don, which may prooue of dangerous consequence, if the same bee not preuented in time by all sit meanes: Besides other orders and courses

courses set downe by their Lordships for that purpose; It is also thought sit and ordered, that Iohn Bill his Maiesties Printer, shall reprint the Booke of Orders which were heretosore thought meete by His Maiesties Tie, and the Board, to bee put in execution through all the Counties of this Kingdome, in such Townes, Villages, and other places, as might bee infected with the plague.

Whereof the sayd Iohn Bill is hereby required to take notice, and to performe the same accordingly.



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ORDERS THOVGHT meet by his Maiestie, and his Privie Councell, to be executed throughout the Counties of this Realme, in such Townes, Villages, and other places, as are, or may be hereaster infelted with the Plague, for the stay of surther increase of the same.

S the most louing and egracious care of his Maiestie for the preservation of his people, hathalready beene earnestly shewed and declared by such meanes and wayes as were thought expedient to suppresse the grieuous Infection of the Plague, and to preuent the increase thereof, within the Citic of London, and parts about it; so whatsoeuer other good meanes may be yet remaining, which may extend and proue behouefull to the Countrey abroad (where his Maiestie is sorie to vnderstand that the Contagion is also in many places dispersed) it is likewise his graci-

ded and put in practife. And therefore having taken knowledge of certaine good Orders that were voon like occasion published in times past; together with certaine Rules and Medicines prescribed by the best and most learned Physicians; and finding both of them, to serue well for the present time, his MAIESTIE is pleased that the same shall bee renewed and published: And withall straightly commandeth all suffices of the Peace and others to whom it may appertaine, to see the said Orders duely executed.

Nprimis, All the Justices in energie County, as well within the Liberties as without, immediating upon knowledge to them given, thall assemble themselves together at some one generally place accustomed, being cleare from Insection of the Plague,

put in execution not meaning that any Justices owelling in or neare places infected, that come thither, whiles their comming may be doubtfull. And after their first generall assembly, they that make a distribution of themselves to sundry limits and divisions, as in other common services of the Countie they are accustomed to doe, sorthe prosecution thereof.

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forme themselves by all god meanes, what Townes and Uillages are at that time of such assemblie infected within every their Counties, and in what hundred or other Diussion, the said Townes and Uillages are, and how many of the same places so infected, are corporate Townes, market Townes and Hillages, and shall consider of what wealth the inhabitants of the same Townes and Parishes are, to be able to relieve the page that are or shall be infected, and to be restrained in their houses.

3 Item, thereupon after conference bled accoeding to the necessitie of the cause, they shall deuife and make a generall taxation, either by charging the Towne infected with one summe in groffe, 02 by charging the special persons of wealth within the same, to be forthwith collected for the rate of one moneth at the first, and so if the ficknesse mall continue, the collection of the like summe, of more of of leffe, as time and cause thall require, and the same to be every first, second, third, of fourth weeke employed to and for the execution of the laid orders. And in case some of the faid Townes infected thall manifelily appeare not to be of fufficient abilitie to contribute sufficient for the charges requilite, then the taration of collection shall bee made of further extended to other parts, or in any other further limits, as by them shall be thought requisite where there shall be any fuch Townes of Aillages to infected, and bnable to releeve themselves. And if the said Townes be scituated in the boyders and confines of any o-9.3 ther

ther thire, then as the Inflices thall the cause and nieve for the greatuess of the charge requisite, that the parts of the thire ionning to the Townes infected be not able, they shall write their letters to the next Judices of the other Shire so confining, to procure by collection some reliefe, as in like cases they are to relieve them, in respect of nieve neighbourhood of the place, and for that the same infection may be the better stated from the said adiopning places, though they be separated by name of the Countie.

4 Item, they hall cause to be appointed in co nery Parish aswell infected as not infected, certaine persons to view the bodies of all such as Mall Die, befoze they be luffered to be buried, and to certifie the Winister of the Church and Church. warden, oz other pzincipall Officers, oz their fub. fitutes, of what probable difeate the faid persons vied: and the faid viewers, to have weekly some allowance, and the moze large allowance where the Townes of Parishes be infected, during the infection, towards their maintenance, to the end they which hall be in places infected, may for= beare to refort into the company of others that are found: and those persons to be swozne to make true report according to their knowledge. and the choise of them to be made by direction of the Curate of the Church, with these of foure subs fantiall men of the Parish. And in case the said viewers either through fauour or corruption, mall giue wrong certificate, or spall refuse to ferue bemg thereunto appointed, then to cause them to be

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ferue for a terror to others.

