# To all such Readers, as have care of theyr bodily bealth.

Ow prouident a parrone and bountifull a Father, the Lorde God of life is, vnto vs vnthankfull and rebellious Children, his manifold benefits doo tellifie : yea the continuance of his kindnelle is heerein principally declared. # An Hospitall for the diseased.

A preservation against the Plague.

Take a handfull of Sage, a handfull of Hearb, grace, of therwife called Rew, a handful of Elder leaves, a hand, full of red Bramble leaves, and Campe them together, and Craine them through a cloath with a quart of white Wine, then take a quantitie of Ginger, and mingle with them altogether, and drinke thereof morning and evening a spone, full nine daies together.

For the partie infected with the Plague.

If it fortune one to bee sicke of the Plague before hee have brunke the foresaid medicine, then take the water of Scabious a sponefull, water of Betonie like much, and a quantitie of fine Treacle, put it together and drinke it and it will expell all the benome.

A medicine to breake the Botch,

If it fortune the Botch to appeare, then take Bramble leaves, Gloer leaves, Pullard leave, and flampe them altogether, and then take of it and make a plaister, and laye it to the sore, and it will draw out all the benome.

A medicine for the Plague.

Take three flips of hearbe Grace, and fire spoonefuls of Mineger, and beate the same togeather, then straine the inice out thereof, and put thereunto one ounce of sine Treacle, and one ounce of sugar and stir it together, then set it over the sire, and make thereof a sirrop, and put it in a bore close, then take a sage lease, and everie morning fasting, spread as much as a Beane thereof upon the same lease and so eate it. And if hee that taketh it, be insected, it will drive it from his heart, and if the partie that taketh it evening and morning he not insected, it will preserve him within 24, houres after.

A plaister to drawe the fore-

Take one spoonefull of Ponie, the inice of Spurge, two sponefuls and a halfe of wheaten flower, a good quantitie, and one

one sponefull of Turpentine, and temper these together withsout fire, and make of the same a plainer, and lay it to the soze, changing it at enerie 24. houres.

A good medicine against the Plague, approved.

Amongst other excellent and approved medicines for the pestilence, there is none more worthy available when the sore doth appeare, then to take a Cocke, Pullet or Chicken, and let the feathers of the taile of the highest part bee plucked off, till the rumpe be bare, then holde the saide bare of the Pullet to the sore, and the Pullet will gape and labour for life, and in the end will vie, then have an other Pullet, and no the like to the Patient, and if that die, yet still applie the patient with Pullets so long as any do die, sor when the poyson by the saide Chickens is drawne south, the saide Chickens that bee offred thereunto will live, then the sore presentlie will swage, and the partie south-with recovereth, this medicine is necessarie to drive the benome from the heart.

A soueraigne drinke against the Pestilence.

Take an ounce of Sozrell water, and as much Deagon water, a deagme of Areacle, and put thereto a deagme and a halfe of powder imperiall, and give it to the Patient with Ale within 24. houres after he is infected, and he half with Gods grace escape and do well.

A plaister to drawe a head to the fore of the Plague, and to breake it.

Take two Lillie rotes, one handfull of sowre Dowe, two handfuls of Pallowes, one handfull of Linsede, stampe all these together small, and boile it in a quart of the Lies of Thine till it be thicke, then lay it an inch thicke bpon Leather, broader then the sore, and let the borders of the leather bee plaises red with Cordiers ware, to make it cleans it shall bring out the Botch in twelve howers, and breake it shortly.

A medicine that was taught King Henry the seauenth, by his Phisition, against the Pestilence.

Take halfe a handfull of Rew, likewife of Pandzagozies, featherfew, Sozrell, Burnet, and a quantitie of the crops and rotes of Dzagons, wall them cleane, and footh them with a

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fost fire in running water, from a pottle to a quarte, and then Graine them together through a cleane cloth, and if it be bitter, put thereto a quantitie of Sugar-candy, or of other suger, and if this medicine be bled before the purples do rise: ye thall be whole by Gods grace.

A medicine to be drunke suspecting any, to

haue the Plague.

Take a great Dnyon, and the coze being taken out, fill the same sall of god Treacle of Bene, and waap the same in a paper, and rost it till it be softe, then Graine the same with a little wine vineger, and veeing tempered with a quantitie of Suger, give the Patient to drinke two sponesuls fasting, and if the Patient be infected with the Plague, you shall perceive the appearance thereof, within sire howes after the receipt of the same drinke.

Alfo for the viuall drinke of euery Patient being so infected.

Take Rolemarie the quantitie of eight or nine crops, then take of Parigolds being browne within, of burnet; and of Bourage, everie one a handfull thereof, let them bee fod in a quarte of stale Ale clarified, then put into it a crust of bread, a little whole Pace, and a quantitie of suger, and let him drinke the same at all times during his sicknes, and put Pimpernell to his broth-

Also another drinke to be taken enery morning, for a preservatine against the Plague, and for the anoyding of infection.

Take Sauerie the quantitie of a handfull, and boile the same in a quarte of good Thine bineger, with a sponefull of graines being beaten, and put into the same: then brinke the same with a quantity of suger every morning fasting.

A good medicine against the Plague.

Take of Betony water the quantitie of this sponfuls, of good wine vineger, the quantitie of this spoonefuls, and the quantitie of a Putmeg of good Treacle of Gene, or els the quantitie of a Valell Put of Pethridatum being all mixed together, take it in the beginning of your ficknes.

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Take in the morning falling one drie Figge, one Walnut and foure or fine leaves of Kew chopped altogether, and eate them, and afterwards drinke a cup of wine, if it be a woman

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with childe leave out the Rew. For the Plague.

Take an ounce of the leaves of Rew, halfe an ounce of god figs, an ounce of Zeneper berries, two ounces of walnuts picked, four ounces of vineger, and a god quantitie of faffron, frampe all the fozefaide things together, and referve them in an earthen pot 02 a glaffe fall fropped, that no aire issue out, where of if ye receive in the morning bpon a knives point the quantitie of a beane 02 more, yes thall be sure by the grace of God not to be infected within rrivy boures after.

A medicine for the Plague or leprofie.

Take hearbe grace, fotherwoo, mugwozt, wozmewood of each a handfull, three or foure handfuls of Jeneper berries. those which be blacke, cutand theed the bearbs small, and put them into a flaunders Dipkin , and poure therto foure quarts of god white Wine Mineger, and let them foke feauen nights if the hearbs beogie, if they be græne, let them not foke aboue fouretiene houres, then put a handfull og two of those hearbs which be in the Wipkin into the Apll, and then take out a quart of the same vineger, and poure it into the fill bpon the hearbs. and billil it with a prettie loft fire, for to great a fire will walt it away, and fo Will it butill you have Willed all, from the Dipe kin into the Gillatozie, and after this poure it into the pipkin againe, and put as many new and freth hearbs, with fo many berries as you had before in the pipkin againe, and fo let them foke one other feauen nights, and then figll them againe as you did befoze, & fo the third time to be bled with new hearbs, cein the fame manner as befoze, and at the last time, put foure ounces of Wethzidatum into the pipkin amongil the bearbes, oz els fine oz fire ounces of treacle, in place of the Bethridas fum foz want thereof, and then being filled as befoze, put the fame into a double glaffe, and flop it with a pecce of leather bound about it, and if the party be infeded, let him take therof foure

foure ounces at one time, and if niede be, you may give him for much for two or three dates as you fix cause, and to a woman but two ounces, and to children according to their age, and as they be able to beare it: and so sweat two or three houres, or longer if the party may endure, and one stande by alwaies to wipe their face least by putting out their hand they take colde, ec. when all this is three times stilled, it will not amount to arbour three or foure quartes.

An oyle for all manner of aches, bruses, and strainings of the Sinewes.

Take a pottle of Peates feete oyle, and a quarte of an ore gale, a pint of Aqua viræ, a pinte of Rose water, baye leaves. Rosemarie Cripped from the Calkes, Strawberrie leaves, rots, and Crings of Lauender Cotten, of every of these a handfull, beate them small, and put them into the sozesaide Coffe, and seth it over a fire of coales, in a pan of two gallons, and at your owne perrill, let not the same touch the Coffe, let it seth very well, and then take it off, and let it Cand untill it be almost colde, then Craine it through a course linnen cloth, but not the bottom of the said liquo; then put it in a glasse, and so kep it, and when you are pained, annoint your greise withall.

Take Aqua composita, and the oyle of Peates fete luke warme, and annoint the patient open the place of the greefe, laying warme clothes thereon.

A medicine for an ache, or shrinking of the sinewes.

Take the tenderings of Rolemary, and Parthe Pallows, by as even positions as you can gette, gather your heards when they be daye from raine and delve: pound them in a moster berie small, then take Pay butter well clarified, and put it to the heardes, and mingle it in a vestell, and let it stands source dates, then set it over the fire, and let it seth till the Grength of the heards be gone, the take a little of it in a spone, and let it drop by on the naile, and if it be græne as the Emeraulo, it is perfect; and then put it in an earthen pot, and when you will occupie it, you must warme it.

A medicine for an ache.

