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
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



















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












The Preface of the Author to the Reader.



F some thinke no shame to displeasure many, for the pleasuring of a few (gentle Reader) then I need not to blush nor scare to profit many by hurting of none : which I hope I have done by the publishing of this my Booke abroad, not pend without paine,

nor drawne without diligence, nor ended with eafe: Whereiu are fuch and fo many notable, rare, pleafant, profitable and precious things, (meaning oue with another) as neuer were yet fet forth in any volume in our vulgar English tongue, nay divers of them were neuer hetherto printed, nor written that ener I knew : but onely that I writ them at fuch time as I heard them credibly reported. Thinking them fuch rare things as was worthy to be registred. Marie I must confesse, I have selected and picked a great fort out of Latin writers: the Authors and writers, whereof I have named most commonly at the end of the fame. And fomenotable and precious things I gathered out of fome old English written Bookes, & some also not long fince printed,

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printed vnworthy to be hid, and great pitty but they fhould be knowne : which purposely I have placed herein, whereby I thinke verily, many will read them, heare them, and have profit by them, that otherwise fhould neuer have knowne them. For many (I suppose) will buy this booke for things whereunto they are affectioned, that neuer could or would have bought or looked on the Bookes, wherein all they are. So that by this meanes, they are like to winne against their wils.

Perhaps you will maruell, that I haue not placed them in better order, and that things of like matter are not joyned together. Truely there are fo many of fo diners and fundry forts, and contrary effects, that it could not be altogether obferued. And in my indgement, through the ftrangeneffe and variety of matter, it will be more defiroufly and delightfully read; knowing we are made of fuch a mould, that delicate daintineffe delights vs much: but we lothe to be fed too long with one foode: And that long wandring in ftrange, pleafant, and contrary places, will leffe weary vs, then fhort trauell in often troden ground.

This worke might haue beene framed with finer Phrafes (more delectable to fome, though not fo meete for many) but that it is better to profit a great fort, then to feed the fancies of a few, well affured, that the learned eloquent can better perceiue plaine fpeeches, then the flenderly learned and common fort can vnderstand eloquent Discourses.

Therefore as I have written it to all indifferently, fo with I to manifest the meaning thereof accordingly:

ly : especially of fuch as are to be conceined : Not ignorant that there are divers and fundry Aftrologicall Aphorifines, and fome other practices befides in this Booke, that many both wife, learned and eloquent, cannot attaine to the vnderstanding thereof, (much leffe the common fort :) the meaning whereof I commit to the learned therein. Vntill the publishing whereof, I referre you to a little booke, intituled or called, A briefe Treatife concerning many proper Tables,&c.

In which little booke is contained the Computation of yeares, with the raignes of the Kings of England : alfo a briefe, neceffary and exact Table and rule, whereby any may finde iuftly and truely, when and how long any Planet doth raigne, especially fuch as be of good capacity, and have pregnant wits for to conceiue the fame : But as for the duller fort, whofe vnderstanding is vnable to reach the true meaning A.3 DY. by short instruction, I thinke the same to be both too briefe and too busie for them.

I have deuided this into ten Bookes, every one whereof, containes a hundred of the intituled Notables things : which are in all a thoufand. Being bold to affirme this much, that a great deale of gold cannot coteruaile this guift: if but fome twenty of the faid thoufand, be diligently marked, faithfully followed, and perfectly practifed. I tet-Staine man being in a Gatten with his Loue, westers did take (as he was walking) a few leaves of Sage, who rubbing his teth and gummes there with, ine mediatly fell downe and dyed : whereupon his faid Louo was examined how he dyed, the faid, the knew nothing that he ailed, but that he rubbed his teth with Bage : and thee went with the Judge and others into the Garden and place, where the fame thing happened : and then the toke of the fame Bage to thew them how he did, and likewife rubbed her tath and gummes therewith, and prefently fie oyed ale to, to the great maruell of all them that floo by : whereupon the Judge fulpeaing the caufe of their deaths to be in the Sage, cauled the laid bed of Dage to be plucked and digged bp, and to be burned, lead others might haus the like harme thereby. And at the rotes, or buder the faid Sage, there was a great Moade found , which infected the fame Sage with his benomous breath. Anthonius Mizaldus hath with ten of this maruellous matter. This may be a warning to · fuch as rathly ble to eate rate and bnivatht Bage : therefore it is goo to plant Bue round about Sage, for Teades by no meanes will come nie onto Rue, (as it is thought of fome.)

A certaine Poet by the report of Mizaldus, dio weare leased den foles under his thoses, least the wind thould over-blow him, his body was folight and fo little.

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If any doe mildly 02 foftly beat the plant 02 falkes of an bearbe called Hullen, some cals it Geoge taper, in the mozning, when the flowers thereof begin to open, all the flowers by little and little will fall and come to one : as though the plant were withered, 02 blaffed, which the ignorant have thought to be done by Magicall arts, 02 by some inchantment: especially, if he that doth firike the same Mullen, both seme to mumble some words while he both it. 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The droffe, or that that is left after the palling out of the oyle of Linfæd, is meruellous profitable for the fæding of beafts: sif you thall let a handfull or two thereof ftæp a while in raine water, s therewith walk your hands, it will not only amend the fpots or other deformity of the fkin: but allo you thall thereby perceine that the fame s other members, if they be likewife walk therewith, will be made much faire smore cleane. Mizaldus. 61

All things that comes out of the earth will fwimme boon quickfilner, though they be heauy, ercept gold : g gold though neuer folittle, will fincke into it and be fivallowed thereof, g his colour will be turned into filner, which cannot be reduced into the forme of gold againe, but with fire, nor cannot be gotten out. Ptolomie faith, that he saw the triall heres in the house of laing Adebarus: who was berg wife, and was margailous erpert in naturall Magicke, in whose Palace of Place, there was neither filte nog any other hurting wogme. And that I might search it out fayth he : I brought in thither lyne filtes, which presentlie died. Mizaldus.

Sire of leaven whites of egs put into troubled of thicke Mine, and the fame being wel moued and flirred with a fricke makes the Mine fagre and cliere.

It is dangerous to Aricke : especially, to cut that part of the body, when the Mome is in that figne that gouerns the same : as daily experience theweth by many, and a thing every where feared and doubted, through the dangers that followes thereof. And it was credibly told me, that one that was by chance pricht in the finger with a thorne : the Mome in Gemini, died without any remedy thereof. And I knew a tall man and a stoute , that in fighting had a little cut with a fword buder the ancle, as it fermed to me, feeing the same, a thing of small harme, yet notwithstanding, his dyed within halfe an house after the firche was given. This may be berified by many examples. So that by this and by many other things, it is manifest that the Mome and other Celestiall bodies: have maruailous power in our earthlie bodyes. As in this Boke and in divers and many places, the fame is manifest.

If a Rat, Mouse, or Wiefell, or any other thing, sovensie leap or fal on the body of a woman with child:02 els any Cheries

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or a clufter of Grapes, or other thing whatfoeuer chance to fall or hit any part of her body, by and by it haps that the childe is marked with fome special noat or marke on that part, subereon they did fall or hit: (ercept happily the woman on whose boby the same did chance,) wipe whith her hand sodainly the part or member therwith touched, & lay her faid hand on some other part further of. Lemnius. There are seve women; but knowe this to be true, and many have found it to true. As two or three strange examples in this booke doe shew most wonderfully.

