Good and true Chy2argian, is no other the a minister and helper of nature; who hath three operations to perform, in curing of wounds; the first is that be foin the les parated parts close together : the second, to preferve it from pain; the third, that he

kep it from putrifaction: all the reft he may leave unto nature, which will work with good expedition. And this is a fure intention concerning the cure of wounds: never kep the fielh open with tents or pledgets neither weaks on nature by letting of blod, or by purging nor yet by firait diet to caufe the pain to increase but kep the would always clean wathing it with aqua baliami and lay upon the wound, cloaths wet in magno licore. This is a god and an approved order : whereof wholosber will know more let him lok in Leonardo Fioravante his book, of Ras tional Scales, where he thall be fatisfied more at large.

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CHAP. II. The cure of all manner of wounds in generalf.

All kind of wounds, may be healed with these medi-Acines following (accepting to the method before mentioned) viz. with cur ballamo, with Aqua ballami, balfamum artificiale, buintaeflentia vini, oleum refinæ pini, oleum ceræ & terebinthinæ, magno licore, cerotum magistrale, elixir vitæ, oleum hypericonis compositum, flos unguentorum, and Paracelfis,

CHAP. III.

The caufe why wounds cannot heal quickly.

T Hough there be many moze, yet chiefly they may be reduced unto two caules. The one is an immoderate and extream diet, which weakneth the Armack and body to much, that nature cannot prevail to conglutinate or lover the fielh together. And thus through want of naturall heat, the wound falleth to impoflumation, Gangrena, fiftulaes, &c. and can hardly be cured. The fecond is the keping of them to much open, by realon of their tents or pledgets, fo that they cannot foin tegether again, but grow to Cancers, and fiftulaes, whereupo many times the patient remaineth lame ever after, or elfe specy death is the end thereof.

CHAP.IIII.

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Of wounds in the head, how they must be dealt withall,

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A together, the bloud must be close joined & kept together, the bloud must be crushed out, then wash it wel, w some thing that hath virtue to liquifie the blod, as the Quintaess of wine, of such like. Then lay thereon lint, wet in olcum benedictum: this medic in you that chan in four days, but every day once wash the wound round about with that Quintaesence, and anoint with the faid oil,

oil, and at the fourth days end dreffe it again, and let it remain two days more and after that for a day more, and the wound (by the help of God) that be cured in ris or risis days. Thus may you deal with all wounds fave those that are made in the belly. As for all other, either timple or compound wounds: you that find their cure, methodically thewed, in the Rational iecrets of Leonardo Fioravance publithed in Englith.

CHAP. V.

The healing of a grievous wound on the fide of the head.

The wound was made on the fide of the head, almost to dura mater: but it was healed in this maner. first there was put into the fame the Quintaeffence aforefaid, then a little ballamo, then there was applied a cloath which was wet in magno licore, made very bot, upo which cloth was laid our fecret powder, covered with lint, and thus he was dreffed once every day, till he was whole. You must note, that whenfoever the feull is hurt unto dura mater, there must be call up at § nofethails our balfamo: that the fmell may pierce upward, and refolve the offence. Sometime also instead of a defensative you may anoint round about the wound, with the forefaid balm, which preferveth from putrifaction and alteration.

CHAP. VI.

A dangerous wound in the head cured in five days.

I E was healed very quickly by putting therein our A. qua exlectis and ballamo, and by applying uto the fame very hot cloths wet in magno licore.

CHAP, VII. The cure of a wound on the ear to the scull.

Certain miller in Buckinghamshire calles Peter Bull, . being fore wounded in the head, whereof one wound was in the midit of the head with fracture of the fcul, an other within an inch of that, fir inches long, he had an s. ther wound over his eve brow, two inches long; befides the wounds in his head he had also a great wound in the bow of his arm, beids the etbow to that a man might. have laid his three fingers in it, divers of his fingers were allo cut, a he loft two joints: This man bled by the space of 7 02 8 hours befoze it was Ainted: neither was he dreffed untill the nert day, but yet he was cured in this manner : first the hair was thaven away, round a. bout the wounds on his head, and the wounds were made clean, then was there dropped into the wound balfamum fulturis, made bery warm : and a fine cloath wet therein luas applied to the wounds, and round about the wounds there was a defensative applied : thus he was dieffed once in 24 hours and within the space of three weeks, he was perfectly belped, that he bid wear no pleifter at all; allo you thall note, that upon the wound next the cloath, there was laid ceroum magilirale: forget not that this bals fome be always used warm, with a fine linnen cloath og a peece of Cambrick, and not with any lint; this bal. fome did caule the hair to grow fo fall about the woulds, that it was fain to be haved away very often.

H that will cure wounds, that are made with thot, lance, arcows, &c, must first wath the wound well with urin, and day the wound wel, then let him put theres in the Quintaeff. of wine, and foothwith join the wound close and hard together. Then let him put immediately therein, fibe of fir drops of our ballamo artific, and lay a cleath upon the wound, wet in magno licore, which must be applied to bot as he may fuffer it; thus must be do the first day. CHAP, XL.

Three deep Fistulaes in the breast, cured by W. T.

Dere was a certain man called R. B. dwelling in London, which having the deep fillulaes in his break had been long under the hand of unskilfull Chyrargians confuming both himfelf and his fubstance: but afterward by Bods help, he using this course was cared. First he was purged every second of third day, for 5 or 6 bayestogether, with Turpetum minerale Phædronis, receibing thereof fibe of fir grains in Amuletum Palmarij. Afterward he was caused to sweat fibe of fir times with this potion following.

Take the diffilled water of lignum vix two ounces, falis ejusdem 1 scruple, water of Carduus benedictus 2 suns ces, which being mired he drank it warm in the morning, and sweat thereon two hours. After he was purged, he dressed the fiftulaes two hours with this unguent untill they were mundified) upon tents of those leather. When the fiftulaes were cleansed, he dressed them onely with Emplastum Fodicationis (being made liquid, to wrap up the tent with) till they were whole.

The mundificative ointment was this.

Lake oil of war, of luccinum, of guaiacum, oleum hypeconis compositum, of each 2 sunces, mir them without fire and use it with the afosesaid tents. Also you hall note, that he drank no other drink then this, all the while. Take lignum virz, the bark, falfapatika of each 4 cunces, 20 the

A Tertaine maiden firten yeares old, had all the fleth on her thumb, and fozefinger eaten away, with the fozefaid difeale: which was cured by frawing thereon, faccanum Saturni, and applying therete Cerotum magifirale Fioravante.

CHAP, XLII.

Ope that was troubled with a great wen, had it take away, by washing it with a great wen, had it take ashes. I have been told since of a certain, that if ye cub the Usen often with the hand of a dead man, untill the Usen war hot, it will confume away in thost time after. CHAP. XLIII.

TAke three or four pound of butter freih from the Cherm, without any falt, fet it on a fewembers either

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either in an earthern of Alber pot, and let it clarifie uns till it be clean, sham off the top and your it into an earthen pat and put to it as much of the flowers of elders vicked from the stalks, and of the green frelh leaves, and of the inner grien bark, the ruffet outlide being fcras ped off, of elder and barkes of each a third part, fo that there be two parts of leaves and barks, and one of flowers, chop the leaves and barks reasonable small, put them all into the clarified butter, and fet it on fome embers and let it fteld foftly a good part of a day, there mult be as many hearbs as will go into the butter, it muft be bery green, if once boing will not ferbe pou muft Do it twice, when the hearbs grow hard in the butter, then they are boiled enough, when it is almost cold, you mult put in two presty sponfuls of fine fearced fugar, and fir it well together ; if the fugar be put in, befoge it be somewhat cold. it will fick to the bottome and fo bo no good, kep this in glalles of pots for your ule, for the piles lag a little lump upon a bouble rag, and apply it to the place.

CHAP, XLIIII.

The making of a most excellent Searcloath or Plaister.

1. Barber, aged about fifty, by an old bauife had bis leg tanckled. and a tumo: fallen bown into it, whereby the field was eaten away to the bone, and was cared with the applying this Plaiffer or Searcloath.

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fath it to thicken it again, and then abde a little more sil again, and fill let it feeth upon a very foft fire, fire ring it continually with a filver og braffe fpon, and fo feed it Afll with oil, untill it come unto the perfection of a falve, which you thall know by the wetting of the end of a white linnen rag in it, and taking it out till it be cold for when you perceive by the rag to bipped, being cold ; that it feelethoily and wet, then by that you may know that it is not yet come to perfection, and therefore your must let it boil more till it come to a better perfection; ever and anon trying the cloth in it, which cloth you may afterward make a Gearcloath of, it must not be any hard cloath but loft, it will be fomewhat above half an hour in bsiling and it must be always firred and when it is boi. led to the perfection; dip your cloths throughly in it, and to take them up and let them col. and then role them up together, and way them up in lether made of the ps skin let the lether be white it will keep good fo 7 years, if you key it close, and if it grow day anoint it over with a feas ther dipped in fallet oil. when you apply this fear clath to any wound of fore, warm the fearcloth before you lay it to it, and put fo much white leather one the back five thereof, as you put fear cloth, and fo when the one five is woon long, you may use the other fide to it, if the fores be many, and do fand close together, cut little pieces of the learcloth and lay them upon each lose, and then lay a big piece offear.cloth over them all, but let not the great piece be bigger then to cover the lozes, ercept the lozes have much fivelling about it, and in that cale let it be bigger, the wound must be dreffed morning and evens ing with the same sear cloath, onely every time it is dreffed wipe the corruption off from the fear-cloath, which it hath draten from the lose, and fo lay it one as gain, if the wound be rotten and finking, you may change the letter plaitters which are next the fozes once a week, but other wife you may continue to use the fame a fortnight or better, but Ail at every dreffing cleanse the filth

Alth off from them, it wil take away the rottennesse, and draw out the filth and heal it, but it wil not heal it till it have fully cleansed and drawn out the corruption, neither will it suffer any proud field to grow therein.

The rare effects which have been wrought by this plaister is hardly to be expressed, and after good prof thereof Pr. Cradock of Cambridge, gave 8 pounds for the Receipt.

Thus much briefly, is expressed and declared concerning wounds and ulcers : wherefoever they be, or howfoever they arile, by which examples, the juditious practioner may undertake other things, which are not here mentioned. It followeth now (in manner aforefaid) to fet down the observed practites of those that have cured internall difeafes, which have taken effect and brought forth syntoms, outwardly of inwardly.

Peftilent feavers with great thirft, cured by I. H.

First they were purged once of twice with Aromatico Leonardo: then was the stomack comfosted with some pedosall potton. That being done, there was Barley. water

water made with raifins, liquozice, and cool herbs. Then frain it clean, and put therein as much oleum vitrioli, as will make it tart like a Pomgranate, Dzink thereof when you are a dzy foz it comfozteth nature, allwageth heat and thirlt wonderfully, openeth al oblicuations, and befendeth the body from putrified feavers. If they be grieved with the head ach, you thall canfe them to be let bloud under the tongue, cutting those beins overthwart, and they thall prefently be cured.

CHAP.LXXXV.

Against Poison, or the Pestilence, a diaphoreticall potion, by W. T.

Take Mirchæ, croci, of each two ounces, Amuleti Palmarij, one ounce, Spiritus Vini one pound, oleum piperis, oleum Gingiberis, of each one dram, mir them in a glaffe, and give thereof half an ounce in old Sack at once, as gainst the pestilence or poilsn.

Signs of death in the Plague, by W. K.

TAke a live Frog, and lay it next the sozeris the party will escape the Frog will burk in a quarter of an hour. Then lay on another, and this you shall do, till no more do burk for they draw forth the benome. I have been told that a dried toad, wil in better sort do the same. If none of the Frogs do burk, the party will not escape, this bath been often proved.

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CHAP. LXXXVIL

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Antidotes, and prefervatives against infectious airs on the water or land, by W.T.

You thall use to chew or bold in your mouth, a little of Effencia Angelice. Allo it won'd be very profitable to drink three or four drops of the fame falling. Allo Oleum Camphoræ, being drunk effecteth the fame. In like manner Aqua Baliami Fioravante, if it be drunk in the morning with wine, or Allome, preferbeth a man from ull poilon and peltilent airs: and is a melt fingular remedy against furfeits or the pestilence. Alfo, if you be in any infected thip or house, it were necessary to wear a bag of Saffron under your armespits to befend the heart.

Allo it were very necellary to dink two of three dops. of the effence of Saffron, for the fame purpole.

Amuletum Palmarij is also very excellent, being taken in the mouning falling.

Diffolved Pearl, eaten of drunk, defendeth the heart, purifieth the bloud, and reviveth the spirits above all other things. Dou may make it in lozings. or drink it in ang cordiall, what quantity you please.

Take unguentum album camphora tum, two ounces, faccarum Saturni two dams, and make thereof an ointment.

Also you thall anoint the reins, and other grieved parts with the unguent mentioned in the Chapter afogesaid.

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in Red. Wine, is very profitable for the Kopping of the Flux.

Take conferbe of red Rofes, Marmilet of Auinces, electnary of Sulphur, of each two ounces, Amulecum Palmarij half an ounce, effencia croci, Laudanum nostrum, of each half a scruple, aquæ preservantis half an ounce, oleum vitrioli, & sulfuris of each half a scruple, mir them, and take thereos one dram, morning and evening.

CHAP; XCI.

The cure of the Hemenhoids or Piles, performed, by I. H. and many others,

TAke Mullen, and fry it with Butter, and therewith anoint the part divers times.

The oil of Eggs is a notable remedy to withdraw the laid infirmity.

Baifamum fulfuris anointed upon them, doth with great. (peed and good fucceffe, cure them: this allo hath been oftentimes proved very ercellent.