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Take Parlie and Mommwod, of each a handfull, and leth them in a quart of Ale, with a quantitie of live to Butter, and walh well the place therewith, that akes, and also binde the hearbs to the place, as hot as you may luffer it.

An approved ointment for aches.

Stampe Smallage, and put in it Aqua viræ, and ffraine it, then put therto Bozes greace, and ffraine them well toges ther, and annoint the Patient befoze the fire therewith evening and morning.

A medicine for an ache in any place.

Take Sowthistle, Chickwede, Cloer leanes, gronnosell and Cleuers, of each a handfull, drie all these together between two Tiles, then laie these heards to the place where the griefe is, let the heards be washed before they be dried.

A medicine for aching fores.

Take inice of Smallage, of Sozrell, of waibzed, of each of them like much, take Ponnie and the white of an Egge, of eyther like much, and mingle them together till it thicken, let it come nære no fire, but all raw and cold lay it to the fore.

For aches and fwellings in the knees.

Take a quarte of Palmeley, and a handfull of Time, boile them together, and when it is halfe boiled, put in a good pace of livate Butter, and let them boyle together from a quart to a pinte: when you goe to bed bathe your knees well therewith, and wet a cloth the of four times double therein, and lay it to your knees as hot as you can suffer all night, and vic this fire of seauen times, and it will doubtlesse helpe you.

For a Sciatica or ache.

Take oyle of Peats feet, and Aqua composite, and anoint the same place where the paine is then take woll newly plucked from the theps backe, and lay thereon, and wasp it well with warme cloathes.

A plaister for an ache.

Take as much Cone Pitche to the vallue of a tennis vall, and a sponfull of Tar, and a penimorth of Treacle and Ros In, to the value of a tennis vall, and a sponfull of Hone, boils

it oner the fire in a Bettle, and Air it altogether till it be well melted, then take a new Thepes (kin, and make holes in it with a bookin, and spread the medicine on the fleshy five of the (kin, and lay it to the ache as hot as you may.

For an Ague.

Take Burre rotes, and red Pettle crops, and læthe them in Cale ale, and clarific it, and give the Cicke thereof to drinke about such time as the colde beginneth to come, and after the beate be past. Then you se that he beginneth to sweat, give him to drinke Posset ale, made with Parigolde and Kennell, and se the Posset ale be well clarified, whe this medicine, for it will take away the Ague within three or foure fits at the victormost.

A medicine against the hot Feuer.

Take a handfull of Bay leaues, a handfull and moze of red Sage, and feeth the same in a pottle of Cale ale, to a quart, and the same being Crained, let the patient beeing in bed, drinke thereof a god draught, being warmed with a little sugar, an houre before his sit do come.

A good medicine for an Ague be it quotidian or quarten.

Take of smallage, and of Feathersew, of either of them the quantitie of a handfull, Camp them and Craine them, and then take halfe so much as the inice of the same is of small ale, and beeing mirt together, drinke it warme a little before the time that the sit shall come: that is to say, when you perceive any grudging. This must be drunke three severall times, the patient going to bed, and clothes inough laid by on him.

A medicine for an Ague.

Take Pettles, Tobwebs, and Salte, and beate them in a wooden dishe, and lay it to the lest arme of the licke, and it will take away the heat of the Ague.

For the Ague.

Take Sot, and polices of Egs, and Bay falt, and pepper, and mingle them together, and lay it to both wrells and it will take away the Ague.

at ad the For youndrinke in your Ague.

For your drink, take Ale, & not ftrong, & ble it luke warme.

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Drinke

Drinke and Pottage in an Ague.

Pake your Pottage and pollet ale, and almond milke with these heards following, that is to say, Sinckfoile, Succozye, Buglosse, Endine, Bozage, Sozrell, Lettice, and Fenell rots, and Parsely rotes, great reasons and Prewnes.

A medicine for the drought in an Ague.

Take a quantity of Burrage, a quantity of Sozrell, a certaine of Tiolet leaves, a certaine of Strawberrie leaves, leth them in a pottle of faire running water to a quart, then Araine the hearbs, then take almonds, and blanch them, beate them and Araine them with the faire water, and put lugar therein, and drinke it warme.

A medicine for the quarten Ague and for the drought.

Take a pottle of gwo red Wine, and a pottle of new milke of a Cows of one colour, take two or three good handfuls of Poule eare cleane picked and walhed, Aripe it into the milke and wine, and temper them together and let them And so one night, and put them in a faire Still, and Still them with a soft fire, and take the water and put it in a faire glasse, and let it in the Sunne source or five daies, and let the sicke when he drieth in his Ague drinke thereof three or foure times, and he shall be rid of his Ague, and his drinke shall quench his drought.

A medicine against the Quarten.

Take thell Snailes two handfuls, bay Salt, Pallowes, of each a handfull, beate these together, and lay it to the soles of your face, before the quarter fit outh come.

A medicine for a colde in a Feauer.

Take Camomile and Moozmewood, and feeth them in a quart of Ale, till halfe be consumed, and give it the patient first and last.

A medicine against the hot Feauer.

Take a pottle of Cale ale, and a bottome of a Cale white Loafe, and a handfull of finckfoyle, a handfull of Camomile, Treacle and Tinegar, of each a sponefull, a few whole Paces, sugar Candy, as much as they tiff, and feeth these bottill halfe be consumed, and Craine it from the hearbs, and give it to the patient

patient to brinke, and none other brinke buring his heat, and as much thereof as he will, and it helpeth.

For the Ague.

Take two or three Cloues of Barlike, and brufe them and a peniworth of Aquavira, halfe a pint of ale: feeth them toges ther, and drink it a little before the fit come as hot as you may.

Against the corrupt aire.

Take Betany, Centozy and Egrimony, of each a handfull, and Campe them and Craine them with ale, and with a Lycoras Aicke brused: and then boyle it, and clarific it, and make it pleasant with suger, and drinke thereof every morning blood warme the session fulls, the or source daies.

To make a man haue an appetite to his meat.

South Centozie in faire cleane water, and let the ficke daink thereof every mouning blod warme, three sponefuls, three or foure daies.

To make a man haue an appetite to his meat.

Sath Centozie in faire cleans water, and let the fick brink it luke warme fasting the daies, each day nine sponfuls, and be shall be whole, for this purifieth the stomack and brest also.

A good comfortable powder to difgest well, and many

other good properties.

Take Pellatozie of Spaine, Centozie, Annis, Licozas Graines of Paradice, Ginger, Sinamon, of each like much beaten, and searced into fine powder, and dzinks thereof mozning and eucning, halfe a sponfull in Wine oz in Ale.

To make Ipocras for a weake stomacke.

Take a pint of Aqua vice, and put in a glasse, then take two ounces of Sinamon, and one ounce of Ginger, two penyswooth of Cloues, two peniwooth of Graines, one of Automegs, and beat them altogether to grosse powder, and put them all into the glasse to the Aqua vice and thake it every day of ten nine daies together, and then drinke it with Thine of Ale, halfe a sponfull, of a quarter, with halfe a pint of ale.

A medicine to clenfe the backe, and to purge the reines.

Take one Fennell rote, and two Parfelie rotes, and pick out the pithes of them, and take thereto one handfull of Pella-

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tozie of the wall, and all thefe beeing walhed cleane, feeth in posset ale, and ozinke thereof when you goe to bed, and if you wake at mionight, dzinke you also.

A medicine for the paine in the backe, and for the heate in the backe.

Take Rosewater, and put thereto Saunders, and rose leaves, and lay them in Rose in your Rose water one whose night, then wash your backe with the same, and it will take a way the heat, and greatly comfort the reines.

For paine in the backe.

Take Sage, Kolemarie, Camomell, and Paudlin, of each of them a handfull, then Campe them together and frie them in Pay butter, and annoynt your backe with it warme.

A medicine for the reines of the backe.

Take halfe an ounce of Turpentine of Aenice, and let it be well washed in Plantine water, or Rose water, and then mire it with fine white sugar, and make thereof source or fine balles, which you must eat three in a morning fasting, and day, lie drink a little white wine, or Renish wine immediatly after.

To drive out a paine or griping in the bellie.

Take Sothernewod, and laie it against the place of the contrarie side where the tozment is, and it will drive it out: and if it be laid to the Pauell, it will drive away the paine.

For the byting of any venomous beaft.

Take Plantine and drinke the inice therof, and take plantine and Salendine, of each like much, Camp them and temper them with Cale pille, and lay to the loze, and it will allwage the livelling, and draw out the venome.

A medicine for the biting of a mad dog.

Take a god handfull of Betony, and a handfull of wilde fage, a handful of night. Hade, and faire running water a pint, the hearbs being stamped and strained therwith, and put there to a peniwouth of Treacle, and give it to the patient to drinke, two or three mornings.

A medicine to stop bleeding.
Take Centozie, græne Rew, and red Fennell, and Camp
and

and Eraine them, and orinke them warmed.

A medicine to ftop bleeding.

Take Bursa Pastoris, Plantine, and hisop of each of them like much, and bruise them in a Porter, and warme them as hot as you can against the fire, and lay them to the note of him that bleedeth, and bind some of the hearbs to his temples as hot as he can suffer them.

