To all such Readers, as have care of their bodily health.

TOw prouident a Patron and bountifull a Father, the Lord . I God of life is vnto vs vnthankfull and rebellious children, his manifold benefits do testifie : yea the continuance of his kindnesse is herein principally declared. For whereas our owne naturall corruption worketh daily in vs the banishment out of his fauour, and the danger of reprobation : he notwithstanding in consideration of our weaknes, withdraweth not his compassion from vs, but in all our necessities, reaching out his helping hand vnto vs, is most ready (as hee is alwayes able) to plucke vs out of the pit of perdition, whereinto the hainoufnefle of our transgressions (as it were with a Cable) haleth vs perforce. O gracious God, how shall sinners worthily aduance the excellency of thy loue! Who shall give them an heart to conceive thy kindnes? Whence shall they have vtterance to found out thy mercy? Of themselues (because they are vessels of wrath) they cannot compasse so perfect a worke. Thou therefore which art the perpetuall spring of all goodnes, give it them O give it them, and they shall have it : yea and in the having of it, they shall magnifie thy name, extoll thy power, and maruell at thy mercy. Where is one, among thousand mousands, that looking vpon the heavens most gloriously beautified, vpon the earth most plenteously enriched, vpon the frame of his owne body, moit Angellically created, but shall of compulsion acknowledge the omnipotency of God, and confesse the vnmeasurable greatnes of his goodnes, and loue toward man? Note of my words, and then judge of the value and worthinesse of the Booke. Art thou diseased in thy head? art thou grieved in thy heart? art thou pained with ache? art thou tormented with a Feauer? art thou wounded? art thou troubled with any irkefome fore? Doth thy fight faile? Doth thy hearing waxe weake? Doththy youth weare away? Doth age creepe on apace? Finally, doost thor feele thy selfe infected with the poyson of the Plague and Pestilence? Then delay no time: but with a small price buy a Iemme worth gold (this Booke I meane,) which though it be little in quantity, yet it is great in quality and vertue. Here (as in a cunning Apothecaries shop) are receits of fundry forts prouided, wherewith the rage of any fore may bee mitigated: the nipping finart of any Vlcer or wound affwaged and the venome of any malladie expelled, and the perfection of health restored. Thanke God and vieit in thy need. Heere thou hast succour to serue thee in thy sicknesse.

A preservation against the Plague.

Ale a handfull of Sage, a handfull of Herbergrace, or therwise called New, a handfull of Cloer-Leanes, a handfull of cod Bramble-leanes, and Kampe them together, and Araine them through a cloth, with a quart of white wine: then take a quantity of Singer, and mingle them all together, and draine thereof morning and evening a spone full nine dayes together.

For the party infected with the Plague.

If it fortune one to be licke of the Plague before hee hath druncks the forelaid medicine, then take the water of Scabious a sponefull, water of Betony like much, and a quantity of fine Areacle, put it together and drinke it, and it will expell all the benome.

A Medicine to breake the Botch.

If it fortune the Botch to appeare, then take Brambles leaves, Elder leaves, Puffaco-feed, and Kampe them all together, and then take it, and make a plaiser, and lay it to the fore, and it will draw out the venome.

A Medicine for the Plague.

Make thick flips of hearbe Grace, and fire sponefuls of Wieneger, and heate the same together, then Krains the supce out thereof, and put thereunto one ounce of fins Areacle, and one ounce of Sugar, and fir it together, then set it over the fire, and make thereof a Sirrops and put it in a hor close, then take a Sage-lease, and every morning fasting. spread as much as a Beane thereof upon the same Lease and so eate it. And if hee that taketh it be insected, it will drive it from the heart, and if the party that taketh it evening and morning, beanet insected, it will preserve him within 24. houres after.

A plaister to draw the fore.

Take one sponefull of Dony, the surce of Spurge, two sponefuls and a halfe: of Theaten sower a good quantity, and

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one sponeiull of Turpentine, and temper them fogether without fire, and make of the fame a plaifter, and lag it to the foze, changing it at enery 24. houres.

A good Medicine against the Plague approoned.

Amongt other ercellent gappzoued medicines for the peltilence, there is none meze worthy quallable when the loze both appeare, then to take a Cocke, Pullet sa Chicken, and let the feathers of the tayle of the highest part bes plucked off, till the cumpe be bare : then hold the faid bare of the Pullet to the foze and the Pullet will gape and labour foz life, and in the end will dye: then have another Bullet and doe the like to the Patient and if that ope, yet thill apply the patient with Pullets fo long as any one dye: for when the poplon by the laid Chickens bee drawne forth, the faid Chickens that be offered thereunto will live, then the loze prefently will fwage, and the party forth with recovereth: this medicine is necessary to brine the venome from the heart.

A foueraigne drinke against the Pestilence.

Take an ounce of Sozrell-water, and as much Dragon-water, a dragme of Ereacle, and put thereto a dragme and a halfe of power Imperiall, and give it to the patient with Ale with. in 24. houres after he is infected, and he Mall with Geds grace escape and do well.

A plaister to draw a head to the fore of the Plague

and to breake it.

Take two Lilly-rotes, one handfull offomze Dough, two handfuls of Mallowes, one handfull of Lin-fede, Campe all these together small, and bople them in a quart of the Lies of Wine till it be thicke, then lay it an ynch thicke bpon Leather, broader then the loze, and let the borders of the leather be play. Aered with Cordiers ware, to make it cleave: it Chall bring out the Botch in 12. houres, and breake it Mortly.

A medicine that was taught King Henry the seauenth by

his Physician, against the Pestilence.

Takehalfe a handfull of Rew, like wife of Wandragozies, Featherfew Sozrell, burnet, and a quantity of the Crops and rotes of Dragons, walh them cleane, and lethe them with a foft

fost fire in running water, from a pottle to a quart, and then fraine them together through a cleane cloth, and if it be bitter but thereto a quantity of Sugar candy, or other Sugar; and if this medicine be vied before the Purples do acife, yes that be whole by Gods grace.

A medicine to be drunke, suspecting any to have the Plague.

