. During the use of this Drink apply the following Remedy out wardly when the Evil is broke out.

Take Garden Snails with their houfes; beat them in a Mortar, with a little Parfly into a Mafh, apply it to the Sore or Sores, and change it every Morning. The Author fays he gave this Drink to a Gentlewoman, for a Humor and Swelling in her Nofe, whom it Cured.

X. An other Diet-Drinck for the Kings Evil, Itch or Scab, Ulcer, Fistula's or any other Sores, and to sweeten the Blood.

Take China-root, Sarfa Parilla of each an ounce and half, Lignum Vitæ four ounce; Saffafrafs, two ounces, red Sanders half an ounce, Liquorice an ounce and half, Shavings of Ivory and Harts-horn of each fix drams; Infufe them for twelve hours in a Gallon of boiling hot Water, then ftrain of the Liquour and beat the Ingredients in a Mortar to Mafh, then put them again into the Liquor, and add crud Antimony in pouder one ounce ty'd in a rag, and half a pound of raifons flic'd, let it boil gently for an hour and half; then take it off the fire, and when it is half cold ftrain it and bottle it.

XI.

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XI. An other for the same, to Purge and clear the Blood.

Take of Sarfa Parilla, Chinna-roots, Juniperberries bruis'd, and Daucus feeds bruis'd of each half a pound, Raifons flic'd one pound, Cardemom feeds, four ownces, Lemonds cut in pieces, four Oranges, two Nutmegs beaten, four Pine and Fir-tops, or the fhavings of their Wood of each two handfuls, Agrimony four handfuls; all being duly prepar'd, put them in a clofe Net, and hang them in nine Gallons of new Ale with a heater to make it fink.

XII. A precious Powder that has done wonderful cures in the Kings Evil and other desperate Scorbutick Difeases. Sir K. Digby.

Take Bezoar Mineral well prepar'd, and Antimony Diaphoretick of each an ounce, grind them together, and put them into a fmall Retort, and pour upon them good fpirit of Niter four ounces; diftil it in Sand with a gentle fire to drynefs, then let the fire go out, and when the Retort is cold pour the fpirit upon the pouder again that you diftil'd off; diftil it over again once more, put fresh fpirit of Niter upon the pouder, diftil it, and cohobate twice as before; repeat this a third time with fresh spirit of Niter upon the pouder, the fame quantity as at the first; which are fix diftilations in all

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all, and twelve ounces of spirit of Niter: Then brake the Retort, and take out the pouder, which grind, and wath it well feveral times till it be perfectly edulcerated; then dry it and put it in an earthen Poringer, and pour upon it fpirit of Wine that will burn all away, fet it on fire and whilst it burns stir it all the while, then pour fresh spirit of Wine upon it and fire it as before, repeat this a third time, and put this powder in a Vial close ftopt ; the Dofe is fifteen grains for five days, and twenty grains for the next five days, and fifteen grains for the last five days; mix the pouder with a little Conferve of Rofes, and let the Patient take it upon a knifes point in the Morning in his Bed, and let him keep his bed for at least two hours, it will cause a gentle sweat; which being over, must be rub'd with warm Napkins all over his Body, then he may rife and eat a Mels of Watergrewell keeping himfelf warm, and eat of good wholfom food; Note, that after every Dose of the pouder you must give a good draught of the Diet drink warm, at Sect. XI. of this Chap. And before you begin the use of the pouder and Diet drink you must purge the Patient once or twice with fome fit purge.

Hartman. With the fame Pouder I cur'd a Gentleman of a Scorbutick humor in his Back, where (as his Chyrurgion affirm'd) he had near a hundred holes, which the faid Chyrurgion and two Phyficians had had in hand for near two years, but in Effect could do him no good,

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good, he was by the use of the afore mention'd Pouder and a Diet dring restor'd to perfect Heatlth, by the bleffing of God upon it. With the same Medicine I cur'd the Daughter of Sir Nathaniel Johnson of the Elephansialis, which is a kind of Leprofy, after many remedies us'd in vain by the ableft Phyficians in London; as the Lady Johnson her Mother told me, for the faid the had fpent above an hundred pounds upon the Phylicians of the Colledge. With the faid Medicine I have cur'd alfo desparate Patients of the Kings Evil, and of Sore and Ulcerated Legs, and amongst the rest one Mrs. Pannel, who had about fitty Ulcers in her Legg, which a Chyrurgion after he had her in cure above eight months faid it must be cut off there was no cure fon it else.

XIII. A Medicine, wherewith Dr. Havervelt cur'd the Kings Evil, Cancers, Wolf and old Ulcers.

Take Dantzick-Vitriol, Calcine it till it be yellow, then grind it with Salt or Salt-Petre, the ordinary proportion : With this fublime Mercury, which fublime once again by it felf, then take only the Christal-line part of it, whereof take one ounce, grind it to a fubtil pouder in a glass Mortar, with a glass Peftle, put this pow ler into a large glass-bottle, and pour upon it a quart of Fountain water, stop the bottle close, and let it stand for some days, Shaking

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ing it often : Then being well fettl'd and flood without shaking at least twenty four hours, pour of the clear, and filter it: Then take one spoonful of this filter'd Liquor, which put into a Vial, and pour into it two spoonfuls of fair Fountain-water ; shake the Vial well, then pour it out into a glass, and let the Patient drink it in the Morning fasting; let him keep himself very warm, and frir and walk as much as he can, but let him neither cat nor drink till two hours after the Medicine has operated. It will operate by Stools, and by a gentle Vomit, and therefore let poffet drink be provided and kept warm to drink a draught of it after every Vomit. The next Morning let him take the faid Medicine again, if the Patient finds himfelf strong enough, if not, he may rest a day or two between. The Author above mention'd cur'd with this Medicine all foorts of Scrofula's Tumors and Swellings whether open or thut; the Cancer or Wolf, whether in the Breaft or any other part of the Body, also all forts of Pustula's and old Ulcers and Wounds, as Sir K. Digby relates, who had the Receipt from him.

XIV. A Drink against the Kings Evil.

Take Sarla Parilla fix ounces, Lignum Vita eight ounces, Bark of the Walnut-Tree, roots of Fig wort, Saffafrass of each two ounces, Herb Robert three handfuls, Raisons flit a pound, Ifving Millepedes a pint, bruise the Millepedes with

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a little white-Wine, then prefs them out hard, put the husks to the other ingredients, which put into a clofe Net, and hang it in four Gallons of new Ale, adding two ounces of the Bark of Guaicum bruis'd, and Antimony crude in pouder tied up in a rag one pound. It is chiefly defign'd for the cure of the Kings Evil, the Ficus and Hemotrhoides in the Fundament, Cancerous and other like Malign and cating Ulcers, Malign fcabs, &c. by taking this dring as common Dring, and purging once a week with fome fit Medicament. The Antimony will ferve again for the fame ufe.

CHAP. XXIX.

Of Selected, approv'd and experienc'd Remedies against all intermitting Fevers, vulgarly called Agues.

I. A Remedy for an Ague.

TAk a spoonful of good strong Mustard, mix it with a draught of hot Ale, and let the Patient drink it when ever he perceives his fit will come upon him. If it cures not the first time repeat it two or three times.

II. An other for the same. Take of Rue and Peniroyal of each a handful,

ful, fhred them fmall, and boil them in a Poffet made of Ale and Milk; drink a good draught thereof warm in the Morning fasting, and at Night when you go to bed, continue this for three days together.

III. An other for the same.

Take three drams of Roch-Allum in pouder, put it into two quarts of new Milk, boil them a little that Whey may be made, then clarify it with whites of Eggs, and let the Patient take it all at times before the fit; or you may take a leffer quantity, and repeat it two or three times, if it cures not the first.

IV. An other Medicine against the Ague.

Take Burnt Alum what quantity you pleafe, pouder it and put it in a glafs Cucurbite, which place in a Sand heat, and pour thereon as much good Vineger as is needful to diffolve it, filter the diffolution, and evaporate in the fame Bath till a film cover the top of it; then fet it to Chriftallize in a Cool place, feparate the Chriftials dry, and keep them for ufe; the Dofe is from twelve grains to twenty in fome proper purging Liqour. Dr. Charras.

V. A Remedy for Children fick of an Ague.

Take of Black-Cherry-Water and Reniftwine

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wine of each two ounces, the Jefuits-Bark in fine pouder three drams, fyrup of Clove Gilloflowers one ounce, mix them and make a Julep; whereof give a fpoonful or two according to the Childs Age, every four hours, till the Fits return no more, adding to every fecond Dofe, if there be a Loofenefs, one or two drops of Liquid Laudanum.

VI. A Plaster for the wrift for the same,

Take pouder of white Hellebor, half an ounce, Niter two drams, pulp of Figgs what fuffices, to make a Pultice; apply it to the wrifts, two hours before the fit of a Tertian or Quotidian; fpread it upon Leather and lay it to both wrifts, when the fit is over renue it again.

VII. Agues happening in the fpring are fometimes happily cur'd, by timely giving a Vomit where the ftrength will bear it; but fo long before the coming of the Fit, that the Operation of it may be over before the time of the ufual accefs.

Dr. Wills commends a gentle purge of an Infufion of Sena and Rhubarb to be given in a Quotidian or Tertian Ague; but in a Quartan vulgarly call'd a Third Ague, he abfolutely forbids either Purging or Vomiting; by reafon that thereby the Blood is the more impoverifh'd, and the ftrength of the Patient impar'd; he there commends the Jefuits Bark and Wrift-Plafter.

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VIII. A Refreshing and Cooling Drink in a Burning Fever.

Take four quarts of Fountain water, and five fpoonfuls of French-Barly, feald the Barley first in two or three Waters, then boil it with half a pint of Currans till a quart be confum'd, then put into it two handfuls of Wood-forrel fhred and stampt, and as much common Sorrel; let them infuse in the Decoction without boiling for an hour, then strain it, and drink thereof with the juice of an Orange and a little Sugar.

IX. An excellent Julep of Lemonds for a Calenture, or burning Fever.

Take Lemonds and peel them, then prefs out the juice of them, which being fettl'd twenty for hours, pour off the clear, filter it, and digeft it in a Stone bottle in hot Water, or in Sand for twelve days; then filter it again, and digeft as before : repeat this till it fettle no more feces, in the mean time Calfine the peel, and draw the Salt out of the Afhes, which put to the purefi'd juice, and digeft them for fome time together; then put it into little Vials of an ounce a piece, which is the Dofe for a big Body. Two Dofes will cure the greateft burning : It is beft to give it by it felf; but if the Patient does not like the tafte of it, you may 226 Choice and Experienc'd Ch. XXIX.

mix a little Sugar with it. This will keep good five or fix years.

X. A Pultice for the Soles of the Feet in a Fever.

Take fresh Rue two ounces, fresh Bryonyroots four ounces, foure Leaven, bay Salt, black-Soap of each an ounce and half, Mustard three ounces, beat them well together, and add Vineger formuch as suffices to make a Pultice which apply to the Soles of the Feet : If you cannot get the Leaven (as in England 'tis hard to be got where bread is made with Yest and not with Leaven as in Germany, France and other Countrys,) then you moy take the grounds of stail-Beer, and so take less Vineger, and it will be no less effectual.

XI. A Julep to Cool in Fevers to hinder the firmentation of fharphumors, and their flying up to be the Head.

Take Hony two parts, Water twelve parts, boil them very gently together, till you have foum'd away all the fourn that will rife, and have clarifi'd it with whites of Eggs; then take it from the fire and put to it one part of Vineger, ftrain it through a Flannel-bag. Drink three or four fpoonfuls of it at a time.

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XII. An other Cooling drink in a Fever.

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XV.

Take a Gallon of fpring-Water, five fpoonfuls of French-barly, half a pound of the beft Currans, let it boil foftly till a quart be confum'd; then take of Wood forrel, and Roman Sorrel or common Sorrel of each two handfuls, bruife them well, and let them infufe in the Liquor for an hour, then take it off, and ftrain it through a Sive; drink of this with the juice of an Orange and a little fine Sugar. The Lapis Contrayeva is excellent in Fevers, fo is the Lapus de Goa, and the Lord Abbington's pouder, all which fee in their places.

XIII. An Antifebrisick draught in a Continual Fever.

Take Cowflip-Water, three ounces, fyrup of Poppies one ounce, fresh juice of Lemonds, two spoonfuls, mix them for a draught.

XIV. An Electuary in a Continual Fever.

Take Conferve of Wood-Sorrel of Sweetbriar of each one ounce, Cream of Tartar one dram with a fufficient quantity of Syrup of Lemonds make an Electury, of which take the quantity of a Nutmeg thrice a day, drinking after it fix spoonfuls of the following Julep.

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XV. A Julep.

Take Water of Purstain, Lettice and Cowflips of each three ounces, fyrup of Lemonds one ounce and half, fyrup of Violets one ounce, mix them and make a Julep. Dr. Sydenbam.

XVI. An excellent Drink in Fevers even in Malignant.

Take a quart of fpring Water, and having given it a wamble or two, put to it an ounce at least of Harts-horn, Calcin'd to perfect whiteness, and when the mixture is cold, put to it three ounces of fyrup made of juice of Lemonds, shake this mixture well when you use it, and let the Patient take of it a moderate draught feveral times in the Day and Night.

XVII. An useful Drink in Feverish Distempers.

Take the Roots of Dandelion cleans'd and flic'd very fmall an ounce, boil it in a pint and half of clear Poffet-drink till near half be wafted, and then ftrain it, and let the Patient take half a pint of it at a time.

Dr. Meyern fays, that the fpirit of Allum is far better in burning Fevers than the fpirit of Vitriol for 'tis a great Cooler; the Dofe is from four drops to eight. XVIII. Ch. XXX. Remedies for the Erifipelatous.229

XVIII. A Drink in a burning Fever.

Take Sorrel two handfuls, boil it in a fufficient quantity of Fountain water to a pint, ftrain it and add juice of Lemonds four ounces, Rhenifh-wine a quart, Loaf Sugar four ounces or what fuffices to as it may be made very greatful. It may be drank at pleafure; It abates the heat of burning Fevers, and quenches thirft admirably, It cuts tough Fleagm, and opens obftructions of the Lungs, and caufes a free breathing. It may be us'd where no Fever is prefent, for it excits the appetite and caufes a good digeftion.

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CHAP. XXX.

Of choice, Approv'd and Experienc'd Remedies against the Erispelatous, or Redswelling Fever.

I. A Vomit to be given at the first approach of this Disease.

TAke the Emetick Tartar of Minficht, from two grains to fix in a bolus of Conferve of Rofes, having ready good flore of Poffet drink to take in the working of it; after which you ought the next to promote a fweat with this. Q 3 Take

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Take Bezoar Mineral from ten grains to a fcruple, Cochinil from fix grains to twelve, Saffron from two grains to four, Volatil falt of Amber from two grains to four, mix it and give it with care in a naked bed, two or three hours before the ufual time of the fits approach, and the next day repeat the fame, and if need, the third and fourth days. In the time of fweating give the Pearl Cordial or the Cordial Julep at Set. I. and II. in the Chap. of Cordials following in the fecond book. See Salmon in Sydenbam.

II. A Fomentation for the same.

Take of the roots of Marsh mallows and Lillies of each one ounce, Leaves of Mallows, Elder and Base Mullin, flowers of Camomile and Mellilot, tops of St. Johns-wort and leffer-Centory of each one handful, Linseed, Foe nugreek feed of each half an ounce : Boil them in a convenient quantity of water to three pints, strain out the Liquor, and when you use it add to every pint three ounces of Brandy; dip pieces of Woollen cloth in this Decoction, and having squeezed them apply them hot twice every day, bathing the parts affected with the following mixture.

III. Take half a pint of Spirit of Wine, Venice Treacle two ounces, pouder of long-Pepper and Cloves of each two drams, make

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a mixture in which dip a piece of brown paper, and wrap about the part affected. Sid nham.

IV. An Oyl for the same, which will do its Effects in twenty four hours.

Take Sacharum Saturmi two drams, Winevineger two spoonfuls, or something more to diffolve the Sacharum Saturmi, then mix the Diffolution with Oyl of Ben. sour ounces, shaking them well together; anoint the sore places three, sour, five, or six times a day therewith, as you shall see occation; in twenty sour hours the Inflamation will be wholly taken away. Salmon.

V. An excellent Clifter for the fame.

Take Turpentine one ounce, two yolks of Eggs, mix and grind them well together in a Morter or Bafin, then add to them Poffetdrink a pint fweetn'd with Sugar, and give it warm. Salmon.

VI. An excellent Linement or Ointment for the same.

Take juice of Night Shade, Oyl of Rofes of each a pound and a quarter; boil them to the Confumption of the juice, then strain it and add Litharge, and Ceruse in fine pouder of each one pound, mix them and make an Ointment.

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It is good against Cancers in Womens Breasts, heats and inflamations, Erisipelatous, & anoint therewith Morning and Evening, and spread it upon soft gentle Leather, and Cover the whole Affect therewith. Bates. Note, that if you add to it Sacharum Saturni sour ounces, it will be mote effectual to answer all the intentions for which it is made. Salmon.

CHAP. XXXI.

Of Select and Approv'd Remedies against the Itch and other Diseases of the Skin.

I. An excellent purging Portion against the Itch.

TAke Tamarins half an ounce, Sharp pointed Dock-root two drams, Fumitory and Succory of each half a handful, white Tartar half a dram, Ginger one fcruple, chop the Herbs and bruife the Roots, and boil it in a fufficient quantity of fair Water to a quarter of a pint (to which) being ftrain'd, add one ounce of fyrup of Rofes, and two drams of fyrup of Buckthorn-berries, and take it in the Morning. This I have try'd with good fuccefs.

II. An other purging Decoction for the fame.

Take French-Barly two spoonfuls, boil it

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in two quarts of Water with Raifons flic'd two ounces, crude Antimony in pouder and tied in a rag, Munks Rhubarb or Garden patience three ounces, flice the Roots thin, and let it boil three quarters of an hour; then add Corianderfeed bruis'd and Sena of each half an ounce, Fumitory one handful, let it boil a quarter of an hour longer; you may add a little Hartshorn and Ivory, and Liquorice. The Dose is half a pint early in the Morning. It is an approv'd thing.

III. A Purging Apozem for the fame.

Take of Polypody of the Oak, fharp pointed Dock-roots, flic'd thin or ftamp'd of each an ounce, Sena ten drams, Turbith, Agarick, Epithimum of each an ounce, Carthamus feeds half an ounce, yellow Sanders two drams, feeds of Anis and Carraway bruis'd of each two drams, boil them in fix pints of Fountain water to half, then add white Wine a pint and ftrain it prefently; the Dofe is fix ounces by it felf, or with a fpoonful of fyrup of Epithimum. Dr. Wills.

IV. A Purging Ale for the same.

Take Roots of Polypody of the Oak, and of red Dock of each three ounces, Sena four ounces, Epithimum, Turbith, Mechoacan of each two ounce, yellow Sanders an ounce, Coriander-

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derfeeds fix drams, being flic'd and bruis'd, put them in a Bag and hang them in four Gallons of Ale; after five or fix days drink of it twelve ounces more or lefs every Morning, for eight or ten days.

V. An other Drink for the same to be us'd for ordinary Drink.

Take tops of Tamarick, Funitory dry'd, of each four handfuls, red Dock-root dri'd fix ounces, Rinds of Bitter fweet two ounces, make a Bag for four Gallons of fmall Ale.

For purging Medicines for the Itch, the pouder call'd Cornachinus's pouder, and also my Lady Cri/p's pouder are very proper, which will be fet down in the Chap. of Purging Medicines. An fo is Glauber's Sal mirabile.

VI. An Effectual Ointment for the fame.

Take flowers of Sulphur half an ounce, Butter without Salt four ounces, Ginger pouder'd half a dram, mix and make a Linement.

VII. An other for the same.

Take Unguentum Rosatum four ounces, Sulphurvive pouder'd half an ounce, Oyl of Tartar per de liquium what suffices, make a Liniment, to which add Oyl of Rhodium to give it a sent.

VIII.

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VIII. An other for the Same.

Take red Dock-roots, bruife them and boil them in Butter, or Oyl and white-Wine till the Wine be confum'd, then with Sulphur and Oyl of Tartar make an Ointment.

IX. An other for the same oft prood.

Take the Ointment of Elecampane without Mercury four ounces, pouder of Sulphur half an ounce, Oyl of Tartar Perdelquiam what fuffices, make a Liniment.

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X. An other for the same oft prov'd.

Take the Ointment of Elecampane without Mercury, two onnces, Sulphurvive one dram and half, burnt Allum, Camphor of each one fcruple, Oyl of Rofes two drams, the Chymical Oyl of Saffafrafs eight drops, mix and make a Liniment.

XI. An other Effectual Ointment for the Itch, of Dr. Harvy.

Take Hogs-greafe four ounces, Therebinthin and Wax of each an ounce, flower of Brimftone, or rather unmelted Brimftone pounded and fifted one ounce, Tobaccostalks pouder'd and fifted half an ounce, white Lead two drams, com-

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common Oyl as much as will fuffice to bring it into an Ointment. Melt the Hogs-greafe and the Wax together in a Pipkin, then put it in the Therebinthin, and the pouders, and laftly the Oyl, and ftirr them well together; this I have often prov'd with good fuccefs, Hartman. The places affected must be anointed with it Morning and Evening.

CHAP. XXXII.

Of Choice, approv'd and experienc'd Remedies against the Scurf or Scabs in the Head.

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First, Purge the body twice with the common purgin Potion, or with the purging Potion for the Itch at sect. I. in the foregoing Chap. then you may come to outward applications. But first, let the Hair be cut off, and afterwards rub of the Scales by little and little, every Morning, according as they are ready to fall away.

1. An approv'd Ointment for the fame.

TAke half a Peck of Oystershels, where the Oysters are newly taken out; wash them clean, then burn them in a clear fire to perfect whiteness, reduce them to a fine pouder, and fift

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fift it as fine as flower; then mix it with Unguentum Album fo that it be pritty stiff, and keep it in a Gallypot for use; Anoint the Head with it twice every day, and then cover it with a Hogs-bladder. It will keep a year. Sir K. Digby.

II. An other for the fame.

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Take Rofin half a pound, Pitch two ounces. Hogs-greafe an ounce, melt them together and let them boil a little, stirring it well; then take it off, and keep it in a Gallon pot for use. Having clipt of the Hair very clofe, whilft the ointment is yet warm, spred it upon new Lockrum that was never wash'd in Soap, and cut it into divers Plasters, and keep them by you; you may make as many at once as will ferve a month, when you lay them on, warm them a litte to make them Stick; drefs it only twice a week, and when you fee that the Plasters have taken away the Hair, and that the Head is as bare as ones hand, then drefs it but once a week; you mult pick off that Hair with the point of a knife that the Plaster brings not of with them, which you must do every time you drefs it : You must continue it till the Head and Skin look white, then it is a cure which may fometimes require four five or fix months, for as long as the Skin looks red it is not cur'd. The Hair you clip off from the Patiens Head, you must burn, and mix the Ashes with the Ointment while it is boiling.

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III. An other for the same:

Take Oyl of bitter Almonds, Oyl of Bays, the afhes of Southern wood leaves of each an an ounce, mix them throughly for a Liniment, with which anoint the whole Head every Night, rubbing it in very well, and then cover it with a Hogs bladder.

IV. An other for the same.

Take Wine vineger, black Soap of each two pounds, Ginger and common Sulphur of each two ounces, boil them together till a third part of the Vineger be wasted.

V. An other for the same:

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ge Willing of the Tree

Take Caftle Soap half a pound, cut it fmall and diffolve it in Plantain Water what fuffices, then add Mercury fublimate, two drams diffolv'd in Rofe water, mix them well together, and add Musk two grains.

VI. Another for the fame,

Take common Sulphur four ounces, Sulphurvive two ounces, a Lixivium of Soap made with Plantine Water half a pound, Hogs-greafe two pounds, mix and make an Ointment; Anoint the Head with it twice a day. VII. Ch.XXXIII. Remedies for the Fistula's. 2.29

VII. An other for the fame.

Take white Precipitat Mercury one scruple, Chalibiate Water two ounces, mix them and wash the Head with it. These four last Receipts were given by Mr. Holliar Chirurgion of the Hospital, to Mr. Ireland Chirurgion, and by him to me. Hartman.

CHAP. XXXIII.

Of Fishula's and Vicers.

I. An Excellent wound Drink for the Kings Evil and Fiftula's.

TAke of the Herb Prunella two handfuls, Angelica, Sanicle, Bettony, Rofemary, topsof red Beets, Scordium, Agrimony, Soapwort, Plantin, Comfry roots, Hypericon, Cinquefoil, Mint, Avens, Dafy-leaves of each one handful, Guaicum, Saflafraís, Saría Parilla of each an ounce and half, being all duly prepar'd, boil them in fifteen quarts of Alewort to a Gallon, then tun it up with Yeft being ftrain'd and cool'd; and after four days, drink conftantly of it, drinking no other drink. It cures Fiftula's, inward and outward Ulters and Sores; it ftanches inward bleeding, eafes the pain

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pain and foreness of Wounds; you may give with it the pouder of Egg-shells or Oyster-shells, and Crabs Eyes prepar'd of each eight grains, to be given every Morning fasting.

II. An other very good Drink for a Festula:

Take Sarfa Parilla half a pound, Guaicum, four ounces, Saffafras, three ounces, roots of Horfe-redifh four ounces, Hyfop, red Sage of each three ounces, chop and ftamp them, and boil them in running Water two quarts to a pint, ftrain it and walk the Fiftula with it, pour to the remaining two quarts of Water adding a pound of Currans, Boil it an hour, and if the Fiftula be hot leave out the Sage and Hyfop, and put in Bettany and Strawberry leaves, and fome Orange Peels; the Dofe is a quarter of a pint twice or thrice a day.

III. An outward Remedy for the same.

Take a quart of tunning Water, Roch Allum the quantity of an Egg, white Copperais the quantity of a Wallnut, boil them to a pint, cast of it into the Fistula with a Seringe.

IV. To make a Stone to beal Fiftula's, bot Ulcers and Wounds.

Take Lapis Calaminaris two ounces, Allum half an ounce, Bolarmenick four ounces, Cerufe three

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three ounces, green Copperastwo ounces, make all into a fine pouder and put it in a Pipkin, which fet upon a Charcoal fire, adding Wine Vineger, let it boil till it comes to a Stone. The manner of ufing it is thus; Diffelve of this Stone one ounce in a pint of Wine, and wafh the wound therewith, having firft filter'd it and apply over it a Cloth wet in the fame; but if it be for a Fiftula or Ellcer diffolve it in Rain-Water, or Smiths-forge Water and caft it in with a Seringe, and if it be for fore Eyes diffolve it in Rofe-water.

V. An other Medicinal Stone for the fame.

Take white Vitriol four ounces, Sal Armoniack half an ounce, Allum, Cerufe, Bole Armoniack of each an ounce, mix and make a pouder, which boil with Vineger a fufficient quantity to the confiftancy of a hard Stone : It dries up Ulcers and Defluctions, heals Wounds and inveterate Sores, cures an Erifipelous, Scabs and Tetters. The manner of using it is thus; diffolve of it one ounce in Rain water a pint, then filter it, with which wash the part affected, and apply over it a Cloth wet in the fame.

VI. A Powder for the Same.

Take white Vitriol and fine Bole Armoniack of each half an ounce, grind them to a fine pouder, then anoint your Tents with Oint-R ment 242 Choice and Experienc'd Ch. XXXIV.

ment of Populion, and dip it in the pouder, do this as often as you see occasion.

VII. An Ointment for the Jame.

Take the Caput Mortuum, of Vitriol of each equal parts, mix them and digeft for eight days, then diftil it in a Retort in Sand. See more in the Chap. for the Kings Evil.

CHAP. XXXIV.

Of Appov'd and Experienc'd Remedies against Tetters, Herps, and Ringworms.

I. A most approv'd Ointment for a Tetter.

TAke Lytharge of Gold in very fubtile pouder, half a pound, Wine Vineger five ounces, Oyl of Rofes, one pound, grind the Litharge in a Morter, putting to it by turns, fome times Oyl, and fome times Vineger, till by a continual grinding and ftirring, the Vineger no more appears, and that it comes to a whitih Ointment. It is good against Inflamations, Burnings and Scaldings, it is Cooling, Drying and Anodine: It dryes, skins and heals Sores and Ulfers. This Ointment cur'd a Man that had a very Malignant Tetter all over the backtide of his Hand, which had been of many years Ch. XXXIV. Remedies against Tetters. 243

years standing. It also cur'd a Tetter in a Gentilman's Forchead.

II. An other for the fame which hath cur'd many.

Take Hogs greafe four ounces, Quich Silver Mortified, and Verdegreafe of each an ounce, Camphire one dram, black-Soap and Muftard of each one fpoonful, juice of the Leaves of Walnuts four fpoonfuls, grind this well together in a Stone Morter; then put it in a gallypot: Anoint the Tetters with it Morning and Evening until they are kill'd and heal'd.

III. An other for any kind of Tetter or Herpes, &c.

Diffolve two ounces of running Mercury in four ounces of Aqua-fortus, pour upon the Solution a quart of fair Water, in which is diffolved two handfuls of Salt and then filter'd. This will make the Mercury fall down to the bottom in a white Calx. When it is well fettl'd, pour off the clear Water, which keep for your ufe. Pour the remaining milky thick fubstance upon one pound of Hogs greafe melted in an earthen pot. The Greafe must be very hot when you pour in the diffolv'd Mercury; but take the pot from the fire when you pour the Mercury into it, and ftir it well all the while you are pouring it in, and when'tis all in, fet the pot upon the fire again to boil the greafe, till all the moisture of R 2 the

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the Mercurial Subfrance and Solution is avaporated away; but be fure you ftir it very well all the while; as alfo after you take it from the fire (which do affoon as the moifture is gone) till the greafe is cold and harden'd.

The way of using this Ointment and clear Water is thus: Hirft, if the Evil be very great, purge and let blood. Then begin with the Water, rub the Tetters all about with linnen dipp'd in the Water made as hot as you can endure it, and when you have rub'd and bath'd it well, lay upon it compreffes wetted in the Water. Do thus twice a day for two or three days or more, till you fee it hath drawn out the Salt humour abundantly, and that the part is much inflam'd and very fore, and hath little Holes and Ulcers caten in it, prefently after the first washing, it will grow very forc and inflam'd; therefore you mult not afterwards rub it fo hard as at first but very, gently. Some fores will require the ufe of the Water five or fix days, others more; tender ones two or three days. When you judge the Water hath drawn out the violent matter; then anoint with the greate as hot as you can endure it, and lay upon it a Plaster of the fame Ointment binding it on. This Ointment will prefently affwage the pain, and take away the Inflamation. Drefs it twice or thrice aday; Much matter will run from the fore as from an Iller, and by little and little it will heal up: An that which is wounderful is, that whereas ORG

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one would think that fuch deep holes as the water will have eaten, fhould leave Scars, there will not appear the leaft mark of them; but a fine new tender natural Skin will come over it all. This was Sir K. Digby's Remedy, where with he cur'd himfelf of a Malignant Tetter.

CHAP. XXXV.

Of Choice, Appov'd and Experienc'd Remedies for the cure of Vlcers and Fistula's.

1. A Water which hath done fuch wonderful cuers in all manner of Swelling Ulcers, Cancers, Tetters, Ring-worms, Itch, Scabs and Fistola's.

TAke Bol Armoniack and white Vitriol of each four ounces, Camphir one ounce, put the Camphir and Vitriol in a little Pot (or in a Crucible) upon the Fire, and boil them gently till they be come hard, then let it cool, and pouder it finely, and having pouder'd the Bol Armoniack, mingle the Pouders together and keep it in a Bladder; then take a pound of quick Lime newly burnt, put it into an earthen Veffel; then take a Gallon of Smiths forge water, fet it on the fire and let boil, then ftrain it and pour it upon the quick Lime, when the Lime is flak'd ftir it well together, then let it ftand to fettle; then pour off the clear and keep it in R 3 glafs246 Choice and Experienc'd Ch. XXXV.

glaß-Bottles; into a quart of this water put a good fpoonful and half of the faid pouder, inake them well together in a bottle, let it fland a Fortnight, fhaking it twice a day. If you defire to have it ftronger, pouder one ounce of Allum and mingle it well with the pouder before you put it in the Water, when you use it pour of the clear or filter it, and make it hot and bath the Sore with it as hot as may be endur'd, and lay double cloths over it dipp'd in the fame Water; when you use it for a Fistula, cast it in with a Seringe.

II. An other for the same.

Take a quart of fair runing water, put in it Allum as much as an Egg, white Vitriol as much as a Walnut, let them boil from a quart to a pint, east it into the Fistula three or four times a day till it be whole.

III. An other for the same.

Take Tanners owfe and caft it into the Fiftula with the Seringe; then anoint your Tents with fome cold ointment, and dip the Tent in green Copperas burnt, ufe this two or three dreffings, or as occasion ferveth, then take burnt Alabaster and ufe it at the end of the Tent, as it healeth fo you may shorten the Tent. It healeth Ulcers also.

IV.

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IV. To make a Medecinal stone to beal Fistulat; bot Ulcers and Wounds.

Take Lapis Calaminaris two ounces, Allum half an ounce, Bol-Armoniack four ounces, Cerufe three ounces, green Copperas two ounces, make of all a pouder and mix them; put it in a pipkin and fet it upon a fire of Charcoal, pouring upon them Wine vineger, and boil it till it come to a Stone; which reduce to pouder and keep it in a Bladder; for a Fifula or Ulcer put a little of this pouder into Vineger, and if it be a Wound into white Wine; for fore Eyes into Rofe-water, use no more pouder at. a time then you have occasion to use. While it boileth upon the Fire you must fir it continually, See more at Sect. X 11.

V. For a Festula another Remedy.

Take white Vitriol two ounces, Bol-Armonick half an ounce, grind them into a subtile pouder, then anoint your Tent with ointment of Populion, and dip it in the Pouder, do this as oft as you see occasion.

VI. An Excellent Balfam for Ulcers and Fiftula's

Take Salt of Saturn call'd Sacharum Saturni eight ounces, spirit of Turpentine that is rectifi'd, Oyl of Turpentine somuch as to cover it R 4 four

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four inches deep, being put into a Matrafs, place it in a Gentle Sand heat, digest for twenty four hours or till you have a red Tincture : which pour off and put on more Oyl of Turpentine, digeft as before; then pour off the Tincture again, which will be a little colour'd ; put these Tintures in a little Retort, place it in Sand, and fit to it a Receiver, and with a very gentle fire diftil off about two thirds of the Oyl of Turpentine, then let the Retort cool and pour that which is in it into a glafs vial which keep for Balfam of Saturn. It is excellent for curing Fiftula's Siccatrizing of Ulcers : It heals Cancers being but touch'd with it tho never fo bad, for it mightily relifts putrefaction, it heals wounds and cures an Atrophy in any particular part; it is also of wonderful use in a hot Gout, if a little Lint or cloth being moistn'd in it and apply'd. Lemery.

VII. An Excellent inward Remedy for a Fistula.

Take Herb Valerian, Tormentel, Avens, Pellitory, red Beat, red Chick-weed of each one handful, Roots of Gallingal, Zedoary, Lorrelberries of each two drams, chop the herbs and bruife the Roots and berries, and boil them in Wine, then ftrain it; the Dofe is two fpoonfuls thrice a day warm. You will fee its operation in a few days, how it carries off the vitious humor. Junckins. But If the Fiftula groes upon a bone and the fame is black and putrifi'd, it will not heal, therefore you must use the following means. VIII.

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VIII. A Water for the Same.

Take Plaintin-water, boil in it a little Mercurius Dulcis till it be diffolv'd, then add fome drops of Spirit of Niter, fo much that it may not be fharp of it, caft it in with a Seringe, and it will take away the blacknefs, and that in four, five or fix days, and you may foon perceive if Flefh comes upon the Bone by feeling with a Prob, which if you perceive you may leave off Seringing with the faid Liquor.

Then take fresh Juice of Tabacco Leaves, and the Juice of live River Cray-Fishes of each equal parts, to which add a little Mercurius-Dulcis, and with Honey make it into a thin Ointment, of which put into the Fistula, and it will foon heal. Note, That to Cure a Fistula you must first Purge the Body well to carry off sharp humours.

IX. An excellent Ointment for a Fistula.

Take Pouder of Briony-Roots a dram, Franckincence, Myrrh of each two drams, Verdigreace half a dram, Salt-Armoniack a fcruple, Hogs-greafe, Oyl of Olives of each as much as fuffices, make an Ointment.

X. An other of greater Vertue:

Take white Vitriol four ounces, Allum, Ver-

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Verdigrease of each half an ounce, strong Vineger six ounces, Calcine them till it comes to a Stone, which Pouder mixt in it Unguentum \mathcal{A}_{-} gyptiacum and arm the tent with it. The brown Ointment of Felix Wortz is a most Medicine in this Case, if it be by boiling reduc'd into the form of a Suppository and so put into the Fishula. Barbet.

It will be fet down in the chap, of Balfams.

XI. Other Suppositories excellent, especially in Fistula's of the Fundament, and other soft parts.

Take Agrimony half a handful, Scordium a pugil, Flowers of St. John's-wort two pugils, French-Barly an ounce, boil them in white Wine and strain them, adding Virgins Hony four ounces, boil them to a thickness, then add Frankincense, Mastick of each two drams, Myrrh a dram and half, Sarcocol 3 drams, white Vitriol a dram; make them into Suppositories. Barbet.

XII. A Medicinal Stone.

Take white Vitriol four ounces, Salt-Armoniack half an ounce, Bol-Armoniack and Cerufe of each an ounce, mixt them and make a Pouder, which boil with Vineger what fuffices to the confiftency of a hard Stone. It drys up Ulcers and Defluxions; heals Wounds and invoterate Sores; Cures an Erifipelous, the Scab or Leprofy, Tettars and Ring-Worms, exc. The manner of ufing it is thus; Take one ounce

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ounce of this Stone and diffolve it in in Limewater, or Smiths-water, or Plantain-water one Pint, then filter it, with which being warm'd wash the part affect'd and apply over it a Cloth wet in the same. For a Fistula cast it in with a Seringe.

XIII. An other of Monsieur Lemery.

Take of the Caput Mortuum of Vitriol two ounces, Litharge, Allum, fine Bol of each four ounces; make of all a fine Pouder and mixt them, and put them into a glaz'd Por, and pore upon them good Veneger, fo much as to over top the Ingredients two Inches, cover the Veffel and leave it in digestion two days; then add to it Nitre eight ounces, Salt-Armoniack two ounces, and over a gentle heat evaporate all the moifture; then take the mais that remains and calcine it about half an hour in a ftrong Fire in a Crucible, and keep it for ufc. It has all the Vertues of the former, and is to be used in the same manner. It is one of the best Remedies in the World to cure a Gonorthea by injection, univerfals being before hand premised diffolve one dram of it in Lime-water, Smiths-water or Plantain-water eight ounces; and then filter it, and make an Injection into the Yard with a proper Yard-Seringe (of which that of Dr. Wall is the best) three or four times a day; the Patient being fure to make water just before the use of it, if he has occasion

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occafion, and not after it in fome confiderable time. It is alfo a fingular Remedy to clear the Eyes at any time, efpecially in the fmall Pox, eight grains of it being diffolv'd in Rofewater four ounces, and the Eyes wash'd therewith. It stops bleeding in a Wound and near answers all the Effects of the Stiptick-water.

XIV. An other Water to wash a Sore.

Take Roch-Alum, white Vitriol of each equal parts, fry them in a glazed pot or an old pan, till they be hard, then pouder it; then take fair water and make it boiling hot, put in fome of your pouder, and when it is bloodwarm wash the Sore with it and lay a a Linnen cloth over it wet in this Water.

XV. Agood Salve to cure an Ulcer.

Take Wax two ounces, Sallet Oyl a pint, boil them till they come to a good body; then take Olibanum, Lapis-Calaminaris in fine pouder of each two ounces, and put them to the Wax and Oyl, as they cool with half an ounce of Camphir, two ounces of Turpentine, and a little burnt Alum, boil them not to much, if you do they will be black and quite fpoil'd.

XVI. An other for outward Ulcers

Take the green bark of Oak and chop it all together

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together, both infide and outfide, into very fmall pieces, upon which pore good Limewater freshly made, and let them infuse in it till the Liquor has acquired a deep Tincture, with this dress the Ulcer once, and if need require twice a day.

XVII. The famous Scotch Empirical Medicine for a Stubborn Ulcer.

Take the groß stalks on which the red Colewort grows (not Cabbage) burn it to ashes, but not too much, and with any fit additament make thereof a pultice to be applied to the Ulcer, and shift it at reasonable distances of time.

XVIII. To dry up sharp humours with ones own Water, and to cure Kibs and Chilblains.

Sir Kenelm Digby relates. that a certain Lady had a humor broke out at her heel, which neither Phyficians with Purgings and Dietdrincks, nor Chyrurgions with Ointments coul heal and dry up; it was heal'd in three or four Fomentations with her own Urin newly made and fome white Salt diffolv'd in it, all warm'd, and then with Linnens dubl'd foment the place by the Fire fide for a quarter of an hour, then bind on a clean dry Linnen and comprefs to it : Do this Morning and Night, it Cures all Kibes and Chilblains, even after they are broken; 254 Choice, and Experienc'd Ch. XXXV.

broken; and if used before they are broken it will prevent them.

XIX. An experienc'd Medicine, that bath Cur'd Fiftula's in the Fundament, Scrotum, &c.

Take Oyl Olive two pound, Salt-Armoniack one dram, Bitum two drams, Saffron one dram and half, let them boil in Balneo Mariæ to the confumption of a third part.

XX. An other that Cur'd a Fistula left in despare.

Take Herb Robert, Ofmund Royal of each two handfuls, Mint one handful, Millepedes four hundred, bruife them and hang them in a bag in four Gallons of Bear, when it hath done working drink of it conftantly.

XX' For a Fistula in the Fundament.

Take juice of Herb-Mercury, and of wild Cucumbers of each three drams, Coloquintida, Hellebor, black and white, of each half a dram, Aloes one dram and half, Ox Gall one dram, Honey what fuffices; mixt and make an Oincement, and apply it to the Fiftyla, using at the fame time proper Wound drinks inwardly, fuch as you have in the chap. of the Kings Evil. This Ointment if it be laid to the bottom of the Belly, it Purges down-wards; If the Stomach be anointed with it, it Vomits; Ch.XXXVI. Remedies against the Piles. 255

It is also good for Worms in Children that will not take Medicines.

CHAP. XXXVI.

Of choice, approv'd and experimented Remedies against the Piles and Hemorhoids.

I. An Experimented Remedy for the Piles.

TAke white Lead in fine pouder one dram, burnt Alum two drams, mixt them with Hogs-greafe and Plantain-water, and then anoint the griev'd place therewith.

11. An other infallible and often prov'd Remedy for the Piles.

Take Pile-wort, stamp it and mixt it with unfalt'd Butter, working into it as much of the Herb as you can well make it take in, so that the Butter be highly green, melt it over the Fire, and let them boil gently till the Butter have taken in all the Juice and Vertue of the Herb, and the superfluous moisture be evaporat'd : In a word, you are to make the Butter as strong as you can of the Herb, and that it be of a perfect green colour; when it is cold it will be ferm and hard, with this anoint the Piles, Mr. Boyle. 256 Choice and Experienc'd Ch. XXXVI.

III. An other approv'd Remedy for the Same:

Take of the best and fattest Figgs fix in number, cleave them thrô the middle, lay them in a Portinger, and pore upon them good ftrong English-Brandy or Spirits to cover two good fingers breath ; then fet the Brandy on Fire and let it burn fo long as it will, and the Figs will then be very tender and foft; then apply one of them as hot as can be endur'd to the fwell'd Hemorhoids that comes out, and let it remain until it groweth cold, which will be lefs than half a quarter of a hour; then apply an other half of Figs as before, and fo continue till you have used all the twelve half Figs; and to that end you must keep them warm by the Fire. This will give you perfect ease, thô the pain be never so great before, and will take away all the fwelling and knobs upon the Veins, and make them retire orderly into the Body. Sir K. Digby.