Another medicine for the same.

Take an olde cleane linnen cloth, and wet it well in bines gar, then burne it to pouder, then take the pouder therof, and if it be a wound cast it therein, and it will stop the bleding immediatly, but if the nose blede, then snuffe by the sozesaid powder into the nose and it will stint bleding.

Another for the fame.

Make a Toade, and drie him in the Sunne very drie, then put him in a Linnen bag, and hang him about your necke with a Aring, so low that it may touch your brest on the left side next but your hart, and commonlie it Aayeth all kinds of bleding at the mouth, nose, or wound.

Another to ftop bloud.

If your note ow blede bameasurable, then tie your little finger verie hard about the lower toyat, and for the most part it faileth not but staieth the same.

For spitting of bloud.

Take the inice of Betonge, and temper it with Goates milke, and give the patient to dzinke the daies.

For the same.

Take Smallage and Pints, Rewe and Betonie, and læth them well in god milke, and sup it warme.

To stench bloud at the nose.

Take Betonie, Camp it with a little falt, as much as thou maiest take by with thy two fingers, and put it in thy nose.

To stench bloud.

Make Linnen cloth, and burne it, and take the pouder and put it in another cloth, and so lay it to the wound. Also take an Pearbe that is called Peruincell, and holo it between thy teth, and thou shalt not blede while thou holdest it there.

Good

Good for the braines.

To smell the savour of Puske, Camomell, to drinke wine measurablie, or to eate Sage, but not much, to keepe the head warme, often washing of your hands, measurable walking, measurable sæping, to heare little noise of Pusicke or singers, to eat Pustard, Pepper, the sauour of Ked Koses, and to wash your temples with rosewater.

Ill for the braine.

All manner of Brains, Gluttonie, drunkennes, late Suppers, to Riepe much after meate, corrupt aires, anger, heavis nes of minde, to frand much bare headed, to eat to much or has filie, to much heat, to much watching, to much cold, Wilke, Chefe, all manner of Auts, much bathing, Onions, Garlicke, and great noise, or to smell a white Rose.

For stopping in the brest.

Make Rew, and læth it in Cifell, and so dzinke it : dzinke Rettle sede bzaied, and it thall boyde grauell of the flone in the raine of the backe.

For a stincking breath.

Take the fiede of Coziander, and boyle it in white rimney of Sacke, and thereof drinke three sponfuls in the morning, and as much at evening, but that you drinke in the mornings must be colde, and the other hot, but you must be to take none excesse of meates, nor drinks, nor sit not late, but rise by early.

A medicine for a bruise in the Leg or arme or else where. Take water cresses, and wash them cleane, and seth them in faire water till they be soft, then beat them small in a Moze ter, and put them in a cleane pan, and put therunto sweet sewet of a Part, Buck, oz Shæpe, and put thereto the Læs of wine, and wheat bran, and fry altogether, and make a plaister there of, and lay it warme to the soze place, and so lay three or source plaisters as neve shall require.

An other plaister for a bruise or sore vnriped.

Take Dtemeale grotes, and leth them in wet Cow milk, butill they bee as thick as Pap, and put it into a pan, with a quantitie of thecees tallow, and boyle them well, and Airre them well, and then make a playtter thereof and laye it to

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the greefe as hote as you can luffer it.

For a bruife or a straine.

Take the grounds of Ale of Bere, and wheat branne, and Chickwiede, and lay it to the greefe three of four e times a day boon a red cloth, not to thin.

For all bruses and aches in the bones.

Take a good quantitie of Malwort, and a certaine of Balme, and Smallage, and Campe them well, then take a pound of Pay butter, and temper them together, then make them in round balles, and let them lye eight dayes after, and then Campe it againe, then fry it and Craine it, and so put it in an earthen pot, and this will helpe the bruse, though it be very blacke.

A medicine for burning, fealding, or burnt with

Take ten of twelve Eggs, as you will make the quantitie of your oyle, and let them be as new as you can get, lay them in the fire, and roll them as harde as you can, then take the yolkes, and chop them as small as you can, and put them in an earthen pot, and set it over the fire, and take a sticke and stir it, and let it boyle butill you se it consumed in a manner to nothing, then take it from the fire, and set it in the agre a quarter of an howre or more, and there will come an oyle thereof, then take a feather, and annoynt the greefe with the same cyle, and take Wartstongue leaves, and lay them byon the greefe, a that will gather the skin, then you may bind a cloth to it.

An other medicine for the fame.

Take the dung of Dele, of one nights making, and fresh butter busiled, or els clarified Sheepes sewet, and fry them in a frying pan a good time or season, butill your sewet be almost consumed, then put them in a cleane course linnen cloth, and straine them into a small bestell, then take a feather, and dip it in the liquor, and annoynt the burned place or scalded, and whe you have so done, wet a sine linnen cloth in the liquor, and cover the sore withall, and do this twife or thrife a day, and by Gods grace it shall helpe you.

For burning or fealding.

Take Paiden wort, stampe it and seth it in fresh Butter, and straine it and annoynt the patient.

To take away a heat or burning with Gunpowder.

Take a god quantity of Poullek, stampe it and wring out the inyce, take the white of sire Egges, and beate them in a oith till they be thin, and then take off the skinne, and put the rest together, and wash the sozes with a linnen cloth, and lay the cloth alost upon the soze wet.

A medicine for burning or scalding.

Take black Sope, 02 gray Sope, and lay it immediatly to your soze.

For burning or scalding.

Take a god handfull of Avans, and as much of Sheepes dung, and so fry them in Hay butter, and straine it, sannoint the place with the same cold, twise a day, but annoynt it first with gray and black sope, and it will help, the syntment must be speed by on a steren cloth, if you can get it.

To make an oyntment for burning with Gunpowder, or fealding with water.

Take a handfull of Barroes greace, and two handfulls of Groundfell, and two or three handfuls of Housek, and Kampe the hearbes together, then put to it news Sheepes dung two handfuls, of Twee dung two handfuls, and Kampe them altogether, and being hote, Kraine them through a cloth into an earthen pot, and with the liquor annoynt the burned place.

An oyntment for burning.

Take Plantine, Maybred, Dasse, and græne barke of Elder, and græne Gose dung, and Dyle of Olife, stampe them
together, and wring them through a cloth, and bathe the place
that is hurt with a feather.

For burning or scalding in what place soener.

Take the white of an Egge, and put it in a Pewter diffe, and then labour it with an Allom Kone, till it be like a Pollet curde; then take a fine piece of linnen, and wet it in Dyle Deliffe, or in some other Dyle, then lay the saide cloth uppon the sore, and aboue it lay the sore sayd curde made of the white of an Egge, and that shall drawe out the fire, and heale the sore.

For

For burning or scalding.

Take foure Egges and rolle them, and take out the yolks, and fry the in a pan softly bpon the embers, till they be blacke, and thereof will come an Dyle, the which saue and put into a Gally pot, and vie it when you have neede.

A medicine for a burning, for lack of other things.

Take the berries of Cloer træ, and lay them to the foze, and it helpeth.

An other medicine for the fame.

Take oyle Dliffe, and beate it with water till it were very white, and annoynt the place.

For a burning with fire.

Take blacke Hernith, and all to annoynt the place with a feather, and it will stay the heate, and heale it as fayze as ever did Dedicine, and so we it till you be whole.

For a Canker in a womans paps.

Take Gose dung, and Salendine, and bear them well together, and lay them to the soze pap, it will clense the Canker, kill the worme, and heale the soze.

For the Canker in the mouth.

Take the inyce of Plantine vinegar, and water of Koles, and walh thy mouth withall many times.

A receit to Still a Cock.

Take a red Cocke of their or foure yeares old, and kil him, and dresse him fagre, and cut him in foure quarters, bruse the quarters, and pick out the fat of them, then take halfe a handful of red Hints, a handful of Parts-tongue, put them in the pot close, with halfe a pint of Palmie, size crops of Pisope, a rote of Parsy, a rote of Fennell, a rote of Endine, twentie Damaske Princes, twenty Raisons of the Sun, source Maces, and let it still twelve houres, and let the pot be covered with paste, with a platter boder it, and let the patient drinke it every morning next his hart.

A medicine for the Collick.

First take a handfull of Rosemary, as much of time, and as much of Hispe, one ounce of Cloues and Pace, and soth it in a pottle of white Thine, and let it soth till it be consumed to a quart,

quarte, then put therein a little Sugar, and beinke therof luke warme, when you feele your felfe pained, and when it is foo. pen, as is before mentioned, you must burne it as you burne of ther wine.

For the Collicke in the fide.

No 1 1 Take a small wooden diffe, & put therein first colde ashes, then lay byon them hote embers, without great coles, & thereboon strew a good quantity of Tummin-sede, and spanishe it with Malmile, and so do till the dish be filled: then couer the with a fave linnen cloth double, and lay it to hote as you can to your fide where the Collicke lyeth, and ble this two oz thee times, and it will helpe you. And for lacke of Cummin febe, take red Sage, Cammomell, Difope, Time, Deneroy all, of like quantity, and ble it as the Cummin feede before.

A Medicine for the stone.