Burning water called Aquavice, is of a meruailous force, in preferring of things and kieping them from putrifying. For fieth or meates what sever mortened therewith, will be fafe from corruption and wormes.

If young bealtes eate of the leaues of an Juie tree, they die. But if they that chaive the cudde doe eate thereof, they fiele no harme. This is the opinion of Theophraftus. But Plinie doth afcribe it to the Alhtree. But the likelihood and nevenes of the words might deceive him. For the Alhtree in the Greeke tongue is, Milean, and the Juie tree is Millon. Mizaldus.

A maruailous matter, and a thing woathy to be remembed is written by Aclinus, that a great mighty Unolfe did come to a fchwle, and did inatch the writing Tables out of the hands of a boy, called Gelon of Syracufa. Whereat the fayd childe Gelon, rifing from his feat, did diligently and tharply without any fear follow the faid wilde beaft, earneftly to plucke the fayde Tables from his mouth. But after that Gelon was out of the fchwle, the fause with a fodaine ruine fell upon the reft of the fchwlers, and killed, & opppzeft with the Schwlemafter, aboue a hundreth boyes. Duely Gelon by Bods providence, of all his fellowes remayning alive. And because hie was not killed of the Utolfe, but rather referued, it ramothe without great admirations, partly forethelwing his kingdom and rule, and partby that he was preferued from fo imminent a perill.

Wholecuce will preferue Chelnuttes, and kæpe them fafe and found, let them lay and mire them with Walnuts: for they will drinke up and confume such humors whereby they corrupt. And they will not suffer them to ware mowely. Mizaldus.

A hearbe called Houndkonge, ioyned with the Matrie of a Bytch, beinh fo tyed to the necke of a Dogge, that he can not get it awaye : you thall fee him turne about fo long, that he will fall downe and feme to be halfe dead. Albertus.

Taken the Scithians were constrayed to hustage hunger for any certaine matter or breast caule : they gived in their belives with broad bands that no emptynes left in they belly or guttes, their hunger might the lefte greene them. For through the hard binding in of the belly, hunger is the more tas lerable. Alternpon it is frene that they that eate much, do lose or unbutton their coublets, and lose their garters. Phanorinus.

The Clephant seeing a Ram is by and by tame, and leaves his fiercenes. With which pollicy the Romanes caused the Clephants of Ring Purhus to returne and goe backward. And so the Romanes obtained a worthy bictory. Mizoldus.

The paring of an Apple cut fomething thicke, the infide whereof laide to hote burning e2 cunning eyes, at night when the partye goes to bed, and tyde o2 bound to the fame, douth help, the fame very specific, and contrary to expectation. An excellent fecret,

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A certaine Priet having a louing Donge, was killed foe his mony, and theown among bulles of fome other priny place. arthich dog to mourned for his faid Maiter, that he would not repart from him, but holded : fo that the beade boop mas found. withich dead body was brought afore certain men to be bieluco. to which place diners people reforted. Amongit whom the mur, therer must nædes thelse himfelfe (lamenting outwardlye the matter, with the reft of the flanders by, as though her had beene as gailtlede as the beft,) whom when the favoe Dog perceived: he backe and did runne at him fiercely, and by no meanes would leave his backing, howling and running at him. And following after him, and at none other : the wing (in his maner) that that was he that killed his Matter. Withereupon being fufpected he was examined, who forthwith confested his wicked fad : and therefore was erecuted Daint Aufline affirmes this, as I borca member. 35

If both the lights, (that is to fay, the Soume and the Moone) bie in the firt house infortunate, they that he then borne with out doubt will be blinde. And if but one of them be there and infortunate: then the childe will be blinde but of one eye. And likewife it will be, if either the faid lightes be Lord of the firt house infortunate. And bniverfally, their eyes cannot escape great hurt, in whole Patinity the faid lightes are impedite, larro.

Withich was:that two men lying in bed together, the one of them being fait alley. twke the keys and bulocked the dwzes, and the gate of the house. and to take his Bowe & Arrowes, and went to a woo oz Cha'e about a myle from thence, and killed a Bucke og a Doe, and then did couer and hide the fame in the Tawd : and then came home againe, bulocking and locking the gates & dwzes agayne and layd the keyes where he had them, and to went to bed. The other man that lay with him being awake, followed him & did fie all that he did. What he would not goe to bed, but Ravde a while in another place, to fee the ende thereof. And as fome as the other was in his 13ed, he take his Dagger, Mabbing and thuilting therewith in the 15ed, where the other man did lye, and by and by after awaking, fayde : alas what have I done, I have killed him. The other answered, nay, I am not kild yet, thankes be to God. Then faide he : for I was a dreamed that I killed a Bucke in such a place, and that thou didle see me where I did kil him, a hide him: a thing thou would a bewray me I thought to kill the. But I am glad faid he, that it was but a Dreame. Then the other faide, if it were a Dreame thy Dreame is the true. for thou halt performed all thy Dreame. ercept the killing of me, which he would not believe butill the nert day : when he that lay with him arried him to the place where he himselfe tolde that he did hide the faid Buck. Withere indede they found the Buck killed as he before told in his Dzeame. A marueilous matter if it were true.

And so of the reft, according to the fignifications of every hou'e. Taberefoze the learned in Aftros loay are not ignozant ; and this is a very true rule flizoughly and many times observed. And the Lozd of the seventh house, og the heuse that the party travels wite, owth fignifie be in the Cadent house : then the partie is farre from home, to that he is not like to speake with him. 23

And it is observed in many eramples. Decreof Augustus Celar, (as Gellius reporteth) was marueilous glad, that he had els caped that years of his age. The cause may be that the feuenth years, and the numb years (being Anni climacterici & critici, which are Judicial years) multiplyed together: makes the faid number of. 63. Mizaldus.

Sethe Luy berries in Thineger, or in white Wine, and when they be well fodde, sup of the same bot licour, and when it is cold spit it out, and sup more thereof. Whosever doth thus, it helpeth the tath ache.

They in whole Ratinity Venus is impedite og infogtunate of Saturne. Are like to have paines og griefes in their ftones, especially, if the be in the Ascendent. And likewise, if Venus be with Mars in the eight house : og if the Done Venus and Mars be conjund, og in the cuil aspect of Saturne, latromath. Guat. Riff.

Thossener is lame, & can neither goe no? Airre their isynts: Let them take of gwd Aqua Composita, and oyle of Koles, of either a like much, mire them both together, and anoynt the greened place therewith Downing and evening, butill it be well. Thich will be within a while after, but rubbe the place with warmed Cloathes well before. A thing often proved.

Wholeener hath Mars in the Hozocope, oz the Alcendent at the time of his birth : certainely be will have a special scarre oz marke in his face. Pro. Which I have tryeo in many, and yet never have found it falle.

And thus the doth cure the fick party, and deliver her felfe from the fame, through a certaine marueilous benefite of Pas ture. But learned men de much diffent in taking of his Birde. Plinie cotends that it is Icterus, some do think that it is Chloreus,02 Chlorio, which the french men call Lorion & Loriot, the beft part of the Philicions befends that it is Charadrius : fome affirmes that is Oriolus : others fay that it is Galbulus og Galbula 02 Chloris inhich Geiner likes not. And Mizaldus leaves it to the indgement of the Decto25 02 learned, butill experience that try the truth therof. Mizaldus in fuis Mirabilius feu arcanis.

