Gent. A Lthough I have not time to give you a Catalogue of all the Famous and admirable Gures performed by me in mine own Country, and other places of this Kingdome, by reafon it would be tedious for your reading, and too large for the Press; yet I am willing to give a touch in fhort of fome Cures performed by me amongst your neighcors, who were left uncured by fome Chirurgeons, counted able men. Nevertheles you may see that Gods bleffing daily attends my endeavours. For when I am at work for the poor, my delight is to perform their cures Charitably, believing that God will crown my endeavours with fuccess. Bleffed be his glorious name for ever,

Gentlemen, we are not unsensible that there are too many Pretenders in our time, who promifing to perform great cures, have taken your mony, and left you worse than they found you. But my way is to perform your cures before you part with your mony. Some few Cures I shall instance in for brevities fake.

I shall not stand on curious delivery, nor on high quaint termes of Art, although I am a great lover thereof : but in a low and plain way, fo that the meanest capacity may understand, what with Gods blefing I can do for them. As followeth.

For all wounds, new or old, make pledget of fine Tow or Lint, the bignefs of the wound, and lay on any common plaister; as Diachilon, or Deminio, and if the wound be deep, you may make Tents of the fame.

Also anointing any greived part, or painful swelling, it giveth speedy ease, and asswageth.

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And for all Sinewes that are contracted, or thrunken. For Cramps and Convultions, anointing the Spundles of the back. Truly it would require a wife Pen, and a large Volume to fet do vn all it's healing Virtues, and curious Operations.

# Of Physick, Chirurgery, and Anatomy.

Also I am bold to give you a touch of Phylick and Chyrurgery: For I am much streigthned for want of time.

The moving principle in a living man, is the vital foul, which is nothing elfe but the spirit of life, thick and strong, mightily filling, and powerfully governing the bodies which it inhabiteth.

For the body of man is Compound, and confifteth of Spirit, Flefh, Blood, Membranes, Veines, Nerves, Griffles, and Laftly Tones being as it were the props and pillars, leaft the frame should fall Which are in number as followeth.

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Ter centum binis compactum est offibus istud, Quod gerimus corpus, non est quod plura requiras. If you 302 bones chance to find, Few, or none, are left behind.

The principle transmutation of the nourishment in man is by Progeneration of the Four Vital humours, Blood, Flegm, Yellow and Black Choler. For the nourifhment received being tempered (as indeed all bodies of the world are) of the Four Elements, is refolved in the body of a living creature into four again. The fatteft part of it is turned into Blood : a part into Spittle or Flegme : a part into Yellow Choler, and a part into Black Choler, or Melancholy. For Melancholy by its terrene großness, represents the Earth. Flegme, Water, Blood, Air. Choler, Fire. But they differ in colour and relish. For Melancholy is black, and something bitter. Flegme, white, and without taft. Blood, red, and fweet. Choler, yellow, and very bitter.

Note that amongst those Four, Blood is most copiously generated, containing the very substance of our nourishment, to which yellow rurge Choler only adds a more easie penitration through all. Black Choler fixes it again ; and applieth it to the members. Laftly Flegm tempers the Acrimonies of them both, (least they should Corode) thich with penetrating and fixing: and gently agglutinates the blood to the members. Hence it is that Philitians also, with the Vulgar, speak of the Blood, as if it were the only food of life. Now the principle concostion in a living creature.is threefold.1. Chilification. 2. Sanguification. 3. Membrification. The First is made in the Stomach. The Second in the Liver And the Last in all the members. Now the Stomach is the common Sink-port, or receptacle of all maladies. Crudity is the feed of all difeafes. From thence grofs vapours arife, caufing inflations: the same condensed in the head, causeth distillation 1. the other member, of the body it caufeth obstructions, whence followeth

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loweth rottenness or inflammation. Therefore let it be taken for grant ed, that he taketh the best course for his bodily health, that endeavours to prevent Crudities. Now the best waies to prevent them is Temperateness: as in food, sleep, and daily exercises. O the strange virtue of Labor ! whereby our ever to be adored God ordered our first Parents to get their bread and health in the sweat of their browes intimating that they should get their bread and health together: which mistery, if the debauched and flothful Gentry of this Kingdom would rightly weigh, and seriously confider, they would not waste their lives in idleness & .

