

But when Paul perceived that the one part were Sadducces, and the other Phartfees, he cryed out in the counsaile, Men and biethien, Jama Pharifee, the fonne of a Pharifee: of the hope and refurrection of the dead I am judged. And when he had to faid, there arole a des bate between the Pharifees and the Sadducees: and the multitude was divided. for the Sadducees fav that there is no refurrection, neither Angel, not spirit: but the Pharifees confesse both. And there arose a great cry: a when the Scribes which were of the Pharifees part arose, they Aroue, faying, we find no euill in this man: but if a spirit or an Angel hath spoken to him, let bs not ftrine against God. And when there arose a great debate, the chiefe captain fearing leaft Paul mound have beene pluckt asunder of them, commanded the fouldiers to goe downe, and to take him from among them, and to bring him into the cattle. And the night following, the Lord flood by him, and said, Be of good cheere, Paul: foz as thou half testified of mee in Dierusalem, so must thou beare witnesse also at Rome. And when it was day, certaine of the Jewes gathered themfelues together, and made a bow, faying that they would neither eate nor drinke till they had killed Paul. And they were more then fourtie men, which had made this conspiracie. And they came to the chiefe Priests a Elders, and said, we have bound our selves with a bow, that we will eate nothing butill we have flaine Paul. Rowthere fore give ve knowledge to the chiefe captaine, and to the countaile, that he bring him foorth buto vou

But follow not thou their mindes: toz there lie in waite for him of them mo then fourtie men, which have bound themselves with a bow, that they will neither eate not drinke, till they have killed him: and now are they readie, and looke for a promife from thee. The chiefe captaine then let the young man des part, and charged him, See thou tell it out to no man, that thou halt shewed these things to mee. And he called buto him two budercaptaines, layina, Make ready two hundred fouldiers to goe to Cefarea, and horfemen threeffore and tenne, and spearemen two hundred, at the third houre of the night: And deliuer them beatts, that they may let Paul on, and bring him lake buto felir the hie deputy. And he wrote a letter after this maner, Claudius

Claudius Lylias, buto the most mightie ruler fc= lir, sendeth greetings. This man was take of the Tewes, a hould have bene killed of them: Then came I with an armie, and rescued him, and perceived that he was a Romane: And when I would have knowen the cause wherefore they accused him, I brought him foorth into their cours fatte. 110 hom I perceived to be accused of questions of their law, but having nothing lard to his charge worthy of death, or of bonds. And when it was hewed me how that the Jewes land wait for the man, I fent him Araightway to thee, and gave commandement to his accusers, that the things which they have against him, they should tell before thee. Farewell. Then the fouldiers as it was commanded them, tooke Paul, abzought him nighto Antipatridis. On the mozow, they left the horsemen to goe with him, and returned buto the castle. Which when they came to Cefarea, and delivered the Epittle to the deputie, viefented Paulallo beforehim. And when the devuty had read the letter, he asked of what prouince he was. And when he biderstood that he was of Cilicia: I will heare thee, said he, when thine accusers are come also. And he commanded him to be kept in Devods judgement hall.