IV. Dr. Bate's Remedy against the Piles, wherewith be Cur'd himself when he had them in the greatest extremity that could be; He gave this Receipt to Sir K. Digby.

Take Flower of Sulphur one part, fine Sugar three parts; make a fine Pouder, which make into Lozenges with Gum Tragant foak'd in red Rofe-water into a Mucilage; make them round and

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and flat and about one dram a piece; eat of these four or five times a day one at a time: Doing thus it gave him three or four stools a day, and in a little while he was periectly Cur'd of his Piles. With the same Remedy I have Cur'd also some Scoars of Persons troubled with the Hemorhoids, both Men and Women. Hartman,

V. An Ointment against the Piles.

Take the Afhes or Pouder of burnt Cork one dram, Camphir two fcruples, Opium fix grains, Ointment of Populneum an ounce and half, mixt them : Anoint upon the place affeCtd; Firft, foment the Part very well with hot Claret Wine, then immediatly an oint the Piles with this Ointment or with that at Sed. II. aforegoing, which you must do at least five or fix times a day; but the Fomentation may be made use of only Morning and Night so long as the Ointment is used. An the Patient may fome times sit over a Chafing-dish of Charcoal, wherein small pieces of Amber are put for a Fume.

VI. Another Ointment against the Piles of Dr. Bate.

Take Oyl of Roses an ounce and half, Emplastrum de minio one ounce, white Wax half an ounce, melt them together: then add Ætbiops Minerale two drams, Opium half an ounce, Saffron, Nut-megs, Camomile-S flowers 258 Choice and Experienc'd Ch. XXXVI.

flowers of each one dram, all in fine Pouder, Syrup of Rofes one ounce, by a gentle heat evaporate the moifture, and mixt them well together. Anoint the Piles with it. It is faid to be alfo a fingular and approv'd thing againft the Gout, or any vehement pain in what part of the Body foever. First, anoint the part afflict d therewith; fpreading it upon Leather apply it, binding on. It has been found alfo by experience to be an excellent thing to diffolve Tumours and Kernels in the Kings Evil, being appli'd and renued every other day, as Dr. Salmon telates.

VII. An other for the pain of the Hemorhoids of Dr. Sydenham.

Take Seeds of Mellons and Pompions of each half an ounce, white Poppy Seeds two drams, five fweet Almonds blanch'd, beat them in a Stone Morter, putting in by little and little Barly-water about a pint; Rofe-water two drams, fine white Sugar a fufficient quantity, make an Emulfion according to Art, of which let the Sick take three ounces often.

VIII. An other for the same, of the same Author.

Take of Flower of Sulphur, fine Pouder of Liquorice and dry'd Sage of each one dram, with a fufficient quantity of Lucatella's Balfam make a mais, of every dram make fix Pills,

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of which let him take three thrice a day, taking fix Spoonfuls of the Emulfion after them. To cool and loofen the Body, Glouber's Salt Mirabile is an excellent thing, you may give it from half an ounce to fix drams, to an ounce, in Clarifi'd Wey.

IX. An other for the same:

Take of Frogs Spawn-water four ounces, boil in of Litharge two drams, Opium one fcruple; foke a Linnen-cloth in a little of it, and apply it to the part affect'd; or if the fwelling be inward; put three Spoonfuls of it into a Clifter and give it.

CHAP. XXXVII.

Of choice, experienc'd and approv'd Remedies against the Plague or Pestilence.

I. Hartman the great Antidote and Prefervative against the Plague, which Sir K. Digby bid me to get prepar'd for his Family, when that great Plague and Pestilent Fever began in London in the Year 1665. was thes:

TAke a pound of the leaves of Wood Sorrel; and pound them by themfelves half an hour, then take three pound of fine Sugar in Signarrow Signarrow pounder,

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pouder, and mixt these together, and keep it ftirring and beating for three hours more; and then take four ounces of Mithridate or London Treacle, and pound them all together for half an hour longer, which makes four hours in all; then put it up in Gally-Pots, and tie it up close with a Bladder or Leather. In time of Infection, take the quantity of a large Nutmeg every Morning falling, and if you have taken any Infection, or if you find your felf stricken with any Difease at the Hart or Pain in the Stomach, take almost as much more, and go to Bed and procure a moderate Sweat for an hour.

11. Also the following Pills I prepar'd by Sir K. Digby's Order.

Take of the beft Aloes Succotrina groffy pouder'd, half a pound, Myrth groffy pouder'd fix ounces, Mattick in pouder four ounces, Saffron two ounces; put them Bold-heads every one a part and extract the Tincture according to Art : The Aloes and Saffron with common Brandy, but the Myrth and Maffick with good Spirit of Wine, often fhaking them; then mixt the Tinctures together, and in a Glafs-Cucurbite in Balneo Marix abitract all the Spirit of Wine, till the Matter remain in the confiftance of Honey; then pour it out into a white Bafon, and in fand evaporate it to the confiftance of a Mais for Pills. They from the

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the Head, Stomach and Heart, hinder Putrefaction, caufe a good Digeftion, and a good Appetite, cures the Scurvy. They are an excellent prefervative in Peftilential times, cleanfing the Body of fuch Humours as might be apt to receive the Infection; and to that end Sir Kenelm caus'd them to be prepar'd. The Dole is from one feruple to half a dram to be taken at Night, before or after a light Supper. These Pills will be better if you prepare the Aloes according to Dr. Harvy's direction which you have in the Chapter of the Scurvy.

III. An excellent Pouder against the Plague or Pestilence, sent by the King of Spain to the King of France.

Take Murrh, I ignum-Aloes, Sealed Earth, Bol-Armoniack, Cloves, Saffron, Maltick, Mace of each four drams, make them all into a fine Pouder, which keep in a Leather-Bag. Dole is ten grains or twelve in white Wine or Water of Scordium, or in Broth every Morning in time of Infection. It will preferve you from taking any Infection that day you have taken it. It is Cordial and Stomachal; But if you have taken any Infection (the Signe whereof is a Feaver, a violent pain in the Head and Back, a Vomiting, the Urin is thick, the Patient is heavy and propente to fleep, &c.) then prefently take a dram of the faid Pouder in the ftrongest Vineger you can get, and Role-Water

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water of each two ounces, and being well cover'd in Bed, expect a Sweat, which by all means is to be procur'd. In the Winter the Pouder is to be taken in Wine, and in the Summer in Vineger and Rofe-water. To a Child you may give half a dram. Dr. Sabine.

IV. The King of Poland's Remedy against the Plague.

Take the best Wine-Vineger fix quarts, Juice of Celandine clarifi'd nine pints, Leaves and Roots of Avens, Elecampane of each one ounce, Roots of Angelica, Zedoary, Junperberries of each two ounces, Sage one handful, digest this two days in a gentle heat; then strain it, and keep it in Bottles close stopp'd. It is a powerful Remedy, both for preferving from, and curing the Plague and other Malignant, Purple and spotted Fever. For prefervation take a little glassful of it in the Morning fasting. It is record'd that no Man that drank this Medicine in the great Plague 1592. was infed'd with it, but was preferv'd from it and all other Difeases. It also clears the Eye light to a wonder.

V. An other Vineger against the Plague.

Take Roots of Angelica, Zedoary of each one ounce, Juniper-berries two ounces, Rue three handfuls; pound them and pour upon them

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them of the best Wine-Vineger three pints. It is us'd for a fume, and to wash and gargie the Mouths and Throats of fuch as are als fault'd with the Plague. Dr. Bate. Salmon fays that if Camphire two drams, fine pouder of Bay-berries and Winters-bark of each half a dram, Spirit of Wine eight ounces be added, the Medicine will be much more spirituous and effectual to the purpose intend'd. For Prefervation, let it be finelt to or drawn up the Nostrils every Morning : Thrice a day let the Mouth be wash't there with; and every Morning falting let one or two spoonfals of it. be taken in a glass of Sack. For cure, it is to be given in all that the Sick drinks, making the drink pleafantly sharp; and if it be Broth give it therewith to a grateful acidity.

VI. A Prefervative Antidose against the Plague.

Take Venice-Treacle, Mithridate of each one ounce, the Contection of Alkermes two drams, Conferve of Wood-Sorrel two ounces, mixt them together and take the quantity of a Walnut every Morning. Dr. Sermon.

VII. An other for the fame.

Take Spirit of Sack one pint, Venice-Treacle one ounce and half, Saffron two drams, mixt them together, and let them stand close stopp'd for three days; then filter it, and keep the S 4 clear

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clear Spirit for use : The Dose is one Spoonful every Morning in the distill'd Water of Rue or Carduus.

VIII. An other for the same.

Morning in the diftill'd Water of Wood-Sorrel.

IX. An other for the same.

Take Juniper-berries, the Leaves of green Rue, of each one ounce, the Kernels of Walnuts two ounces, Venice Treacle, Saffron of each two drams, ten or twelve Figs, beat them all well together, then mixt there with a fufficient quantity of the best Vineger, and make an Electuary thereof, of which take the quantity of a large Nutmeg every Morning.

X. An other Antidote for preservation.

Take Conferve of the Leaves of Rue four ounces, Mithridate, Confection Liberantis of each one ounce, Confection of Hyacint two drams, Salt of Worm-wood two drams and half, of the red Hungarian pouder half an ounce, Bezoartick-Vineger what fuffices make an Electuary. The Dofe is the quantity of a Cheft nut thrice a day. Dr. Willia.

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X I. Lozenges for the same.

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Take Virginia Snake roots, Roots of Contrayerva, Zedoary all in fine pouder, Species Liberantis of each two drams, Camphor two feruples, Sugar diffolv'd in Bezoartick Vineger and boil'd to the Confiftency for Lozenges four ounces, make Lozenges according to Art of half a dram each, eat one or two often in a day. Dr. Willu.

XII. An other Antidote for the fame.

Take Virginia Snake roots three ounces, boil it in Fountain-Water three pints to a pint and half, then strain it, and add Hony two ounces, Venice-Treacle one ounce, digest it warm, close stopp'd, then strain it. The Dose is two spoonfuls three or four times a day.

XIII. An other for the fame.

Take Flower of Sulphur four ounces, melt them in a Crucible or in a Poringer over a gentle Fire, then caft in to it by Spoonfuls eight ounces of Salt of Worm-wood, ftir them well together till the whole Mafs grow red, then add Aloes, Myrrh, Olibanum in pouder of each one dram, Saffron half a dram, ftir them for a quarter of an hour longer, till they be well incorporat'd; then the Mafs being cold put 266 Choice and Experienc'd Ch. XXXVII.

put it into a glaz'd Difh, and in a Celler let it refolve into an Oyl as red as a Ruby and very fair to look upon. The Dofe is from ten to twenty drops in Bezoartick-Water, an onnce and half or two ounces twice a day. Dr. Wills.

Or put the aforefaid Pouder in a Matrafs or Bolt-head, and pour upou it Spirit of Wine that hath been rectifi'd from Virginia Snakeroots, and Contrayerva fo much as will over top it the breath of three fingers, and extract a Tincture. The Dofe is from twenty to thirty drops in any convenient Liquor.

Or take of the faid Pouder half an ounce, pour upon it good ftrong Wine a quart, make a close and warm infusion : The Dose is one Spoonful twice or thrice a day. If you have taken any Infection you are to take the same Remedies, but in a larger Dose and offiner.

XIV. An Antidote for Curing the Plague.

Take of Bezoartick-water two ounces, of Bezoartick-Vineger half an ounce, Venice Treacle one dram, mixt them and thake them in a glafs, and give it for a draught, and procure fweat.

1 XV. An other for the same.

Take of the Gascoin's Pouder, Virginia Snake-Roots, and Gontrayerva of each one scruple,

to

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to twenty five grains, make a pouder, give it in a fpoonful of Treacle water, drinking atter it. 2 little draught of the fame, or of fome cordial Julap.

XVI. An other for the same.

Take the pouder of Toads Calcin'd, Gascoin's powder or Dr. Bate's purple pouder of each half a dram, make a pouder and give it in the same manner.

XVII. An other for the fame.

Take Bezoar Mineral half a dram, Venice-Treacle one dram, Camphir fix grains, Bezoartick Vineger what fuffices, mix and make a Bolus, give it in the fame manner.

XVIII. An other for the fame.

Take Dragon water and water of Woodforrel of each four ounces, Compound water of Scordium, Treacle water, Bezoartick water of each one ounce, Pearl prepar'd one dram, fyrup of Clove Gillo flowers, (or the Juice of Citron) two ounces, fpirit of Vitriol twelve drops, make a Julap; the Dofe is three ounces in a day, fometimes by it felf, and fometimes with other Medicines. Dr. Willis.

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XIX. An Amulet to bang about the Neck of excellent use to preferve you from the Plague.

Take a Hafelnut, the Kernel being taken forth, fill it with Quick-filver, close up the hole with Wax, then cover it with Silk, and hang it about your Neck that it may touch the pitt of the Stomach.

II. An other for the same.

Take the Head of a Toad well dri'd and cover'd with Silk, and use it as the former.

XXI. An other for the same.

Take Venice Treacle one ounce, Toads dri'd and grofly beaten two ounces, Virginia Snakeroots and Contrayerva of each half an ounce, make a pouder, of which make Amulets, with Gum Tragacant diffolv'd in Rofe water, mixing them with a little Cotten to keep them from breaking, gild them with Gold, and wear them about your Neck.

XXII. An other pestilential Amulet or Presevative.

Take Aurum Pigmentum an ounce and half, Angelica-roots fix drams, Mucilage of Gum Tragacant what fuffices, mix and make a paft

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past of which make Amulets twelve in the form of a bullet, which role up in Silk, and hang against the Region of the Heart.

XXIII. Amulets of Mineral Cinaber against the Plague.

Take natural or Mineral Cinaber, and reduce it to a most fubtile Pouder; then with as little Turpentine as may be, compose a mass of it (as if you would make Pills) of which make cakes, make them flat and thin, but not fo thin as they shall crak and break, let them dry, and upon the one fide of them ingrave the Character of Mercury, which must be done Die Mercurij, and Hori Mercurij, which is twice every Wednesday. Put this in a piece of Sarfnet and hang it about the Neck of any Perfon (or any living creature) it will infallibly preferve them from the Plague, tho they converse with or are about infected Persons every day, the cakes or pastils must be made very smooth, and the Character well ingrav'd. If on the other fide you ingrave the Character of Jupiter it will preferve from Wichcraft; which must likewise be done Die Jouis and bora Jouis which is twice every Thursday. If you can have a piece of Cinaber big enough to ingrave the two Characters upon both lides of it, you need not make it up with Turpentine. It will likewife preferve from Convultion-fits or Falling Sickness being worn in a Sarfenet, on the region of the head as well

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as upon the Stomach. If it begiven from twenty four grains to thirty made up in Pills with a little Turpentine, and given to any Perfon infected of the Plague, it will procure fweating, and will drive out the Venim or infection. Paracelfus faith that in the greateft Plague that is in any City or Village, if you lay four pieces of Mineral Ginaber the longer the better, one at the Eaft, another at the Weft, the third at the South, and the fourth at the North part of the Houfe, and laying them fo that no wet can come to them, infalliable that houfe and all the Perfons and creatures in it will be preferv'd from the Plague.

XXIV. An Antidote for curing the Plague.

Take Venice Treacle two drams, the pouder of Toads calcin'd fix grains, Treacle water two drams, Cardus water four ounces, make a Potion and give it the Patient, and procure fweat. Dr. Sermon.

XXV. An other for the same.

Take the diftil'd waters of Marigold and of Cowflips of each three ounces. Plague water, Treacle water and Tincture of Saffron of each one ounce, fyrup of Clove Gillo flowers, two ounces, Ovl of Vitriol, or rather fpirit of Niter thirty drops, mix and make a Julap; the Dofe is one or two fpoonfuls at any time when more then ordinary ill or faint. Con-

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Concerning the pouder of Toads: Dr. Willis relates that in the 1643 a Pestilential Fever reigning at Oxford and other parts adjacent; the chiefest method of cure was plac'd in Allexipharmicks, and a Sweat feafonably procur'd for this purpose, besides the preferips of Phyficians taken from Apothecaries Shops, certain Empirical Remedies deferv'd no small praise : Then first in this Country the Counters of Kent's pouder began to be of great Fame, and another ashcolour'd pouder was not of the least note; which a certain Courtier coming by chance to this City, gave to many with good fuccels, and fold it others, who approv'd of its ufe at a great rate. The difeas'd were wont upon drinking half a dram of this in any Liquor to fall into a most copious Sweat, and so to be freed from the virulency of the Difeafe : That Diaphoretick (the preparation whereof I learnt afterwards from the Authors Sifters fon) was only the pouder of Toads prepar'd as followeth :

XXVI. The Diaphoretick antidote, or Pouder of Toads.

Take Toads what quantity you pleafe, cleafe them with Salt, wash them with Wine; then calcine them lightly in a Earthen pot, and reduce them to pouder bones and all; the Dose half a dram.

IIVXX reca-Walnuts in a genele hear for three

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XXVII. An Electuary against the Plague.

Take Roots of Contrayerva three ounces, of Valerian, of Master wort, Zedoary of each an ounce and half, feeds of Angelica hull'd, Dittany of Creet, Mirrh of each an ounce, Virginia Snake root half an ounce, Saffron three drams, Opium two drams, pulp of Juniperberries (extracted with Mallago Wine) twelve ounces, Mallaga wine fo much as fuffices to diffolve the Myrrh and Opium, of the Antepidemick fyrup what fuffices, make an Electuary. It is not only good against the Plague, but all other malign and Epidemical Difeafes; which it overcomes by puting the Patient in a gentle fweat; the Dole is from one dram to two (according to the Age and Malignity of the difeale) diffolv'd in fome proper Plague water, and fo give it the Patient (being in bed) cover'd down warm, and caufing to fweat fome hours upon it. If it be given by way of prevention, take one dram of it upon a knives point in the Morning fasting, and drink after it a glafs of Sack. Dr. Bate.

XXVIII. A syrup against Epidemical Diseasas.

Take fresh roots of Butter-bur one pound, fresh scordium, fix ounces, Rue two ounces, chop them and infuse them in four pints of Juice of green-Walnuts in a gentle heat for three days;

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days; then strain it, and to the clear Liquor add double refin'd Sugar, the double weight, and make a fyrup. It is good against the Meafles, imall Pox, fpotted and malign Fevers; Plague and all other Epidemical diftempers, ftrengthening the Stomach, and driving the Infection from the Heart and Vitals. In the Plague give it thus : Take Canary four ounces; of this lyrup two ounces, Oyl of Sulphur fo many drops as to give it a greatful accudity, mix and give it every Morning fasting, as a Dofe for prevention; But for cure thus: Take Carduus water four ounces, Bezoartick water one ounce, of this fyrup two ounces and half, Oyl of Sulphur eight drops, mix for a Dofe to fweat upon. In the Meafles and fmall Pox give it thus : Take Aqua Lastis Alexiteriæ three ounces or four, Aqua Mirabilis and Treacle water of each half an ounce, of this fyrup two ounces, mix it and give it Morning and Night.

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CHAP. XXXVIII.

Of choice and approv'd Cordial Waters distil'd.

I. The London Cordial Plague water.

TAke Roots of Angelica, Master wort, Butter-bur, Peony roots of each four ounces, Vipers grafs, Virginia Snake roots of each an ounce, leaves of Rue, Rofemary, Balm, Cardus Benedictus, Scordium, Marigold with the flowers, Dragon, Goats-rue, Mint of each two handfuls, chop the Herbs, and flice the Roots, and stamp them a little, and infuse them in fix quarts of Brandy for two days, then put thereto fix quarts of fair water, and distil it in a Limbeck, drawing from it two Gallons, which put in a large bottle, and hang two drams of Saffron in it tied up in a rag, or make the Tincture of two drams of Saffron with the first running, and mix that with the reft of your Water which is better. To every quart of this water put two ounces of Loaf-Sugar. It is excellent against the Plague and all malignant Diftempers, as the fmal Pox and Meafles, fpoted and purple Fevers, dre. the Dofe is from one ounce to two in Angelica or Sage water.

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II. An other Plague water of Dr. Bate.

Take Celandine, Rosemary, Rue, Sage, Mugwort, Wormwood, Pimpernel, Dragons, Scabius, Agrimony, Balm, Scordium, leffer Centory, Carduns Benedictus, Rof. Solis of each two handfuls, roots of Angelica, Tormentil, Gentian, Zedoary, Liquorice of each one ounce, being chopt and bruis'd infuse them in four quarts of white Wine for two days, then distil it. You may distil this in Balneo Mariæ to drynefs, otherwife if you distil it in a Copper Vesica with a Worm, you must add water to it to prevent the taste of burning. It is profitableagainst the Plague or Pestilence, and all manner of Malign and Pestilential Fevers, &c. It may be given a lone, from two ounces to four, or us'd as a vehicle to convey other Medicines in for the fame intention, the fick being in bed, and Iweating well upon it.

Dr. Salmon fays that if three or four good Lemonds were thin flic'd and put (after diftillation) into the Water it would be fomuch the better, for that the particles of that acid Juice, certainly deftroys all the Vermiculi, or Miasmita, which are the progenerators of the Plague, or Pestilence, and also more pourfully overcome it when the Infection is begun : For this Reason it is, Vineger is put into almost all our Plague waters, by Sylvim Barbet, and the more learn'd Physicians.

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III. The Alexitary Milk water refifting Poison, of Dr. Bate.

Take Mead fweet, Carduus Ben. Goats Rue of each fix handfuls, Mint, common Wormwood of each five handfuls, Rue three handfuls, Angellica two handfels, chop and bruife them, and pour upon them new Milk three Gallons, mix them well and diftil them in a common Still. The intention of Medicine is to be us'd as a General Vehicle to take many other Medicines in, It is many times us'd to quench thirst in violent continual burnings or Malignant Fevers, and mixt with Plague water or other cordial Waters for Juleps. For example; Take of this Allexitery Milk water fix ounces, Plague water three ounces, double refin'd Sugar fix drams, mix them together and let the Patient take three or four spoonfuls of it at pleafure. Note, That this water will not keep long, but will grow fower if it be diffil'd with Milk, therefore fome Phyficians rather approve to diffle it with fair water, and then it may be distil'd in the Winter seafon with dry herbs, as well as with the Green Herbs in the Summer feason, and then you may diffill it in a Copper Vefica with a Worm, or in a Limbeck with a bucket head.

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IV. The Febrifuge-Water of Dr. Bate.

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Take tops of Centory the lefs eight handfuls, Worm-wood, Feather few, Cinqk-foil, Mari-golds, Tormentil, green Tobacco, Sorrel, Carduus Bened. Dragons, Cammomil, Germander of each fix handfuls, Dandeleon twelve handfuls; bruife them all, and add to them white Wine two quarts, and diffil according to Art; then pour the distill'd Water upon new Herbs, digeft for twelve hours, then diftil it in Balneo to dryness. In the Distill'd-water infuse Roots of white Dittany, of Tormentil of each an ounce and half, Seeds of Citrons, of Carduus Benedictus, of Carduus Maria, of Sorrel of each two ounces, Leaves of Scordium, Goats-rue of each four handfuls ; then diffil according to Art. This is profitable against all manner of Fevers whether continual or intermitting, commonly call'd Agues : the beft way is to diltil in Balneo, for then you may diftil to drynefs. It is also good for a cold and weak Stomach, fainting Fits, trembling of the Heart. or. The Dofe two, four or fix Spoonfuls according to the Age, Sex and as necessity requires.

V. Aqua Mirabilis, Sir Kenelm Digby's way.

Take Cubebs, Galingal, Cardemons, Melilot flowers, Cloves, Mace, Ginger, Cinnamon T 2 of

of each half a dram, Juice of Celandine one pint, Juice of Mint and Baum of each half a pint Flowers of Cowflips, Rofemary, Borage, Buglofs and Marigold of each two drams; bruife the Spices and infufe all with the Juices in three pints of Sack, one pint of ftrong Angelica-water, and half a pint of red Rofewater; Let it infufe twelve hours, then diftil it in Balneo, laying Hearts-tongue-leaves in the bottom of the Balneum, receive the first, fecond and third runnings by themselves, and mixt it as you please to have it for ftrength, to every quart put two ounces of Loaf-Suger.

VI. Dr. Stephen's great Cordial-water.

Take Cinnamon, Cloves, Galingal, Ginger, Nutmegs, Grains of Paradice, Anifeeds, fweet Fennel-feeds, Caraway-feeds of each one dram, Thyme, Mother of Thyme, Mint, Sage, Penniroyal, Pellitory of the wall, Rofemary, red Rofes dry'd, Flowers of Camomil; Origanum, of Lavender of each a handful : Shred the Herbs and bruife the Seeds and Spices, and Infufe them for twelve hours in a Gallon of white Port-Wine; then diftil it, and fave the firft, fecond and third running by themfelves: you may alfo diftil it with Brandy and fair Water.

It is Cordial, strengthens the Heart, comforts and revives the Spirits; being given to a woman in Labour, it facilitates the Birth, and caufes

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causes a good delivery; and after delivery it is faid to bring away the after Birth, cleanfes the Womb and reftors ftrength; it comforts the Stomach, and is good against swooning and fainting Fits, and Fits of the Mother; It is good against the Stone and Gravel, and is faid to preferve youth.

VII. Excellent Cordial-water, call'd the Royal Aqua Vita, or Water of Life.

Take Lignum Aloes, Roots of Zedoary, Angelica, Carline-Thiftle, and Valerian of each one ounce, Cinnamon, Mace and Citron-rind of each fix drams, Cloves, Cardemoms, fweet Fennel-feeds of each half an ounce; Flowers of Rolemary, Sage and Marjoran of each two handfuls, being flic'd and bruis'd, put them into a Stone Jug with Brandy and Sack of each two quarts, ftop it clofs, and let them infufe for three days; then distil in Balneo to drynefs, and to every quart of Water put two ounces of Loaf-Sugar. This Water is much used and esteem'd by all the Nobility and Gentry in France : The Perfection of it is, that all thô there be not many Ingredients, vet they are of great Vertue. It fortifies the Brain, Head and Stomach, strengthens the Memory, comforts the Heart, revives the Spirits when enfeebled : It is to be taken fasting from one Spoonful to three in fome proper Liquor, as black Cherry-water, or Baulm-water. VIII.

VIII. An Excellent Cordial VValnut-VVater of Madam Ducke.

Take a peck of Walnuts in the Month of July, beat them to math, put them into a Jug with Clove Gillo-flowers two quarts, Poppy leaves a quart, Mace, Cinnamon of each two ounces, Nutmeg one ounce, all bruifed, pour upon them one Gallon of Brandy, and two Gallons of ftrong Bear; ftop the Veffel clofe, and let it ftand to infuse for twelve hours; then diftil it in a Copper Vesica with its Worm, you may draw off fix or seven quarts of Water, to every quart of water put two ounces of Sugar. It is very Cordial and good for Surfeits, *Oc.*

IX. An other great Cordial-VVater of Dr. Godart.

Take the outward thin rinds of Lemons frefh four ounces, of Oranges three ounces, Cinnamon two ounces, Nutmegs, Mace, Calamus Aromaticus, Coriander of each one ounce, Cubebs fix drams, Cloves, Seeds of Carduus Benedictus, Cardamoms of each half an ounce, Saffron two drams, cut the peels fmall, and bruife the Spices and Seeds, and infufe them all in three quarts of Brandy, and fix quarts of Water for twelve hours, then diftil it in a Copper Vefica with its Worm, drawing about five quarts, which fweeten with Loaf-Sugar,

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or with Syrup made of Damask Rofe-water and Sugar, fetting it in warm Water till the Sugar be diffolv'd. The Dofe is from an ounce to two ounces, either alone or in any proper Vehicle. It is a truly noble Cordial againft Fainting, Swooning, Beating and Sicknefs of the Heart and Stomach; It is good againft the Plague and Peftilence, and to put into Juleps in all manner of malign Fevers, with three or four drops of fpirit of Sulphur.

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X. The Royal Cordial WV ater, as it was prepar'd for King William, invented by Dr. Sylvius.

Take Angelica-roots one dram, Masterwort, Galingal roots of each a dram and half, Rofemary, fweet Marjoran, Rue, Bafil-leaves of each one handful, Bay-berries bruifed three drams, Angelica, Lovage and Ani-feeds bruis'd of each half a dram, Ginger, Nutmegs, Mace of each a dram and half, Cinnamon fix drams, Cloves, Orang-peels of each one dram; beat them grosely, and digest them for two days in Spirit of Sack three pints; then Distil in Balneo to drynefs; then pour that which you have drawn off upon the remainder again, and diftil as before, and keep the Spirit for use. If you please you may put upon the remaining Brandy a quart or three Pints and diffil it as long as it comes with any ftrength, and keep that apart from the former. It is an admirable Cordial against the Cholick and all opprefilons

opprefions of Wind, weakness of the Stomach, obltructions of the Spleen, fainting and fwooning Fits : It is good against the Plague, Pestilence and Poison : It also prevails against Gravel, Sand and Stone; and may be given in some proper Water from three drams to half an ounce. They that will not be at the charge to distil it with Spirit of Sack, may do it with good Brandy. I have seen it prepar'd in London for King WILLIAM, Dr. Sylvins, who is the Author of it, was Physician to the Prince of Orange at the Hague; he cals it the Carminative Spirit, or Spirit Expelling-wind, or Spirit against the Colick.

XI. A Cordial VV ater of Excellent use, especially in all cold affects of the Head, Brain and Nerves, as Apoplexie, Palsies, &c.

Take Roots of Angelica, Zedoary, Gentian, Valerian, Tormentil, Celandine, Biftort, Butter-bur, Scorzonera, Mafter-wort, and of the great Burdock, Leaves of Goats-rue of each tour ounces, of Carlin-Thiftle fix ounces, Leaves of Carduus Benedictus, Wood-Sorrel, Dittany, Scordium, Mead-fweet, Scabious, Baum, Plantain, Divel-bit, Mint, Rue, Buglofs and Borrage of each five handfuls, Flowers of Marry-gold and St. John-wort of each five ounces, Sage and Rofemary of each two handfuls, twenty Lemonds and as many Oranges cut fmall with the rinds and all, the Hearts of twelve

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twelve Lambs, fhred fmall; pour upon them Canary twenty pints digeft for two days; then diftil it. The Dofe is one ounce. It is an excellent Cordial and ufed by feveral Perfons of great Note.

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XII. An other good Cordial VV ater.

Take Sage, Rue, Rosemary, Centory, Agrimony, Fumitory, Betony, Rosa Solas, Pimpernel of each one handful, chop them small and infuse them in a Gallon of white Port-Wine, the Vessel being well stopt for two days, then distil it in Balneo, or in a Cold Still, and sweeten it with Loaf Sugar. It is admirable in all Fevers, Surfeits, small Pox and Meass, fainting and swooning Fits.

A worthy Lady leaves out the Fumitory and in the room puts in Baulm, Scabious, Mugwort Carduus Benedictus, Wormwood, Scordium, Dragons, Mint of each a handful, Leave out the Dragons-roots, and add Roots of Jentian and Contrayerva of each one ounce, in the fame quantity of Wine.

XIII. An excellent Orange-Water or Spirit of Sir K, Digby.

Take the thin rinds or chips of an hundred Oranges; cut them finall, and put them in a Cucurbite, fo large that they fill it not above a third part full; pour upon them three quarts of

of good Brandy, then put on the Head, and lute it well with Pafte and Paper, ftop the beak or fpout of the head and let it ftand to infufe three or four days; then diftil it in Balneo, keep the first quart by it felf, for it will be excellent good; then change the Receiver, and the Oyl will come over with the rest of the Liquor; when it begins to come weak leave off distilling, mingle one pint of Syrup of Clove Gillo-flowers with the first quart, and it will be an excellent Cordial : You may Aromatife it with Amber-greece if you love Amber.

XIV. The compound Wormwood Water of Dr. Godart.

Take of the outward fresh rinds of Lemons. one pound and half, Orange-peels one pound, tops of dri'd Worm-wood, Winter-bark of each half a pound, Flowers of Camomil four ounces, Cardamoms with their husks, Cloves, Cubets, Camels-Hay of each one ounce, Cinnamon, Nutmegs, Caraways of each two ounces, being all duly prepar'd infuse them in fix quarts of Brandy, Spring Water four Gallons, digest for three days, then distil it in a Copper Vesica with is worm, or in a Limbeck with its refrigeratory or bucket-head. It is an excellent Stomach-Water, and a good Cordial, prevalent against faintings and swoonings Fits, Cholick and wind in the Bowels. It is also a specifick against the Scurvy, very much sweetning

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ning the Blood, and an admirable Surfeit Water, being taken either alone, or in any proper Liquor.

XV. A Cordial-VVater of Clary compound, for preventing Miscarriage, of Dr. Bate.

Take leaves of fresh Clary bruis'd twelve handfuls; pour upon them six quarts of Brandy, distil it in Balneo to dryness; then empty your Balneum and put into it ten handfuls of fresh Clary with the flowers if you can have them, Flowers of Archangel fix handfuls; pour the distilled Water upon it, and distil a second time : Repeat the Distillation once more with fresh Herbs and Flowers, adding one ounce of Nutmegs; put in the receiver fix ounces of double refin'd Sugar. It is of great use (among young and tender Women) for preventing Abortion; it also is good to stop the Whites. Before you distil let it digest in the Brandy four and twenty hours. Dr. Salmon fays, that if you put two ounces of Catechu in fine pouder into every quart of Water, and fo make a Tincture, it will be ten times stronger to all the purposes afore mention'd, and will also, ftop the most violent Flux of the Terms. The Dose is a spoonful or two at Night. It is best to take the tops and tender Leaves of Clary with flowers. Sir K. Digby.

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XVI. The Cordial VV ater, making fruitful, of Dr. Bate.

Take feeds of Angelica hull'd one pound and half, fweet Fennel-feed, Liquorice of each four ounces, Raisins flic'd one pound, Leaves of Mug-wort, Baulm of each four handfuls, Carduus Benedictus, Penny-royal of each two handfuls, Seeds of Ammum four ounces, Wine and Milk of each three quarts, mixt and diftil it in Balneo to drynefs. The Dofe is four ounces, Præmiss, Premittendis with the tincture of Juniperberries and Syrup of the juice of Sage two fpoonfuls, two scruples of the pouder of the feeds of Hart-wort, or Bastard Lovage, mixt with Sugar of Rofes, being given before. It is given to cure Barrennefs in Women, and make fruitful. It fweetens the Blood and deftroys the Scorbutick accidities, which hinders the breeding of good feed, and being given at a convenient time (after the exhibition of the two fcruples of the Hart-wort feeds.) It is faid to provock the Termes, and effectually cleanfe the Womb of its impurities which hinder Generation. Sometimes it is also profitably giv'n against Hysterick Fits.

XVII. A Cordial VV ater of black Cherries for the Vertigo, Giddiness, Dizziness and Swimming in the Head.

Take four pound of black Cherries, fquize

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out first all the juice from them, then beat the reft with the Stones to a mash; then put them with the juice into a Jug, with Baulm, and tops of Rofemary fhred very fmall or stampt of each one handful, Cinnamon and Nutmegs of each half and ounce, then pour thereon two quarts of Sack; ftop it clofe and let it stand twelve hours; then distil it in Balneo, and draw fo much of it that it be weak like Aqua Mirabilis, fweeten it with Sugar-candy to your tafte. The Lady Dacries distill'd this in an ordinary Still; but Sir K. Digby fays it is better to distil it in Balneo. The faid Lady was much trubl'd with the Vertigo, Giddinets, Dizzinefs and fwimming in her Head, of which she was cur'd by the use of this Water, and many other have found the like effect of it. This Water will be better if you keep the juice till it be fetled and then pour off the clear. and keep that by it felf, and pour the fetlings to the Sack and the other Ingredients, and then mingle the clear Juice with your diffill'd Water. or you may run the Juice thrô a Gelly-bag. It is very Cephalick and Cordial.

XVIII. An other Cordial VV ater of black Cherries compound.

Take black Cherries five pound, prefs out all the Juice from them; then stamp the rest with the Stones, and pour to them Claret-Wine or red Port Wine two quarts, Rosemary and Baulm

Baulm of each one handful fhred very fmall, Cinnamon two ounces, Nutmegs one ounce and half, put them in a glaz'd Jug, or ftone Bottle for 12 hours then diffil it in Balneo, to every quart put two ounces of Loaf Sugar, or Sugarcandy. It is a great Cordial, and exceeding good for the Head and Stomach. Sir K. Digby, You may diffil the Juice with the other thing, or put it to the diffil'd Water as is direct'd in the former; do as you thinck beft.

XIX. An other VV ater of black Cherries compound, of Dr. Bate.

Take black Cherries with their flones well bruis'd ten pound, new Milk two Gallons, Leaves of Violets, Bramble, Self-heal, Woodbine of each four handfuls, fhred them very fmall or ftamp them, and diftil it in Balneo to drynefs. The Dofe is half a pint twice a day. It is a most powerful Remedy in the Tympany. It is also of good use for those who have old Sores, running Ulcers, Fistula's, &c. which are hard to cure.

XX. A Cordial VVater of Clove-Gillo-flowers of Dr. Bate.

Take two pound of Clove-Gillo-flowers new gather'd, Dates flic'd one Pound, Anifeeds and Liquorice bruis'd of each an ounce, Lees of Wine three Gallons; digest and distil in a Limbeck

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beck and draw off two quarts, to which add Sugur-Candy four ounces. Hartman, If you diftil this in a Limbeck as is directed, the Lees of Wine will certainly burn to the bottom of the Still; the beft way is to diftil it In Balneo, for then you need not fear burning nor the tafte of burning. It is an excellent Cordial Water, good against Faintings, Swoonings, fickness at Heart, oppression of the Spirits. It chears the Heart, revives the Spirits, comforts Nature, and is good against Melancholy.

XXI. The Queen of Hungary's Water; as they make it in France:

Take four pound of Rosemary-flowers, put them into a Cucurbit, and pour upon them three quarts of Spirit of Wine rectifi'd, prefs down the flowers into the faid Spirit, and then cover the Cucurbit with its head, and lute well all the Junctures with Paper and Past, or with wet Bladders cut into flips, then place the Cucurbit in a Sand-bath, and lute a Receiver to it, and leave it fo until the next morning; then distil it with so moderate a Fire, that whilest the Spirit distils, the Head may not be fo much as warm; continue the Distillation until you have drawn about three quarts of Spirit, which will be very pure and charg'd with the best and volatile substance of the flowers; keep the Water close ftopt, then strain the Liquor and press out the Flowers that

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that remain in the Cucurbit, and evaporate it till it comes to the confiftance of an Electuary. The great Fame and Reputation of this Water, and the great Vent for it in France, Germany and England for many years fince, has caus'd many Perfons, as ignorant as wicked, to prepare it after their manner, taking only Rofemary in steed of the Flowers, and in stead of Spirit of Wine, make common Brandy, or Malt-spirit ferve their turns.

Thổ this spirit of Rosemary well prepard is a very good thing, yet it is ten times better and more efficacious and pouerful, both for inward and outward uses, if it be prepard according to the correction of a learn'd Author, which is to rectify the Spirit of Wine, first from the tops of Rosemary with the flowers and the green about them, which they call course flowers, and then to distil that spirit from the fine flowers, as is directed before.

But the true Royal Hungarian-water as it was prepar'd for King Charles the II. order'd and preferib'd by his Phyficians for his own ufe in his latter days, far exceeds the two former in Vertue against all cold Distempers of the Head and Brain, all affects of the Nerves and Joints, &c. The Preparation of which the great Pretenders and Sellers of the Hungarian-Water, have no knowledge of, thô they pretend to have been in the King's Laboratory; The Secret of it was impart'd to me by an honourable Lady, who had it of the Illustrious Prince

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Prince Rupert, and I am under an obligation not to publish it; but I prepare it and fell it to many of the Nobility and Gentry in this Kingdom.

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XXIII. A Lemon VV ater by Infusion.

Take the thin yellow rinds of twelve Lemons, infuse them in good Brandy and fair Water of each three pints, for three or four days; then strain it and sweeten it with Loaf-Sugar two ounces to a quart.

XXIV. Sir K. Digby's Cordial Poppy-water for Surfeits, as he had it prepar'd every year for has Family.

Take a wide mouth Glass of fix quarts, and put into it five quarts of the best Anifeed-water, then thrust in as many red Poppy-leaves as the the Glafs will contain, fo that it be topful, and let them infuse four and twenty hours, then itrain and prefs them out, and thrust in as many Poppies, and let them infuse as long, then strain them again and put in fresh, and let them infuse fix or seven days, then strain and prefs them well from the Liquor, and then strain the Liquor from the Dregs; then put into, it fix ounces of ston'd Raisons of the Sun, and a pound of Cherries the ripest you can get, and half a pound of fin'd Sugar. Such Perfons as do not love Anifeed-water, as I know ma-V 21 ny

ny Ladies cannot away with the tafte of it, they may make it with the compound Wormwood Water at Sect. 12 of this chap. which will make the Surfeit Water of greater Virtue. It is an excellent Cordial and Stomack-water; good in the Collick, and griping of the Guts, wind in the Bowels, and is admirable for Surfeits coming by eating Mutles, Sallets or Fruits, &c. Stop the Glafs clofe with a Corek fitted to it during the Infufion.

XXV. An other Cordial Poppy-VVater for Surfeits, as it is made by some Ladies.

Take half a Peck of Poppies, Cowflips, flowers of Sage, Rofemary, Borage, Merrygold of each a handful, leaves of fweet Marjoram, Bettony and Baulm of each a handful, Mint and Carduus of each a little, Cinnamon half an ounce, Nutmegs two drams, fweet Fennel-feeds, Coriander-feeds, Juniper-berries all bruis'd of each a spoonful, Lignorice flic'd two ounces, Raifons of the Sun Iton'd, and Figs flic'd of each half a pound, Saffron two drams, bruife the Seeds, chop the Herbs, and put all together in three quarts of the best Aniseed-water, let it stand nine days; then strain it out and bottle it. You may put the Ingredients (when you have strain'd it) into a cold Still and draw a good Water from them. And you may take the Wormwood-water compound at Sect. XII. which is better then Anf-XXVL feed-water.

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XXVI. To make Surfeit Water, the Lady Spencers way.

Take of the best Brandy one Gallon, put it in a Jug, or a wide mouth Glass that will hold fix quarts, put into it half a pint of Rosewater, and as much Poppy-water, Raisons of the Sun one pound and half, Aniseeds made very clean, but not bruis'd, two ounces, Dates flic'd four ounces, a stick of Liquorice bruis'd; let them stand five days, stirring it once a day; then put into it four handfuls of red Poppiflowers, and press them down in the Liquor; let it stand four days longer, then press it out, and put into the Liquor Cloves and Mace of each fix drams, Nutmegs cut in pieces half an ounce, white Sugar-candy half a pound, stop it closs, and let the stores remain in it.

If you distil Rasps in a cold Still, and put a little of that Water into Sack, or other Wine, or into Claret or white Wine and Water; it will Aromatise it very strong of Rasps, and make it very pleasant. Two or three spoonfuls is sufficient to a quart of Sack, Sir K. Digby.

XXVII. The best-way to make Cherry-Brandys either Black or Red.

Prefs out all the Juice from them, then framp the stores and skin to a mash; put V_3 that

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that into your Veffel, and pour the Brandy upon it, fhake them well together, and thus the Brandy will extract a Corroborating Vertue which is in the Kernels, and make the Brandy tafte of them. Phyficians do affirm that red Cherry-Brandy is a greater Cordial then that which is made of black Cherries; but the black Cherry-Brandy is better for the Head. You may run the Juice thrô a Gelly-Bag, or let it fettle, and then add it to the reft.

CHAP. XXXIX.

How to make the Strong-Water which the Distillers of London sell in their Shops.

1. To make Agua Vita common.

TAke ftrong proof Spirit one Gallon, Anifeeds bruis'd one ounce and half; Difil them into ftrong proof Spirits.

II. To make Aqua Vitæ proper.

Take strong Proof Spirit one Gallon, Aniseeds three ounces and two drams, Carraways, Coriander-seeds of each three ounces; Distil them into strong proof Spirit according to Art.