Orpheus and Archelaus affirme, by the report of Plinie, that if the lippes of them be fineared with mans blod, that are - fallen of the fallingficknes by and by they wil be delinered from the traunce of fitte, of if their great lawes be then nert pulled of vincht. 54

And the third day after, he being carried to burying , there was there prefent, one Eucharius , Rofenbader, of Wellemburge, and John of Ettenftet, Surgeons, in the pres fence of many, which bid cut or open the belly and make of the faide dead Bulbandman. Witherin was found being maruellous and prodigious, a long and round piece of wood, foure knines of Steels partly charpe, and partly nickt like a Salve, and two marpe inftruments of irou, that were longer then a ipan : and they had therein allo, haire cowled together as it were a round Bonile

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Bowle of Ball. This was laid of put into his Dawe, by none other arte, but onely by the craft and subtilitie of the denill. This hath Ioannes Langius written in the first part of his medicinall Cpiffles. Epistol. 38. de prodigijs & præstigijs dæmonum in morbis. Mizaldus reports it also.

In many Ponds, all the water and mudde taken out. by and by Geles doe bræde, if raine water come into them, for that with the dewe, they do line and are nourifhed. Arift. Plutarch. And other. 64

Af the right knie of a Bull be tyed with a broade band, it will make him tame. Elianus.

There was a certaine woman great with Childe in Pago, not farre from Andernacus, a Towne of the Bithop of Cullen, defiring or longing to eate or to fæde on her hulbands fleth, and although the loued him intirely, the killed him in the night, and being fatilited with the half of his fleth, the powdred the red with Halt : but after when her great longing did ceale, and that the Dis tia copent fa, hat hall Sharefor

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vid repent the dede, the did confesse it to her frændes that sought for her hulband. Ichannes Langius, in his medicinall Spiftles. Therefore it is good for the hulbands to take hæde, while their wines have such inordinate longing opon them.

But to the weaker perfons give the leffer quantity. Dake it in five or fire little round pils or balles, and fwallowe them one after another at one time. They are proved to be very god, I found this in a very close written Boke.

If Mercurie bie impedite of Satutne in a Childes Patinis ty,it doth hinder the tung. But it is woole when they be coopdals ly coniund together, especially, in the Ascendent, or in the ses wenth house, and in the same signe with the Summe, (Mercurie being then Occidentall:) or if Mercurie be aboue the earth corporally coniund with Saturne, or else in an quill aspect of Saturne, and in a dambe signe called signum mutum, and also is infortunate : that is to say in an euill place, Retrograde or combust, and peregrine : That party then born, will have great impediment in his tung, or else will be dambe, and cannot speake, latromath. Guat. Ryst.

Iohannes Langius an ercellent Philicion laith, that he heardit reposted of certaine Possemen of the County Palentine, that they did fix in Aultria, a man, which with barking, and with livift running: contended and Ariued with Dogs, and was huuted of them buhart in the WODS.

This following will heale lame members. Sorth Reive, and Rolemary, of each two handfulles, with common Dyle, and Malmeley, of either one quart together, for the space of halfe an house : then let the lame members be washt and bathed theres with, (but before the la d member or graced place must be well chafed with a hote cloth,) then when it is well bathed (which will be within halfe an howse, (wrap and have the member or place to bathed with a Lambe fluinne, (the woll-five inward,) and doo thus every night before or at going to bed, there weekes at the leaft, and he will be whole and found thereof. Dotor Owen hel stone therewith, and with none other thing, that could neither frand nor goe, but was very lame. They that faive the profe thereof, told it; me, which were perfons of gap credit.

It was a hainous offence with the Egyptians, either willing, lye of by chance to kill a Catte. And Diodours tels a pretty fictie thereof, left it might be thought to be a fable. In the time of Prolomie, a league of amitic being begun betweene him and the Romanes : A certaine Romane then against his will, had, killed a Cat : whereupon the Egyptians gathered together, and bid befet the house where he was, requiring to have him to be executed for his great offence, (no whit regarding the power of the Romanes, nor yet their league of friendship with them :) Then had not the King and Rulers bene, they would have by awne him out of the house and killed him. This excellent Antidote did Bing Nicomedes bie, when any did bid him to Banquet oz any other cheere, that he did fuspect . If there bie no poylon taken befoze it, it will remaine quietly in the fomacke : but if there bie any poilon, it will prorure bomit : fo that thereby the poilon and medicine will both come forth. Mizaldus.

A notable thing to cause one to liepe immediately. Take of the inice of Penbane, of Lettice, of Plantane, of Poppie, of the

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the leaues of Mandrag, of Juie leaues, of Mulbery loaues, and of Pemlocke, of eache one dram, of Opium, and of Juie berries, of either as much: frampe the Juie berries and the Opium tos gether, and mive the inices and them well together : then dip a Spunge into the fame, and let it drinke it all by, and then lay the fame Spunge in the Sun to dry: after lay the faid Spunge to the parties Pole whome you would have to fleepe, and he will fleepe quickly. If a woman with Childe have her Smocke that the weater, flitte at the neather end og Skirt thereof, og not selved there round about, but that one floe og seame thereof be a little left buclosed, og busieved together : the same childe that the then goeth withall, that be safe from having a clouen og Pare lip, yea though the chance to meet suddenly a Pare, og though a Pare doth leap ouer her, og suddenly touch her. In this Cleduary, be medicines of the principall members (that is to fay) of the heart, head, ftomack, Liner. But in them that are infect already, and are taken with the Petrilence, if they drinke of it but one (pomefull, as thall be faid here after, (especially after letting of blood, if it bec convenient to the patient,) and lay him downe and tweate boon the fame, if the benome hath not biterly ouercome the heart: he thall budoubtedly recouer. It hath been lately proued, that after orinking of the fame medicine, when the patient made his water in an buinall, the glasse hath burth in paces, by reason of the benome that it purged out. This is the making of the faid Cleetuary.

And every one of them did draw out a Figure thereof alike, and they found Mars in the fame figure of the Revolution in the Angle of the earth, which is the fourth house bnder the earth : and they indged Mars then to be of an enill influence, and thereby they indged that the Emperour that give thould have hot feuers of the nature of Mars. And they agreed all in thatopinion to the Em. perour. Guydo Bonatus being there, had drawne the Emperours Revolution likewife, and he found Mars going towards the fourth house, being then of an cuill influence, indged thereby that poylon thould be ministred to the Emperour to kill him. Theres fore he countailed the Emperour, that if any did whilper, or had any pring taile together, or were found meeting or having conference together in his Court, they thould be apprehended. Da if any thould come to the Bitchin not wont, or appointed, that somefraithfull man of his Court should watch the same. Which charge was committed to the Mafter of the Emperours Houthold : which being very diligent therein, elpyed and found two knights of the Emperours Court, that were very bulle in talke together, and had not onely mutuall conference together, more then they were wont : but allo oftentimes required to come into the Litchin. I knew one that could not theed a predle without spectacles, which put not past two or three drops of the same into their eyes at night, and the next morning the fame party did for well to thiede a pedle without Spectacles.

