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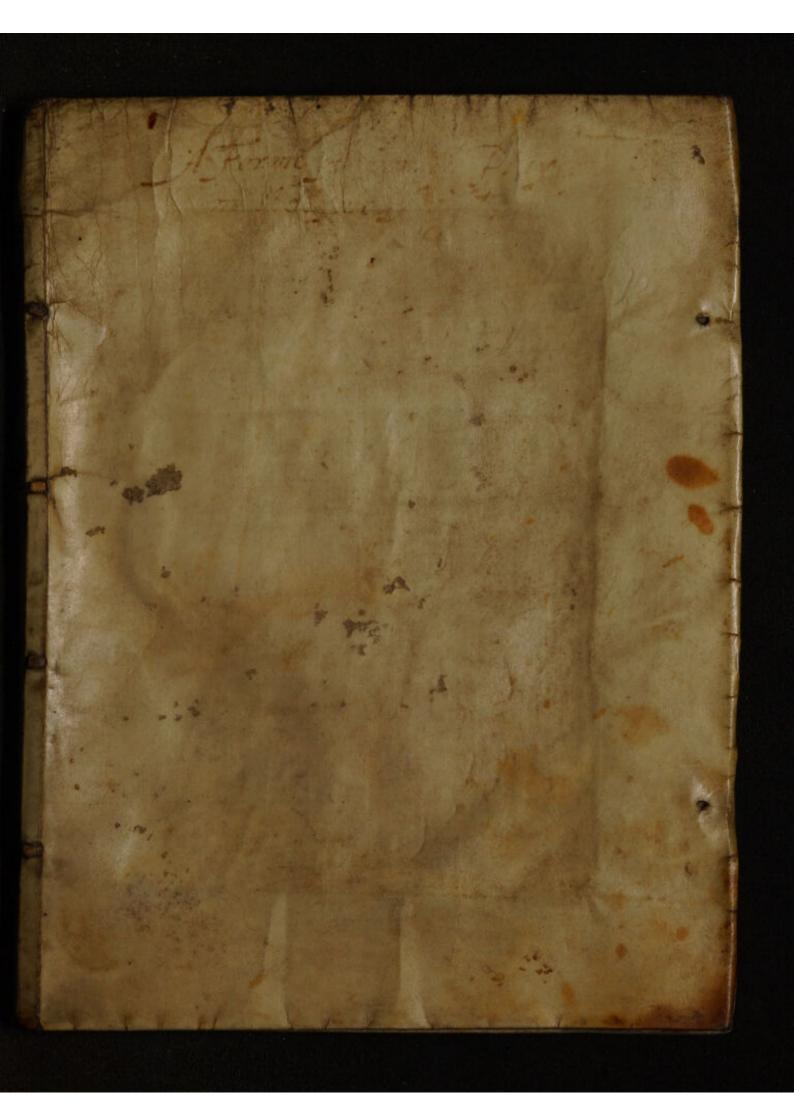
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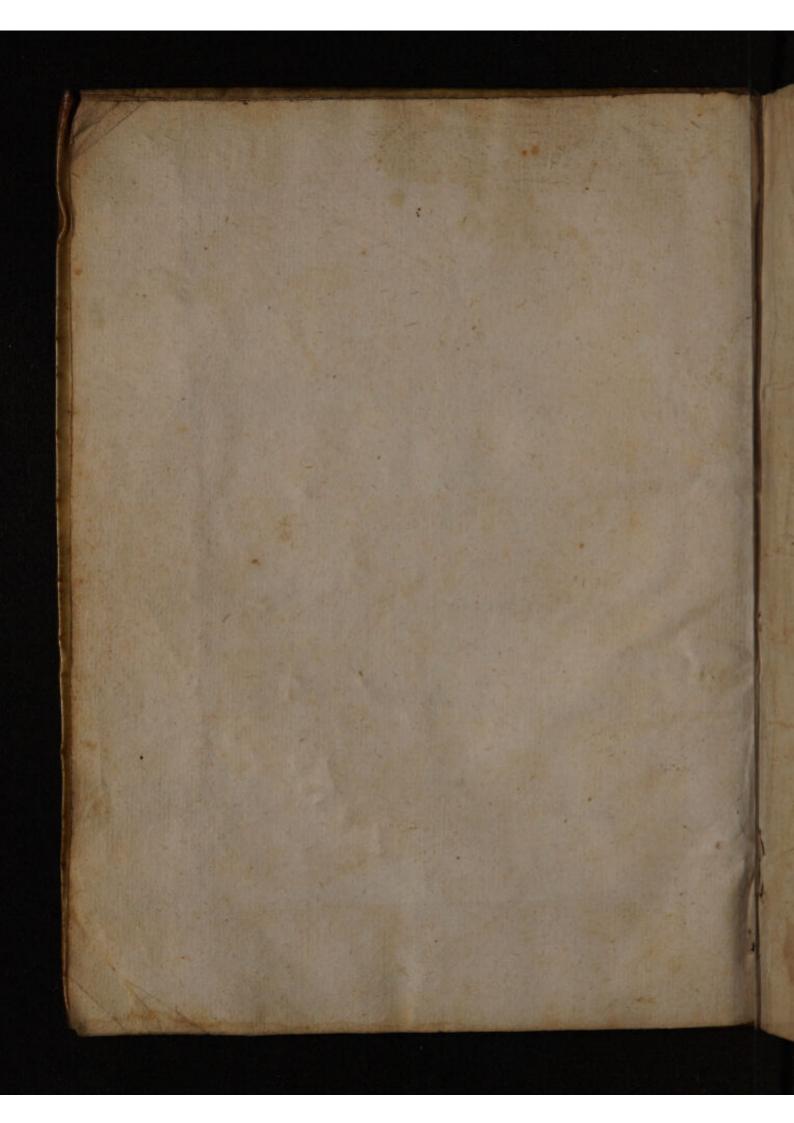