Take a great Dopon, and the coze being taken out, fill the same full of god Areacle of Jeane, and wrap the same in a paper, and roll it till it be soft, then Araine the same with a little wine Aineger, and being tempered with a quantity of Sugar give the Patient to drinke two sponefuls sasting: and if the Patient be infected with the Plague, you hall perceive the appearance thereof, within the houres after the receit of the same pearance thereof, within the houres after the receit of the same

Alfo for the viuall drinke of enery Patient

being so infected.

Take Rosemary the quantity of eight or nine Crops: then take of Parigolds being browns within, of Burnet, and of Bourage, every one a handfull thereof, let them bee sod in a quart of stale Ale clarified, then put into it a crust of Bread, a little whole Pace, and a quantity of Sugar, and let him drinks the same at all times during his acknesse, and put Pimpernell in his Broth.

Also another drinke to be taken every morning for a preseruative against the Plague, and for the avoyding of infection.

Take Sauery the quantity of a handfull, and boyle the fame in a quart of god wine Aineger, with a sponefull of Graines being beaten, and put into the same: then drinke the same with a quantity of Sugar every morning fasting.

Take in the morning fasting one dry Kigge, one Walnut, and foure or sue leaves of Rew, chopped all together, and eate them, and afterwards drinke a cup of Wine: if it bee a woman with childe, leave out the Rew.

A good medicine against the Plague.

Take Besony-water the quantity of the sponesuls, at god wine Aineger, the quantity of the sponesuls, and the quantity of a Putmeg of god Areacle of Jeane, seels the quantity of a Pazell Qut of Petheivatum being all mired to gether, take it in the beginning of the acknown.

For the Plague.

Aske an ounce of the leaves of Rew, halfe an ounce of god Aiggs an ounce of Juniper berries, 2. ounces of Malnuts picked, 4. ounces of Aineger and a god quantity of Saffron, stamp all the afozefair things together, and referre them in an earthen pot or a glasse fast Copped, that no agre issue out, then take in the morning vpon a knives point the quantity of a Beane or more, and ye shall be sure by the grace of Cod not to be infected within 24, houres after.

A Medicine for the Plague or Leprofic.

Take Dearbeigrace, Sotherniwod, Pugwozt, Mozmes woo, of each a handfull, thace og foure handfuls of Juniperberries, those which be blacke, cut and thred the hearbes small and put them into a flanders Bipkin, and powze therets foure quarts of god White wine Mineger, and let them foke feanen nights if the hearbes be day, if they bie græne, let them not foke aboue fourteene houres, then put a handfullog two of those hearbes which bee in the Dipkin into the Still, and then take out a quart of the fame Mineger, and powert into the Still byon the hearbes, and vistill it with a pretty foft fire, for to great a fire will walle it away, and fo Mill it bntill you have Killed all, from the Wipkin into the Stillatory, and after this power it into the Dipkin againe, and put as many new and freth bearbes, with to many berries as you had before in the Dipkin againe, and fo let them foke one o. ther 7. nights, and then Will them againe as you did befoze, and so the third time to bee vied with new heards, sc. in the same manner as befoze, and at the last time put 4. ounces of Methaidatum into the Dipkin amongst the hearbes, og elle fine 92 Are ounces of Treacle, in the place of the Wethaidatum foz want thereof, and then being Killed as befoze, put the fame into a double glade, and Coppe it with a piece of leather bound

bound about it, and if the party be insected, let him take there of 4. ounces at one time, and is neede be, you may give him so much so two or three dayes, as you see cause, and to a woman but two ounces, and to children according to their age, and as they be able to beare it: and so sweate two or three houres, or longer, if the party may endure, and one stand by alwayes to wipe their face, least by putting out their hand they take cold, ec. when all this is three times stilled, it will not amount to ahove three or source quarts.

An oyle for all manner of aches, bruses, and strainings of the Sinewes.

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Take a pottle of Peates feete ople, and a quart of an Dre gall, a pinte of Aqua view, a pinte of Koleswater, Bay-leanes, Kolemary Aripped from the Stalkes, Otraw-berry leanes, rots and Arings of Lauender cotten, of every of these a handfull, beate them small, and put them into the sozesaid Auste, and set he it over a fire of coales, in a Pan of two gallons, and at your owne perill, let not the stame touch the Ausse: let it seth very well, and then take it off, and let it stand untill it be almost cold, then Araine it through a course linnen cloth, but not the bostome of the said liquoz, then put it in a glasse, and so have it, and when you are paised, anount your griese with all.

For an ache.

Take Aqua composita, and the Dele of Peates fate lukewarme, and anount the Pacient spon the place of the griefe, laying warme clothes thereon.

A Medicine for an ache, or shrinking of the sinewes,

Take the tendrings of Mosemary, and Parsh Pallows, by as even positions as you can gette, gather your hearbes when they be dry from raine and down: pound them in a Moster bery small, then take Pay Butter well clarified, and put it to the hearbes, and mingle it in a vessell, and let it stand source dayes, then set it over the fice, and let it sathe till the Arength of the hearbs be gone, then take a little of it in a spone, and let it drop upon the naile, and if it be græne as the Emerald, it is perfect and then put in an earthen pot, and when you will occupie it, you must warme it.

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A Medicine for an Ache.

Take Partly, and Alozme-wod, of each a handfull, slæth them in a quart of Ale, with a quantity of swete Butter, and wash well the place therewith that ares, and also bind the hearbes to the place, as hot as you may suffer it.

An approued Medicine for Aches.

Stampe Smallage and put it into Aqua vitæ, and fraine it, then put thereto Bozes grease, and fraine them well toges ther, and anoint the patient befoze the fire therewith evening and morning.

A Medicine for an Ache in any place.

Take Sowithittle, Chickweed, Elder leaves, Grounfell and Clevers of each a handfull, day all these together between two tiles, and lay these hearbes to the place where the griefe is, let the hearbes be washed before they be dryed.

A Medicine for aking fores.

Take invce of Smallage, of Soziell, of Maybred, of each of them like much, take Honney, and the white of an Egge, of either like much, and mingle them together till it thicken, let it come neere no fire, but all raw and rold lay it to the lose.