The Dofe of a Bead called Alces, which is a wilde beaff like a failow Diere, having no ioynts in his legges, hath a marnes ious bertue and firength against the falling euill: foz a little piece thereof enclosed in a Ring, and the same Ring put byon the finger next the little finger, fo that the fame piece of the houfe be turned toward the palme of the hand, it douth recreate them maruelous much, that are fallen, and immediatly makes them rife bp. Sage, Planten, Juy leaves, Roleparsie, stamp them together, and mire Mine thereto: give the patient it often to drinke, till he be whole. A true & tryed medicine. I thinke that Per. Hisp. hath the same. 68

If you burne foure obnces of Turpentine, byon a hot og burning plate of Iron, bntill it may bemade in powder, and then mire two dyams thereof, with foure ounces of the water of Sarifrage, and give it twice in a weeke, earely in a moguing, to them that have the fione in their Blather, and so continue it two months, be shall not onely be preferred from breeding of the fione in the Blather : but also it will burft and drive footh the fione by bothere already. This is proued, and a fecret, and is to be kept well in minde. Emperica Benedicti Victorij Fauentini.

If Lauender be well fod in water, and then Arayned, and halfe a pinte thereof drumke dayly first and last, for the space of a fort, night, it will beale them that have the Palley. This was found in an old written boke. 70

An excellent and spiedy remedy for many diseases, and chiefly for the fromack. Dire two sponfuls of Gallet oyle with two sponfuls of pure Aqua virz, and drinks all the same in the morning at one time: doe so free or seven mornings together. It is a notable and often proved remedy.

For the Strangury a frange medicine. Take a pinte of good Aqua Composita, and put a good handfull of Juy leaues therein, and kiepe the bezell well ftopt, and the Juy leanes will confume therein, bie to drinke of the same thrie or source sponfuls at one time, morning and evening, first and last, five or fire dayes toges thereand you thall se a marneilous help thereof.

This following is a proued medicine for the ache in the buckle bone, called the Sciatica. Take a point of god blacke Sope, one pinte of god Aqua vitz, halfe a pinte of Sallet Dyle, and a quartter of a pinte of the inyce of Rew, fæthe them and fur them all together ouer an easie fire, butill it be fomething thicke, and that it may be made in a plaifter : then spead some thereof boon a piece of Leather, and apply it to the ach or pained place, and let it lye thereon buremouse this dayes and their nights, and if the paine be not then gone, then apply such another platter therto, and remove it not of so long, and it wil help it certainly. This was fold by one that/knew it often proned.

The powder of white hard Sugar, put into a blodhotten eye, of that is something dim of fight, it helpes the same, and mends the fight very well. Especially if you put afterward a little Rosewater into the eye. This I have proved aftertimes to be true. Wea, and I think if it were bled, it would confume the web of the eye, at length. 74

And as he doth preferve them from harme, euen fo be appoints them their times to walke in, and the beginning of their cournies: Affared I am, and fully fatiffied, that he by his diuine prouidence, makes them anoyd that houre, and other easy times: and the wick. ed and bigobly have havned of that time, to their defiruation. Therefoze for my part, 3 attribute nothing to the time, but all honour to God, that made the time ; whole glozy and power is to be ertold, that forethewes such things to man, by such hours or times. 75

Blacke Shæpes woll, mirt and chafed by the fire, with fresh butter, and the deafe eare flopt therewith at night, and thus bles nine of ten nights together, it helpeth deafenesse perfectly, and spædily. A proued thing.

Dere followeth a notable and ercellent Aqua vita. Take Gas lengale, Cucubarum, Ginger, Putmegges, Cloues, Sinamon, of suery one an ounce, freth Sage, foure ounces, water that is diffilled fire times out of pure and god wine, ten ounces : put them all together, and let them remaine fo in a close cleane bekell their baies : then diffill the fame, and kiepe that that is diffiled in a cleane and close befiell. Whofeeuer dainkes a Aut-theil full of this water every day, it wil preferue their bodies marueilcusfy, and kiep them from many difeases, and bring them to old age. It is faid that M. Gallus, Physicion to Charles the Emperour, bled this water, and times a hundred and foure and twenty yeres. Georg. A lapide deuifed this water.

If you defire to have sweet water forthwith, or by and by, put two or three droppes of Dyle of Spike, in a good deale of pure water, and chafe it together in a Glasse with a narrows mouth. Euonimus.

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374

An ercellent oyle for cold aches. Take the wood of Juy dryed, sut the wood in little pieces, and of the berries, and gum of Juy, of each a like weight : let them be put in an earthen beffell, bored thorow in the bottome in two or three places : and then let an or ther pot be fet boder it in the earth, and ioyne the bottome of the byper pot botto the mouth of the nether with clay or patte, and the byper pot must frand wholy about the ground: then make a fire on cuery fide, and the Dyle will visitil blacke into the nether beffell. This oyle before all oyles ceafeth the griefs of the ioynts of a celd caufe. This is promed to be a notable oyle in this cafe. Rogerius fæmes to be the Author hercef, as appeares in Euconimus.

If you put out the white of an Hens Egge, and fill by the fame egge with the inice of flowerdelace, and mix the yolke and it well together, then warming it a little in the hot afhes, and fo give it in the magning to them that have the Dropfie, it will anoide Dimeward the Dropfie water above measure. This is proved to be true. Which like onto this, Benedictus Victorius Fanentians writes this for the fame caufe; but he appoints the ingreto be giuen with Mellirate. 80

A proper practice to make a Capon to bring by young Chickens. Take a Capon and pull his belly bare of feathers, and after rub the naked place with Pettles, then fetting young Chickens woder him, he will manueloufly cherify them then, and bring them kindly vp. And the rather if you vie him thus for a time : for by that meanes he is mouse the more willingly to cherify, bring vp, and feede, yea, and to love them, as the Hen would doe naturally. And the reason thereof is, for that by pricking of the Pettles, he is the rather deficous to couch on the lost downe and feathers of the young Chickens, fitting where him. This I had out of the Paturall and Artificiall conclutions of the Schollers of Padua. Translated into English by Thomas Hill.

Due Aefchilus was fozetold by an Altronomer, that he thould be killed by fome ruine, oz fomething that thould fall byon him byon a certaine day oz time : who (to prevent the fame,) did walke abzoad a certaine space about the warned time, and would by

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by nomeanes come into any house, thinking thereby to aucyde the banger, buleffe the heavens thould chance to fall : but mark hem hard it is to auoide fate og Gods Determined appointment. Abeut the faid time fozetold by the Aftronomer, an Caale did fie over his head, from whom a frone did fall boon Aefchilus head, and killed him. Whereby we may not onely for that mans wifedome and policie is not able to frustrate Gods prouidence : but also that there is a maruelous certainty in the Adrological forethew. ing of events, especially by Directions: which Cyprianus Leouitius fæmes to affirme by this and other notable eramples. And fure I ant by many pawfes and trials, that the enents will affuredly happen at the time promifed by directions : that when the Signifier comes to the very place and minute of the Promiflor, accounts ing for every begræ betwæne them one pære, and every minute aboue fire daves, if the Signifier be to be directed by the direct Als centions : but if the Signifier be to be directed by the oblique Af. centions, (ozelle Intermixtim) which is not bery eatily og fæne Done, then they fignifie fometimes moze, fometimes leffe, accorde ing to their fwift or flow alcending, which directions to be infal, lible, the learned and expert hærin cannot chule but affirme. Hoz that they are found as perfect by profe, and as true by triall, as the break of the day douth allure bs of the riling of the Sunne. 82