5 Item, the houses of such persons out of the which there thall die any of the plague, being to certified by the viewers, or otherwise knowne, or where it shall be understood, that any person remaineth ficke of the plague, to be closed up on all parts burning the time of refleaint, viz. fir weeks, after the ficknesse be ceased in the same house, m case the said houses so infected thall be within any Towne haumy houses niere adiogning to the fame. And if the infection happen in houses difperfed in Unlares, and separated from other hous les, and that of necessitie, for the serving of their cattle, and manuting of their ground, the faid persons cannot continue in their houses, then they to be neverthelesse restrained from resorting into company of others, either publikely of pilnately during the said time of restraint, and to weare some marke in their uppermost garments, or beare white robs in their hands at luch time as they mall goe abroad, and if there be any doubt that the masters and owners of the houses infected, will not duely observe the directions of thutting up their dwies, specially in the night, then thall there be appointed two of these watchmen by turnes, which thall be iwozne to attend and watch the house, and to apprehend any person that shall come out of the house contrary to the order, and the same persons by order of the Justices, shall be a competent time imprisoned in the flocks in the pighway next to the house infected: and furthers more, some speciali marke thall be made and fixed

where any such houses shall be Innes of Alehouses, and the signes shall be taken downe for the time of the restraint, and some crosse of other marke set upon the place thereof to be a token of the sicknesse.

bonest persons that either shall collect the summes assessed, or shall have the custodie thereof, and out of the said collection to allot a wiekely proportion so, the sinding of victuall, or sire, or medicines so, the power sort, during the time of their restaint. And whereas some persons being well dissipated to yield almes and reliefe, will be more willing to give some portions of victuall, as come, bread, or other meat, the same shall be committed to the charge of some special persons, that will how nessly and truly preserve the same, to be distributed as they shall be appointed sort the power that are insected.

Ttem, to appoint certaine persons dwelling within the townes infected, to provide and deliver all necessaries of victuals, or any matter of watching or other attendance, to keepe such as are of god wealth being restrained, at their owne proper costs and charges, and the paper at the common charges: and the said persons so appointed to be ordered, not to resort to any publique assembly during the time of such their attendance, as also co we are some marke on their opper garment, or to be are a white rod in their hand, to the end others may avoid their companie.

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against the Infection of the Plague.

And of these things about mentioned, the Austices shall take great care, as of a matter specially directed and commanded by his Paielly by on the princely and natural care he hath conceived towards the preservation of his subjects, who ty very disorder, and sor lacke of direction doe in many parts wilfully procure the increase of this general contagion.

If the patient be costine and bound in his body, let him take a Suppositary made with a little bopled Honie, and a little fine poulder of Salt, and so taken in at the Fundament, and kept till it move a soole.

An excellent Medicine made without charges.

Taken away from them, before they be dayed, a sponefull: Let the Patient danke this, well mingled in a draught of good date Ale of Beere, which innether source, nor dead, or with a draught of white which and goe to bed and call himselfe in a sweat, and sozbeare nieve as is a sozesaid.

Another soueraigne remedie, that is, a stilled water.

Take the inward barke of the Ash-tree, a pound of Walnuts with the greene outward shelles, to the number of sifty, cut these small, of Scabious, of Veruen, of Petimorell, of Houseleeke, of every one ahandfull, of Saffron halfe an ounce, power by on these the strongest Aeneger you can get, source pintes.

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forborne, the next is to ble all meanes to expell the poplon, and to befond the heart by Cordials.

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3. Medicament expulsiue.

The poison is expelled best by sweatings prouded ked by posset Als, made with Fenell and Marigolds in winter, and with Sorrell, Buglosse and Borage in Sommer, with the which in both times they must mire the Triacle of Diarellaroum, the weight of ir. d. and so to lay themselves with all quietnesse to sweat one halfe boure, or an hours if they be strong. For they that be neither full of humors, nor corrupt in humors, niede neither purging nor letting of bloud, but at the first plunge may move themselves to sweat with cordial things mire with such things as move sweat, and are before declared.

What is to be done when there is nyrifing or swelling in any part.

ben if by the ethic meanes the poison be expelled outward by botches, earbuncles of markes, called Gods markes, according as nature both expell, so must the further proceedings be, providing still, that they continue still in use of the Cordiall and moderate smeating now and then, all the time that the sores be in healing, which must by the Surgion be handled with great discretion.

Medicines to be vsed in ordinarie diet.

In is thought that the poulder of Harts horne bath a speciall prerogative, to be bled all the time

time of their ficknesse, in their broths, and supping, which in sommer must ever have Sorrell, Borage, Buglasse, and in winter, Betony, and Scabious, or Morsus Diaboli: and if their abilities doe not serve, let them wie it with Aleburies made with a little Nutmegge, or one Clove, or with Cawdles in like manner made with Cloves, Maces, Nutmegs, Sanders, or such like.