To Colour your Waters you may take Clove-Gillo-

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Gillo-flowers, or Poppy-flowers, or red Rofes, either of them in their feafon and dry them, and put them in Aqua Vita, or proof Spirit; or you may take red Sanders, and when the Tincture is drawn out of them; then draw off the Spirit and keep it to colour your Water with as you pleafe upon occasion; The proportion may be about half a pint to a Galion.

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III. To make Anifeed-VVater.

Take ftrong proof Spirit one Gallon, Anifeeds bruis'd half a pound; diftil them into ftrong proof Spirits, and fweeten it with half a pound of Sugar. If you double the quantity of the Anifeeds, the Water will yet be richer, and you may call it proper.

This Water strengthens the Stomach, expels Wind, eases pains of the Collick and Gripings of the Guts, and helps Digestion; and is also opening whereby it helps thortness of Breath, and difficulty of Breathing, Gre.

IV. To make Angelica-VVater.

Take strong proof Spirit three Gallons, Angelica six ounces six drams, or Angelica Herb green two pound sour ounces, Aniseed sour ounces seven drams; slice the Roots thin, or bruise them and the Seeds; then distil them into strong proof Spirits, and sweeten it with white Sugar a pound and half.

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If you would make it richer, add Carrawayfeeds, Coriander-feeds of each feven drams and a half, Calamus, Aromaticus of each eleven drams fifteen grains, Ani-feeds, Caffia Lignea of each two ounces three drams thirty grains, Angelica Roots two ounces three drams thirty grains, or of the Herb nine ounces four drams thirty grains, white Sugar twelve ounces. And then you may call it Angelica Water proper. It is a very good Cordial, ftrengthens the Stomach and inward parts, is good againft Poifon, fainting and fwooning Fits, and a preferver againft the Plague and other infections.

V. To make VVormwood-Water.

Take ftrong proof Spirits three Gallons, Anifeeds bruis'd four ounces feven drams, common Wormwood dry Leaves and Seeds ten ounces and a half; Diftil them into fine goods and dulcify with white Sugar a pound and half. If you would make it richer, add Cinnamon, Cubebs of each one ounce one dram forthy-five grains, fweet Fennel-feeds, Ani-feeds of each two ounces three drams and half, Cloves, Carraway-feeds, Nutmegs of each feven drams and half, white Sugar twelve ounces, and then you may call it proper. It ftrengthens the Stomach, ftops Vomiting,

expels Wind, caufes a good appetit and a good digeftion, kills Worms, cafes pains of the Head : alto it is a great Cordial.

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VI. To make Baulm-Water.

Take strong proof Spirit three Gallons, dry'd Baulm thirty ounces and half, Ani-feeds feven ounces seven drams; Distil it into fine goods, and fweeten with Sugar a pound and half. If you would make it richer, you may add Garden Thime, Penny Royal of each a pugil, Cardamums four ounces and half. fweet Fennel-feeds, Ani-feeds of each two ounces three drams and half, dry'd Baulm four ounces and half, Nutmegs, Ginger, Calamus Aromaticus, Galingal, Cinnamon of each an ounce one dram fourty grains. This may be call'd Baulm-water proper. It strengthens the Heart, is good against fits of the Mother and vapours, eafes the after-pain of Women in their Lying in, and being taken before hand caufes a speedy Delivery.

VII. To make Mint water.

Take ftrong proof Spirit, three Gallons, Spear mint dry four ounces, two drams and five grains, Annifeeds four ounces feven drams, diftil it into fine goods, and dulcify with white Sugar one pound and half: If you will have it richer you may add, Spearmint dry and Anifeeds of each four ounces feven drams, Calamus Aromatiscus one ounce two drams one fcruple and five grains, white Sugar twelve ounces, and then 298 To make Strong Waters Ch.XXXIX.

then it may be call'd Mint water proper. It comforts and strengthens the Stomach, Heart, Liver and Spleen, it is good against Vomiting.

VIII. To make Rosemary water.

Take high proof Spirit three Gallons, Rofemary ftript and dry nine ounces, Anifeeds four ounces feven drams, diftil into proof Spirit and dulcify with Sugar a pound and half. If you will make it richer, add fweet Fennelfeeds, Cinnamon of each two ounces three drams and half, Anifeeds, Rofemary dry of each four ounces feven drams, Carrawayfeeds four drams and half, Spearmint dry a fmall handful, Sugar twelve ounces; this you may call Rofemary water proper. It is very good againft the Bloody-Flux, proceeding from a cold caufe, being drunk, and alfo three fpoonfuls of it given in a *Clifter*; It alfo preferves from Vomiting, and is good for the Stomach, Head and Brain.

IX. To make Lemon or Orange water.

Take good proof Spirit three Gallons, Lemon or Orange peels dry nine ounces, Anifeeds the beft five ounces, bruife the peels and feeds, and then diftil into fine Spirit, and dulcify with Sugar one pound and half. If you will make it richer you may add Carraways one ounce three drams and half, Annifeeds, Lemon or Orange peels dry of each four ounces feven

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feven drams, white Sugar twelve ounces; and thefe you may call Lemon or Orange water proper. Lemon water is a Cephalick Cordial and refifting Poifon; It fortifies the Brain, chears the Heart, revives the Spirits, ftrengthens the Stomach, and is good in fainting and fwooning Fits; It opens Obstructions, expels Wind in the Stomach, and is a great restaurative to such as are in a Confumption, It is good against Melancholy, making chearful and merry.

X. To make Marjoram water.

Take strong proof Spirit three Gallons, sweet Marjoram dry fifteen ounces, Anifeeds four ounces seven drams, Carraways one ounce three drams five grains, Calamas Aromaticas one ounce feven drams, bruise them and distil into fine goods according to Art, and dulcify with Sugar one pound and half. If you will have it richer add Cinnamon one ounce and half, Cloves half an ounce, Sugar twelve ounces; Then you may call it Marjoram water proper, or the greater.

XI. To make Stomach water the Deffer.

Take strong poof Spirit three Gallons, Spearmint dry, Lovage-roots dry, Aniseeds of each sour ounces seven drams, Calamus Aromaticus, Ginger, sweet Fennelseeds, Masterwort-roots, Wormwood dry and stript, of each two oun-

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ces five drams, Carraways and Corianderfeeds of each one ounce feven drams and half, bruife them that are to be bruifed, diftil them into itrong proof Spirit, and dulcify with white fugar one pound and half.

XII. To make Stomach water the Greater.

Take ftrong proof Spirit three Gallons, Calamus Aromaticus one ounce seven drams, Guiacum, green Bark, Avens-roots dry, Galingal of each twelve ounces, Citron peels dry, Orange peels dry, Winters-bark of each one ounce one dram two scruples and five grains, common WormWood dry, Roman Wormwood dry, Spearmint, Rosemarytops, Costmary, fweet Marjoram, wild Thime all dry, of each four drams and half, Nutmegs, Cinnamon of each fix drams, Cubebs, Cardamums of each three drams two scruples and five grains, fweet Fennelseeds, Corianderleeds of each one ounce and half, Anifeeds fix ounces one dram, bruise those that are to be bruis'd, and then diffil into ftrong proof Spirit which dulcify with white Sugar.

XIII. To make Ufquebauch.

Take strong proof Spirit one Gallon, Aniseeds one ounce five drams, Cloves one dram and half, Nutmegs, Ginger, Carraway of each three drams; Distil them into strong proof Spirit;

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Spirit; then add to the diftil'd Water Spanish Liquorice bruis'd, Raifons of the Sun flic'd of each three ounces one dram and half, Sugar half a pound, Saffron one dram; let it stand ten days; then draw it off and keep it for use. It is pectoral and stomachal, helps expectoration, causes appetite and a good digestion, and is a good cordial.

XIV. To make Balfamint-Water:

Take of Good Proof Spirit three Gallons, Balfamint dry nine ounces and half a a dram, Anifeeds the best four ounces seven drams, Carraways one ounce one dram, Lemon peels dry two ounces three drams and half; bruife them, that are to be bruis'd, and diftil them into ftrong proof Spirit, and dulcify with white Sugar one pound and half. If you would make it stronger, you may add, fweet Fennel-feeds, Cinnamon of each one ounce and half, Nutmegs feven drams and half, Sugar twelve ounces, and then you may call it Balsamint-water the greater. It is a Cordial reveives the fpirit Natural, Vital and Animal, comforts the Languishing Heart, fortifies the Stomach, causes a good appetite and digestion, and expels Wind out of the Stomach and Bowels.

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XV. To make Rose, or Rosa Solis common and the lesser.

Take strong proof Spirit one Gallon, Rofa Solis four handfuls, biting Cinnamon fix drams and half, Cloves one dram and half, Nutmegs. Ginger, Carraways of each three drams, Marigold flowers, Ani-feeds of each one ounce five drams; bruife them and diftil them into ftrong proof Spirit according to Art. Then add to the diffil'd Water, Spanish Liquorice bruis'd one ounce and five drams, Raifons of the Sun flic'd, Sugar half a pound, red Sanders three ounces, stir them well together, let them stand twelve days and then being fine draw it off. If you would make it richer, you may add half as much more of each of the former Ingredients, and in steed of the red Sanders the Tincture of Rofes, Gillo-flowers, or Corn Poppy-flowers a sufficient quantity; And then you may call it Rofa Solis the greater.

XVI. To make Rofe, or Rofa Solis proper.

Take ftrong proof Spirit three Gallons, Rofa Solis, gather'd in due season and clean pick't, one pound three ounces one dram two scruples five grains, Juniper-berries fourteen ounces three drams and half, Saffafras with the Bark, Carraways of each nine drams two scruple five grains; Marigold-flowers four ounces

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ounces feven drams, Ani-feeds feven ounces two drams and half; bruife them that are to be bruis'd, and diftil into fine goods; then take of this Spirit one pound twelve ounces four drams and half, to which add of the water, call'd Precious Water dulcifi'd (at Sect. XXV. following) one ounce five drams, Liquorice bruis'd one ounce five drams. It opens Obftructions, refifts Poyfon, Plague, Contagious, Malign and Epidemical Dileafes, is excellent against the Stone and Gravel, whether in the Reins or Bladder, provoks Urin, comforts the Stomach, caufes appetite and a good digestion, is good against the falling Sickness and restores decaying Nature.

X VIII. To make Clove-VVater.

Take strong proof Spirit three Gallons, Cloves three ounces, Ani-feeds four ounces seven drams; bruise them, and distil into strong proof Spirit, and dulcify with Sugar one pound and half. It helps Digestion, expels Wind, provokes Urin, chears the Heart, enlivens the Spirits, is good against Vapours, Fainting and swooning Fits, and strengthens the Stomach and Liver.

XVIII. To make Cinnamon VV ater common.

Take strong proof Spirit one Gallon, Cinnamon, sharp and biting, half a pound, Aniseeds

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feeds one ounce, bruife them and diftil them into ftrong proof Spirit according to Art, and dulcify with white Sugar half a pound.

XIX. To make Cinnamon water proper.

Take ftrong proof Spirit one Gallon, fharpbiting Cinnamon one pound, bruife it, and diftil it into ftrong proof Spirit, and dulcify it with Syrup of Rofe Water fix ounces and three drams, white Sugar a pound and half. It is an excellent Cordial, good againft Vomiting, loathing of the Stomach, fainting and fwooning fits, chears the Heart, and enlivens the Spirits, and is faid to be good for fuch as are Hecktick and Confumptive It is good againft all cold moift difeafes of the Head and Brain. You may make the one half of this Water perfum'd, and the other half without, by reafon that perfumes give offence to moft Women.

XX. To make sweet Fennelseed water.

Take ftrong proof Spirit one Gallon, sweet Fennelseds half a pound, Carrawayseeds three drams, Anifeeds one ounce and five drams, distil them into strong proof Spirit, and dulcify with white Sugar half a pound. If you would have it richer, you may add sweet Fennelseeds half a pound, Carrawayseeds three drams and five grains, Anifeeds one ounce and five drams, Cinnamon fix drams and half, Cloves a dram and

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and half, white Sugar fix ounces. It is good against pains in the Stomach, expels Wind, and is prevalent against the Collick and Griping of the Guts, as also against a vehement Cough:

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XXI. To make Marigoid water.

Take strong proof Spirit three Gallons, Marigold flowers new gather'd and clean pick'd, one Gallon and pint heap'd, bruife them, Anifeeds, fweet Fennelfeeds, of each three ounces, bruife them and diftil them into ftrong proof Spirit, and dulcify with white Sugar one pound and half. If you would have it richer, you may add Cinnamon biting, fweet Fennelseeds of each an ounce and half, Carroways, Cloves of each half an ounce and half a dram, Marigolds a pint and half well heap'd, Sugar four ounces, and this you may call Marigold water the greater. It is a good Cordial, expels wind, good against fainting and beating of the Heart, ftrengthens the Bowels, and is good against the Infection of the Plague or Pestilence.

XXII. To make Carraway water.

Take ftrong proof Spirit three Gallons, Carrawayseeds nine ounces, Anifeeds three ounces, Lemon peels dry, Cloves of each feven drams and half, bruise them, and distil them into strong proof Spirit, and sweetend with Sugar one pound and half. This water is prevalent X against

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against all Cold and Moist distempers of the Stomach and Bowels; it expels Wind, Comforts the Head and Brain, and takes away dulness, droufiness and sleepiness, exhilerates and revives the Spirits.

XXIII. To make Nutmeg-water.

Take strong proof Spirit one Gallon, choice Nutmegs two ounces, Anis. one ounce, bruife them and distil into strong proof Spirit, and dulcify with white Sugar half a pound. It comforts the Spirits, discusses Wind, strengthens the Stomach, causes a sweet Breath, prevails against the Collick, and provokes Urin.

XXIV. To make precious Water.

Take ftrong proof Spirit one Gallon, roots of Elecampane, Avens, Angelica, Cyprus, *Calamus Aromaticus*, Saffafrafs, of each half an ounce,Zedoary, Gallingal of each three drams, *Caffia Lignea*, *Lignum Rhodium*, yellow Sanders of each two drams and half, Citron peels, Orange peels dry of each half an ounce, two foruples and five grains, white Cinnamon, Nutmegs, Mace, Ginger of each half an ounce, fharp biting Cinnamon two ounces, Cloves, Cardamoms, Cubebs of each two drams, fweet Chervilfeeds, Bafilfeeds of each three drams, Corianderfeeds, fweet Fennelfeeds of each one ounce, Anifeed two ounces, bruife them and diftil

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diftil them into ftrong proof Spirit according to Art, and dulcify with white Sugar one pound and half, let it ftand till it is fine, then draw it off and perfume it with Musk fix grains, Ambergreece twenty four grains, keep it till it is clear and then uie it. It is good againft Poyfon, Plague and Malign Fevers, as alfo againft contagious and Epidemical Difeafes; it comforts and revives all the fpirits, Natural, Vital and Animal, corroborates and cheares the Heart, preferves the fenfes; and relieves languifhing Nature.

XXV. To make Wine water expelling Winds

Take strong proof Spirit one Gallon, roots of Elecampane dry, Aniseeds of each one ounce and five drams, Ciprus roots, bark of the root of the Baytree, or as much Bayleaves, Saffafras with its bark, white Cinnamon of each half an ounce two scruples and five grains, Calamas Aromaticus, Orangepeel dry of each three drams, Clary, Mint, Calamint, Elderflowers, Camomilflowers of each half an ounce, fweet Fennelseeds Carraways, Angelicaseeds, Cardemoms, Cubebs, grains of Paradife, Cloves, Ginger of each two drams, Pepper long and white of each one dram, bruise all grosfly ; diftil them into ftrong proof Spirit, and dulcify it with white Sugar. It is excellent to expel Wind, good against the wind Collick, Gripings of the Guts, against all cold and moist di-X 2 feales

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feafes of the Stomach and Bowels; a little dith of it taken just before eating, strengthens the Stomach and sharpness of the Appetite, causing a good Concoction and Digestion.

XXVI. To make a Water causing Sweat.

Take ftrong proof Spirit one Gallon, Butterbur roots dry three ounces one dram and half, roots of co nmon Velerian, Anifeeds of each one ounce five drams, roots of Swallow-wort, Saffafras with the Bark of each fix drams and half, Angelica leaves dry, Carduus Ben. great Valerian leaves and roots all dry, Scordium of each one ounce a dram and half, Cowflip-flowers, Marigold-flowers of each one ounce, Juniperberries two ounces, bruile them all, diffil them into proof Spirit and dulcify with white Sugar. It caufes fweat powerfully, expels Malignaty and Venom from the Heart in the Plague, and all forts of Malign Fevers, and drives forth the fmall Pox and Meafles.

XXVII. To make Surfeit water.

Take strong proof Spirit three Gallons, Juniperberries nine ounces sour drams and half, Elecampane roots dry sour ounces seven drams, *Calamus Arramaticus*, Gallingal of each nine drams, Wormwood, Spearmint, red Mint all dry or each fix drams, Carrawayseeds, Angelicaseeds, of each sour drams and half, Sastatras

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fras roots with the Bark, white Cinnamon of each four drams and half, Nutmegs, Mace, Ginger, Cloves of each half an ounce five grains, Corn Poppy-flowers, ten ounces and half, Anifeeds twelve ounces, bruife them all, diffil them into fine goods and dulcify with Sugar. It is good against all forts of Surfeits proceeding from Heats or Colds, Gluttony, by over Eating and Drinking, Ge.

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XXVIII. To make Scorbutical water, or Water against the Scurvy.

Take firong proof Spirit one Gallon, Horfradifh-roots dry three ounces, Elicampane dry, Anifeeds of each one ounce five drams. Water-Creffes, Winter-Creffes, Garden-Creffes, Tarragan, Balfamint, Garden Scurvy-grafs, Wormwood, Brooklime, Water Trefoil, tweet Chervil of each one ounce to temples five grains, Arfmat hot fix drams and half, feeds of Muftard, Branch Creffes, Roket and Radifh of each two drams and half, Citron and Orange peels dry, white Cinnamon, Mace, of each three drams fifteen grans, bruife them all, diffil them into a ftrong proof Spirit, and fweeten it with white Sugar.

Take of this Spirit feven parts, Juice of Lemons depurated one part, or more, mix them and dulcify with white Sugar a fufficient quantity. It is good in a cold Scorbute, where the habit of Body is Cold, Moist and Flegmatick;

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If you put half the quantity of juice of Lemons to it, it may be useful in a Hot Scorbute.

XXIX. To mak Plague water.

Take strong proof Spirit three Gallons, Roots of Butterbur dry four ounces and seven drams, Garden and common Valarian-roots both dry, Angelica roots, Masterwort-roots, Gentian, Elecampane, Snake-grafs-roots of each one ounce an half two drams and five grains, Contrayerva, Zedoary, Galingal of each an ounce one dram two scruples and five grains, leaves of Rue, white Hoarhound, Scordium, Cardius Benedictus of each one ounce and half, Elderflowers, Lavender and Mace of each feven drams and half, Citron peels dry, Juniperberries of each two ounces three dams and half, green Walnuts with the husks four ounces and seven drams, Venice Treacle and Mithridate of each four drams an half, Anifeeds feven ounces two drams an half, Camphir two drams and fifteen grains, distil them into fine Spirit, and dulcify with white Sugar three pound or what fuffices. It is good against all Malign and Pestilential diftempers; in the Imall Pox and Measles, let the party infected take of this Water one ounce mixt with warm poffet drink and kept very warm, and fweat well thereupon. Sceanother Plague water in the foregoing chapter of Cordial waters.

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XXX. To make Lavender Water.

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Take firong proof Spirit one Gallon, Lavender leaves dry four ounces fix drams and half, Mace fix drams and half, Nut-megs one ounce five drams, Stoechados fix drams and half; bruife them, Diftil them into firong proof Spirit, and dulcify with white Sugar. It is good against all cold and moist Difeases of the Head and Brain, vehement Head-achs and Megrims, proceeding from a cold cause. It also prevails against the Vertigo, Epilepsy, Convulsions, Cramps, Palsies, Apoplexies, and Passions of the Heart, as Fainting, Swooning, Trembling, Palpitation, & And it restoreth Speech lost.

XXXI. To make Sage-Water.

Take firong proof Spirit one Gallon, great Sage dry four ounces fix drams and half, red Sage dry three ounces one dram and half, Lavender-flowers, Sage-flowers of each one ounce one dram; Lavender Cotton dry, Southerwood dry of each fix drams and half, Nutmegs one ounce; bruife or beat them as is moft proper: Diftil them into ftrong proof Spirit and dulcify with white Sugar. It has the Vertue of the former, and is very good for fuch as are of a Cold and Flegmatich habit of Bedy, are Melanchaly, and of a dul and heavy Spirit. X 4 XXXII. 312 To make Strong Waters Ch.XXXIX.

XXXII. To make Water of Flowers.

Take ftrong proof Spirit one Gallon, put it into a wide mouth'd Glass, Pitcher or other Veffel, stopt very close. Take those several Flowers following in their Seafons, and being clean pick't, put them to the Spirit in the Veffel; Viz. Cowflips, Lilly of the Vally, Woodbind, stock-Gillo-Flowers of all three forts, Damask-Rofes, Musk-Rofes, Sweet-Brier-Flowers, Clove-Gillo-Flowers, Jefemin, Citron and Orange-flowers (or 'the Peels) Flower of the Tile-tree, Garden Thyme, Lemon Thyme, wild Thyme, Lavend, Marigold, Camomil, Melilot, Elder of each fix drams and half: being furnished with all these Flowers, when you would Distil them, add Ani-feeds three ounces one dram and half, Coriander feeds one ounce five drams; bruise the Seeds, and it would be best to bruise all the Flowers as you put them into the Spirit : Distil them according to Art : Then add to the diftil'd Water, Rofes, Clove-Gillo-flowers, Elder-flowers of cach one ounce five drams, after twelve days infusion strain it, and sweeten it. It is a great Cordial, fitted for all cold and moift Difeafes of the Head, Brain Heart and Bowels; It is good against the Falling-Sickness.

XXXIII. To make Water of Fruits. Take strong proof Spirit one Gallon, Juniper berries

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berries fix ounces three drams fifteen grains, Quince-parings dry, Pippin-parings dry of each three ounces one dram and half, Lemon and Orang-peels dry of each one ounce five drams, Nugmeg three drams fifteen grains, Ani-feeds three ounces one dram and half, Diftil them according to Art; Then dulcify it with Syrup of Fruits. It is a good Stomatick, comforts, corrobarats and ftrengthens the Ventricle, weakn'd by Surfeits or other Diftempers.

The Syrup of Fruits is thus made.

Take Apricocks, Quinces, Cherries, Currans all full ripe, take out the stones of the Quinces and Apricocks, and flice them very thin, Stone the Cherries and bruife them and the Currans; then lay them in a flat Basin or Pan, thus, A lay of Fruit a fingers thickness, and a lay of white pouder Sugar of the fame thickness, and fo proceed in order lay upon lay till all be laid into the Bafin : Then pour on good Brandy gently till all be cover'd therewith, and fo let it stand, three or four hours; After bruise or mash them all together, and prefs out the Juice as dry as possible may be; Let it stand till it is clear fettl'd which evaporate gently to the thickness of a Syrup; or you may Distil off the Brandy and part of the moifture in Balneo, for it is pitty to loofe it, to the thickness of a Syrup : And in fteed of the Apricocks you may take Pippins. One pound of it dulcifies eight pounds of the Spirit.

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XXXIV. To make Avens-Water.

Take ftrong proof Spirit one Gallon, Avens-Roots fix ounces three drams fifteen grains, Orrice-Roots, Nutmegs, Mace, yellow Sanders of each one dram and half, Saffron, Storax, Benjamin, Lignum Rhodium of each two fcruples five grains, Angelica-Roots two drams and half, fresh Lemon peels fix drams and half, fweet Fennel-Seeds of each one ounce five drams, Roman Wormwood, Mint dry'd of each a pugil, red Roses, Stechas-flowers of each a little handful, fweet Marjoran, Baulm, Burnet, Thym, all dry, of each half a handful; bruife them, and diffil them according to Art, and dulcify with Syrup of Alkermels. This is a great Cordial, strengthens the Heart, exhiterats and revives the Spirits, and indeed the univerfal fram, and confirms the healthful Tone of the Viscera. It removes Sadness and Melancholy, and reftores in Confumptions.

Syrup of Alkermels is thus made :

Take Rofe-water one pint, white Sugar two pounds and half; boil to a Syrup, then add Confection of Alkermefs one ounce, Syrup of Clove-Gillo-flowers four ounces, let thefe boil a little till they are incorporated with the Syrup and fo keep it for ufe, one pound of it dulcifies eight pounds of the Cordial-water. It may truly be call'd a Cordial Syrup. They that love Amber-greece may add fifteen grains of it. XXXV. Ch.XXXIX. as fold in the Shops. 315

XXXV. To make Imperial Water.

Take of the yellow thin rinds of Citrons and Oranges dry, Nutmeg, Cloves, Cinnamon of each four ounces, three Roots of Flower de Luce, Cyprus, Calamus Aromaticus, Zedoary, Galingal, Ginger of each one pound. of the tops of Lavender and Rofemary of each four handfuls; Leaves of the Bay-tree, Marjoran, Baulm, Mint, Sage, Thyme, white and Damask Rofes of each one handful, Rofewater one Gallon, white Wine two Gallons; bruife what is to be bruis'd, and infuse them four and twenty hours; then diftil it. This Water strengthens and coroborats the Heart, and is therefore good for fuch as are fubject to fainting and fwooning Fits, and Palpitations of the Heart, and is a prefervative against the Apoplexy.

XXXVI. To make Juniper-berry VVater, as it is made in Germany and Holland.

Take ftrong proof Spirit three Gallons, Juniper-berries bruis'd one pound and half, fweet Fennel Seeds four ounces, Carraway-feeds one ounce, bruife them and diftil them into fine goods, and dulcify with white Sugar a pound and half. If you would have it richer you may add Cinnamon and Cloves of each one ounce, Lemon and Orange peels of each an ounce

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ounce and half. It is excellent to expel Wind out of the Stomack and Bowels; prevails against the Collick and Gripings of the Guts; It opens Obstructions, results Poyson, Plague, Contagious, Malign and Epidemical Difeafes. is excellent against the Stone, Sand and Gravel, whether in the Reins or Bladder, it provocks Urin, comforts the Stomach, causes a good Appetite and a good Digestion, chears the Heart and revives the Spirits. If you Distil any of these Strong Waters (or any of the Cordial - Waters in the foregoing Chapter) in a fmall quantity, then your best way will be to Diftil them in Balneo, which indeed makes the fweetest and best Waters; and in fteed of Sugar you may fweeten them with a Syrup that you have from the Sugar-Bakers : It is a Syrup that runs down from the Sugar-Loaves as they stand to dry : This Syrup will never congeal, and will keep many years without fowring. There is two forts of it; the first, which is of the Sugar of the first refining, which is very brown, but clear and very thick; The fecond, which is of the finest or double refin'd, this I use and Sir Kenelm Digby used it. It is pure clear and white, like Rock-water, it will go farther and be cheaper to you than Loaf-Sugar, for less than a pint will serve for a Gallon of Cordial-waters put it in and shake them well together. If you will Aromatife it with Amber, put half an ounce of the Effential Tincture of Amber to a Pottle of Cordial water. CHAP.

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Of Cordials and Cordial Juleps.

I. The Essential Tincture of Amber-Greece, as it was made in Sir Kenelm Digby's Elaboratory.

TAke eight parts of Amber greece, and one part of Musk, grind them with an equal part of Sugar-candy, then put them in a Matrafs and pour upon them good fpirit of Wine that will burn all away; To half an ounce of Amber and half a dram of Musk, put a quart of the Spirit; ftop the Matrafs clofs, and put it in digeftion in warm Horfe-dung for the space of four days, or in fome other gentle heat; then pour off the clear (whiles it is warm) into a Vial, and keep it clofs ftopt.

Lemery makes it thus :

Take two drams of good Amber-greece, and as much Sugar-candy, half a dram of Musk, and two grains of Civet, grind them together, and put this mixture into a Matrafs, and pour upon it four ounces of good Spirit of Wine, ftop it very clofs, and put it in digeftion in Horfe-dung for the fpace of four days; Then take it out and pour off that which is clear whileft it is warm, for it congeals when it grows cold : This Effence acts with more force than the Amber-greece in fubftance : The Dofe

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Dofe is from fix drops to twelve in any convenient Liquor. The Terresterial part which remains in the bottom may serve to mixt with fome fweet Pouders.

II. Dr. Breffius a Phisitian at Paris, makes a Cordial VVater of Wall-Nuts thus :

The first thing that buddeth out of these Trees, is a long green excression like Pine-Apples, which is call'd their flower. Distil the Water of these, and keep it. Then when the Nuts are as big as Hassenuts, Stamp them and strain out the Juice; which Distil till you have the matter remaining in the bottom of a thick substance, like an extract; which keep as also the water, when the Nuts are grow'n big, and have but a gelly in them, then stamp them as before, and Distil their Juice to a like confissence as the other : Mingle your three Waters together, and this is his Water of Wal-Nuts, which is a great Cordial, Sir Kenelm Digby.

III. To make a Plaster that Comforteth and Strengthens the Stomach wonderfully.

Take the two thick confiftences (remaining after Distilling the two Juices) put them together, and put to them a little Venice-Turpentine, an eight or tenth part, or a little more, a little pouder of Cinnamon and Cloves, Ch.XL. and Cordial Juleps.

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and a little Wheat-flower to thicken it, alfo a little Salt; and keep it in a pot all the yeat to make a Plaster of it for the Stomach, from the Sternum to the Navil, and fix of eight fingers breath, which let remain on as long as it will flick, taking it off fometimes to wipe a little water that fometimes it draws. If you have none of this composition ready, take two or three preferv'd Wal-nuts (preferv'd black, not green, or white) and framp them to a Pulp, and mingle with them about as much Turpentine as a Hafle-nut, and fome Wheatflower to thicken it and a little Salt, and a little pouder of Cinnamon and Cloves; and make a Plaster of this for want of the other. You should so proportion your Sustances or Nuts, as to have about a like quantity of Juice of each; as also fo much of the flowers, as to have so much Distil'd Water as out of either of the Juices. In crudities and indigestion of the Stomach when a loofness followeth he prescribs two or three days very flender diet. and then to eat a Mornings three or four preferved Wal-Nuts, and to drink a little Wine after them, eating a Mouthful of Bred; this coroborats the Stomach and fets it very right. The Nuts are preferv'd black, the way of preferving them will be fet down in the Chap. of Preferving. When the faid Dr. will make Cinnamon Water, he uses onely this Cordial Water of Wal-nuts, without Wine or any other Liquor to the Cinnamon, and holds it for a great Cordial. Sir K. Digby. IV.

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1V. A precious Cordial-Water of great Vertue, call'd the Golden-Pally-Water, Coppied from My Lord Portland's Copy, that he had from My Lady Lovelace, Compos'd by Dr. Matthews.

Take Flowers of Lavender two quarts, Spirit of Wine one Gallon and half, digest them in a Glais Bottle clois stopp'd in the Sun for fix days; then diftill in a Limbeck, or Copper Vefica with its refigeratory, and keep the Spirit. Take Flowers of Sage, Rofemary, Bittony, Borage, Buglofs, Lillies of the Valls and Cowflips. of each half a handful, put them all into a Gallon of Spirit of Wine, and put into them Leaves of Baulm, of Fetherfew, tops of Rofemary, Flowers of Stechas and Barberries of each half an ounce, pour upon them the fore going Spirit of Lavender-Flowers, and digeft them twenty four hours, then Diftil it according to Art : Then put into this Spirit the thin yellow rind of Citron-peel, and Peony-feeds husked of each three ounces, Cinnamon, Mace, Nutmegs, Cardemums, Cubebs, yellow Sanders of each two drams, Lignum-Aloes half a dram; bruife them all, and digest for four and twenty hours : Then only strain it, and put it up for use. Take Pearls prepar'd one dram, Saffron a scruple, red Roses dry'd, and red Sanders of each two drams, Citron-peels dry'd and pouder'd one dram, put them all in a Sarcenet Bag, and hang it in the Spirit. H

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It is of great Vertue and efficacy againft the Palfy, Apoplexie, Falling Sicknefs, and all cold Diftempers of the Head, Brain and Womb; It chears and comforts the Heart, revives and exhilerates the Animal and Vital Spirits, Coroborates, ftrengthens and warms **2** weak and cold Stomach, and recovers loft Apetites: It is excellent againft Hifterick Fits and Vapours, Convulfions, Pains of the Head, Megrims, Vertigees, lofs of Memory, Dimnefs of Sight, Melancholy, Fainting and Swooning Fits, Palpitation of the Heart, helps Barrennefs in Women. The Dofe is from half **a** fpoonful to a whole Spoonful in Wine, or black Cherry Water, or any fit Vehicle.

V. The best way to Distil a most Odoriferous, and spirituous Rose-water, far beyond any that can be Drawn by any ordinary-means, and as much to be commended for its pleasant and penetrating Odour, as for its Vertues.

Take twenty pounds of Damask-Rofes pick'd, ftamp them, mix and beat with them by degrees one pound of Bay-Salt pouder'd; put this into a large Earthen Pitcher or into two Crufh, and ftamp them down very clofe, order it fo that the Pitcher may be quite full; then ftop it up clofe with a Cork fitted to it; and clofe it up with yellow Wax made warm, fo that no air can get in; then tie a Bladder about it, and fet it in a Cellar for fix weeks; then open Y

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the Pitcher, and take out a pound of these ferment'd Roses, and Distil them in Balneo to dryness almost : Then take them out, and make the Cucurbit clean, and fill it again with fresh Roses out of the Pitcher; stop the Pitcher up close again; then pour upon the Roses the Water that you distil'd; Distil it as before until the Roses be almost dry; then take them out and put in fresh Roses, and pour upon them the Distil'd water, and distil again as before. Continue doing thus till you have distil'd all your Roses. This Rose-water is a great Cordial.

VI. A Cordial to procure fleep and reft.

Take a quart of the beft Claret or red Port Wine, put into it Cowflip-Flowers dry, Borrage-flowers of each a handful, a flip of Rofemary; fet it on the Fire, and when it is ready to burn, fmother it in the first flame, and keep it in the Pot till it is cold : Then strain it and put thereto three ounces of Syrup of Clove-Gillo-flowers, mingle them well together, and every night at your going to bed, take a Wineglass of it; you must not warm it the fecond time.

VII. An other excellent Cordial to cause rest and sleep in a Fever, or when one is oppress'd with pain, as also in a Surfeit or after Physick. Take Confection of Alkermes one dram and half

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half, Diafcordium one dram, Syrup of Clove Gillo-flowers a good fpoonful, Dragon-water or red Poppy-water, or Carduus-Water, as the Difeafe requires two ounces, mix them well together; and take it at your going to Bed. It is an excellent Cordial.

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VIII. A Cordial Julep.

Take the Water of Lettice, Purflain, Cowflips of each two ounces, Treacle-water, Plaguewater of each one ounce, Confection of Hyacinth one fcruple, with Syrup of Meconium what fuffices, mix and make a Julep : The Dofe is from three to four or five spoonfuls, at pleafure.

IX. A Pearl Cordial Julep.

Take Water of Citrons, Borage, Baulm, Black-Cherries of each three ounces, Spirit of Black-Cherries, or Spirit of Citrons one ounce, double refin'd Sugar fix drams, Pearls prepar'd one dram and half, mingle them well together, give five or fix fpoonfuls at a time in any fainting. Dr. Bate.

X. An other Pearl-Cordial:

Take of the Distill'd waters of Citron, Wood-Sorrel, Dragons and Carduus of each one ounce, Aqua Mirabilis fix drams, Pearls prepar'd one Y 2 dram.

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dram Syrup of Clove-Gillo-flowers one ounce, thake them together in a Glafs, and take it by Spoonfuls, as is before direct'd, thaking the Glafs every time. Dr. Harvy.

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XI. Another Pearl Cordial.

Take black Cherry water, Milk-water, Barly, Cinnamon-water one ounce, prepar'd Peatls a dram and half, Sugar-candy as much as is fufficient, add Damask-Rofe-water half a dram, mix them for a Cordial Julep : The Dofe is four or five fpoonfuls, in fickness or fainting Fits. Dr. Sydenbam.

XII. A Cordial Julep.

Take Milk-water, Black-Cherry-water of each three ounces, Plague-water, Syrup of Clove-Gillo-flowers, Syrup of Citrons of each half an ounce, mix them and make a Julep, which is to be taken frequently. Dr. Sydenbam.

XIII. An other Pearl-Cordial.

Take the Waters of Wood-Sorrel, whole Citrons, Strawberries of each four ounces, Syrup of the Juice of Citrons an ounce, Pearl prepar'd a dram, make a Julep; The Dofe is two ounces, three or four times a day. Dr. Willio.

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XIV. A Cordial call'd the Ladies Cordial, or VVater.

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Take Canary-Wine half a pint, Rofe-water a pint and half, double refin'd Sugar three pound, make of thefe a Syrup, to which add Aqua Imperialis fix drams, Aqua Celeftis three pints, yellow Sanders one ounce, Saffron one dram, mix them, and if you would have it Perfum'd add Amber greece one dram, Musk an eight part, ground together with a dram of Sugar-cardy, and then ty'd in a Sarcenet.

X V. A Cordial Syrup.

Take Cloves, Ginger of each two drams, Cinnamon one dram, bruife them, and infufe them in a quart of Rhenish-Wine, red Rose water five ounces, boil it a little; then add double refin'd Sugar ten ounces; make a Syrup, to which add Musk and Amber-greece of each three drams ty'd in a Rag.

Note, That Pearls prepar'd is only ground on a Marble with a little Rose-water, into an impalpable Pouder; and in the same manner are prepar'd Crabs-Eyes, Coral, and other Alkalys.

XVI. A Cordial Julep, call'd the Purple Julip.

Take Syrup of Violets three ounces, Oyl of Y 3 Vitrio

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Vitriol or Sulphur thirty drops, Barly water, or fair Water a quart. It is very good to quench thirst in burning Fevers, and to abate the violent heat of it; and it carries off the Morbifick matter by Urin. Dr. Bate.

XVII. The Vital Julep, or Julep of Life.

Take two yolks of new laid Eggs, Loaf Sugar half an ounce, Oyl of Cinnamon three drops, white Port, or Canary-Wine fix ounces, mix them very well. It is indeed a good Cordial Julep, gives great relief in Fainting and Swooning Fits, Coroborates and Strengthens where there is an extraordinary Debility or Weaknefs, it is good for Women who are apt to Mifcarry. It is alfo good in Confumptions. Dr. Bate.

XVIII. The best way to make the Cordial Syrup of Clove-Gillo-Flowers.

Take of the beft Clove-Gillo-flowers cut of from their white ftrings one pound, put them into a large Pewter Flagon, or a new Earthen Pipkin glaz'd within, and firft foak'd in water, then pour upon them a quart of fcolding hot Water, thruft the flowers down, and cover the Pipkin with its cover very clofe, and fet it all night in the Celler; then ftrain and prefs it out, put the Liquor into the Pipkin again, and put into it three pound and half of fingle refin'd

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fin'd Sugar in pouder; fet the Pipkin on a clear Charcoal Fire, and make the Liquot only luke-warm, ftirring it all the while that the Sugar may diffolve, and that is enough. Take head you do not boil it, for then you would fpoil the Syrup, by reafon that would occafion a great lofs of those fragrant cordial Spirits; as learn'd Physicians will tell you : And you need not to fear, but this Syrup will keep many years. After the fame manner you may make the Cordial Syrups of Violets, Cowflips and of Marigolds, all without boiling.

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XIX. To make the Syrup of red Corn-Poppies.

Take red Poppy-flowers newly gather'd two pounds, put them into your Pewter Flaggon or Pipkin, and pour upon them two quarts of boiling hot Water; thruft them down, and cover them clofe, and let them ftand one day and night, theu ftrain and prefs out the Liquor, which put into your Pipkin again with three pounds and half of Sugar in Pouder, fet it on a clear Fire and boil it gently to a Syrup The better way to make this Syrup is thus.

Take two pints of the Juice of red Poppyflowers, clarify it with the whites of two Eggs, beaten and their shells crush'd with your hands; then put to it a pound and three quarters of white Sugar, and boil it gently to a Syrup. Dr. Harvy. X 4 XX.

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XX. A Cordial compound Syrup of Baulm.

Take the Roots of Vipers-grafs, white Dittany, Buglofs, Cinquefoil well pickt, of each two ounces, white Tartar in fine pouder one ounce and half, Leaves of fresh Baulm three handfuls, Mint, Scabious, Divels-bit of each one handful, Seeds of Citron, Bafil, Sorrel and Carduus Benedictus; bruife the Roots and the the feeds, and chop the Herbs fmall; and having boil'd the roots and the feeds first with the Tartar in four quarts of Fountain-water for half an hour, then put in the Herbs, and let them boil a quarter of an hour longer; then strain it and press out the Liquor, and add to it half a pint of the Juice of Baulm, clarify it with the whites of two Eggs beaten and the Shells crush'd with your hands; then add four pound of white Sugar, and boil it gently to a Syrup. When it is cold put into it the Oyls of Citron and Orange peels of each two drams, incorporat'd first with white Sugar. It strengthens the Heart, revives the Spirits, defends all the Noble Parts against Pestilential Air, and Contigious Diseases : It prevents the Putrefraction of the Humours, chearifhes the Natural-heat, creates an Appetit and helps Digestion. The Dose is from half an ounce to an ounce, either alone or mixt with Potions, Bolus or other Medicines. Dr. Charras in his Royal Difpensatory.

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XXI. To make Syrup of Pippins.

Take of the Juice of Pippins two pints, fet it for some days in the Sun to clarify, then add three pounds of white Sugar, and boil it over a gentle Fire to a Syrup. It is account'd a high Cordial, and very proper against Palpitations of the Heart, especially when they proceed from Melancholy, Vapours arrifing from the Spleen. It qualifies the heats of Collerick Fevers; It is also very good for the Cough of the Lungs and Hectick Fevers. You may also make the Syrup of Pippins without Fire, thus : Wipe them clean, but do not pare them, then cut them into round flices as thin as you can, taking out the Cores, lay the flices in a hair Sieve fet in a Basin, then cover them with their thickness in Sugar; then lay an other lay of the flices, and continue these layers of Pippins and Sugar till the Sieve be full; then cover it and fet it in a cool place for three days, and you shall have a Syrup of a good Confiftency. This Syrup thus made without Fire undergoes no alteration, being endu'd with all the good quality that can be expected; The Sugar will draw out all the Juice of the Pippins.

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Of Chose Select and Approv'd purging Medecins.

I. A Common Purging Potion.

TAke half an ounce of Tammarinds, two drams of Sena, one dram and half of Rubarb; boil them in a fufficient quantity of water to three ounces, then strain them, and sweeten with Manna and Solutive syrup of Roses, of each one ounce, mix them for a Potion. Dr. Sydenbam.

II. An other Universal Purgative Potion.

Take of the best Sena, half an ounce, sweet Fennel seeds bruis'd one dram, steep them all Night in somewhat more then a quarter of a pint of Ale-posset very clear, next Morning strain and press it out, and dessolve in the Liquor one ounce of good Manna, then strain it again Dr. Harvy.

III. An other Universal Purgative Potion.

Take of Polipody of the Oak half an ounce, Agrymony a handful, fix damask-Prunes, one ounce

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ounce of Currans, half an ounce of Sena, one dram of Anifeeds bruis'd, boil them gently for a quarter of an hour in half a pint of water, prefs the Liquour through a strainer, and sweeten it with brown Sugar. Dr. Harvy.

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IV. An other Universal Purge.

Take two drams of Sena, one dram of Rubarb, two fcruples of Agarick, half a dram of fweet Fennelseds, a fcruple of Cinnamon; fteep them all Night in somewhat more than a quarter of a pint of the Decoction of Currans, next Morning press the Liquor thro a strainer, and diffolve in it one ounce of syrup of Roses Laxative. Dr. Harvy.