For Aches and swellings in the knees.

Take a quart of Palmeley, and an handfull of Time, boyle them together, and when it is halfe boyled, put in a god peece of tweet Butter, and let them boile together from a quart to a pint: when you goe to bed, bathe your knees well therewith, we wet a cloth three or four times double therein, and lay it to your knees as hot as you can suffer all night, and vie this fire or seanen times, and it will boubtlesse helpe you.

For a Sciatica or Ache.

Takeople of Peates-feets, and Aqua composita, and anount the same place where the paine is, then take woll newly plucked from the sheepes backe, and lay thereon, and was it well with warme clothes.

A Plaister for an Ache.

Take as much Aone Pitch, to the quantity of a Tennis Ball, salponefull of Tax, and a pennyworth of treacle and Kofin, so the quantity of a tennis Ball, and a sponefull of Hony, boile

it over the fire in a kettle, and Kir it all together till it be well melted, then take a new theepes skinne, and make holes in it with a bookin, & spread the Wedicine on the fleshy fide of the skinne, and lay it to the Acheas hot as you may.

For an Aguc.

Take Wurre-rotes: and red Pettle-crops: and seeth them in Kale Ale's clarifie it, and give the ficke thereof to diak about such time as the cold beginneth to come, and after the heate be past. When you see that he beginneth to sweate, give him to drinke Postet Ale, made with Parisold and Fennell, and see the postet Ale be well clarified: whe this medicine, for it will take away the Ague within their or foure sits at the ottermost.

A medicine against the hot Feauer.

Take a handfull of bay leaves, a handfull and moze of red Sage, and feeth the same in a pottle of thate Ale, to a quart, and the same being framed. Let the patient being in bed, drinke thereof a good draught, being warmed with a little Sugar, and houre before his fit come.

A good medicine for anague, be it quotidian or quartane.

Take of mallage, and of feathersew, of either of them the quantity of a handfull, sampe them and straine them, and then take halfe so much as the twice of the same is, of small Ale, and being mirt together, drinks it warms a little before the time that the sit should come: that is to say, when you perceive any grudging: this must be drunke three senerall times, the Partient going to bed, and cloathes ynow layd upon him.

A Medicine for an Ague.

Take Aettles, Tob-webs, and Salt, and beate them in a Modden, with, and lap ic to the left arms of the ficke, and it will take away the heate of the Ague,

For the Ague.

Take Sot, and polkes of Ogs, and bay, salt, and pepper, and mingle them together, and lay it to both wrefts, and it will take away the ague,

For your drinkein your Ague.

For your brinke, take ale, and not firong, & vie it lake, warme.

Drinke

Drinke and Pottage in an ague.

Spake your Pottage and Posset Ale, almondmilke, with these hearbes following, that is to say, Sinckfoile, Succopy, Buglosse, Endine, Bozage, Sozrel, Lettice, and Fenclicuts, and Pariely-rutes, great Kapsinsand Princes.

A Medicine for the drought in an Ague.

Take a quantity of Borage, a quantity of Sorrell, a certaine of Miolet-leanes, a certaine of Strawberry-leanes, læthe them in a pottle of faire running water, to a quart, then Araine the hearbes, then take Almonds, and blanch them, beate them and Araine them with the faid water, and put Sugar therein and drinke it warme.

A Medicine for the quartane Ague, and for the drought,

Take a pottle of god red Mine, and a pottle of new Wilks of a Cow of one colour, take two or three god handfuls of Youle, eare cleane picked and walked, Arip it into the Wilke and Mine, and temper them together, tet them ftand so one night: and put them in a faire Still, and Kill them with a soft Are, and take the water and put it in a faire Classe, and set it in the Sunne source or sine dayes, and let the sicke when he drieth in his Ague, drink thereof three or source times, and he chall be rid of his Ague, and this drinke chall quench his drought.

A Medicine against the Q uartane.

Take thell Sonailes two handfuls, Bay lalt, Pallowes, of each ahandfull, beate them together, and lay it to the foles of your feete, before the quartane fit both come.

A Medicine for a cold in a Feauer.

Take Camomile and Mozmewed, and fethe them in a quart of Ale, till halfe bee consumed, and grue it the Patient firk and last.

A medicine against the hot Feauer.

Take a pattle of Cale Ale, and a bottome of a Cale white Loafe, and a handfull of Sinckfolle- a handfull of Camomile, Areacle and Ainegar, of each a sponefull, a sew whole Haces, Sugar Candy, as much as they lik, & seethe these until halse be soulumed, and Araine it from the hearbes, and give it to the Patient

Patient to drinke, and none other brinke buring his heat, and as much thereof as he will, and it helpeth.

For the Ague

Take two or three Cloues of Garlick, and hruse them, & a penny-worth of Aqua vitæ, halse a pint of Ale: seth them toges ther, & drinke it a little before the fit come, as hot as you may.

Against the corrupt ayre.

Take Betony, Centory, Egrimony, of each a handfull, and stampe them a straine them with Ale, and with a Lycoris sticke brused, and then boyle it, and clarifie it, and make it pleasant with Sugar, and drinke thereof every morning blod-warme three sponefuls, three or source dayes.

To make a man haue an appetite to his meat.

Sothe Centozy in faire cleane water, and let the ficke dzinke thereof enery mozning blod-warme, the sponefuls, thereoz foure daves.

To make a man haue an appetite to his meate.

Sothe Centory in faire cleane water, and let the ficke drinke it luke warme fasting three dayes, each day nine sponefuls, and he shall be whole, for this purifieth the somack and brest also.

A good comfortable powder to difgeft well, and many

other good properties.

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Take Pellatory of Spaine, Centory, Annis, Lycoris, graiues of Parabile, Ginger, Sinamon, of each like much beaten, and fearced into fine powder, and drinks thereof morning and euening halfe a sponefull in The or in Ale.

To make Ipocras for a weake stomacke.