Take Wellitory that groweth on the wall, grounde Juie, Barefrage, Warly, Auans, Mallowes, and red Pettels, Depo per, Cheruell, and Boufe-eare, and boyle all thefe hearbes, of every of them a like quantity in Tahap, and clarific the Tahap with the white of an Egge, and drinke a draught thereof at a time, falling.

An other for the same.

Take halfe a penny-worth of Partly feede, almuch of Rabill feede, beeing wel dreffed and brufed, and feeth them all in a pinte of white Baltard to halfe a pynt, and then drinke it milk marme.

Another to breake the stone.

Take Hauthorne flowers, or for lacke of flowers take Values, and diffill them, the flowers in Pay, and the Berries when they be rive, take of this water thee sponefuls, & thee sponefuls of Palmsie, and a quantity of Dinger, and drinke it warme.

A medicine not onely to breake the stone, but also cleerly to purge you thereof, if you doo vie this fame daylie.

Take the Roles of Dip tree, and pricked Holly leaves, and dry them in an Duen, and beate the feuerally into dry pouder,

then

then put them together being first searced, and of like quantitie: then put thereto the powder of Grommell sede, & Brome
sede, of each a like quantity, doing but halfe so many in quantitie as the powder asore said, and they being mixt altogether,
ble daily a god sponefull of & said powder in a draught of Ale,
Bere, white Time, or Kenish wine, evening and morning:
and besides that, you may ble the same powder in brothes and
pottages, the oftener the better: have alwayes in store a god
quantity of the said powder, you must keepe the same alwaies
dry, in a Pipkin by the fire side, or otherwise.

Another for the fame.

Take Partly, vistill it, and vie to drink the water in white Thine, or in god Ale, and it will bestroy the stone, Collicke, Strangurie, and other passions in man or woman.

A medicine for the Collick and the stitch.

Take the grounds of Palmie, Shæpes tallow, Kibwozt, red Sage, and Alisanders, sæth all these together, and make a plaisfer thereof, and lay it to the græfe, and annoynt you with Oyle Dliffe, and oyle of Balme mixed together.

For the Collick and the stone.

Take Pellitory, butet Lækes, and Pallowes, of each a like quantity, stampe them, and put thereto a penny worth of peates oyle, fry them well together in manner of a playster, put them into a bag of Limnen cloth, and being very hote, lay it to thy belly, and it helpeth within an hower.

And for the stone, lay the same to the reines of the back bee

hind, and it helpeth with speede.

For the Collick and stone.

Take halfe a pound of Time, as much Parlly rotes, and blades, halfe a pound of Alisander rotes, and seeth them altsgether in a pottle of Ale, butill it consume to a quarte, and so drinke it falling.

For the stone, and for him that cannot pisse.

Take a quantity of time, Parlly, crops of Fennel, Sinckfoyle, Alifanders, of like quantity, fine or fire clones of Sarlick, stampe them altogether, and straine them with white Unine or Ale, and drinke therof first and last, warmed.

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A speciall medicine proued, for the stone, Collick, Dropsie,

Strangury, and launders.

Take of Teny halfe an ounce, Ginger, Annis fede, Licorice, Paces, Pettle fedes, Geate, Saffron, of each two peny weight, Kennell feede, and Spikenard, of each one penny weight, and three penny weight of Sinamon, make all these in powder, and drinke thereof halfe a sponefull at once in possetale, or in pottage.

For the Collicke passion.

Take Annis lædes, Kennell lædes, and Caraway lædes, of enery of them halfe an ounce, Dinger, Balingale, and Sienamon, of enery of them two deagmes, Cloues, Paces, and Cardani, of enery of the halfe a deagme, Setwall foure deagmes, Sugar eyght ounces, make them altogether in pouder.

For the stone, or stopping of the water.

Take a pint of white Wine, and therewith make a posset, then take all the curds away, and put into the posset-ale two penny weight of the scraping of white Sope, and boile it, then drinke it as warme as you can.

For the Collick and the stone, proued.

Take Partly fiede, Brome fiede, Gromell fiedes, Fenell fiedes, Annis fiedes, Planten fiedes, and Smallage fiedes, of enery of them a quarter of an ounce, and of Putmegs halfe an ounce, of Sugar tryed, four counces, and beate them altogether in a Porter, butill they be very fine, then fearce the powder through a fearcet, and vie to drinke this powder evening and morning, three dayes in a weeke, with wine or other drink luke warme, and take of this powder at a time, the quantity of a great Pafell out; and if the paine be great, take of the oyle of Scorpions, with oyle of Roses, 4 annoynt your side where the payne is, against the fire.

To purge the bladder of him that cannot piffe.

Take Fennell, and the rotes of Allesanders, Parlly, the rotes and the leaves of Parts-tongue, Paiden-haire, & seeth them in white Mine, and give it the patient to drinke, and it Hall purge the bladder in thort time.

att had the For the fame; attended done salfa to and the

Take Reive, Grommell, and Parily, Campe them toge. ther, and temper them with white Wline, and give it the ficke to prinke warme.

For him that cannot well piffe.

Take a flint frone, and lay it in the fire, butill it be redde hote, and there with warme your Ale, and then daink thereof.

To prouoke vrine, and against the stone.

Take thee quarts of Ale, warme it well, let it be fkimmed thrife, then put to it a handfull of time, a handfull of Rosemas rie, and a handfull of Benniroyall, and let them feth together till one quarter be consumed of more, then straine the hearbes fro the Ale, and brink a draught of the Ale first a last warme. To make one pille.

Take a quarter of a handfull of Parlly, almuch red fencl, walh and thred them small, and put them in a cup of stale Ale, and make a Posset therewith, and drinke the Ale & it helpeth.

For a man that piffeth blood.

Take Ambros a handfull, Burfa Paftoris, almuch, Partly fiede, asmuch, Campe them altogether, and gine the sicke to dainke thereof in Goates milke.

To prouoke vrine.

Take a handfull of red Pettle rotes, and feth them in a quart of good Ale, till it be consumed to a pint, and put thereto halfe a vilh of Butter, and let it be cleane skimmed before the Butter be put in, feth it in Allesander sedes, Parlly sedes, Grommell feedes, beeing beaten into fine powder, and fraine them through a fine cloth, as much of the one as of the other, and brinke thereof first and last.

For the fame.

Take a quantitie of black Sope, and English Saffron, and temper them together cold, and lay it cold bypon your nauell, being speed upon a broade paper, or red leather, and then layd bpon it a Linnen cloth, of tenne or twelve folos, hote, and roule you with a towell, and so lye downe bpon your bedde warme, and it will make you piffe within an howee.

A drinke for the windie Colliek. Take a quarte of Walmue, and two sponefuls of the pith

of Partly rotes, and a handfull of Aiolet leaves, and fine Bay leaves, feeth all these together unto a pint, and drinke it mozing and evening warme.

To take away Cornes.

Take Parigolds stamped, and lay oppon the soze evening and morning, and it profiteth. Dr else pare your Corne, and lay thereto Turpentine and red were boyled together, a make a plaister thereof, and it helpeth.

To doe away a Corne.

Take and cut away the Corne, and drop into it a droppe or two of a blacke Snaile, and put thereto the powder of Sandes fer, and it will do it away.

For the fame.

Pare away your Corne as neere as you can, eput into the hole buleckt Lime about as a Fatch, ecouer it with a playeter of Were and Rozen, and let it lie 24. houres.

To make a water against a consumption.

Take a quarte of Kole-water, as much of womans Wilke, Wilke of Boates, of Pares, or of Cowe milke, put unto them thirtie yolkes of Egges, well mingled togeather, and thereof Still a Mater, whereof give the patient to drinke warme first and last with a Cake of Manus Christi, made with Bolde and Pearles.

For a Consumption in the reines. To did a start

Take Clary leaves and prick them, and frye them with two or three yolkes of Egges, and put thereunto Saffron dried byon a stone, and grinde it small, and put all together, and fry them in fresh Butter and eate it warme next your heart.

To make lellie for one that is in a confumption.

Take a Legge of Meale, and cut away the fat, and a Capon or Cocke new killed and skald him, and wash him clean, and let the Capon and the Meale lie in water the space of three hours, and seeth them on the fire, with two pottles of faire water, scum it cleane, and as the fat riseth take it off, and so let it seeth, till halfe the broth be consumed, then put in a pottle of rackt renish wine if you have it, or els a pottle of white wine, and let it seeth altograther, whill it consume to a quarte, and clarifie

clarefle it with the or foure whites of Egges, and let it run through a ielly bag, and then set it on the fire againe, and put in one pound of Sugar, and one ounce of Sinamon große beaten, and then let it runne through a Jelly bagge the or foure times, and after let the patient drinke thereof warme.

For an extreame Cough.

Take Fenell rotes cleane walhed, Annifedes, and a little Licozas, and feth them altogether in white Thine, and take the white Thine, and drinke a good draught thereof when you goe to bed, and the next morning take a Fig and a Date, and rose them, and eate them somewhat hote, and neither eate nor drinke in two or three howers after, and in two or three times drinking it shall helpe you.

For the Cough.

