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

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



His is not the first time it hath beene my fortune to encounter with a Rebell; And therefore, you must not expect I should be astonished at your language, (like some of your Citizens, by dreaming of Master Pyms

Ghost:) Nor yet any whit satisfied, where I find neither Conscience, Loyalty, nor Reason. The World knowes how long it hath beene deluded with your Almanacks and Prognostications, and how averse your nature hathever beene to approve, or admit of any thing which transcends the Sphære of your Capacitie; or does not imitate your wonted Method of Bolting out Treason, B 2

and stuffing your Perfidious Pamphlets with Ambiguous. Phrases, thereby to beget new (or to increase the old) Feares and Jealousies amongst the People: (The onely

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prop now left to support your fading Faction.)

And for this cause (Mr. Booker) you have undertaken to give a Caveat to all the People of the Kingdome, &c. You have done very wifely in directing it to the People: none but your seduced Many-headed-Monster-Multitude will credit you: But you have done more like your felf, in that you intreat them to believe jon; For I am sure if they were not already furnished with an Implicite Faith; you could never expect to do any good upon them; there being neither Argument, nor Reason, throughout all your rayling Pamphlet, either to satisfie their understandings, or to make you esteemed any whit the more Attive Rebell.

But you mistake grossy, if you thinke to prevaile at Oxford by your Intreaties: they looke for Reasons, not Rayling, there. Yet it is no marvell you should (at last). be driven to Intreaties, fince your Commands and Threats

have (hitherto) thriven fo badly.

That Chronologie of mine (which you terme Infamous, is not asham'd at all of its Descent, nor fearefull that you (Mr. Booker) should Calculate its Nativitie, and wherefoever I had my Collections, I shall need no other testimonie of the verity thereof, then the miserable complaints. and outcries of fo many Fatherlesse, & Widowes, whose Parents and Husbands were engaged, and lost their lives in this Rebellion.

Yet you doe well not to rehearse any thing which may seeme to resect upon, or displease the Scots. Ibeleeve you will stand more and more in need of their help, and they as much of your Money. You had best provide it for them quickly. Otherwise; No Penny no Pater noster.

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But to come somewhat closer to you yet: Be pleased (Learned M. Booker) to tell me upon what grounds you deduced the signification both of that which you tearme the Putting in Execution of the illegall Commission of Array: And also the setling of the Militia of the Kingdome by those (you call) the Thrice honoured, and (indeed) never to be forgotten Parliament, from the Coniunction of Mars and Jupiter

the 15 day of May, 1643?

They are two effects of a contrary nature: This (you'l fay) tending to the good and benefit of the Kingdome, the other to the ruine and destruction thereof. Therefore (Mt. B.) let me demand of you, how one and the same Position, at one and the same time, should produce such two contrary effects? It you erected a Figure to the True Time of the said Coniunction, I cannot see how you could pronounce any such positive sentence, without a great deale of more caution, and circumspection, then I perceive (and am sure) you have taken. Nam difficile admodum erit indicium in coniunctione illa, qua & bona respectu Iovis, & pernitiosa respectu Saturni, vel Martin indicatur. Divers (by you) accounted

Haly Cap 4. Part. 8. saith Quod Iupiter iunctus cum Malevolo, probibet omne malum. whereas Franciscus Iunctinus avoucheth the contrary, saying, that Coniunctio Boni cum Malo, mala est. But on both sides they conclude with this definitive sentence, Hoc tamen pro natura & dispositione Planeta vincentis in Figura judicandum est. Now (Mr Booker) if you would but deale as ingenuously with the people, as your Presended (Perpetuall) Parliament are forced to intend towards their Brethren (the Scots), you must of necessitie grant but one (or rather neither of those (by you) before mentioned effects) to have had any dependency upon this before named Conjunction of Mars and Iupiter; and that according as either of those Planets was then Fortisted, with more Dignities Essentiall and Accidentall, then the other.

But you would be thought famous; and so I think you are already, as any Rebell I know of your stamp. I know it hath been your daily practise, and profession a long time to delude the ignorant with your Fopperies: and I suppose you are become ridiculous enough to all such as have had any dealings with you, or so much as heard of your kna-

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Doe you think any one so void of reason, as to conceive you so much as thought of Hull's being kept against his Majestie, untill you heard Rebellious Hotham had Traiterously there denied his Majesty entrance? I thinke rather you thought of Hell (an habitation fitter for such as you, except you repent the sooner). However if you doe not cut one anothers throats, I hope both they that then withstood his Majesty, and all the Rabble of you, that dare to touch the Lords Annointed, shall ere long receive the fruits of their Labours.

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Whether the Kings Majestie and his Loyall Subjects have been punished for the sinnes of another Nation: (I meane for the Rebellion in Ireland) or whether not rather for the Toleration of such a number of Prophane, Puritane, Putristed Zelots, (by whom the true worship and service of God have been so much neglected and scorned, his Churches prophaned and defaced, and the Ministers of his word and Sacraments so much contemned, vilisted and despised) in this our owne Land: I leave to the judgement of all such Divines who are lovers of Religion, Truth and Loyalty.