V. An other.

Take Sena half an ounce, Liquorice bruis'd two drams, falt of Tarter a fcruple, Water three quarters of a pint, mix and infuse them in a fimmering heat for an hour and half close cover'd; then strain it out, and sweeten it with Manna or syrup of Roses Solutive for two Dofes. Dr. Salmon.

VI. A gentle Purging Potion.

Take Rubarb flic'd three drams, yellow-Sanders half a dram, falt of Tartar a fcruple, make a cold Infufion all Night in Chichorywater

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water and white Wine of each two ounces and half, next Morning strain it, and dissolve in three ounces of the clear Livour syrup of Cichory with Rubarb half an ounce, Cinnamon water two drams, make a Potion. Dr. Willis.

VII. An other mean Purging Potion.

Take of the beft Sena three drams, Rubarb, Troches, Agarick of each a dram and half, yellow Sanders two fcruples, falt of Tartar half a dram, Corianderfeeds bruis'd a dram, infufe them all Night in fpring-water and white-Wine made warm of each three ounces, cover it clofe; to four ounces of the ftrain'd Liquor add of the purging fyrup of Pippins hereafter difcrib'd an ounce, Aqua Mirabilis two drams, make a Potion : Or take of the Decoction of Sena Gerionis four ounces, fyrup of Rofes Solutive an ounce, Cream of Tartar half a dram, Cinnamon-water two drams, make a Potion.

VIII. An other mean Potion.

Take the best Sena, Cassia Fistula, Tamarinds of each half an ounce, Corianderseeds bruis'd two drams; boil all in ten ounces of spring-water till a third part be consum'd, strain and clarify it with the white of an Egg beaten, and the shell crush'd with your hand, and add to it of the purging syrup of Apples an ounce, make a Potion.

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IX. A ftrong Purging Potion.

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XII

Take of the Decoction of Sena Gerionis, (with the addition of the strings of black Hellebor and Agarick of each a dram and half) fix ounces, syrup of Roses Solutive, or of the Flowers of Peaches an ounce, Aqua Mirabilis two drams.

X. An other.

Take Sena half an ounce, black Hellibore, Turbith of each two drams, yellow Sanders a dram, Corianderfeeds bruis'd a dram and half, falt of Tartar half a dram, Infuse them all Night close cover'd in half a pint of white-Wine made warm, to five ounces of the strain'd Liquor add of the Electuary of the Juice of Rofes three drams, syrup of Buckthorn fix drams, Cinnamon water two drams, make a Potion.

XI. A Potion of easy preparation for the Poor.

Take of Flaxweed a handful, fweet Fennelfeeds bruis'd two drams, boil them in a fufficient quantity of fpring water to fix ounces ; add of white Wine two ounces make a Potion. After the fame manner you may make a purging Potion of the dry leaves of Damask Rofes ; also of Peachleaves.

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XII. Purging Pills of a gentile Operation.

Take of Stomach pills with Gums, from a fcruple to half a dram, Tartar Vitriolated two grains, balfam of Peru what fuffices, make three or four Pills. After the fame manner may be made pills of the Mafs of Pill Ruffi, Pill Maftichin. Pill de fuccino.

XIII. Mean purging Pills.

Take of Stomach Pills with Gums half a dram, Rofin of Jalap from fourgrains to ten, Tartar vitriolated fix grains, Ammoniacum diffolv'd, as much as will fuffice, make four Pills. After the fame manner may be made pills of the Mafs of Crato's Amber Pills, and Quercetan's Pills of Tartar : Alfo inftead of Rofin of Jalap you may put Scammony fulphurated from fix grains to twelve, or Rofin of Scammony from eight grains to fourteen, Balfam of Peru what fuffices make four Pills : Or take Stomach Pills with Gums a fcruple, Rofin of Jalap from fix grains to twelve, balfam of Peru what fuffices, make four Pills.

XIV. Strong purging Pills.

Take Pill Rudij half a dram, Rofin of Jalap, from eight grains to twelve balfam of Peru what fuffices, make four pills to be taken with Go-

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Governance. After the like manner you may make pills of the Mafs of Pill Cochiæ, de sagapeno. Take the Mafs of Pill exduobus from a fcruple to half a dram, Calomelanos a fcruple, make four pills to be taken with Governance.

XV. Pills eafily prepar'd and Cheap.

Take pouder of the best Jalap two drams, Diagridium a dram, Cloves, Ginger of each a scruple, Ammoniacum dissolv'd what suffices, make a Mass, the Dose is half a dram. Take of Pill Cochiæ from half a dram to two scruples, make four pills.

XVI. An Excellent purging Pouder of my Lady Cri/p.

Take of the beft and mealy Sarfa Parilla three ounces, Roots of Jalap two drams, Hermodactils one ounce fix drams, Cream of Tartar one ounce, Ginger and Anifeed of each two drams two fcruples, Sena two ounces, Scammony one dram an fcruple; the Dofe is from half a dram to a dram in the Morning, in Poffet drink, warm Ale or white Wine.

XVII. A cheap purging Pouder and eafy to be got.

Take pouder of the Roots of the best Jalap a dram, Ginger a scruple, give it in a little draught of white Wine.

XVIII

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XVIII. That Excellent and much approx'd purging Pouder of Cornachinus.

Take Scammony fulphurated an ounce, Diaphoretick Antimony fix drams, cream of Tartar two drams, make of them a fine pouder, and mix them exactly, then put it in a Glafs vial and frop it clofs; the Dofe is from half a scruple to half a dram, or a whole dram. Cornachinus a Phyfitian in Italy is the Author of this Pouder, and has made a great commentary upon it; It operates quickly, fafely and pleafantly; it gently purges superfluous humors from the Bowels, and roots up the caufe and matter of Agues and Fevers. It is commended by learned Authors as one of the best Purges that can be prepar'd. Sir K. Digby had it always prepar'd for his Family. The Scammony fulphurated is prepar'd thus : Take Scammony one ounce, pouder it grosfly, spread it upon brown Paper, then take fome Charcoals kindl'd in a Chafindish or a fire Shovel, put upon it some Brimftone pouder'd, hold the paper with the Scammony over the flame of the Brimftone until you fee it grow moist, then let it cool and it will harden, then pouder it.

XIX. A gentle purging Boliss.

Take Lenitive Electuary half an ounce, cream of Tartar half a dram, fyrup of Roses what suffices, make a Bolus. XX. Chap. XLI. Purging Medicines.

X.X. An other purging Bolus.

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Take Caffia newly drawn half an ounce, pouder of Rubarb half a dram, cream of Tartar a fcruple, fyrup of Rofes what fuffices, make a Bolus.

XXI. A mean purging Bolus.

Take of the Lenitve Electuary half an ounce, cream of Tartar half a dram, Rofin of Jalap fix grains, fyrup of Rofes what fuffices, make a Bolus.

XXII. An other mean purging Bolus,

Take the Electuary Diaphænicon half an ounce, the compound pouder of Hermodactils half a dram, fyrup of Elder what fuffices, make a Bolus.

XXIII. A strong working Bolms.

Take of the Electuary of the Juice of Rofes half an ounce, Rofin of Jalap ten grains, cream of Tartar half a dram, fyrup of Elder what fuffices, make a Bolus.

Electuaries are compounds of the fame things made up in a greater quantity, by adding Conferves of Damask Rofes, or of the flowers of Peaches; the Dofe is the quantity of a Cheftnut to be taken betimes every Morning, or twice or thrice a Week.

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Bolus's

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Bolus's and Electuaries cafily prepar'd. Take Pouder of the Roots of Jalap an ounce, Mechoacan half an ounce, Ginger two drams, Cloves a dram, cream of Tartar three drams, falt of Wormwood a dram, fyrup of Rofes folutive what fuffices, make an Electuary; the Dofe is the quantity of a Walnut.

XXIV. Laxative or purging Raisons or Currans,

Take of the best Sena one ounce, Ginger, Cinnamon of each one scruple, Brandy half a pint, digest them warm for fix hours, strain and add Raisons of the Sun ston'd, or Currans four ounces, Sugar one ounce, boil them with a gentle fire till the fruit is soft, and let them be conferv'd together.

XXV. Laxative or purging Prunes.

They are prepar'd after the fame manner as the former, taking Damask Prunes inflead of Raifons or Currans. They gently purge the Bowels, expel Wind, and carry of fharp Humors, which caufes the Collic and griping of the Guts, Loofnefs's and Bloody Fluxes. They are of good ufe alfo for fuch whofe Bodies are hot and dry, and apt to be coffive; the Dofe is from half an ounce to an ounce or more at a time, according as you find your Body eafy or hard to work upon.

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XXVI. Purging Lozenges of a mean or gentle Operation.

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Take pouder of Mechoacan, Gummous Turbith of each half an ounce, Scammony fulphurated two drams, Rolin of Jalap a dram; yellow Sanders a dram, cream of Tartar two drams conferve of Violets an ounce, Sugar diffolv'd in Role water and boil'd up to a fit confiltancy a pound, make Lozenges according to Art each waying a dram, whereof take one or two at a time in the Morning.

XXVII. A Physical or purging Wine of a mean Operation.

Take of the beft Sena an ounce and half, Turbith, Mechoacan of each fix drams, ftrings of black Hellebor three drams, Cubebs, Galingal, bitting Cinnamon of each two drams, put all in a large Glafs with two quarts of Renifh wine, (or Elder wine) adding to it falt of Tartar a dram and half, ftop it close and let it ftand cold for fix days fhaking it fome times; then ftrain it through a Flannel bag, and add Sugarcandy three ounces, The Dofe is three of four ounces in the Morning, fafting an hour of two after it.

XXVIII. A purging Ale. Take Sena three ounce, Roots of Polipody, Z z of

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of the Oak and fharp pointed Dock of each two ounces, Turbith, Mechoacan of each an ounce and half, Epithimum, yellow Sanders of each an ounce; Corianderfeeds an ounce and half; being flic'd and bruis'd hang them in four Gallons of new Ale; the Dote is half a pint to twelve ounces or a pint twice or thrice a Week.

XXIX. A purging Decoction call'd the bitter Decoction.

Take the tops of leffer Centory, flowers of Catemonil of each one pugil, Roots of Gentian half a fcruple, feeds of Carduus bruis'd one dram, Sena two dtams, a little flic'd Ginger, cream of Tartar half a dram, fteep them all in half a pint of fair water all Night, next Morning boil it only a walm or two, then ftrain it, and if you will have it work ftrongly, you may add to the ftrain'd Liquor an ounce of fyrup of Rofes, or half an ounce of fyrup of Buckthorn berries. It opens obftructions and is prevalent against Agues and Fevers; it easies pain of the Breast and Spleen, and is good against the Green-fickness and stoppage of the Terms.

X X X. The true description of that purging Cordial, call'd Elixir Salutis or Elixir of Health. Dr. Bate.

Take Sena fix ounces, Raspings of Guaiacum Elecampain dry'd, Aniseeds, Carraways,

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Coriander, Liquorice, of each two ounces, Raifons flic'd half a pound; flice the Elecampaue very thin, bruife the feeds, and beat the Liquorice into ftrings, and put all into a wide mouth Glafs or Jug, and pour upon them three quarts of Aqua Vira, ftir them well together, ftop it clofe, and let it ftand for four days fhaking it fome times; then prefs it out and put the Liquor up for ufe.

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I always take nine ounces of Sena, for I find that fix will not do as it is in the true Receipt; moreover when I have preffed out the Liquor, I put the ingredients into my ftill, and pour thereon common English Spirit, and distilua good Strong water from it, which I make ufe of when I make the Elixir again, for it is better then common Aqua Vita. It is good against the Scurvy, Dropfy, Gout, K's Fvil, and Scabs, It opens obstructions of the Stomach, Liver and Spleen, It is pectoral, and prevails against difeafes of the Lungs, as, fhortnefs of Breath, obstructions of the Lungs, It is also an excellent Remedy against the Wind Collick and Gripings of the Guts and Belliach, It is an admirable Remedy against Rheumatism, and wandering pains running up and down in any part of the Body. Some take two spoonfuls at Night when they go to bed after a light fupper, and three spoonfuls the next Morning early. And again others take it altogether in the Morning, three, four or five spoonfuls. It may be had at my house ready prepar'd for 2s. the half bottle. XXXI 1 2

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XXXI. A gentle Vomit.

Take of Hemetick wine, and Oximel of Squils of each an ounce, mix them together, and give it about four in the afternoon, drinking a large draft of Poffet drink after every Vomit.

XXXII. An other.

Take of Minficht's Emetick Tartar two, three, four, five or fix grains, mix it with a little conferve of Rofes and take it as the former, three or four quarts of Poffet drink being made ready before it is taken, drinking a large draught of it after every Vomit. You may alfo take it in a draught of Poffet drink.

XXXIII. An other Vomit.

Take Oximel of Squils an ounce and half, Wine of Squils two ounces, mingle them and make a Vomitory.

Or take from fix to nine leaves of Afarabacca, bruife them and put them into three ounces of white Wine, then prefs out the Liquour and let it be taken with Governance. Or take pouder of the roots of Afarabacca, purging Lorael from a dram to four feruples, Oximel of Squils an ounce and half; mingle them and let it be taken in a draught of Poffet drink. Or take falt of Vitriol, from one feruple to two, or a dram;

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dram; let it be taken in a draught of Posset drink. Or take the infusion of Crocus Metallorum from half an ounce to an ounce, or an ounce and half; let it be taken in a draught of Poffet drink, with Governance. Or take the infusion of Crocus Metallorum fix drams, wine of Squils an ounce and half, fyrup of Vineger fimple, mingle them and make a Vomitory. Or take Sulphur of Antimony, from fix grains to eight, Cream of Tartar a scruple, mix them and let it be given in the pap of an Appel, or in a stew'd Prune, or in a spoonful of Panada. Or take Mercurius Vitæ; from three grains to fix, let it be taken after the fame manner. After the like manner you may take Aurum Vitæ, or the Solar Precipitat, and Turbith-mineral.

CHAP. XLII.

Of chaice and Approv'd Medicines to stop Vemiting.

1. To stop the very working of a Vomit.

TAke Sea Wormwood, Mints, and Spices boil them in red Claret wine, and fomenc the Stomack therewith hot the Patient being put into bed. Or make a Toast of the Crum of Bred, and dip it in hot Claret and apply it Z 4 hot 344 Choice and Approv'd Chap. XLII.

hot to the Stomach: Let here be a Clifter given of Milk with Treacle deffolv'd in it. Let the Members be rub'd with warm Cloths, and ufe ftrong Ligatures above the Knees to keep Convultions from those parts; let the Stomach in the mean time be kept empty, unless an inclination to Faint, or swooning or therewise requires; but as soon as it is able to receive any thing of Medicine, give some Cordial Water, as Cinnamon, or Spearmint water, or warm burnt Claret: In case the Affect be violent, and the Pulse admit it, Venice Treacle or Diascordium, fometimes solution of Laudanum or an Opiatick Tincture dose well.

II. To stop a Belching and Acid Vomiting proceeding or stir'd up from other causes.

Take pouder of Aron compound an ounce and half, falt of Wormwood two drams, fugar of Rofes thre drams, make a pouder; give a dram of it in the Morning, and at five a clock in the afternoon in a little draught of Beer boil'd with Mace and a Cruft of bread, or give it in the Tincture of Roman Wormwood. Or take the pouder of Ivory, Crabs Eyes, and red Coral of each two drams, calcin'd Coral one dram, red Sanders, Cinnamon of each half a dram, make a powder; the Dofe is half a dram after the fame manner.

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III. Lozenges for the same.

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Take Lignum Alees, yellow Sanders, Winters-bark of each two drams, white Cholk fix drams, Sugarcandy half an ounce, make of all a fubtile pouder, and with the Mucilage of Gum Tragacanth made with Mint water, make Lozenges weighing half a dram, let the Patient. take three or four at a time thrice or oftner in a day.

Take Tincture of falt of Tartar an ounce, the Dofe is from a fcruple to half a dram twice 2 day in fome proper diftil'd water.

IV. A famous Medicine to stop a Vomiting by Dr. Riverius.

Take falt of Wormwood a fcruple or half a dram, give it in a fpoonful of Juice of Lemons, you may alfo mix with it two or three ounces of Mint water.

V. An other for the same.

Take white Port wine fix ounces, ftrong Tineture of Cloves half a fpoonful, mix them for a Dofe. Or take prepar'd Coral two drams, falt of Wormwood a dram and half, juice of Lemons four ounces, let all ftand in a large Glafs, and add to it ftrong Cinnamon water, two ounces, give a fpoonful or two twice a day, first fhaking the Glafs. VI. 346 Choice and Approv'd Ch. XLII.

VI. To binder a purging Medicine from working to excess.

Make a Plaster of Methridate, and apply it to the Patients Stomach, and to the whole upper Region of the Belly; or let those parts be fomented with warm Linen cloaths dip'd in a decoction of Wormwood, Mint and Spices in red Wine, the Patient being put in a warm bed, and presently upon it let him take inwardly, either a Bolus of Venice Treacle, or a falutation of it in Cinnamon water, and let him drink ever now and then a spoonful or two of burnt Wine, with a little Mint water; if troubled with the Gripes, give him a Clister of warm Milk with Treacle diffolv'd in it.

VII. An Annodine or Hipnotick Cordial to take after a purging Medicine that hath wrought to much.

Take Water of Cowflip flowers two ounces, Cinnamon water hordeated, fyrup of Mæconium of each half an ounce, Pearls prepar'd half a fcruple, make a draught to be taken going to reft. Or take Conferve of red Rofes vitriolated two fcruples, Diafcordium half a dram, Pearls half a fcruple, Diacodium what fuffices, make a Bolus to betaken going to reft.

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CHAP. XLIII.

I. An Excellent Clister to Cure any Flux or Loosness.

"Ake a handful of Barly-meal with all the Bran in it; or take a handful of Barly and beat it in a Morter to a fine Pouder, Wheatbran and dry'd Rofes of each one handful; boil these gently in a glaz'd Pipkin cover'd. in three pints of Water for three quarters of an hour ; then strain it thrô a linnen Cloath, and prefs it hard to get out all the thick and flimy substance of it. This is enough for two Clifters when carefully done. Take half of it and put into it the Yolks of two Eggs, and one ounce of Honey of Roles, and give it duly warm. The Patient may keep it three or four hours without trouble, becaufe the quantity is less than of an ordinary Clister, and that it is of a Balfamick and comforting quality to the excoriat'd Guts. It is an excellent Remedy to any tharp tormenting Flux, when the Guts are inflam'd, excoriat'd and ulcerat'd, either thrô ordinary causes (as by eating fruit or the like) or by taking Mercury to Flux one by Sallivation, you will prefently find eafe at the first taking it; but it is well to repeat it once or twice a day.

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An Experienc'd Remedy for a Flux or Looincfs you have in the Chapter for the Jaundice, made with Rubarb an Currans, to which I refer you.

II. An other Remedy for the Same.

Take Venice-Treacle from a dram to a dram and half; let the patient take it in Bed, and drink feven or eight fpoonfuls of the following Julep, and let him repeat this Dofe every third, fourth, or fifth hour. Take Mintwater, Cinnamon-water hordeated of each three ounces, Plague water, Treacle-water of each two ounces, Pearls prepar'd a dram, Loaf Sugar half an ounce, mingle them and make a Julep: At the fame time take a piece of Bread, fpread fome Treacle on it and dip it in red Wine warm'd, and apply it to the Stomach as hot as it may be fuffer'd, and change it ever now and then.

In the Evening, if the Pulfe and Breathing feem strong enough to bear it, let the Patient take of liquid Laudanum half a scruple, Gafcoin's pouder a scruple, Cinnamon-water what suffices, make a Bolus to be taken going to sleep.

III. An other for the same.

Take of Gascoin's pouder, Roots of Contrayerva of each a dram, Cinnamon, Roots

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of Tormentil of each half a dram, Saffron, Cochinele of each a fcrupe, make a pouder : the Dofe is from half a dram to two fcruples. You may give fpirit of Harts-horn twenty drops with the Julep every fourth hour, or a Dofe of the Pouder interchangeable, one one time, and the other the other; let his drink be Ale or Beer with a cruft of Bread, Mace and Cinnamon boil'd in it and fweeten'd, or burnt Wine with Mint-water; let his food be Chickenbroath, Gruel or Panada, with the fhavings of Ivory, Hart-horn, and the Roots of Scorfonera boil'd in it. Dr. *Willw*.

CHAP. XLIV.

I. A Remedy to Cure a Bloody Flux.

TAke Shepperds-pouch and Plantain of each a like quantity; ftamp them, and boil them in fair water; mix it with the diftil'd water of red Netles, add there to a little fine Sugar, and drink it every Morning and Evening. It is good alfo for Bloody Urin or Spitting of Blood.

II. An other for the same.

Take Venice-Treacle a dram, Liquid Laudanum Cidoniated twenty drops, make a Bolus to be taken going to reft.

Take

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Take Conferve of Rofes vitriolat'd two ounces, Venice Treacle an ounce, pouder of the Roots of Tormentile and Contrayerva, Pearl, Coral prepar'd of each a dram, Syrup of dry'd Rofes what fuffices, make an Electuary to be taken every fourth of fifth hour, drinking after it of the following Julep three ounces.

Take Water of Mint, of Baulm, Cinnamon hordeat'd of each four ounces, Treacle-water, Plague-water of each two ounces, Pearls a dram, Sugar an ounce, mingle them and make a Julep.

After a day or two give a Purging Potion, which leaves an aftringency as the following.

Take Rubarb fliced two drams, yellow Mirabolans flic'd a dram and half, red Sanders, Cinnamon of each a fcruple; infufe them all night in the Waters of Plantain and Cinnamon' hordeat'd of each two ounces and half, wring it forth hard, then add of ftrong Cinnamonwater a dram and half, make a draught.

Every Evening, and alfo in certain Cafes in the day time, Dr. *VVillis* fays he was wont to give a pritty large Dofe of *Laudanum*; nor have I ever known this Medicine (fays he) to have done any prejudice to a Perfon troubl'd with the Flux.

III. A Clifter to appeale the Gripes and freting of the Bowels.

Take the Decostion of the tops of St. John's wort,

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wort, in which Sheeps Trottets have been boil'd, eight or twelve ounces, Venice Treacle two drams, Oyl of St. John's-wort an ounce and half, make a Clifter, or make use of that for the Loosness in the foregoing Chapter.

Take Venice Treacle a dram, Liquid Laudanum Cindoniat'd, mix them and make a Bolus, let the Patient drink after it a little draught of the following Julep.

Take Waters of Tormentil, Mints and Cinnamon hordeated of each four ounces, Treaclewater and Plague-water of each two ounces, Pearl a dram, Sugar an ounce, make a Julep.

IV. An Electuary for the same.

Take Conferve of red Rofes two ounces, Venice Treacle an ounce, pouder of the Roots of Tormentil, Contrayerva, Pearl, Coral prepar'd of each half a dram, Syrup of red Poppies what fuffices, make an Electuary. The Dofe is about a dram and half every third hour, with the faid Julep.

V. An Excellent Distill'd-VVater against the Bloody-Flux.

Take tops of Cypress and Mirtle of each four handfuls, leaves of Meadow sweet, Burnet, St. John's-wort, Avens of each four handfuls, Roots of Tormentil, Bistort of each fix drams, red Roses four handfuls, Cinnamon, Mace of each 352 Choice and Approv'd Chap. XLIV.

each an ounce : being all flic'd and bruis'd together, pour to them red Port or Florence-Wine and red Role-waters of each two quarts; Distil it in a common Still. Mingle the whole Liquor and fweeten it with Syrup of Coral Take pouder of Tormentil-Roots, Contrayerva, Bole Armenick Alexiteriat'd of each a dram, Pearl, red Coral prepar'd, white Amber of each half a dram in the faid Diftil'd Water. Every Night give a Scruple of Liquid Laudanum in three ounces of the faid Water with Syrup of Clove Gillo-flowersthreedrams. For common drink give a Decoction of Burnt Harts-horn, with Barly, a Crust of Bread, Mace and Cinnamon, to a pint and half of which add a pint of new Milk.

VI. A Decoction for the same.

Take Roots of Avens and Scorfonera of each an ounce, Tormentil two drams, burnt Hartshorn pouder'd fix drams, fhavings of Ivory and Harts-horn of each two drams, tops of St. John's-wort a handful, red Rofes and Balauftiæ of each a pugil : Boil all in three pints of Fountain-water to a quart, adding towards the end of red Port-Wine four ounces, when it is cold ftrain it thrô a Jelly-bagg. The Dofe is three or four ounces three or four times a day.

Take tops of St. John's-wort, leaves of Perwinkle and Mousear of each a handful, red Roses two pugils; boil them in the Broath of a Sheeps

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Sheeps Guts : To a pint of the ftrain'd Liquor add Oyl of St. John's-wort two ounces, Honey of Rofes an ounce and half, mingle them for two Clifters, whereof give one in the Morning and another at five a Clock in the Afternoon. Apply to the Belly an Emplafter of Deminio and Paracelfi. Take Juice of Plantain three ounces, with Water of Scordium and Plaguewater. Take a Quince make it hollow and fill it with the Pouder of Olibanum, Maftick and Balfam of Tolu; then roft it, mix all very well and let the patient eat one every day, or mix the faid Pouders with the Marmalet of Quinces.

CHAP. XLV.

I. A Medicine to caufe Sweat.

TAke Roots of Contrayerva, Verginia-Snake roots, Roots of Butterbur of each a dram, Cochinile, Saffron of each a dram, make a Pouder : The Dofe half a dram with Treacle water a spoonful, or any other fit Vehicle. Or take Mithridate from half a dram to a dram, Lapis Contrayerva from a scruple to half a dram, Syrup of the Juice of Citrons what will suffice make a Bolus. In steed of Mithridate, you may take Venice Treacle or Diafcordium, or Confectio Liberantis, or the A a Hyacinth. 354 Approv'd Medicines Chap. XLV.

Hyacinth. Or take Pouder of Vipers a dram, give it in fome convenient Liquor. Or take Pouder of Toads prepar'd fix grains, Lapis Contrayerva a fcruple, make a pouder, give it in a fpoonful of Treacle-water. Or take extract of Carduus half a dram, Lapis Contrayerva a fcruple, Salt of Wormwood fifteen grains with fufficient quantity of Syrup of the Juice of Citrons, make a Bolus. In ftead of the Lapis contrayerva, you may take the Bezoartick-pouder.

II. A Potion to caufe Sweat.

Take Roots of Butter-bur an ounce, feeds of the fame two drams, Eringo-roots cand'd fix drams, Carduus feeds two drams, being flic'd and bruis'd, boil them in a pint of fair Water to the half; in the clear ftraining diffolve half a dram of Mithridate, or two fcruples, let it be taken warm in Bed. After the like manner the Leaves of Carduus, the Flowers of Marigolds, or Camomil may be boil'd in a fufficient quantity of Poffet drink, of which fix or eight ounces may be given warm, either alone, or with fome pouder or Mithridate, Venice Treacle or Diafcordium added to it.

Redicines to caufe Sweat, eafy to be got for poor People may be preferib'd according to the following forms."

In Malignant Fevers, take Conferve of Wood-

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Wood-Sorrel a dram, Mithridate two fcruples and a half, mix them for a Dofe, drinking after it a drought of Poffet-drink, that hath the leaves of Carduus, Scordium, or of Camomil-flowers, or of Marigolds boil'd in it. Or take pouder of Virginia-Snake-roots from half a dram to a dram : Give it with a fit Vehicle. Or give pouder of the Roots of Butterbur a dram. In ordinary cafes give the Decoction of Gromwel of the Roots and Seeds of great Burdock, of Butterbur, or of Virginia-Snake-roots. Let the Spirit of Treacle Camphorat'd be given, from half a dram to a dram, or a dram and half in a fit Vehicle.

III. To make the Lapis Contrayerva, or the Stone against Poison.

Take Roots of Contrayerva half an ounce, of Harts-horn, red and white Coral, Pearls, white Amber, Crabs Claws, and Crabs Eyes all rightly prepar'd (that is ground upon a Marble-ftone with Rofe-water to an impalpable pouder) of each two ounces; then let it dry, and with Jelly of the Skins of Vipers make it up into little Balls, which cover with leaf Gold, and dry them carefully. It is a famous Cordial Antidote againft Poifon and Sudorifick, prevails wonderfully againft the Plague, Malign Fevers, fmall Pox and Meafles: The Dofe is from ten grains to half a dram, Dr. Bate.

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IV. An other Call'd the Bezoartick-Pouder.

Take Pouder of the Roots of Contrayerva, Crabs Claws of each two ounces, Pearls, white and red Coral, white Amber, Crabs Eyes, Harts-horn, Chryftal of each an ounce, Occidental Bezoar, Lemnian Earth of each half an ounce, Cerufe of Antimony two ounces, Cochinele half an ounce; All being duely prepar'd (as in the former) make it into little round Balls with the Jelly of the Skins of Vipers: The Dofe and Vertues are the fame with the former.

Take of the Tincture of Salt of Tartar and Antimony : The Dofe is from a fcruple to two fcruples, in an other Liquor. Or take the Effence of Vipers, from ten drops to twenty in a fpoonful of Treacle-water, or any other Liquor.

V. An Excellent Sudorifick-Water.

Take Roots of the Butterbur and Valerian of each two ounces, Zedoary, Contrayerva, Virginia-Snake root of each an ounce and half, Flowers of Butterbur four handfuls, Saffron two drams, being flic'd and bruis'd pour to them two quarts of Sherry-Sack, diftil it in a Cucurbite in Balneo, let the whole Liquor be mixt : The Dofe is from two ounces and half to three ounces.

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VI. Another excellent Sudorifix-Water.

Take Roots of Angelica and Master-wort of each four ounces, Zedoary, Elecampane, Swallow-wort, Gentian, Galingal of each an ounce, tops of Carduus, Rue, Angelica of each three handfuls, the midle bark of Ash fix ounces, being flic'd and bruis'd, add Mithridate, Venice Treacle of each two ounces, mix them and pour to them white Port Wine three quarts, the best Vineger one quart, Distil it in a Glass Cucurbite in Balneo, or in Sand : The Dose is the fame with the former. Take Flowers of Salt-Armoniack ten grains, Cristal-mineral fifteen grains, Bezoartick pouder a scruple; mix them and give it in a sponful of the Sudorifick-water. Or take Salt of Tartar a scruple, Ceruse of Antimony twenty five grains, make a pouder, give it after the fame manner. Or take pouder of Bezoartick mineral from a scruple to half a dram, Gafcoin's pouder a scruple, give it in like man-Or take Ceruse of Antimony from a ncr. fcruple to half a dram, Flowers of Salt-Armoniack ten grains mix them. Or take Bezoartick mineral a scruple, flowers of Salt Armoniack fix grains, Mithridat halfadram, make a Bolus. Or take Spirit of Harts-horn, or Salt-Armoniack from fifteen drops to twenty, Sudorifick Water from an ounce to three ounces; make a draught to be taken with governance.

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VII. A Sweating Medicine proper for Phthisical Perfons, and such as have Ulcers in the Reins.

Take of Opobalfamum from fix drops to twelve, Water of Baulm, or of Ground Ivy three ounces, Sudorifick-water half an ounce, let it be taken every Morning to provoke fweat for many days together. An fo may be given the Balfam of Peru, but in a greater Dofe. Dr. Willis.

CHAP. XLVI.

Of Remedies to Care an Excessive or depravid Sweating.

TAke Conferve of the Flowers of Succory and Fumitory of each two ounces, pouder of Ivory, Harts-horn, Coral prepared of each a dram, Pearl half a dram, Species of Diarrhodon Abbatis a dram, Lignum Aloes, Sanders red and yellow of each half a dram, Salt Prunella four fcruples, with a fufficient quantity of Syrup of Fumitory make an Electuary: Give the quantity of a Wall-nut in the Evening, and the next Morning, drinking after it either of the following Julep or diftil'd Water three ounces.

Take the Waters of Fumitory and Wall-nuts fimple of each fix ounces, the Waters of Snail and Earth-Worms of each an ounce, Sugar fix drams, mix them and make a Julep. Take

Chap. XLVI. Excessive Sweating.

Take tops of Firr, Tamarisk, Cyprefs of each four handfuls, Water Creffes, Brooklime, Agrimony, St. John's wort, Harts-tongue, the rinds of twelveOranges; being flic'd and bruis'd pour to them Brunfwick-Mun a Gallon, Diftil it in a common Still, let the whole Liquor be mixt, and fweaten it at pleafure : The Dofe is three ounces twice a day.

Take Leaves of Dandelion, Water-Creffes, Plantain, Brook-lime of each three handfuls, bruife them and pour to them of the diftil'd Water above written a pint, wring it forth hard : The Dofe is from three to four ounces in the Morning at nine of the Clock, and at five in the Afternoon.

According to this methode (fayth Dr. Willis) I use to preferibe in a failing of strength and night Sweats after longs Agues, and if these Remedies do no good, we must come to Charly beates. Take Syrup of Steel fix ounces; let a spoonful be taken in the Morning, and at five in the Asternoon, with three ounces of the water above preferib'd.

Take pouder of Ivory, Coral prepar'd of each two drams, Crocus Martis, Salt of Steel of each a dram and half; make a Pouder: The Dose is half a dram twice a day with three ounces of the fame distil'd Water.

Take Tincture of Salt of Tartar an ounce : The Dofe is from twenty to thirty drops twice a day with the diftil'd Water. After the fame manner may be given the Tincture of Coral,

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and Tinctures prepar'd out of Gums and Balfams. Moreover in these cases the Spirits of Harts-horn and SaltArmoniack are often given with Success.

CHAP. XLVII.

I. Remedies agright the Fits of the Mother.

TAke Spirit of Heartschorn from twelve drops to fifteen or twenty in a little draught of the following Julep.

Take Water of Penny Royal and Mugwort of each four ounces, Hysterick water two ounces; Castoreum ti'd in a rag and hung in a Glass half a dram, double refin'd Sugar an ounce, mix them.

II. An Histerick Liquor against Vapours and Fits of the Mother. Dr. Chaffas.

Take Castoreum two drams, Saffron and Camphire of each one dram. Infuse them in a pint of Brandy for fisteen days without any fire; then filter or strain the Liquor. This Liquor is Specifick to Suppress all Vapours which rife from the Matrix or Womb. It may be taken as occasion requires, at any time fasting, from half a spoonful to a whole one. It may be also put up in the Nostrils, laid to the Temples, or carri'd about the Person in a box full of Cotten dip'd in the Liquour. III.

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III. An excellent Hysterick Water of Dr. Charras, Physician to the French King.

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Take Roots of Piony, Briony, Orange peels of each three ounces, flowers of Mugwort, Fetherfew, Baulm, Pennyroyal, Rue, Savine, and Elder flowers of each one handful, Mirrh and Cafter of each half an ounce, Saffron two drams, infufe them for two days in white Port Wine, water of the Catkins of Filberds, and Orange flower water of each two pints, then diftil it in Balneo. This water is highly commended against all diftempers of the Womb, Vapours, Fits of the Mother, &c. the Dofe is from one spoonful to two. Instead of the Orange flower water, you may take the water difil'd from Elder flowers, or water of Mugworth, or Baulm.

IV. An Hysterick Elixir of the Same Author.

Take the diftil'd oyls of Wormwood, Penny royal, Fetherfew, Rue and Amber of each fix drops, Tinctures of Saffron and Cafter of each three ounces, refin'd Sugar fix ounces, mix the Oils with the Sugar and incorporate them well, then pour upon it in a Matrafs, Mugworth and Elder flower-water of each fix ounces, digeft them together in a Sand bath for two or three days and make an Elixir. It is wonderfully ufeful in all diftempers of the Matrix or Womb, it fup362 Remedies against the Chap. XLVII.

fuppreffes the Vapours thereof being taken fasting from half a spoonful to two, either alone or in Hysterick water.

V. An excellent Histerick Balfam of the fame Author.

Take Tears of Afafætida, Galbanum, Opopanax, Sagapen, Ammoniacum of each a dram, distil'd oils of Rue, Juniperberries and Amber of each one scruple; melt the Gums in a brass Mortar and then mix the oyls with them and make a Balfam : It suppresses the Vapours of the Matrix, smell to it and put it up into the Nostrils, also anoint the Navel with it.

VI. An other Hysterick Balfam of the fame.

Take diftil'd oyls of Rue, Citronrinds, Orangepeels, Lavender and Angelica of each half a fcruple, oyl of Amber rectifi'd five drops, Camphir four grains, oyl of Mace or Nutmeg by expression half an ounce, make a Balfam according to Art. It is us'd with happy success to suppress the Vapours of the Matrix against Fits of the Mother, put never so little up into your Nostrils. It is also very effectual in difeases in the Head and Brain, as Megrim, Headach and Apoplexie. It is also good in the Plague time for it powerfully refits Pestilential Air.

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VII. The Royal Cephalick, and Hysterick Elixir or Essence.

Take Cardemum, Jaimaca Pepper and Mace of each three drams, Nutmegs two drams, Coriander seeds, Gallingal, Cinnamon of each two drams, Anifeeds, Carrawayseeds of each four fcruples; being bruis'd put them in a Matrafs, and pour upon them spirit of Salt-Armoniach fuccinated, and the Royal Hungarian water of King Charles the Second, of each half a pint, the Chymical oyls of Cloves and Nutmegs of each two drams, digest them in a Sand Bath with a very gentle warmth for twenty four hours, then strain it, and keep it in a Glass close stopt. It is a truly noble Cephalick and Hysterick Elixir, it prevails against diseases of the Head and Brain. It is very effectual in Faintings and Swoonings especially in those of Hysterical and Hypocondreacal Women; for I have never feen any Medicine operate fo nimbly in Fits of the Mother as this Elixir; for it has often in a trice to the wonder of the by standers fetch'd them out of their Fits. Nor is this the confiderablest effect that I have had of this Spirit or Effence, for fome times I have obferv'd that it has with a strange quickness brought to themfelves Patients that were fallen into Swooning Fits without any appearance of Life or motion in them, and others that were follen to the Ground, and either really were Epilep364 Remedies against the Ch. XLVII.

Epileptical, or so judged. And even in Agonizing Persons, where it would not recover them it would bring them out of their Swoons, and make them know and understand the Affistants, and perhaps speak to them too; of which I cold give you feveral Instances, and in such dificult and desparate Cafes, I am not content that a Vial be held to the Nofe, but order that little pellets of Lint, Cotten, or thin Rags de dipt into the Effence, and thrust up into the Noftrils, and ten or twelve drops in a spoonful of water being pour'd into the mouth. Again flight Head-achs have been cur'd in less than a quarter of an hour. Spirit of Hartshorn is much inferiour in its degree to this Effence, and many Ladies and Gentlewomen have told me that they would never be without it in their houses, and some Hysterical and Hypocondriacal Women would not go to bed without taking it inwardly. The dole is from ten to fifteen or twenty drops in any convenient Liquor. It may be had at my house ready prepar'd.

IX. Pills against Fits of the Mother. Dr. Bate.

Take feeds of Agnus Caftus one ounce, Rue dry'd, Afafætida, Camphire of each two drams, Cafter half a dram, oyl of Amber forty drops, fyrup of Mugworth what fuffices, mix and make a Mafs; the dofe is from ten to fifteen grains every fecond or third hour in the time of the Hylterick fit; as alfo every Night at bed time out Ch. XLVII. Fits of the Mother. 365

out of the Fit from half a dram to two scruples.

X. Other Pills for the Same.

Take of the Pills call'd Cochiæ the greater two drams, Caftoreum pouder'd two grains, Baltam of Peru three drops, make twelve Pills; of which take four every Morning, or every other day according to ftrength, about four or five in the Morning, fleeping after them.

XI. Other Pills for the same.

Take pouder of Rubarb one fcruple, Calomelanos feven times fublim'd fifteen grains, Elixir Proprietatis what fuffices, make five Pills which take in the Morning twice a Week : After take Galbanum strain'd, Myrrh and Castor pouder'd of each two scruples, Balm of Gilead what suffices, mix and make midling Pills, of which take five thrice a day.

XII. An Excellent Hysterick Plaster.

Take Galbanum, Ammoniacum of each an ounce, Asafætida two drams, mix and make an Emplaster which apply to the Navil.

XIII. An Hysterick Julep by Dr. Bate.

Take the best Asafatida one dram and half, black Cherry-water six ounces, mix them and dissolve

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diffolve without Heat in a cold Mortar that the Liquor may be Milky; take of this Liquour a spoonful, Spirit of Hartshorn ten drops, give it at the beginning of the Fit, and also at the end thereof.

XIV. Another for the same of the same Anthonr.

Take of the Hysterick water fix ounces, Mithridate two drams, Tincture of Caster two ounces, fyrup of black Cherrries and of Elderberries of each an ounce and half, mix them; the dose one or two spoonfuls in the time of the Fit, or fainting.

XV. The Musk Julep against Fits of the Mother, by Dr. Riverius.

Take Orange flower water fix ounces, Musk ten grains, Dragons blood one fcruple, mix them for two doles to be given in the Fit. The learn'd *Riverius* mightly commends it even from experience it felf againft Hyfterick Fits. If you cannot have the Orange flower water, you may take the water of Elder flowers, Mugwort, or Baulm. Dr. Sydenbam orders to eat often green Ginger preferv'd in Barbadoes. Take Rue water four ounces, Hyfterick water, Caftor tied in a knot and hung in the Glafs half a dram, Sugarcandy what fuffices; the dole is five fpoonfuls in every Fit.

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XVI. A Powder of great vertue for the fame:

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Take the inward Skins of Capons Gizards four ounces, the yellow rind of Orange peels one dram, make of them a Pouder; the dofe is a dram in the Fit in fome Anti Hyfterick water or Conferve: You may give it from two fcruples to four upon the approach of the Fit; But us'd as a preventive, and to cure the Difeafe, it ought to be given Morning and Night for a whole Month together. It is good againft vapours, expels Wind and eafes the Collick.

XVII. An approv'd Clifter for the same.

Take of the common Decoction for a Clifter ten ounces, Camphire one dram, oyl of Rue half an ounce, Hony of Herb Mercury three ounces, mix them and make a Clifter.

XVIII. The Campborated Elixir for the fame.

Take Rectifi'd Spirit of Wine fix ounces, choice Saffron three drams, put them in a Matrafs and extract the Tincture by digeftion, then ftrain it and put to the tinged Spirit Camphire half an ounce or five drams, digeft them in a Matrafs, fit to this Matrafs another little one whofe neck is to go into the bigger and fo make a duble yeffel (fee the Figure in the Copper plate) lute them well together with flips of a wett

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wett Bladders, place the Matrais in your Sand Furnace, digeft with a very little heat till the Camphire be diffolv'd and the Spirit be pure and transparent as before, and the Camphir will give it a pleafant smell. It is an excellent Remedy prevailing against Hysterick paffions, Vapours, and Fits of the Mother, and other Hipochondriack malladies; It cures the Collic and Gripings of the Guts to a Miracle, It chears the Heart, revives the Spirits, and strengthens Nature; It cures the Toothach, by puting a little Cotten dipt therein to the pain'd Tooth. It is very excellent against all manner of Malign or Pestilential Fevers, small Pox and Meafles, Spotted Fever, yea and the Plague it felf; - the dole is from ten to thirty or forty drops in any Cordial water.

It is faid to help the pains in the Ears by dipping in it a little Rabbits wool, and puting it into the Ear. It cures a Rheumatifm, and outwardly bath'd upon Gouty places cures them. It is alfo good in the Apoplexie Lethargy, Vertigo, Magrim, Palfly, and other old difeafes of the Head, Brain and Nerves.

Dr. Brodback Physician and Professer in the University of Tubingen, esteem'd Camphir for his greatest secret, he dissolv'd it in Tartarris'd Spirit of Wine and Lillies of the Vally; outward swellings being anointed with it, it Molifies the hardness of them, and lays the Inflamation, It discusses the cold swelling of the Joints, and eases the pains thereof. For inward uses

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ufes he diffolves it in Spirit of Baulm, and Spirit of Wine Tartaris'd of each equal parts, and often adds to it fome drops of diftil'd oyl of Cafter, and of Baulm, and effects it a great fecret in fuffications of the Womb, and Difeafes of the Head. Dr. Gerbard Phyfician of Tubingen ufes in the fame affects the oyl of Amber Camphorated, which is prepar'd of two parts of oyl of Amber, and one part of Camphir, He fays the Effects of it are wonderful. Soliander commends the feeds of Parfneps; or Columbines in Wine or Hyfterick water, as moft certain Remedies.