In Lambergea towne of Schelessa, as Iohannes Langius writes, a certaine Aloman great with childe oid follow a Priest that had newly washed or bathed his sete : who being taken with such a longing or last with the sudden sight of his bare sete, that the privily behind his backe, did hold his legge with her hands, and out of the same pluckt a piece of stelly with her texth: Pothing res garding the cry of the pare Priest, which cryed out both of God and Man. 83

If the fote o2 legges of an Dre, Coive o2 Ho2's be swolne by chance, marke the ground where the same swolne leg o2 fote owth stand, and take o2 graus by with a knife o2 dagger, a turse o2 piece of earth in the same place where the same some did stand, and hang the same Aurse o2 piece of earth vpon the bough of a white tho2ne, o2 some other tree, (if it be faire o2 d22 weather,) if not, then hang it in some Chimney where size is made, and af-

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ter as the turfe of earth owth dry, fo will the swelling cease and the paine go away. This I have preued to be true divers times. Ind it is practiced of many, especially, for Dren of Usine. But the subdaines welling and griefe of my Porse legge hath biene helpt therewith, within two of three dayes, and by none other meanes. Tatho list to prove it, shall finde it true : although it be farre bulthely. 84

The water wherein Lauender is lod, both quite put away any spot of fraining in any cloth, Cap of Hat, if the ft ained place of spotted be washed of rubbed therewith. It is very true, prove it who lift. 85

To make any fewle, of what condition the fame be, to have the feathers all white. Take the Egges of what Bird of Fowle you will, role them in the inice of the hearbe called Poule=eare, of in the inice of Poullæke, of otherwise in oyle (after the minde of Cardanus,) and after put the Egges agains in the next : for after the hatching, the feathers will growe white. This is taken out of the Paturall & Artificiall conclusions of the Schollers of Padua, translated into English by Thomas Hill.

If the figur of a Lyon be graued in a thin plate of Gold, when the Summe is in Leone, (that is the figue called the Lyon:) so that the Mome behold not then the firt house, not the Lood of the Alcendent behold Soturne of Mars, and the Mome then separate of rather frie from them, it doth put away the intolerable paines and togments of the backe : if it hang at the regnes of the backe, of touch the same. But if the fromack be full of meate of fleame, it wil thein the leffe effed. Wil hosener thall prove it, thall finde it a worthy thing. I have proved it above a hundreth times.

This also Mizaldus both affirme.

The Intell of Bitumen taw, or the Imoak thereof burning, tes teined by the Pole of luch as are grienoully tormented with the paines of the mother, is a prefent helpe or remedy. It is most certainly proued. Wherefore many Unomen which are griened with that difeale, doe hang it about their necks in woll, that they may drive away their fit by the oft Imelling thereof. Mizaldus writes this. And the learned Doctor Monardus affirmes the like thereof. The

The Sparrowe Dawke is a fierce enemy to all Digicus, Lut they are befended of the Caffrell, whole fight and voyce the Spare hawk both feare, which the Pigions of Doues know well inough: for where the Caffrell is, from thence will not the Digiens go (if the Sparhawk be nigh) through the great truft the hath in the Cas Arell her defender. lohannes Baptifta Porta hath waitten this.

The leaves of a Willow tre, as also the barke thereof fod in Wine, both helpe them that have the gowt, if they be fomented p2 batheo therewith.

Stofferus an ercellent Affronomer, knowing by his Datinity, that he thould be in danger to be burt about a certaine day of time, kept himselfe then within his owne house, affured that it was frong inough. The fame day or very nye buto it that the event thould hap, certaine of his learned friends & he, as they were reales ning together, did bary in some certaine opinion, about the tryall whereof as it hould ferme, he reached to take downe 1Book a off his, thelfe (being placed there among diners other,) when through the lacke of a naile, the whole classe or thelfe where the Bothe was, fell bpon his head, and wounded his head very loze. Which booth not only them the worthines & ercellency of Aftrologie, especially in a learned and skilfall perfon therein: but also out felly in flying from fate, for that our Wilfbome deth leave bs into it, when most of all we meane for to thun it. Therefore perfect prayer paffeth policy, in preuenting of perils.

Theie halfpeny weight of the powder of an Adamant ftone, detuik with the impre of Fennell, drawes the water from them that have the Dropfie. And the fame frone put to the bead, takes alway quite all the paynes thereof. Iacobus Hollerius an excellent Ibyficient affirmesit.

It is a manifest thing and proued by dayly experience, that the bodies of them that be murthied, when they be found, if any of their kinres bie then prefent, or the party or parties that killed or murthered them, or was the cause thereof, immediatly blood will burft fougth fundenly, either of the wound, og noie, og out 20 A 22

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silome other part of their body. I would alleage here a great fort of eramples for the verifying thereof, but I omit them: for it is a thing fount true by dayly experience, befides that Lucretius, Philip Melancton, Iohannes, Langin's, and Leumius Lemnius write thereof. 8

Pietes of Amber bæing put og tyed to the hinder part of the head, doe helpe the running og watrinelle of the eyes, with a marueilous fuccelle: and hanged about the necke, doth hinder diffillations, that they goe not downe by the throate, Mizaldus. Belides that, it is proued to be true.

A certaine Wioman went with a dead Childe in her wombe aboue foure geres, which by the countagle of learned Phylicions and erpert Surgions, was dealwne from her piecemeale, and the mother did not onely line, but allo conceaued another Childe, as Mathy Cornace a noble & learned Phylicion hath affirmed, who was prefent when the faid Woman was cut for the getting out of the faid dead Childe.Mizaldus reportes this.

If Celes he suffocated in Wine, wholoeuer that drinke of that wine, though they have beene very much given to wine before, and could scantly abiliaine from the same, they will loath wine, and not be defirous to drinke Wine after. The greene frogges which ble or leape about Springs, if they be suffocated in wine, worke the like effect. Mizaldus.

If Mus aranëus called a Shrew, I take it to be the blind moule, both chance to goe ouer any part of any bealt, that part of the bealt will after be lame. This I know to be true.

Taboloeuer would have a very white and velicate Skinne, let them boyle of heate Lytarge of Silver in Aineger diffilled : and wath therewith their Skin which they defire to have fagge, trim and white. This I tok out of Mizaldus.

Mizal.

16 The whiteff Frankincense made in very fim powder, and drunke with Mine, (if if be in cold weather or in winter.) or in water wherein Reylons are sodde, if it be hotte weather, (or in Summer,) in the encreasing of the Mone, at the rising of the Summe, at none, and at the setting of the Summe, doth marues lously helpe and encrease the memory, and is very profitable for the braine and fromack. But Benedictus Victorius Fauentinus in his practices affirmes for trueth, and faith, it is certainely proued, that fine ounces of the brine of a Boy not polluted, and of a languine complexion, mixt with halfe an ounce of good white Sugar, being drunke enery morning early falting, for the space of ten bayes, both helpe certainely the Jaundile, and also much drunke at once, a moneth together in such order, both helpe the A.a.s.

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Stæpe a thræd in oyle of Brinkone mirt together, and coms pake a glake with that thræde in that place where you would have it broken even, or parted, and after kindle the same thræde with fire, and do thus so often untill the place of the glake be hot, and after compake the same with a thræd wet in cold water cand it will part so cleane as mover, as though it had bæn cut with a tharps-pointed Diamond. 20

If they that be swolne and are full of Doopsie, do lye their dayes and nights in their bods well coursed round about in soden Bars ly, it helpes and cures them perfectly. This was proused by them that came bery much swolne from Ginny. And one of them that was helpt therewith, reuealed it buto merwhich I am content to publish, to the common commodity of many.