Take eight penny-weight of fine Ginger, and firtene penny-weight of the powder of Clicompane rotes, and one ounce of the powder of Licozas, and two ounces of the powder of Anifedes, and three ounces of Sugar candy, mingel all these together, and vie to eate it when you wil at all times in the day, and you thall finde ease therein, for this is well promed.

For the Cough, and to dry vp the rume & fleame.

Take a handfull of Sage, a handfull of Bay falt dayed at the fire, a handfull of Commin, a pennitworth of Cloues, and another of Paces, and beate all these and mingle them toges ther, and put them into a linnen bag, the length and breadth of a mans hand, and quilt it, and ble it hote byon the mould of the head till you be eased, warme it morning and evening, and lay it to your mould againe.

For the Cough of the lungs,

Take a pottle of running water, twenty Figges, a quarterne of the belt Sugar, a god quantitie of Licozas and Anifiedes, a peny-worth of Paiden-haire, a handfull of great reafons the frones picked out, and boyle them buto a quarte, and so warme a little in a frone cruse, and drinke thereof.

For the Cough.

Take Hisope, Hozehound, Sugar and water, boyle them altogether, till it come to a thinne Sirrope, and so vie to eate there.

thereof evening and morning, and all other times when you thinke god.

For a Cough.

Take a pynt of Pisope water, and halfe a pinte of Kose was ter, and a god quantitie of Licoras brused, a great sponeful of Annisedes, halfe a pound of white Sugar candy, let all these boyle together, till it come to a cleare Sirrop, then put it in a faire glasse krained, and take this sirrop at all times of the day or night, when you list.

For the Cough.

Take a tolke of breade, and make it hote, and put on sweete Sallet oyle, on both sides of it, and eate it every morning and evening, and it will helpe you.

For the fame.

Take Barrowes or Boses greace, three or four clones of Garlick, and frampe them together, and warme and annoynt thy fixte therewith at thy going to bed, and so kiepe them hote with a toasted trenchour, and warme clothes and you shal rescouer.

For the chin Cough in chyldren.

Take Bozes greace, and warme the foles of theyz feete at the fire, and chafe them with the afozesate Bozes greace, and let them goe to bed, and keepe them warme, and lay cloathes to theyz feete.

For the Cough and the wheefing.

Take a pounde of Sugar candy some what finely beaten, halfe a pound of Licoras searced, and halfe a pounde of Anniscedes searced, and an ounce of the powder of Ginger, an ounce of Clicompane rotes made into powder, and mingle these together, and take of the same powder halfe a sponefull at a time when you goe to bed, and when you rise in the morning.

Take Hisope, Licoras, Porehound, a little of the rote of Clicompane, great Kaisins, Kigges cut in small pieces, and Anniséedes: boyle all these in water, then Araine out the water, and drinke it in the morning fasting.

For

For the Cough, and for stopping at the breast, and to open the pypes, and to auoyd much corruption.

Make the roote of Elicompane, and a roote of Radilly, and Med them thin, & Peare-wardens, twice so much as of both the others, then put altogether into a newe earthen pot, then put thereunto clarified Ponny till it over-flow the saide ingresionee: then cover the pot, & passe it that no breath come out, and set it into an Duen and let it bake with a batch of breade, and give the sicke thereof a sponfull at morning, an another at night.

Maister Bakers medicine for the Cough of the lunges.

Take these pints of running water, halfe a pounde of Pozetingale Sugar, with nine Figges, and halfe a sponefull of As nisedes beused, a handfull of Raisins of the Sunne cleane was shed having the Cones picked out, a penny worth of Paydens haire: let all these boyle together till the one halfe and more be boyled away, and then Caine the same through a fine cloth, and every morning drinke two sponefuls of it luke warme, and you shall finde present remedy.

For the Crampe.

Take Polysogle, oyle of Aiolets, and of Swines greace, of each like much: and make an oyntment and annoynt the place.

An excellent falue for a Cut.

Take two handfuls of Bugle, which groweth most commonly in Mods, and asmuch Halerian: bruse the very smal, the take a quantity of Decres sewet, halfe so much bowrought Mere, so much of these two as the hearbes may bee boyled therein, then set it on the sire, and when it is halfe boyled, put in a quantity of the best Turpentine that you can get, then let it boyle till it be enough, and all the while stirre it well, when it is boyled enough, straine it through a cloath into a vessell and so keepe it.

For a newe cut that will not leave bleeding.

Take the blades of volet Lækes and stampe them, and put thereunto Henny and Wheat-slower, and stirre them wel to D 2 gether

gether butill they be thick: let it come niere no fire but all cold lay it to the wound, and it will stanche the bleding, draw out the brused blood, and make it cleane.

For the deafenes in a mans head.

Take a quarte of Palmile, a penny-wooth of Commin, and englit Betony leaves that groweth on the land, then boyle all these together, till the one halfe of the Balmsie bee consumed : then take the potte that you boyle your Dedicine in, as some as the hearbes be boyled, and couer it with a tunnel, and binde it close about the verge that the heate come not out : then put a quill in the other end of the tunnell, then put the patients eare thereunto, so that the heate may goe close into the head, first the one, and then the other: and whilst the heate is days uing in the one eare, you must stop the other with black woll, and you must have hote cloathes to keepe in the heate on the or ther five of the head while that your Pedicine worketh: then ferue the other eare likewife. You must be it there times in the day, that is to fay, in the morning, at noone, and at night, and so you must continue the space of thee dayes and thee nights. See that the patient come not into any open agre the space as foresaide: and you must put to your Malmesse a quarter of a pinte of clære running water.

A good Medicine for deafenes, vsed by Thomas Steeuens of Bushton.

Take Bay berries, Bay leaues, Betony, and Sticards, of each of them one handfull, seeth them in white Wine to the halfe, and foz an old man in Palmse: then put it into a vessell that hath a narrow mouth, and holde your eare over it beeing bushopped, so that you may suffer it, being neither to hote noz to colde: then take oyle of bitter Almonds, and let doop therof two oz thee doops into your eare, and alwaies have a locke of fine blacke woll that groweth between the Sheepes legges, to stop close your eare there with: wherein if you put a little Puske it will be the better.

A foueraigne medicine for the paine and buzzing in the head, which hindereth the hearing

very much.

Take one cloue of Barlick, pill it, and pricke three or foure holes in the middelf, and dip it in fine English Honny, and put it into your care, and put a little blacke wol after, and lie by on your other side each night, and so let it continue in your care for the space of seauen or eight dayes, and it will expulse the humors at your nose, expell the paine, and restore the hearing.

For the paine in the care.

Take two handfuls of Sage, one handfull of Hisope, and halfe a handfull of Rosemary, put these into a little pillow boisted in Rose Tinegar, Aqua vicæ, and Rose water, and lay it to your eare as hote as you can suffer it.

An oyntment for a swelling.

Take a god quantity of Smallage and Pallowes, and put thereto two pounds of Bozes greace, one pound of Butter, and a quantity of Peats-sote oyle, stampe them well together, then fry them, and straine them into an earthen bestell.

To make a drinke for an extreame hear or drought.

Take a pottle of faire water, a handfull of Succory, a handfull of Endiffe, a handfull of Miolet leaues, a handful of Burrage, halfe a handfull of Lettice, two Fenell cotes, two Parklie rotes, put them all in your pottle of water, a let them feeth from a pottle to a quart, then take it off, and put a little Sugar to it, and let it have two wallops more, then drinke of it when you thinke god.

To make a dyet drinke.

First buy a diet pot, and fill him full of Conduit water, lacking a quart: then put to the water a quarte of white Thine, and set him over a soft fire of coles, then put thereto a pound of Licozas scraped and cut in small pieces: halfe a pound of Annistedes brused, halfe a pound of Ligna vive bought at the Aureners, and an ounce of the barke of the same, which you may have at the Apothicaries: then let all these boyle together an howze an halfe, so that one part of the liquoz be boyled away, then take and straine it into a fayze bestell, and kiepe it close, and drinke thereof first and last a pretie draught warme.

A water for the eyes.

Take kindly Roch Alome white, a finall quantity of Rev

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Roles

Rose water, and the invee of red Fenell, and the white of an Egge well beaten, and take of the seum of the Egge and beate them together: then arame it through a fine cloth, then dyppe your finger in the water and let it drop into your eye.

Good for the fight.

All this is good for the fight, red Roles, Teruaine Rootes, Fennell, Salendine, Pimpernell, Oculus Christi, to walh your eyes with clove water, or to loke bypon grove colours, measurable slope, to loke in a fayre glasse, often walhing of your hands and force, and it maketh your meate to disgest wel.

Ill for the eye fight.

To Audie after meat, Barlick, Dnyens, Leekes, Lettice, tw suddaine going after meate, wines, hote or cold agre, drunskennesse, glutteny, Hike, Chees, much beholding of bright things, and as evill reduc things as white: much seepe after meate, tw much walking after meate, and tw much letting blod, colde tworts, fire, dust, tw much waping, and outernuch watching.

A speciall good water for the eyes.