XVIII. An excellent Hysterick water.

Take Pennyroyal, Feaverfew, both Southern woods, Calamint, Nep, both Horehounds of each a handful, Brionyroots four ounces, Parfnepfeeds two ounces being flic'd and bruis'd, pour to them of White Wine or Elderburry Wine three quarts, diftil them according to Art.

Take Conferve of Rue the quantity of a Nutmeg twice a day, drinking after it a glass of the faid Water Dr. Willis.

XIX. An excellent Liquor of great vertue in Hyster rick and Hypocondriacal affects.

Take filings of Steel, Cream of Tartar of each three ounces, mix them and boil them in B b

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quart of fair Water to drynefs, then pouder it finely, and put it into white Wine three pints, let it stand three Weeks or a Month shaking it every day; the Dose is three or four spoonfuls at a time in a glass of Alc, white Wine, or Elderburry Wine, if you can get it, at Night going to Bed.

In frequent Guidiness and Scotomia, also in passions of the Heart, faintings of the Spirits, with a fear and dread, as it were, of present Death. Dr. Willie fays he has known a mighty cure often perform'd by steel Medicines.

XX. An Electuary of great vertue against Hypocondriacal Affects.

Take Conferve of Roman Wormwood, and Conferve of the yellow part of Oranges of each an ounce, candied Angelica, candied Nutmegs Venice Treacle of each half an ounce, Compound pouder of Wake Robin three drams, preferv'd green Ginger two drams, with fyrup of Oranges make an Electuary. Take of this Electuary two drams, filings of Steal eight grains, mix them for a Dofe to be taken Morning and Evening, drinking after it a draught of the following Infusion. Take roots of Angelica, Elecampane and Masterwort of each one ounce, common Wormwood, leffer Centory, white Horehound and Germander of each one handful, the peels of two Oranges flic'd; pour upon them fomuch of Canary or Sherry as will over top

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top them two Inches; and strain it at the time of using it. Dr. Sydenbam.

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The Elixir Proprietatis is prepar'd with Spirit of Hartshorn is of great vertue in Hysterick and Hypochondriacal Affects. Dr. Willis, and Dr. Sydenham both aver the good Spirit of Hartshorn taken twice a day from twelve to fixteen or eighten drops in any fit Liquor hath prov'd mighty beneficius, An so hath my Royal Cephalick and Hysterick Effence, which excells in the Hypochondriacal Affects and suffecation of the Womb.

CHAP. XLVIII.

Of the Obstructions of the Menses or Courses.

The Obstruction of the Menstrums proceeds generally from Course and tough Humours. brought from the Stomach to the Passages of the Womb. The following Medecinal Wine prepares the humours.

I. A Medicinal Wine.

Take Roots of Masterwort, white Dittany of each an ounce, sweet Garden Flag half an ounce, leaves of Mugwort, Pennyroyal, Calamint of each half a handful, Savin one handful and half, seeds of Carots, Sefely, of each, B b 2 half

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half an ounce, Juniperberries five drams, Cinnumon and Orangepeels of each two drams; being cut and grofly bruis'd, infuse them in three pints of white Wine; the Dose is fix spoonfuls with Spirit of Salt Armoniack fix drops. Then purge.

II. Purging Pills for the same.

Take of Pill Fætid the greater half an ounce, volatil Salt Armoniack fix grains, diftil'd oyl of Nutmegs two drops, mix them and make feven Pills, take three at Bed time and four in Morning. Take Pill Aœphangine one fcruple, Salt of Amber, volatile Salt Armoniack of each four grains, Rofin of Jalap fix grains, oyl of Marjerom one drop, mix and make fix Pills, let them be gilded.

III. A pouder which is much commended for the fame.

Take Salt of Mugwort, Amber, Afh, of each twelve grains, Tartar vitriolated fix grains, mix them for a Dofe. Or take Salt of Mugwort, Amber, Tartar vitriolated of each three grains, Aloes Succotrine fifteen grains, oyl of Minth one drop, mix and make five Pills for one Dofe which repeat often. Gentle Diaphoretick mixt with Specificks do much avail. Alfo the diftil'd oyl of Savin, but it will caule Abortion, if with Child. Chap. XLVIII. Menses or Courses.

IV. An excellent suffumigation for the same.

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VI.

Take the Drofs of the Regulus of Antimony four ounces, boil them in a Lye made of Mugwort Ashes and other specifical Herbs, to a redness of the extract, then strain it; take of this Liquor fix ounces, old Malmsy in which was steep'd Sage and Savin two ounces mix them; let two spoonfuls be pour'd upon burning Coals, and the smoak receiv'd up, the thighs being dilated.

Spiritus Tartaris Philosophicus, provokes Menfes powerfully, three, four, five or fix drops being taken in a little white Wine.

V. A Sudorifick for the same.

Take of the waters of Fennel and Parfly of each an ounce, Treacle water, Cinnamon water of each half an ounce, Tincture of Caftor two drams, volatil Salt of Hartfhorn one fcruple, Vineger of Squils half a dram, Salt of Mugwort one fcruple, Spirit of Salt Armoniack twenty drops, fyrup of Scurvy grafs, and of Carduus Ben of each half an ounce, Crabs Eyes prepar'd one fcruple mixt for a Dofe.

Take of Crato's Amber Pills two drams, Pill Ruffij one dram, mix and make fifteen Pills, whereof take three at Bed time, and two in the Morning. They were prefcrib'd for an Honourable Lady.

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VI. To make the opening Tincture of Steel with Tartar.

Take of Filings of Iron turn'd to Ruft twelve ounces, of good white Tartar two pounds, pouder and mix them exactly, put this mixture in a large Iron Pot or Kettle, and pour upon it fix or feven quarts of Rain water, boil it for the fpace of twelve hours, ftiring it from time to time with a Iron or Wooden Spatul, and be careful to add more water as you fee the Liquor leffens in boiling; then let it fettle, and you will have a black Liquor, which strain thro a felly bag, and evaporate it to the confiftancy of Syrup; you will have about two pounds and twelve ounces. It is an excellent apperitive extold and approv'd of by all learned Authors, it opens Obstructions the most inveterate, 'tis us'd with good fuccels in Cachexies, in the Dropfie and in suppression of the Terms, Green-ficknels and other Diseases that proceed from Opilations and Obstructions; the Dose is from a dram to half an ounce, in Broth, Wine, or any other proper Liquor.

VII. To make an excellent Mixture Liquor of great vertue in suppressions of the Terms, and Green-sickness. &c.

Take of the faid fyrup of Marss or Steel twelve ounces, Elixir' Proprietatis four ounces mix them; the Dose is from two drams to half an ounce

ounce in white Wine. Or take Elixir propietatis prepar'd after the description of the Colledg of Physicians of the Hague three ounces, Spirit of Hartshorn one ounce, syrup of Marss twelve ounces; the Dose is the same with the former.

From my own experience I can teftify this to be an Effectual Medecine in the cafes above nam'd, due purgations being premis'd, She may take a fpoontul or more at a time in a glafs of white Port Wine every Morning or every other, for four or five times before the expected time. If the cannot take Pills, the may take the Pouder of Cornacbinus in the Chapter of Purges. And every Night going to Bed the may take a fcruple of Troches of Myrth, made into a Bolus with fyrup of Mugwort.

CHAP. XLIX.

Of the Green fickness.

I. The figns of this Difease are these; Ill colour of Face and of the whole Body, swelling in the Face, Eyelids and Ankels, Lumpishness of the whole Body, a Stretching, weariness of the Legs and Feet, difficult Breathing, Feverish pulse, Sleepiness, longing for things not fit to be eaten with Obstruction of the Courses.

II. If she be of an indifferent strength purge her B b 4 once

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376 Remedies against Longing. Ch.XLVIII.

Once or twice either with fome proper Pills, (fuch as you have in the foregoing Chapter) or with the pouder of Cornachinus. Or with the Elixir Salutis; afterwards give the Tinture of Steel, with the Elixir Propietatis in the foregoing Chapter. With this very method I have often cur'd this Difeafe, and not long before the writing of this I cur'd a young Gentlewoman of the Longing, or the Difeafe of eating Chalk and Cinders, to whom to clear the Stomack from them, Firft I gave a gentle Vomit of fix grains of Tartar Emetick in a Bolus of Conferve of Rofes; after that I purg'd her gently twice, and then I gave her the Tincture of Steel with Tartar, with the Elixir Propietatis.

III. A Remedy against Longing, or the Disease of eating Chalk, Oatmeal, Cinders, &c. Dr. Poleman.

First give a gentle Vomit, then take Mustardfeed ten grains, the Ashes of the bones of Rosted Pigeons, Purslainseed two scruples, Juice of Quinces two ounces, Loaf Sugar three ounces, mix it before a gentle Fire; the Dose is two ounces three times a day. Wormwood wine, and syrup of Crabs is a very good Remedy. Beans boil'd, whether dry or green, being eaten, are very good against this disorderly Appetite. Dr. Poleman.

CHAP.L.

Of the Overflowing of the Terms.

The Overflowing of the Terms is known by the parties being uneafy at that time, by the failing of her strength, want of Apitite, Ill habit of Body, ill colour of Face, like that of a dead Carkas and swelling of the Feet.

I. L Et her take the common purging Potion, and repeat it every other day to two Dofes more, taking at Night after every purgation a cordial and refting draught with fyrup of Poppies.

II. In the intervals of purging let her take that which follows.

Take Conferve of dry Rofes two ounces, Troches of Limnian Earth one dram and half, Pomgranate peels, red Coral prepar'd, Bole-Armeneck of each two fcruples, Bloodstone and Dragons blood of each one fcruple, with a sufficient quantity of fyrup of Quinces make an Electuary; of which let her take as much as a large Nutmeg in the Morning, and as much at five in the Asternoon taking after it fix spoonfuls of the following Julep.

III. Take water of Oak buds and Plantain of

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of each three ounces, Barly Cinnamon water, and fyrup of dry'd Rofes of each an ounce, fpirit of Vitriol a fufficient quantity to give it a greatful accidity, or fharpnefs.

Chap. L.

IV. Take Plantain and Netles of each a fit quantity; beat them together, and prefs out the Juce, of which let us take four or five fpoonfuls now and then as they pleafe.

V. After the first purging let the following Plaster be made and apply'd to the Reins of the Back.

Take of Emplaster de minio, and the Plaster for a Rupture of each equal parts, spread them on Leather for a Plaster, to be appli'd to the Region of the Lions. Dr. Sydenbam.

Or you may rather Anoint the Back with this.

Take Sacharum Saturny three drams, diffove it in two Spoonfuls of spirit of Vineger, and mix it with oyl of Ben. one ounce an half, with which annoint the Back Morning and Evening. It is much better then an Emplaister, especially in the Summer time; because in some Patients, a Plaster is very apt to heat the Back, which by the use of this oyl is prevented. Dr. Salmonupon Sydenbam.

VI. An approv'd Remedy for the Overflowing of the Terms.

Take a handful of red Dock roots, flit them and boil them in a Gallon of Conduit water, fcum it and put in it Raifons of the Sun ston'd two.

Chap. LI. of the Whites.

two handfuls, Liquorice bruis'd two ounces, boil it till a third part be confum'd, then strain it, and make Almond Milk with it with blanched Almonds; drink a good draught of it thrice a day.

VII. An other for the same.

Take of the filings of the Scull of a Man, put it into a Glafs of white Wine, let it infufe all Night in it, and in the Morning take it fasting. In two or three times taking it every Morning, it will cure it, 'Tis atry'd thing.

CHAP LI.

For the cure of the Whites, If She wants her Monthly Terms when the bath the Whites, they must be no. means be stopt till the Terms be brought down, and then you may stop the Whites, by the use of the following Medicines.

I. T'Ake the Ceruse of Antimony made of the Regulus, the Dose is fifteen grains or twenty in a little white Wine in the Morning fasting, for three Mornings together the Body being first purg'd, Or

II. Take Venice Turpentine, an ounce, Dragons blood, Nutmegs grated, and Bole Armenick of each a dram, mix them, and make a Mass for Pills; take thereof a dram for a Dole, after due purging. III.

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III. A very good Electuary for the fame.

Take Conferve of red Rofes four ounces, Conferve of Succory two ounces, red Coral in fubtile pouder, Virginia Snakeroot, Tormentileroots, fhavings of Ivory of each two drams, with fyrup of Myrtils make an Electuary, and take thereof the quantity of a large Nutmeg every Morning, the Body being purg'd first, with the following.

Take of the *Pill Cochiæ* the greater two fcruples, Caftorum in two grains, Balfam of Peru three drops; make four Pills to be taken at four a Clock in the Morning, repofing after them, and twice to be repeated every fecond or third day according to the ftrength of the fick. The Salt Mirable is faid to be the beft purge in this Cafe, it may be given from three drams to fix according to her ftrength, and as fhe is eafy or hard to move, it may be repeated twice every other day, and may be given in Poffet drink, Whey or thin Grewel.

IV. Take of Rue water four ounces, Compound Bryony water, two ounces, Sugarcandy what fuffices, make a Julep, of which let her take a fpoonful every fainting Fit. Dr. Sydenbam.

V. Take Venice Treacle an ounce and half, Conferve of the yellow part of Oranges, two ounces, Dia Scordium half an ounce, green preferv'd Ginger, and preferv'd Nutmegs, of each three

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the Whites.

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three drams, Gafcoins pouder one dram and half, Pomgranet Ihells, roots of Spanilh Angelica, red Coral prepar'd, and Troches of Lemnian Earth of each one dram, Bole Armenick two fcruples, Gum Arabick half a dram, with a fufficient quanty of dry Rofes, make an Electuary, of which let her take the quantity of a large Nutmeg in the Morning, and as much at five in the Afternoon, and the fame quantity at Night every day for a whole Month, taking fix fpoonfuls of the following infufion, after every Dofe.

VI. Take Elecampane, roots of Masterwort, Angelica, Calamus Aromaticus of each half an ounce, Roman Wormwood, white Horehound, leffer Centory, common Calamint, and Sage dry'd of each one handful, Juniperberries one ounce, chop and bruise them small, and infuse them in two quarts of Canary, and let them stand cold to infuse, when you use it strain it. Dr. Sydenbam. Let her eat food of easy digestion, and abstain strom all forts of Potherbs, Fruits, and at every Meal drink Sherry, Tent, or Canary.

VII. Another experimented Remedy for the Whites, and for heat in the Back and Kidneyes.

Take four large found Nutmegs, put them in the middle of a Houshold Loat, then let the Loaf be bak'd, take out the Nutmegs, beat the white of a new lay'd Egg to a froath, then let it 382 To Cure the Whites. Chap. LI.

it fettle, and mix the clear Liquor with four fpoonfuls of Rofewater, and as much Plantain water, fweeten it with fine Sugar, and great into it half of one of the Nutmegs, and drink it in the Morning fasting, for seven days together. This cur'd a Woman that had taken many Medicines in vain for the faid distemper.

VIII. Another powerful Medicine for the fame.

Take a pottle of Ale, fhred into it two ounces of Ifinglafs, and put it in a veffel clofe ftopt, let the Liquor fimper till about half is wafted, ftrain the reft, and give of it two or three ounces at a time warm, in the Morning and at Night. Mr. Boyle, Or

IX. Take a pint of Milk boil in it half an ounce of Isinglas, take of this a dishful warm every Morning and Night. The Conferve of Archangel flowers is faid to be effectual for the cure of this distemper.

X. An Injection for the same.

Take of a Decoction of the Inner Oak-Bark two quarts, white Vitriol, Roch Alum in pouder of each one ounce, mix them and digeft three or four days, then pour of the clear, and diffolve therein pure Hony three ounces, of this inject with a Womb Syringe, two, three or four times a day, befides all those inward Medicines to cleans the Womb and strengthen the Parts. CHAP. Chap. LII. To forward Confeption.

CHAP. LI.

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Of Barrenss in Women.

I. An approv'd Electuary to procure and forward Conception.

TAke of fyrup of Motherwort, Mugwort of each half an ounce, Spirit of Clary two drams, Roots of Englifh Snakeweed in fine pouder one dram, Purflainfeed, Nettlefeed, Rocketfeed all in fubtil pouder of each two drams, Candied Nutmegs, Eringoroots, Satirionroots, preferv'd Dates, Pistaches, Conferve of Succory of each three drams, pound all these in a Stone Mortar to a perfect Electuary, then put it up into Gallypots and keep it for use; the Dose is as much as a large Nutmeg in a glass of white Wine in the Morning fasting, and at four in the Afternoon, and as much at Night going to bed, and in the taking it be fure you do no violent exercise.

II. Dr. Scoder's Cordial drink to Cleans and strengthen the Womb, and procure Conception.

Take Baulm, Penny Royal, Maidenhair, Sage, Calaminth, Mugwort of each halfa handful, Camelshay half a dram, Marygolds, Wallflowers of each two Pugils, Nutmegs, Mace, Cubebs,

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Cubebs, Cardemoms, grains of Paradice, Zedoary of each one dram, being cut and bruis'd, infule them in two quarts of Canary wine in a bottle clofe ftopt for fome days, then strain it and sweeten it with syrup of Mugwort, or syrup of green preserv'd Ginger, drink thereof three times a day a glass at a time. This I have known experienc'd.

III. A Cordial water call'd Aqua Prolifica, or the Water making Fruitful. Dr. Bate.

Take feeds of Angelica hul'd a pound and half, fweet Fennelfeeds, Liquorice of each four ounces, Raisons ston'd one pound, leaves of Mugwort, Baulm of each four handfuls, Carduus Ben. Penneroyal of each two handfuls, feed of Amomum four ounces, Wine and Milk of each three quarts, mix them and diftil them according to Art, either in Balneo or in a Rofe still; the Dofe is four ounces with Tincture of Juniper berries one dram, syrup of the Juice of Sage two fpoonfuls Morning and Night; but before you take this Cordial water, you must take first two scruples of the pouder of the feeds of Hartwort, or Bastard-Lovage mixt with Sugar of Rofes. 'Tis given to cure Barrenness in Women, and make fruitful. It fweetens the Blood, and deftroys the Scorbutick accidities which hinders the breeding of good feed, and being given after the exhibition of the two scruples, of Hartwortfeeds, it is faid to provoke the Terms, and effectually cleanfe the Womb of its im

impurities, which hinder Generation. Sometimes it is profitably given against Hystorick fits.

IV. A Gelly of Harts-born for the Same."

Take rafpings of Harts-horn fix ounces, fair Water three quarts, boil with a gentle Fire in a close Veffel for three or four hours, that the Rafpings may be come Gelly : Strain it and add Juice of Lemons one ounce, Loaf-Sugar two ounces. It is reftorative in a Confumption, and of fingular use in all other weakness of the Body, &c. Dr. Bate.

CHAP. LIII.

I. An Experienc'd Medicine to prevent Abortion or Miscarriage by Sir Theodore, Mayern.

TAke a quart of Claret Wine, red Rofe water four ounces, Galingal-roots bruis'd four ounces, three Nutmegs flic'd, Cinnamon bruifed one ounce, two Cloves bruis'd, and a branch of Rofemary; make of all a clofe and warm infufion for twelve hours; then fweeten it to your taft with Loaf Sugar or Syrup of Sage, and three or four fpoonfuls of it warm twice or thrice a day. It is an approv'd thing.

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11. A Cordial Water to preferve and nourifh the Child in the Womb, and prevent Miscarriage, Dr. Bate.

Take fresh Eringo-roots one pound, Dates half a pound, fweet Almonds blanch'd four onnces, pound them in a Stone-Mortar and bring them into a pulp; then add Nutmegs three ounces, Mace half an ounce, Barly and Cinnamon-water one pint and half, Sack and Baulm-water of each a quart; mix and diffil them. The Dofe is two ounces twice a day with Pearled Sugar, having first taken an Electuary made of Conferve of red Rofes, Clove-Gilloflowers, preserv'd Nutmegs, pouder of Ivory and Pearl. This Medicine dayly taken nourifhes the Child in the Womb, and prevents Miscarriage where it is fear'd, as also in such as are fubject to it. If you Distillit in Balneo you may draw it off to drynes, otherwise you must add Water to prevent burning.

1931. III. An other for the fame.

Take a fprig of Rolemary and Baulm, a few Cloves and a little Nutmeg. being cut and bruis'd put them in a pint of Claret Wine and burnt it; then beat the yolks of three new laid Eggs, brew them with the Wine; then take the Cock threadles of fix Eggs, and the white of one, beat them very well to a Liquor; let

let it fettle, take off the froth, and mix the clear Liquor with the Wine, and brew all well together; then fweeten it with double refin'd Sugar, drink of this four fpoonfuls whenfoever fhe begins to feel any pain in her Back or Belly.

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IV. An other for the same, much used in France and held as a present Remedy.

Take a penny worth of Stiching Silk of a red crimfon colour, double the Threads as often and as fhort as you can, then clip it as fhort as you can with Scifars, mix this with a new laid Egg boil'd fo fort that the white of it be but curdled, let the Woman take this. This they hold as a prefent and infaillible Remedy in France, which I have often feen ufed with good fuccefs. Hartman.

N. A Cordial-Water of ClaryBrompound for the Jame by Dr. Bate. houog

Take Leaves of fresh Clary bruis'd twelve handfuls, Spirit of Wine or Brandy two pints, distil it in Balneo Mariæ to dryness: To the distil'd Water put fresh Clary ten handfuls, Flowers of white Archangels six handfuls, and distil a second time, repeat the Distillation with fresh Herbs and Flowers a third time, adding also Nutmegs one ounce; Receive the Liquor in a Glass the third time upon double C c a refin'd 388 Approuv'd Remedies Chap. LIII

refin'd Sugar fix ounces, Amber-greece three grains ty'd in a Rag and hung in the Glafs. It is of great use (among young and tender Women) to prevent Mifcarriage; It also stops the Whites. You must distil it in a Body of Tin, or of Copper Tinn'd within, as you have defcrib'd in the Coppet Plate, for Glass is apt to break, and you must digest it four and twenty hours before distillation. Dr. Salmon fays, that if you put to every quart of the Water Catechu in fine pouder two ounces, and to make a Tincture, it will be ten times ftronger to all the purposes afore mention'd, and will also stop the most violent Flux of the Terms. The Dofe is one or two fpoonfuls at Night.

VI. A Drink to Strenthen the Child in the Womb, and prevent Miscarriage, by Dr. Bate.

3 CULL

Take Raspings of Lignum Cotoneum one pound, white Sanders, Ivory of each four ounces, Oak-mols two ounces, Roots of Tormentil an ounce and half, Bistort one ounce, Nutmegs, Coriander-seeds of each fix drams, Raisins flic'd a pound and half, mix them and hang them in fix Gallons of new Ale. Let it be drank as ordinary drink; It prevents Abortion, strengthens the weak Foetus, and confirms the Ligaments of the Womb.

VII.

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VII. An Emplaster for the same, of the same Author.

Take red Lead a pound and half, Oyl two pounds, white Soap fhread fmall four ounces, Wax two ounces; boil them together according to Art. It prevents Abortion, being timely apply'd to the Back and Navil, and kept continually on, Spread it on Leather, and apply it, renew it again when it will flick no longer. It is call'd the cleanfing Emplaster, it cleanfes and refolves, eafes the pain of the Back and Joints, diffipates contufions; It is a specifick to eafe the pain of the Gout.

VIII. A Remedy to prevent Miscarriage, prescrim bed by an Eminent Physician for an Honourable Lady.

Bleed from the Arm three or four ounces, then take the following Pouder.

Take Roots of Tormentil, red Sanders, Kermes Berries, Nutmeg, Pearl prepar'd, red and white Coral prepar'd of each one feruple, Cloves ten grains, Leaves of Gold two, Pearl'd Sugar two drams, make a fubtil Pouder : The Dofe is one feruple in a poch'd Egg; or with a little Broth, or other Supping, once every day during the pains, either in the Morning or at Night.

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For outward means use the following Emplaster. Take Galangal one ounce, Bole Armenick, Dragrons-blood, Seal'd Earth of each half a dram, Mastick, Myrrh of each one dram, Cyptus-Nuts half an ounce, Juice of Mugwort, Venice-Turpentine of each a lufficient quantity, mix them exactly; to which may be further add'd red Sanders in fine Pouder half an ounce, Wax sufficient to make an Emplaster, of which spread on Leather and lay to the Back. These being observed Miscarriage was prevent'd.

A Married Gentlewoman in Gravelend was wont to Mifcarry every year for three years together about ten or twelve wecks after Conception; her Husband came to me requiring my council, fhe having then been great with Child about feven or eight weeks; I advis'd her to take the aforefaid Pouder every day in a rare or poch'd Egg, alfo to wear the following Emplatter.

Take pure Labdanum one ounce and half, Galls, Oak-Mofs, Bole Armenick, Cyprus-Nuts, Terra Sigilata, Mirtils, red Rofes, Dragons-blood, Pomgranat-flowers of each half an ounce, Ship Pitch two ounces, Turpentine fix ounces, or fo much as fuffices, make an Emplaster, the Ingredients being all reduc'd to a fine Pouder, melt the Pith in a Pipkin, then add the Turpentine, and then the Pouders, and ftir them well together. Of this was fpread upon Leather, and appli'd to the Loyns, Os Sacrum

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Sacrum and the bottom of the Belly. This She used all her time, and after brought forth a hufty hearty Daughter, and after that more. Hartman.

CHAP. LIV.

Of Rules and Signs of Conception.

Authors have left many Ways for Women to know whether they be great with Child or not, which proves true indeed in many Women, but not in all.

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I. A Coldness of the outward parts of the Body after Conception.

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2. The Belly groweth very flat first of All, because the Womb closeth it felf together, to nourish and cherist the Seed.

3. The Breasts begin to swell and grow hard, not with out Pain and Soreness.

4. The tops of the Nipples look redder than formerly.

5. Wringing or Griping pains like Cramps, happen in the Belly about the Navil.

6. Loss of Appetit to Meat, and Illness after Meat, and Weakness of the Stomach.

7. The Veins of the Breafts are more clearly feen than they were wont to be.

8. It is a good Sign when the Veins in the C c 4 Eyes 392 Rules and Sign of Conception. Ch. LIV.

Eyes are clearly seen, and the Eyes seem something discolour'd.

9. Divers longings and Appetites are ingender'd.

The following Signs Mr. Culppeper fays he hath known to be true and never to fail.

10. Put the Urin of the Woman in a Glafs, and ftop it, and let it ftand three days; and then ftrain it thrô a fine Linnen Cloth, if you find fmall living Creatures in the Cloth, fhe is most affur'dly conceiv'd with Child.

11. Take a green Nettle top, put it into her Urin, ftop it clofe, and let it ftand all Night, the next Morning take it out, and if it is full of red fpots, fhe is with Child; if not the Nettle will be blackifh.

To know whether a Woman bareth a Male or a Female. Authors give these two Signs of Conception of Males.

I. The Woman when the raifes up from a Chair or the like, doth fooner ftay her felf upon her right hand than on the left.

2. The Belly lieth rounder and higher then when it is a Female.

3. The Child is first felt on the right Side, because (according to Hypocrates) the Male Children lie on the right Side of the Womb. 4. She breeds Boys easier and with less trouble Ch.LV. Remedies for Women in Travan. 393

trouble and pain than Girls, and carries her Burthen not fo heavily, but is more nimble in moving.

5. The right Breaft is more plump and hard than the left, and the right Nipple redder.

6. Her Complexion is more clear and not fo dull and fwarty, as when the beareth a Girl.

7. Let a drop of Milk fall into a Basin of fair Water, if it sincks to the bottom, she bears a Girl; but if it swins and spreads a broad it is a Boy.

CHAP. LV.

Of Remedies to cause a good and safe Delivery in Travail, or Child-baring.

1. Sir K. Digby's Labour Pouder to facilitate the Birth, which he usually gave with good success, and which was sent for far and near.

TAke a dram of the finest Myrrh in fine Pouder, and give it in a little burnt Claret.

II. A Specifick and much experiment'd Pouder for the same, by Dr. N.

Take Cassia Lignea, Castoreum of the best, English English Saffron, Troches of Myrrh, Borax of each tengrains, make it into a subtil pouder, and give it for one Dose.

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III. Another for the same.

Take Roots of round Birth-wort, Borax, Saffron, Caftoreum, Caffia Lignea of each half a dram, make them into a fine pouder, and divide it into two parts for two Dofes; give one Dofe when the pains are upon her, and the other two hours after, in a little Cordial Julep.

CHAP. HVI.

Of Remedies for Women Lying in.

I. An infallible Remedy, much experiment'd to bring away the after Burthen, or a Dead Child, or any Foulnels, as also to Cure the after Throws, and Gripings after a VV oman is Deliver'd.

TAke the inward wrinckled skins of Gizards of Hens that are laying of Eggs; wipe them clean, and lay them by to dry, when you have need to use them, beat them to fine Pouder, of which give one dram for a Dose in a little warm white Wine, or Cordial Julep: You will see the effects of it in a short time, if Ch. LVI. for Woman Lying in.

it be needful you may repeat the Dole once or twice the fame day. Sir K. Digby.

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II. Another Remedy after Labour, to take away the Pains and Pangs, which many times attend Women newly deliver'd.

Let her drink a draught of Beer boil'd with a fpoonful of Camomil-flowers, and in great pains let her take fix ounces of Oyl of iweet Almonds newly drawn. Of the Loches or Child bed Purgations fee in the Mifcellanea.

III. An Excellent Cerecloth to be laid upon the Breafts after Child-bearing.

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Take Oyl of Rofes fix onnces, Perwincle bruis'd three ounces, Juice of Mint and leffer Sage of each one ounce and half, boil them over a foft fire till the juice be comfum'd, then ftrain and press them out; Into the strain'd Oyl put Wax cut finall three ounces; when 'tis half cold, add half an ounce of choice Mastick finely pouder'd, ftir them well together, and then dip the Cloths in it. This Cerecloth is very proper to prevent the Breafts from growing big after Child-bearing; as alfo to change the course of the Milk and to turn it downwards. The Cerecloth must be laid hot. upon the Breafts, and wrapt up with warm Cloths, and be continually apply'd'fill the Milk be gone. To in creafe Milk fee the Mifcellanea. IV.

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IV. Another Remedy prefently made to dry up the Milk in Womens Breafts.

Take Aqua Vitæ and sweet Butter, melt them and beat them well together, and anoint the Breasts therewith, laying a brown Paper upon them, and as often as the Paper dries anoint again, till the Milk be dry'd up. This is also good to keep the Ague out of the Breasts.

V. An often try'd Remedy for an Ague in a Womans Breaft.

Take the leaves of Hemlock, stamp them and fry them in unfalt'd Butter, and as hot as can be endur'd lay it to the Breasts, and lay a piece of Flannel warm over it. This is good also for any swelling in any other part.

VI. An admirable Pultice that hath Cur'd many VVomen of Hard and Sore Breafts.

Take Turneps, and boil in Water till they be foft; then squeese out the Water from them, and stamp them to a Mash, and mingle with them some fresh Butter unsalt'd, and apply this warm to the Breasts upon a thick Cloth very large, change Morning and Night. In three days it hath perfectly cur'd, thô before the pain and hardness hath been very great.

VII.

VII. An Approv'd Remedy for Aches and Soreness in VVomens Breast, or in any part of the Body.

Caufe a Dier to dye you fome thick fpungy Flannel, of the blew colour call'd Coventryblew, when 'tis dry dye it again, dye it thus five times; at laft the dye will be fo deep, that it will look almost black; lay of it on a good deal beyond the pain'd part on all fides, keep it thus continually cover'd and warm with it.

VIII. A hard and painful Swelling in a VVomans Breaft Suppurat'd and Cur'd.

Mrs. Millbanck giving Suck had a hard, red and painful Swelling, feal'd in the upper part of her Breaft : I laid on it the following Emplaster of Dr. Bate. Take Sperma Ceti one ounce, white Wax two ounces, Galbanum prepar'd with Vineger half an ounce, Oyl of Elder fo much as fuffices, mix them and make an Emplaster, of which spread upon Cloth, and lay it on a good deal beyond the pain'd part; then lay all over the Emplaster a Bag fill'd and quilt'd with Rye meal, warm it upon a warming Pan, and lay it on as hot as can bee endur'd. In a fhort time the Swelling was suppurat'd, and open'd it self of its own accord, and much Pus flowed thence; Then it was dreffed twice a day withthat excellent wound 398 Approuv'd Remedies for Ch. LVII.

wound Balfam of Arcaus; The Emplaster and the Bag of Rye-meal was continu'd to mollify the reit of the hardness, and so this Swelling was heal'd within the space of a few days: Contrary to the vulgar custum I did not use Tents in this case, for the reason which a learn'd Author gives in the following observations. Hartman,

The aforefaid Emplafter is not only good againft any hard Swelling in Womens Breafts, occafion'd thrô a Blow, Cold taken, or Milkcurdled therein; but being apply'd to a white Swelling in the Knee, call'd an Oedema, it difcuffes or diffolves it, eafes the pain thereof, and strengthens it, and indeed is good against any hard swelling in any part of the Body foever. The Ballam of Arcaus will be fet down amongst other Balfams.

IX. An other Swelling in the Break Suppurat'd and cur'd by a Famous Author.

A Woman giving Suck, had been Ill for fome days of a hard, red and painful Swelling, feat'd in the upper part of the Breaft : The Author laid on it the Emplaster of Paraceliss, and the Bag of Rye-meal (as in the obfervation aforegoing) by which the Swelling in a short time was suppurat'd, and open'd it felf of its own accord, and much Laudable Pu's flow'd thence for some time : In the mean while the Author laid on the apperture the Balfam

Balfam of Arcams, and continu'd the Emplaster with the Bag of Rye-meal to mollify the reft of the hardness, and fo this Swelling was heal'd with in a few days : Contrary to the vulgar culturn he did not use Pledgets or Tents in this Case, because he fays in many Cases like this they do more hurt than good; for they are wont to offend the bottom of the Ulcer by pricking it, and to render the edges of it Callous, and in the mean while they do no good, because the Pus is often found to pass off well enough without their help.

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Mrs. Jupony being great with Child, had been III for fome days or desparate hard, red and painful Swelling in her right Breaft, caus'd by a Blow, a Chyrurgeon being feht for, demanded five pounds in hand, and five pounds after the Clire, faying there would be work for Chirurgeons; Her Mother Mrs. Nickols, Hot being able to give him ten millings, much lefs ten pounds, brought her Daughter to me to fee her fore Breast : I presently apply d' the Emplaster of Paracelfus, and over that the hor Bag with Rive meal, in a few days the Swelling was suppurat'd, and open'd it self of its own accord with a large Orifice, and much Laudable Pas flowed thence. To the apperture I apply'd twice a day the Ballam of Arcaus, and CO12400 Approv'd Remedies for Ch. LVI.

continu'd the Emplaster and the hot Bag with Rye-meal to mollify the rest of the hardness, and with in the space of less than three weeks, this Breast was heal'd and as well as the other, and so continueth to this day. Hartman.

By the fame methode I Cured alfo Mrs. *VVyburn*, at *Shadwell-Dock* in *VVappin*, of a hard, red and painful Swelling in her Breaft caufed by Milk-curdl'd.

XI. A Cancered Breast Cur'd.

Sir K. Digby relates that Mr. Breffieus, a Chirurgeon in Pars, apply'd to Mrs. Brents Cancered Breast when it begun to break the following Pultice. Take an old mellow Pippin, cut off a cap at the top of it, and then take out the Core leaving the fides of the Apple whole, that the melt'd Greafe may not get out; Fill the whole with Hogs-greafe, then cover it with the cap, and fet the Apple to rolt, when it is well rolt'd to pap, take it and pare off all the paring, and break and mingle perfectly all the pap, that it may spread well, and be a uniform pulp; fpread it thick upon Linnen; and lay it warm upon the Sore, putting a Bladder over it. It is to be chang'd every twelve or four and twenty hours, according as it groweth dry. It is an excellent Pultice to take away cool and diffolve any Swelling and hardness if it be diffolvable; and if not, to make it break and separate with case, and without XII. tharpnefs.

Chap. LVI. Womens Sore Breasts.

XII. A bleeding Nipple cur'd in a Woman that gave Suck.

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Take Gum Arabick, cut it in thin flices, then dry it and pouder it, of this powder she put upon her Nipple with her finger, being first moisten'd with her own Spittle; and fo the day following the was holy freed from this Evil, and continu'd well.; There are often feen in Nipples Fiffures or Clefts which mightily torture Women that give fuck, and are difficultly cur'd, because the Nipples by reason of the fucking Infants, get little or no reft. Now a famous Author fays he has often cur'd thefe Fiffures in a fhort time by gently touching them Every day with a Feather dipt in oyl of Myrrh. Either the diffil'd Ovl or that which is made perdeliquium in the whites of Eggs boild'd hard, either of them will do. That perdeliquium will be set down in the Chapter of the Cosmeticks for the Face and Skin.

XIII. An Ointment against Fissures, Clifts or Chaps. Dr. Bate.

Take Myrrh, Ginger, Litharge of Silver of each an ounce, Hony four ounces, Wax two ounces, oyl of Rofes fix ounces, mix them according to Art. For the Rich you may add oyl of Rhodium twelve drops, leaves of Gold ten. Otherwife thus; Take fine Bole, Myrrh, D d white 402 Approv'd Remedies Chap. LVII.

white Lead of each two drams, Ducks greece what fuffices, mix and make an Ointment; It cures quickly.

XIV. Another of Dr. Salmon which he fays is better.

Take Beef fuit three ounces, Wax one ounce, Strasburk Turpentine half an ounce, oyl of bitter Almonds what fuffices to bring into the Body of an Ointment being melted together. Anoint herewith Morning and Evening at bed time, and in a few days the Fiffuries or Chaps will be well.

CHAP. LVII.

Of Discases Incident to Children.

1. An Excellent Remedy that bas cur'd many Children of Convulsive Fits,

TAke two or three drops of (Chymical)oyl of Rosemary, and put it into half an ounce of Sack in an ounce Vial, stop the Vial, and let it be well shak'd to make a whitish mixture of the Liquor just before you give it; or else in a half pint Bottle or Vial, put sour ounces of Sack, or of the Antipileptick water of Langian, and drop into it fourty drops of the said Oyl; and

Chap. XLVII. for Children.

and when ever you are to give the Medicine fhake the Vial well ftopt, and prefently give of the whitifh mixture a Childs little fpoonful. If you give this to an Infant newly born it will prevent Convulfive fits in the fame afterwards, tho former Children Born of the fame Parents have been found obnoxious to Convulfions. Some pour into the Mouth of an Infant newly Born, fo foon as it begins to breath forme drops of pure Hony. Others oyl of fweet Almonds freih drawn; fome a drop of oyl of Amber, or half a fpoonful of Antiepileptick water.

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II. Take water of black Cherries and Rue of each an ounce and half, the Antiepileptick water of Langiss an ounce, fyrup of Coral fix drams, Pearl prepared fifteen grain, mix them in a Vial, and give a fpoonful of it twice a day, befides the things before mention'd which are given to the Infant newly Born which truly feem to be of fome moment. Dr. VVilks. Let the Temples and Neck be gently rub'd with this following. Take oyl of Nutmegs by exprefion two drams, Oleum Captorij three drams, oyl of Amber a fcruple mix them. Take of the Roots and Seeds of the greater Piony, with a little addition of Elkshoof, make a Necklace, and hang it about the Neck.

Untzer us greatly commends the Gall of a fucking Whelp, wiz. that all the juice of the Gallblalder be taken forth and given to the Child with a little water of Limetree flowers.

A learned Physician favs that he has known Dd 2 many

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many cur'd with this Remedy : Moreover fome after the Gall is drank, are wont alfo to give to great Children to eat the Liver rosted.

Antiepileptick water of Langius corrected au ounce, Sugar of Pearl two drams, mix them and make a Julep.

V. Take fresh roots of Male Piony four ounces, bruise them in a stone Mortar, then pour to them Canary a pint, press it out strongly, add Pearl d Sugar half an ounce, keep it in a Glass close stopt; the Dose is a spoonful or two twice a day. Dr. VVillus.

V. For the Epilepfy in Children after a loofnefs, *Diafcordium* as much as a Pepper Corn, diffolv'd in Saxiafrage water, or the Mothers Milk, and given, is a very excellent Remedy. Dr. Sydenbam.

VI. A Corrected Antiepileptick water of Langius.

Take Shavings or Raspings of Man's Scul, Misletoe of the Oak, roots of Piony and white Dittany of each two ounces, fresh flowers of Lillies of the Vally two handfuls, Lavender, Rosemary and Limetree of each three handfuls, Cinnamon fix drams, Nutmegs half an ounce, Cloves, Mace and Cubebs of each two drams, being all bruis'd put them in a Matrass, and pour to them four quarts of Malmsey, stop it closs and let them Digest in a genle heat of Sand; then pour it into a Cucurbite and distil it in Balneo. This

Chap. LVIII. for the Worms.

This Anti Epileptick water of Langius, (fo often nam'd and prefcrib'd in other Authors) has been long inrequeft, but it will be much better adding the Shavings of Human Scull, and prepating it as is here prefcrib'd. It is given in Epileptick paffions from two drams to an ounce. It may be us'd alfo as well for the prevention, as in the cure of this diftemper. It prevails alfo against all cold Difeases of the Head and Brain. It has been corrected by a learn'd and judicious Physician.

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VII. An excellent and experienc'd Remedy for Convulfion Fits and Falling Sickness.

Take Piony roots, fresh dig'd, scrape them with a Knife, and apply it to the Soles of the Feet.

CHAP. LVIII.

I. An excellent Infusion for the VVorms.

TAke Rubarb the best one dram, Sena the best four scruples, seeds of Santon. one dram and half, Coriander, Anisceds of each one scruple, Cream of Tartar one scruple, blew Currans three drams, mix and make a close and warm Insussion in white Wine half a pint for an hour, then strain it to the strain'd Liquor, Dd 3 add 406 Approv'd Remedies Chap. LVIII.

add Manua one ounce, fyrup of Buckthorn berries two drams, Spirit of Carraway one fcruple. The Dofe is four spoonfuls every other Morning.

II. An excellent VVorm Powder.

Take Mercurius Dulcis well prepar'd fifteen grains, Rofin of Jalap fix grains, pouder of Rubarb eight grains, with fyrup of Succory and Rubarb what fuffices make a Bolus, to be taken upon a Knives point, drinking after it a draught of warm Ale in the Morning with Governance. You may proportion the quantity of the ingredients according to the Age and ftrength of the Patient.

To a Child miferably troubl'd with Convulfions fo that he feem'd even a dying, I gave a Dofe of *Mercuriuus Dulcis* with Rofin of Jalap, which gave him four stools, he voided twelve Worms, and presently grew well. Dr. VVillis.

The learned Dr. Riverius his Infalliable Remedy against the Worms is thus :

Take Calomelanos eight grains, Scammony fix grains, grind them to a fubtil pouder, and give it in a Morning in a fpoonful of Milk. This he fays has cur'd when all other Remedies have fail'd.

III. A great secret to Destroy VVorms in the Body of Man.

Take Monsedunk from three grains to seven, pouder Chap. LVIII. for the Worms.

pouder it and give it in a little warm Milk for the Maw worms; But for those Worms call'd Ascarides, which are little slender short Worms breeding in the Guts, especially near the Arssgut, you must give it in a Clister, one dram of the Dung in pouder boil'd in a point of Milk, and put in a little Clister Sugar. The Author fays it hath perform'd the cure when all other Remedies have fail'd, and commonly in three, four or five times : It hath brought them away in large quantities and Numbers.

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IV. A mater killing VV orms.

Take Crud Mercury well cleans'd one ounce, Water of Grafs and Purflane of each four ounces,; put them in a Bottle and shake them well together for an hour the bottle close stopt, then pour it into a pipkin Glaz'd and boil it for two or three hours. It is an effectual Remedy, against the Wormbs of all forts, and may be given with all the fafety Imaginable. It is much us'd now a days, and some boil it only in Rain water, and some in River water.