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I must beg your pardon, and break off abruptly, as touching these things : or I shall walk into so pleasant a field, that I shall not be able to get forth; I must therefore but only hint at things.

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#### Of the Quantisies of Weights which are at this daie in use in preparing, and composing Medicines,

For as much as the perfect knowledg of Medicines cannot be atained unto, without the knowledg of the quantities of Weights, which are at this prefent day most commonly used in making and preparing Medicines. I thought good to declare them, as followeth.

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GRows by the borders of Fields and High-way-fides, and it flowreth in August, and it is fomewhat Aftringent, and not too hot, pound it with Oyl of Sweet Almonds, and lay it as a Plafter, eafeth the pain of the Stomack, also it cureth the Ach and Shaking and drawing together of Sinews

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#### 2. Tuffilago Coltsfoot,

It groweth in Watry-places, and moift fields, is of a drying nature; pounded with Honey, it cureth hot Inflamations, and St. Anthony's fier being laid thereon, it is good for any Impostumations of the flomack.

### 3. Petafites : Butter Burre.

It groweth in moift places: it flowereth in March, and it is dryin the third degree, being dried to powder and drunk in Wine, provokes Sweat, it killeth Wormes, and is of great force against the Suffocations or Fits of the Mother, it cureth all Ulcersor old filthy Sores.

#### 4. Britannica Bistort,

They be of two forts and flowereth in May, cold and dry in the third degree, being boyled in red wine and drunken flopeth the Bloody-flux, it also flopeth the overmuch flowing of Womens Purgations and all other Issues of blood

## 5. Fumaria Fumitory.

It grows amongft Wheat and Batley, hot and dry in the fecond degree, flowers in *June*, the decoction is good in all hot Collectick humours, also against the fowl fourf or old fores butifying the skin and purging the body.

## 6. Chamadrys Germainder.

It groweth in flony Hills and Gardens flowereth in *July*, hot and dry in the third degree, opens all obstructions of the Liver and Spleen it bringeth down Womens natural purgations, it purgeth the body.

# 7. Bitonica St. Fauls Bitony.

Male and Formale, the Male Veronica, it groweth in fandy places A about Woods, the Formale groweth in low moift places, they flowet in *July*, it is dry and fomething hot, it is very good for flop.<sup>45</sup> pings and pains of the Kidneyes, it is good in old Coughs and cor.<sup>46</sup> rupted Longs and Ulcers.

### 3. Ajugo Ground-pine.

Grows in flony ground flowers in Augnst; it is hot in the fecond degree and dry in the third, it is good to apply to the Stingings of any Venomous Beaft, boyled in Vinegar and drunken deliwereth the dead Child, diffolves congealed blood, anointing the body with the Juice provokes fweating.

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#### 9. Chamesiparissus Lavender-Cotten.

Grows in Gardens if Planted, or elfe not in this Country ; it deg flowers in August, it is hot and very dry; the Hearb drunken in Wa Wine is good against Serpents Scorpions, and any other kind of poyfons both to Man and Beast.

#### 10. Steophalaria Celandine,

Grows about old rotten walls; flowers in May, hot and dry in He the third degree, the Juice in Wine is good to wash fretting fores, it much openeth the stopping of the Liver, it helpeth the Jaundice, it is very good in the Hemorhoids, the Juice of it mingled with Wine and wash therewith.

#### 11. Pervinca Pervincle.

Grows in moift fhadow places; flowers in April, it is very driftet, and Affringent, the herb fodd in Wine and drunken flops the bloo dy flux, it flayeth the immoderate courfe of the flowers, and al other fluxes of blood.

