The Committee being set the third time in expectation of what Objections the Colledge would offer against the Ordinance for publike artificiall Bathes, & Bath-Stoves, or whether they would approve of them.

Dr. Alfton began as followeth, in these or the like words and Phrafes.



He Colledge commanded me to return humble thanks to the HonorableComittee for not giving confent to the Oldinance of Bathes, without them. (Then he proceeded) Having the fear of God before our eyes, and the good of the Common-wealth, The Col-

Icdge do by us return this Answer to the Honorable Committee, that they do not think fit the erecting of publike Bathes should be granted to Dr. Chamberlen, and they think them hurtfull to the Common-wealth. A 2

And the Colledg defires that this honourable Committee fignifie fo much unto the honorable Hofe.

Then the Committee asked if they had not brought their Answer in writing, whereupon they prefented their Paper as followeth :

To the Honourable, the Committee for Bathes.

He Fresident and Colledge of Physicians return their humble thanks to this Honorable Committee for your favour unto them, and humbly represent that fince the Honorable Committee is pleased to resolve not to enjoyn Dr. Chamberlen to attend the Colledge concerning his Defign of Bathes, they can give no fatisfactory Anfwer therein, Onely whereas publike Bathes have been by their abufe, the Caufes in the Greek and Roman States, (where there was greater neceffity, and leffe danger of them then in our cold clyme) of fo much Phyficall prejudice, ffeminating bodies, and procuring infirmities, and morall in debuuching the manners of the people, that in either of them upon the coming of the Chriftians into power, they were demolifhed or converted into other ules; And whereas for private use there are in the houses of divers perfons of this Kingdom, Cradles, Tubbs, Boxes, Chayres, Bathes, and Bathe-Stoves, in which by the help of Fumes, Vapors, water, Oyle, &c.according to the prefcription of Phyfitians, fweat may be procured, payne affwaged, and all neceffary ends of bathing attained. The Prefident and Colledge are fo confident of, and prefume fo much upon the wildom and justice of this honourable Committee, & the two Houfes of Parliament, that they believe, if that it shall please them to em-Power the faid Dr. Chamberlen by any Ordinance for erection

rection of publike Bathes, they will fo regulate his defign, make fach prevision, and take fuch cantion from him, that none of the afore-mentioned inconvenier ces fhall to llow. And that they will meither infringe the just liberty of the Subject, nor abridge other Physicions in the choyce of their infruments, or legall practife of any part of their Art.

To the bonorable Committe for Bathes, The humble Answer of Peter Chamberlen, Doctor in Physick, and Fellow of the Colledge of Physitians in London, to a Paper delivered to the honorable Committe, by Dr. Alston, Dr. Hameus, Doct. Bates, and Dr. Micklethwait, from the President, and others of the said Colledge.

In humble obedience to Command of this Honourable Committee, & in Answer to the Colledg Paper.

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N the first place, I fay, I willingly passe by all perfonal aymes, be it in the mention of my rot attendance, (which they are cause of) or in their grand Caveats enjoyned by them on this honourable Committee, and the two Honfes of Parliament, upon(4.) upon their Wisdoms and Justice, If they shall empower mee, &c. or in their many arguments of Abuse to prevent that IF. And am resolved (as God shall enable me) to swallow all private reprozeh and scorn, that runs not too much on the publick score.

Secondly, concerning the Matter it felf, I humbly anfwer, that the Colledg have quite miftaken it; for I prefented only the Ufe of Publick Buthes, and they meddle only with the Abufe of them. Alas, who knows not, that the Abufe of wine caufeth drunkenneffe; the abufe of women, whoredome; the abufe of means, gluttony; and the abufe of Phyfick, poyfon ?

Thirdly, I fear they have too much forfaken the Authors of our own Faculty, to fide with Poets and the fuperstitious beginnings of Antichrist, in the aggravations of those Abuses.

Fourthly, I doubt whether they have not millaken the jealous zeal of those Religious Fathers that writ against them; for the infulting Barbarismes of the Gothes and Vandales, and other conquering Nations, in demolishing those stately Buildings. And whether the felf fame writings may not more, or as fitly be applyed unto the private Houses, and those Accommodations mentioned in the Paper, Yea, to the Excellent and Famous Bathes of Sommerfetshire.

Fifthly, I perceive they confulted not well with Travellers, when they affirm them all demolifhed, or converted to other ufes in the Grecian and Romane Empires. For the truth is, that many of them being demolifhed, Leffer Purfes, Power, and Leifure, have not been able to contend in State with the Treafure and Soveraignty of the whole world, which those Emperouts had that built them.

Sixthly, I doubt whether it be not a fundamental Herefie in Phyfick, to neceffitate hot Remedies (as Bathes) for hot Countries, and proclaim them dangerous in cold Clymes, notwithflanding the daily Experience in Germa-

ny,

ny, Poland, Denmark, & Muscovia, to the contrary. And the Great Canon of Physick, contraria contrariis curantur,

Seventhly, I do verily believe, and dare adventure my Life and Effate upon it, that I can (by Gods bleffing) more fafely, certainly, fuddenly, and with more Eafe, cure many (if not all curable) difeates with them, then all our Colledg; yea, then All Phyfitians in the world can do without them. Yea, such difeates as without them are wholly defperate and deadly.

Eighthly, In Anfwer to some tacit Jealousies, I do not do this purposely to diminish the Practife of Physitians, but verily suppose there may be a way propounded in them, both advantagious to them & the Common-wealth.

Ninthly, I do not endeavour to engrofie them. to my felf; but have from the beginning, and do ftill humbly offer it unto the State, or any whom thay fhall appoint; wherein (if I do not) I verily believe that Dr. Grent will be the best able to ferve them.

Lastly, I professe before God and men, that I believe the due use of them in all convenient places, may fave above 10000 Lives 2 year. And that in faithfulnesse to Almighty God, and my native Country, I have endeavouted this fervice; from the which, if the honourable Parliament or Committee can discharge me before the Great Judg, I shall give most humble thanks to God and Them, rejoycing to have so escaped the incensed Spirits of so many learned men, as now oppose me.

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