V. An Emplaster for the VVorms.

Take Aloes in pouder one ounce, Colocynthis, Myrrh of each three dram, Savin, Rue, Wormwood, Tanfy, Walnut tree Leaves, Briony Roots of each two drams, Wax, Rofin, mix them and make an Emplaster which ap-Dd 4

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ply to the Navil, being fpread upon Leather; It is good for Children that will not take any thing inwardly. But before you apply it bathe the Belly well with this mixture. Take of a ftrong Decoction of Colocynthis four ounces, Ox Gall an ounce and half, mix them and therein diffolve Aloes in pouder two drams, add Brandy one ounce.

CHAP. LIX.

I. An experimented Remedy for the Rickets.

TAke Roots of Smallage, Parfly, Fennel and Angelica Roots, flice them and boil them in diffil'd water of Angelica, unfet Hyfop and Coltsfoot of each one part till they are tender, then firain it, and boil it up to a fyrup with white Hony. Then take a flick of Liquorice fcrape it and bruife one end of it, and give the Child with it of the fyrup one fpoonful in the Morning, at four in the Afternoon and at Night.

II. A Bath for the Rickets, Livergrown, or Obfirmctions of the Liver in a Child.

Take a Sheepfhead with the Wool on it, clave it in the middle, and boil it till it be tender, that the bones flip clean out of the flefh, boil-

Chap. LIX. for the Rickets.

boiling with it Smallage, Camomil, Primrofe leaves and Hyfop of each four handfuls; then bathe the Child all over with this Broth, as hot as can be endur'd twice a day; then mafh the Herbs with the Flefh, and bind it on warm to the joints that are weak.

III. Another try'd remedy for the Rickets.

Take a quart of new Milk, boil it with a handful of Sanicle. fhred fmall, till a pint be boil'd away, let the Child drink of it warm in the Morning fafting, and let it neither eat or drink till an hour after it; and at Night boil a handful of red Mint in a quart of Milk, and let the Child eat it laft at Night. Continue this for a Month.

IV. An approv'd Ointment for the same.

Take Sanacle. red Mints, of each two handfuls, chop them finall and ftamp them, then boil them in a pound of fresh Butter not falted; then pressit out, and anoint the Childs breast, Arms and Gullet bones with it warm before a Fire.

V. A remedy to cure and prevent the Rickets.

Take Dandelion, the inner bark of Ash of each half a handful, chop them as small as you can, then put them in a Glass bottle, and pour upon

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upon it a quart of small Beer and Ale, shake it well, and let the Child drink of this; keep one bottle under another. Which a Lady of quality told me she had prevented the Rickets in all her Children.

VI. Dr. Sydenhams remedy for the Rickets.

Take common Wormwood, leffer Centory, White Horehound, Germander, Scordium, Calamins, Feverfew, Saxifrage, St. Johns wort, Golden Rod, wild Thime, Mint, Sage, Rue, Carduus Benedictus, Pennyroyal, Southernwood, Camomil, Tanfy and Lilics of the Vally, all fresh gather'd an cut small of each one handful ; Hogs Lard four pounds, Sheeps Tallow two pounds, Claret wine a quart; let them stand twelve hours foaking on hot Ashes, in a Earthen Pipkin; then boil away the moilture, and afterwards strain them for a Liniment, with which anoint the Belly, and under the fhort Ribs, and also the Limbs or Joints, every Morning and Evening, for five or fix days until the Child recover.

VII. An other of Dr. Salmon which he fays is very much better.

Take oyl of Ben. or Neatsfoot oyl eight ounces, chymical oyls of Rofemary, Sage, Lavender, Lemons, Mint, Pennyroyal, Sarfafrafs, and Camomil of each four fcruples, mix them, with Chap. LIX. Rickets in Children.

with which anount all the Joints, the Back, Ribs, Stomach, and under the fhort Ribs and the Belly, Morning and Evening for fome confiderable time.

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Dr. Sydenbam orders the afore prescrib'd Ingredients two hanfuls of each, to be cut small, and infus'd cold in four Gallons of Ale, or ordinary drink.

VII. A Decoction for the Rickets in Children, Dre Bate.

Take Roots of Polipody of the Oak, Smallage, Fennel of each an ounce, Liquorice, Anifeeds of each half an ounce, Hartftongue, Maidenhair, Dodder, Bettony, Celandine, Tamarisk of each one handful, blew Currans three ounces, Barly water two quarts, boil it two one half, and ftrain it; give two, three or four fpoonfuls thereof at a time, twice or thrice a day, in the mean time purging once a Week with fyrup of Succory with Rubarb.

VIII. A Julep against the Rickets of the same Author.

Take water of Hartstongue distil'd, pour it again upon fresh Heabs, and distil again, then take of this Water four ounces, Contection of Alkermes one dram, fyrup of Clove Gilloflowers two drams, Spirit of Sulphur six drops, leaves of Gold twelve, mix and make a pleafing

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fing Julep; the dose is two spoonfuls twice a day. The Ladies say it is of wonderful force.

Mr. Boyl greatly commends Ens venerus, he fays It cur'd more than an hundred Children of the Rickets; the Dofe is from four grains to twelve in any proper Liquor.

IX. A Pouder for the same.

Take pouder of the Roots of Ofmund Royal four ounces, Sugar two ounces, mix them, fprinkle a little thereof upon all their thin or Liquid food, fo as they may take two or three drams of it in a day, for five or fix Weeks together.

CHAP. LX.

Of the Fever in Children from Breeding Teeth.

I. Give the Child two, three or four drops of Spirit of Hartfhorn, as the Age of the Child may require every four hours, in a fpoonful or two of black Cherry water, or fome other proper Julep, repeating it five or fix times. Dr. Sydenbam:

11. For the preventing the hard breeding of Teeth, the use of Corals were invented; that by the Constant rubbing of the Gums with them

them the Child might breed them with the more eafe and fafety.

CHAP. LXI.

Of Hectick Fever in Children. Dr. Sydenham.

I. THey pine with a fenfible heat, and weaknefs of Appetite; the Trunk of the Body and the Limbs waft alfoaway.

II. Take two drams of Rubarb flic'd thin, put it into a Glafs bottle, and pour upon it a quart of finall bear, fhake it well together, and let it be for ordinary drink; and after it is drank up, put upon the fame Rubarb another quart of Beer, and fo a third time.

II'. But if the drink be two much impregnated with a purgative vertue, after one pint is drank up, let another be prefently added to that which remains. Dr. Sydenham.

A Remedy for a Child that cannot hold its water, whether Male or Female.

Take the Navel string of the Child when it is ready to fall from him, dry it and pouder it, and give it the Child in two spoonfuls of small bear in the Morning fasting.

CHAP.

Chap. LXII.

CHAP. LXII.

Of the Measles.

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I. An Appozem, or drink in the Measles.

TAke of the Pectoral Decoction a pint and half, fyrup of Violets and Maidenhair of each an ounce and half, mix and make an Apozem; the dofe is three or four ounces, three or four times in a day. Dr. Sydenbam.

II. A Linsture for the same of the same Author:

Take of Oyl of fweet Almonds new drawn onc ounce, white Sugarcandy a sufficient quantity, mix and make a Lohoch or Lincture, to be taken often with a Liquorice stick bruis'd at one end, especially when the Cough is troublesome.

III. Take of black Cherry water three ounces, fyrup of Poppies one ounce, mix them for a draught which is to be taken every Night, from the beginning to the end of the diftemper; the dofe according to the Age of the Sick.

IV. Let the Sick keep their Bed two days after the first coming forth of the Spots.

CHAP.

Chap. LXIII.

CHAP LIII.

Of the Small Pox.

A Gentleman falling Ill of the Small Pox the fourth day of his Illneis he feem'd mortally Ill with Vomiting and a violent Fever; a Lady warm'd him a quarter of a pint of Sack, and put into it a good fpoonful of Sallet Oyl, and gave it him, holding an Orange to his Nofe, that he vomitted not up; the next day the Pox came out kindly, and he had no ill fymptoms after, but foon recover'd. His Man catching them, and being light-headed, got out in the Snow, he was brought in, and had the fame Potion given him, and tho they were ftruck in, they came out again almost as black as Jet, yet with no ill fymptoms enfuing, but became Imediately well and recover'd.

This Medecine hath been try'd many times, and always with the like good fuccels. The following is out of Dr. Sydenbam's practice.

II. He advices to give a Vomit in any of the three first days; then during the first days to let the Blood be made thin by frevent draughts of small beer hop'd. Or the following Julep. Take Milk water eight ounces, choice Canary an ounce and half, Spirit or Salt Armoniac, two drams, mix it for four little draughts, Dr. Salmen.

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III. Affoon as all the Pox are broke out (which is generally on the fixth day of the Difeafe) let an ounce of fyrup of Poppies be given at Night, which may afterwards be continu'd every Night to the tenth day after Invafion.

IV. Let the Dofe be increased that Night (if the Pox be of the running kind) to an ounce and half, and one ounce in the Morning, and repeat it in like manner till the Sick begins to grow well.

V. If the fyrup of Poppies does not agree with them, you may take Liquid Lawdanum in its place, viz. eighteen drops for an ounce of fyrup, and twenty five for an ounce and half, you may give it in clear Poffet drink

V I. In the mean time you ought to take notice, that if the refting Medecine, given twice a day be not powerful enough to lay the commotion (as it often times happens about the end of the Eruption, when the Pox runs notably together) in that cafe you may reiterate it every eight hours, or oftner, if need require.

VII. But when the Pox are diffined it will be enough to give a refting draught once every Night, after the full comming forth ; and alfo in a fmaller dofe.

VIII. If the Urin be wholly ftopt, let the Sick be taken out of his Bed, and endeavour to walk a little.

IX. If the Spitle by reafon of the Heat be fo tough that it cannot be fpit forth, let a Gargarifm be very often injected into the Throat with

with a Syringe : It may be made of fmall Beer or Barly-water with Honey of Rofes : Or thus

X. Take of the bark of the Elm-tree fix drams, Liquorice Roots half an ounce, twenty fton'd Raifins, red Rofes two pugils, boil them in a fufficient quantity of Water to a pint and half, in which being ftrain'd out, diffolve Oximel fimple and Honey of Rofes of each two ounces, mix them for a Gargarifmes

XI. When the Pox are fully dry'd up, let the Face be anoint'd with a Liniment made of equal parts of Oyl of Sweet Almonds and Pomatum two days, and no longer. Dr. Salmon fays the following is the best of Liniments.

Take Sacharum Saturni two drams, diffolve it in Juice of Lemons half an ounce, with which mix pure Sperma Ceti one ounce, Oyl of Ben. three ounces and a half, and keep it for ufe, and anoint therewith twice a day.

XII. On the thirteenth day of any other fucceeding day; but not before, the Sick may be gently purg'd; as for example, let him take an ounce of Lenitive Electuary, diffolv'd in four ounces of Succory or Milk Water. Dr. salmon advifes to let purging alone till the end of the Difeafe, and then the beft Purge in the World is the Salt Mirabile (of Glauber) which you may give from three drams to fix, according to Age and ftrength, mixt in half a pint or a pint of fair Water, or in as much Poffet drink, and fo give it, with obfervation as in other Purges; it neither makes the Stor E e mach 4.8 for the Small Pox. Chap. LXIII.

mach Sick, nor gripes, enters actually into the whole Mais of Blood and clenfes it througly, which fearcely any other purging Medicine does befides : You may fafly enough repeat it three or four times. See Salmon in Sydenham's praétice.

Hartman, The faid Sal Mirabile, or Wonderful Salt of Glauber, a German Phyfitian and Chymift) hath bee in great efteem in Germany and Holland for many years; and is this day much us'd and eftim'd in England; it is highly commend'd to be the beft thing to give to Children for the Rickets, or in their Fever from breeding Teeth, or in their Hecktick Fevers, in which cafes I ufually give it with good fuccefs; as alfo for the Itch, Scab, or Scal'd Heads *Ore.* in all which cafes it is the beft purge. I have it always by me ready prepar'd, and fell it for eight Shillings the Pound.

XIII. In the fmall Pox, Dr. Sydenham adviles to let the Patients Food be Oat-meal and Barly-broths, boyl'd Apples and fmall Beer; and after the eleven day, let him drink, if he pleafes, four or five fpoonfuls of Sack twice a day.

XIV. If during the first days of the Distemper the Sick spits or pisses Blood, let the Pouder and Mixture, prescribed in the Chapter of Spitting of Blood, be carefully exhibit'd ever fixth hour, till the Symptoms perfectly go away: in which case also large doses of Opiats or resting Medicines may be given.

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CHAP. LXIV.

I. A Pouder against Vomiting or Spitting of Blood.

Take of Bole Armeniack one ounce, pouder of Comfry Roots two drams, Terra Sigillata, Blood-Stone and Dragons Blood of each one dram, fine white Sugar the weight of all the other things; mix them and make a fine Pouder : The Dofe is one dram in the Morning, another at five a clock in the Afternoon, and one dram at Night, drinking four ounces of the following Decoction after it.

II. Take Plantain, Bramble-leaves and yarrow of each one handful, boil them to a fit quantity of Water to a pint and a half; in the straining diffolve two ounces of Syrup of Comfry.

III. Or let him take fix fpoonfuls of the following Tincture. Take of red Rofes fix drams, the inner Bark of Oak half an ounce, Plantain feeds a little bruis'd three drams, Spring Water one quart, Spirit of Vitriol a fufficient quantity to give it a pleafant fharpnefs : Infufe them for four hours in a clofs Veffel with a gentle heat : To the Straining add three ounces of Barly Cinnamon-water, and a fufficient quantity of white Sugar to make it pleafant to the taft.

Dra

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Dr. Salmon fays there is no Pouder like this: Take of Catechu one fcruple, Jefuits Bark twelve grains, Henbane-feeds fix grains, Opium one grain; mix for a Dofe to be every day once or twice repeated, according as the urgency and neceffity may require. It may be given in this Decoction; Take of the Jefuits Bark in grofs pouder two ounces, Cinnamon one ounce, red Wine a quart, boil 'm clofs cover'd for a quarter of an hour; then ftrain out for four times. IV. If the Sick cannot take the Pouders let

him use the Electuary spoken of in the chapter of the Flux of the Terms.

V. Mr. Boyl's Syrup of Comfry-roots for fpitting of Blood, which he gave to Sir Kenelme Digby is thus: Take Camphire-root freshly gather'd fix ounces, Plantain leaves twelve handfuls, beat all well in a Mortar, and press out the Juice strongly, and with such quantity of Sugar more or less, as you intend to keep it long or use it quickly, make Syrup of it. Take of it often in the day a spoonful or two at a time. You need not let the Juice settle to separate the grose part from it (which may be the best in this Case.) Chap. LXV.

CHAP. LXV.

I. A Remedy against Bleeding at the Nose or a Wound.

TAke the juice of the Leaves of Netles a quarter of a pint at a time fweetn'd with Sugar. It is a certain Remedy. Or take Tents with Lint, and dip them in the juice of Nettles, and put them up into the Nostrils. Or you may burn the Blood that cometh fourth out of the Patients Nose, and blow the ashes up into the Nostrils, for it is also of excellent use, Dr. Sermon.

II. A very defparate and continual Bleeding at the Nofe hath often been ftanch'd, by making the Party hold in their hand a little of the Herb Shepper's-Pouch, in Latin Burfa Pastoris; wear it continually, and it will prevent Bleeding : It will suffices the one wear it but in their Pocket, or to their Hot band. Sir Ken. Digby.

111. To ftanch the Blood of a Wound thô an Artery be cut; ftrew thick upon it the Pouder of certain Balls, call'd Fur-Balls; and if you have the whole Ball, put over the Pouder fome of the Spingy part of the Ball, and bind it on.

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IV. A sudden and infallible cure of Bleeding, either at the Nofe or by a Bloody-Flux.

Take two parts of the Moss that growes on the Scull of a dead Man, pull it as fmall as you can with your fingers, and one part of Maflick in pouder, mingle them well together; then make them into the confiftance of a foft Plaster with Gum Tragacanth brought into a Mucilage by steeping in Plantain and red Rofewater of each a like : Of this make a Plaster upon Linnen or Leather an Inch and half or two luches long, and not fo broad, to lay upon the Veins of the Fore-head, at the joyning of the Nofe and a long the Eye-browes, for Bleeding at the Nofe : But for a Bloody-Flux it must be as large the Palm of a hand, and round, to lay upon the Navil and round about it : This last must be apply'd warm'd a little.

V. The true Description of Sir Ken. Digby's Pouder of Sympathy, as it was prepar'd every Year in bis Elaboratory, and as 7 prepare it now, which is a Specifick to fanch Bleeding, either at the Nofe, or of a Wound, and to cure green Wounds (where there is no fracture of Bones) without any Balfams, Oyntments or Emplasters.

Take good English Vitriol, what quantity vou please, dissolve it in warm Water, using no more Water than will diffolve it, leaving tome

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fome of the impurest part at the bottom undiffolv'd, then pour it of and filter it; and boil it in an Earthen Veffel glazed, till you fee a thin Scum upon it; then set it in a Cellar to cool, covering it loofly fo that nothing may fall in : After two or three days standing, pour off the Liquor, and you will find at the bottom and on the fides large and fair green Chrystals; drain off all the Water from them and dry them; then fpread them, a broud in a large flat Earthen Dish, and expose them to the hot Sun in the Dog-days, taking them in at Night, and feting them out in the Morning, fecuring them from the Rain; and when the Sun hath calcin'd them to whiteness, beat them to pouder and fift it, and fet it in the Sun again, stirring it some times; and when you fee it is perfectly white, pouder it and fift it finely, and let it again in the Sun for a day; then put it up in a Glass and stop it close. The next year when the Dog-days some, if you have any of this Pouder left, you may expole it to the hot Sun for a day, spreading it a broad. To stanch the Bleeding of a Wound and to heal it, take fome of the Blood of the Wound, and put upon it some of the faid Pouder of Sympathy upon a rag, then keep onely the Wound clean with a clean Linnen about it to keep the Air out of it, and the Wound will heal without any Salve or Balfam; but befure you put the Rag with the Pouder in a Box, or in your Pocket securing it from wet.

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To ftanch Bleeding at the Nofe, put fome of the Pouder upon fome of the Blood; and befides take a Poringer full of frefh-water, and put into it a fpoonful of the faid pouder, ftir it, and dip a Linnen cloth in it and bath your Noftrils with it, and fnuf up fome of the water into the Noftrils. Thus a defperate Bleeding hath many times been ftanch'd when all other Remedies have fail'd.

V. The Wound Water of Sir Ken. Digby in Dr. Bate's Dispensatory.

Take of the best and greenest English Vitriol half an ounce, pure Nitre two drams, put upon it Fountain Water six Gallons, stir it well, then let it stand still for eight and forty hours; then with a Syphon (without troubling the subsiding matter) draw off the Water. The Dose is half a pint or a pint, twice or thrice a day. It immediatl and effectually cures Wounds or Ulcers.

Dr. Salmon's comment upon it) The Niter is chiefly put in, to caufe an exquifite fubfidence of the diffolv'd matter, that the Water might be perfectly clear. It is doubtlefs an excellent thing for the curing of any Wound or Ulcer, whether inward or outward, in what part of the Body foever. And fince Vitriol (in the Sympathetick Pouder) has fuch a mighty power and force, that it is able to cure Wounds at a diffance; yea, and at a very great diffance; it

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it is much more reafonable being taken into the Body, that it fhould perform the fame thing more powerfully, and with more fingular advantages.

This Water drank for fome Months together, is faid to fweeten the whole Mafs of Blood, and perfectly to Cure the Leprofy, Scurf, Morphew, and fuch like defedations of the Skin.

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I. For an Intermiting Fever, vulgarly call'd Agues.

TAke a spoonful of good strong Mustard, mix it with a draught of hot Ale, and let the Sick drink it when ever he perceives his Fit coming upon him: Repeat it two or three times, if it cures not the first. See more in the Chapter of Fevers.

II. Another for the same.

Take Rue and Pennyroyal of each a handful, boil them together in a Poffet made of Ale and Milk, drink a good draught thereof warm in the Morning failing, and when you go to Bed; continue this for three days together.

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III. The Counters of Kent's pouder as it was prepar'd in Sir K. Digdby's Elaboratory, and as I prepare it now.

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Take the black end of Crabs Claws four ounces, Crabs Eyes, Pearls and Corals prepar'd of each an ounce, yellow Amber half an ounce, Roots of Contrayerva, Virginia Snakroot of each fix drams, Oriental Bezoar three drams, the bones that are found in the Hearts of Stags four scruples; reduce all into a subtile pouder, Sprinkle the pouders of Pearl, Coral, Crabs Claws and Crabs Eyes with a little Juice of Lemon; then the next day mix all well together. adding one ounce of Tincture of Saffron, and one ounce of Troches of Vipers; grind it all well together upon a Marble stone with Jelly of Hhartshorn, and Jelly of the Skins of Vipers to an impalpable pouder : Then make itup into little balls like Pegions Eggs and let them dry. This pouder is a molt Soverain Remedy in all Pestilential and Epidemical Distempers, in all Malignant, Spotted or Purple Fevers; the Small Pox and Meafles, drives the venom from the Heart, and hinders the vapours to fly up to the Head and Brain; it is Sudorifick, and drives out by transpiration all bad humors, refifts corruption; It is Cordial, coroborates and Strengthens Nature; the Dofe is from lix to twenty or thirty grains, and in an extreamity of the Plague one may give it from thirty to forty grains. IV.

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IV. The Lord Abbington's Pouder.

Take Pearl, Coral, Crabs Eyes, Saffron of each one dram, Nutmeg, Mace of each half a dram, Diapenthe; Roots of Contrayerva and Elecampane of each half an ounce, reduce them all to a fubtile pouder, and then grind it upon a Marble ftone with Rofewater, then let it dry, and being pouder'd again make it up into little bails with Venice Treacle, and Gelly of Hartshorn; let them dry and keep them for ufe. The Dofe and vertue is the fame with the former.

V. An Experimented Wound drink, which cur'd a Gentlewoman of an Ulcer in the Reins in Six Weeks Space. Sir K. Digby.

Take leaves of the large Comfry, Agrimony, Mugwort of each two handfuls; Mumia half an ounce, Speedwell fix handfuls, fhred the Herbs, and Pouder the Mumia and boil them in a fufficient quantity of white Wine and water in a veffel clofe cover'd, then pour off as much as you can of the clear, and then diffil the remaining, and put the diffil'd water to the clear Decoction that you pour'd off. Take of this a little glafsful in the Morning fafting, and as much at four a clock in the Afternnoon. This cur'd alfo a Fryer, who being cut of the Stone could not be heal'd.

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VI. A drink for a burning Scab or Salt Humor experienc'd.

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Take of Lignum Vitæ half a pound, Bark of the fame, Anifeed and Liquorice of each an ounce, Hony ten ounces, Violet leaves, Hartstongue, Liverwort of each a handful, French-Barly two ounces, Raifons flic'd one pound and half, twelve Figs flic'd, cut the Herbs, and boil all in three quarts of Spring water to two quarts; then ftrain it, and take a draught of it in the Morning, at four in the Afternoon, and another at Night, drink it cold.

An Ointment to be us'd with this Drink.

Take white Lead, Litharg of Gold and Silver of each an ounce, reduce all into a fine pouder, and make an Ointment with Sallet Oyl and Vineger of each four ounces, grind the pouder with them by little and little in a Mortar, puting in fome times Oyl and fome times Vineger. It is excellen for any Tetter.

VII. An Emulfion for Heat in the Reins and Kidneys, and harpness of Urin.

Take of the greater cold Seeds of each half an ounce, feeds of Lettice and white Poppies of each two drams, with Barly water one pint make an Emulfion, fweeten it with fyrup of water

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water Lillies three ounces. Drink a little draught of it cold three times a day.

An Emulfion good in a Fever and the Pleurefy.

Take of the four greater cold feeds of each three drams, Hempfeed two drams; white Poppyfeeds one dram; beat them and make an Emulfion with Jelly of Hartfhorn and Poppy water of each half an ounce; fweeten it with fyrup of Corn Poppies.

IX. An Emulfion for Sharpness and gnawing in the Stomach.

Take white Poppy feeds two drams, French Barly beaten half an ounce, twelve blanch'd Almonds, with Bawm water and Alexitery Milft water, make an Emulfion, to which add fine Sugar and red Rofewater of each one ounce and a half; drink of this as often as you pleafe. Dr. Brooks

X. A purging Pouder for the Sciatica.

Take feeds of Dwarf-Elder, Turbith, Hermodactils, Sena, and white Tartar of each a Dram, Cinnamon two drams, make all into a fine pouder for four Dofes to be taken for four Mornings every third day.

XI. Excellent Pills for the Sciatica and any kind of Gout.

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Take Aloes and Hermodactils of each one dram, Diagridium half an ounce; reduce them to a fine pouder, and make it into Pills with fyrup of Rofes; take everythird day one dram for a Fortnight together.

XII. A most Soverain and approvid Ointment for the Gout.

Take the oldest Gander you can get, make him ready, and draw him, but let no water touch him : Take Sheeps Tallow, Hogs Greece, Pitch, Hony, and black Soap, Wax two ounces, a good handful of Salt, Frankensence in pouder three ounces, the Flesh of an old fat Cat, Meal or the Fower of Beans, and the Soot of a Chimny of each one handful, mix them well together, and put all into the Gandersbelly, and so him up close and rost him so long till he will drip no more; then put up your Ointment and anoint the griev'd part therewith.

XIII. An experienc'd remedy for the Ciatica and Rheumati(m.

Take Storax liquid, yellow Wax, new Pitch and Hony of each four ounces, Cinnamon, Pepper

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Pepper of each one ounce, pouder them and put them in a Pipkin and let it boil but one walm, Stirring it carefully all the while; then take it from the fire, and put into it four ounces of Aloes, and one once of Oyl of Lillies; firr them together to make them incorporate; then put the pot again upon hot alhes, and ftirr it till it be of the confiftence of an Ointment, of which fpread warm upon Leather and apply it; but if your Difeafe be in the whole Thigh, then fpread it upon a whole Lam's Skin.

XIV. A Pultice to open a Impostume and to ripen a Boyl.

Take the Whites of two Leeks, wrap them up in a wet Linnen Cloth, and bake them under hot Embers, fo that they be but foft and no more; then pound them with a piece of Hogsgreece, fpread this priety thick and apply it, changing it once in feven hours.

XV. A try'd Remedy for a Bruise and Swelling.

Take a pint of fair Water, boil in it a handful of Salt; then bathe the part fwell'd therewith as hot as can be endur'd. With this Mr. Stockdeal cur'd himfelf of a great bruife an fwelling upon his Foot, caus'd by a piece of brick falling upon it from the top of a Chimny.

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XVI. Another infaliable remedy for Bruefes and Swellings, to discuss the Humor and Swelling.

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Take fome Tow of Flax, flat it and lay it clofe, then moiften it with English Brandy or Spirits, and put upon it some Hony, sprinkle fome of the Bandy upon the Hony, and having bath'd the swelling with Brandy apply it.

This hath cur'd many Children of great Bruifes and Swellings upon the Forehead, caus'd by falling down.

XVII. For an Old Ach or Strain.

Take of Lucatella's Balfam one ounce, oyl of Turpentine one dram, incorporate them very well with a gentle heat, and anoint the part affected therewith, wearing on't a piece of unwafh'd Flannel befmear'd with the fame Oyntment.

XVIII. For a Recent strain or Bruise experimented by the Lord Bacan.

Take a good handful of fresh Wormwood, cut it small, and boil it in a sufficient quantity of strong Ale to the softness of a Pultice, then take it off the Fire; Foment the place griev'd with this Lipuor with Flanel cloths as hot as can be endur'd adding some good strong English Brandy or Spirits. Or you may boil the Herb whole,

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whole, and Foment with that having put the Brandy to it; then lay over it a Plaster made of the Emplaster of Paracels and Diapalma.

XIX. Or, make a ftrong Decoction of bitter Herbs, as Wormwood, St. John'swort, Fetherfew, Rue, Southarnwood, &c. in fair water; to a quart of the ftrain'd Liquor put a quarter of a pint of English Brandy, and Foment with it as hot as can be endur'd, twice a day, laying on afterwards the faid defensive fter.

XX. For a Burn or Scaldto take out the Fire.

Take whites of Eggs, beat them well, then mix and beat with them fome Sallet Oyl, and the juice of an Onion. Or take fresh Cowsdung and Hogs greece of each equal parts, mix and incorporate them well together over a gentle Fire.

XXI. An excellent Ointment for the cure of Burnes. Dr. Charras.

Take Hogfgreece one pound, white Wine two pints, leaves of leffer Sage, Ground Ivy, and Wall Ivy, Marjerom and bigger Houfleek of each two handfuls, boil them together over a foft Fire to the Confumption of the moifture, ftiring it well, then ftrain and prefs it out ftrongly.

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XXII. Another for the same of the same Author.

Take fresh Butter unfalted, melt it, and then take it off the Fire and put into it as much Snow as the heat of the Butter can convenienly melt; then scum of the Butter that swims above the Snow-water, add to it an ounce of white lead Pouder'd, Camphire pouder'd very little, with spirit of Wine one dram, mix it into an Ointment. It is highly esteem'd for the cure of all forts of Burns.

XXIII. An excellent yellow Ointment for cure of Ulcers in the Legs, Tetters, Childblains, Chaps and Clifts of the Breafts and other parts of the body.

Take fresh Butter six pounds boil it and purify it from dregs and moisture, yellow Wax four pounds, Rosin two pounds, Venice Turpentine one pound, make an Ointment according to Art, somewhat solid to the end it may lay upon the parts. Charras.

XXIV. An Ointment against Cancers in Womens Breasts, Heats and Inflamations, Erisipela's, &cc. Dr. Bate.

Take juice of Nightshade, oyl of Roses of each a pound and a quarter; boil it to the Consumption of the Juice, then strain it and add Litharge and white Lead of each one pound, mix

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mix them : Anoint therewith Morning and Evening, and fpread it upon faft gentle Leather and cover the whole Affect therewith. Dr. Salmon faysthat if Sacharum Saturny be added to it, it with be more effectual.

XXV. The Familiar Ointment of Dr. Bate.

Take May Butter feven ounces, Wax, Rofin of each four ounces, Hony ten drams, wheat flower fix drams, mix them and make an Ointment. It Warms, Moistens, Loosens, Discuffes, Cleanses, Smooths, Ripens and Digests; and is of Familier use for the speedy curing of Fellons, &c. Whitloes in Fingers, Kibs and Childblains in the Feet and Toes : It also helps Scorbutick Ulcers in the Feet. Spreed it upon Leather, and apply it warm to the part affected, renewing twice a day till you find amendment.

XXVI. A Green Ointment of Dr. Charras.

Take new Butter boil'd and purify'd four pound, Rofin and Burgundy Pitch of each one pound, yellow Wax four ounces, make an Ointment, when 'tis off the Fire add two ounces of Verdigreece pouder'd ftirring it till the Ointwent be cold. This is a wonderful Ointment to cleanfe and heal all forts of Wounds and Ulcers.

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XXVII. The bown Ointment of Dr. Bate.

Take Colcothar and Flegm of Vitriol of each one ounces, Celandine Vineger an ounce and half, Flowers of Verdigreece five drams, Clarifi'd Hony three ounces, mix and make and Ointment. This is made in imitation of the brown Ointment of that Famous German Surgion Felix Wurtz. It is one of the beft cleanfers in Wounds and Ulcers, and poffibly the beft of Remedies against all forts of running fores, Ulcers and Filtulaes in what part of the Body foever.

XXVIII. A black Ointment to ripen, open and cure all Impostumes, the Pestiferous.

Take common Oyl two pounds, white and yellow Wax, Ram's Kidnes fat, Rofin, Pitch, Venice Turpentine of each half a pound, Maftick finely pouder'd two ounces, melt, mix and make an Ointment. It breaks all forts of Apoftemes, as alfo peftilential Carbuncles, and venerial Buboes. It is to be us'd from the beginning to the end of the cure. Charras.

XXIX. The true description of Lucatella's Balsam as it was prepar'd for Str K. Digby and his Famaly, and as I pepare it now.

Take three pints of good Sallet Oyl, which waft

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wash first with good Clarret wine, then wash and beat one pound of the best Venice Turpentine in several white Rose waters, till it be very white and Liquid; take a new Earthenglaz'd pepkin of four quarts, put into it fix spoonfuls of Sack, and a pound of yellow Bees Wax cut small, put it over a gentile Charcole Fire; when the Wax is melted take it off the Fire and put to it the Turpentine by little and little, ftirring it very well; then put in the Sallet oyl, and ftir it all very well for a preaty while, fet it on the Fire again, and let it boil very gently, ftiring it carefully all the while, when you perceive all to be perfectly united together, take it from the Fire and fet it by to cool for one Night; the next Morning take a big flick, and put it through the Balfam till it touch the bottom, and lean it on one fide that all the extraneous moilture may run out, and drain very clean; then fet it on the Fire again, and when it is well melted strain into it by degrees one ounce of red Sanders in very fine pouder, take it off the Fire and stir it for a quarter of an hour, and set it on the fire again to boil very gently to the confiftency of a Balfam ftiring it well all the while; then take it from the Fire, and add to it one ounce of pure Natural Balfam of Pearl, and one ounce of the best oyl of St. John's-wort and ftir all exceeding well together for along time till it be perfectly cold; then tye over the Pipkin a Bladder, and cover it with a Leaden Cover, and fer hallow in the Ff 2 ground

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ground a yard deep fo the ground be dry fo low, it must be arch'd round about, and over them with sticks strong enough to bear the Earth, and keep it from falling close about the Pipkin, and then cover the vault very well with the Earth you dig'd out, and so let it remain the space of two Months.

XXX. The description of that Famous wound Balfam of Arcaus.

Take Sheeps Kidney-fewit, Gum Elemi, Venice Turpentine of each two ounces, oyl of St. John's wort, and ounce and half, Wax two drams mix them, let them all be melted, ftrain them and make a Balfam; then put into it red Sanders in fine pouder, ftir it continually till it be cold, It is very much efteem'd and us'd to Incarnate and Confolidate all forts of Wounds and Ulcers; as alfo for Fractures and Diflocations of the Bones, and to heal contufions and hurts of the Nerves. 'Tis very much us'd for the healing of fore Breafts, and Wounds in the Head.

XXXI. An Excellent Wound Balfam cheap and egfily made for poor People.

Take of Clowns Allheal four handfuls, chop and bruife it, and boil it in four ounces of Hogsgreece and half a pound of Oyl, with three ounces of Wax cut fmall, boil it until it buble

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no more; then take it of the Fire and strain it, and stir it till it be cold.

XXXII. The excellent Balfam of my Lord Craven.

Take yellow Wax half a pound, fhred it fmall, and melt it in half a pint of Canary, then add two pints of Sallet oyl, Venice Turpentine wafh'd three times in Rofe-water twelve ounces, boil it gently till they be well incorporated; then pour it out into a Bafin that it cool, and the drofs fettle; then being again well melt'd take it of the Fire and add two ounces of Natural Balfam, and one ounce of red Sanders in fubtil Pouder; ftir it till it be cold.

XXXIII. The Description of that excellent green Balsam of Metz.

Take Oyls of Linfeed and Olives of each a pint, Lorel Oyl one ounce, Venice Turpentine two onnces, melt them together over a very gentil Fire; then let it cool; and mix there with by degrees, diffilled Oyl of Juniperberries half an ounce, Verdigreece finely pouder'd three drams, Aloes Succotrine finely pouder'd two drams, white Vitriol one dram and half, Oyl of Cloves one dram; mix the Pouders firft, and then add the diffill'd Oyls; mix and incorporate all well together and flir it till it be cold. Dr. Scroderus fets down this F f 4 Balfam

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Balfam in his Chymical Difpenfatory, faying that Dr. du Clas, a Phyfitian of Metz, imparted it to him for an excellent Receipt, as indeed it is for all forts of Wounds, either by Sword or Bullet, being first wash't with warm Wine, and then anoited with this Balfam alfo warm, laying over all the Styptick Plaster, which I shall here after describe. It cleanses, incarnates and cicatrifes : It is also fingular against the biting of Venemous Beasts, Fistula's and malignant Ulcers.

XXXIV. The Description of the true Balsam or Oyl of St. John's wort.

Take tops and Flowers of St. John's wort when they are near ripe two pounds; stamp them, and pour upon them Sallet Oyl four pounds, good Claret or Port Wine half a pint, stop it close, and set it in warm water for four and twenty hours; then let the water boil it stands in, stiring the Ingredient some time, then strain and press it out strongly; then put into it the fame quantity of tops and flowers of St. John's wort, let it digest and boil as before; strain and pressout as before; repeat this a third time with new tops and flowers; digest and boil as before, then prefs it out, and you have an excellent Oyl of St. John's wort. But then to make this Oyl more efficacious having separated it from the dregs and moisture set it over a gentil Fire, and put into it two pounds of

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of Venice Turpentine, and ftir and incorporate them well together; then take it from the Fire and mix with it three ounces of Tincture of Saffron ftir them well together.

This Oyl thus prepar'd is an effectual Balfam, it warms, attenuates, diffipates and dries, and is very proper against all Pains, Aches, and Numness proceeding from Cold; particularly against all weaknesses in the Nerves and Joints, the Sciatica and all forts of Gouts; It eases the Pain of the Teeth : It heals all forts of Wounds, together with those of the Nerves, for it conglutinates and cicatrifes : It extends Shrunk Sinews, and firengthens them : It is good for Burnings, and for Convulsions and Cramps being given inwardly. Of this enters into the Composition of Lucatella's Balfam.

XXXV. The Description of that Famous Emplaster, call'd Manus Dei, which is so much us'd in France, where many Ladies of Quality take the Pains to Prepare it and distribute it to the Poor, as Dr. Charras relates in his Royal Dispensatory; Who advises to observe well the following Derections for the Preparation thereof.

Take common Oyl eight pints, Litharge of Gold finely pouder'd four pounds, yellow Wax cut fmall two pounds, Venice Turpentine one pound, Galbanum, Opopanax, Sagapen, Myrrh, Olibanum, Mastick of each eight ounces,

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ounces, Oyl of Lorrel fix ounces, Lapis Calaminaris and Load-Stone, long and round Birthwort of each four ounces : Grind the Lapis Calaminaris and Load-Stone upon a Marble-Stone with Plantain water, and dry them : Beat together the two Birth-worts, and the Myrrh and Maltick a part fifting them thrô the finest bottom Sieve; then put the Galbanum, Ammoniacum, Opopanax and Sagapen, all well bruis'd into an Earthen glaz'd Pipkin, and diffolve them over a gentle Fire in about a quart of good Vineger; strain them hot thrô a strong Cloth, and having well press'd them, put that which remains in the Cloth into the Pot again, and pour upon it fresh Vineger, and diffolve it over the Fire as before, strain and prefs it as before ; then evaporate the Vineger over a gentil Fire, and gently boil the Gums till they be fufficiently thick; then incorporate the Turpentine with them, and keep the Composition a part. Then put the Litharge into a Copper or Brafs-Pot, and incorporate it with the Oyl ftirring them continually with a Wooden Spatula; then add to them three pints of fair Water, and boil them over a good Fire, stirring them without intermiffion till it be of the Confistence of a folid Emplaster before you add the Wax; then melt the Wax in it, after take it off the Fire, and ftir it till it be some what cold : then add the Gums and Turpentine prepar'd, and then the Oyl of Lorel; and lastly the Pouders, and

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and be fure that all the Ingredients be well incorporat'd together. It is every day fuccefsfully us'd for the cure of all forts of Wounds and Ulcers, whether new or old, Contufions, Bruifes and Swellings; It mollifies, digefts, diffolves and brings to fuppuration fuch matters as require it; for it never fuppurates thofe which may be diffipated by transpiration; and when its ripen'd and drawn the Matters forth, it draws no more, but Cleanfes Cicatrifes, Confolidates and Heales alltogether. It may be properly call'd the Family Emplaster.

XXXIV. The Description of the Stiplick Emplaster mention d in the Green Balfam of Metz, at Sect. 31.

Take Minium, Litharge of Gold and Silver, and Lapis Calaminaris of each half a pound, Linfeed Oyl and Sallet Oyl of each a pint and half, Oyl of Laurel one pint, Decoction of Birth-wort long and round three pints; Incorporate the Litharges, Minium and Lapis Calaminaris, with the Oyls cold, in the first place, and then with the Decoction in a Plasterpan, and boil them together over a moderate Fire, ftirring them continually, to the ordinary confistence of Emplasters : Then add yellow Wax and Rofin of each one pound, Turpentine and Sandarach of each half a pound, Opopanax, Sagapen, Galbanum, Ammoniacum, Bedelium of each three ounces, Amber

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Amber, Franckincenfe, Myrrh, Aloes, Birthwort long and round of each an ounce and half, Mummy, Load-Stone, Blood-Stone, Coral, white and red, Mother of Pearls, Dragons-blood, Seal'd Earth, white Vitriol of each one ounce, Flowers of Antimony, Crocus Martis of each half an ounce, Camphir one ounce. First melt the Wax and Rosin, then take the Pan from the Fire, and add the Opopanax, Sagapen, Galbanum, Ammoniacum, and Bedelium diffolv'd in Vineger strain'd and thickn'd and incorporated with the Turpentine as in the foregoing Emplaster of Manus Dei, and the whole being half cold mix first the fine Pouders of Birthwort, Mummy, Blood stone, Load stone, Corals, Mother of Pearls, Seal'd Earth, Vitriol and Crocus Martis, and laftly the Sanderach, Amber, Franckincenfe, Myrrh, Aloes, Dragons blood, and Camphir, and incorporate the whole exactly. This Emplaster is highly effeem'd and commend'd for the cure of Ulcers in what foever part of the Body; for it cleanses, dries, and quickly heals and confolidates them, preferving them Putrefaction, and hindering all excrefcence of ill Fleih; It is proper to heal Cuts and Contusions of the Nerves : It draws bits of Iron, Lead, Thorns and Splinters out of the Flesh; It is good for all forts of bitings and stingings of Venimous Animals : It ripens all Impoltums ; diffolves and heals the Swellings of the Kings Evil, cafes the pains of Wounds and Bruifes, and keeps

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keeps for feveral years, being well made.

XXXVII. An Excellent Emplaster against Ruptures and Burstenness.

Take fresh Eels-skins newly flea'd, and wash'd in Lime-water, as many as you please; boil them in a clean Lye made of common Afhes, till they diffolve and grow thick like Glue; Then strain it : Take thereof four ounces of Blood-stone, Sacharum Saturni, Burnt Pewter (Potty) of each three drams, Gum Ammoniacum diffolv'd in strong Vineger, strain'd and thickn'd two ounces and half, Oyl of Myrrh diftill'd : Put all thefe finely pouder'd with the Glue into a glaz'd Earthen-pot, and boil them all together over a very gentle Fire, ftirring them continually till it comes to the confiftence of an Emplaster, add at last the distil'd Oyl of Myrrh. This Emplaster is one of the best that ever was invent'd to cure a Rupture, it is to be apply'd to the part, after the inteffine is put up, and must be kept on with a Trufs. Dr. Charras.

XXXVIII. An Excellent Cere-Cloth for the fame.

Take pouder of Mastick, Mummy, Franckincense, Amber, Gum-Arabick and Tragacanth, Aloes, Balaustienans and Roses of each half an ounce, Dragons-Blood fine Bole, Bloodstone

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ftone of each fix drams, Oyl of Rofes three ounces, Oyl of Myrrh and Mastick of each two drams, with Wax and Rosin in as much as will suffice, make a Cere-cloth, and dip Linnen Cloths therein. This is a most excellent thing to cure Ruptures, as the dexterous Volkerus Frisius has often prov'd : Apply it under the Truss. It also strengthens weak Limbs.