Take a pint of Aqua vita, and put it in a glasse: then take 2. ounces of Sinamon and one ounce of Singer, two penimosth of Cioues, two penimorth of Orsines, one of Autmeas, and beate them altogether to große powder, and put them all into the glasse to the Aqua vita, and thake it every day often, nine the glasse to gether: and then drinke it in Thine of Aie, halfe a sponefull, or a quarter with halfe a pint of Aie.

A Medicine to cleanse the Back, and purge the Reines.

Take one Fennell roote, and two Partly rootes, and picke out the piths of them, and take thereto one handfull of Pella-

fozy of the wall, and all these being washed cleane, seth in Posset Ale, and deinke thereof when you goe to bed, and if you wake at midnight, deinke you also.

A Medicine for the paine in the backe, and for the heate in the backe.

Take Rose-water, and put thereto Gaunders, and Rose-leanes, and lay them in steepe in your Rose-water one whole night, then wash your backs with the same, and it will take as way the heate, and greatly comfort the Reines.

For paine in the backe.

Take Sage, Role-mary, Camomile, and Paudlin, of each of them a handfull, then Campe them together, and five them in Pay butter, and anoint your backe with it warms.

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A Medicine for the Reines of the backe.

Take halfe an ounce of turpentine of Menice, and let it be well washed in plantine water, or Rose-water, and then mire it with fine white Sugar, and make thereof source or fine bals, which you must ease, there in a morning saking, and dry, ly drinke a little white wine, or Kenish Wine immediately after.

To driue out a paine or griping in the belly.

Take Sothernwod, and lay it against the place of the contrary side where the torment is and it will drive it out, and if it be layd to the Pauell, it will drive a way the paine.

For the biting of any venomous beaft.

Take Plantine and drinke the innce thereof, and take plantine and Salendine, of each likemuch, stamps them and temper them with stale pisse, and lapit to the soze, and it will asswage the swelling, and draw out the benome.

A medicine for the byting of a mad dogge,

Take a good handfull of Betony, and a handfull of Wilde Sage, a handfull of Might thade, & fairer unning water a pinte, the heards being Camped & Crained therewith, and put thereto a penniwo2th of treacle, and give it to the patient to drinke two 02 three moznings.

Take Centery, greene Rew, and red Fennell, and Kaurpe

and Araine them, and brinke them warmed.

A Medicine to stop bleeding.

Take Bursa pastoris, Plantine and Isp, of each of them like much, and bruse them in a Porter, and warme them as bot as you can against the fire, and lay them to the nose of him that blædeth, and binds some of the hearbs to his temples as hot as he can suffer them.

Another Medicine for the fame.

Take an old cleane linnen cloth, and wet it well in Aine, ger, then burne it to powder, then take the powder thereof, til it be a wound, cast it therein, and it will Cop the blading immediately, but if the note blade, then souffe up the foresaids powder into thy note, and it will Kint blading.

Another for the fame.

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Takea Toade, and dry him in the sunne very dry, then put him in a linnen bag, and hang him about your Pecke with a Aring, so low that it may touch your brest on the lest side nière but your heart, and commonly it Aageth all kinde of blading at the mouth, nose, or wound.

Another to stop blood.

Af your note doe blade bumeaturably, then the your little finger very hard about the lower toyut, and to; the most part it faileth not, but stayeth the same.

For spetting of bloud.

Take the iupce of Betony, and temper it with Goates Wilke, and gine the Patient to brinke theix dayes.

For the same.

Take Smallage and Hints, Rew, and Betony, and lithe them well in god Hilke, and sup it warme.

To stench blood at the nose.

Take Betony, Campe it with a little falt, as much as thou maid take by with thy two fingers, and put it in thy note.

To stench blood.

Take linnencieth and burneit, and take the powder and put it in another cloth, and so lay it to the wound. Also take an Hearb that is called Poruincel, and hold it between the teeth, and then that not blede while thou holdest it there.

Good

Good for the braines.

To smell the saucur of Puske, Camomile, to brinke Wine measurable, or to eate Bage, but not much, to keepe the head warms, often washing of your hands, measurable walking, mesurable saping, to hears little noise of Pusicke or singers, to eate Pustard, Pepper, the saucur of ted Roses, and to wash your temples with Roses water.

Ill for the Braine.

All manner of Braines, Gluttony, Drunkennelle, late Suppers, to flupe much after meate, corrupt agres, anger, heavis nelle of minde, to kand much bare headed, to eate too much or halfily, too much heate, too much watching, too much colo Wilke, Cheele, all manner of Juts, much bathing, Ontons, Garlicke, and great noyle, or to smell a white Kole.

For Acopping in the breath.

Take Reto and feeth it in Gifell, and so dzinke it : dzinke Pettle-feed brayed, and it shall boid gravell of the Cone in the Rienes of the Backe,

For a stinking breath.

Take the feed of Coziandez, and boile it in white Kimney of Sacke, and thereof drinke three spoonefuls in the morning, and as much at evening, but that you drinke in the morning, must be cold, and the other hot, but you must be to take no excesse of meates, nor drinks, nor sit by late, but rise by early.

A medicine for a bruse in the Log or Arme or else-where.

Take water. Tresses, and wath them cleane, and seeth them in faire water till they be soft, then beate them small in a Mozter, and put them in a cleane Pan, a put therebut of weet suct of a Part, Buck, or Sheep, and put thereto the Lees of Mine and Wheate Bran, and six all tegether, and make a plaiser thereof, and lay it warme to the soze place, and so lay three or source plaisters, as neede shall require.

Another plaister for a brule or fore variped-

Take Deemeale grotes, and fithe them in sweete Cow milke, butill they be as thicke as Pap, and put it into a Pan, with a quantity of Sheepes tallow, and boyle them well, and Airre them well, and then make a plainer thereof, and lay it to

the griefeas you can luffer it.

For a bruse or a straine.

Wake the grounds of Ale or Bære, and wheate bran, and Chickwid, and lay it to the græfe thræ or foure times a day boon a red cloath, and not tw thin.

For all bruses and aches in the bones.