Take a new laybe Egge, and rolle it hard, cut the thell in the middelt, and take out the yolke, and put in a piece of white Coperas whereas the yolke lay, and binde the Egge together againe, and let it lye in the fire untill the Coperas be refolued in water: then take the white out of the Egge, and cut it in small pieces, and let it stand a while, then straine it through a fine cloth, and kiepe it in a close glasse, and dresse the eye energie morning and evening.

To kill the pin and the web in the eye.

Take a quantitie of the leaved Grasse, as much Red Jennell, as much red Sage, as much Daises, the white of an egge
beaten and the froth taken away: halfe a sponeful of Ponnic,
stampe all the hearbes together, and then take the inverther,
of, and put thereunto the white of the Egge and the Pony, and
then stirre them together, and deopthe same into the eye of the
patient: then take a plaister of Flare tow, and dip it in y sayd
medicine, and say it upon the eye of the sayde patient, a binde it
fast, and let it remaine so an howe at every time of deesting.

Another for the fame.

Take the leaves of Saladine and Campe them and Craine them: then put one doop of the innce thereof in the eye, and it will helpe by Gods grace.

For the web in the eve if it be olde.

Take the red Dimpernell and Euphrasia, and stamp them in a Porter: and then fry the with Tapons greace in a cleane pan: then wring it through a cloth into a vessell of brasse: and let it stand therein three dayes after: put it in a bore of horne or tume, and take thereof and put it in the web of the eye: Thys Pedicine is sourraigne.

A good medicine for the eyes, being eyther Pearle or Web.

Take their leaves of Dasies, and Pouch-worte alias Bursa Pastoris, and the Chest lops, alias Unodliffe: stampe them together and straine them in a little god Ale: drinke of the same three severall Pornings two howers before you rise and you shall finde ease. Potwithstanding your eyes will be sore: then wash your eyes with cleare running Unater: then drinke of your drinke two mornings againe: and you shall be whole and sinde great ease by Gods grace.

A Water comfortable for the eyes.

Take the inyce of Euphrasia, or els water made of it: for it is the best hearb that can be for the eyes what way soener you take it.

For fore eyes.

Take rotten Apples and Kill them: and with the water thereof washe your eyes, and it wil purge and clense them and clere your fight.

For the fame.

Take Coperas and lay it in running water and Araine it: and when you goe to bed Arike the brees of your eyes with the same water and let it drop into your eyes.

A water very good for the eye fight,

Take Rose-leaves, a great handfull of red Fennell: Aeruaine asmuch: Rewe a handfull: of Salendine asmuch: and Aill them together: and you shall have a god water and comfortable

fortable for your eyes.

A drinke for the eye fight.

Take a quantitie of Juie that groweth uppon the Ache; a quantitie of the rotes and leanes of Dailies in the fielde : also a quantitie of Fennell : and a quantitie of theie leaued Graffe: all these being walhed cleane Campe them and Craine them with a pinte of Cale Ale: and drinke thereof enening and moze ning: 02 at midnight foz a feafon.

A perfect water for the eye fight.

Take Sage, Fenell, Meruaine, Betony, Guphzasia, 02 Epe-bright, Pimpernell, Sinckfoyle, and Bearb-grace, and lap all these in white Tame all night: and then ftill them in a Willitory of glasse: 02 4c. This water is speciall god.

For the Emrodes, and to dry vp any fore.

Take the broade Pemphane leafe, commonly called Canel-leaves, which growe in waters : washe them cleane, put them in a paper, and fry them in the embers, and apply them as hote as may be suffered, and make them in powder, & cast them into the fore and it helpeth.

For the same.

Take reode Mosts and feeth them in a pot : then take the pot, and fet it bider a close chapze, and little ouer it, and lappe warme clothes about the chaire, that no agre may goe out, and to little ouer it till it be colde, and then annoynt the members with the liquoz.

For the same.

Take a plate of Lead, and rub theron a quantity of Bozes greace for a man, and Swines greace for a woman, and walh it out with white Mine, and annoynt the Emrodes.

A medicine for a red and high coloured face.

Take Tine leaves, Straivberries and Creame, and put two penny-worth of Camphire onto it : then put it into a Stillitory with the afore-sayo leaves, and distill it: and take the water thereof, and walks your face there-with morning and evening for a certaine space, and it will take away the high colour of the same. Ano-

Another for the fame, and and and and and and

Take Towcombers, and pare them cleane, and cut them in flices, and figli them, and with the water that commeth of them, wash your face daylie, the or foure times in the day, if you have none of the water, then take the Towcomber it selfe, and pare him, and rub your face therewith.

A medicine to destroy heate in the face or in any other place,

though it be Saint Anthonies fire.

Take a quart of Smithes water, a handfull of lage, a handfull of Cloer leaues, or of the greene barke, a penny worth of Allom, and fath them altogether from a quart to a pinte, then put it in an earthen pot, and annoynt the patient.

For the pimples in the face.

Take Wheat flower mingled with Ainegar and Hong, and lay byon them, and it will clense them.

Goodfor a Fellon.

Take Sage, Rew, Snailes Way salt, and Bacon, and beate them togeather, and then lay it to the Fellon, and it shall helpe you.

For the same.

Take heard grace, Parch, and white wortes, rustie Bacon, a little butter, a house snaile, mingle them together, and make thereof a plaister.

A medicine for Biles, Fellons, and Vncomes.

Take Theate flower, Bozes greace, Pay butter, and Sage, and Campe it togeather, and make a Plaister thereof, and say it to the Bile of fellon, and it will both ripe it and draw it, and if it be freed it will worke the better.

To ripe Byles, Fellons, and Vncomes.

Take a pinte of sweete Dilke, and set it over the sire, and put thereunto a quantitie of sheepes selvet, small sheed, and a handfull of two of Datemeale sine beaten, and let all these seth till it ware very thicke, so that ye may spread it upon a faire linnen cloth, and lay it as warme as you can suffer to the sore, and it will quicklie ripe him, and breake him without great paine, then when he is broken, lay a little Turpentine by on a piece of white leather pricked full of holes, and it will brain

brawe and heale it.

A gargresse for fleagme.

Take a quantity of Endine water, and as much Ponisuckls water, a good sponefull of Pustard pure, a sponefull of Pony, two sponefuls of Ainegar, and a little powder of Pepper, two or three braunches of Rosemary, and the seaves of Sage, and put all these togeather and heate them upon a Chasingdish of coales take warme, and let the Patient put a sponfull at once in his month, and hold his head upwards, and wash his throat therewith, and it shall make him voide much seagme, let him take thereof as oft as he shall thinke god.

To breake the fleagme, and for the cough.

Take a pinte of Flope water stilled, one quart of god Pushadine, there of foure god Races of case Ginger, pare them cleane and cut them in sices, and twice so much Licquozice, and pare it like wise, one good handfull of sugar candie groce bewised, put all these premises together in a glasse, and shake them together and stop it close, and let it sand source and twenter hours, then drinke thereof at your pleasure.

To breake fleagme.

Take Butter without falt, and Honie, of each a like quantitie, and a fewe bitter Almonds, blaunch them and beat them

fine, and eate a little enery bay.

For the fame.

Take Smallage, and leth it in Ainegar, then take the Misnegar and wash your brest withall, and then take the Smallage and put it in a cloth, and binde it to your Comacke three houres.

For the fame.

Take Sozrell, and stampe it, and straine it, then take the inyce and temper it with olde Ale, and drinke a good quantitie in the morning before you rise out of your bed, then take a siepe after, and you shall beliver sleagme wonderfull to see so, the quantitie.

A medicine for the flixe or laxe.

Dake Egges and roffe them hard, then take the volkes of them and frame them with rea Mine, and put thereunto Sienamon.

namon, then fath them together, and brinke it as hot as you may luffer it.

For the fame.

Take Wheate flower, and the polkes of Egges, with the ingce of Plantine, and make a cake ofit, and bake it in an D. uen, and eate it as hot as pe can, and brinke thereto red Mine or Respice all hotte, or else the jugce of Plantine, for it will binde him.

A Cawdle for the bloody Flixe.

Take a pinte of red Wine, and the yolkes offine new layd Egges, a god quantitie of Sinamon, and a little Sugar, the pill of a Bomgranet biged, and beaten to fine pouder a good quantitie, and boyle all thefe in a faire platter bpon a Chafing. dich of coles, till it be somewhat thicke, then let the Patient eate of it morning and euening, and as oft els in the day as his Comacke will ferue him thereto, and it Chall Cop him be the flipe neuer fo great.

A fingular medicine for the bloody flixe.

Take as much fine cloth as will make a suppositarie, being Wapped round together bottome wife, then wet the fame in the best Aqua vitæ 03 Aqua composita, and let the partie gree. ued conuay the same into their Fundament, and it will belpe them God willing within thee og foure deffings, this is paws ued and hath holpen many that hath bene brought bery low, and judged paft cure.

Another for the fame.

Hake a péce of Allome, as much as a Malnut, put if in a pinte of new milke, and feth it on the fire till the Wilke turne to a Euroe, then take of the curb as you do of the Pollet Ale, then take the liquour that remaineth, and put onto it a quan. titie of the pouter of the pill of a Pomgranate, and Sinamon fine beaten, and let them brinke it, and it will Cop them, and if they eate of the curo they thall be stayed the foner.

