Hat the Bill, 1.0:0 have mercy upon us, with a large red Croffe be fet upon the door of every house visited with the Plague.

2. That all the Stuffe in the houfe where any have been vifited of the Plague be well aired, before they be difcharged, or the houfe opened.

3 The houle visited with the Plague to be shut up, whether any person therein do die or not: And the persons so shut up to bear their own charge, if they be of abilitie.

4. No perfon to be removed out of any infeded houfe, but by leave of the Magiffrate.

the Magiltrate, 5 If any perfon thall flee out of any houfe, at the time when the faid houfe thall be infected with the Plague, fuch perfons fo fleeing to be purfued by Hue and Cry, and the houfe where they thall be found to be flut up, and they reftrained in fome fuch place as the Magiltrate of the place where they thall be found thall think fit.

6 That the Pavements in the Streets be made fufficient, and fo continued; The Kenels kept fweet and clean; The foile of the faid Streets to be carried away, and all annoyances to be removed : And fuch inhabitants as fhall refue to pay thereafonable rates affelfed on them for payment of the Scavingers which fhall cleanfe and carry away the foile, be diffrained by their goods for payment thereof according to Law.

7 That if any perfons shall turn out of their houses any Servant or Lodger being fick, power to be given to the Magistrate or Officer to put them into their faid house again, or otherwise the faid perfons to provide sufficient maintenance for them; And upon refusing so todo (being able perfons) to distrain the goods of such perfons (for the charge) that shall so turn them out of doors.

8 If by order of the Magistrate any perfons visited be removed out of their house or Lodging, to the Pest-house or other place, when they be recovered and in perfect health, the faid Magistrate to have power and full authority to return and settle the faid perfons in their houses or Lodging from whence they were so taken out, without contradiction of their Landlords or any other.
9 That all such Magistrates or other perfons that shall be trusted with this fervice may be enabled to

9 That all fuch Magiftrates or other perfons that fhall be trufted with this fervice may be enabled to do all other things neceffarie, and purfuing the execution of these Orders, as occasion shall require. To That all Collectors in the several Parishes shall be hereby required to perform their dutie in the col-

To that all Collectors in the feverall Parifhes shall be hereby required to perform their dutie in the collecting of the fums affeffed upon the faid Parifhes, according to Law; And such as shall fail in the performance of their duties therein, shall be liable to such penalties as shall be inflicted by Parliament.