If they be anointed with oleum Tartari fætens, if drieth them up in thoat time : but firt, it were necessary so purge the body of the meianchollick original of that difsale, both by bomit and flege.

A very melanchelick maiden, was cured in this mannet.

CHAP. XCIII.

Suffocation and pains of the Matrix, with retentation of menstrues, cured by .I.P.

Take extract. Drionx, one dram and a half, the leaves of Sena half an ounce, Ginger one foruple, Cinamon, one dram, Dugar one ounce, lay them to infuse one night in a pint of warm whey, made of Goats milb. Then firein it, and drink thereof three mornings warm, about the new Hoon; keeping a warm and drying diet, your wine must be infused with Rosemary, sowers,

Eake the flowers of buds of a Walnut free in May. give the patients as much thereof to daink as will lie on a groat, and with two of three boles they thall be cured.

Allo if you give one fcruple of oleum fuccinum album, in wine, it will prefently cure the fame difeate, a thing ofe tentimes proved with good fuccests.

The bole hereof, is from half a fcruple to a whole fcruple and may be very lafely administred, without perill, 1.0. 0.43

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to any age of lere: upon good occasions, and at times convenient, after that the body is prepared for the same purpose.

I shall now proceed in order to speak of leverall other griefs and discases, incident to mans body, and shew you the cure thereof, according to the rules and practife of the most excellent expert Philosophical Physicians and Chyrurgians, beginning first with the head.

Pow of the cure of this difeale, as it hath been er. perimented, an infinite number of times : which way foever the caufe cometh, work thou after this manner, and thou thalt never want credit, in giving others eale and curing thy felf.

Taken the pain in the head is confirmed, and that thou canft and no help by common Deosick of Pradick, do these

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these things following. Kirst let them bloud on Leonichie, cutting it overthwart, and let the patient spat as much as he can. Then the next morning, let them take Aromatico fasting. The next day let the head be spaten, and lay thereon an attractive plaister, to draw out the humidity. In the end cause them to next and hereby all the pain in the head will cease.

CHAP. XCVI.

Then Arein it and put thersunto Quintaessence solutive, and keep it close in a glasse, let the patient drink thereof, every morning 3 ounces luke warm, for twenty bags together: let him eat good neurithing meats, for they agree well with his difease. If the patient be not too far spent you that see your sure performed in thost time: in the mean time, if the pastient be weak, you that give him new laid eggs, and good white wine. If the humidity be perceived not is be outes

quite expelled & ebacuated, then give him Aromatico: afterward comfort him again, with reftspatives and corbials. to make him firong, and no doubt by the help of God he shall be cured. 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CHAP. CII.

The description and manifold cures, of the disease called Scrophulæ, or forunculi, which some do call waxing kernels, but rather the Kings. Evill.

"De Scrophula og waring kernels (fo called of fome) which use to come in the threat.or other parts of the bodies of young chilozen, bo artife and are caufed of great quantity of melancholly humo28, because that both for the molt part raign in perions that are weak of complexi. on. For you may eatily fie that fuch as are bered with that infirmity : are not very quick spirited. These Scrophulæ, are a long time, ere they will come to faps puration: and before they break and when they are broken, they caule excellive pain and are hard to be cured. For all infirmities that come of melancholly, are trous blefom to cure og refolde, as you may fe in the quartain and such like. But here I wil thew thee a fecret to cure & Scrophulæ, firft you muft remove the caule, then work the offed : fogotherwife it were impossible to cure them with outward medicines This melancholly is purged. with the brink following against melancholly, which you must ule three weeks og a moneth. That done, gibe them Aromatico, which cleanseth the head and ftomack, varifieth the bloud. As touching locall medicines, lay to the place a plaister of ware and butter, and anoint it with magno licere, untill the escare be fallen out : and when it is mundified, apply thereon the cerote of Gualtifredo di Med, and ale no other medicine, foz it will in, carnate, and cicatrile without lcare.

Due W. R. owelling in Cheap-five London, at eightien years old had the Kings. Evill in a very great meafure, and was throughly cured by this medicine following after he had been twice touched by the late King, and spent very much money on Doctors, and found not any help.

Take the roots of Scrophilaria, otherwife called Brown-worts, the cots of Daphin, the roots of Wileworth, of each clean walkes and picked two ounces, of the leaves of Brown worts, of hearb Robert, of Egri. mony of each three hanofulls, of Dugwoot, and Smal, age of each two handfulls, of Scurby graffe, four hand, fulls, of Mattericreffes, and Homeikadilindeaves, of each two handfulls, of the roots of Hogie Is with, one ounce and a half, of Taraway feeds, and formel febs, of each an ounce, thed the hearbs and roots finall, then tun to all this (being put into a large boulter bag) four oz five gallons of new dzink of a reasonable frength. ready to work, having wrought ftop it up close, being fir og feben dags old, then dgink of this continually fog a whole year or more, and let it be your continual brink. and purge once a week with pulvis fæma montagin: two Drams, and Cremor Tartarij, two frue fcruples for a bole, in a draught of Dacesale boiled with currance, let your hearbs and roots be gathered in Summer to D20 cleanly, and keep them for all the year bay, keep to the place a discentent og diffolding plaister, and obferbe a good dief.

Another cure for the Kings-Evill,

A Certain young boy of 14 years, of complexion chol, lerick and melanchollick, who had Scrophulæ in his throat, on both the fides, was thus cured, The first medicins

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cine that he took was the infusion of Khabarb, with the trochisks of Agarick, and acetum squillicicum, and water of maidenhair mired together, which he used by the space of ten days. Then was laid u pon the Scrophulæ a plaister of cerotum magistrale with Cantarides, which doew footh the malignity of the user, and great store of Sanies besing applied for fiften days together. This done, I gave him the decession of Salfaparilla, with a good diet, for twenty days together. Then I applied unto the sore a cerote of Gualdfredo di Medi, which in a store time cured him, that had been bered with them four years before.

Another for the fame,

Another which was a maid of thirteen gdares of age, was vered with Scrophulæ in her throat. which was also in this manner cured. First I gave her the extract of Ellebonus niger, w Mel rolarum; which both very effectually purge the melächoly humor. That done I gave her our firrup against the melancholly humour, for eight or ten days together; and applied unto the lores an unguent of Lytarge, boiled with the powder of Scrophularia.; thus was the in thost time cured-

Another for the fame.

Take Terdigreale. Pelitory of Spain, Dock. root, the suice of læks, of the herb Scrophularia, of each alike quantity, mire them, and lay on lint, and apply it unto the Scrophulx, but take some care thereof.

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Chap. 103.

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CHAP, CIII.

Of Payaricium, or Pavaricies, called the whit-blow.

" His grievous and intollerable malady (as those know well that have felt them) cometh on the end of the finger; and is an infirmity beed in the liver, wherea of nature being willing to bischarge ber felf, fendeth it to the ertream parts of the fingers : and most commonly it cometh to the finger next the thumb, but seldome in the other. The reason of caule whereof is hidden, sabe that we may conjecture (as we have faid befoge) an ac. cident in the liver, which nature lendeth forth unto thole parts to eafe herfelf. Withen it cometh to the end of the finger, that it can go no further ; it cauleth a harp and erceffibe pain : and the accident coming unto that place, not having pallage, is to bot, that in thost time it pas triffeth the fine ws, muscles, and cartilages, and in the end rotteth both flech and bone. The fecret of this grief is not commonly known of the most Surgeons : who with all their learning, cannot bebile to cure it, as it ought to be cured. The molt part of fuch as have that infirmir ty, lose their finger: but if thou wilt quickly help them follow this method.

First let them bleed on the liver vein : then let them be well purged. Afterward dzelle the finger with oleum fulfuris : which will cause some pain, neverthelesse(to have some ease) you must abide it. The next day dzelle it with magno licore, untill it be whole, which will be in short time, as I have often proved.

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CHAP, CIIII.

Of grievous V leers in womens breafts.

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First they must be teuched with oleum fulfuris : then make this unquent. Take of the yolks of eggs, two ounces, Turpentine, Butter, Barley-flower, Honey of Roles, of each half an ounce: incorporate them all in a morter, and therewith dreffs them untill they be whole. But if they come of any kind or spice of the foul difeals, this unquent will be to very small purpole. But then thall you dreffe them with Vnguento magno: which is appropriate unto the difeale, and look that you purge them with Aromanico.

CHAP.CV.

Of the discase called Asthma, or Tylick, and the cure thereof.

T his difeale, which is called the Tylick, is a certain infirmity, contained in the lungs, which ooth harden and day them in fuch manner, that fuch as are troubled therewith, cannot fetch their breath. It proceedeth of as outtion of the bloud, that cannot run in the beins : and fo the lungs lacking fullenance, worketh that effed. This difeale is cured four manner of ways. First you thall let them bloud under the tongue, cutting those beins overs thwart, and fuck them as much as they can: fog it spacus atety and openeth the opilation of the bloud, and eafeth the lungs of all that evill matter which offendeth. Ses condly, you thall give them a dole of Aromatico, which evacuatety the Aomask, of all evill qualities that of fend the lungs. The third is, to let them eat fog a mos neth together, every mouning one ounce of Electuario de Althea. The fourth, to anoint the flomack, every night with

Y Du thall give the patient two ounces of unguento magno, to drink with Mel rotarum, three mornings together, anoint the nosethrils therewith, and in three days they will be expelled, were they never fo many.

Take of the powder of Tentuary leaves one ounce, powder of Sena of Alex. half an sunce. Wogmfeed fines is beaten one sunce : then take of god Halmley, a quars ter of a pint of better, of the belt Honey two sunces, diffolve the Honey in the Mine with a gentle heat, and then put in all the powders, and Kir it well together, which done put it into a clean bladder : knit it close and hang it in the Chimney untill it be an hard tump, you may use it as the Mermfeed alone is commonly used, give a child the weight of a great at a time, to the elder lost mose, as you think god : it killeth the wesms, and causeth them to boid.

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CHAP. CVII.

Of the hardnesse of the milt, and the cure thereof.

The splein of milt is hardened, by reason of superfluous humidity that it taketh from the liver and lungs. Therefore, if you will help this infirmity, it were necellary, to use medicines a bitersive, and drying, which thou thalt do thus. First give them Aromatico, then let them use this Electuary, which is of marbellous virtue in that operation. Take Grocus Marcis, Scolopendria, of each one onnce, Spikenard, lapis lazuli of each two scruples, Cinamon half an eunce, mire them, and make an Electuary thereof with purified honey, and take thereof every morning one sponfull, and every night (two hours before super) an other sponfull, and anoint the outward part, where the grief is with baliamo artific, and in there thme, the discase thall be cured.

Another remedy very effectuall for the former difeafe.

Let them bloud on the two beins, under the tongue. That done, mire multard fæd with the urine of a boy, and lay it betwæn two cloaths, and lay it to the part afflicted one night, and then (if thou fest not good eafe) ule it again till the difeate be gone. Also the decodion of oak helpeth the fwelling of the milt.

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CHAP, CVIII.

The cure of the Gonorthea, or running of the reins, the forerunner of the foul difeafe.

FIrst you thall give them Aromatico once in white FURINC. Then mounting and evening, for feven or eight days, use this potion following : anointing also the reins, and those parts, with Aqux izcida, being cold and in those time they thall be healed.

Take the whites of four 02 five new laied Eggs, two ounces of fine Sugar, there ounces of Role water, mire them well: and deink it morning and evening. This is a rare fecret, and often proved: the deink mult be dounk cold.

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CHAF; CIX.

Of the Hemerrhoids, and their cure,

"He Bemerhoids, are an alteration in the Bemerhois dal beins, caufed of a corrupt and putrified humour, whereof nature being willing to discharge her felf, fen, beth forth by those veins unto the extream or outward : parts, where it cannot patte through, and cauleth the als teration and inflation that is called the Demerrhoids. This corruption and putrifacion, is cauled of the evill quality of the liver, which corrupteth the bloud, and is the caule of all this inconvenience. Pow for the cuce, is were necessary to help the liver, to purifie the bloud, to alter the Demerchoids, and to discharge nature of that impediment. First therefore, give them Electuario Angelica, the next day they thall take Sirupo lolucivo, whereof they thall take five or fir voles. Then let them ancint the Demerrhoids, with Caultick, once of twice, and they thall for after be cured, 06

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Of the divers forts, and divers effects of the Hemerrhoids and their cure.

139 reason of this difease, that cometh always at the end of Inteffino, og Longanon, fome have marbellous vain about the fundament, fome burn wonderfully, and others do scald: which cometh because of the good og bad qualities in some, more than in other some, as experts ence theweth. For (as I faid) fome have fuch a burning that they can take no reft, fome have such pain, as they cannot fit; some have it scalding bot that it is intollera. ble. Though this infirmity is more hartfull in one complerion than in another, and the cure harder : yet you thall cure them in this manner. First give them Aromatico, then purge the body five of fir times with Sirupo fos lutivo. Then give him fame at the lower parts, with frankincense, and Cozar atting on a close fol their or four times, and then anoint the parts with Balfamo artific, for that will org and take away the pain altogether, and the patient thall be furely healed.

There are others kinds of Pemerrhoids, but two in principall. The one fort is in the fundament, and cau, feth great pain when they go to fool. The other foot cometh forth of the fundament, and are not to painfull as the firft. To cure these within the fundament you thall give the patient eight of ten days together, Sirupo magi-Hrale warm, let them take Aromatico once, and use Gliffers, wherein is put half an ounce of Aqua reale Phioravance at a time, and to thou thalt help them. The best way for those that are come forth, is to make incition, or to make a little hole in them that the bloud (which is pu, trified) may come forth, and to by evacuation thou that help them. Allo you thall understand, that bomiting is very necessary in the cure of both losts, because it open, eth the beins. Alle Oleum Ovorum, both eale the pain of the Demershoids very greatly: to dath the ail of figs, if

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you anoint them therewith. The Tooth of an Hoyles filh, being worn in a ring on the finger after the booy is purged, taketh them alway by a fecret and hidden guality, a thing proved more then an hundred times.