XXXIX. To dry up sharp Humors, and to cure Kibs and Chilblains.

Sir Ken. Digby relates, that a certain Lady had a Humor broke out at her heel, which neither Phyfitians with Purgings and Dietdrinks, nor Chyrurgions with Ointments could heal and dry up; It was heal'd in three or four Fomentations with her own Urin newly made, and fome white Salt diffolv'd in it; Foment the place with this fo warm as can be endur'd with Cloths doubl'd by the Fire-fide for a quarter of an hour, then bind on clean dry Linnen, and comprefs to it; do thus Morning and Night. It cures all Kibs and Chilblains, ev'n after they are broken, and if us'd before they are broken it will prevent them.

XL. A Remedy for heat of Urin.

Take feeds of Marsh-mallows, Commonmallows, Quinces of each one ounce, Gum-Tragacanth three ounces, bruise them and infuse

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fuse in a Decoction of Mallows, and a little Liquorice, feeds of white Poppies, and of Winter Cherries; you will have a Mucilage, of which with the Decoction aforefaid what fuffices make a Syrup. Take of this Syrup every Morning and Evening four ounces. It is good alfo for an Ulcer in the Bladder.

XLI. A Diuretick Remedy to provoke Urin.

Take Nitre two drams, Barly-water with Grafs-Roots, and candied Eringo Roots boil'd in it two pounds, Syrup of Violets two ounces, mix them : The Dofe is four ounces twice a day. Or

Take Salt-Prunella two drams, Salt of Amber a dram, make a pouder : The Dofe is half a dram twice a day. Or

Take Salt-Prunella two drams, Sugar-candy a dram, make a pouder to be divid'd into fix parts : whereof take one in a convenient Liquor thrice a day. Or

Take Salt-Prunella, Crabs Eyes, Salt of Worm-wood of each two drams, mix them: The Dofe is half a dram thrice a day. Or

Take pouder of Egg-shels from half a dram to a dram, give it in a draught of white Wine, or Posset drink, or a diurctick Decoction twice a day.

See more in the Chapter for the Stone, &c.

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XLII. A Remedy for Curing to much Purging by Urin or the Piffing Evil. See another at Sect. 63 following.

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Take Cyprefs-tops eight handfuls, whites of Eggs beat'n two pints, Cinnamon half an ounce, being cut fmall, pour to them of new Milk one Gallon, diftil it in a common Still, taking care it burn not : The Dofe is fix ounces thrice a day. Or

Take Gum Arabick and Tragacanth of each fix drams, Penids an ounce; make a pouder: The Dofe is a dram and half twice a day, with three or four ounces of the diftil'd Water. Or

Take Rhubarb pouder'd fifteen grains, Cinnamon fix grains, make a pouder to be taken in the Morning and repeat'd with in fix or feven days. Or

Take Cowflip-water three ounces, Barly-Cinnamon water two drams, Syrup of Meconium half an ounce, make a draught to be taken every Evening.

XLIII. Another Remedy for one that cannot keep his or her Water.

Take a Moufe and flea it; then dry it with all the Entrals in an Oven, fo that you may pouder it; drink all the pouder at once. It is faid to be an infallible Remedy, if it be us'd for three days. Lady W. XLIV.

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XLIV. Another for the fame.

Take Conferve of Hips three ounces, of red Rofes an ounce, Crabs Eyes a dram, Root of Tormentil two drams, Syrup of Purflain as much as fuffices to make an Electuary : The Dofe is the quantity of a large Nutmeg twice a day, drinking after it a dofe of the following Decoction.

Take Succory Roots fix drams, Leaves of Littice, Purflain, Horftail and Shepperds Purfe of each a handful, of the four greater cold feeds, Purflain feeds and Sorrel feeds of each a dram, red Rofes dry'd a handful, fhred the Herbs and bruife the feeds, and boil them all, in a fufficient quantity of Water, to a pint and, a half, then ftrain it, and diffolve in it Gum Dragant and Arabick of each two fcruples; then add two ounces of Syrup of Purflain: The Dofe is a quarter of a pint. Let the Patient were about the Neck a little Bag with the pouder of dry'd Toads Calcin'd, which alone many times is faid to cure this Difeafe.

XLV. An Excellent Pouder, that Cur'd a Gentlewoman that could not keep her Water.

Take Cutle-Fifh-bone, red Coral prepar'd of each a dram, Gum Tragacanth and Arabick of each two fcruples, Crocus Martis aftringent half a dram, pearl'd Sugar one dram, mix Gg them

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them and make a strengthning pouder. The Dose is half a dram in two spoonfuls of Plantain-water, twice or thrice a day, drinking after every dose three spoonfuls of Cinnamonwater. With this I Cur'd also the Daughter of Mr. Carpenter at Gravesend. Hartman.

In stead of pearled Sugar, you may take a dram of Pearl prepar'd, and four ounces of double refin'd Sugar, and mix them, and take thereof one dram.

XLVI. A Remedy for Pain or Weakness in the Back.

Take Comfry-Roots, stamp them and boil them in Posset-drink; drink thereof for four or five days together. Also take Not-grass, shred it and mix it with Butter, and make a Tanfy thereof, and eat it; It is very effectual.

XLVII. An other for the same.

Take the Kidneys of an Oxe, flice them very thin, then flew them eafily in a quart of Water clofe cover'd to a pint; then add half a pint of red Rofe-water, and as much Allegant or Mufcadine, Sugar and grated Nutmeg, take thereof tour or five fpoonfuls in the Morning, and at four in the Afternoon, for a week together : Then intermit a week, and then take it again for an other week if you think it needrol.

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XLVIII. An other Remedy to strengthen the Back and to restore Marrow in it.

Take the Pith of an Oxe half a handful, blew Currants wash'd and bruis'd two ounces, boil them together in Allegant or Muscadine; then mix it with the yolks of two new laid Eggs, and grated Nutmeg, and take a spoonful or two of it warm in the morning fasting.

XLIX. An Excellent astringent Emplaster, for Weakness and Pain in the Back, Sir K. Digby.

Take Comfry-roots, Knot-grafs, Cinquefoil roots, Bawdweed of each two good handfuls, ftamp all thefe and put to them a quart of the beft Sallet Oyl; let it boil foftly till the Oyl hath extracted the Vertues of the Roots, then ftrain it; and put to it four ounces of Venice Turpentine, with as much of Virgins Wax, and two ounces of Pitch : Spread it upon Leather and apply it.

L. An Ointment for Pains and Aches.

Take Neatsfoot Oyl one quart, Deersfuet four ounces, Hogs-greace one pound, Camphir four ounces, boil them together a while, and then take them off the Fire; when you use it warm fome of it, and then put to it fome English Brandy or Spirits.

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LI. An excellent Emplaster for Aches and Pains.

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Take of yellow Wax fhred fmall two pounds, Deers-fuet half a pound, Franckincenfe four pounds, Rofin or Burgundy-Pitch two pounds, Tarre four ounces, melt and mingle them well together on a gentle Fire; then pour into it by little and little two quarts of Wine ftirring it well together, then strain it into a pan, and add the Pouder of Cloves and Mace of each two ounces, Saffron half an ounce, mix it well and ftir it a good while, and when 'tis cold make it up into Rouls; alfo you may dip Cloths in it, and fo make Cerecloths and apply them. This is highly commender for all manner of Aches and Pains, for fo foon as it is laid on 'tis faid the pain is gone.

LII. An effectual and much experiment'd Remedy against the Hysterick or Mother Collick, Fapors and Fits of the Mother, or Stone Collick.

Take of our Cordial, Bezoardick, and Anodine Tincture a spoonful, of the Royal Cephalick Essence describ'd in the Chapter of Hysterick Fits fisteen or twenty drops, Penny Royalwater, or Baulm-water three spoonfuls, Aqua Mirabilis, or any other Cordial-water one spoonful, Syrup of Cowssips, or of Clove Gillo-Flowers half a spoonful, mix them for a draught.

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draught. In fteed of the Waters, you may take it in a Glafs of Wine or Sack. And in an extream Fit of the Collick, you must take two fpoonfuls of the Anodine Tincture, but always fifteen or twenty drops of the Royal and Cephalick Effence : If your Pains or Collick happen in the day time, you must go to Bed with the fame Medicine, otherwife you may take it at night Bedward.

LIII. An Emollient Clister by Dr. Scroderus.

Take of the Emollient Herbs, which are leaves of Mallows, Violets, Beets, Herb Mercury of each a handful, Marsh-Mallow-roots an ounce, Camomil-flowers half an ounce, five Figs flic'd, boil them in a sufficient quantity of fair Water to a pint; Then strain it and put to it Cassia four drams, Benedicta Laxativa one ounce, Salt-Gem a scruple, Oyl of Olives three ounces, brown Sugar an ounce, mix for a Clifter. It loosens and mollifies the Bowels, evacuates their Slime and Filth, and cleanses them from Wind and Water, and is good in Fevers.

LIV. A very good common Cliffer.

Take of the emollient Herbs of each a hatidful, Camomil-flowers half a handful, fweet. Fennel-feeds half an ounce, Linfeeds two drams, cut the Herbs and bruife the Seeds, and boil them in Water to a pint.

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LV. The Lady Lufon's Receipt to make one fleep in Frensy and Madness,

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Take the Gall of a Hare, mix it with half a pint of white Wine and boil it, let the Patient drink it, and it will caufe him to fleep till you give him Vineger to wake him.

LVI. A VVash for the Feet inducing Sleep. Dr. Bate.

Take twenty white Poppy-heads, white Poppy-feeds one ounce, leaves of Lettice four handfuls, flowers of Water Lillies fix handfuls, Violets a handful and half; boil them in a fufficient quantity of Water, and bathe the feet therein when you go to Bed. See more in the Chap. of the Watching Evil, and at Sect. LXIV, following.

LVII. An Ale or Drink to cure a Confumption.

Take half a pound of Blanch'd Almonds großy beaten, four ounces of Anifeeds bruis'd, three ounces of Liquorice bruis'd, red Rofes dry'd. Hyfope and Purflane of each three ounces; boil thefe in two Gallons of Ale-wort of the first running to one Gallon; when 'tis cold put into it one quart of Malmfey, and bottle it. Drink of it in the Morning fasting, and in the Afternoon two hours before cating. It preferves

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preserves from a Cough, nourishes and strengthens, cures a Confumption and shortness of Breath. prov'd.

LVIII. To make a rich Gelly for a wasting and Consumptive Body.

Take a fore Leg or Shin of Beif, beat and champ it all to mash with the Bone, three ounces of Harts-horn, boil it in a quantity sufficient of fair Water for the space of seven hours; then strain it and only use the Liquor. It is exceeding nourrishing and restoring in Confumptions.

LIX. The Queens Gelly of Harts-born.

Take Harts horn half a pound, boil it in five quarts of Water to a Gelly; then ftrain it and put to it the Juice of fix Lemons, and the peal of one; double refin'd Sugar two pounds, a handful of Coriander-feeds, two fpoonfuls of Cinnamon grofly beaten, two grains of Amber greece, halt a grain of Musk, boil all these in the Gelly for a quarter of an hour; then run it again thrô the Gelly-Bag, and put it up for use. Doie from one ounce to four, warm.

LX. Another Gelly of Harts-born, of Dr. Bate.

Take Raspings of Harts-horn six ounces, fair Water three quarts, boil it with a gentle G g 4 Fire

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Fire in a clofe Veffel for three or four hours, that the Harts-horn may be come Gelly : strain it, and add Juice of Lemons one ounce, double refin'd Sugar two ounces. It is restorative in Confumption, and of singular use in all other weakness of the Body what ever, and in every case where the Body is emaciat'd by a long Sickness thô no proper Confumption : It has been found of extraordinary use against the Scurvy. Dose from one ounce to four, warm.

LXI. The strengthning Gelly of Dr. Batc.

Take four Sheeps feet, two Calves feet, Rafpings of Ivory, Roots of Satyrion of each two ounces, Sea-horse-pizle one ounce, Hartshorn ten drams, Ladies-mantel, Dasies of each two handfuls, boil all in five quarts of fair Water to three pints; then strain it and add white Sugar-candy three ounces, being cold feparate the fat, and keep the Gelly for use. Give a draught of it warm in the Morning fasting with Pouder of a Harts-pizle one scruple, some aftringent Pills being premis'd. It is faid to cure Confumptions and a Phthifis or Ulcer of the Lungs; as also to be prevalent in a Hectick, and as some fay in a Marasmos. It is good against weaknesses and wastings in the Back, and the Whites in Women, the Body being first purg'd.

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LXII. To make Gelly of Ising-Glass, by Dr. Bate.

Take the whiteft and beft Ifing-Glafs two ounces, beat it with a Hammer as you do Stock-Fifh, then fteep it in Water all night, the next morning it will be foit, pull it and cut it into fmall bits, and boil it in a quart of Water to a pint, ftrain it and add new Milk one pint, white Sugar or Sugar-candy one ounce. The Dofe is a pint at a time twice a day, for ftoping the Whites in Women, and Gonorrhæa in Men, &c. It is very ftrengthning, and reftorative in Confumptions, and all forts of weaknefs.

LXIII. An other Gelly of Harts-horn, of an Honourable Lady.

Take a pound of Harts-horn, and a pritty bigg lean Chicking, boil them in a clofe Veffel with nine quarts of Water for four hours to a ftiff Gelly, you may try it in a Spoon as it is boiling, then ftrain it, and in all things proceed as in the Queen's Gelly of Harts-horn.

LXIV. An Almond Caudle of Dr. Bate.

Take of the best Ale a quart, Spring-water a pint, biting Cinnamon one ounce, boil it to the confumption of a third part; strain and add thereto Jordan Almonds cleans'd (but not blanch'd

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blanch'd) and bruis'd N°. 60. boil a little and ftrain thrô a Sieve; add of Loaf Sugar rwo ounces, and make a Caudle. It is good for Women in Child-Bed who are troubl'd with a Loofenefs.

LXV. Dieuretick Pills of Dr. Charas.

Take Chio Turpentine and white Vitriol pouder'd of each two ounces; mix them and make a mass of Pills. The Vomitive quality of the Vitriol being corrected and alter'd into Diuretick, by the mixture of the Turpentine : These Pills work good effects in all stoppage of Urin and difficulties of making Waters, being given from half a dram to a dram.

LXVI. A Sleep provoking Linement, of the fame Author.

Take ointment of Rofes and Poplar of each one ounce, Oyl of Henbane-feed prefs'd two drams, liquid extract of Opium one dram, mix them and make an Ointment. It is apply'd with good fuccefs to the fore Head and Temples, to eafe the pains of the Head, and procure reft and fleep.

LXVII. An experiment'd Poultice against the Fever in Children.

Take of Anchoves, and Onions boil'd tender, and

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and Black-Soap of each two ounces, fresh Bryony-roots beaten to mass four ounces, Rue two handfuls, a little Turpentine, mix and make a Poultice, and apply it to the Soles of the Feet and to the wristes.

LXVIII. To make the Blessed-water simple for several uses.

Take fresh unflact Lime one pound, pour upon it boiling hot water one Gallon, when the Lime is all flack'd stir it well together with a stick, then let it stand to settle, and pour off the clear and keep it for use in a Glass close stopt.

LXIX. To make the Bleffed VVater Compound.

Take of the Bleffed Water afore going three quarts, put into it fresh Liquorice one ounce, Bark of Saffafrass half an ounce, Raisons of the Sun flic'd fix ounces, Nutmegs fix drams, let them stand to infuse without heat for two days, then strain and keep it for use. It is good against the Kings Evil, Confumption of the Lungs, schortness of Breat; It sweetens the mass of Blood. It stops a Flux or Loofness, and cures the Running Gout. It is faid to be a most excellent Remedy to cure the Diabetes or Pissing Evil. The Dose is three ounces two or three times a day.

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LXX. To make the Tincture of Amber, by Dr. Bate.

Take white Amber four ounces reduce it to a very subtile pouder, which put into a Matrafs, and pour upon it Spirit of Wine highly rectifi'd one pint, shake them well together, and digest them in Sand to the Solution of the Amber; then pour it off and filter it, and abstract the third part of the Spirit of Wine in Balneo. It is a Cephalick, Hysterick, Anticolick, Nervous Medicament, &c. Several Men have tought the making of this Tincture, which for brievity's fake I omit to name, they differing little from this of Dr. Bate, fave in the abstraction of the Spirit of Wine, which they advise to be done to a balf part; but our Author more prudently, only to a third part left if too much of the Spirit should be drawn off, the diffolv'd Sulphurous particles of the Amber should subside. The Dose is from one dram to three, in any proper Liquor.

LXXI. To make the Pectoral Tincture of Honey.

Take of the best Honey two pounds, fine Sand wash'd and dry'd, mix them together into a Past, which put by little Lumps into a Matrass, and pour upon it Spirit of Wine twice distil'd from Carminatives, so that it be totus ardens, two pints; digest in warm Sand,

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till you fee the fpirit is Tincted; then pour it off, and put on fresh Spirit, and digest as before, repeat this so often till you fee the Spirit of Wine will extract no more Tincture; then put all your Spirits together, and abstract in Balneo to the confistence of a Syrup. Dose two or three spoonfuls.

another way without Sand.

Take Virgin Hony fix ounces, Spitit of Wine twice rectifi'd from Carminatives ten ounces, falt of Tartar one dram, mix and digeft in warm Sand for two or three days, ftiring the matter twice or thrice a day, that the Tinture may be of a reddifh colour ; then feparate the ting'd Liquor from the Feces. These Tinctures are accounted by all Authors as the highest Remedy against an Asthma, Phthilic, and inveterate Coughs, as alfo Gatarrhs, Difficulty of Breathing; and other Difeafes of the Breast and Lungs. Beguinus prescribes it rather to the truly Hectical, or fuch as are in deep Confumptions, to be given dayly Morning and Evening, either alone or in some Pectoral Decoction. A lo noi State 2 2000 xit

LXXII. An excellent Cordial Tinture.

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Take of any Gordial water which you pleafe fo it be ftrong and not weak a quart, Juice of Kermef-berries half a pound, Cochenele in fine

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fine pouder half an ounce, English Saffron one dram, mix them and digest in a glass Matrass or Bolthead in a very gentle heat in Sand for fourteen days, then being well featl'd or fine, pour off the clear Tincture for use: 'T is not only an extraordinary Cordial to revive the Spirits, Natural, Vital and Animal, chear the Heart, refiss Melancholly, and help all forts of fainting and Swooning Fits, Palpitation and beating of the Heart, &c. But it is a famous thing in all continual, Putrid, Malign, and Pestilential Fevers, yea, against the Plague it felf; It powerfully brings out the Meass and small Pox, and fecures the Patient from danger.

The way to use it. Take of the Alexitary Milkwater four ounces, fyrup of the Juice of Citrons one ounce, of this Tincture from half a dram to one dram and half, or two drams, mix them for a Cordial Dose; proportion the Water and Syrup according to the Tinture and the Age of the Patient.

LXXIII. Excellent Cordial Tablets or Lozenges.

Take of double refin'd Sugar in fine pouder fix ounces, Confection of Alkermels half an ounce, mix them well together, and make a palt of it with the Mucilage of Gum Tragant fteep'd in Orange-flower-water; of which make Lozenges: They are very Pleafant, Cordial, and Pectoral; when you make the Paft drop into it four drops of the Quinteffence of Citrons. Sir K, Digby. LXXIV.

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LXXIV. A Cerecloth against Corns of the Feet.

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an ounce an hair

Take Gum Ammoniacum diffolv'd in Vineger of Squils infpiffated two ounces, Roman Vitriol (which fome call the blew Stone) one dram and half, white precipitate well edulforated three drams, Strasburg Turpentine what fuffices, mix and make a Cerecloth; you may fpread it upon thin Leather or Slink, and lay it to the Corns (having first par'd them) renewing it when it will stick no longer, or as you see occation. It prevails also against old Ulcers, which are hard to be cur'd.

LXXV. To take away Worts from any part of the Body.

There are many Remedies which are faid to be good to take away Worts; but as the Learned *Riverius* fays, there is nothing fo effectual than to touch them often with fpirit of Sulphur; which I have fufficiently experienced to be true : But in the touching of them you muft have a care that it do not touch the Skin in other places, for it will take it off, and caufe Ulcers and holes, for it is an eating and burning thing.

LXXVI. The purging Cordial Elixir or Tincture against shortness of Breath and the Sourvy, &c. Dr. Bate.

Take roots of Elecampain, Florentine Orice, feeds

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feeds of Anis, Caraway, Liquorice of each two ounces, leaves of Carduus Ben. two handfuis, Raifons of the Sun flic'd one pound of the best, Sena cleans'd fix ounces, Anifeed water three quarts, mix them and digest for four days; then strain and press it out; the Dofe is two spoonfuls at Bedtime, and three or four the next Morning early

Hartman, Thave this purging Cordial Elixir always by 'me, ready prepard, and fel it for two Shillings the half pint bottle : But I find that fix ounces of Sena is two little, and that less than nine ounces will not do in the composition : I also add pouder of the best Jalap, an ounce an half, Pot Ashes an ounce, which makes it better by all the coaft, Dr. Salmon advifes. This is not only good against the Afthma, or shortness of Breath, and all Diseases of the Breaft and Lungs, but also effectually cleanfes all the Bowels; gently purging and carrying off all offenfive humors, as Water, Fleam and Cholar, all crudities and Tartarous Matter. It is an Excellent thing against the King's Evil, the Scurvy, Gout, fmall Stones, Sand and Gravel, whether in Reins or Bladder. It prevails against Rheumatism, Sciatica or Hip-Gout, Griping of the Guts, dry Belly-ach, Dropfy and yellow Jaundice; and in a word performes what ever may be expected from an excellent purger; it far exceeds that which is call'd Daffie's Elixir. LXXVII.

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LXXVII. The Royal Panacea, or Antifcorbutick Tincture of Metales with Gold and Antimony, &c.

Take of the Martial Regulus of Antimony an ounce and half, Gold, Silver, Copper and block Tin of each one dram, melt them together in a Crucible in a Wine Furnace, fetting the Crucible upon a piece of Tyle in the Fournace, left the wind that comes in by the ashole, under the Grate should cool it; the matter being melted caft upon it by little Ladelsful the Pouder of Tartar and Nitre of each half a pound exactly mixt together; when all your Pouder is in take out the Cruciple, and let it cool; break it and take out the Mafs, and if there be any Regulus precipitated melt it again and cast upon it more of the faid pouder of Tartar and Nitre as before, untill all the Regulus be diffolv'd by, and into the faid Salts; then powder the Mass whilest it is hot in a hot Mortar, and put into a Matrafs or Bolthead warm'd, and pour upon it Tartariz'd Spirit of Wine, four fingers above the Matter; ftop the Matras with another, fo as to make a double veffel, as is defcrib'd in the fecond Copper-plate; Lute well the Junctures, and digeft in warm Sand. fhaking it fometimes, till the Tincture be extracted, which pour off and keep it in a bottle with a glass Stopper.

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fect Health, and performs all its Operations with wonderful sweetness. It is excellent against Hypochondriack Melancholy, Jaundice, Green ficknefs in Virgins, Rickets in Children and the King's Evil; Putrit Malignat and Peftilential Feavers, small Pox and Measles, Worms whether in Old or Young, Itch and Scabs and all breakings out : In fo much that there is not the like General remedy in the whole Art of Pharmacy and Chymistery. Once I cur'd with it a Girle of about four years old, which was fo Rickety that fhe could not ftand, and was all her Body cover'd over with Scabs like a Leprofy, the was perfectly cur'd by taking only the quantity of an ounce; the Dofe is from ten to thirty drops in Wine, or any other proper Liquor. I have it always by me ready prepar'd.

I know there are some that make a Tincture. of the Martial Regulus of Antimony (without Gold), which they fulminate and diffolve with Nitre only; pretending that Tartar precipitates, and that Nitre diffolves; but that is an Errour, and not to be commended ; for the Tartar acts more upon the Sulphur of Antimony than the Nitre : And this Tincture made with Nitre and Tartar is a far more noble Medicament and Artifcorbutick, then that which is made with Nitre only; because the Tincture of the Salt of Tartar alone is highly approv'd off by learned Authors to be a good Medicine against the Scurvy, and most difeases before Hh 2 menmentioned; and in this Operation you have both the Tincture of Metals and that of the falt of Tartar in one.

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A Paste or Horse Medecine for Farriers, much experienc'd. Dr. Batc.

TAke pouders of Fenugreek, Anifeeds, Cum-minfeeds, Carthamus feeds, Elecampane roots, dry'd leaves of Coltsfoot, Flower of Sulphur; of each two ounces; Juice of Spanish Liquorice one ounce diffolv'd in half a pint of white Wine, Sallet Oyl, Hony of each half a pound, Jean Treacle twelve ounces, Oyl of Anifeeds one ounce; mix them all together, and with Wheat flower as much as fuffices make a Paste, of which make Balls about the bigness of a Mans Fift. Diffolve one of them in cold water what fuffices, and let the Horfe drink it all up at a time; this do Morning and Evening for fifteen days; in which time it will certainly cure fuch Horses as are troubl'd with Coughs, thortness of Breath, and difficulty of Breathing, and feveral other internal difeafes: It makes fuch fat as are wasted and pour, and makes healthy fuch as are infirm and difeas'd. This Medecine will do much better in ftrong wort and given hot. It is beyond many other Horse Medicines, much valu'd and efteem'd in the World. Dr. Salmon. An

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Another Medicine far a Cold, Cough and shortness of Breath in a Horse.

Take Elecampane, Liquorice, Anifeeds and Sugarcandy all in pouder of each one ounce, Hony half a pound, Treacle four ounces, Rue half a handful, Garlick flic'd or bruis'd three heads; boil the Rue and Garlick in a quart of Ale for half an hour then take it off the Fire, and put into it the other things with half a pound of butter, flir it well and give it the Horfe warm, and let him be rid well after it, and faft three hours after it, give him warm water for three days, and give him the drinko three days Morning and Evening. Then reft three days between, give him the drink again for three days: And this will cure any Horfe. Approv'd.

An other for the fame.

Take a pound of Figs flic'd, Raifons of the Sun flit half a pound, Oyl of Anifeeds half an ounce, Oyl of Sulphur one dram, fyrup of Coltsfoot one ounce an half, Sugarcandy two ounces, fyrup of Violets half an ounce, Sallet Oyl four ounces, pouder of Anifeeds one ounce, mix them well together, and make a Pafte with pouder of Liquorice, keep it in a Bladder for ufe.

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A purge for a Horfe.

Take Aloes one ounce, pouder of Jalap two drams, Cream of Tartar half an ounce; mix it with London Treacle.

To cure Meaf'd Hogs.

Take a priety large Apple, and Scoup out all the Coar of it, fill the Cavity with Brimstone in powder, and give this to the Hog to eat. You may give him two or three at a time. If Hogs be never fo much Meass' it is a certain cure of them tho it be but two or three days before they be kill'd. Sir K. Digby.

THE TRUE ENGLISH THE TRUE ENGLISH

There are many Perfons in this Kingdom, who make feveral Hogfheads of Wine fome years of the Grapes of their own Growth, but by reafon the Soil is defective, and the Sun lefs favourable, the Grapes are not of that goodnefs and perfection as in the Southern and Eaftern Countrys; therefore the Wine that is made of them is but thin and green, and not durable. Now by the addition of a convenient quantity of Malaga Raifons, or Raifons of the Sun, Wine may be here made of Englifh Grapes in goodnefs, ftrength and adduration equal to the beft and most Southerly French Wines that are ufually imported hether.

I. To make Wine of English Grapes, to be as Strong, Wholfome, and Pleasing as French-Wine.

W Hen you perceive your Grapes to be plump and transparent, and the Seeds or Stones to come forth black and clear, and H h 4 100

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not clammy, and the stalks begin to wither, then gather them, the weather being dry fome time before. Cut them off from the Branches, and not Pull them, and in the Moons decrease, preferving them from bruises as much as you can; then cut the Stalks as close to the Clusters as you can, before you prefs out your Wine.

To every Gallon of Juice or Must take two pounds of the beft Malago Raifons pickt from the stalks, and shred, put them together in a Fat, the head being out, let there be a Tap at the bottom, with a Taphofe, as in a Meshtub; ftir your Liquor and Raifons well together and let them stand twenty four hours: then draw off all the Liquor by the Tap that will run, and prefs out the Reafons as ftrong as you can, then put both Liquors together in a Cask, which rauft be full, and leave the Bunghole open, that it may work and caft out any foulnefs; after ten, twelve or fourteen days, draw it off from the gross Lee into a clean and dry Cask, which must not be full, but leave a part of the Veffel void or empty, ftop it up close immediatly, and that very well, leaft it loofe its Spirits, which vacancy you may again fupply when it hath done working with other Liquor or Wine of the fame that hath alfo fermented in any other veffel. After you have thus closed up your Bung, you ought to leave open the finall venthole, or Faffethole, only loofly putting in the Peg or Fasset, lest otherwise the wild Spirits that are in the Liquor force a paflage ;

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fage; which by the eafy fttopping this vent, and fometimes opening it may be prevented until you find it hath wafted that wild fpirit.

11. If you intend to make Claret you must let your Mure or Chaf abide in the Must fix or eight days, or as you will have it more or less, ruff or Tinctur'd, before you press it out, as they do in other Countreys; but in the interim befure to cover your Fat close.

To purify Wine, take the thin shavings or plainings of Beech, the Rind being peel'd off, boil them in Water to abate the rankness of them; then dry them throughly, and with these may you purify Wine, about a peck will ferve a Hogs-head; which Chips or Shavings will ferve often times, being wash'd, dried and preferv'd.

III. To make artificial Champagne.

Take black and white Grapes promifcuoufly, and proceed as is before directed; and thus you may have Wine or artificial *Champagne* made here, comparable with the beft of that which is made in that province.

This may be an incouragment to fuch Perfons and Gentlemen, who have convenient places, to propagate Vines: For against a Wall Grapes will ripen very well in most years, and upon out Houses, Stables, and Barns that are cover'd with Tiles they will ripen the better, provision being made, by fixing Poles and Lats upon 474 The true English

upon them, for the Vine to fasten it felf on. If you have no red Grapes, you may make it with White, steeping in it Clove Gillo-flowers dry'd; which will give it and excellent Tincture and Flavour.

IV. You may also ferment and purefy this Wine or any other Vinous Liquor effectually by Isingglass, about the proportion of three or four ounces to a Hogshead, rather more than lefs; beat it with a hammer, as they do Stockfish; then lay it in steep in white Wine or stail Beer all Night, cut it into little pieces, add more stail Beer and keep it over a gentle fire, till you find it well deffolv'd, then take a part of your Liquor you intend to purify in proportion about a Gallon to twenty Gallons, in which boil your diffolv'd Hingglass, and cast it into the whole Mass of Liquor; stirring it well about.

V. One principal help to purify any Liquor or to provoke fermentation, is warmth, as is vulgarly practis'd amongst Housewives, who in fermenting both Bread and Beer, preferve it warm during that operation; and thus I have made Wine of Raisons in the coldest time-of Winter, setting the Cask by the firefide under the Chymny.

VI. To make Cyder Royal without Spirits, to be as strong, pleasant and boldsome as Canary.

Take the Juice of Pippins, and Permains, or Red-

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Redstreak, Golden Rennet, Golden Pippins, and to every Gallon of Juice put two pounds of the best Raisons of the Sun shred; stir them well together, then cover the Fat, and let them stand two or three days; then draw off the Liquor by the Tap and Taphofe as is directed before in the making of Wine; prefs out the Raisons, and put both Liquorsin a Cask which must be full, leaving the Bunghole open, only covering it with a Cloth, that it may ferment and cast out its foulness; and after a fortnight rack it off into another cleandry Cask not filing it quietful but leave fome vacancy, for it will yet ferment; but stop it close only leaving a faffet or Peghole open or loofly ftopt; when you perceive it hath done working fill up you Veffel with the fame Liquor that has been alfo fermented in another Veffel; then ftop it up clofe, and keep the Veffel full or bottle it.

fel is, the better Liquors are preferv'd in them.

In Elfas in Germany and in the Palatinate, and other Countrys on the Rhein, Veffels being made that one of them will contain twenty five. fome thirty Hogfheads of Wine; which Veffels are very feldom emptied; but what is drawn out of them, is made up again the next year with new fermented Wine. I have drank Wine at Strasburg in Elfas, out of a Veffel that did contain above fix Tuns of Wine, and they told me that it had not been empty in a hundred years, but had ftill been fill'd up again with The true English

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with new wine first ferment'd, and then put into the old. The largest Wine Fats that are imported into England are the Rhinish-Wine Fats; but they are small incomparison of those before mentioned.

VII. To make Cyder Royal with Spirits, as good as French Wine, Mr. Hains's way.

To every Gallon of Cyder put a pint of the Spirits, or Brandy made of Cyder.

As to the time of putting your Spirits into your Cyder, observe, that the staler your Cy-i der is before the Spirits are added, the more time they require to incorporate; and the foonner they are put in, the foonner 'tis fit for use. But in case you put your Spirits into the Cyder, before it hath fermented, they will evaporate and be cast out; Therefore be fure, that your Cyder be rackt off the Lee, once or twice as you find occafion, and being indifferent fine, then put in your Spirits well beaten together with a certain quantity of Cyder, and after 'tis put into the Cask, ftir it very well together again, and bung it close up, and about two or three Months after it will be fit for ufe; but the longer it lyeth, the better, especially if your Cider be stale er'e your Spirits are put in; for as this Cider drinks very unpleasing, when first mixt together, so no Wine can be more ftrong and pleafing than this, when it hath flood its due time to incorporate and meliorate

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meliorate, and in the mean time to be clofe ftopt without drawing any out; unlefs the feafon of the Year be warm, then to prevent its fermentation, let the Cask be open as you find occasion.

The reason why simple Cider makes the Stomach fick, is the chilly, cold, phlegmatick part of the Cider, Viz. That which has least of the Spirits in it is most hurtful; that this is fo, nothing can be more evident, for that the strongest Cider is most free from occasioning this Diftemper. Now this we know, that the Spirits of Cider are no other but the purer part of it namly the ftrong, warm, and Lievely part feparated from the weak, cold, and Melancholy dead part; So that Reafon must needs yield, that the Spirits of the Gider being mixt with Cider, cannot but make it more ftrong and pleafant, and also more wholfom, for that by this expedient this fickly, cold, and windy part is cur'd.

Moreover for want of strength and life, simple Ciders are apt to decay and dye; this we see by experience; for that as the strongest simple Cider hath most Spirit in it, and therefore lives longest; So the weakest Cider that hath least spirit in it, will soon grow sickly and decay; therefore this expedient must needs be so far from rendring Cider more unwholfom and unkind, that 'tis rather to be esteem'd its most infallible Physition or Remedy, for that it corrects all the ill Humors that cause its

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its Sickness or ill Effects in Humane Bodies. And this much I can honeftly and truly aver, from along continued experience, that a glafs of this excellent refin'd Cider-Royal, drank half an hour before Meals, procures a good Appetite; and after Meals, helps Digestion; that it chears the Heart, and revives the Spirits. And as for its Operation upon the Brain, when too much is dranck at a time, the fame is lefs hurtful, than excels of ftrong Beer, Ale, Canary, or High Country-Wines : For itis fo far from clogging the Stomach, or clouding the Brain with thick muddy Vapours, that I do believe a Man may (were it not a Sin) be fuddl'd and fober twice in a day with this Liquor, without mischief to his Health; and the reafon in my opinion, is, because it fo admirably provokes Urin, and carries with it fuch foul and ill Matter that offends the Head, Stomach and Belly : The truth of all which, I doubt not, will be foon atteft'd by experience of those that shall make Tryal.

VIII. The first and worst infirmities that Common Cyder is subject to are two forts, either being musty, or fretting it self until the Spirits are spent, and the Cyder become weak and unpleasant.

If the Apples be gather'd into the House whilest they are wet, they will be Musty, and so will the Cyder; Again if the Vessel wherein 'tis made, or that you put it into be Musty, so will be your Cyder. If none of these happen, Wine-Cellar.

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pen, you need not fear any thing of that kind; But if Cyder be Musty, so will the Spirits that are drawn from it.

To cure Cyder that is subject to fret is some what difficult; but the best way is to prevent the Caufes; which are, either the gathering of the Fruit before they are ripe, or making the Cyder before the Apples have lain long enough, for until Apples have lain in an heap while they have fweat, and are dry again, they cannot be fit for the Press. But if by reason of warmth and mildness of the Seafon, or any other accident, the Cyder should fret and destroy it felf, the best way is to draw it off into an other Veffel; and do fo once in fix or ten days, as you see cause, always taking the Lee from it, as oft as 'tis Rackt. Let not your Veffel be full by a Gallon; Nor yet ftopt clofe, until by drawing it off, it be made to leave Huzzing and Sputtering; for the fuller and closer it is, the more it frets. When your Cyder is thus quiet, then have a care to keep the Veffel full and close ftopt ; yet left you fhould ftop it too foon, open it once in two, three or four days, and if you find it is not yet quiet, let the Veffel be open an hour, or half an hour at a time.

IX. A Perfum for the Cask not to be neglet'd.

If the Veffel before Cyder be tunn'd up into it, be fumed with Sulphur, it much conduces

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to the prefervation of this or any other kind of Liquor, which may be done by dipping a Rag, about the bignels of your hand, in melt'd Brimftone, and then immediatly dipt in Coriander-feeds, and by a Wire letting it down into the Veffel, being fired, and ftopping the bunghole, will fill the Veffel full of Smoak; then take it out, and immediatly tun up your Liquor, which gives it no ill taft nor favour; but is an excellent expedient to prevent ill taftes and Fermentation, and is an excellent perferver of your Health, as well as of the Liquor. Do this as oft as your Cyder or any other Liquor is Rackt.

X. To Cure and Sweet'n musty Casks.

If your Veffel be Mufty, boil Pepper beat'n in Water an ounce to a Hogshead; fill your Veffel therewith fealding hot, and fo let it ftand two or three days; or elfe, take about a pound of Quick-Lime to fix or feven Gallons of boyling hot Water which put into your Cask, and ftop it clofe, and roul it up and down till the Lime be througly flack'd.

XI. To make Cyder-Royal by the addition of Sugar, and Spirits of Cyder to be as ftrong and pleasant as Canary, Mr. Hains's way.

If you would have it drink more like Canary (fays he) or other Sacks, you must add more

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of the Spirit, and as much Syrup or Iweets (the making of which is herein after tought) as will best please your pallate; And as the proportion of one pint of good Spirit to a Gallon, will make it as ftrong as French Wine; to one pint and a half will make it full as strong as Spanish Wine; And by this means in like manner, Perry and the Juice of Cherries, Currens and Goole-berries (efpecially Goole-berries) may by adding there unto their proper Spirits, or any other fine Spirits, be made Wine, as good, strong, wholsom and pleasing as the Wines made in the Canaries. I mention other Spirits, because upon Trial I have obferv'd, that Brandy, Spirit of Wine, Grain and other Spirits, may be of good Effect in this Businels, provid'd they are drawn fine.

Hartman, By experience I have found the Spirits of Melaffes, Raifins or other Fruits, or of the Lees of Wine, provided they be Rectified and drawn fine, are of good effect in this Busines; Nay, a Rectified fine Spirit made of Mault will ferve very well, if in case Spirit of Cyder is not to be had.

XII. Spirits being put into Bottles amongst Cyder, or any other Liquors, hereaster mention'd, will not drink well. I was a long time troubled to find out how to make this Drink as pallatable and pleasing as it was become strong and chearing, until I put both Cyder, Syrup and Spirits into a Cask; The first I compleated was in a Vessel of fix Gallons; I i into which I put two quarts of Syrup or Sweets, and three quarts of the Spirits of Cyder, which after it had lain two or three Months, I found to be as ftrong and pleafing as Canary.

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XIII. The way to make Syrup or Sweets for such Cyder Royal as you would have as Rich as Canary.

A quarter of an hundred weight of brown Sugar which is eight and tweenty pounds, will make four Gallons of Syrup, and fo proportionably; but before you put your Sugar into the Kettle, take the whites of eight or ten Eggs, which being well beaten with a thing like a Rod or whisk, in two Gallons, or two Gallons and a half of Water ; then put one Gallon of this Egg-water fo prepar'd into your Kettle; then put in the Sugar, and hang it over a gentle Fire and ftir it about until it be diffolv'd : But be fure when it boils, put in more Egg-water to keep it from boiling too high; and fo continue putting it in, one quart after an other, for an hour together, until all your Egg-water be spent : But to prepare your Egg-water in parcels, Viz. A quart of two at a time as you use it is the better way. Now the use of these Eggs, is only to raise such a Scum as will carry away not only all the foulnefs and grofnefs of the Sugar, but all the whites of the Eggs also; And when the Scum hath done rifing, and is clean taken off, then fill up your Kettle with as much Water as will make make up your quantity, and let it boil to the confiftence of a Syrup: But to put a little Coriander-feed bruis'd, and ty'd up in a fine Linnin-rag whileft the Syrup is boiling, will give it a fine grateful fent.

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Of this Syrup, when cold, you may put in two or three Gallons, more or lefs into an Hogs-head, as the tartness of the Cider; or any other Liquor requires : But put them not in till you have Rackt your Cider the last time, and that it be past the fermentation. And before you put your Sweets into the Cask, mix your Sweets and the Spirits you intend to put in together, with a little quantity of Cider, and ftirr them well together; then put all into your Cask, and ftirr them with all your strength, with a strong Staff in the Bung-hole for half a quarter of an hour; After that ftop it clofe, and draw none off till two, three or four Months, by which time it will be anfwerable to what hath been propos'd; only remember, that if you will have it to refemble Canary, you must add the greater proportion of Spirits and Sweets; but if French Wine, then the lefs Sweets or none at all.

An thus every Man may merrily make his varieties of Drink, with that which he knows to be good, cheap and wholfome; which is more than he is fure to have at every Tavern, altho he pay three times as much for it.

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XIV. How to make Royal-Curran-Wine Mr. Hains's way.

A Bushel of Currans, ripe and good, will make fix or seven Gallons of Wine : To every Bulhel of Currans, fo foon as they are well bruis'd and broken to pieces, put in twelve quarts of Water, and in twelve or fixteen hours after press it and strain it, put it into a Cask, and let it fland until it begin to be clear, which will be in ten or twelve days; then Rack it off from the gross Lee, and put to each Gallon a pint of good rectified Spirit of Mault or Melasses, and a pint and a half of the Sweets or Syrup, ftir it well together for a quarter of an hour; then ftop it up close for three Months; then you may Bottle it if you pleafe. If you add Rasberries to your Currans, you will have a most delicious pleafant and very wholfome Wine.

In like manner you may make Wine Royal of Goosberries, Mulberries and Cherries; but of all thefe, that of Goofe-berries excels the reft, and doth refemble Canary the moft.

XV. To make Royal-Wine of Goofe-berries, or of Currans, without Spirits and Sugar.

If you will make Wine-Royal, either of Curran, or Goofe-berries, without Sugar and Spirits, then to every Gallon of Liquor put two

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two pounds of Malaga Raifins fired, ftir it well together, and let it stand four and twenty hours; then prefs it out, and strain it and put the Liquor into a Cask, and after a fortnight Rack it off from the gross Lee into an other clean dry Cask; stop it up closs, leaving only a little Peg or Fasset-hole open, or the Peg loosly in it, till you perceive it hath left huzzing and is quiet, then fill up your Cask with the same Liquor, and so keep it full till you. Bottle it.

You may also put your Raifins, being fhred, amongst your Currans or Goose-berries broken to pieces and Liquor, and in four and twenty hours after press it out; and thus you make but one pressing.

XVI. How to make Wipe Royal of red Cherries.

Prefs out as much juice from the Cherries as you can, and then ftamp the ftones with the skins to a mash, breaking all the ftones; for you cannot stamp them before you prefs out the juice of them, by reason the juice will spatter about; then put the juice with the stones and skins into an open Vessel, and stir it well about, and let it stand two or three days, that the Liquor may draw out the Tinsture and Cordial part of the Skins and the corroborating vertue of the Kernels; then prefs it out, and put it into a Cask, and let it stand until it begin to be clear, which may be I i 2 486 The true English

in a fortnights time; then Rack it off from the grofs Lee into a clean, dry and fweet Cask, and put into every Gallon of it a pint of good Spirit, and a pint and a half of the Syrup or Sweets; Stir it well together with a Staff for a quarter of an hour, then ftop it up close for about a quarter of a year, and then you may Bottle it. A Glass of this excellent Wine Royal of Cherries, drank half an hour before Meals, procures a good Appetite; and after Meals, helps Digettion : It is Cordial, chears the Heart, revives the Spirits; It is Diuretick and admirably provoks Urin, and carries with it Sand and Gravel out of the Reins and Bladder, and all fuch foul and ill matters out of the Body that offends the Head, Stomack and Belly. And the Wines made of Currans and Goofeberries are highly. commended by the Learn'd Dr. Willis to be very wholfom, and good for the Liver, and against the Scurvy by sweetning the Blood.