Ee be taught by many and fundry ex-Is amples of holy Scriptures, that vpon occasion of particular punishments, afmost just judgement hath sometimes flictions and perils, which God of his fent among his people, to shewe his wrath against finne, and to call them to repentance, and to the redresse of their lines, all men ought to be prouoked and stirred vp to more servencie and diligence in prayer, fasting and almes-deeds, to a more deepe consideration of their consciences, to ponder their vnthankefulnesse and forgetfulnesse of Gods mercifull benefits towards them, with crauing of pardon for the time past, and to aske his assistance for the time to come, to liue more godly, and fo to be defended and deliuered from all further perils and dangers. So king David 2. Sam. 24. 14. in the time of plague and pestilence which ensued vpon his vaine numbring of the people, prayed vnto God with wonderfull feruencie, confessing his fault, defiring God to spare the people, and rather to turne his ire to himward, who had chiefly offended in that transgression. The like was done by the vertuous kings, lofaphat and Ezechias, in their diffresse of warres 2.Chro.20.5. and forreine inuations. So did the King and people of 2. Reg. 19.1.

For the effectuall accomplishment whereof, it is thought meete that this order of Prayer following should at this time be published, being such as shall be

time be published, being such as shall be vsed by the Minister in the Church, and may by every man in his private family.

It all Pastours and Curates exhort their Parishioners to come to the Church, with so many of their families as may bee spared from their necessary businesse (hauing yet a provident respect in such assemblies to keepe the sicke from the whole in places where the Plague reigneth) and they to resort thicker, not onely on the Sundayes and Holy dayes: but also on Wednesdayes and Fridayes during the time of these present afflictions: exhorting them to behaue themselves there godly and reuerently, and with penitent hearts to pray vnto God to turne these Plagues from vs, which wee through our vnthankefulnes and sinfull life have deserved.