CHAP. CX.

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Of the cure of fuch as are troubled with fuffocation of the Matrix.

A Certain woman afflided therewith having much pain and grief in her ftomack, was cured by taking a dole of Electuario Angelica. Then the used our firrup against pains of the mother, eight az ten days, and anointed her ftomack, with Magno licore every night.

A certain young woman affiided in manner afoze'aid, wanted allo her naturall fickneffe, and began to losse her naturall heat: so that nature could not digett the superfinons matter in her body, was thus helped. First the took Electuario Angelica, and every night anointed her ftomack, nosethaills, and pulses, with magno licore, and every mouning dank of Quintaeffence folutive, and so was cured.

CHAP. CXI.

To cure a rupture or burfting in the beginning.

Is every ten days once give them Aromatico, and ever ry maxing falting; give them one ounce of white Tartar, in water or wine, and two hours vefore supper you thall take the like: let your bread be dry, also you mult wear a truffe fit for that purpose and use this remeop following. Take of the spirit of wine twelve sunces, franktincense, Olibanum, massich farcocolle, of each halt an sunce, infuse them in Aqua vitz, and therewith wath

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wath the tupture twice a day, then call thereon the powder of Billingua, and the herb Ballamina, and lay thereon a cloath wet in the faid water, and bind on the truffe fo hard, as he may possibly abide it; and hereby thalt thou heal any great rupture, in an hundzed days, but for that you keep diet accordingly.

Another for the fame.

Take very fift and thick paper wel gummed, chew it in thy mouth till it be foft : then lay it upon the rupture, and lay thereon a truffe fit for the purpose.

Some use to ftep the paper in lie, and wring the same out till it be dry, and apply it to the ruptace, changing it once in 24 hours.

A most excellent medicine for burfting.

Take Unotgraffe, Cofery, Ribwost, Shepherds pouch, of each alike quantity wall them & Day the, then fet them in an oben to byp, then beat them to powder & fearce the, to that powder take a like quantity of Anifeeds, beat if with the pewder & hearbs, fearce them again, & when 2 will use this powder take as much of it as will lie upon a fir pence, for ten mornings together. brink it with a little Malmley falting : then take of the fozefaid hearbs being fir fodden in fair water till they be tender, wing the water clean from them and apply it to the place not to hot; let not the truffe be to frait foz it will make the place rent further, gather the hearbs to make this powper in May, when the chief arength is in them, put a little oil of Spike to the hearbs after they be boiled, and the water clean drawn from them, anoint the place with oil of Spike, befoze you lay the hearbs to it. This hath been often proved to be good upon children that have ben born to, and upon old folks, that have been many years broken.

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CHAP. CXII.

Of retention of Urine, and the cure thereof.

De refention of urine arifeth of many caules, one is gravell, that Coppeth the conduits where it chould palle, an other is the want or weaknelle of the birtue er. pulfive; to that nature cannot erpall; an other is a car, nofity, which is an alteration cauled of courupt and yus trified humours, which do to restrain the powers. and urine, that it cannot patte. There is another, and that is viscolity of the reins, fogrolle, that it hindereth the urine from paffing. Another caufe, which is to to common, is the Bonozchea, when it changeth into Strans guria, that it is a flopping or choking of the conduits, that cary the urine to the bladder. All these fogelaid cau, fes, proced of one original, even of the diffemperatuce of nature, whereof if you ask the reason you that under. fand that it arifeth of that filthy beginning, which beins geth the foul difeale. That which moveth me to believs it, is the observation thereof divers and funday times, for many have been cured, that were infected with the pocks which were troubled (with carnolity befoge (poken of) fome with gravell. fome with debility of the virtue er. vullide, some with Gonozehea; all which when they were cared of the pocks, the other diffemperatures were therewith allo cured. For that difeale is the caufe of twenty milchiefs, and the reason why, many Phyliti, ans, make a long cure of the former diffemperatures, is for that they know not the main and principall caufe of them. But now I will thew thee a true and excellent manner of curing the retention of urine, which way for ever it cometh.

First give them a bole of Aromatico, then give unto them Sirupo folutivo, eight oz ten days, but in any wile kap

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kep no frait diet, but a good government as you do most commonly use : and eat such meat as pleaseth the Romack beft:cau's them allo to fweat, and in fogt time thou thalt thozoughly cure them.

CHAP, CXIII. A most excellent remedy to cure the difficulty of Urine.

"De difficulty, oz recention of urine, cauled divers ways, as of gravell. vifcofity, exulceration,&c. is in this fort very well and fafely cured. Withen the caufe of this difficulty of urine is in the reins of kidneys, fo that it be not a flone in the kidneys, og fome great floge of gravell fee that you work thus.

Take the lungs and piffel of an bare, boil it in good. wine, when it is well boiled frampit furall, and pate it thezough a Arainer with the faid liquoz wherein it was boiled. Remember that when you boil it there must not remain much liquoz in the veffel. Then take the laid matter that you arained, and put thereto as much purified honey, and boil it on a foft fire, untill it come to the form of an Cleduary, Withen it is boiled put thereto for every pound of that Elecuarythele things following made into fine powder, of Lignum aloes, of Tinamon, of each Iferuple Cloves Saffron, of each one feruple Busk four grains, Aquæ rolarum one ounce, Quintaellence folutive one cunce and a half. Incorporate thefe well toges ther, while it is warm, and kep it in a glaffe close ftopved. And when you will ule it, you muft firft take a Dole of Electuario Angelica, and while you use the Glece tuary, remember to anoint the reins with Aqua facida, when you go to bed. Df the Gleanary you mult take one ounce in the mouning, and fall thereon four bours, and ule some exercise and in thost time, thou thalt fe a marbeilaus goed work performed. for the reins will be Arengtheued, the viscolity will be resolved, the pozes 群物器

will be opened, and the urine will be expelled, and cleanled, all which are effects, necessary for him to regard, that will with honessy and credit, help the former malady.

Another often proved,

If thou wilt presently help one that cannot make was ter, by reason of wind viscouty, or other griebous cause, vering the party; anoint the reins, and the privy parts with Ballamo Artificiato, and keep them very warm, and forthwith they thall make water, to their great latisfact tion.

CHAP, CXVI.

Of Chilblains, and their cures.

VDu thall understand that Childlains (as we term I them.) are cauled of no other thing then of humours dried, and restrained in the bodie. For in winter when it is cold, the poses do that to close together, that the humour cannot patte of come forth, neither by fiveat, nos other exhalation of expiration. For that caule, the humours in a young man (who is hot of complexion) may not be kept in ; for then nature (which would cale her felf) fendeth that exhalation, unto the extream parts of the body, that is, unto the hands and feet; where remains ing there is cauled that alteration ; and in proceffe of time the skin both open, and the humour goeth fozth; but cannot heal till the spring, when warm weather cometh in. Howbeit, there is found out a fecret to cure them quickly, and with great eale. First let them bloud, then give them a vole of Electuario Angelica : after that let them take Sirupo folutivo, fir og feben dags together; not keeping any Areight diet or rule. After this ansint them with Oleum philosophorum de cera & terebinthina, at night when they go to bed : and bo thus one week at the least, and then no doubt then thalt cure them, as I have often proved. Allo the oil and water of frankincenfe, will do

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CHAP, CXVII.

Of Corns on the feet and the manner to take them way.

" De Goans that come on the feet, are a kind of hard: tumo, og thick excreffence cauled of cogrupt and putriffed humours, whereof nature being willing to bilcharge ber felf, fendeth them to the lower part of the fect whereout because they cannot passe, there do they make refidence, ingendzing that kind of tough ercreffence; which is griebous and painfull. Dang times the caufe hereof arifeth of that noifome tifeafe Morbus Gallicus, as some write, and than must it be remedied with medicaments appropriate thereunto. But if they come otherivile. then to take them away follow this ozder. When they are in their greateft fate, and caufe moft pain, cut them untill they bleed, then anoint them with Balfamo Artificiato applying it fo bot as you may fuffer it; thereupon go to ber. Then touch them once of twice mith Oleum fulfuris, and anoint them with Oleum philosophorum de teribinthina & cera, untill they be whole.

Some take the jugce of Semperuivum, and anoint the eyes therewith. Then they take Wormwod, and lay it upon an hot tile flone, and sprinkle it with flrong bine, gar and being hot bind it upon the Corns, and in three or four times to boing (as I have been credibly inform, cd) the Corns will be taken away. Also the red plaister or lear-cloth before set down cureth the same.

Chap.118.

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CHAP, CXVIII.

Of an infirmity that cometh on the fingers ends, and in the feet, under the nails, and the cure thereof.

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Any men are greatly froubled herewith, and in Luch manner, as thereby they are made altogether unfit to go. It commeth on the great toe under the nail or the five of the nail for the most part and a man would think that the nail grew in the fleth, but it is not fo, fog the fleth groweth upon the nail . though this infirmity appear not, to be a thing of great importance (whereof the ancient writers have made little mention) yet is it a thing greatly to be regarded. For many great perfor nages that live eafily, and are tozmented with the gout, have also this grief in those parts : but the ozder to cure them is this. First you thall cut the nail on that part where it molt grieveth them ; then take it away, which you may be ealing without any great pain to the patients for the nail is already separated from the grieved place. Thus when the nail is taken away, touch it with our Tauftick, whereof mention is made in our treatile of the plague. Let it fo remain thie days together : then Dielle it every day with Magno licore, untill it be whole, which will be in a very thoat time.

CHAP. CXIX.

Of Erifipela, or tumour in the face, or any other part of the body, and the cure thereof.

This vileale (as experience theweth) is cauled of an hot and fiery moisture, arising in the face, arms and legs;

legs, for where it is, the pores are flopped of the faid meiflure, cannot have expiration, whereupon cometh fumor: as allo a flutting and clofing up of those pores, by means of the ordinary anointing them, with fats, oils, &c. or other cold things : a common course of common Chyrurgians. Against this there cannot be found a more present remedy, then the spirit of wine or Aqua ardens, or bathing it with hot water : and if you walk the parts ale flided with our Quintacflence, the pores will be opened, and it penetrateth and affubtilateth that humidity, caufing it to come forth.

Also you thall find that by drinking our Quintaessence and anointing the Komack with oleum cere, divers are cured of a certain heat retained in the Comack.

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CHAP. CXX.

There is an herb, called Herba di vento: in the suyce where of, if you wet a cloath, and bind it upon the warts, they will wear away in thest time after.

CHAP. CXXIII.

For Ears that run, and are full of water.

Take two parts of the Gall of a barrow hog, half as much of the best honey, boil these together in thick glasses, in hot alhes till half be consumed and so use it, prescribed by Dr. Nicholas for Henry Medlex.

CHAP. CXXIIII.

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TAke the juyce of Bnot-grade, and leeth it with heney and wine, and your a quantity there of into the patients ear, and dop the ear with cotten, and lie bown on the contrary ade.

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In the next place I shall shew you many rare and hidden secrets, for the making and, use of our Balfamo Artificiato, or the Artificial Balsome (often mentioned before) and severall other excellent Balsomes, Oyles, and Ointments, with the rare effects thereof.

CHAP. CXXV.

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The making of Balfamo Artificiato, or the Artificiall Baltome, with a declaration of the effects and virtues thereof.

TAke of Menice Turpentine, one pound, af perfect oil of Bays four ounces, oil Galbanum, three ounces, of Bum Arabeck four ounces, of Lignum aloes, Galingal, Clobes, Contelida major. Cinamon, Butmegs, Zedoeria, Ginger, Diptanum album of each on e ounce, of Olibanum, Mirrha eleded, Oum Hedera of each that brams, of the belt Busk and Amber of each one dram, of rodis fisd Aqua vitæ fir pound; put all thefe in a new earthen pot, and let them fand leven days, close flopped that no air gossin, then diffill them in a glaffe retortive in land. And the first water that cometh is white mingled with oil, after you have drawn a sufficient quantity of this increase your fire, and there will come a black oil and water, which you are to take in another Receiver. increaling your fire according to Art, til it drop no more; then leparate the sils from the waters and the black oil is the Artificial Balfame.

An excellent Ballome to cute deep wounds and punctures, made by feme narrow tharp pointed weapon, which Balfam doth bring up the fleth from the bottom very lpeedily, and alfo healeth fimple cuts in the fleth, according to the first intention, (that is) to glue or foder the lips of the wounds together, not procuring matter or corruption, as is commonly feen in healing of wounds.

Also oil of roles, oil of Daint John Blost, of eis ther one pint, the leaves of Tobaco Camped Imall in a Cone moster two pound : boil them together, to the confumption of the sugce. 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CHAP. CXXVIII.

To make the Italians Ballam to heal a green wound prefently; It is that which they which are called Mountebanks use when they heal them whom they wound and stab upon Stages. It conglutinates and cements very suddenly any green wound by cut or thrush, though never so deep in the flesh, if it be not ranckled and festered.

Ake a pint of Salict oil, and three cunces of Barrel, pitch, two ounces of yellow Wace, an ounce and an half of Kolin, and feeth them about half an honr upon a fost fire, and mingle them bery well upon the fire, and then take them off, and put them into little pots for your use; and warm a little in a fawrer, and put it not bery hot into the wound; but little more than blond warm, and take also a soft linnen cloth and put it into the Ballame and lay it over the wound, and use it fresh and new morning or evening, and it curcs i refently.