For the bloody Flixe.

Take Almondes fkinnes and all, and Campe them fmall, and take the water of hoked Barlie fodden, and make thereof Wilke, and put therein fkinnes and fcozches of Pomegranats

bæing Camped to pouder, with a little lagar, and so eate the same every morning and evening and put gaddes of Cale that hath bæne made red hot in fire into their drinke.

To stop the bloody Flixe.

Take a quarte of Beanes dried over the fire, so that ye may make powder of them, then bruise them in a morter very small and boult them, and take a quarte of god Ale, and a quantitie of flower, and so seth them both together, and let the patient eate thereof at night as hot as may be suffered.

For the bloody Flixe.

A plaister to heale a goutie Legge, a wound or fore whatsoeuer.

Take a handfull of Pallowe leaves & an other of Groundsell, put them in a Poinet with faire water, and let them boile till they bee sodden so tender that ye may make a playfter of them, then put the Liquour from the heards and firaine them through a firainer by on a platter, and set the platter by on a Chasingvish of coles, then put thereunto a quantity of Deares sewet, or shapes sewet clarified, and bnwrought ware, sallet oyle, turpentine, and rosin, let all these boyle by on a Chasing dish of coles bntill they be thicke, then straine all the said staffe through a linnen cloth into a bestell that you will keepe your salue in, and solet it stand bntill it be colde, then ble the same beeing spread by on a cloth, and you shall sinde ease by Gods grace, and helpe.

A plaister for the Gout or ache in the joyntes, wherewith the Lord Rich was cured, when all Chirurgians thought him to be vncurable.

Take halfe a pound of bnw2ought Mare, halfe a pound of Kolin, an ounce of Dlibanum, a quarter of a pound of fine Littarge of golo, the quarters of a pound of white Lead, bear ten to pouder, and fearce it through a Searcer, and take a pint of ogle of Peates fete, and fet it on the fire in a fmall Meffell, with the Ware and Rolin, and when it is molten, then put therto the other pouders, and fir it fall with a flicke, and then put a little of it bpon a pewter Sawter, and if it be hard being fo tried on the pewter fawcer, then take it from the fire and ans nognt a faire bo;o with fome of your ogle of Peates fete, and as you may handle it foz heate, worke it as it were Cordiers ware, and make it in great roles, and make plaiffers of it with a chafingvilh of coles, and fpzcad it thinne vpon a Linnen cloth or leather, and lay the plaifter warme where the paine is, and forenew it morning and evening butill you bee whole, or till the ache be driven to some other toynt, and then take the plate Her and lay where the ache is , and beware of colde and hotte the, and last three famore book which a

A drinke for the Gawte festered.

Make a quantitie of Archangell, Betony, Bernein, of each like much, and boyle them in Unine, and let the acke pers fon dainke therof firft and laft, and it helpeth.

A plaister for the same. Dake a lawcer full of the inice of Smallage, another of Wormewood, bong, falt, and binegar, and meddle them well together, and do thereto a quantitie of the flower, Litte them C 3

fall togeather, and boyle them and make a plaister in a cloth and lay it to the foze, ble the drinke afozesaide, and the plaister, and it will belpe by Bods grace.

Good for the heart.

Saffron, Burrage, Pulke, Cloues, Balingall, Putmegs, the red role, Wiolets, Sugar, Paces best of all.

Ill for the heart.

Beanes, Peale, Liekes, Garlicke, Dnions, labnelle, anger, dread, to much travell, to drinke colde water after travuell, and evill tidings.

A medicine for the passion at the heart, called

Take the powder of Burrage flower, the powder of Putomegges, white Amber likewise in powder, the bone in a Stags heart, the powder of Sinamon, all these powders drinke tuke warme with Beere, Ale, or Mine, evening and morning, and the partie graved shall finde case. These thinges must be portioned by good advise.

A medicine for a continuall head ache.

Take Betonie water, and take a cloth three or foure done ble, and but three fingers broad, wet it well in the Betonie water, and lay it to your forehead coide. Let the cloth beeing wet come round about the head, and tie it fast, and three or foure times thus boing, it will helpe thee, and when the cloth is dreed wet it agains.

A medicine to cleanse or purge the head

Take Pellitozie of Spaine, and thewe the rote in your mouth thic daies at times, and it thall bo away the ache and fasten the teth in the gummes.

A medicine for the paine in the head.

Take a Kose cake, cut it in length and breadth of the fores bead, then take Kose water and Minegar of like quantitie, as bot as you may suffer it, lay to thy forehead.

A medicine for the winde in the head.

Take a handfull of flowers of Cammomell, and halfe a handfull of pouder of Cummin, and mingle them together, and make two bagges of the breadth of your eares and laye them thereunto.

For the head ache.

Take the inice of Rewe, and put it in the nosethails, fog it getteth out the fleagme and clenseth the braine, the heard sod, ben in wine both the same.

For the Megrime or head ache.

Take foure of five Putmegs, and pare and flice them as you would pare and flice Ginger thinne, then make two little bagges of linnen cloth, of the length of your finger, and put in the Putmegs, then take a quantitie of pure red Rose water, and lay your bags in the same water in a bith byon a Chasing bithe of coles, and make them bot, and lay them to the temples of your head.

A medicine for the Megrime truly prooued.

Take halfe an ounce of Pepper, two Putmegges, halfe a quarter of an ounce of Graines, one pinte of vinegar and a handfull of Rosemarie, and boyle altogether betwirt two platters by an a Chafing oith of coles, and then take a cloath, and put it over your head, and hold your head close over it till it be boiled well nære all away, and by Gods grace it helpeth.

For the Megrime.

Make five leaved Graffe, and Pozell that is called S. Parie hearbe, even pozitions of these two, and betony as much as of both the other, and beate all these in a mozter, and take the inice of them, and put to the same inice as much Pay Butter, as the quantitie of the inice, and thereof make an oyntment, and annoynt therewith the patients browns when hee goeth to bed.

Another for the fame.

Take bole Armonicke, Sanguis dragonis, and Terrafigillat, of each like quantitie, and beate them in pouder, then to make a plaister, take slape and laye it boon a ruset paper, as broade as you will have your plaister, and take the clare of an Egge, and lay it boon the slape, then take the foresaide powder, and cast it on that side of the playster that shall lye next your head, and put one folde of ruset paper, or else of lynnen, betweene your head and the medicine, or else it will cleave heries.

A good medicine for the Megrime in the head.

Take the hearbe Ambzos, Betony, Dugwozt, of each of them a handfull, of Centuric halfe a handfull, and this or foure Docke rotes cleane washed and scraped, and sampe all these together in a Porter till they be indifferent small beaten, then take Spicknell, Turmericke, and Galigarie, of each of them like quantitie, and stampe them likewise in a morter, then put the hearbs in a cleane linnen cloth by themselues, and the sprees by themselues and tie them fast with strings, and hang them in a gallon or two of Ale when it is new and ready to be tunned, after three or soure daics drinke enery morning next your hart a god draught thereof, and drinke nor eate nothing two or three houres after, and do so likewise when you goe to bed, and no doubt by Gods grace it will helpe you.

For the blacke Jaundis, M. Anthony Cox prisoner-

Take the Gall of a Rauen and drie it, and grate it into powder, take a quantitie in a spoone, and temper the same with Beere or Ale togeather, and drinke it saking in the morning.

A medicine or drinke for him that is burst in the belly or coddes.

Take a knuckle of Meale, a pottle of white Wine, halfe an ounce of Pace, halfe so many Dates, halfe a pound of Raisons of the Sunne, a handfull of Camfrey, a handfull of Polipodium alias Fearn of an Dke, a handfull of Sparoking, alias knotwort, take all these and put them in an earthen pet, and set on a Retile of water of fine gallons, and set the earthen potte in the water, and stoppe it with paste very close, and let the Bettle bee kept seething fine or size houres with the earthen pot therein, and keeps he kettle still full with other sething water, then take all these and beate them in a More ter, and Graine it, and give the patient of the liquour thereof both first and last.

For the tooth ache.

Take a pinte of white Wine, halfe a handfull of lauender cotten, and sethe them together till the Time be halfe spent, then put into it halfe a sponefull of Bay salt, then let it seth a little, then take a sponefull of the liquour and put it in that side that the painc is in, and keepe it in thy mouth, and then put another sponfull in, so one after another, and it will helpe the.

A good drinke to put out the small Poxe or Pimples, Wake a Posset of Ale with milke, and the curd being taken off, take red Fennell the quantitie of a sponesul, and the same being sob together with the Ale, straine it and put theresto the quantitie of a Putmegge of fine Areacle, a quantitie of setwall and a quantitie of English Saffron, being well mings led together, and give it the Patient to drinke warme.

A present remedie for an Ague.

Take the ounces of Bay falte, two ounces of white Frankensence, and a handfull of Smallage, beaten altogether and lay it to the writtes of your handes, and to the boughts of your armes, two houres before the fit ow come, proved.

For the same.

Take two or three clones of Barlicke, and brule them, and a peny-worth of Aquavica, halfe a pinte of Ale, and feeth them togeather, and winke it a little before the course or fitte

boo come, as bot as you may

For the Collicke.