Take a good quantity of Walalwort, and a certaine of Walm and Smallage, and stampe them well, then take a pound of Pay Wutter, and temper them together, then make them in round bals, and let them lye eight dayes after, and then Kamps it agains, then fry it, and strains it, and so put it in an earthen pot, and this will belose the bruse, though it be very blacks.

A Medicine for burning, scalding, or burnt with an Hand-Gun.

Take ten of twelve Egges, as you will make the quantity of your Dyle, and let them be as new as you can get, lay them in the fire, troff them as hard as you can, then take the yolkes, and thou them as small as you can, and put them in a eartheu pot and set it over the fire, and take a ticks and stirit, and let it boyle butill you see it consumed in a manner to nothing, then take it from the fire, and set it in the agree a quarter of anhoure of more, and there will come an Dyle thereof, then take a feather, and anoint the griese with the same Dyle, and take Warts-tongue-leaves, and lay them by on the griese, and that will gather the skin, then you may binde a cloth to it.

Another Medicine for the fame.

Take the bung of Sees of one nights making, and fresh thatter valuated, or else clarified Shapes sewer, and fry them in a frying pan a god time or season, butill your sewer bee almost consumed, then put them in a cleane course linnen cloth, and straine them into a small vessell, then take a seather, and dip it in the liquor, and anoint the burned place or scalded, and when you have so done, wet a fine linnen cloth in the liquor, and cover the sore withall: and do this twice or thrice a day, and by Gods grace it shall belpe you.

For burning, or fcalding.

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.b. An Hospitall

Take Paiden-wort, Campe it and lieth it in fresh Butter, & Araine it and anoint the patient.

To take away a heat and burning with Gunpowder.

Take a god quantity of Houseke, stampe it and wzing out the inice, take the white of sire Egges, and beate them in a dish till they be thin, and then take out the skinne, and put there together, and wash the sozes with a linnen cloth, and lay the cloth alost open the soze wet.

A Medicine for burning or scalding.

Take blacke Sope, 02 grey Sope, and lay it immediately to

For burning or fealding.

Take a good handfull of Anens, and as much of Shæpes bung, and so fry them in Pay-butter, and Araine it, and anoint the place with the same cold, twice a day, but anoint it first with gray and blacke Sope, and it will helpe, the ointment must be spred upon a staren cloth if you can get it.

To make an ointment for burning with Gunpowder or

fealding with water.

Take a handfull of Barroes, greace, and two handfuls of Grounfell, and two or three handfuls of Poulleke, and Campe the hearbes together, then put to it new Cheeper-dung two handfuls, of Gose, dung two handfuls, and Campe them together, and being hote, Craine them through a cloth into an earthen pot, and with the liquor anoint the burned place.

An oyntment for burning.

Take Plantine, Way, bread, Dazy, and græne barke of Cloer, and græne Gole, dung, and oyle of Olive, Kampe them together, and wring them through a cloth, and bathe the place that is hurt with a feather.

For burning or Scalding in what place soener.

Take the white of an Egge, and put it in a Pewter dith, and then labour it with an Allum Cone, till it be like a Pocet curd: then take a fine piece of linnen, and wet it in oyle Dlive, ez in some other oyle, then lay the said cloth byon the soze, and aboue it lay the sozesaid surd made of the white of an Egge, and That Hall bram out the fire and heale the sore.

For the burning or Scallding.

Take foure Ogges and rove them, and take out the yolkes, try them in a pan softly by on the embers, till they be blacke, and thereof will come an oyle, the which save and put into a Gally pot, and vieit when you have need.

A medicine for a burning for lacke of other things.

Take the Berries of Elder træ, and lay them to the loze, and it helpeth.

Another Medicine for the fame.

Take Dyle Dline, and beate it with water till it ware very white, and anoint the place.

For a burning with fire.

Take blacke Wernish, and all to anount the place with a feather, and it will kay the heate, and heale it as faire as ever did medicine, and so vie it till you be whole.

For a Canker in a womans paps.

Take Dole dung, and Sallendine, and bray them well too gether, and lay them to the foze pap, & it will clenfe the Canker, and kill the Mozine, and heale the foze.

For the Canker in the mouth.

Take the inice of Plantine, vineger, and water of Roses, and walh thy mouth withall many times.

A receit to still a Cock.

And are de Cock of the of of the years old, and kill him and desse him faire, and cut him in source quarters, beuse the quarters, and picke out the fat of them, then take halfe a handfull of red Piuts, a a handfull of Parts, tongue, put them in the pot close, with halfe a pint of Palmue, fire crops of Pisope, a rote of Parsely, a rote of Fennell, a rote of Endine, twenty Damaske Prunes, twenty Raisuns of the Sun, source Pares, and let it fill twelve houres, and let the pot be covered with passe, with a platter under it, and let the patient drinke it cue, ry morning nert his heart.

A Medicine for the Collick.

First take a handfull of Rolemary, as much of time, and as much of Pylope, one ownce of Cloues and Pace, and let it apattle of white Mine, and let it let till it ber confumed to a

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quart,

quart, then put therein a little Sugar, and drinke thereof luke, warme, when you field your felse pained, and when it is sobben, as before is mentioned, you must burne it as you burne of ther thine.

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For the Collicke in the fide.

Take a small woden bill, and put therein Art cold ashes then lay spon them hot Embers, without great coles, therespon knew a great quantity of Cummin-sed, and sprinkle it with Palmesey, and so do till the dish bee filled: then cover the dish with a faire linnen cloth bouble, and lay it so hot as you can to your side where the Collicke lyeth, and wie this two or three times, and it will helpe you. And so, lacke of Comminsed phase red Sage, Camounite, Pysope, Time, Penyroyall, all of like quantity, and wie it as the Cummin-sed before.

A Medicine for the Stone.

Take Politory that groweth on the wall, ground Juie, Sarifrage, Partly, Auens, Pallowes, and red Pettles, Pepper Chernell, and Poufeseare, and boyle all these hearbes, of every of them alike quantity in Mhay, and clariffe the Whay with the white of an Egge, and drinke a draught therof at any time falling.

Another for the same.