CHAP. CXXIX.

To make a Balforne of St. Johns wort,

Take Thite. Thine two pints, Dyle Dlive four pounds. Dyl of Aurpentine two pounds, the leaves flowers and feeds of St. Johns Alort, of each two great handfuls gently bruifed. Put themall together into a great double glaffe, and fet it in the Sun eight of ten days, then beil them in the fame glafs in a kattle of water with fome firate in the bottom, wherein the glaffe must fland to beil : which done, firain the liquor from the herbs, and do as you did before, putting in the like quantity of berbs, flowers, and feeds, but not any more Whine.

Diokorides saith, that the fred drunk for fourty days together, cureth the Sciatica, and all aches that happen in the hips.

The same Author saith that being drunk with Wline it taketh alway Tertian and Duartan Agues.

CHAP, CXXX.

To make Oyl of Exceter good for all manner of aches or bruiles.

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"Ake a yound of the flowers of Towlips in May, Cep them in oil Dlive, in as much quantity as they may eaffly be laid in, then taks Talamint, berb John, Red. Sage, Willowage, Sugar, Sotherwood Wornwood, Penyroyoll, Labender, Pelitozy, Camomill, Belito. ry of Spain, Bays. Howes, fowers of Lillies, of citber of the aferefaid berbs one handfull, and thefe berbs mult be gatheres in lunc, grind them in a Mozter as fmall as accen fawce, when it is fo bone, take the flowers of Conflips out of the oil, with clean hands, and put them in white Wine a night and a day, and take as much Wine as they may safily fier in, then take the berbs with the Wine, and boil them together with the oil Dlibe, that the Coullips were feeped in, and let it boil fo long os ver a fast fire, untill the Waine and the Water be was fed away. Withen it is voiled enough, taks it off the fire and wring it through a ftrong linnen cloath, then put it in a Hellel of Tyn og Glaffe, fog no other Hellel will hold it. This opniment will last 3 years, and it must be made in the moneth of June, is is good for all manner of aches and bauiles.

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CHAP, CXXXI.

To make Oyl of Roles the best way.

TAke half a pound of rederofe leabes and Kamp them very finall, and then take a pound of orl Dlive, and mingle with your roles, and put them in a glaffe well topped, and firth them in a Metfell with water, the space of fir hours, and then train them through a clean cloth, and keep it in a glaffe, and by this proportion you may make as much and as little as you will.

CHAP. CXXXII. Another way of making Oyl of Rofes.

Take Koles and oil Olive of each alike quantity in weight, theo them and put them in a Askel of glass flop it well, and hang it in a beffel of water, up to the neck two moneths, and every day fir it once, unflop it ogain and frain it through a Canbas, and put away the grounds, lo keep it in a veffel of glasse well stopped, for this is a celder kind then the other.

CHAP, CXXXIII,

To make Oyl of Lillies.

Ake Gallet oyl. and put into it a good quartity of the flowers of white Willies, then fet it in a pot of het water, and let your oyl & your Willies boil a good while, then wring out your Willies, & put in more Willies, and fet them in the San, and let them fland to long as you think convenient, then take them out, and put in more Willies, fo change them once or twice more as you think good; for mant of flowers, you may take the cost and Ramp it and boil it as aforefaid.

CHAP. CXXXIIII.

To make Oyl of Balm.

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Ake oil Benedid one pound, gum of Ivie, sed of Balus, then take chosen Hows Turpentine four ounces, mingle them together on a little fire, three or four times, till it hath a little colour and this ning, and till it come to thicknesse of honey or Turpentine, then keep it pretiously. This oil is good for all aching of finews, coming of cold, it keeps dead bodies frem rotting and corruption. It is good for all other things, for the Palley and the falling ficknesse. and the fione in the reins, and in the bladder, and to cure all corr bednesses

CHAF, CXXXV.

To make Oyl of Worms for an ach.

TAke a pint of Gallet oil, and a pint of red Mooms, a handfull of Kolemary, and a handfull of Comphery, then take thele, and chep them together very fmall, then put them into the oil, and let them boil till they be enough, then Arain them through a linnen cloath, and fo keep them close cob-rod, the older it is the better, when it is boiled enough, then it will Amber foftly, if it boil to much it will flame away.

CHAP, XXXVI.

To make Oyl of St. Johns Wort.

TAke the leaves, flowers and fæds of St. Johns Most Eamped, and put them into a glasse with Dyl Dlive, and set it in the hot Sun for certain Takks together, and

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and then Crained it from those herbs, and the like quatity put in, and sumed in like manner. Both make an Dyl of the colour of bloud, which is a most precious remedy for the prounds, and those that are thrust through the body, for finews that are pricked, or any wound made with an invenomed weapon.

CHAP. XXXVII.

To make Oyl of Broom.

Take a quart of Pay Butter clarified in the son, put thereto three pints of Broom flowers, clean picked from the Calks, let it Cand in a Balon till you can habe Elder flowers, where recof put in à pint and an half, clean pickt allo : let them Cand together a moneth, put it into the Doen after bread, or in some other place where it may have a continual warmth, and fir it cometimes : frain it through a thin cloth, and set it in the Doen as gain to cleanle it.

To make Oyl of Hemp. feed, which caufeth a comely face, and maketh the perfon merry which ufeth it.

Ake one peund of Hemp. sed, and beat it very fine, then spinkle and wet it with a little wine, and put it into a new earthen pot op pan well glaied, and set it over the fire, heat it is long, till you cannot suffer your hand in it; then put the same subtance, into square bags, which you must presse hard, and an Dyl will come south, whereof it any drink the quanof one sounce at a time, it maketh him pleasant and merry; and if a Souldier brink it. it will make him both fierce and hardy to fight without any fear or doubt of his enemy. In this manner you may draw out any Dyl out of all seds.

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CHAP. CXXXIX,

To make a Green Oyntment.

T Ake of Sage and Rue of each a pound, of Bayleaves and Wegans, wood of each half a pound, of Pellilot, herb of flower of Camomil, of the flowers of Spike, of Rofemary, of Rofe-leaves of St. Johns Wegat, and of Dill, of each one handful, of Parthmallows two handfuls: All these herbs chop as small as may be, and Ramp them, and weigh and put thereto the like weight of Spikeps-fuet, chop it as fine as may be, and mince your herbs and it together, and flamp them in a fione mostar to one fublitance, that there be no fuet sien, but all green : then put it into some fair earthen pot, then put thereto Switt Dyl Dlive a pottle and pint: work these altogether in a pan with your hand to one subflance

fubstance, and cover it close with past, that no air go in 0, out. so let it stand seven days, then take it forth, and put it into a pan, and set it on a soft fire till the leaves begin to war parched hard, and then strain it into some clean pan, then have ready these oyls following : oyl of Roles, of Spike, of Camomile, of white Lillies, and of Riolets, of each one ounce, stirring them well together and referve it in glasses or galler pots to your use, if you will have it more pleasant of small, and more nourishing, adde thereto the Gums Labbamium one cunce and a half, beaten to fine powder, Storar calaminted three quarters of an ounce, builed fine to powder, mingle this with your other stuffe as before, and so keep it to your use.

This ointment is good for flitches for bruiles, for the palley, for the thrinking of finews, gouts, and sciaticaes, for the ach of the back, lameneffe, plurifies, for the cough, the foles of the feet being anointed therewith, for extream pain in the head by cold, making a cap for the crown with linnen cleath, and lap it in wood pluckt from the flanks of a live theep, make it clean from the filth and motes, and cartle it, then wet it in the sintment, and so paffe it and lay it somewhat warm to your head. it is good alfo for the collick and the spleen, and the cold drop, fie of the Liver.

CHAP. CXL.

An Oyntment for any Ach or Crick.

Take 12 psund of butter in themoneth of Pay, one pound of B200m flowers, and framp them, then boil them in the butter a good while, then firain it and put it info a Glaffe, and let it frand a while in the Sunno to clarifie, when you use it, take one spoonfull of the oyntment, and three spoonfuls of Sack, and boyl them together, then bath the place there with as hot as you can suffer it, and bip a cloath therein, and apply it hot to the place. 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Another excellent Oyntment for any bruile ftrain or pain in the joints,

CHAP, CXLII.'

An excellent Oyntment for the Reins of the back or other part of the body that hath pain or Crick.

I Ake a good quantity of Peats-fort Dyl, and put thereto a sufficient quantity of Aqua vita, mingle them well together, and anoint therewith for it bath been often proved excellent.

CHAP, CXLIIE,

An Oyntment for all manner of flitches and akings, in what place foever it be in mans body.

TAke a peck of flowers of B200m, and two ounces of Balls. and put them in an earthen pot and fill the pot full of Arine, and ftop the pot fall, and pat it in the earth at the door of the house, and let it be there twolve moneths, and then take that oyl that is in the pot and firain it, and put it in a defiel to keep, and another there, with the place griebed, and it wil help, when all other medicines fail.

An Oyntment for Ears that run and are full of water,

Take two parts of the Gall of a Barrow, hog, half as much of the bell hency, boil these together in a thick glatte in het alhes till half be consumed, and so use it, Dr. Nicholas for Henry Medlex.

CHAP, CXLV.

An Oy utment for an imposlume in the Ears,

Take two spoonfuls of oyl of Roles, and as much birgin war as a Autmeg, melt it together, and make it bery warm, then put to it a little saffron finely pounded, then take it off the fire, and fir it till it be almost cold, then put to it a quarter of the yolk of an egge, and fir it, and when it shall be like an oyntment, take the bignefie of a hayel-nut, and melt a doop of it into the ear, and so continue four of fibe doops, and anoint the Cars round about, and fuffe it with unwashed wool round about, and keep it warm, this will ripen the Impositume.

A fingular medicine for any flopping at the flomack.

T Ake four sunces of Lynfeed, and boil it in a quart of milk, till it come to a pint, and anoint the break therewith then take a prece offcarlet, and wet it throughly in the milk, and when it is wet, lay it on your break without warming.

An Oyntment to clear the Lungs.

Take the pap of roffed apples, as much oblibanum as a bean, twice as much Sugar candie as oblibanum, mingle them together being beaten to powder, if the patient be far goue, put to it a little oyl of sweet Almon. and anoint the breast outwardly with oyl of Almonds.

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CHAP ,CXLVIII.

'An Oyntment for deafnesse.

Take an Englich Dnion of the greatelt you can get; and cut of the tip of it, then take out some of the meat and fill it up with the best Sallet-oyl, then wap it up in a brown paper, and rolt it in the embers; when is is rosted you must piel it, and then Arain it through a fair cloath, this you may drop with a feather into your sars luke-warm morning and evening, and your head must be kept very warm.

CHAP, CXLIX,

An Oyntment to break a fore,

Take two drams of Cantarides, a quarter of an ounce of Pepper, and so much binegar as will make it a perfect continent, lay this upon a brown paper, and apply it.

An excellent owntment for fealding or burning by Mr. Iohn Burgheffe, which will do more in fix weeks, then another in three moneths.

Take Bacon that is very fat, cut of the fivard, and cut it into Cellspa very thin, and fry it till be black, then pour the liquoz into water, take it out of the water and put it in the pan, and fry it again till it be black, then pour it into the water again, then take it out of the water and put it into the pan, and fry it till it be black, then pour it forth again, and beat it with a little water till it be white, put your water clean from it, and put your liquoz into a poinci, take a realonable quantity of Dnions, pilled and chopped fmall, put them to the liquoz, and boil them together, and frain it through a cleath, and kép it to your use: this cured a man that was fealded in a Bzewers beffell.

For a burning or fealding.

Take theeps suet and theeps dung, the inner vine of elber, and boil them through a course cloath, and when you use it warm it, and lay it on the burnt og scalded place with a feather.

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An oyntment for the Shingles .

Take Adders-tongue in the moneth of May one pound and three quarters of a pound of freth clarified Wogsgreale, and framp the Adders-tongue very fmall in a Sorter, then boil them together, and fir them till they become a falve, then put it into an earthen pot, and anoint the Shingles, and spread some of it upon a cloath, and lay it upon the Shingles so far as they go, this is good against any biting or finging of a Serpent or madde Dogge, by anointing the place very hot.

CHAP, CLIIII,

An Oyntment for the cold Sciatica, or Benummednefie in the thighs or legs.

Take a pint of Aquavitæ, a pint of Mine Ainegar, a quarter of a pound of eyl of Bays, the juyce of four 02 five handfulls of Gage, a fawcer full of good Hus flard, the Gall of an Dre, and chafe them in the bladder an hour 02 moze, that the oyl may be well mingled with the reft, and ansint the place thereivith against

An Oyntment for the Gout, and to comfort the joynts.

Dyl, seeth them together with a soft fire, and put therein a handfull of Dugwort thred small, two cunces of Will in powder, seeth it again in a pound of oyl W, live, and a pound of scelh butter, seeth it till all the water be consumed, then Acain it, and anoint the joints therewith.

CHAP. CLVI.

An Oyntment against the Palsey.

Take Iby berries and Capons greafe three onnces, and the roots of Celendine a handfull of Sage of oil of Bays two sunces, of oil Dlive half a pound, beat the hearbs and roots small seeth all these together upon a small fire, so frain it and anoint the place griebed this is very pretisus.

There is Fles V nguentorum or the flower of Oyntments fold by the Apothecary, which hath very rare effects, for the curing of all old Fiftulaes and feftred fores of long continuance, it draweth any broken bone. fplinter, or thorn out of the Lefh. It cureth aches or pains in the joints or bones and (being rightly made) is above all others the most pretious unguent as experience dayly teacheth.

Rules for an expert Phyfinian.