XVII. To make VVine Royal of Black-Cherries.

Having prefiet out as much of the Juice as you can from the Cherries, ftamp the ftones and skins as you did with the red Cherries, keep the juice a part, put the skins and ftones in a Veffel, and pour upon it fcolding hot Water, ftir it well together and cover it up clofe, let it ftand two days; that the hot Water may extract all the Tincture out of

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the skins, and the Cephalick and corroborating vertue of the Kernels; then prefs it out, and put this Liquor with the Juice of the Cherries into a Cask, and after a fortnight Rack it off from the groß Lee into an other clean dry Cask, and put into it the fame quantity of Spirits and Syrup, as is directed in making the other Royal - Wines. This Wine of Black-Cherries has an admirable Cephalick Vertue; It is excellent against the Vertigo or Dizziness and Swimming in the Head. The Reafon why you put Water to the ftamped Cherries, is because the Juice of the Black-Cherries is a very thick and fweet Juice, and would not ex-tract the Tincture and Vertue out of the Skins and Kernels, as the Juice of the red Cherries will do. The quantity of Water you use, is the fame with that in making the Royal Wine of Currans and Goofeberries.

XVIII. Cider Royal, prepar'd as is direct'd at Sect. VII. and Sect. XI. may be kept in the Cask two or three years, and be bettered thereby, provided you keep the Cask full; which to do, you must observe, that in two Months time the Liquor will wast a quart, more or less, as the Vessel is bigger or lesser; which you ought to fill up again with Liquor of the fame strength, or if stronger the Better. And by this means it may keep and grow better and better fome years.

Suppose by keeping Cider Royal too long it thould

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should become unpleafant, and as unfit to Bottle as old Hockamore, take but one Hogshead of that and one of Tart new Cider, and before the latter be quite clear or fine, mix them together in two other Hogs-heads well perfum'd, and add Spirits and Sweets a due proportion, to the quantity of your new Cider. Suppofe it be in the Month of October or November, you may be fure to have it full as good, if not better than ever it was, and a most excellent Cider Royal to Drink or to Bottle, by or before Chriftmass. And this I know by repeat'd experience and practife; nor can your new Cider be made half so good by that time. Mr. Haines.

XIX. How to make Wine Royal of Elder-berries.

To every Gallon of fair Water take four pounds of Malaga Raifins pick't from the Stalks and fhred, put them together in an open Veffel with a Taphofe, ftir them well together, and let them ftand two or three days, then draw off all the clear Liquor by the tap, and prefs out the reft ftrongly, put both your Liquors together, and to every Gallon of it put a pint of the Juice of Elder-berries, put them together in a clean dry Cask well perfumed, keep open the Bung-hole that it may work; let it ftand a fortnight, then Rack it off the grofs Lee into an other clean dry Cask well perfum'd, let it not be full by a Gallon, ftop ftop it up clofe, leaving only a Peg-hole open or loofe ftopt; when you perceive it hath done working, and that it hath left huzzing, and is quiet, fill it up, and ftop it very clofe and in two or three Months time it will be

fit to drink.

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XX. An other way to make VVine Royal of Elderberries much better than the former.

In steed of fair Water take the Juice of Apples, and then two pounds of Raifins to every Gallon will ferve, press out the Juice of your Elder-berries, and keep it a part; put the Husks or Skins amongst your Raifins and Juice of Apples, for there remains in them agreat deal of Tincture wherein confifts the most cordial part of the Berries, which is pitty to lose. The fame you are to observe in the former Receipt. There are some that let their Rafins and Water stand together for three Weeks, which is a great Errour, for there by a great part of the Spirit do's evaporate, the Body being much open'd by fermentation where by the Spirit is fet at liberty and drawn away by the Air: And the Raifins will be. fufficiently foak'd and swell'd in four and twenty hours, fo that there is no need to let them stand longer before you press them. In all other things proceed as in the former Receipt. This Elder Wine has been found by experience to be good against the Gout, Dropfy and Confumption. XXI.

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XXI. To make Cowflip-WVine.

Take fix Gallons of Water and ten pounds of Sugar, boil them together for half an hour; fet it a cooling, when 'tis almost cold put into it two or three spoonfuls of yest well beaten with the Juice of sixteen Lemons; then put in also a Peek and a half of Cowssip steaten in a stone Mortar; let them work together for two or three days; then press it out, and strain it, and put it in a Cask, which must be full of it; stop it but loosely till you perceive it hath done working, then stop it up close, and after a Month Bottle it.

XXII. Another way to make Cowflip-VVine.

Having boil'd your Water and Sugar together, pour it boiling hot upon your Cowflips beaten, ftir them well together, and let them ftand in a Veffel clofe cover'd till it be almost cold; then put into it the Yeft beaten with the Juice of Lemons; let it ftand for two days, then prefs it out with as much speed as you can, and put it up into a Cask, and leave a little hole open, for the working; when it hath quite done working ftop it up close for a Month or fix Weeks, then Bottle it. Cowflip Wine is very Cordial, and a glafs of it being drank at at night Bedward, causes fleep and reft. In like manner you may make Wine with

Elder-

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The

Elder-flowers; and likewife with Clove-Gillo-

XXIII. To make excellent Sage-Wine.

Take fix pound of Sage pickt, fhred it very finall, pour upon it three Gallons of boilinghot Water; cover it close and let it ftand four and twenty hours, then prefs it out, and to every Gallon put a pound and half of clear Sugar, or a quart of the Syrup or Sweets mention'd at the Sect. XIII. put it up into a Cask, and it will work, cover it loofely, or with a plate of lead upon the Bung, and let it stand fix Weeks, or till you fee it hath quite done working, then Bottle it. The beft way to make this Sage-Wine is to ftamp or pound the Sage in a Stone Mortar, and then pour your Liquor boiling hot upon it, and cover it close for twelve or fixteen hours, then preis it out, and thus you have all the Juice of the Sage. Sage-Wine is good for Women with Child to prevent Abortion. In like manner you may make Clary-Wine and Baulm-Wine, either fhreding or ftamping the Herbs. You may make it also by boiling your Water and Sugar together, and then pour it boiling hot upon your Herbs.

If any think it to much trouble for themfelves to prepare the Sweets or Syrup before mention'd, they may have them at almost every Sugar-Bakers in London.

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The right Method of making Matheglin, wherein the vulgar errours (mhich hetberto bave been committed in the making that excellent Balfamick Drink) are rectifid.

Many Receips are handed from one to another, for the making Metheglin or Hydromel, wherein are green Vegetables prescrib'd to be us'd, as Sweet Bryer leaves, Thime, Rofemary, de. which are not to be us'd green (as a Judicious Author well observes) by them that Drink ; green and cru'd Herbs dulling and flatning the Spirits of the Liquor to which they are added, as you will find if you add green Hops instead of dry to your Beer; neither will any green Herb yield its vertue foe eafily as when dry. 'Tis alfo directed that the Metbeglin when boiling fhould be fcum'd, to take off the filth that arifeth from it in the Decoction : which is not fo necessary as it is pretended to be; for that four remaining behind will be of use, and a help to its fermentation, and makes the Lipuor afterwards to become the more limid, and doth not unite again with it, as is vulgarly believ'd, it being a Maxime in Phylofoyby, that Feces once separated will never re-unite.

Sir Ken. Digby being very curious in his Re-fearches, made a large Collection of the choicest and

Wine-Celler.

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and best Receipts of this excellent and wholefome Drink; some of which I did publish after his Death; but one good Receipt or two will ferve, only observe, that if you use Herbs in the boiling of your Mead, they are to be dry and not green, for the reason before given, and that scuming of it does it more hurt than good; likewise to let it work and ferment without yest, is better than with yest.

Some confiderations of Sir Ken. Digby for making of Mead or Metheglin.

I. TAving made your Water bloodwarm in your Copper or Kettle, put the Hony to it, about one part to four of Water; but because this doth not determine the proportions exactly (for fome Hony will make it ftronger than other) you must do that by bearing up an Egg; but first, lade and scoop your mixture exceedingly (at least an hour) that the Hony be not only perfectly diffolv'd but uniformly mixt throughout the Water. Then take out fome of it in a great wooden Bowl or Pail, and put a good number (ten or twelve) newlaid Eggs into it, and as round ones as may be; for long ones will deceive you in the fwimming, and stailones being lighter than new, will emerge out of the Liquor the breadth of a fixpence, when new ones will not a groates breadth; therefore you take many, that you may make

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a medium of their several emergins; unless you be certain that they which you use are immediately then laid, and very round. The rule is that a groat, or rather but three pence breadth of the Eggshel must swim above the Liquor; which put again into your Copper to boil : So foon as it boils turn up an hour glass, and let it boil gently an hour ; a Quarter before the hour is out put into it fome Eringo-roots flic'd small, and a little Ginger in fine pouder, and a sprig of dry Rosemary; which having boil'd a puarter of an hour, fo to make up the whole hour of boiling, pour out the Liquor into wide open Fatt to cool : When it is quite cold, tun it up into a Cask that has had Sack in it, or white Port wine, let it ferment of it felf without yest, keeping a thick plate of Lead upon the Bung to lay close upon it, fo that the working of the Liquor may raile it to purge out the foulness, and have always fome new made plain Liquor to fill it up as it finks: When it has done working, left huzzing, and is quiet, then ftop the Bung exceeding clofe, and let it lye three or four Months, always keeping the Cask full, and when you begin to draw it bottle it. It will become a more pleafant vinous Drink, dayly loofing its luscious tafte; the longer it is kept the better it will be. When you Barrel it up hang in it in a Bag to the proportion of about fifteen Gallons, an ounce of Ginger flicd, half an ounce of Cinnamon, Cloves and Mace of each an ounce all grofly beaten; TOT

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for if you beat it fine, it will always float in your Metheglin, and make it foul; and if you put it in whilst it is hot, the Spices will loofe their Spirits.

II. If you make it work with Yeft, you must have a great care to draw it into Bottles foon after it hath done working, as after a fortnight or three weeks, for that will make it foon grow ftale, and it will thence grow fower and dead before you are aware; but if it work fingly by it felf without mingling of either Leven or Yeft, it may be kept long in the Barril, fo it be fil'd up to the Top, and keept very close ftopt.

III. To make Hydromel with Clove Gillo flowers.

When you have a ftrong Hony Liquor of three parts of Water to one of Hony well boil'd, put into it fo foon as you take it from the fire fome Clove Gillo flowers, and if they be duly dry'd, I think they are the better) two handfuls to every Gallon of Liquor; let thefe infufe thirty or forty hours, then ftrain it from the flowers and barrel it up without Yeft.

And in like manner you may make Hy-dromel with Cowflip-flowers, and Elderflowers., with either fresh or dry flowers.

IV. And when you will make your Mead with Cherries, or Rasberries, or black Cherries, prefs out the Juice of them, then stamp their magina and break the Stones, pour upon them

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them your Liquor fo foon as you take it from the fire, let them infuse thirty or fourty hours, it will extract all the Tinture and vertue out of the Skins and Kernels; then strain it, press it out and barrel it up, putting into it the Juice of the Cherries, about one quart of Juice to every three or four Gallons of Liquor.

V. If you will make small Mead for the Stone, put but half the proportion of Hony or lefs, and boil in it Daucusseed, Juniperberries bruis'd; and then work it with Yest by reason it is small and has not strength enough to work of it felf, but after three weeks or a Months barrelling you must bottle it. Sir Kem. Digby.

VI. I now condemn all fermentation with Yeft when the Mead is ftrong, ftanding in the Sun or fome warm place is the beft way for fermentation. Rasberries nor Cherries are never to be boil'd, but their Juice put into the Liquor when it is tonning. Use only Morrello Cherries (I think) for pleasure and black ones for health. I conceive best to use very little spice of any kind in Meads. Sir Ken. Digby.

Mead or Metheglin, as it is in strenth fo it is in vertue, warming animating, and cleanfing, restoring lost Appetite, openeth the Stomach; loofneth the Belly; is good against the Consumption of the Lungs, and all Coughs and Colds, against Quarton Agnes, and all diseases of the brain, as Epilepsies, Apoplexies, &c. It cures the yellow Jaundice; and there is no better Drink against

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against the Stone, Sand and Gravel in the Reins or Blader; neither is there any Liquor more conducing to long Life then this. Mr. J. W.

Metheglin is a great Balfam and strengthner of the Viscere; is excellent in Colds, Coughs and Confumptions: for which last they use to heat it and then diffolve the yolk of an Egg in half a pint of it, and a little fresh butter, and drink it warm in the Morning fasting, and at Night Bedward. Sir Ken. Digby.

Metheglin is an excellent pectoral, good against Confumption of the Lungs, Althma, shortnefs of Breath and difficulty of Breathing; it is restaurative and strengthening, it is cleanfing and Diuretick, good against the Stone, Sand and Gravel; it comforts and strengthens the noble parts, and affords good nurrishment. Dr. Charras.

VII. To make a Cordial Liquor of Sack with Clove Gillo flowers. Sir Ken. Digby.

To every Gallone of Sack take a good half pound of the wip'd and cut flowers, put them into large glafs bottles, and pour the Sack upon them, Stop the glaffes exceeding clofe; let them ftand fo till you fee that the Sack hath drawn out all the principal Tincture from them, and that the flowers begin to look palifh; then pour the Sack from them, for if you let them remain longer in the Sack they will give it an earthy tafte; you may then put the tinct'd Sack into K k fit

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fit bottles, stopping them very close : If you drink a glass or two of this Sack at a Meal, you will find it a great Cordial. From the flowers you may distil a spirit adding some Brandy and other ingredients to them.

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I. To preferve green Walnuts in Syrup.

Ake as many green Walnuts as you pleafe, about the middle of July, try them all with a pin if it goes eafily through them they are fit for your purpose; lay them in water for nine days, washing and shifting them Morning and Night; then boil them in water until they be a little foft, lay them to drain ; then pierce them through with a Wooden Sciver, and in the hole put a Clove, and in fome a bit of Cinnamon, and in fome the rind of Citron Candi'd : then take the weight of your Nuts in Sugar, or a little more; make it into a fyrup, in which boil your Nuts (scimming them) till they be tender; then put them up in Gally potts, and cover them close. When you lay them to drain, wipe them with a Course cloth to take off a thin green Skin. They are Cordial and Stomachal.

and Pickling.

II. To make a pleasant and beautiful Sweetmeat of Rasberries and Currans.

Put your Rasberries into a high pot, which ftop clofe and fet in a Kettle of boiling water, till they be all come to a Liquour; then let the clear run through a ftrainer to a pint, whereof put a pound of red Currans (first ston'd) and a pound of Sugar; boil these till the Lipuor be Gelly'd, then put it in glaffes, it will look like Rubies in clear Gelly. You may do the like with Cherries.

III. To make a fine Marmelade of Cherries, with Juice of Rasberries and Currans, as Madami Mancy made it for the Queen.

Take three pound of Cherries ston'd, half a pound of clear Juice of Rasps, and one pound of the Juice of red Currans, and a pound of fine Sugar; put them all together into the preferving pan, boil them with a quick fire, especially at the first, skimming them all the while, as any foum rifes. When you find them of a fit confistence, with a fine clear Gelly mingl'd with the Cherries, take them from the fire, and bruise the Cherries with the back of your Spoon, and when they are cold put them in pots, Peradventure to keep all the Year, there may be requisite a little more Sugar. It is a very fine sweetmeat. Sir Ken. Digby.

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IV. To make Marmelade of Cherries.

Take a pound of fine Sugar to four pounds of the best Kentish Cherties ston'd, put them over a gentle fire that they may not boil, but refolve much into Liquor; take out with the fpoon much of the thin liquor, leaving the Cherries moift enough, but not fwimming in clear Liquor; then put to them your Sugar in pouder and boil it up quick, skimming away the When it is well incorporated froth that rifes. and clear, ftrow in a little more of the Sugar; when they are boil'd enough, take them off, and bruife them with the back of a Spoon, and when they are cold put them up in pots. 1 his will keep well all the year.

V. To make Gelly of Currans with frust whole in it.

Boil four pound of Sugar to a Candy hight, and clarify it with whites of Eggs; then put into it about five pints of the Juice of red Currans; boil them together a little while till it be enough to become Gelly; then put into it two good handfuls of whole Currans, clean'd from the ftalks and black ends, and boil them a little till they be enough.

VI. Mrs. Marbury the Queens preserving woman, ber fine White Gelly of Quinces.

Bail y zur Quinces whole ina large quantity

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of Water, till they crack and are loft, then prefs out their Juice hard, but fo, that only the Lipuor run out, but none of the pap, Lake there pounds of this strain'd liquor being settl'd, and one pound of fine Sugar, and boil them up to a Jelly, with a moderate fire, they may require near an hours boiling to come to a Gelly. The Tryal of that is, to take a Tin plate and wet it with fair water, and drop a little of it upon the wet Plate, if it flick to the Plate it is not enough, but if it fall off (when you flop the Plate) without flicking at all to it, then it is enough. Then put it into flat shallow Tin forms, first wetted with cold water, and let it ftand in them four or five hours, then reverse the Platesthat it may shale and fall out, and fo put the parcels up in Boxes.

VII. To make a very beautiful and clear Paste of Apricocks, or Rasberries, or Currans; which taste most quick of the fruit. Sir Ken. Digby.

Take fix pounds of par'd and flic'd Apricocks, put them into a high pot, which ftop clofe, and fet it in a Kettle of boiling water; till you perceive the flefh is all become an uniform Pulp; then put it into your preferving Pan and boil it gently till it be thick, ftirring it carefully all the while; then put to pounds of pure Sugar to it, mingle it well, and let it boil gently till you fee that it comes to fuch a thicknefs and folidity, that it will not flickd to K k 3

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a Plate; then make it up into what form you pleafe. In like manner you may make paste of Rasberries, and of Currans.

VIII. To Preferve or Pickle green Walnuts like Mangoes for Sauce as they are done now for Genmens Tables.

Take four hundr'd of green Walnuts, fuch as a pin will eafily go thro' boil them in Water, with a handful of Salt for a quarter of an hour; then put them in fresh water and boil them again till they are tender, then take them out, and wipe them with a course Cloth to wipe of a thin skin; when they are cold put them as followeth. Take a well glaz'd Pot big enough to hold them, put a handful of Salt in the bottom; then lay Walnuts, three or four lays one upon another; then a fmall handful of Salt, and again Nuts as before; continue this till your pot be half full; then put in whole Pepper an ounce, and Jamaica Pepper, three Heads of Garlick flic'd; then fill up the Pot with Walnuts and Salt as before; then put in as much right Wine Vineger as will cover them, and cover the whole with good ftore of the best Mustard. I think it will be better if you mix your Peppers and Garlick together, and strow it between every lay of Nuts, and likewife to make your Pickle of Salt and Vineger and pour that on the Nuts to cover them, and then the Mustard to cover the whole.

and Pickling.

IX. Madam C. does bers thus.

Put your Walnuts in fair Water for fifteen days, fhifting them once a day; then put them in Salt and Water for three weeks, then boil them for a quarter of an hour; then wipe them with a courfe Cloth, and put them in the Pot, and ftrow Pepper, Jamaica Pepper, and flic'd Garlick between every lay of Nuts : When your Nuts are all in, pour into them a Pickle made with Vineger and Salt; then to the quantity of two hundred Nuts take a quart of Muftard feed made into the beft Muftart, and Cover the Nuts with it. It will do well if you put Horfradifh roots cut in round flices among your Muftart, that will preferve the ftrength of it and quicken it exceedingly.

In like manner Coucumbers are preferv'd and pickl'd now a days, which are better than the common way.

X. To preferve or pickle Coucumbers the common way as Oylmen do them.

Take a thousand of Coucumbers, wash them clean, then wipe them dry, and put 'm into a pot, First lay a lay of Dill, Fennel, and then a lay of Coucumbers, thus continuing till the Pot or Jar is full; to this put a Pickle made of good Vineger what suffices, in which so much Salt is diffoly'd by boiling that will bear an K k 4 Egg.

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Egg, in which diffolve alfo three ounces of Roch Allum, adding Ginger in groß powder two ounces, Pepper, Coriander feeds, Dill feeds of each an ounce, Cloves two drams; put this Pickle among the Coucumbers, and Cork them up clofly, covering it with wax and Rofin: About a month or fix weeks after take the Pickle out, boil it and Scum it, put it in again to the Coucumbers hot, which cover clofe as before, fo will your Coucumbers laft long and be green: If they be not green enough boil the Pickle again.

XI. To Preferve or Pickle Purstlain.

Take Puflain with its stalks, boil them tender in Fair water, then lay them a drauing, put them in a Jarr or Crock, and Pickle them in the same manner as do Walnuts.

In the like manner you may preferve or Pickle Ashen keys in the month of May, when they are tender.

XII. To Preferve or Pickle Oyfters.

Take a quart of large Oyfters, wash them in fair water, then stew them in their own Liquor strain'd, and a Pint of white Wine Vineger, Pepper, and Jamaica Pepper of each a dram, Lemon peels half a dram, Coriander steeds bruis'd one scruple, a little Salt, boil them till they are pritty tender which may be

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and Pickling.

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in half an hour; put them up in a Caper barrel, and pour the Pickle cold upon them; they will keep good Six or eight weeks.

XIII. To Prefeve or Pickle a breaft of Veal.

Boil it First in fair water fo much as will cover it, till it be tender, then let it cool in its own broth; take of this broth two quarts, of the best Vineger one quart, white Wine one pint, Cloves, Mace and Cinnamon of each a Dram, or of Jamaica Pepper half an ounce; boil them a little together, let it cool, and having cut your Breast of Veal into fit pieces, and put the same into a fit Vessel, pour the Liquor upon it, and stop it up close; it will be fit for eating in a week, and will keep three Months in Summer time.

In like manner you may Preferve or Pickle a Pig, cut into fit pieces.

To make a great Cake, as it was made for the Queen, and for Sir Ken. Digby.

Take four quarts of fine Flower, two pound and a half of Butter, three quarters of a pound of Sugar, four Nutmegs, a little Mace, a pound of Almonds finly beaten, half a pint of Sack, a pint of good Ale-yeft, a point of boil'd Cream, twelve yolks and four whites of Eggs, four pounds of Currans: When you have wrought all these into a very fine Paste, let it be kept warm

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warm by the Fire half an hour before you fet it into the Oven; If you pleafe you may put into it two pound of Raifons of the Sun fton'd and quarter'd. The Ice for this Cake: Take the whites of three new laid Eggs, and three quarters of a pound of fine white Sugar finly pouder'd, beat thefe well together, and Ice the Cake. Let your Oven be of a tempar'd heat, and let your Cake ftand therein two hours and a half before you Ice it, and afterwards only to harden the Ice.

X V. To make excellent small Cakes which are much efteem'd at Court, the King and Queen themselves have eaten of them. Sir Ken. Digby,

Take three pounds of fine Flower, a pound and half of Loaf Sugar in fine pouder, three pounds of Currans; mix the Flower, Sugar and Currans well together, then put in it a pound and half of unmelted butter, three yelks and two whites of Eggs, beat with them one Nutmeg greated; When you have wrought your Pafte well, put it in a Cloth, and fet it before the Fire till it be thro' warm, then make them up in little Cakes, the bignefs of a hands breadth, and prick them full of holes, and bake them in a quick Oven unclos'd.

XVI. To make my Lady Reed's Ginger-bread, fo. much efteem'd and Cry'd up.

Take Cinnamon, Nutmeg, Corianderfeeds, Ani-

and Pickling.

Anifeeds, Carraway feeds and Ginger of each half an ounce, Cloves, red Sanders of each two drams, Cochinile half a dram all in fine pouder, fweet Almonds blanc'd half a pound, Sugar two pounds, fix stale penny Loaves, grated and passed through a Callender; beat the Almonds with a little Rose water; put the grated bread and Sugar into a Basin, and pour on them a pint of Claret wine, set it on a Chasen dish of Coales, put in the Cochinile and the Sanders, stir it well till you see it is pritty stiff; then take it from the Fire, and put into it the other Pouders with the Almonds; work it well together with your hands, and make it into what shape you please.

XVII. To make Cracknels, as they were made for the King.

Take Almonds blanch'd, half a pound, beat them very fine with a little Rofe water, then add one pound of Sugar, and two pounds of fine Flower, three Eggs, four ounces of butter; make a Paste of it, whereof make Cracknels and bake them in a temperate Oven.

X V III. To make Flumery.

Take a heap'd pint of Oatmeal put it in a deep Pan, and pour upon it three or four quarts of Water, ftir it well together and let it stand twenty four hours; then pour off the clear water Of Preserving,

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water without diffurbing the fettl'd Oatmeal, pour on fresh Water, and let it stand only a few hours to fettle a little; then pour off as much as you can of the clear into a Pan or Basin, stirr the reft together and pour it into a Scive, ftirring it in the Seive with your fpoon to make the white Liquor go through, what remains in the Seive put into the empty Pan again, and pour upon it fome of the Water that you pour'd off, ftirr it well together and pour it into the Seive stirring it as before, do thus till you have imploy'd three quarts of water to yout pint of Oatmeal, which is a due proportion to make it of a fit confiftency; boil up your white Liquor with a quick fire ftirring it diligently all the while, and at the beginning when you fet it on the fire left it fettle to the bottom; when it is boil'd enough take it off the fire and pour it into flat Difhes, and let it cool, it will be thick fo that you may cut it; You may eat it with Ale and Sugar, Milk, or with Ale and white Wine; Phylicians call it the Diuretick difh, because it admirable provokes Urin, Its cooling and good for those that have Hectick Fevers. 'Tis excellent Suppermeat in the Summer time. The fecond time that you pour water on the Oatmeal, you must not pour on above five pints, and if that does not make three quarts with what remain'd in the Pan with the Oatmeal, take a little more fresh Water to walhout your Oatmeal, fo as to make it three quarts. thave been been tirr'd to give Receipts of this to Gentlewomen and Housekeepers; and therefore I have set it down here; you may also make a Coudle with it off Ale, and so eat it hot.

and Pickling.

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XIX. To make Bolonia Saufages.

Take a fore Loyn of Porke, good and Fatt cleanse it from all the skins and strings, then fhred it the Fatt and lean together, and to twelve pound and half of meat, take half a pound of Salt, Old rich Cheshier Cheese grated two ounces, and an ounce of Pepper, and half an ounce of Jamaica Pepper grofly beaten; and a handful of dry Sage pouder'd ; When you have mixt and wrought this well together put it into your large Weathers Guts, or Beif Guts well cleans'd, cutting them in pieces about a foot long, tying them at one end with packthread; then put in the meat preffing it in very hard, ty it up and hang them not up in the Kitchin Chimny, for they will hang too hot. They will keep a year or two. When you use them boil one or more of them (as you have occation) for an hour, and when they are cold cut them out in thin flices. Thus I have ofteen made them in England, and they have been better likd then those that are made in the City of Bolonia in Italy from whence they have their name. In Italy they put in Buttoch beif and Beif Suet, Garlick and Parmafan Cheefe.

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XX. Madam Adrian, ber Receipt to Pickle green Walnuts, which are excellent.

Geather them about Midfummer and put them over the fire in cold Watter and shift them four or five times, but let them not boil the first four times but scalding hot, and the fifth time a little longer over the fire, after this put them into cold Water, and let them lye till they are cold; then make a Brine to bare an Egg, and let them lye in it three or four days; then take them out and drain them, and if occation be wipe them. A Pickle for them is half Wine and half Beer Vineger, cold, with Cloves, Mace, Nutmeggs, whole Pepper, Shelots or Garlick fhred, and Jamaica pepper whole. If you please you may put Mustart to them; but the faid Lady does them without it.

COSMETICK REMEDIES.

OR

A Collection of the choiceft and felect'd Receps for making the rareft and fafeft Cofmeticks, to beautify, fmoothen, foften, and whiten the Face and Skin, and to preferve the Beauty and Complexion of Ladies; Invented by feveral learned Phyfitians, and ufed by Queens, Princeffes, and other Ladies of Quality in France, Italy, Germany, and England. The Word Cofmetick fignifies Adorning or Beautifying.

There is an infinite ftore of Cofmetick Remedies amongst curious Ladies and others that are nice in keeping the Skin fair; whom I advise to be caucious in using any thing that is made of Mercury or of Metals.

I. A precious Cosmetick VVater of Sir K. Digby, used by Ladies of great Quality.

TAke white Lilly-Roots fix drams, Florentine, Oris-roots, Beans, Cicers, Lupins of each half an ounce, fresh Bean-flowers a handful,

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ful, Gum Tragant, fine Sugar of each half an ounce, Crums of white Bread Iteept in Milk an ounce, Frankincenfe and Gum-Arabick of each three drams; Borax and Feathered Allum of each two drams, the white of an Eggbeaten, Camphir a dram and half; infufe them for four and twenty hours in a fufficient quantity of Rofe and Bean-flower water, of each equal parts; then diftil it in Balneo. It fmoothens, whitens, beautifies the Skin, and preferves the Beauty and Complexion of Ladies. Wask the face with it at any time; but efpecially Morning and Evening.

II. Another Cosmetick Water, much used in France. Dr. Charras.

Take two young Pigeons, gut them and cut them into pieces, crums of white Bread half a pound, Peach Kernels and the four greater cold Seeds bruis'd of each four ounces, the whites of twelve Eggs beaten, and the Juice of twelve Lemons; infuse them twelve hours in two quarts of Milk; then diffil it in Balneo. To the diffill'd Water add Borax, Camphir, Sugar-candy, and burnt Allum of each three drams; fet three day in the Sun, then let it stand fifteen days in a Wine Cellar; then filter it thrô gray Paper an keep it for ufe. This is an excellent Connetick-water, and hath all the Vertues of the former, and is to' be us'd in like manner. III.

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III. An other Cosmetick-VV ater.

Take fine Sugar one pound, Roch-Allum three ounces, white Poppy Seeds bruifed, Bean-flowers, flowers of Water Lillies, and of the greater Houfe Leek of each a handful, the Juice of four Lemons, the crum of two white penny Loaves, bruife what is to be bruifed, and put all into a Glafs Body or Cucurbite or of Tin, and pour upon it Cows-Milk and white Wine of each a quart, diftil it in Balneo. The Ufe and Vertue is the fame with the former.

IV. A Cosmetick Remedy used by the Queen of France.

Take the whites of two new laid Eggs, beat the shels to pouder, and put them with the whites in a quart Bottle, let them be shaken and beaten for three hours, then put into it four ounces of burnt Allum in fine Pouder. beat it two hours longer; then put into it three ounces of white Sugar in Pouder, and beat it also for two hours, then put into it four ounces of Borax in Pouder; and beat it alfo; then take a pint of Water that runs from under the wheel of a Mill, put into it four ounces of white Poppy feeds well beaten, mix them well together, fo that it be like Milk, then pour that into the Bottle to the other things, at four feveral times, beating it every time the fpace of two hours; then ftrain

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ftrain it trô a fine white Linnen Cloth; and having put it into the Bottle again, let it be beaten for two hours longer. An to know when it is well made and well beaten is, when it froths the breadth of three fingers above it. It will keep a twelve Month. Use it only every other day.

V. A Cosmetick or Beautifying VVater by Dr. Bate.

Take fix Calves feet broken, Milduft four ounces, Pouder of Myrrh four ounces and half, white Wine and Milk of each three pints, mix them and diftil them, and keep the water in a Bottle for ufe; put a piece or two of fmooth Allum in the Bottle and fhake them well up and down in it. Wash the Face with it. It fmoothens and whitens the Skin, taking away Scurf, Morphew, and Sun-burnings: It ought to be used twice a day.

VI. The Beautifying Secret of Dr. Bate.

Take Venice-Talk made into fubtil pouder one part, Oyl of Camphir two parts, digeft them in Balneo Mariæ to the greateft whitenefs.

Scroderus, from whom this Secret is taken, fays it must be crude Talk in pouder, and so you must expose it for a quarter of an hour before a hot Fire, and pouder it in a Mortar made

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made almost red hot by Setting it upon a Fire, heating also one end of the Pestle, and Sift the Talk very finly.

To make the Oyl of Campbir for this Secret.

Take Camphir two ounces, Tabaccopipe-Clay four ounces, mix them and make it into little Balls, and let them dry; then put them in a Retort and Diftil in Sand into a large Receiver which hath Rain Water therein: First there comes forth a white Matter, then a clear Water, and at last, with a stronger Fire, a sweet fent'd Oyl, which being rectifi'd with Spirit of Wine will be as yellow as Gold.

VII. To make a clear VV ater from Talk and Snailes, very proper to Beautify and clear the Complexion of Ladies, being in great esteem in France. Dr. Charras.

Take Venetian Talk, expose it for a quarter of an hour to a flaming Fire; then beat it in a Iron Mortar made almost red hot by setting it upon the Fire; heat also one end of the Pestle and reduce your Talk to a most subtributil pouder; then take Garden Snailes, put them into a Pipkin, and straw your Talk amongst them, cover the Pipkin and leave it fo till the Snailes have sucked up all the Talk, then bruise the Snailes with all their Shells, and put them into a Glass Cucurbite, put on the head and L l 2 Distil 516 The Cabinet of Safe

Distil it in Sand or in Balneo Mariæ, and you will have a clear Water.

VIII. To make a Pomatum for the Face.

Take fix dozen of Sheeps Feet with the bones, break the bones, and take out the marrow; then boyl the Feet well with the bones, and feira off the Oyl that rifes and put it to the Marrow, to which put of the four great Cold-Seeds beaten of each half an ounce, the rind of one Citron, two penny worth of Borax, three Cloves of white Lilly-roots well beaten, a little white Rofe-water; boil all together for the space of two hours, then strain it into a Basin of Spring Water, and wash it with divers Waters till it be white. Use this at night. It nourifhes, fmoothens, foftens and whitens the Skin. If you mix with it fome of the Magistery of Pearl, or the Magistery of the white Orient part of Oyster-shels, you will have a most incomparable Cosmetick Remedy. Some Ladies make this Pomatum of a Calves Chaldren in steed of the Sheeps Feet, which makes a very white Pomatum.

IX. An other incomparable Cosmetick Balsam, used by a Princess in Germany.

Take of Pomatum half an ounce, Oyl of Jalmin one dram, Oyl of Myrrh per deliauium two scruples, Sperma Ceti five scruples, Ma-Magistery

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giltery of Pearls, or of Oyster-shels two drams, mix them. It is a truly noble Cosmetick.

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The Magiltery of Bilmuth, Tinglafs, Saturn, Lead and the Spanish White, have been in use for many years among Ladies; but they are absolutly to be condemn'd, and never to be used, by reason that all Cosmeticks prepar'd out of Metals or Minerals, thô they seem to whiten the Skin for the present, yet they will certainly make it black, as the Ingenious Monsteur Lemery tels you, in his Cours of Chimistry, in these words.

The Magistery of Saturn or Lead having been wash'd and dry'd, is nothing elfe but a most subtilised Ceruse or white Lead. 'Tis used for a Paint or Fucus; but this Cosmetick as well as all others that are made with Metaline or Mineral materials, as Bismuth, Tinglass or Tin, very often make the Skin black after they have whiten'd it. He gives you the reason for it. Now, there is nothing better in the World for a White, than the Magister of Pearls; and that which is made of the white Orient part of Oyster-sters, which is yet whiter and better, thô much cheaper. I will give you the Preparation of them as follows.

X. To make the Magistery of Pearls:

Take what quantity you please of Seed-Pearls, reduc'd to an impalpable pouder upon L l 3 518 The Cabinet of Safe

a Marble stone; put them into a large Matrafs or Bolt-head, and pour upon them Juice of Lemons four fingers breadth above the Pouder, put the Matrass in Digestion in warm Sand for two days, shaking the Matrals now and then; then let it settle, and pour off the clear Liquor into fome Bottle. Pour upon the remaining Pearls as much fresh Juice of Lemons as before, digest as before, shaking the Matrass from time to time. Let it settle, pour off the clear Liquor as before; put fresh Juice of Lemons upon the remaining Pouder, and digest again for two days; continue doing until your Pearls be all most all diffolv'd; Then mix your Liquors together, and pour it into a large white Bafin, or Earthen Pan, and evaporate in Sand two third parts of the Liquor (covering the Basin with Paper that no durst fall in) or till you see a very thin Skin appear upon the Liquor; then take out the Bafin and filter the Liquor; put this Liquor thus impregnated with the Pearls into a Basin, and pour into it drop by drop some Liquor or Oyl of Tartar made per deliquium, it will make a Coagulum, which will precipitat to the bottom in a Pouder very white; let it stand till it be well settled, then pour off the clear Liquor eafily, and pour upon the white Pouder fair Water, stir it well about and let it stand to settle, pour off the clear, and put on fresh Water; repeat this five or fix times that the Pouder may be perfectly fweeten'd and washed from the Juice ot

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of Lemons and the Oyl of Tartar: Then dry the Pouder carfully that no dust come to it.

This is that which is call'd Magistery of Pearls, and is whiter than any made either of Metals or Minerals, and wholfom and fafe to be used both inward and outwardly, and is a Noble Fucus or Cosmetick for Ladies of the greates Ranck. It may be used with Cosmetick Waters, or mix'd with Pomatum.

XI. To make the Noble Cosmetick, of the pure, white, and Orient part of Oysters-shels, which far exceedes that of Pearls or any other in whiteness, and is much cheaper.

Take of the faireft and largeft Oyfter-fhels, wash them very clean, then with a short knife sharp at the point scrape off as much of the white of the infide of the Shels as you can; when you have enough of this white Pouder put it into a Matrass or Bolt-head, and pour upon it Juice of Lemons, set it in digestion in warm Sand, and in all things proceed as in the making of the Magistery of Pearls.

The Juice of Lemons you may buy at the Confectioners for two Shillings the quart : You may alfo use a pure distill'd Vineger in stead of the Juice of Lemons.

Some Ladies use Oyl of Tartar to cleanse the Face and Skin, which is not to be used alone, by reason it is a sharp brine of the Salt of Tartar, diffolved into Liquor by the moisture L l 4 of

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of the Air; it is called Oyl of Tartar per deliguium, which thô it be fmooth and feem to cleanfe the Skin, yet when it is dry the Skin will be very rough. In ftead of this, the noble Oyl of Myrrh made per deliquium in the whites of Eggs boyl'd hard is an excellent thing; It is made thus,

XII. To make the Oyl of Myrrb per deliquium.

Take Eggs and boyl them hard, then having cut them in the middle take out the yolks, and fill the whites with Myrth in pouder, put them upon little flicks laid at the bottom of an Earthen Difh glaz'd, put this in a Cellar or fome moift place; The Myrth will refolve into Liquor, which will diftil and drop into the Platter or Difh, which gather and keep it for ufe. 'Tis the Oyl of Myrth; 'tis much efteem'd to cleanfe the Skin and take away Freckles, Sun-burn and Morphew. It is alfo good for Tetters.

XIII. To make the Cosmetick Water of Montpelier, which is highly esteemed in France for the Complexion.

Take of the best Verjuice two quarts, put to it Litharge pouder'd and wash'd in Plantain-water, and dry'd one pound; distil this in Balneo, and keep the Water for sife. It is also very good for a red and pimpl'd Face.

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XIV. A Cofmetick Remedy to take away a filtby Morphew often experienc'd by Dr. Hall.

Take Caftle-Soap fliced two ounces, Sulphur Vive, in fine pouder, one ounce, Verdigreece one dram, Camphir one fcruple, grind the Camphir in a Mortar with a few drops of Spirit of Wine, then make a Ball of them all with Oyl of Tartar : When you use it moisten it with a little Vineger, and anoint the Face with it at Night, and let it dry of it felf; the Morning after wash it off with Milk. The faid Dr. says he bas experienc'd it an bundred times.

XV. A Cofmetick Remedy to take away Summer Spots, Lentiginous Spots, and the vulgarly called Liver Spots. by Dr. Willis.

Take of a fmall Lixivium of Salt of Tartar four ounces, Oyl of bitter Almonds what fuffices, mix it in fuch a proportion that the whole Liquor prefently turn white, and fo let it ftand : Let the parts affected be anointed and gently rubbed Mornings and Evenings with this mixture. Or,

X VI. Take fresh roots of Aron, Briony and Salomons-Seal of each an ounce, pouder of Fenugreek-Seeds a dram, Camphir half a dram, being bruis'd together pour to them Oyl of Tartar per deliguium three ounces, prefs it out, apply it with a Rag dipt in it twice a day. Or, XVII.

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XVII. Take Sulphur Vive pouder'd an ounce, Black-Soap two ounces, bind it in a Rag, let it hang in a pint of Vineger for nine days, then apply it to ufe, washing and rubbing the places affect'd with it twice a day.

Some are content with the Water of Bean-Flowers, or the fimple diftill'd Water of Eumitory, or with the Water which bleeds from the fprout of a Vine cut in the Spring : But (fays the faid Dr.) the more curious Women and pretenders to the most exquisite knowledge in the Cosmetick Art, are scarce fatisfied with any Remedies for the Skin but Mercurial : But it is frequently observ'd (fays he) that Men or Women using much Mercurial Remedies, become subject to the Vertigo, and Convulsive, or Paralitick effects, and that their Teeth turn black, and sometimes grow loofe.

XVIII. The Dutchess of York, her excellent Cosmetick Water for the Complexion.

Take two dozen of old Pippins, pare them and flice them, put to them two quarts of Butter-Milk, put to them the Parings, but not the Coars, let them infuse four and twenty hours, then distil it in a common Still with a gentle Fire, and keep the Water for use: Then take Bean-flowers and Elder-flowers of each a Gallon, put them in an earthen glaz'd Pot, and add white Poppy Seeds bruis'd, Jordan Almonds bea-

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beaten and white Lilly-roots beaten of each a pound pthe ulp of fix Lemons without the peels and Kernels, twelve Snails out of the Shels, the whites of 12 Eggs well beaten, Camphir beaten with an Oyl'd Peftle, mix all these together, and pour to them as much new Butter-Milk as will well cover them; let them stand till the next morning; then Distil it and mix this Water with your Pippin-Water. From my Lady Baker.

XIX. To make an excellent sweet or perfum'd VVater of Dr. Bate.

Take fix Oranges, and as many Lemons cut in pieces; Roots of Florentine Oris, white Sanders, Cinnamon of each two ounces, Mace, Cloves of each fix drams, flowers of Lavender four handfuls, of Roman Camomil and Rosemary of each two handfuls, Leaves of Marjerom two handfuls, Bafil three handfuls, Styrax Calamit three drams, Benjamin five drams, Damask Rofes fifteen handfuls, round Cyperus half an ounce, Fountain Water fifteen quarts, Distil all in an Alembick drawing off only the first seven quarts and a pint; To every pint of which add two grains of the best Musk tyed up in a Nodule : Or thus, Take Musk nine grains, Civet three grains, grind them together in a little Morter with three or four drops of Juice of Lemons. This being ty'd in a Nodule will perfume twice the quantity

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quantity of Water that the Musk will do alone. The Water it felf is used as a Perfume, and is a most excellent Vehicle to make any Cordial Julep up with all; for it admirably comforts and recreates the Animal Spirits. Dr. Salmon.

P. S. There is a Pouder fold by fome Apothecaries for the Face and Skin, which I would caution Ladies not to ufe, by reafon it is made of a certain Stone, call'd English Talk, burnt in the Fire, and therefore this Pouder is but a Lime, which makes the Skin rough inftead of fmoothening it. The Noble Cofmetick of the white Orient part of Oyfter-fhels, is a thing of an incredible whitenefs, far exceeding any White that can be made, I have it always by me ready prepar'd, and Sell it for 2 s. 6. d. the ounce.