Both to preserve and cure the sicknesse.

Take an egge and make a hole in the top of it, take out the white and yolke, fill the spell with the weight of two french crownes of Sassron, rose the said egge thus silled with Sassron under the embers, but ill the shell begin to ware pellow, then take it from the sire, and beat the shell and Sassron in a moster together, with halfe a spoonefull of Sussard sied, take of this poulder a french crowne weight, and as some as you suspect your selfe infected, dissolve it into ten sponefuls of posset-ale, and drinke it luke-warme, then goe to bed and proudke your selfe to sweating.

To be vied in the first time of the ficknesse.

A Wother is to take five of fix hand full of Sorrell that groweth in the field, of a greater quantitie according as you will distill more of lesse of the water thereof, and let it lie infrised of sixped in god dineger the space of four e and twentic boures, then take it off and distill the water cloth put into a Limbecke, and distill the water thereof: And assone as you finde your selfe touched with the sicknesse, drinke source sponesuls of the said water with a little sugar, and if you be able.

able, walke byon it untill you doe sweat, if not, keepe your bed, and being well concred, pronoke your selfe to sweating, and the next day to take as much againe of it, a little before supper.

Item, to prouoke bomit with two ounces of ranke oyle, or walnut oyle, a spoonefull of the suice of Celendine, and halfe a spoonefull of the suice of radice root, so that the party Infected doe walke and not sleepe, is better then any letting of bloud, or any purging. For the disease neither can suffer agication of humors, nor when one is infected, bath no time to bleede or to purge.

Outward Medicines for to be applyed to the sore.

The first.

ake of Scabious two handfuls, stamp it in a stone morter with a pestell of stone if you can get any such, then put onto it of old swines grease salted two ounces, and the yolke of an egge, stamp them wel togicather, and say part of this warme to the soze.

The second.

Take of the leaves of Mallowes, of Camomill flowers: of either of them an handfull, of Linfeede beaten into poulder two ounces, boyle the Mallow leaves first cut and the slowers of the Camomill in faire water, standing above a singers breadth, boyle all them together until all the water almost bee spent, then put thereunto the Linseede, of Wheate slower halfe an handfull, of sumes

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fmines greafe the fkins taken away, their ounces, of ople of Boles two ounces, firre them fill with a flicke, and let them all boyle together on a foft fire, wit hout smoake, untill the water be utterly spent, beate them altogether in amoster, butill they be wel incorporated together, and in fieling smooth not rough: then make part thereof bot in a diff let byon a chafindish of coales, and lay it thicke upon a line nen cloth, applying to the fore.

> Another excellent Medicine to ripen and, bring out the fore.

Ake a white Onion cut in pieces, of fresh but= ter three ounces, of Leven the weight of rii.d of Mallowes one handfull, of Scabious (if it may be han) one handfull, of Cloues of Garlicke the weight of re b. boyle them on the fire in fufficient water, and make a pulteffe of it and lay it warme to the foze.

Another.

D the fore it felfe doe thug. Take two handfull of Valerian, thie rots of Danewort, a handfull of Smalledge, oz Louage, if you can get it, feethe them all in butter and water, and a few crimmes of bread, and make a pulteffe thereof, and lay it warme to the foze untill it breake.

Another for the fame.

I f you cannot have these herbs, it is good to lay Laloafe of bread to it hot as it commeth out of the ouen (which afterward mall be burnt, or buried in. the earth) of the leaves of Scabious, of Sorrell, roffed, of two of three Lillie roots rolled buder embers, beaten and applied. BINIS

A generall

An Aduise

A generall medicine for all forts of people taken with the Plague, to be had without cost.

Take of the root of Butter-burre, otherwise called Pestilent-work, one ounce, of the root of great Valerian a quarter of an ounce, of Sorrell an hands full, boile all these in a quart of water to a pint, then straine it, and put thereto two sponfuls of vineger, two ounces of god Sugar: boile all these together until they be well mingled, let the infected drinke of this so bot as he may suffer it, a god draught, and if he chance to cast it up againe, let him take the same quantitie straight way upon it, and provoke himself to sweet, and he shall sinde great helpe.

Time of continuance apart from common affemblies.

Stich as have beene infected, should keepe their Spoule, without being conversant with the whole, butill the sozes shall have left running and be perfectly whole and sound, which in sanguine and cholericke persons will be healed somer, than in melancholicke, and segmatike complexions.

Such persons may not well be conversant with Sthem which are not infected, for the space of one moneth.

Infected clothes.

The contagion suspected to remain in clothes, either wollen of linnen, cannot well be ausided by better meanes than by fire and water, by often washing and againg the same in frosts, and sunshine, with good discretion, and burning the clothes of small value.

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