Take Gromell læbe, Parlie lædes, and Annilædes, of each two sponefuls, græne Fennell one handfull, one Parlie rot, one Kadith rote, of each as long as a finger, whiet Time one handfull, one handfull of Philopendula, and a handfull of Cherifones, walh all these and byuse them and Campe them very small, boile all these in two quartes of white Thine, in an earthen pot close, till a pinte be consumed, then let it run through a linnen cloth of it selfe, without Craining, and drinke it more ning and evening.

For the windy Collicke.

Take a quart of Ale clarified, two sponefuls of the flower of Liquozice, one sponefull of the flower of Annisedes, halfe a sponefull of brused Fennell sedes, a little Time, and seeth them together till a pinte of the Ale be consumed, and so drinke it first and last.

For the Collicke and Stone.

Take a handfull of Auens, a handfull of Pellitozie of the wall, as much Camomell as will lye in the Palme of your hand, and a sponefull of Parsie sede, brused a little, make a Posset of renish wine, take off the curd, and boile all these together in the drinke till the substance be boyled out, then vie it morning and evening.

For a paine in the fide that commeth of winde.

Take a handfull of Cummin fiede, another of Annifede, and two of Rew, and fæth all these together in running water from a pottle to a quarte, put to it halfs a pint of white Tines gar, before it be colve, dip a spunge in it, and wring out the lyquour somwhat, and lay it to the patients side as hot as he can suffer it, and when it beginnesh to ware colo, take a new.

To remoue a disease from the stomacke.

Dzinke a quantitie of Dzagon water, oz water imperiall, mingled with Treacle oz Mctridatum.

Take an Egge, and Aqua composita, and boyle it with the Egge till it be dire, then take Sinamon and Sugar, and eate with the Egge. manner of maladies, that is to wit, against all sores, and wounds, against all manner of impossumes in the head or bodie, against head ache, singing in the braine, or boiling in the hart, shrinking of Sinewes, it draweth out any thorn or broken bone, and al maner of ache out of the Lyuér, Splene or Lungs it helpeth the Hemerodes, and is very good to make a sere cloth for all Court ches, and pestilent botches, and therfore this treatise is worthilie called Flos unquentum.

Take Rolln and Ber of each halfe a pound, of Mirgin. ware and Frankensence, of each a quarter of a pound of Pas Nicke an ounce, of harts fewet a quarter of a pound, a quarter of a pound if Campber, and two dragmes, melt that is to be Tions melted, and pare that is to be pared, and territorial ouer

ouer the fire, and Craine them through a cloth into a pottle of white Tine, with all the other medicines together, then let it cole, till it be no hotter then blod warme, then put therunto a quantitie of Aurpentine , euer firring it butill it be colbe, but euer beware that your Auffe be no hotter then blod warm, when you put to your Aurpentine , ozels it marreth all geur fruffe, and make it op in roles, and kepe it to year ble, and when you will, occupie it plaifter wife to your greefe.

Take a gallon of fale Ale, being very frong, two hands fuls of Modbinde leanes, halfe a handfull of red faded pet. ties, as much Colewortes, with the ragged leanes, halfe a pound of red Dnions, halfe a pound of Barlicke pilled, a pound of busct Lekes, a little difffull oz a handfull of the pouder of a rotten Pofte, of an Die is belt, let all thefe be famped imall in a Poster fenerally by themselves, put them into the Ale with halfe a pound of Roch Allom, then fet them ouer a foft are, and let them boyle till the one part og moze bee boyled as way, then let them Cand thie og foure daies, but first Graine them through a cleane Cloth, into a cleane bellell, then put to them halfe a pound of Ware, halfe a pound of Rolin, halfe a pound of the Peruell that is greene, a quantity of Cone Pony, then fet it ouer a fost fire againe, and let them boile till the one halfe be consumed, then put it into a cleane earthen pot, and Stop it very close, and ble thereof when you have occasion-

Prescriptions and rules, made by M. Doctor Good, to be observed at the Bath.

N Ben you come to Bath. after your journey, reft and quiet your bodge for the space of a day or two, and see the fathion of the Bath, how and after what fort others that are there om ble the lame.

If it be not a faire cliere day, goe not into the open Bath, but rather vie the water in a Bathing vessell in your Cham-

ber as many men bo.

The bell times in the day to goe into the Bathes, is in the morning,

mozning, an houre and a halfe after the Sun rifing oz there as bout, in the most quietest time, and when you wall fæle your stomacke well and quiet, and that your meat is well disgested, and have rested well the night befoze, but befoze you goe into the Bath, you must walke an houre, oz halfe an houre at the

leaff in your Chamber og elfe where.

Pour must alwaies goe into the bath with an emptie so, macke, and as long as you are in it, except great necessitie require the contrarie, and then to take some little supping before your walking, or before you rise is not hurtfull, let your tarrying in the Bath be according as you may well abide it, but tarrie not to long in any wise at the first, although you may well abide, that your strength at no time may faile you.

You may tarry in the Crosse bath an houre and halfe at a time after the first bathing, and in the Kinges Bath you may tarrie after the first bathing, at one time halfe an houre, or three quarters of an houre, but in any wife tarrie at no time

bntill you be faint, og that your frength faile you.

And if at any time you be faint in the Bath, then you may drinke some Ale warmed with a toste, or any other supping, or greene Ginger, or if great need be Aqua composita. Betratatum, the bignes of a Put kernell at a time eyther by it selfe, or mired with Ale or other Liquour.

As long as you are in any of the bathes, you must cover your head bery well, that you take no colde thereof, so, it is be, rie perrilous to take any colde on your head in the Bath, o, in

any other place buring your bathing time.

Then you come forth of any of the Bathes, lie that you cover your felse very well and dry of the water from your body with warme clothes, and then put on a warme thicke and a Spantle, or some other warme Gowne, for taking of cold, and so goe traight way to your warmed bed, and sweat diligently, and after that you may supe a while, but you must not drinke any thing till dinner time, except you be very faint, and then you may take a little Sugar-candie or a few Raisons, or a little then broth, but small in quantitie to sake your thirst one-lie, because it is not god to drinke or eate by and by after the

Bath, butill you have flept a while if you can.

After that you have flept and sweat enough, and clearelie delivered from the heate, that you had in the bath, and in your bed, then may you rise and walke a little, and so goe to your dinner, so, by measurable walking, the evill vapours and windinesse of the stomacke, that are taken in the Bath be do; wen away, and viterly avoided.

After all this, then goe to your dinner, and eate of good meates, but not very much, that you may rife from the table with some appetite, so that you could eate moze if you would, and yet you must not eat to little soz decaying of your strength.

Let your bread be of goo sweete Peale, and of one dayes baking or two at the most, and your meate well boiled or ros sted, and especiallic let these be your meates, Button, Heale, Thickins, Kabbets, Capon, Phesant, Partrich, or the like.

Pou may also eate fresh water fith, so it be not muddy, as Beles and the like refraine all salt fish, as Ling, Haberdine, ec.

auoide all fruite and raw hearbs, Sallet and the like.

Apparrell your body according to the colonelle of the westher, and the temperature of the ayze, but in any wife take no coloe.

And if you bath againe in the after none, or at after dinner, then make a verie light dinner, as a couple of poached Egges, a Cawdle, or some other broth with a Chicken, and then after source or since hours your dinner so taken, you may bath againe, and in any wise tarrie not so long in the bath as you did in sozenoone.

Pou must at no time goe into the bath, ercept you have beene at sole, either by nature or otherwise, and if by no means it will be of itselfe, then take a suppositary once in two dayes

at the least wife.

For all manner of Wormes.

Take Groundsell, and Plantine with the rootes, and Campe them and Craine them with Palmesse, and warme it, and give it the patient to drinke three vaies together: it will kill all manner of wormes, and if you have an ague, it will also rid it by Gods grace.

A median

A medicine for the woormes in a Childe.

Take Aqua composita that is made of heards, and wash the brest of the Childe, then take the pouder of mirrh very fine beaten, and strew it bron the brest of the childe after that it is washed, and laye a warme cloth to it, and let it lie source and twentie houres.

For the Wormes.

If it fortune the Childe to avoide a worme, as often times they do, then take that worms and dry it, so that you make into powder, and give it to the Childe to drinke in Ale or Moorte, and it shall kill the rest of the woorms or cause them to come forth alive.

For him that hath drunke venome, and his belly be-

ginneth to swell or ake.

Take greene Rewe, wath it, Campe it and temper it with white wine, and give it him to brinke.

To cleere the voyce.

Take Digany, Isop, Parts, tung, Clicompane, of Licorrice, and of Fennell, and boile them together with cleane was ter, and so dinke it first and last.

A medicine for Tifick, and stopping in the brest,

and to open the Pipes.

Take Partly rotes, Fennell rotes, Succozie rots, and take out the pith of them, and feeth them in white wine till they bee foft, fath them with Jiniper verries if you can get them, then Araine it, when it is well fooden, put Pellitozie of Spaine to the Thine, and let the ficks drinke of it morning and sucning eight dayes.