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I have already shewed you many hidden fecrets or rare experiments in Phylick and Chyrurgery; which thou mult needs acknowledge to have produced wonderfull great eftects ; yet are they nothing in comparison of these that are behind, the reading and right use whereof, will render thee a true imitator of him who by his unparallelled wildome and morall Philosophy, knew the virtues and use of all herbs and vegetables, from the tall Cædar of Libanon, to the Hylop that groweth upon the Wall. And forasmuch as there is none that can (with affurance of good fuccesse) undertake any cure in Physick, without observing certain Rules (as hath been already proved noto you in the practife of Chyrurgery,) Before I ipeak of Purges, Vomits, Waters, Drinks, and Hearbs in generall, I shall recommend fome particulars which I always observe in the ministring of Phylick.

CHAP. CLVII.

Certain Rules to be observed by the learned and expert Physitian.

A Skilfall Phylitian is a continuall Totary of ferbant of nature; for the right ministring and applying such sit and proper remedies as may help, defend, and sufferin nature; and walk or destroy the malady or disease, which that thou mayest effectually perform, search diligently to know the cause from whence the distemperature or disease ariseth, whether of Phisghm, Choller, Bloud, or Pelancholly, and whether it be seated in the Stomack. Dead, Scc. or from a hot or cold cause, by which means thou art in a good measure enabled to find out the grief or disease, and apt to prescribe a proper remedy against it. At thou findest it convenient and profitable for the Patient to be let

bloud thou mult have respect to the time of the year, the age of the party, the sign that governeth, the trength of the Patient, and the disease.

In purging also then art to take notice and confider inhat humeur is to be purged, and how far it aboundeth, and have as speciall regard to suit the medicine to the humour that then would eff purge as to the time, and the quantity then givest thereof. But chiefly and above all I hold it necessary (in all schnesses of diseases) you should observe the time when the Patient falleth ill, and what Planet governs, and what the alpeas are, for by that you may subge whether it be a convenient time to minister Physick, as for example.

R. H. findeth himself ill this present day, being the first of Aprill, 165 I, and seketh unto me for remedy, I find at this time Saturn in opposition with the Down, and Mars with a quartille 12 degrees, a sertile with Venus 6 degrees, by which I adjudge it not a good time to minister Physick, and the next day like unto it, there, fore unless I perceive the Patient to be in great necesfity. I persuade him not to take his Physick untill the third day, which I find faboured with better aspects.

These kind of observations are of great antiquity, and source in high effeem among the most learned Abhiloso, phers, the practile whereof is of that fingular use in these times that some in London and other places, which soar with the highest on the wings of same, give sudgements this way, rather then by the brine, and therefore I suppose thou wilt not think it loss of time, if I am the more large on this point.



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

And when 2 Planets are in one fign, and one degree of the Zodiack there is a conjunction.

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Therefore as it is necessary that then thouldest know what the sign is, when thy Patientfalleth sick, so must then likewise know what Planet is Lord of the house, then observe what the Aspects are (described in the first Olobe or Sphear) and it will not a little direct thy sudgment both concerning the disease, the remedy, and the time of continuance or abatement thereof.

Also the knowledge of the Planets is the moze defirable, for that it is the sudgement of the wife Philose phers, that they have not onely influence upon the bodies of men, & c. but also upon all Hearbs, Plants, and Aegetables; for the Sun hath a speciall influence on the Baytre, and other trees of that nature, and we find by god experience the effects answerable (of which more in the virtues of herbs,) the fludy whereof will very much snable the in the right minificing and applying such things as in thy practife thou thalt find requisite to be made use of : for Alcomes the Phylosopher choice to make his powders, (whereof he giveth such large commendation,) when the Summe entered the first degre of Aries.

I thall now therefore procked to let down certain ges nerall remedies by way of Purgations, Momits, Glis Aers, Drinks, and Waters. with divers other hids den secrets for the curing of any dilease or malady of the body either internall or externall.

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CHAP. CLVIII.

An excellent Purge,

Ake Diacatholiacon one sunce, Confection of Hameck one sunce, mire them very well toges ther, and put them into half a pint of Williewine and drink it.

FCHAP. CLIX.

Pills to purge Melancholy and Choller,

Take half an ounce of Aloes Sackatrina, and beat it to powder very small, then take a dram of Rubarb, and flice it very thin, and dry it in a saucer upon embers, then beat it to a fine powder, and of powder of Steel half as much in measure as the Rubarb, and with a little Claret. Whine temper them together till they be like path, and then make them into pills, whereof take one every night 2 hours after supper, and in the morning drink some broth.

CRAP. CLX.

To purge the head of groffe Choller and Phlegm.

Take Pillule Masticka fermely, I dram and a half of ogl Teijme Chymicall seven drops, of the spices of Aromatica seven grains, mir these well, and make them into ten pills, an hour basoze dinner and an hour befoze supper, and use them as you have need.

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CHAP. CLXI.

A Speciall powder for the Memory, and to purge the Brain.

TAke their sunces of Senx leaves, Sednarij, Commin, Parlley, and Dill fied, of each an ounce, Ginger one ounce and a half, Cloves, Putmegs, Calimus, Galingal, Pimpernill Roots, Sage, Rue, Nalerian, Annissfeeds, of each one quarter of an ounce, Sugar three onnces, pound all these small and temper them together, and take thereof morning and evening one dram at one time.

CHAP, CLXII,

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Another excellent Purgation.

Take the flowers of the Peach tree, infused in warme water for the space of tenor twelve hours, then strain them and put thereto more of the flowers and put to the said liquoz to infuse after the same manner fir or seven times; then put thereto as much Suger as it will require, and beil it to the thicknes of a firmp, where, of take two spontals in the morning, and it purgeth the belly better then Rubard or Agrick, for it workether, ceedingly upon moilt and waterily humars without pain or gripings.

CHAP, CLXIII,

To make Pills of Liquoris to be taken after an extream cold, or the falling of the Rhume from the head.

TAke choile Liquoris, and beat it to fine poinder, and put thereto to much Hilp water as will make it like

tike palle with a little Bum dragon, & make pills there of and let them diffolve in your mouth.

Another gentle purge.

T Ake a new-laid egge, t put the yolk from the white, then put the yolk again into the thell and sup it off, then dyink four sponfulls of Aqua vite after it, and walk a while upon if.

CHAP, CLXIIII.

A Glifter for the Emrods.

Take a Gliffer made of a quart of milk bolled to a pint, with two handfuls of Pallows, and a hand, full of Mercury. Then take Frankincense, Stozar, and Benjamin, and powder them, and take the fume thereof in a close ftol, and anoint the place with Voguenum album Camphoreum.

CHAP.CLXV.

Another Gliffer.

Ake a pint and a half of ftröng ale, an ounce of fennell-seeds, and five og size ounces of course Suger, four og five sponfuls of sirrup of Roses, og of sirrup of bleto Aiolets, your fennel-seeds must be beaten, and beiled in your ale, it must boil half a pint away, then strain it, and put in your Suger, and which of these sirrups you will, and give it warm.

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CHAP, GLXVI,

An excellent Vomit.

Ake Antemony prepared, beaten imall, one pennyworth, and infule it in a penny-pot of Abite/wine, take Sinamon bruiled, frain it, and as you use it warm it, and one hour after, if it work not, drink warm posset:ale; and if the water proceeding be tough and thick, put into the posset:drink a little iwset.butter, but be fure the fign be not in the upper parts, by reason the matter will not fir and operate, the quantity you give may not be above two or three spontalls, according to the firength of the patient, four spontalls will be enough for any firong beby.

A vomit for an Ague.

Take the pewver of Subin. according to the Arength of the Patient four, five, fir. or feven grains, and give it to the party falling in any convenient fign. and orink posset. Drink between whiles. It purgeth both ways without danger.

Dr. Giffords purging drink,

T Ake of the roots of Partley, Red Fennell, Sparagus, Paoder, of each two ounces, of Red Dock roots two ounces, of Setrach, Paiden hair, water. Crettes, Scabius, of each two handfuls, of Bur rage, Buglas and Aiolet flowers, of each half a handful, of Sena three ounces, of Polipodium of the Dak two ounces, of Epithemum one handfull and a half, of white Turbith,

bith, of Gum Perican, of each two ounces, of Sar'afrage, of Alhen-tree bark, of Capper-roots, of each one ounce, of Annis-leeds, Caraway-feeds, Coilianderfeeds of each two drams, let the hearbs and the roots be a little dried and cut that which is to be cut, and bruile the reft and make a groffe-powder, put it into a linner bag, and put into a firkin of four gallons of firshillings Beer, when it is cleanled put into it, a pint and a half of the inyce of Scurby-graffe clarified, put afface the fetting from the dregs in the bottome, t drink a good draught of this every morning falling, and at four of the clock in after-mon.

CHAP. CLXVIII.

A Purging drink for a tough Phlegm.

T Ake Salfaparilla, Permodactiles picked, Sena of Alexandria, Liquoxice, of each three cunces well bruiled, the filling of Guajacum four ounces, the back of Guajacum two ounces pounded, Bay berries, the husks taken eff and bruled, one ounce and a half, Cinamon pounded half an ounce, two good Autmegs bruifed, put all thele into two gallons of new tunned ale, and three bays being ended, the next morning at fir of the clock, brink half a wine pint if you can of the ale, as much at three of the clock in the afternoon make a spare binner at ten of the clock, and the like supper at fir, or else drink one draught at fir and another at ten left it make you rife in the night.

CHAP, CLXIX,

An excelent drink for the yellow Jaundies.

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TAke tops of grien 13,00m a reasonable quantity, theed them imall, then put to them half a penny, worth of Saffron, famp them well together, put to them of Grong Ale oz Beer, two good spoonfulis fo let them acop all night, in the morning Arain it with a lit. tle more beer to make a small draught, let it be brunk be times and fall three hours, and ule to living the arms much, receive it three or four mornings making it freihevery meaning.

CHAP. CLXX.

A drink for spitting of Bloud.

Ake the jugce of Betony, and temper it with Goats milk, and give it the patient to daink three dayes. oz take Smallage, Mints, Rew, and Befong, and feeth them well in good wilk, and fup it off warm.

CHAP. CLXXI.

A drink for a furfeit.

FAke three quarts of firong ale, freep therein a quar. I for of a pound of Liquozice & half a quarter of Anni, ferbs twelve hours, then fill it in a Limbock, & take a quart of the first water for the furfeit brink.

To a quart of this Aqua vita, put a baam of Hierapicra made into fine powber, as imail as duff, and fo put it into Aqua vira, and thake it half an hour together, then put it into a Stove og Cuboazo near the fire where it may have a continuall warmth like the heat of the SORE

Sun forten days, for that time thake it once a day berg well, after these ten dayes it must thand a week to settle that it may be clean put from the bottome, when you pour it out:the Ales are, it may be safely given in surfeits of all sorts, one, two, or three spoonfulls at severall times to some complexions it will give some few stools, it must no way be given to a woman w child unless the be in hard tradel near delidery, in thew of danger nor thing is better to speed delidery.

CHAP, CLXXII.

Another for the fame.

The diffilled water of Mallows fliced in small pieces when they be ripe, and drink once in a day three or 4 ounces for a moneth together & it doth greatly help the Stone, cauleth the Urine, and purgeth the kidneys and allayeth all inward heats, and not unnaturally, cooleth the liber and ceafeth thirff.

CHAP, CLXXIII.

A reftoring Drink for any decay of the inward parts.

T Ake live honey, and put therets tops of Balme, Couffip.bloffomes, Rolemary flowers, Burrage, flowers Buglas, flowers, the flowers of red Cognations, let these remain in the hony a month, the flo p the pot bery close that no air go in e3 out, flet it fland al the while infome warm place either in the Sun o3 by a continuall fire, then diffill it in a glaffe fill and daink thereof every mogning a good daught.

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CHAP. CLXXIIII.

A drink for a woman with child in danger to miscarry.

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If any woman great with child thall take this wink every other day in the mouning, three hours before the eat any meat, beginning the fame about ten days or a fortnight before the time of the birth it thall not onely be made more safe, but allo the thall bring forth her child without pain. Take of the great Treacle one (ccuple, which is the weight of twenty four barley corns, the powder of Liquorice, and the powder of Sinamon of either three grains, of good white wine one ounce and a half mired altogether, and make thereof a drink, and letit be given to the woman with child, in fuch manner as is before fayed.

CHAP. CLXXV.

An excellent Drink to purge Melancholly and choller, to cleanfe the bloud and to comfort the heart.

T Ake of Saliaparilla four ounces, of Sena munda four ounces, of China rots two ounces, of Rubarb thrée brams, of Epithamum half an ounce, of Polipodium rots three ounces, of Dadder roots one handfull, of red Dock rots the pith taken out and fliced one handfull, of fluset Fennell roots and Annis feeds, of each half an ounce, of Sinamon, Dace and Putmegs of each three drams, of Scabius, and Egrimony, of each one handfull. Then take your Saliaparila, China, Rubarb, Polipodium, and Dadber, and Icraps and flice them, and beat them into groffe powder, and powder the Fennell and Annis fees, Putmegs, Dace, and Sinamon. And put the D'3

Epithamum, Dockstots, Sena, Egrimony, and Scas bions whele into a bag of course Boulter, og Loumbook, incompassing the powder in the hearbs; in putting them into the bag. And put the bag into an empty barrel, and after put fir gallons of Beer to it, but let not the barrell be full let it work over, and flop it close, and after it hath flood seven dayes, daink thereof every morning a wine pint, and the like quantity about four of the clock in the afternoon. But put the bag first empty into the empty barrell, and after put in the ingredients theres to.

CHAP. CLXXVI,

Doctor Deodats Scurbubical Drinke.