The name of Homilies by a mifunderstanding conceit, is not acceptable with many: and yet they are nothing else in effect, but Epistles or Declarations grounded upon the Word of God, to teach Christian men & women their duties to his Diuine Maiesty, how to beleeue, and what to practise: carefully and soundly written unto us by Apostolicall men, with the approbation of the Church. There is here set downe, agreeable to the time, a godly Exhortation or Epistle (as it may well bee termed) written unto you all here present, by such as are in authoritie, and doe loue you with an unfair med

ned loue in Christ Iesu, who intreat you by the mercies of God, that you will bee content and willing to heare, what for your good, vpon mature deliberation they doe write vnto you: not as of themselues, but in the blessed Name of the most glorious Trinitie: to whom they cease not to commend you all in their daily prayers.

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An Exhortation fit

A the due confideration of the

mortalitie and plague, where: with God at this time bath grieuoully vilited vs, two principall things are to bee looked into: first, what may bee the cause of this infectious difeate: then what cure, or remedy may be prouided to remoue, flap, or mitigate the spreading and the increase thereof. The Philosopher and Phylician doe alledge such na= turall causes as these: the infection of the avre, the corruption of the blood, and humors in the body of man: the contagion which the found party may receive from perfons, or places already infect ed: and all thefe are true in their kind. But over and above these causes alledged, the gra ue and weightie authority of the word of God multinforme by of another cause, a cause not naturall, but supernaturall: namely, the meath

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weath of God proudhed and incented by the fins of any Pation or people, hath often brought in the petitience, as the fword and scourge of God 1, Cor. 11. to destroy them, or chastenthem for their annes. The people of Itrael murmured against God in the wildernelle, and not regarding his louing care and providence over them (who fed them miraculoully with water out of the Rocke, and with Manna from Deauen) waped wanton in their delires, and required fielh also for their luft, which, though they obtained, yet not with stan= ding, while the meat was in their mouthes, the plaque of God fell byon them, and flew the wealthielt of them, and imote downe the cholen men that were in Ifrael, as you may read. Againe, Numb. rr. the multitude of the people of I frael taking part Pial 78.30. with those factious and seditious conspirators, Corah, Dathan and Abiram, murmured against Mofes and Aaron, and grudged against that their authority of Dagistracie and Priesthood where in God himselse had established them: where fore a plague came boon them, and there died 14700. Againe the same people of Israel com = Numb. 25. mutted whosedome with the daughters of Moab, which called them also to the facrifice of their gods; wherefore the wrath of the Lord was kindled against Israel, and there died in that plague 24000. Againe in the dapes of Ring Da- 2. Sam. 24. uid the weath of the Loed was kindled against 1. Chro.21, 1. Mrael, and Satan mooned David to number Ifraeland Juda:and the Lord fent a pestilence,

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among be in England not onely fuch as have despised gouernment, and spoken enill of those that are in authozitie: but fuch also as S. Paul 2. Tim. 3.4. prophetied of, that there should come in the latter dages traitors, heady, high minded, murmurers, malecontents, fault-finders, as S. Inde ca 'th them : The people of Irael cont = Iude 8. mitted whosedom with the daughters of Moab: and there are many of the daughters of England like those daughters of Moab, and too many Num 15. like buto Zimri whose fornications are notori= ous in the light of the world, not caving to conceale their abominations; and therefore no marueile, if God himfelfe stand forth to plaque the land forthem. Adde buto thefe, that haply with Dauid, wee have lifted bp our hearts in the multitude of our people, and magnified out 2. Sam. 24. selnes, that wee are a mightie and populous Pation, accribing buto our felues, and our owne Arength the honour, and victory over our enemies, which God with his owne right arme hath gotten buto himselfe for his glory. Adde moreover, that swearing, outragious pathes, and enried speakings are to bee heard out of the mouthes of all estates, yea, even of viry children in our freetes, whereby the name of God is very grienoully prophaned. Adde also that our trades and traffique is become the practife of desect, and theft, while wee make our gaine by lying, fortwearing, falle measure, false weights, and falle lights, which are an abomination: SD 3