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### 12. Crocus Saracenicus Bastard Saffron,

They use to plant it in Gardens, it flowreth in August, hot in the fama first degree dry in the second, the Juice of the Seed taken with Broth helpeth the stopping of the Bowell's and Guts, it is also very ry good for dropsy; the flowers drunk with honied water open of the eth the Liver and are very good against the Jaundice.

### 13. Tanacetum Tanfie.

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Who ers in August, it is hot in the fecond degree and dry in the third; who te feeds are very good to kill the Wormes, the same drunken in Wine is for pain in the Bladder, and them that cannot pils but by drops, the Juice of the Herb is good for fits of the Ague.

Sing It groweth in dry places by old walls ; it flowreth in August, addit is hot in the third degree and dry in the fecond, Feversew dryngth ed and made into powder, and two drams of it taken in honey, very well purgeth Melancholy and purgeth the Stone.

#### 15. Abrotonum Sothenwood.

It grows in Gardens flowers in August, it is hot in the third degree, it is good against the Scatica and stoppings of Urirne and Womans natural Purgations the Seeds being steeped in Wine and drunken.

dry Hot in the first degree dry in the third, comforteth the Stomack from hot Collerick humours, the decoction.

#### 17. Buglosfa Bugloss.

Hot and dry in the first degree, flowreth in June it groweth in A 2 the THE PART OF

the Axen of this Herb is used in making Glasses; the decodion of it drunk is good against the Strangury and pain in the Reins also very good for green wounds to heal them up.

## 21. Bardana The Clote Burre.

Groweth by highways and dry Ditches, their feafon is in August being very good fleeped in Wine to provoke Urine and break the Stone in the Reigns or Bladder, also for fuch as spet blood or corrupted matter, and in Ointments good for hot swellings.

## 22. Ranunculus Crowfoot.

Grows in Ditches and standing waters, flowers in April, good against Tetters and Ringworms. The Powder of the Root dried e caufeth Sneeling.

## 23. Poligranthemum Gouldenknobs.

Grows on Graffy Downs and in Gardens, if planted flowers in April, and almost all the Summer is hot and dry, feldom used in Physick, the Roots are good to draw Blifters being outwardly ap plyed.

## 24. Dipfacum or Virga pastoris, Teasel.

It flowers in June, and is planted in this Country, is dry in the Second degree, an Ointment made with it is good for chops in the Fundament.

#### 25. Succifa Morfus Diaboli, Devils-bit

Hot and dry in the Second degree : inwardly taken it eafethth Fits of the Mother, and breaks Wind, very good to ftop Swellings i the Jaws being outwardly applied.

#### 26. Trifolium Trefoil.

There be feveral forts, and are hot and dry in the Third degreand flowers in August, good to purge Worms, Natural Purgations, and against the Strangury provokes Urine.

### 27. Allelnga & Oxys Wood Sorrel.

Grows in fhaddowed Woods, flowreth in April, is cold and dr it is good for them that have a cold feeble Stomach, the decoctonic good for fore Mouths.

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# 28. Gramen Couch-crafs. of shire of shire w

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Is cold and dry, it groweth in Cotn Fields and in low places, it is good to boil in Wine for Gnawings of the Belly, very much provokes Urine, and brings forth the Stone and Gravel.

#### 29. Phanix Way-bennet.

Grows in the Borders of Fields, of nature dry and warm, ftops the Flux of the Belly, and womens Natural Purgations.

### 30. Bromos Oatgrals.

Grows on Borders of Fields, and by way fides may be found in ear, all the Summer is dry of complection: the decocton is good for flinking Breaths, or flinking finells, or corrupt fores in the Nofe being washed therewith.

### 31. Crataogonum Stichwort.

Grows under Hedges and Bushes, flowers in April, the Seed heateth and dryeth: Some write that if a Woman drinks the decocton of the Seed three days after her Natural Purgations she may conceive of a man child if the conceive within Forty days.