Take halfe apennyworth of Paray-lad, as much of Radich lied, being well dressed and brused, and seeth them all imapinte of white Bastard to halfe a pint, and then drinke it milkes warme.

Another to breake the stone.

Take Panthorne Cowers, or for lacke of Cowers, take Pawes, and divill them, the Cowers in Pay, and the Berries when they be ripe: take of this water three sponefulls, and three sponefuls of Palinsey, and a quantity of Ginger, and orinks it warme.

A medicine not onely to breake the Stone, but also clearely to purge you thereof, if you dovse this same dayly.

Take the Roses of a Gip tree, and pricked Holly-leaves, and dry them in an Duen, a heate them severally into dry powder, then

then put them together being first fearced, and of like quantity: then put thereto the powder of Grommell-feed, and Mome feed, of each a like quantity, doing but halfe so many in quantity as the powder atoresaid: and they being mixt all together, be dayly a good sponefull of the said powder in a draught of Ale, Weere, white Time, or Kenish Wine, evening and morning: and besides that, you may be the same powder in Broths and Pottages, the oftner the better: have alwayes in store a good quantity of the said powder: you must keepe the same alwaies dry, in a Pipkin by the sire side, or otherwise.

Another for the same.

Take Partly, diffill it, and ble to drinke the water in white Mine, or in god Ale, and it will detroy the Stone, Collicke, Strangury, and other passions in man or woman.

A Medicine for the Collicke and the Stitch.

Take the grounds of Palmsey, Sheepes tallow, Kibwozt, red-Sage, and Alisanders, seeth all these together, and make a plaiter thereof and say it to the griese, and anoint you with Dyle Dlive, and Dyle of Balme mired together.

For the Collicke and Stone.

Take Pellitozy, unfet Leokes, and Pallowes, of each a like quantity, Kamp them, and put thereto a penniwozth of Peates Dyle, fry them well together in manner of a plaister, put them into a bag of linush cloth, and being very hot, lay it to thy belly and it helpeth within an hours.

And for the Stone, lay the same to the reines of the Backe

behind, and it helpeth with speed.

For the Collicke and Stone.

Take halfs a pound of Time, as much Partly cotes, and blades, halfe a pound of Alifander-ross, and feeth them all together in a pottle of Ale, butilit confume to a quart, and fo drinke it falling.

For the Stone and for him that canno pile.

Take a quantity of Lime, Partly, czops of Jennel, Sinkefoile, Alizanders, of like quantity, five or the cloues of Barlike: Kampe them together, and Araine them with white Whine or Ale, and brinke thereof first and last, warmed.

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A speciall Medicine produed for the Stone, Collicke, Dropsie,

Strangurie, and Iaunders.

Take of Cényhalfe an ounce: Dinger, Annis léd, Licorice, Paces, Pettle-ledes, Jette, Saffron, of each two penny weight Fennell-lede, and Spikenard, of each one penny weight, and this penny weight of Sinamon, make all these in powder, and dainke thereof halfe a sponefull at once in posset Ale, or in Pottage.

For the Collicke passion.

Take Annis lads, Kennel lads, and Carraway lads, of every of them halfe an ounce, Ginger, Galingale, and Sinamon, of every of them two dragmes: Cloves, Paces and Cardam, of every of them halfe a dragme, Setwall, foure dragmes, Sugar eight ounces, make them all together in powder.

For the stone in stopping of the water.

Take a pint of white Thine, and therewith make a Pollet, then take all the curd a way, and put into the Pollet Ale, two penny weight of the scraping of white Sope, and boile it, then drinke it as hote as you can.

For the Collick and the stone, prooued.

Take Parlely-læds, Bzome-læds, Grommel-læds, Fennell-læds, Annis-læds, Plantine-læds, and Smallage-læds, of every of them a quarter of an ounce, and of Autmegs, halfe an ounce, of Dugar tryed, four counces, and beate them altogether in a Mozter, butil they be bery fine, then learce the powder through a fearcet, and ble to drinke this powder evening and morning, three dayes in a wake, with Mine or other drinke luke-warme, and take of this powder at a time, the quantity of a great Pazel Put: and if the paine be great, take of the oyle of Scorpions, with oyle of Roses, and anoint your tide where the paine is, against the fire.

To purge the bladder of him that cannot piffe-

Take Kennell, and the rotes of Allesanders, Parsely, the rotes and leanes of Parts-tongue, Paiden-haire, and south them in white Mine, and give it the patient to drinke, and it will purge the Bladder in short time.

For the fame.

Take, Kew and Grommell, and Parlely, Campe them together, and temper them with white wine, and give it the licke to Dinke warme.

For thim that cannot well piffe.

Take a flint Kone, and lap it into the fire butill it be red hot, and therewith warme your Ale, and then brinke thereof.

To prouoke vrine, and against the stone,

Take their quarts of Ale, warme it well, let it be skimmed theire, then put to it a handfull of Time, ta handfull of Rose-many, and a handfull of Penni-royall, and let them seeth together till one quarter be consumed, or more, then, Araine the hearbs from the Ale, and drinke a draught of the Ale first and last warme
To make one pisse.

Take a quarter of a handfull of Parfely, as much red Fenell, walh and thred them small, and put them in a cup of Cale Ale, and make a posset therewith, and drinke the Ale, and it helpeth.

For a man that piffeth blood.

Take Ambros a handfull, Burfa pastoris as much, Parselyseed as much, Campe them all together, and give the sicke to drinke thereof in Goates milke.

To prouoke vrine.

hat the state Take a handfull of red Pettle-rotes, and feeth them in a quart of god Ale, till it be confumed to a pinte, and put thereto halfe a dish of Butter, and let it be cleane shimmed before the Butter be put in, and seeth it in Allesander-seeds, Parselpseeds, Grommell-seeds, beaten in fine powder, and Arains them through a fine cloth, as much of the one as of the other, and drinke thereof first and last.

For the fame.

Take a quantity of blacke Sope, and English Sastron, and temper them together cold, and lay it cold by on your nauell, being speed by on abroad paper, or red leather, and then lay by on it a linnen cloth of ten or twelve folds, hote, and toule you with a towell, and so lie downe by on your bed warme, and it will make you pisse within an houre.

