The grounds for this new Charter,

But now seeing it hath been demonstrated to us in the behalf of our beloved Subjects, the Apothecaries of our City of London, and likewife it hath been affirmed to us, and approved by our well beloved Theodore de Mayerne, and Hemry Atkins, Doctors in Phylick, our difcreet and faithful Physicians, that of these last years many Empericks, and ignorant and unlearned men, inhabit and dwell in our City of London, and Suburbs thereof, who, not being brought up in the art and mystery of an Apothecary, but being unskilful and ignorant in the fame, do make and compound very many unwholfome, hurtful, falfe. corrupt, and pernicious Medicines; and do fell and daily transmit the same into most parts of this our Kingdom of England, to the reproach and scorn not only of that honourable Science of Physick, and the learned Physicians of this our Kingdom of England, professing the same; and likewise of the Apothecaries of the City of London, educated and expert in the faid Art and Mystery; but also to the danger and daily peril of the lives of our Subjects.