nation buto the Lord. And therefore no marneile if that flying booke of the curte of God against the sweaver, and the thiefe, have entred into our houses, and taken holde of the stone, and timber thereof. Belides all thele, the Loids day is not kept holy, but polluted: the word of God and the ministery thereof is not reverenced, but despised: his holy Sacraments are either neglected, or abused : generally the name of God is enill spoken of among the aduersaries of the trueth through bs, and our distolute and li= centious connertation: a therefore the cause is apparent why the plague is broken in amongs vs: God having threatned vs in his word as the people of Afrael, that because wee will not obey the vorce of the Lord our God to doe all his Commandements, and his Didinances which he commands bs, hee will smite bs with a confumption, and with a feuer, and with a burning ague, and thall cause the pestilence to cleave buto by butill hee have consumed by from the land. And thus much of the caute of the vestilence.

Now let by examine and see what hope of helpe, what cure or remedie, remaineth but obs in this visitation. The remedie is to be sorted out answerable to the cause of the disease: so that if Gods anger against since both caused this mortalitie amongst by (as heretofore both beene shewed amongst other people) if wee shall remoque our sinnes out of the sight of God, his

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weath thail ceale, and with his weath our punishment. Hoz the applying of this foucraigne balme buto our present fore, there is by publike order prescribed, that falling and Praper, the true lignes and tokens of our butained repen= tance, and conversion buto God, Mould be erer= cifed in all Congregations: especially in and about London, that all degrees and estates of people might thereby be admonished to humble themselves under the mighty hand of God, to acknowledge their finnes, and by their humili= ation and detellation of their former wicked life, to testifie unto the world, that they delire nothing more then to bee reconciled agains to their good a gracious God, that bee may cause his indignation to cease, and turne away this his fearefull chastisement from among bs. And as fasting and prayer are meanes spirituall, appointed in the word of God, and alwayes practised in the Church of God at such times as hee afflicteth his people with any contagious diseafes or plagues for finne: So are there also other naturall and ordinary meanes not to bee neglected, but to be received and bled against the naturall causes of this infection. For though it bee true that all things are guided by Gods providence: and that he doth what hee will doe in heaven and in earth; pet hee effecteth and bringeth his will to palle by order a by meanes that himfelfe hath determined. The eres of all things looke by buto the Lord, and trusting in bim

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him he giveth them their meat in due feafon: but pet the Lord wil have all mento labour, and eate the labours of their hands, for the mainte nance of their life. It is the Lord that bringeth backe againe from the gates of death, and reffor reth men that were licke to their former health: and yet bath hee ordained the Philician, acreas ted many medicinable and comfortable things topzocure and preferue the health of man, and hath commanded by to ble them. Wen muft plant and water: though it be onely God that giueth the increase. If the husbandmen should give over their tillage, and pretend that they meant to depend byon Gods prouidence, loo: king either to be fed from heaven, orthat pearth mould of her owne accord bying foorth buto them graine and come, and all necessary fruits for their reliefe: were it not in respect of them. felnes extreame madnelle, and towards God a most wicked temptation? It cannot be denied, but that this grienous lickenelle which now reigneth amonalt vs, both is and shall be gouerned by Gods providence, do men what they lift: But pet fuch as truly feare God, are truely in: Aructed out of his word, wil submit themselves buto his heavenly providence in fuch fort as he hath appointed them. When good king Ezechiah was ticke of this difeate of the plague, as Dinines doe deliner, hee played and wipt, and bled those meanes meete to pacific the anger of God. And when God had determined that bee Mould

mould not die of that lichnelle: though he could no doubt have healed him without meanes by his word onely, pet hee directeth his Prophet to fignifie buto him the medicinable meanes of his helpe, namely, that he fould apply a plaiser of figures to his fore to ripen and heale it. 53 that we fee, first praper to God, and then the ble of other necessary and profitable meanes must not be neglected and gina so seeds it en