The earnest fearchers of naturall things, fay and fet forth, that certaine wearns are beed in the bowels of guts of the Bart, and they are deficeyed by the eating of ferpents, which the Bart both allure with the breath of his nole to come out of their hole og denne: and left the poylon of them Gould hurt him, te goes as pace to feme fayze Spring of water, and whiles all his whole body is therein buto the lippes, little brops og teares biftill out of his eyes, which at length encreaseth to a thing, as bigge as a Walnut, and are in manner of a ftone, and when he perceines he hath thereby auoyded all the poylon, and being come forth of the water, with the rubbing of bis eyes at a tree, the fame lump og Stone (being a hinderance to his fight,) he gets away. Wi hich matter og Stone is a thing molt effeduall againft any benome or poylon. Many Phylicions of great authority and antiquity, are witheffes hereof. Iulius Scaliger, and Amatus Lucitanus Do boaft that they faw fuch a thing, and they affirme that it may be ginen effectually with a little wine to them that are infected with the plague : for by the frength and helpe thereof, fo much fiveate will come fough of the body, that you would thinks the whole bos by will turne of confume into mouture, with which once gis uing, all the poylon or benome is thruft out of the body. The Arabian Phylicions call the Stone, Bofoard : And thereof Alexipharmaca, a remedy againft benomes, Bezoardica. This Anthonius

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thonis. Mizaldus maiteth. Athele Befaar ftones, being of a moft excellent, notable and precious bertue, are now gotten in Peru, in the Welt Indians, and found about ten væres palt, in certaine kinde of Beatts that goe in the Bountaines of that Country, which are much like to thepe of kids that are in the Portingal Indians, by a worthy Spanich Gentleman, called Peter de Ofima, who killed fome of those Beatts purpolely, foz the faid Befaar fones, which he thought to finde in them : but al. though he looked and learched therefore in the belly, and in other places of one of the greatest and eldest of them: yet he could finde none of them, neither would the Indians tell him in what place of the Beaff they were, faying they knew no ftones, being loth he fould knows that ferret. What at the last an Indian Boy, of twelve pares of age, fold him where to finde them. Wherefore the other Indians would have killed the Boy, because the Indians dos much efficient thois Stones, for they doe offer them buto their gods, or before their Idols, as one of the molt precious things they have. So that by the faid boyes revealing, the fays Gentleman found the Stones in a certaine liftle purfe that the main of the beatt hath, wherein the hearbs doe lye when he shelw . eth the cub. The faid Bentleman giues a maruelous commens dation of them in a Letter, which he wrote to Doctor Monardus an ercellent learned Phylicion of Siuill in Spayne : faying, that they are maruelous good against all venom, and against all forts of poylon, as well in meates as other wife, and to euils of the heart, and to expell and kill wormes, and that they have heas led fuch difeafes with this frome, that it is bonderfull to be fiene, both of Ladies, Centlemen, and many others; naming many of their names in that Letter : faying further, that as a newe thing all such take it in powder, as have difeases which cannot be head led by medicine, and many do beale: and fo with many other things he prailed God, for the great benefits received by the vertues of this Befaar Stone. And the faid Docts: Monardus having receiues of the faid ftones from the fayo Gentleman, both mars ueiloufly praise and ertoll the faid flones in a worthy worke or boke made by him of certain Tres, Dyles, Plants, and Stones of wonderfull great and marueilous effects, whole very words thereof, (as much as thall firme næofull therefoze) I here ooe htter.

btter. If I would (faith he)put here the great effects, and the bil. eales which the Stones of Peru have healed, that they which dee come from thence boe tell me, and that Gentlemen bce waite me, it would make a great 130ke. I will put that onely which I have erperimented, and the effects that I have bnderficed that they bee, and these that have paft by my hands, inhereby all credit may be giuen buto it, and as a thing certaine : firing that there is erperience of it, with all affurance and truff, it may bie bleb. Dur Des cibentall Befaar Stones have great vertues, principally they boe remedy many perfons which be ficke of the heart, for the which I have given great quantity of them that have beine brought me, and they have made maruelous effects: fo much, that to many per. fons which Dio fwound, by taking it away from them, they were delinered from death. It mult be given when they did fwound, and before it come, taking it in the morning falling with Rofewater, if the party have great heate, if not, then with the water of flows ers of Dzenges, the quantity of foure graines, euery time made in poluder. In all kinde of benoms it is the most principal remedy that we know now, and that which hath done beft effect, in many that have beene poyloned, which have taken it, as well by benome taken at the mouth, as by biting of venemous woames, which are full of poylon. It both truly a marueilous audmanifeit worke onto them that have drunke water fanding in a flinking Lake, being infected with Bealts of bermine which are full of poylon, and being fwolne immediatly after they had drunke it, by taking of this Stone their of foure times, they were remedied, as I have fæne them after, ac.

In Petrilent Keuers I have given it many times, and lurely it doth ertinguilh and kill the malice of them, which is the principall thing that the Phylician thould procure in the like difeales. And although he doth take alway the caule, and both withdrawe the putrifaction, yet if he doe not ertinguilh and take away the malice, the cure is neuer at an end. Kor that is it which killeth, and doth the principall hurt. And where there are certaine spots in the body like buto flea-bitings, which doe appeare in the like Keuers, the Befaar Stone of our Indians doth make marueilous effects. Df these which they have brought me, I have spent the most part, in giving them for the like diseafes, and furely

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it hath remedied many with maruelous fuccede, and in that h hich fome of them baue bene fpent by me, hath bane in foundings. and furely I have fane in these Stones the effects lo great, that if fæmeth a thing of wonder. And especially, I have sæne these caules more remedied in women, then in men : it is a matuelous thing to be taken, and it hath bone manifelt effeds : where there is melancholy humoz, it both repaire him much. And it beth in him and in all things which doe refult of him a great worke, be it bninerfall og particular, in the head, og that as they call Mirarchia, and allo in them that have Lepzone: of the Arabienffor, Elephanciacis, of the Brækes. It both profit much in Grabbes in itchings, in Scuruinelle, and in all parts of the body that is infeded, it maketh a very good worke, and both remedy the emis manifeftly. for that the Stene bath propertie to heale them. I have given it in quartane Agues, and although it taketh not as way the quartane, it taketh away the accidents of it, the faintnes and faonede, and the griefe of the heart : which in thefe feuers are common. Surely they boe faile with the ble of it notable pros fit, in all large and importunate difeater, sc. It is god to call into Burges, some graphes of it, that if the purge doe carry beno, mous medicines, if may redifie and amend them : And if not, it sineth force and arength to the heart, and they worke the better. In the Drientall Indians, they have a cultome to purge them: felnes two times every pare, and especially, the poble people of effimation. And after they have purged them clues, they take every morning falling, foure graphes of the Belaar Stone with Relewater, or with water made for the purpole, and they fay that this both conferme the youth, and both Grengthen the members, and both preferne them from difeates. And it is a neod ble, for it cannot but doe them much good. I have given it to many people, and efpecially to Childzen and boyes, that are togmented with WIwames : and I have feene fuch works as are not to be below, ued if they were not fane. This and more hath Dodor Monardus waitten to his layo boke of this Stone, and other worthy and wonderfull things, which Bake is diligently and truely translated into our English tengue, by one John Frampton Merchant : Walhich Boke is tituled and called, Joyfuli nelves out of the new found Wlozlo; who deferue th great thankes, and 2Bh continual