Ake Cardus Benedicus, Komanswozmwood, Bzocklime, Scurbey-grafs, Water-creffes, Ulater Trefoil, of each one handful : of Doder, Cetrach, Scolopendzia, Burrage. Bugalos, Sozrel, Speedwel, of each one handful, of Clicompain roots one ounce; to thele hearbs clean picked and wathed, put the ounces of Restors of the fun floned, fifteen flices of Lemons, and as many of Drenges. Boil all thefe in as much white-wine as will well boil the hearbs, and let it boil till it cemes to a pint and a half.

A Scurbutical Sirrup to take with the former Drinke.

TAake juice of Scurbey grals, Watercreffes and Brooklime, of each fix ounces, of the juice of Dranges and Lemons, of each foure onnces. First clarifie the juices, then put to it a pound and three quarters of Suger, let it boil to a firrup: then take two spoonfals of it in foure spoonfals of the Drinke at the bourss of fir in the morning and four in the afternoon.

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CHAP. CLXXVII.

A Diet-D inke for any difeale that is cutable preletibed by three Dutch Doctors.

Take of Germodatilis two ounces, of Salfaperilla four ounces, of Scene Alexandr. four ounces, of Sarafras wood, two sunces, of Liquopice one sunce, of Annis fæds one sunce, of long Pepper half an sunce, of the leabes of Scabius one handful, of Egrimony half a handfull of Mater crefles and Brook-lime, of each one great handfull, of Sea Scurbey-graffe, two great handfuls, of good putmegs one ounce, let all the woods be fit and cut finall, and the bearbs fixed and put into a bag and hang it in a barcell with fit gallous of new ale, and let it fland and fettle eight days, then drink continually of it and no other brink while it lafteth and sat bakers bread with Cortander fæds, and keep a good dir et; ale this fit weeks.

CHAP. CLXXVIII.

A Purging Ale.

Take of the jugce of Scurbey-graffe four pound, of Water-creifes two pound, of Brocklime one pound of Water mints half a pound. of the heard of dry Mormwood four h nofulls. of the roots of Padder four ounces, the roots of Duncks Rubarh three ounces, Roots of Porfe-radify one ounce and a half, the roots of Sarafras one ounce, of Sena four ounces, Juniper-berries half an ounce, of Anni-feds, Sarni-leeds, and Ginger of each fir brams.

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Another.

To a pint of the whay of Geats milk put of Scna half an ounce, of Ginger clean scraped and thin Aliced, of Annisteds, and sweet Fennelsleeds well duff. ed and lightly bruiled, of each the weight of sour pence, let them thand so an hour, or an hour and a half, on warm embers, in infuting the next morning to a draught here, of put a spoonfull of strup of Roses, and as this agreeth with you, take it two or three days together, or every other day.

CHAP, CLXXIX,

An excellent Diet-drink.

TAke the roots of Monks Rubarb, and red Madder, of each half a pound, Sena four ounces, Anni feed, and Liquopice of each two sunces, Scabins and Egrimos ny of each one handfull, flice the roots of the Rubarb, bruile the Annisted and Liquorice, break the herbs with your hand, and put them into a fone pot called a fean, with four gallons of Arong ale to fier of infuse the space of three days, and then brink this liquor as your ordina. ry daink for three weeks together at the leaft though the longer you take it the better : providing in a readinelle another flean, fo prepared, that you may have one under another, being always carefull to keep a good Diet. It cureth the dooplie the yellow Jaundies, all man. net of itches, scabs og bzeakings out of whole bodies, it pue rifieth the bloud from all corruption, prevaileth against the green acknede very greatly, and all obstructions oz Aopping, it makes young maids to look freth and fair, & helpeth the Aoppage of their monethly Acknesse.

Chap. 180.

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CHAP. CLXXX.

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Take a gallon of good galcoin wine, the roots of Galagal, Patmegs, Grains. Cloves, Annislerds, Fennellsfeeds. Carawaysleeds, of each a dram, then take Dage, Pint, red Roles, garden Time, Pellitory, Rolemary, Mildstime, Camomil, Pennysroyal, Pars gerome, then beat the lpices small, and beat the hearbs and put all into the Mine, and let it stand for twelve bours stirring it divers times, the distilit in a limbeck and keep the frst water by it solf for it is the best, then keep the second water, for it is bery good, but not is good as the first.

The virtues of this Water.

It comforteth the spirits, or bitall parts; it healeth any inward difeale that cometh of cold; it is good against the chaking Palsie; and cureth the contraction of sinews; and helpeth the conception of women that be barren ; it killeth worms in children or elder perfons; it helpeth the cold gout; it cureth the cold Dropsie; it helpeth the stone in the bladder, and in the reins of the back and whoseber useth this water now and then and not too often, it preferbeth him in good liking, and chall make him look erceeding young and youthfull.

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CHAP. CLXXXI.

A most excellent water for the Stomack, and for a Surfet.

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TAke of the belt & pureft Aqua-vita you can get, and put thereto their dozen of Realons of the fun ftoned. this fias fliced, two Dates quartered, and the white taken out ; a quarter of an punce of Cloves, a quar. ter of an ounce of mate, and as much Sinamon ; two races of Ginger fliced, two ounces of Annis fieds, vice ked and rubbed, of Angelica-lads two Drams, and of Carbusiled two Drams, of Turnfole one cunce and of fine Suger a quarter of an cunce : Step all thele in the Aquasvit for the space of firten Days, making of it twice every day, then take an Dipocras bagg, and let it run through, and to put it up for your ule, and put there. to an ounce of Annisslesd Comfits, and an eunce of Ame ber Comfits, an ounce of Manus Chrifti, and one grain of Busk, and take foure fponfuls thereof falling, og at night when you go to bed.

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Fill an Egg-thell newly emptied with the jupce for Seengreen, and set it in hot embers, take off the green frum that riseth to the top, then it will be a water, firain it and keep it in a glaffe, and sut some of it into the hot eys four so five nights together, and it will ease the pricking and burning.

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CHAP, CLXXXIII.

an to have An excellent Water, alter of

The water of Marigolos both help all difeates of the eyes, and taketh away all pains of the eyes, and takes away all pains of the head, and the inyce of Bay-leabes, propped into the ears takes away deafnette of other firange founds.

CHAP. CLXXXIIII.

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Take Dawthorn flowers, or for lack of them Daws, and visitil them, the flowers in May and the verries when they be ripe, take of this water three spoonfulls, with three spoonfulls of Malmsey, a quantity of Ginger, and brink it warm.

CHAP. CLXXXV.

A Water to be made when Couflips are in their prime,

Take fit bandfuls of Coulip flowers, one handfull o f Rofemary flowers, half a pound of Reafons of the fun floned, half a pound of Liquozice bzuiled, a quarter of a pound of Anifeeds groffely beaten, but all thefe into their gallons of good ale of lies of Wine over night the next mouning diffil them in a limbeck, and when you have a quart of water kep it by it felf, two of the founduls of this water is good for an ill flomack that is weak of bigestion, and for the fplic and other infirmities of the Romack.

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CMAP. CLXXXVI,

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To make Barley-water for a Fever, or an-Agues

Ake a little handfull of Barley, and ftep it in a porrenger of fair running water, the space of two or three hours, then pour away the water from the Barley, and take a pottle of the like water, and boil the Barley in it; then take it from the fire, and put the water from the Barley, then put the Bar. ley in three pints of fresh water, with a parsley root, and a Fennel rot the pith taken out ; then being boyles to a pint, Arain it, and ule it thus. Take thee of four sponfulls thereof, mired with two sponfulls of firrup of Ulinegar, and use to drink thereof every five hours upon your good day, and keep your body foluble with a fuppos Atary once a day, if nature bo not this office. Drink allo of it in your fick days, allo the day after your fit at fir of the clock in the mouning. Take half an ounce of Liquos rice, and a good handfull of Annis febs groffely baufed and boiled with a wine pint of the broth of a Chicken. let it lie fo till it come to a full good draught then frain it hard out, and make it sweet, and so bloud warm let him brink it up at one braught, and neither eat. fleep, noz fiveat five og fir hours after, and fo the fever will aloav.

CHAP. CLXXXVII.

A moft excellent Water for the Stone.

Is the moneth of Day, when Dren go to graffe, take of their Dung, neither too new noz ton day, then vifil it fair and foftly into some vessel oz glasse, of which you thall have a water without any ill shour, which will take

take out any spot of blemith in the face, if you walk therewith dayly. Is eep the same Water in a bial of glasse close ftopped, then take three of sour Kadich-roots, cut them in pieces, and fill the bial with good Muskadel, they being put into it : let it ftand so in the sun one day and a night, then take one part of the Wine, two parts of the Water of the Dung, a pint of Strawberry-water, three of the Dung, a pint of Strawberry-water, three of there be of these waters diffilled, and propostioned together, half a glasse full of sugar, of a little Honey, and so give it the Patient to drink, and you thall se a wonderfull effect, and present remedy.

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CHAP, CLXXXVIII.

This Water is very pretious for frantick and madmen, very often proved.

Take of the flowers of Kolemary, of Burrage, and of the roots of Fugloffe, of each half a pound, of Saffron two drams, of Duinces four ounces, of the belt White-wine two pints, mir them altogether, and let them fland to for the space of a natural day after that bur ry the glaffe wherein all the same is, in Horse dung for fifteene dayes, and then take it out, and diffil a water thereof according to Art, two or three times over : keep this Mater as the apple of your eye, for it is very piecious, and well proved in all melancholy fickneffes very effectually, and the pain and trembling of the heart : The quantity to be given at one time, is a dram, which is the weight of seventy two Barley-corns, if you will prove it, you will praife it. And this in the new Jewel of Bealth, with many more ercellent things.

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CHAP. CLXXXIX.

Au excellent approved water for the Stone.

Ake a galion of new milk from a red Cow, and put thereto one handfull of Pelitozy of the Wall, one handfull of wild Time. one handfull of Datafrage, one handfull of Parfley, and two og three R dich roots fliced fteep all thefe in the milk one night, the next mogning biftill the milk with the hearbs, with a moderate fire, the bell time to diffill this water is in the end of May og beginning of June, ale it in this manner, take of the water eight fponfulls, and of Rhenich of Walite-wine five of fir sponfuls, a little Suger, Putmeg fliced, make it luke-warm, and deink it falting, and falt three hours after it using temperate exercise; take this two mognings and two nights together to betward, every fourteen dayes at the full of the Moon, and at the decrease, og as often as need requireth.

CHAP. XC.

A Water for the falling fickneffe.

Take the water of garden Lillies, and give a child to drink a sponfull thereof at the appearing of the ficknesse, and when it is there with visited, but to an old der person three or four sponfuls.

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CHAP. XCI.

An excellent water good for the flomack and head.

Take a pottle ef white. Wine, a handfull of Balm, a handfull of Bittony, a handfull of Coullip-flows ers, and a handfull of Rolemary flowers clean picked, put all these into an earthen beffell with the wine close covered. let it fland fir days, flir it twice every day, so done put them into a flill, with two ounces of the best Detridate, half an ounce of Cinamon, half an ounce of Claves both bauised, passe your Still close, and so let it work with a lost fire, and not open it till you find it all spent, and when you spend it, put into every pint four ounces of white sugar Candy, and keep the first stilling longest, because it will be stronger then the latter.

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CHAP, XCII,

A Water to cure the Tooth-ach.

Ake of Claret-Wine one pint, Cloves one sponfull, of Rosemary, Bittony, and Bzamble-leaves, of each half a handfull, boil all these over a soft fire, untill half be consumed. Then reserve it for your use in pots close covered.

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CHAP. CXCIII.

To make a Water cordially good against any infectious difease, as the small Pox, Measels, or Pettilent burning Fevers, and to divert any offensive or venemous matter from the stomack, or to be used after a surfeit or in passions of the Mother, or for children in Fits of Convulsions, and is generally good to comfort and strengthen nature in all cold difeases.

TAke of Bige, Celendine, Rolemarr, Rue, Rola folas Wozmwood, Bugwozt, Bimpernill , Dzagons, Scabius, Egrimony, Balm, Bittony-flowers, and leaves, Centary tops and flowers, Parigolds tops and leaves of each of these a good handfull : then take your roots of Tozmentil, Angelica, Elecampane, Pios ney, Liquorice; all clean scraped, of each of these half an ounce, let all the hearbs be walken , and taken in a linnen cloath untill they be well dried, then theed all to. gether, and let your roots be fliced thin and mired with the hearbs, then put them all into a gallant pot of white-Wine, and let them all ficp together in a large gally pot, og earthen pot that is well leaded, and to let them remain close sovered two dayes and two nights, firring them once in a Day, then distill all together in an ozdinary Role-Still, and notin a limbeck with a loft fire, receiving a pot og a pint of the firft water by it felf for your Grongeft, alfo a quart of the fecond running water by it felf, and of your laft a weaker fost by it felf.in feberal glaffes clofe ftopped with cosks faft tied with leather. The Arongeft water when one is infected is to be taken by a fponfull at a time every mosning falling, if they call it up they mult take it again,

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CHAP, CXCIII!.

An excellent water for any Sore either old or new.

Take a quart of pure running water, a pint of white wine, that or four sponfuls of Labenver seas, two spoonfuls of live honey, a little piece of of Roch Allom, boil them together, till the one half be consumed, then walk the soze there with.

CHAP, CXCV,

A pretious water against the Plague, Pestillence, and Poison.

Take the diffilled water of Diptanum Pimpernel Tozmentil and Scabius, of each a like quantity, and mir them together and dzink thereof. Pillolophers doe report that it were impolible for any man to dye of poifon or pestillence, if he use often to drink these waters next his heart. It is called water Imperial, and all great States among the Sarasins use to dzink thereof.