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Now if any man hould object or fay: this bis fitation commeth of God, and I know not whe ther. I may pray against it, he bewrayeth great. lyhisignozance in the Scriptures of God. Foz in every vilitation of this, or any other plague there mentioned, you hall find that the holy men of God ftill laboured by prayer and supplis cation buto God to remove the came from them: selues and their people. Moyses is said to haue Num. 16. Good in the gappe to turne away the weath of God, and Aaron ranne with his golden cenfer to Pfal. 106. stand bet weenethe living and the dead, and Phinees the Priest stood bp and praged, and the plague ceafed. David feeing the Angetready to 2. Sam. 24 destroy Jerulatem, built an Altar, offered facris fice, and brake foorth into that his most ardent, and earnest supplication for the people.

Againe, because in this great mortality of ours, we find by experience, that not so much any generall corruption of the aire, nor any diftemperature in the blood, or humors of mens vodies have beene the causes of the spreading

and continuing of this infection, as the contact gion that the difeate it felfe hath bred, a which one man receiveth from another, the found from those that are liche: Therefore aifo men are to learne that one chiefe a ordinary meane of their preferuation in this dangerous time is, the autoyding of the contagion that commeth by mingling diforderly the found, and the liche together. And if there be any that being pet found doe thinks they are not bound in confcience to fourne and auoide the perfons and places that are infected, except it be in case of necestitie: 02 if those that are diseased, or doe keepe in houses where the difeate is knowen to be, thall thinke much that they are thut by, and refrained from comming abroad, or frequenting the common and publique affemblies of those that are cleare, bauing in the meane time fuch things as are necessary for their fustentation: They must bee content to heare out of the word of God their er= rour therein and ignozance. The difeate of the leprolie was infectious as is the pestilence, and be mie? whenforuer any were imitten with that difeate, it was not furely without the will or proutdence of Bod: and yet we may lafely learne even of God himselfe without any prejudice to his good providence, how wee ought in that and other kinde of infectious maladies to demeane our felues for the anopding of the damage ther. of. The Leper (faith the Lord in the 13. Chap= ter of Leuiticus,) in whom the plaguets, mall naue

hatte his clothes rent, and his head bare, and shall put a covering byon his lips, and shall cry: I am unclease, I am unclease. And as long as this disease shall be byon him, hee shall dwell alone; without the campe shall his habitation bee, The renting of his clothes here mentioned was a signe of his mourning and lamentation for that affliction: he dwelt alone for seare of infecting others; and if at any time he went abroad to take the aire, his sippes were covered, that his breath might not infect such as came neere him: And besides he was to give warning, that all men might the more carefully anoybe him by crying out but them, I am unclease, I am unclease.

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furthermozeit was ordered by the Lord, that the cloathes that were infected should be burnt, thehouses purged, and in some cases of moze danger of infection pulled downe and btterly defaced: In which respect, there was a generall commandement given to the people, That they mould take beed of the plague of the Lepzolie. All these and divers other rules and cautions preferibed by God himfelfe, were chiefly grouns ded byon this, Ehat the difeate of the lepiolic was infectious. Whereby wee are to leavne, that foratmuch as the disease of the plague is farre more infectious, contagious, and dangerous, then that was of the isprofie; wee thould be connich the more carefull to anoid it: and fuch as are infected, more charitably minded, and res ligiousy

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Michael butter the hand of God, then disobeying all authority, to thrust themselves into the company of others, whereby the moz= talitie daily to increaseth. And if any man Mould thinke that the difease of the plague were not contagious and infectious, fo groffe a conteit is rather to be pittied, then confuted, being contrary to the common and lamentable expevience of thefe times, and contrary to the indgement of all learned and wife men in all ages. If therfore we delire that Almighty God hould withdraw his heavie hand from bs, and deliver bs from this affliction, it is not fufficient for bs by fatting and prayer, to humble our felues bu= to his divine Daielty, except wee iowne theres with our best endeanours and diffence, by vling fuch other meanes as God hath appoint ted for the staying ofit. Dtherwise, if we despise all good meanes: if wee neither regard to keepe our felues in a good estate of our bodily health by the countell of the learned Phytician : if wee make a mocke of all prefernatines of art: if we neglect all euitl and infectious lauours, and refuse the benefit of the purer agge: if wee run des sperately and disorderly into all places and as mongst all persons, and pretend our faithand trutt in Gods prouidence, faying: If hee will faue me, he will faue me : and if I die, I die. This is not faith in God, bur a groffe, ignozant, and foolehardie presidence and presumption. little different from that subtill temptation of Sathanto our