This onle hath all the vertues of true Balm, fog it burneth in the water, and curbeth Bilke by and by : fog if one bgop of it warm, be put into a pinte of ABills, it will forthwith become curbed The first liquour is called The water of Baline, the ferond, Dyle of Malme, the third, Balme artificial. The first is profitable against the running of the cares, if two broppes morning and cuening be put into them : drout into the eyes, it amendeth the blearednes, and confumeth the teares : it both maruelloully refframe fuper. fluous humors in any part of the body : it taketh away the tothe ache, if they be want therewith, and killeth the wormes, if there be any in them. The third liquoz will fuffer no venom, it is an offer enemy and defination to Spiders & Serpents: two of their ozops thereof land boon any benomous biting, both make it whole ftraight. If thou drain a circle with this liquor, and thut a beno, mous Beak therein, it will bye there, rather then get out of it: to be thoat, it both all the fame things that Ereacle both, but all things more effectually : being powerd or put upon any Impos. ftume, within nine dayes healeth them, and likewife a fiftula, be it neuer fo cuill, and alfo Noli me tangere. All difeafes byed of fleame, and of cold humors, it healeth, if a Linnen cloth dipped in it, be laide bpon the place, where the griefe is. It putteth away btterly the Palley, all trembling of members: It firengtheneth maruciously the Sincives, it is hotter then the first of the fecond. If a man put a drep of it in his hand, it pearceth traight without griefe. To conclude, it both many other things, and all difeafes ctien of a coid caufe it healeth, if they ple it right. Lullius in his boke of waters. But this is taken out of Euonymus.

45 If you take the Gall of an Dre, mans Usine, Meringce, and the ingce of Pettles, of each a like quantity, and mire them very diligently

biligently tegether, and after quench Stiele rid hot therein, four or five times together : the same Stiele will after become as fost as passe. This is affirmed by the Schollers of Padua in their naturall and Artificiall Conclusions, sc.

47 Dodoz Monardus, in his boke befoze mentioned, among other marneileus matters hath declared at large of two wonderfull and ftrange Stones, in theie words following : They boe bring (faith be) from the new Spaine, two Stones of great vertue, the one is called The Stone of the blad, and the other is, a Stone fes the difease of the Stone in the kidnetes and repnes. The blood Sotone is a kince of Jalper of diuces colours, fomeinhat darke, full of spinkles like to blood, being of colour tcd, of the which Stones the Indians dee make certarne Barts, both great and imail. The ble thereof both here and there, is for all finre of blod, of what parts focuer it be, of the nor, or of the Bentrucs, or of the Wyles, and of wounds, or of that which is call out of the mouth. The frone muft be wet in cold water, and the ficke man must take it in his right hand, and from time to time we fit in cold water. In this fost the Indians doe vie them. And as touching the Indians, they have it for certaine, that four ching the same Stone in some part where the blood tunneth, that it doth refiraine, and in this they have areat truff, for that the effed hath bene fene. It both profit allo, haung it holden, haus CC2 gen

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ged og teed in the fame part inhere the blod runneth, fo that it touch on the fleth. Df this Stone we have fæne great effects in franching of blod. And fome that doe fuffer the Demeroidall flure, have remedied themfelnes with making of Rings of this is tone, and wearing them continually on their Hingers, and alfo in Bentkruall flure of Women.

The other Stone, which is for the difease of the Stone in the hidneyes or reques, the finele of them are like buto Plasma of Emeralds, which is likened to graine, with a milkich colour; the greatelt is the belt : they bring them made in diners formes and falhions : for fo the Indians had them in old time, fome like to Hilles, other like to heads of Birds, other like to bills of Popagies, other like to heads of Birds, other like to bills of Popagies, other like to round Beadeffones : but all pierces thorow, for that the Indians did ble to weare them hanging, for the effect of the griefe of the fione or Comack: for in these two fickness it both macuelous effects.

The chiefe pertue that it hath, is in the paine of the flone in the hidneyes, and in cryelling of fand and flone. Infomuch that a Gentleman which had one of them here, the beft of them that 3 have feene, having put it to his arme, it both make him to erpell and caft out to much land, that many times he both take it away: for he thinketh that it both hurt him for to put out fo much : and in taking it away, he cealeth to caft any from him. Withen he fees leth the paine of the Rone, then putting it to againe, it both take away the paine incontinent, with expelling of much Sand and fmall Stones. I have ferne it carried to perfons, that have beene gricued with great griefe and paine of the layd bileale, and put. ting it to them, they doe forthwith expell the fand and the little fones, and remaine cleare thereof. The Stone hath a property hidden, by the which meanes he doth great effects, to preferre that they fall not into the paine of the faid difeales. And after it is come, it taketh it away, oz biminicheth it. It both make the fand to be erpelled with great abundance, and likewile Stones. It taketh. away the heate from the regnes of the back: it profiteth in griefes of the fomack put to it, and aboue all, it prefermeth from the faid griefe. Which is of a finall price, but yet bery precious: for in my subgement, wholes ever both buy it, both not pay therefore the bundreth part that it is woath.

The making of a Stone, which moiffed with spettle, wil burne. Take of quicke Lyme, pure Salniter, Tutie Alerandzine, not preparate, Calamita, of each one part, quicke Brimftone, and Camphire, of either two parts : let them all be made in very fine powder and searced, then type the same powder hard in a liunen cloth, then put it into a Crucible, and couer the same with another Crucible, and wrap it fail with wyers, and close it well with Lute of wisedome, that nothing may respire out : then let it be dryed at the Sunne: which cone, caff the same Crucibles into the fire of a blicke-faill until the matter be well burned, which faken out, you thall finde a perfect matter of the colour of a tyle: which if it be wet or moiffened with a drop of water, or with spettle, putting Brimftone to it, then it will burne: which with blowing, or a blass, is putout, lacobus Weckerus.

And that figne and begre wherein the some is at the time of the conception, the fame figne and begree, og the oppolite to the fame, both alcend at the very time of the birth, Hermes & Prolomeus: ILherefoze ac. cording to this rule of the ancient and famous Authors: (Waberes to Guido Bonatus, lohannes Ganiuetus, Sconerus and Tayfnierus, notable and learned Aftronomers, with divers other, boc confent and agree.) Diuers Wiomen haue biuers times betweene the cons ception and birth of their Childzen: for the place of the Moneat the time of the conception, and her bucertaine courle after, both plainely manifeft that fome women goe with Childe not aboue 37. wakes, fome others 28. wakes, and buder : fome 39. wakes. and iomething leffe : fome againe goe forty weekes, and a fein baies leffe, and fometimes certaine baies more:yea, and fomes times forty and one weeke, and one day, which is the longeft time. as the learned in the fame fcience can perfectly finde out. There. fose they are much beceined, that thinke every Waloman goes but ink forty wekes with Childe: which fond falle opinion hath made many an honeft woman faily fulpeded, woongfully flans bered, and without iuft canfe from their Bulbands feparaton. Therefoze it were good and very mate for every one, not to aiue to much credit to this fond reckoning of iuft forty weekes : which is more common then true. With fore Defcribed ercellent rule. (according to the minde of the worthy and learned Mizaldus,)is of no imall weight, for the triall of the fidelitie and honefty of wos men to their Dulbands, and to finde out the very right time of the Patinity of birth, fo that the very day and houre of the conception be certaine.