## 32. Junci Rushes, there be Five forts.

Grows in low watry places, of dry complexion, they flowrer in July, it purges very much by Urine, the Seeds fleeped and drunken in Wine flops any Flux in the Belly.

# 33. Arundo Reeds, there be Nine forts.

All hot and dry, they grow in flanding Waters and by Brook fides, tis good in Dropfies, it provokes Urine and breaks the Stone the Afhes are good for Scald heads.

## 34. Hydropiper Water Pepperwort.

Hot and dry in the Third degree, flowreth in August, groweth in Pools and Ditches, it washeth all cold Swellings, it scattereth congealed Blood being laid thereto; the dry Leaves being powdred may ferve instead of Pepper.

## 35. Persicaria Arfemart.

Grows in watry places, is cold and dry, is good to lay to freth wounds

wounds the Juice being droped in ; good against Impostumations and Inflamations and such hot Swellings.

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#### 36. Staphisagria Stavisaker.

Grows in shaddow places and in Gardens, flowreth in June, it is hot allmost in the Fourth degree : Fifteen of the Seeds is a strong Vomit taken in any convenient Liquor, carries of gross flame and flimy matter, it is also good with Vinegar to rub on Loufie Apparel to kill Lice.

### 3.7. Cucumis Wild Cucumber.

Grows in Gardens if Set there, flowreth in August, is hot and dry in the Second degree, is good against Dropfies, good for Squinancy and the Swellings in the Throat.

### 38. Colocinihis Coloquintida.

It grows in Spain and Italy and brings forth fruit in September like unto great Apples being very full of Seeds; it is hot and dry in the Third degree : it purges Cholerick humours; a Scruple is enough at a time, for it openeth the Belly mightily, not fiting nor fafe for the Vulgar to meddle with.

#### 39. Sena Sene.

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It grows in Italy, it flowreth in June, hot in the Second degree and dry in First: the Codds and Leaves in the quantity of a Dram gently purgeth the Belly especially Choler and Melancholy, a very fafe and harmless Purge.

#### 40. Sambucus Eldar.

Hot and dry in the Third degree, especially the Bark grows in fhaddow moist places; flowreth in May, it is profitable in the Dropsey, the green Leaves pounded are good to aswage hot Swellings and to ease the pain of the Gout.

### 41. Humilis Sambucus Deanwort.

Grows near Highways, especially in good ground, flowreth in July, it is hot and dry. The Root boiled in Wine and drank is good against the Dropsey and purgeth watry humours.

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### 42. Vitis alba Brion.

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Grows at the bottom of Hedges and Ditches, flowreth in May, hot and dry in the Third degree. The Root purges very well, provokes Urine, good against Falling Sickness; very good against old Coughs and Paines in the fides being outwardly applyed.

### 33. Polytrichon Maidenhair.

Grows in moift fhado v places, the Hearb between hot and cold in degree keeps always green; good in all infla nations of the Liver and Reins.

### 44. Lichen or Hepatica Liverwort.

Grows on Scones in fhaddow places, and flowers in July, is cold and dry: good for inflamations of the Liver and foul fpreading Scabs.

### 45. Burfa Pastoris Shephards Purse.

Cold and dry, binding stops blood and cools Inflamations, stops Womens Purgation,.

#### 46. Buphihalmum Ox-Eye.

This is good against Melancholy and Madness.

#### 47. Buxas Box Tree Leaves.

Is hor, dry and binding, good against Tenams, or bitings of any Venomous Beasts, taken inwardly.

# 48. Calaminta Montana Mountain Calamint.

Hot and dry in the third degree, provokes Urine, haftens Birth, and brings the after Birth and terms.

#### 49. Calendula Marigolds.

The Leaves are hot in the fecond degree, loofe the Belly with Vinigar it Cools greately.