A drinke for a windie Collicke.

Take a quart of Palmie, and two sponests of the pith

st Partly-rots, and a handfull of Wiolet-leanes, and five Bays baues, feeth all thefe together unto a pint, and drinke it morning warme.

Totake a way Cornes.

Take Marigolds stamped, and lay it byon the fore, evening and mazning and it profiteth. Dresse pare your Corne, and lay thereto Auspentine and red War boyled together, and make a playster thereof, and it helpeth.

To do away a Corne.

Take and cut away the Corne, and drop into it a drop or two of a blacke Snaile, and put thereto the powder of Sandifer and it will be it away.

For the same.

Pare away your Corne as nicre as you can, and put into the hole buffecht Lime as much as a Kitch, and couer it with a playfter of Ware and Rozen, and let it lie 24. houres.

To make a water against a consumption.

Wake a quart of Rose-water, as much of womans milke, milke of Goates, of Hares, or of Cowes milke: put but them thirty polkes of Egges well mingled together, and there of distill a water, whereof give the patient to drinke warms first and last, with a Cake of Manus Christi, made with Gold and Pearles.

For a Consumption of the Reines.

Take Clary-leases, and picke them, and fry them with two 12 thick yolkes of Egges, and put therebut Saffron died by on a flone, and grinde it small, and put all together, and fry them in fresh butter, and eate it warme next your heart.

To make a Gelly for one that is in a Consumption. .

Take a Legge of Meale, and cut away the fat, and a Capon or Cock new killed, and scald him, and wash him cleane, and let the Capon and the Meale lie in water the space of three houses, and seth them on the fire, with two pottles of faire water, seum it cleane, and as the fat riseth, take it off, and so let it seth, till halfe the broth be consumed, then put in a pottle of rackt Renish Thine if you have it, or else a pottle of white wine, and let it sethe altogether, but ill it consume to a quart, &

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clarific it with the or foure whites of Egges, and let it runne through a gelly bag, and then fet it on the fire againe, and put in one pound of Sugar, and one ounce of Sinamon groffe beaten, and then let it runne through a gelly bagge three or foure times, and after let the patient drinke thereof warme.

For an extreame Cough.

Take Kennell rotes cleane washed, Annis-seeds, and a little Licozice, and seeth them altogether in white Thine, and take the white Thine, and drinke a good draught thereof when you goe to bed, and the nert morning take a Kigge and a Date, and roste them, and eate them somewhat hot, and neither eate nor drinke in two or three hours after, and in two or three times drinking it shall helpe you.

For the Cough.

Take eight penny weight of fine Ginger, and firt kne penny weight of the powder of Clicompane rotes, and one ounce of the powder of Licorice, and two ounces of the powder of Andries of Sugar. Candy, mingle all these together, and vie to eate it when you will at all times in the day, and you thall find eeale therein, for this is well proued.

For the Cough, and to dry vp the rhoume and fleame.

Take a handfull of Sage, and a handfull of Bay-salt dried at the fire, a handfull of Cummin, a pennyworth of Cloues, and another of Naces, and beate all these and mingle them together, and put them into a linnen bagge the length and breadth of a mans hand, and quilt it, and bleit hot by on the mould of the head till you be eased: warme it morning and evening, and lap it to your mould againe.

For the Cough of the Lungs.

Take apottle of running water, twenty Figges, a quarterne of the belt Sugar a god quantity of Licorice and Annisfeeds, a penny-worth of Maiden-haire, a handfull of great Kalfins the flones picked out, and boyle them but a quart, and fo warme a little in a Cone cruze, and drinke thereof,

For the Cough.

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Take Pysope. Pozehound, Sugar, and water, boile them altogether, till it come to athinne Sirrope, and so vie to eate there-

thereof evening and morning, and all other times when you thinke god.

For the Cough.

Take a pint of Hylope-water, and halfe a pint of Role-water, and a good quantity of Licorice brused, a great sponefull of Annis-seds, halfs a pound of white Dugar. Candy:let all these boile together, till it come to cleare Strope then put it in a faire glasse Arained, and take the Strope at all times of the day or night, when you like.

For the Cough.

Take a folke of bred, and make it hot, and put on twet ballet Dyle one both fides of it, and eate it every morning and evening, and it will helpe you.

For the same.

Take Barrowes of Boses, greate, the of four clones of Garlicke, and Campe them together, and warme and anoint thy fixe therewith at thy going to bed, and so kiepe them hot with a tosted trencher and warme cloathes, and you shall recover.

For the chin Cough in Children.

Take Bozes-greace, and warme the foles of their fete at the fire, and chafe them with the afozefaid Bozes greace, and let them go to bed, and keepe them warme, and lay cloathes to their feete.

For the Cough and the wheefing.

Take a pound of Sugar-Candy somewhat finely beaten, halfe o pound of Licorice searced, and halfe a pound of Annis-seeds, searced, and an sunce of the powder of Ginger, an ounce of Elicompane-rootes made into powder, and mingle these together, and take of the same powder halfe a spoonefull at a time when you goe to bed, and when you rise in the morning.

For the Cough.

Take Pylop, Licorice, Porne-hound, a little of the rootes of Clicompane, great Kaifins, Figges cut in small pieces, and Annis-seeds: boile all these in water, then Araine out the water, and drinke it every morning falling.

For the Cough and for stopping at the brest, and to open the

pipes, and fo to avoid much corruption.

Take the rote of Elicompane, and a roote of Radich, and Cheed them thin, and Peare-wardens, twice so much as of both the others, then put all together into a new earthen pot, then put thereunto clarified Pony till it over flow the said ingredients: then cover the pot, and passe it that no breath come out, and set it into an Duen, and let it bake with a batch of bread, and give the sicke thereof, a spoonefull at morning and another at night.

Master Bakers Medicine for the Cough of the Lungs.