CHAP. CXCVI.

A precious Water.

TAke Galingal, Cloves, Auibes, Ginger, Pellilot, Cardemons, Pace, Autmegs, of each an ounce, and mingle all the focelaid with the lame supres, and a pint of Aqua vinx, and three pints of white. Where put all these together into a Stillatory of glasse, and let it stand so all night, and on the morrow distill it, this water is of secret nature, and helpeth the lungs without any griebance, and mightily healeth and comforteth the if wounded and perished, it suffereth not the bloud to putrifie R

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but multipliethit in great quantity, yea, he that useth it thall not often need to be let bloud, it is god against heart-burning, and resisteth Pelancholy and Flegm to puffe up 02 have domination above nature, it expelleth theum mightily, and profiteth the stomack marbellously it conserveth youth in the fresh estate, and maketh a good colour, it keeps and preferdes the Daphage and memory, and bestroys the palse of the lims and of the tongue, and keeps one from palses, further, if a sponfull of this water be given to man c2 woman labouring towards beath it wil releeve them. Finally of all Artificial Waters there is none better. In Summer once a week use the quantity of a sponfull fasting, and in winter the quantity of two sponfuls.

CHAP. CXCVII.

A Water to drink with Wine to cool choller,

T Ake Burrage roots and Succesy roots, two of each fost, wath them and forape them clean and take out the pith, then take a fair earthen pot of fluo gallens, and diffil it with fair Spring water, and fet it on a fire, with Charceal, and put the roots therete, and eight pennyworth of Tinamon, and when it beginneth to feeth put in four ounces of Sugar, and let it feeth half an hour, and fo take it off and let it cool, and afterwards or ink it with wine or without at your pleafure.

Снар, CXCVIII.

An excellent Water for the weakneffe of the back and pricking of the Urine.

Take a pottle of Mulmfey, a handfull of Bettony five Parlley.cots, five Fennethrouts, cleanscraped.

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and the pith taken out, a nutmeg minced, seeth all these together unto a quart, and clarifie it, and put thereto an ounce of white Sugar Candy, daink this water evening and moaning, as hot as you can suffer it.

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CHAP, CXCIX.

The making of the Fistula water.

Ake Bolearmonack four bunces. Camphire one ounce, white Topozas four ounces, boil your To. pozas and Tamphire in a little black earthen pot, untill they become thin, firring them together untill they become hard in feething, then beat them in a fione Dozter to powder, and beat your Belearmonack by it felf to to powder, and then mingle them together, and kep your powder in a bladder, till you need to nie them, then take a pottle of running water and fet it on the fire, till it begin to feeth, then take it off from the fire, and put in three goed spoonfulls of the powder into the fodden water while it is bot, and after put there with the powper into a glaffe firring the water twice a day for a fortnight, which will make the water fronger, but be fore you use it let it be well fetled, and apply it as hot as the party can well induce it and lay a clean linnen cloath four bouble to the fore wet in the fame water, and bind it fall with a rowler, to keep it warm, do this moz. ing and evening till it be whole; this water must be put in an Dofter fell, and not in a fawcer, when you breffe the fore other ways the fawcer will foak it up: remember to take three great sponfuls, when you put them in the water : take beed you let none daink this water, put it not into any beffell you use after if you please to make the water Aronger, take an ounce of Allome well beat. en to powder, and mingle it well with the other pows pers befoze you put them to the water, this water cures all old fozes, principally filtulaes, Tetters, Boils, Tanckers 16 2

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Tanckers in the mouth, scabs, op scalls in the head, green wounds op any thing else in this kind.

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To draw a Quintaeflence of mans bloud,

Ake the bloud of a young languine man and chols. lerick man at the Barbers hops as thou mayeff have it, and namely of such men as use good wines, then put away the water after it hath ftod, and pafte and bake it with ten parts of Common falt, prepared to the ule and medicine of man, then put it in a glaffe beffell, and put it in hogle dung til it be rotted and putrified all the bloud into water, and that may be within ten days, fometimes moze and fometimes leffe. Then put it in a limbeck and diffill it by a good fire, and take thereof the water as much as thou may, and grind the dregs that it leaveth on a marble frome, and put all the water thereto and grind it again together , and then difill it, and to continue grinding and diffilling as before many times untill thou have a noble water of bloud, of the which Muintaellence may be drawn thus. ALake the same water and put it in the Stillatory of circu. lation, and let it afcond and descend till it be byought to the great fweetneffe, and marbellsus obour, and finel, ling as Aqua vive, as is taught in the book of Duinta, eccence, and this is a marbellous and miraculous Duine taeffence, as thou thalt well know and find by making use thereof.

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Purges, Vomits, Drinks, and Waters. 125

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To draw a Quintaessence from all Fruits, Leaves, Roots, and Hearbs.

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Gwith the tenth part of prepared falt, then purific it and distill it circumspealy, till it have the odour as is before law.

CHAP, CCII, and the sold hold to ge

To draw a Quintaeffence of every of the four Elements by it felf.

Ake thin grounds with ten parts of prepared Salt. and put it to putrific, and thereof draw a Water as is before rehearled by bloud aud other things, take that Water and diffill it in Balneo till there arife no more water, and then halt then one pure Element in the glaffe. Then put the faid water thus drawn, up, on the effects in the glaffe in Balneo, fomewhat warm that the effects and the Mater may mingle well to, gether ; ouring eight og ten daves: the glade well ftop, peo that no air may go out. And then take it up and thake it well together, and put it in a Furnace with athes, and make a good fire under it, and thou thalt dis filla Water in form of oyl red as Bold then haft thou two Elements Water and Fire, and to fererate Mas ter and Fire, diftill that red Water in Balneo, and the Element of Water will arile, and the Fire will remain in the very bottome of the stillatory, a red ERES ONA : STORES Dpl.

Then to part fire from earth take leven parts of the Element of Mater, and put it upon one part of the ef. R 3 feds,

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feds, as you did before by the space of eight or ten days, and so as thou stovelt in leparating the two fir f Cle. ments. But thou mult make a ftronger fire, and there thall alcend ared water, which is the Glement of the five and water together, leparate them in balneo as you did before, and in the Stillatory chall remain the C. lement of fire. And the Glement of earth, is that black Wlater that thou leavest when the fire is blain by bir. tue of the Clement of water, as all others are before. Thus halt thou every Clement by himfelf, now mayeff thou bying every of these Elements, by himself into an ountment by the vellell of circulation, oz elfe diffill ever ry of them leven times. But the black-water malt firft be bapoured, and in a furnace of Reverberation during twenty four ogthirty dayes according to Art. The ufe and effects of this Duintecence is fufficiently veclared in the foregoing Thapters of this book.

CHAP. CCIII,

Here I shall shew you how to draw a Quintaeffence of all minerals, by example of Gold.

Bilding thy Sol into a Calr in this manner; reach thy Sol with quick-filther, and then bapour alway the quick-filber, and in the bapouring alway flir it all the while with a flick, and the Sol will be a fubtil powder, the which calr put in a glaffe and put thersto wine binegar. diftilled, 22 old Hrine biffilled there fingers beedth above the calr of Sol, and fet it in the bot Sun and thou thalt fee a froth of Sol gathered like unto a fcum, upo the binegar : gather that off with a feather, and have by the froth from off the feather in that water, and then gas ther moze : and thus do as long as any fcum will arife upon the binegar. Then bapour alway the water with fire, and there will remain the Dyl of Sol, which is calles

called Oleum in combustibule, which is the very Quintacflence of Gold. And if thou use this Quintaesflence accozding to Art, it shall restore Pature, and bring again Pouth, and preferbe mans life unto the day that Gou hath prefired for him, which day shall no man passe. Also Quintaesflence of Gold hath great sweetnesse and vertue to allwage aches, and malastes of wounds and to heat wounds and botches, and many other instruction.

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I have already given you many fecrets and rare experiments concerning Chyrurgery, Phyfick, and Chymiftry. There remaineth fome other things moft worthy of obfervation, and as neceflary to be underftood, as any thing which hath hitherto been communicated. I have proceeded to Plaifters, Diftillations, Extractions, Quintaeffences, Purges, Incifions, Minerals, and other things very admirable, the effects whereof have been fufficiently approved. Yet there remaineth fome other things concerning the vertues and effects of Plants, Herbs, and Gums, without the knowledge whereof, no Artiff can effectually undertake any cure; therefore I fhall proceed to that which followeth.

CHAP. CCIIII.

The Vertues of Sage.

Sage is hot and day in the third degree : It is fingular good for the head and brain. it quickeneth the fences and memory, arengtheneth the finews, refloreth health to thole that have a palife that cometh of moifure, it taketh away thaking or trembling of the members. The sugee of Sage taken with honey, is good for thole that spet bloud, it expelleth wind. dreth the drops fie, and purgeth the bloud. The leaves of Sage boyled with Modeline, Plantan, Rolemary, Doney, Alliome, and

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and a little white. White maketh an excellent water foz a Canker, Sozemouth, &c. Sage maketh an excellent and very wholfome Ale, if you adde thereto Bittony, G. grimony, Scabius, a little Spike and Fennel. 御

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The diffilled water of Sage, of Coullips, and of Primrole are good against the Palse being drank and to walh and bath therewith.

A conferve made of the flowers of Sage, and Conflowers, is exceeding good against Palsies, Convultions, Cramps, &c.

The vertues of Clary.

The fields of Clary made into fine powder and mixed with Hony taketh away the dimnels of the eyes, and clæreth the fight and taken inwardly is very good for the back also the herb infused in warm water and applied plaister wise discoverhall kind of swillings especially in the soynts. But it is the more effectual if you ad thereto Pallows and Smallage.

The vertues of Pellitory of Spain.

Dis head is good against the Wegrim, the Venigo, or the giddinels of the head the Apoplexie, the Faling ficknes, the Palse, and is fingular good for all cold infirmities of the head and finewes.

The vertues of of Tobacco.

T Dbacco is of fingular use both in Phisick & Chiur, gery. Dil of Tobacco is good to anount the Stomack and so many other griefs of the body, it healeth all manner of wounds and sozes, if you make a salve thereof thus Take oile of Roles, oile of St Johns-wort, of each one pint, the leaves of Tobacco beaten small in a flone morter, two pound : boile then together to the consumption of

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of the juice, firain it and put it to the fire againe, adding thereto of venis Turpentine two ounces, of Oblibanum and Mattick of each half an ounce in fine powder, a put thereto to much war and Rofin as will make it into a Galbe. Tobacco is also the beft medicin that is for deafnes if you use it in this manner. Take a quart of runing water, and put it into a new pipkin, and put thereto 3, ounces of Varinus Debacco opened into the leaf, and beil it to a pint then firmin it hard, and keep it a glafs bial for your use. When you go to bed warm a little of this water bloud warme, then foak therein a little black woll and put it into both your ears, do thus every morning and evening as you find occafion. This cured a Lavy that was deaf firtien years.

Of the ule and virtue of Ebulus or Dane-wort.

Take the buds of this begetable, when they are young and green perboil them in water, and make thereof a fallad, and give unts thole that have collide bodies and it will proveke them to fixel. It is an herb very profitable for the finews, it comforteth the weak parts and preferbeth fuch as are weak in the joynts from many acridents: it purgeth phiegen which (for the most part) caufeth vehility of the nerves. Witholoever uleth to drink of a firrup, made of the berries thereof shall not be troubled with h Sout nor any difeale, in the articular parts. The feed dried is profitable against all infirmities caufed of humidity,

The use and vertue of black Ellebore.

The root of black Ellebore being dried and kept fluo years may be fakely used without other preparatios, and may be ministred against any infirmity, that bath his originall of a melancholy cause. Therefore it is most appropriate against the feaver, quartain, & lunatick persons bered if meläsholy. The

The llfe and Vertues of

The use and virtues of the hearb called Gratia Dei, a kind of Geranium, in English blew Storks-bill,

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TAke of Gratia Dei, ogied in the Gadow and beaten ins to fine powder one ounce, Cinamen 1 daam, Cloves one fcruple, Wheat flower one pound, Dienges.con. eite one ounce, make thereof a paffe with honey, and bake if in the Doen with bread: but take great beed that if buen not. Df this you hall give one ounce to purge against many infirmities : but above the rest against Scrophulæ, against scabs, and the white scall. for it evacuateth onely the superfluous humidity of the boby, it drieth, and is appropriate for fuch kind of infirmis ties. Howbeit you mult note that all foluble medicines are not fit. for one difeale or completion : for chiefly and properly Rubarb purgeth choller, black Clebore aboid, eth melanchely, Danewort Dispossesteth the body of phlegm, and this herb cleanfeth the bloud. Therefore e. very one hath his peculiar propertie : though sometime either of them may work upon more caufes than one, pet not fo properly or fimply, but by accident, and in regard of circumstances.

Two do uns of the powder of this hearb. dounk in wine od booth, proveketh vomite and fiege, and is very good for such as are lumatick. It helpeth or at the least delayeth the extremity of the feaver : it is good against griefs in the Comack and wind in the belly.

A decodion thereof made with lie, helpeth putrified bleers if they be walked therewith; for as it purgeth the fromack, fo it cleanseth the fore, and healeth it quickly, if you wet a cloath in the faid lie and apply it thereunto.

The virtues of Rubarb.

De heard called in § Italian togue, Lappacia maggiore, or Rombice domestice, is a kind of Rubar b, which among

among the leatned Herbarills, is termed by the name Rha recentiorum : whereof one dram when it is new, will isle the body, ebacuate choller, as the Rhabarbarum doth. It is bery good against the oppilations : it purgeth the bloud, and taketh away feabs.