four Saucour Christ, to throw himselfe headlong from the toppe of the pinacle, in hope that God would send his Angels to holde him by, which were a wanton and dangerous tempting of God: or else with Saint Peter, to lead himselfe into temptation, and by desiring to walke on the water, to bring his life into a needlesse and bunecestary hazard and perill without any warrant of an ordinary calling, or any comfort

of a good conference therein.

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Moreouer, if men at any time will prepare themselves to death, then sould they especially when they are in the greatest danger, as they are who are already infected, or doe without by= gent cause resort buto them. Pow in preparing our selues to leane this world, what one thing almost is more necessary then a charitable heart towards all men, which they cannot have by any possible meanes, who either knowing them= felues to bee infected doe keepe company with fuch as are cleare; or that being whole, doe en= ter without any necessity into places infected, and afterwards refort into all companies, as if they were fure that neither they themselves noz their clothes were tainted. when king Azariali became a leper, because hee knew the danger of his difease, and found by the Law of God the restraint of those that were so diseased, though a King, yet was hee content to dwell in an house apart all the dayes of his life, and Iothan his come gouerned in his stead. This his obedie ence

ence mult needs condemne their difordered licent tiousnesse, whothough the meanest among the people, yet being infected thinke fcome to keepe their houses, though but for a short time; and breake abroad they will whatformer come of it, no authority, orders, lawes or proclamations can reftraine them: and others there are as wil= full to affociate and mingle themselves with them. Wherein, how cruell the one fort are as gainst themselves in hazarding their own lives and theirs that depend on them; how bucharis table the other fort are towards their brethren, by derining their infection into them, and how iniurious both forts are to the flate and com= mon wealth wherein they line, by prolonging and spreading the danger, which otherwise by their better gouernment might bee fooner fup= prest, all wife men of found judgement are bery fory either to fee, or heareit.

spokentendeth to this end, To shew that our sinnes have caused this searchest Usification to breake foorth against bs; and that the remedy lest but o bs for our hope of helpe herein, is our speedy repentance, with prayer and fasting, together also with the good vie of ordinarie meanes, and the wary and carefull cariage of our selves out of the danger of contagion: let by bee truely wise, and demeane our selves in this time of our triall, as those that make good vie of Gods corrections: let by neither nur-

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mure not grudge against the will of God, not take impatiently what our simes have deferued, and God in his fatherly care hath inflicted byon by for our amendment: let by not now adde finne buto finne, but forasmuch as the des sperate security of those that seems neither to feare, noz to flie from this infection, is but a tempting and prottoking of the judgement of God: feeing it may bee an hinderance buto the fruit of the prayers, and falling of the Church, which be they never so strict and realous, mall hardly procure a release of this burden of God, if wilfull and intemperate spirits will not bee kept in order : feeing fuch their buruly licenti= outnes extendeth it felfe to the breach of all charity, a bringeth bpon their owne heads no leffe then the quilt of wilfull murder both of them= felues, their children, their families, and neighbours, which hatefull cruelty against their own kind, Turkes and infidels would abhorre : feeing it procureth also a publike and manifest des triment to the State, and places where thep dwell, by hindering their traffiche, and imponerishing their neighbours in their trades and occupations: let men at the last be warned, and if there be any feare of God, any obedience to his word, any conscience of the Magistrates authority, any fruits of our faith and Chaiftian profession, whose badge and cognizance is mutuall love and charity, to further and procure the common good of all : let ba not goe for ward to tempt

and so harmefull to others: let by be moze humble in the day of our affliction, submitting our
selves to those good and wholesome orders, and
decrees already published for preventing the
further infection of this our calamity, and making account of all good meanes, and medicinable helpe made knowne buto by for our better
preservation: least we may seeme to mocke God
by prayer and sating, to begge a mitigation of
this his irefull chastisement, and yet wee frame
our actions contrary and opposite to the suc-

celle we pray for.