Here followeth the veleciption of a notable Dyle of Balme. Take of Aurpentine, one pound, and put it into a body of Glaffe, and warme it at a loft easie fire, withil it war liquid, and put therein by little and little, with miring of flurting it, the powder of Frankincense five drammes, of Lignum Aloes, Das flieke, Clones, Galingal, Sinamon, Bace, Duibibs, of each one dam, all well powdeed together, guin of a frigge tree fir drams likewise made in powder, and all mired together, and mire them all with the faid Turpentine made liquid, as is before says, and when they be well incorporated together, set on the head of the Limbecke, and lute all the iognts of the same well, and set it in allyes, and put where it an easie fire. And when it be gins to diffil, all we have it an easie fire. And when it be gins to diffil,

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let it dray away a little, for the first drops are little worth, then put the receiver to the usie of the Limbecke, and close and inte them well together that no avee goe forth : for then the bertue of it would goe away. Then know that at the first will come forth a white and cleare water, which keepe by it felfe. Then will come forth the fecond water, which is better, of a heavenly and appress lour, which keepe by it felfe. Then receine the third, which is the belt, which will be yellow and thicke as Hunny : keepe this allo by it felfe. The first of thefe is called The water of Balme : the fecend, The opic of Baime: the third is called, Baime. Dis paofe to all examinations is, that you take one brop of the fame, and let it be put in a beffell full of water, as you doe of naturall Balme, for the faide drop will goe to the bottome of the water, and it will fand there whole, as though it were pure Balme. This is mare uailous, and is of great bertues, and it is called of fome, Dother of 15alme.

The first vertue thereof is, that it burnes: the fecond is, that if you wash your face and note therewith, and that thrice in a day, it cures and helps the Relume. It cleareth the light, and it comforteth the Sinnewes : and if you wath there with the hinder part of the head, then it coniforts the memory, and all the bertues of the minde. This alls both purifie both fifth and fleth, and if they be putrified og cogrupt : inhatfoeuer therefoge is cogrupt og putrified, it takes and commes it alway, and it kepes that that is and and found, to that you may eate them as though they were new and freth. It blings againe an appetite, it comforteth the fomacke, and if you take thereof morning and evening, it con. fumes the ficame in the fomacke. It helpes or cures a flinking breath, as well comming of the ftomack, as of the braine : if you take foure og fine brops thereof once a bay in a little Wine. fo rold venemous thing may come nare it, as Frogs, Woades, Ser. pents and Despions. If a cloth be dipt in the fame, and compate a toade or Servent, compatted therewith, they will bie, although they touch it not, and fo it both in all kinde of cold benoms : as the biting of a Woade, 02 of a Servent. for it heales, if you wath oftentimes there with the griened place. And if you feeth an Egge in it, it will foner be fod therein, then in any boyling water. It brales and dayes by any kinde of Scabos tetter quickly, if you inaffa

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wath it therewith thrice in a day : and if you put three or feure proppes of this into the eace, and fuffer the fame there as long as you can, it helpes and cures all nople & loundings of the cares. If you mire here with an equal postion of the inyce of German. der, and put this of foure blops thereof in the care foure times in the day, then it helps and cures all de afnes, of what caule for ever it comes : watering cyes, & bleared eyes it both cure, claris fie, refirmine and comfost, if you walk them there with twice b2 All Imposumes, Wicers, and all other superfluities it thance. doth reftraine, cure, and redifie. And it is a thing more reperande five and confumptive again & cold humors, then the Saphire or Planten. All paines of the teth, or running humors, it coff help, refiraine, fortifie : and it makes the texth white, if therewith you doe wally the routes of the teeth. All wounds of the head, though they be deepe, are cured with this same Dyle, if therewith you walk it twice of theice a day: yea, though the braine-pan be broken, fo that Pia mater be not hurt. It heales and cures all fis fulaes, Cankers, Noli me tangere, the hings Cuill, and cuery other eating fore, if you walk the fame there with twice or thrice It heales and cures all kinde of Gowtes, if you walh oz a bay. anoynt them therewith, to that they come of a cold caule : and laying allo a limnen cloth dipt therein byon the gricued place. It heweth allo all Arokes with Asues of other builing, either by falles of otherwile, if you anount the buniled of ariened place therewith, and heales them perfectly and well. It helpes the Ce meroos and fundament that goes forth, and makes it farty in his place, if you anoynt the fame there with. It helpes the Palo he; and all weakenede of the members, it both Arengiben, if you anoynt the fame therewith. Unow that it is most hot, and is of fuch penetration and heate, that if you put one drop thereof in your hand, by and by it penetrates the hand without any hurt. And you thall not fiele any fwelling of the fate 02 of the legges, or any raines of the toynts, if you walk or aneynt the lame theres with, and it will helpe it, if you dip a lunnen cloth therein, and plaifter it thereto. And briefelp, if vou will bie it, it profits, helps, and cures all cold griefes, and all difcales comming of a cold caule, of fleame, og of putrified og rogrupt blod. It hath yet mas ny other vertues here left out, g it is called, The mother of balme, becau's EDD 2

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becaule it is better then Balme in many of his effects. And if you will proue that it be a true Balme, take a Chicken (the feathers pluckt off, and guts taken away,) and lee that it be well wathf and made as cleane as can be, s dry the fame at a foft fire, so long as you may well hold it in your hand, then anoint the fame Chicken well within and without, with the fayd Balme, twice or thrice: then afterwards lay the fayd Chicken against the Somme, for the space of two houres, suffring it a little to dry at the Somme, and afterwards lay by the faid Chicken where you will: for it will never putrifie nor receive any corruption, so long as the world both indure. And know further, that this Dyle hath eightene other bertues, which are written: but not here. This notable Dyle of Balme, I copied out of a bery old written Boke, which came out of the Abbey of Cliam in Lincolnshire: And now by me conuerted out of Latine into English, to the yrofit of many, I hope.

A fly drowned in water, Wine, Ale or Bere, and to throughby dead, being layd in warme Athes : (but they must not be burning or very hot,) the fame fly wil recover and live again. This is very true. 65

They do ble of these little balles, which they do make of this Tabacco, they take the leaues of it, and do chewe it, and as they goe chewing of them, they mingle with them certaine powder made of the thelles of Cockles burned, and they mingle it in their mouth all together, butill they make it like to Bosice, of the which they make certaine little balles, little greater then Pealon : and they put them to dry in the theasize, and after they kert

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kæpe them and ble them, for the auoyding of hunger and thirlt in their tranaile, without any meate and drinke, for the space of their or source dayes. This Bortor Monardus hath written, with many other wonders and notable vertues thereof, in his Borke before mentioned, intituled, Joyfull newes out of the new found World. This Tabacco is a marueilous and wonderfull hearbe, growing in the welt Indians, called, The new Spaine: and through the bringing of the Sædes thereof from thence, it growes now both in Spaine and France.

And if the leafe be fpotted all ouer, then it fignifies, that you or the party thall ove that yere following. Dou may prove this for many, or few, at one time, by putting in the water, for cues ry one a leafe of græne Jur, (fo that every leafe be bateb og marked to whom it both belong.) This was credibly told me to be very certaine, who affirmed to mae faithfully, that it was divers times proued for a very trueth.