To fay that you had noted these words , [Ventorum. murmura generabit aura inquieta, cades queg cruenta, & lites atra hine indepercrebescent; Tagainst the very day and time in your Almanack for the yeare 1642, (upon the Opposition of the Sun and Mars) on which Keynton Battle happened, will appeare falle to fo many, as will but observe it. For, those words are begun and intended against the 21 day: The Opposition of the Sun and Mars fell out the 22 day and the Battle not one of Keynton, and another of Edghill (as you: intimate) to multiply your phantafticall victories, but that between both; where your invincible armie received it's wound which Westminster physick, I hope, shall never cure, the 23. But me thinks, Sir, if you had been so quick fighted (as you would be thought to be) you should as well! have discerned that of Worcester in September before; where: I conceive those words would have stood a great deale. more properly: that being the time the Rebells ftruck the first stroak against his Maiestie.

It is not denied but that we lost some Noble blood at Edg-hill, you were happie that you had so litle, or none, to loose: Or if any, none that durst hazard it. But that his Maiesties Forces should be so soundly beaten there, as you

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tell of, He referre it to any Man but of an indifferent judgment: Nay I durst almost be judged by my Lord Wharton himselfe (and youle say hee's none of the wisest) provided the Saw-pit was not too deep , but that he either faw or heard any thing. If you obtained fuch an Absolute victory, why was your fo Truly valiant General fo tame the next morning to let us draw off fo many of his Ordnance. without the least shew of resistance : Why made he such haft to Warwick Caffles And why (to pursue that to great a Victorie of his) did he not come to relieve that seditious Towne of Banbary, which he intended and had engaged himselfe to performe before the battle, if his Majesty had fate downe before it; But contented himselfe with being foundiy beaten, and afterwardpermitted his Maiesties Forces to enter aswell upon it, as your late Lord Says house, both on one day, without the least proffer of interruption to his Maiesties Army?

If these be signes of Victorie, let the world censure.

I doe not live by Cheating and Lying as You, and your friends about you doe, although you tell me I am turn'd Court Parasite. For your part you have deserved so well at Court, you dare not come there, unlesse it be for a Spre.

But I advise you to take heed you meddle not with that imploiment. If you doe the vigilant Governour of Oxford may happen to make you curse your Ascendant, and to look with such an Aspect, as you never yet observed in all the Figures you ever cast for stolne Goods, &c.

But alas why doe I instance that profession of Yours: For since that unhappie Conjunction I told you of in No. vember 1640. Your holie Sisters have soolishly parted with all their Money and Plate, there being hardly so much as a Silver Bodkin, or Thimble left for a Theese to C 2

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p'ey on, so that your Trade is quite decried; only now & then you get a Crowne, or an Angell by chance, for telling ayoung zealous fifter when the shall marrie, or how many Bastards she shall have: And thus every one of you in his way strive to live, all of you by Robbing, Theeving, Cheating and lying. The Devill'is preparing your Rewardrs. The difference betwixt Oxford and Durham is not onely in Latitude, there is some in Longitude too; which if I should regard no more then you have done heretofore betwixt London and Francofure (for which your Ephemerides you commonly used to goe by was calculated) Ishould hit upon the time and Quantity of Ecolipses and other Calestial Congresses, and Configurations, as you did on that Eclypse before mentioned, which happened in May 1639. LevM. Parkinson witnesse with me, and compare our Reductions & Instrumentall Observations, with your false, and erronious Calculations for that yeare.

Thave been told (M. Booker) that you have been indifferent cunning at it; till you had like to have Arecht a Rope for yourskill want and no wo radials bet soled y But some of the Schollers here in the Universitie wished me to tell you that they long to fee and dispute with you, whether New-castle cole be the Element of Fire or not, which you feeme to imply: But J wish you (for your own credit) to make the following words fenfe, (at least wife

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wery good opinion of your skill since that years you Prognosticated how Salacious and wantonly disposed young momen mere likely to be: In which very years your Sister (to fulfill your Prophese) was happily delivered of two Bastards: I must confesse knew you bitthe the mark so even before, norshipe.

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We are not so stupid, but we know there hath wanted no Conspiracies, nor secret Pradises for many yeares agoe, beforeahis damnable and unparalleld Rebellion brake out. Wour late Lord Say, and divers others (his Confederates) have not been idle these 30 years for bringing of it about. And truly he and his Chaptaine (the Miller) cannot misse of

That Great Consunction at Westminster I feare me would out last the effects of that in February 1642. If they might but fit quietly, and be still a draining the Citie of its Monies and Plate. Oh it rellishes sweetly t But I hope King Charles (by the counfell and advise of the Lords and Commons now affembled at Oxford, will foone prescribe the meanes to interrupt and annihilate there proceedings, and let the world fee the truth of their intentions; for (I am fure) this miserable Land hath tasted too much of the effects of their Wicked, and corrupt Counfells. And I doubt not but to fee some of them, as well as your selfe and your brother Britannicus frand Blind-folded at the Gallomes, without being led thither by an Ignus Fatuus; and there to hang for fomething, I meane for the Crowes and Ravens to prey on and pick out your eyes, as you have done the money out of the purses of so many poore leduced people, that (in their hearts) pray for your Confusion, notwithstan-