50. Carduncellas Groundfel. Cold and Moift, it Purgeth Urine and Gravill.

### 51. Cardum B. Marie Lady Thiftle.

Far more temperat; the Cardus good against the Jaundice, provoks Urine and breaks the stone. 52 Core

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52. Carduus Benedictus Cardus. Hot and dry in the fecond degree, a great Clenfer good to clens, the Stomack and Belly, relifteth Poyfon, provokes Sweat.

53. Cataria Nepela Nep or Cat Mint.

The Verme is like Calemint, only Genteeler. 54. Canda Epuina Horse-tail.

Is of a Binding, Drying Quality, very good to flop bleeding at the Nofe or any other pair,

55. Caulis Braffica Collworts.

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## Diascordium 106.

Take of Cinamon, Callia lignea, of each half an ounce, Scordiim an ounce: Dittany of Creet, Tormentil, Biftort, Galbanum, Sum Arabick, of each half an ounce: Opium one dram and a half: Sotrel Seeds one dram and a half: Gentian half an ounce; Bole-Armenick an ounce and an half; Earth of Lemons half an ounce; long Pepper, Ginger, of each two drams; clarified Honey two pound and an half; Sugar of Roles one pound; Canary Wine ten ounces: make them into an Electuary according to art.

It is a well composed Electuary, fomething appropriated to the Nature of women, for it provokes the terms, hattens their labour, helps their usual fickness at the time of their lying in, I know nothing better; it stops fluxes, mightily strengtheneth the hearn and stomack; neither is so hot but it may fafely be given to weak people; and besides provokes steep. It may fafely be given to young children ten grains at a time; ancient people may take a dram or more : It is given as an excellent cordial in such feavers as are accompanied with want of steep.

### Mithridate 106.

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Take of Mirrh, Saffron, Agrick, Ginger, Cinnamon, Spicknard, Frankincenfe, Treacle, Muftard Seeds, of each ten drams ; the Seeds of Hartwort, Opobalfamum, or Oyl of Nutmegs by expreffion, Schenanth, Stoechas, Coftus, Galbanum, Turpentine long Pepper, Castorium, Juice of Hypocistis Styrax calamitis, Opopanax Indian leaf, or for want of it, Mace, of each one ounce : Caffia lignea, Poley mountain, white Pepper, Scordium, the Seeds of carrots of Creet, carpobalfamum or cubebs, Troch, cypheos, Bdelium, of each feven drams : Celtick, Spicknard, Gum Arabick, Macedonian Parfly Seeds, Opium cardamoms the lefs, Fennel Seeds, Gentian, red Rose Leaves, Dittany of Creet, of each five drams; Annis seeds, Asarabacca, Orris, Acorus, the greater Valerian, Sagapen, of each three drams : Meum Acacia, the bellies of Scinks, the tops of St. John's wort, of each two drains and an half ; Mallego wine fo much as is fufficient to diffolve the Juices and

and Gums, clarified Honey the treble weight of all, the wine ex cept ed : make them into an Electuary according to art.

It is good against poyson and such as have done themselves wrong by taking filthy Medicines ; it provokes fweat, it helps continual watrings of the Stomack, ulcers in the body, confumptions, weak. nefs of the limbs, rids the body of cold bumours, and difeafes coming of cold, it remedies cold infirmities of the brain, and ftopping of the paffage of the fenses (viz. hearing, feeing, fmelling, &c.) by cold, it expels wind, helps the chollick, provokes appetite to ones victuals, it helps ulcers in the bladder, if Galen fay true; as also difficulty of Urine, it cafts out the dead child, andhelps fuch women as cannot conceive by reason of cold, it is an a dmirable remedy for melancholly, and all difeafes of the body coming through cold, it would fill a whole fheet of Paper to reckon them all up particularly. You may take a fcruple or half a dram in the morning, and follow your builiness ; two drams will make you fwear, yea one dram if your body be weak, for then two drams may be dangerous becaufe of its hear.