You thall have a most precious medicine thereof : if you mir the græn root with Honey, Cinamon, Saffron, Ginger, and the powder of Roles.

If you roll the root in the embers, and mix it with condited Sugar it breaketh the Scrophulz, and mundifieth them, and healeth them in Morttime. Some do mix it with the gum called Ammoniacum, and to do bring it into the form of an unguent, and apply it unto the parts affected with the Scrophulz.

The virtues of Tithymale.

Gather the hearb Tithymale (called Spurge) in the Imoneth of May: take forth the sugce and mix it with Sougar-rolet or Sugar biolet in fine powder: the make of the both a moist past i keep it in a glasse close sopped.

When you purpole to use it, minister two scruples thereof in booth of any other convenient scrup. It pur, geth without pain, helpeth all feavers that come of heat: working not only by & stool but provoking of sweat also.

It relates all continual and quotivian fevers, when the parties affected therewith be hot, and their flowat cold, yea though they be brought very low, it wil by Bods help deliver them of their troublefome adverfary.

Laureola doth also move the body, by vomit and siege, but it may not be used in any continuall feaver of quotidian; because it will instame too much.

The viranes of Soldanella,

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bet and day. It purgeth bomits and fige, and is er.

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cellent against the dropsie, all windinesse and unwhole fome moisture in the body. Being taken in loginges, with Aromatico. the quantity of one dram, it lendeth forth all the noisome waterinesse, out of the body, drying and heating those parts in an excellent manner.

The virtues of Cyperus.

The herb Cyperus called in English Galingal, being put into new wine giveth it an ercellent good taste a finel, prevailing against inward passios caused of wind. It is good for fuch as are bursten for it refoldeth the wind, if you take the powder thereof being stamped bery small and make a plaister thereof with other things appropriate thereunto, applying the same to the rupture, and changing it once every day. Also if the patient do once a day eat of the root, he shall in sort space be helpen of that difease.

The virtues of Elder.

I ake the roots of Elder, wach them clean, and scrape them till you come to the wood, stamp that sub stance, and take the ingre and strain it, boil it, and soun it wel; and for every sunce of the ingre, take one sunce of Mel rofarum, and drink it for it will cost the stomack, help hot feabers quickly, and purge the bloud.

The virtues of fweet Margerome.

TAke fiveet Pargerome, and flamp it, and take of the supre one sunce, oyl of bitter almonds one dram, and one foruple of Paffich, and fnuffe it up at the nofe, three or four mornings together : and anoint the head with oyl of egs. This purgeth the bead of all pains, diffolbeth tumors quickeneth the fight and probeketh fieth.

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The use and vertues of Perficaria.

Y Du thall understand, that this herb, doth work (in a manner) against all infirmities, most strangely to behold. For if you take the powder thereof, and put it upon Copper molten, it will in the projection become like gold, and will draw if to a small quantity, and make it malleable, and soft like gold, except the colour.

Allo if you make a Grong lie of the albes of Perficaria and therein boil gellow baimfone, it will daaw out of it quick-filber, which is the Phylolophers Hercury. This perbooth allo molt notably preferve a man from many infirmities, if one part thereof be taken whiles it is day and one other part of Specia vencuane; being both of them well incorporate together, and uled in your meats.

Of man and the Medicines that are made of him.

An is a rational of reasonable creature, whereof VI we have written at large in our book called Philica del Fioravante. But here we will onely white of certain medicines, that may be made of derived from him: which are for the eafe, help and remedy of divers infirmities which are in men and women. The reason whereof is bery good, for every like rejoiceth with, and helpeth his like, and therefore man ferbeth for man. The fat of a man is (as every man knoweth) hot and penetrative, and mollifying if you anoint the parts therewith, (where the finetos be hard) and dy win together, or contraded, there. foze it will quickl refolbe them. I habe made the Quin. taeffence of mans bloud, redified and circulated, with the which I have done most wonderfull cures for if you give thereof one dram it will rettore those that its at the point of beath. some of the same

It is molt prostable, against the infirmities that are in S 3 the

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the bloud; for it correcteth the malignity of the bloud, and preferbeth it as well as the spirit of wine. If you put a little of it into an bogs head of Wine it will purific it, and preferbe it along time more then any other thing whatloever, So that this Quintastence workerh more steds, forthe cure of great and dangerous inficmities then any other.

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Allo from the liver of a man will be drawn by diffile lation a water and an oyl. If the water be baunk every morning together, by the space of a moneth, in the quant fity of one brans, with fluo ounces of Liver-wart, it will receiver fuch as are half rectan through bileafes of the lis ber and bath others other properties, whereof I will not seeak at this time.

From the field of man biffilled, there will come forth a flinking water and an oyl, which is most excellent to anoint wounds withall when they are badly healed, and that there remain any burt in these parts, that they are not fo fentible & pliant, (as they were wont to be befaze) this diffolbeth them. And is mollifieth and fosteneth all hardhede of turany, of what ariginall forber it wall come. Callas Hood and an amerida na

From the forepart of a mans fcull there is braton by diffillation, a water, an oyl, and a falt which is most profitably uled again the falling fickneffe. 的第三人称单数 化合同 化合同

D Ces are of nature bot & moill, having a generative Dysoperty. For if they be given to any barren crea. ture, they Mall conceive in Most time after.

Alfo if you lay dead Wees in a or place to putrifie, wetting them fometime w wine, they wil revive again though not as they were before, but they will be much bigger and of another form.

These Bas if you bying into powder with as much Cantaripes; beil them a little with opl of Camomil and anoise

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anoint any part where the hair is fallen away, and it thall quickly come again and in a thost space; a most strange thing to behold.

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The use of Fregs,

The skins of flogs being boiled and made into the form of a plaister with war and frankincenfe, is ver ry profitable for such as have any maligne or treubler some accident about their legs through heat.

The fat of Frogs is a wonderfull medicine against Fueco facto, 03 St. Anthonies fire, a disease happening uns to childzen and others through the great heat that is in their bloud.

The use and vettues of the refine or gum called Tacca Mahacca.

Take thereof as much as you will, diffil it in a retost of glaffe, and from it there will come both oyl and water. Df which I have then divers medicines made as gainst fundage viscales. Anoint, the belly with this oyl cold, when you go to bed; and it helpeth against the ccudity of the Matrix.

Af the genitel part of the man be anointed therewith before the ad of generation, the woman thall be the more fit for conception: for by this means some kind of fleriltty is taken away.

It helpeth and caleth pain in the head, procéeding af a colo flomach.

It helpsth digittion and refolveth pain throughout the body, in what part foever they thall come, especially, when they have their beginning of colo.

The water hereof villelveth wind in the Anmack beipeth vigettion, provoketh vring, mitigateth all feavers that come of cold,

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The virtues of the gum Caranna, and the medicinall properties of ir.

Take it and visitil it in a retort with the yolks and whites of eggs, and there will come forth oyl and water, the oyl where of will be black, and the water red.

The water of Carrana helpeth Skilblains, and all chopps of clifts in the lipps arting of cold in the winter.

It is a great eale for the fore breaks of women, that give fuck.

The oyl worketh wonderfull effects, in wounds of the head, arm og legs,

Anoint a fimple wound there with care of theice: and it will very (peolly be healed.

Take a quantity of this gumand mic it with as much of the feed of Mater-creffes, and the white of an egge, and make thereof a cerot to apply unto a suptire wherewith it wil in thost time be healed, all other circumstances being also observed.

Of liquid Amber and the med cinall vertues thereof.

TAke liquid Amber and diffill it in a retost: and from thence there will come a red oyl.

This oyl is used against all indispositions of cold, and moisture of wind.

The fame healeth fcabs, and is good for wounds.

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If you anoint the Comach therewith, it will ercees ingly comfost the fame : foz it is a thing uncorruptible, and like unto Ballamum,

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The vertues of Oak . Apples.

The Dak-apples are good against all fluxes of blows and lasks, in what manner seeber it be taken but the best way is to beil them in red-wine, and so prepared, it is good against the excessive moilture and swillings of the Naws, and almonds or kernels in the thus t.

The decodion of Dak-apples flays womens fickneffe, and cauleth the mother that is fallen down, to return as gain to his naturall place, if they do fit over the faid des codien being very hot.

The fame fixped in firong white. Wine vinegar, with a little powder of brimfiane, and the roots of Frocus mingled together, and fet in the fun by the space of a moneth maketh the hair black consumeth proud and superfluous field it taketh away any fundurning freckles, spots, the morphew, and all deformities of the face being walked there with.

The vertues of Crabs.

The juyce of Trabs taketh away the heat of burning or scaloing and all inflamation, and being laid on in thort time after it is scalded, it keepeth it from blisfring.

The sugce of versugce is allringent of binding, and hath with al an addersive quality being mired with hard geest of Ale of Beer, and applied in manner of a cold opniment, that is spread upon a cloathurst wet in versugce and wrung out, and then laid to : taketh away the heat of St. Anthomes fire, allinstamations whatseever, it healeth scabbed legs, burning and scalding whatsever it be.

The Ulfe and Vermes of

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The virtues of Adders-tongue.

The leaves of Adders, tongue framped in a flons mozter, and botted in cyl of Ovide unto the confumption of the sugce, untill the herbs be day and parched, then frained, will yield a most excellent green cyl: 02 cather a Ballome for græn wounds, comparable unto cyl of St. Johns Mozt, if not far surpassing it by many degræs, whole beauty is such that bery many Artiffs have thought the same to have been mired with Merdigreas.

To make Salt of any Plant or Herb.

T Ake a good quantity of what Plant you please that is full of juyce, beat it in a Stone moster, and put running water therets, then beil it to the con umption of the one half. Aratnit very hard, and boil this decotion to the thickneffe of a firrup, and fet it in a glaffe eight days, and on the tep you will find a kind of Sait like Sal Gem, take that and walh it in the water of the herb whereof it was made and day it. In this manner you may make Salt of Wiesmwood, Balm, &c.

The vertues of Sow-bread.

The root maketh the skin fair and clear, and cureth all fcabs and fcurffs and the falling of the hair, and taketh alway the marks and spots that remain after the small pocks and measels, and all other blemisses of the face, the root hanged upon women in trabell causeth them to be delivered incontinently.

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The virtues of Sasifrage.

The root of Saxafrage drunk with With Witne and Minegar cureth the Petitience holden in the mouth preferbeth a man from the faid vifeafe. and purifieth the corrupt aic, the fame being chewed in the mouth maketh one to aboid much phiegm, draweth from the by in all groff and clammy tuperfluities, allwageth Mooth acd, and bringeth speech again to them that are taken with the Apoplerie, the inyce of the leaves doth take and cleanse away all spots, and freckles, and beautifieth the face, and leabeth a good colour, it is of excellent use against the Stone.

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The vertue of Maidemhair.

Med upon a place that wanteth hair cauleth it to grow.

The vertue of the Afh-tree.

The Ath tree for such as are too fat or groffe men use to take dayly three or four alhen-leaves to drink in wine to the intent to make them lean.

The vertues of Violets.

V Telets Camped and laied to the head alone, or mings, led with ogl: removeth the extream heat alwageth head sach, provoketh Geep and moiteneth the brain it is good therefore against the drinesse of the head against melancholy and bullnesse or headinesse of spirit.

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The Ule and Vertues of

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The vertues of Hylop,

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Hysop sob in vinegar, and holden in the meuth afe finageth tooth-ach, the vecession thereof doth statter congealed and clotted bloud, and all black marks that come of firipes of beating, and also cureth the itch; seratch, and foul mangineffe if it be washed therewithe all. Gillow-flowers, so Wall-flowers, the succe there of dopped into the eye, both waff, and scatter all dime neffe in the same.

The vertues of Oak-leaves.

Oak leaves famped very small do heal and close up green wounds, and both ftop the bloud being layed.

The vertues of Hoar hounds

Hand lungs; helpeth the pain in the fide, is good a. gaint the Tylick, and the ulceration of the lungs.

Of the Barbil and to what use she ferveth in medicine.

I & the moneth of May the Barbil hath egs, which are of a foluble quality, and of fome those eggs be eaten; they shall be proboked to bomite.

They have a quality contrary to other purgers, they mult be dried in the fun mired with a little Sena, and then ministred in wine or water that is lodden. When it hath wel wrought the patients mult eat good meat to nourish them, and may drink wine, and when they are disposed the reto, suffer them to seep.

Of Centumpedees called in English Sows,

If you minister the powder of these creatures in wine, it hath many excellent properties, but chiefly it hath been experienced, greatly to prebail against the fitchin the fide for it will help that grief presently.

If you burn the little cræking creature called a crice ket, and minister the power therest in some Diuretickhquor, it proboketh urine,

Pallows, Alkakengi, Centum nodi, Centum grava, and the roots of Rapes: are of like property, being handled and used according to art.

There are oftentimes found in ftanding pools, and putrified waters, certain small creatures which are round like a cherry, having a tail and two feet, which are in Lombardy called Comazzi. Take these, and dis still thereof a water of liquos, where with you may bery soon consume of break iron : a very great secret observed, in nature.

How to make a Plaufter for the Rheum.

Take of Dears, Suet, Airgin, Mar, Kolen, perkiese fen, a quarter of a pound of each, Obliganum, Benjamin Maltick, take of each a quarter of an sunce, two brams of Camphire, beat these small, take three penngs worth of Turpentine, boil all these together in a pint of white. Mine ercept the Turpentine which mult be put in after it is taken off the fire, and fir it till it be celd; then temper it in your hands, and so role it up in roles, and keep it close from fire.

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They are to beuied in broth or to be diffilled.

These be also hot, and tend temperature as the reft but to the expelling of wind.

These roots be also hot and comfortable, and likewife good to ftrengthen nature.