And among all other things vet Cooken of, let this one aduice bee added without offence bnto any; That though it be a Christian and laudable custome to accompany the bodies of the dead buto the grave, and commend them in decent manner buto their reft : pet, feeing the end of fuch allemblies as are then gathered together is, by the ble of Prayer and the word preached rather to give comfort bnto the lining, then any benefit buto the dead; let men be aduised, perfwaded, and content, that their dead fould bee buried with no more company then is needfull for the interring and laying them by in the earth, because the gathering together of friends and neighbourg in to common a contagion cannot bee without prefent danger, and hazard of their health and lives: and it is verely thought that infection by this meanes of meeting hath enfued



my of those families which have beene, and are pet bilited, being of the poster fort. Co whose affliction, if you thall adde affliction, and fuffer them to want meanes of ordinary fullentation. alas, what wall become of them, feeing wecestity knoweth no law, and want and hunger breake stone walles! In which case of neede they will breake forth for the fuccor of their lives, though with never so much danger to themselves, or others. wherefore it thall well beforme those that are rich, and able to thew their fellow-feeling of their brethrens necessitie; it shall well become the mifery of the time for men to bee fruitfull in good workes, whereby their Chailte an duetie may bee testified buto God and men. and it thall well agree also with the exercise of falling and Player now in hand, that in every affembly gathered together to that end, there be a collection made of the beneuolence of the people, to bee faithfully and truely distributed by those that are put in trust, buto the poore but bp, and vilited with this affliction. So hall your Papers, falling and Almefdeedes, as the incense, and odours of the faithfull, qualifie the Gench and corcuption of our linnes, and as facrifices where with God is well pleased, being made acceptable in that I weete finelling fauour of our Saujour Thrill his intercession, thall mitigate the weath of God and turneaway this his indignation from bs, reflozing bs againe to his wonted favour, and our former health and fafety:

- 3 The quantitie being but sufficient, it is not fit that any delicacie should bee regarded. Let no publike order bee contemned herein, nor dissimulation with God committed, pretending godly abstinence, but doing nothing lesse.
- 4 The wealthier fort are earnestly to be mooued to bestow the price of the meale forborne, vpon the poore, considering the miserie and distresse of a number of hungry soules, either almost starting for lacke of foode, or being sicke with eating vn wholesome meates.
- The people are to bee warned to forbeare this day their bodily working, and common buying and felling (necessary occasions and labourers excepted) and to be exercised all the time in holy prayer, godly Meditations, and reverend hearing of the Scriptures, either read or preached. And especially they are to take heede that they spend it not in playes, passimes, idlenesse, haunting of Tauernes, lascinious wantonnesse, surfeiting and drunkennesse: for which sinnesse (the proper sinness of our Nation) the heavier displeasant warth of God is fallen vpon vs.
- 6 Admonition is here lastly to bee given, that on the

the said Fasting day there be but one Sermon at Morning prayer, and the same not about an hours long, and but one at Euening prayer of the same length, to auoyde the inconvenience that may grow by the abuse of Fasting: Some esteeming it a meritorious worke: others a good worke, and of it selfe acceptable to God without due regard of the end: others presuming factiously to enter into publike Fasts without the consent of Authoritie, and others keeping the people together with overmuch wearinesse and tediousnesse a whole day together; which in this time of contagion is very dangerous, in so thicke and close assemblies of the multitudes. God give vs grace to repent, and in his mercie turne away his punishment from vs. Amen.