Take the pints of running water, halfe a poimt of Poztingale. Sugar, with nine Figgs, and halfe a spoonfull of Annis-seeds, bensed, a handfull of Kaisins of the Sun, cleans walhed, having the Conespicked out, a peny, worth of Paiden, haire: let all these boile together till the one halfe and more be boiled away, and then Craine the same through a fine cloth, and enery morning drinks two spoonefuls of it suke-warms, and you thall finds present remedy.

For the Crampe.

Take Polly oyle, oyle of Aiolets, and of Swines-greace, of each like much: and make an cintment and anoint the place.

An excellent salue for a cut.

Take two handfuls of Bugle which groweth most commons ly in woods, and as much Malerian: bause them very small, then take a quantity of Dete sewet, halfe so much vnw2ought Mare, so much of these two as the hearbes may be boiled there in, then set it one the sire, and when it is halfe boiled, put in a quantity of the best Aurpentine that you can get, then set it boile till it be enough, and all the while stirre it well: when it is boiled enough, straine it through a cloth into a vessel and so keepe it.

For a new cut that wil not leave bleeding.

Take the blades of buset Lickes, and Kamp them, and put thereunto Hony and Wheate flower, and Kir them well to-D 2 gether

gether untill they be thick : let it come to no fire, but all cold lay it to the wound and it will flanch the blading, draw out the brused blod, and make it cleane.

For the deafenesse in a mans head.

Take a quart of Malmley, a penny-worth of Cummin, and eight Betony leaves that groweth on the land : then boyle all thefe together till the one halfe of the Dalmfey be confumed : then take the pot that you boile your Dedicine in, as some as the hearbes be boiled, and cover it with a tunnell, and binde it close about the verge, that the heate come not out, then put a quill in the other end of the funnell, then put the patients eare therebuto, to that the heate may goe close into his head, first the one, and then the other, and whilf the heat is driving in the one east, god mult fop the other with blacke woll, and you have bot cloathes to keepe in the heate on the other ave of the bead while the medicine worketh: then ferue the other eare Dou must ble it thee times in the day, that is ikewifeto fay, in the mouning, at none and at night, and fo you must continue the space of thee bayes, and thee nights. the Patient come not into any open agre the space afozesaid : and you must put to your Malmfep a quarter of a pint of clare eunning water.

A good medicine for deafenesse, vsed by Thomas
Steuens of Bushton.

Take Bay-berries, Bay-leaues, Betony, and Sticards, of each of them one handfull, sæthe them in white Unine to the halfe, and so an old man in Palmesey: then put it it into a velfell that hath a narrow mouth, and hold your eare over it being but opped, so that you may suffer it, being neither to hot not twood: then take oyle of bitter Almonds, and let drop thereoftwo or three drops in your eare, and alwayes have a locke of fine blacke woll that groweth betweene the Shæpes legges, to sop close your eare therewith: wherein if you put a little Puske, it will be the better.

A soueraigne Medicine for the paine and buzzing in the head, which hindreth the hearing

very much.

Take one cloue of Garlicke, pill it, and pricke three or foure holes in the middest, and dip it in fine English Hong, and put it into your eare, and put a little blacke woll after, and lie by on your other side each night, and so let it continue in your eare for the space of seauen or eight dayes, and it will expulse the humors at your nose, expell the paine, and restore the hearing.

For the paine in the eare.

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Take two handfuls of Sage, one handfull of Pylope, and halfe ahandfull of Kole-mary; put these into a little pillow boiled in Kolevineger, Aqua vita, and Kolevinater, and lay it to your eare as hot as you can suffer it.

An oyntment for a swelling.

Take a god quantity of Smallage and Pallowes, and put thereto two pound of Bores-greace, one pound of Butter, and a quantity of Peates-fot cyle, Campe them well together, and fry them, and Craine them into an earthen vessell.

To make a drinke for an extreame heate or drought.

Take a pottle of faire water, a handfull of Succozy, a hand, full of Endiue, a handfull of Aiolet-leaues, a handfull of Burrage, halfe a handfull of Lettice, two Fennellewtes, two Parfely-rots, put them all in your pottle of water, and let them fieth from a pottle to a quart, then take it off, and put a little Sugar to it, and let it have two wallops moze, then dzinke of it when you thinke god,

To make a diet drinke.

First buy a viet pot and fill it full of Conduit. water, lacking a quart: then put to the water a quart of white Mine, and fet it over a foft fire of coles, then put thereto a pound of Licoras scraped and cut in small pieces: halfe a pound of Annis, seeds brused halfe a pound of Lignum vitæ, bought at the Aurners, and an ounce of the barke of the same, which you may have at the Apothecaties, then let all these boyle together and houre and a halfe, so that one part of the liquor be boiled away then take and straine it into a faire vessell, and keepe it close, and exinke thereof sits and last a pretty draught warme.

A water for the eyes.

Take kindely Roch Allome white, a small quantity of Red Rose,

Mose-water, and the inice of red Fennel, and the white of an Egge well beaten, and take off the scum of the Egge, and beate them together, then straine it through a fine cloth, then dip your finger in the water, and let it drop in your eye.

Goodfor the fight.

All this is god for the fight: red Roles Meruaine Roles, Fennel, Salendine, Bumpernell, Oculus Christi, to wash your eyes with clare water, or to take vpon grane colours, measurable sape, to lake in a faire glasse, oft washing of your hands and fate, and it maketh your meat digest well.

Ill for the eye fight.

To Auddy after meat, Barlike, Dnions, Leekes, Lettice, two sodine going after meate, Mines, hot or cold aire drunkennesse, gluttony, Pike, Chase, much beholding of bright things, and as evill red things as white: much sape after meat two much walking after meat, and two much letting blod, Colework, Kre, duft, two much warping, and overmuch watching.

A speciall good water for the eyes.

Take a new layd Egge, and rost it hard, cut the shell in the middest, and take out the yolke, and put in a piece of white Coperas whereas the yolke lay, and binde the Egge together as gaine, and let it lye in the sice till the Coperas bee desolved in water: then take the white out of the Egge, and cut it in small pieces, and let it stand a while, then straine it through a fine cloth, and kiepe it in a close glasse and dresse the eye every morning and evening.

To kill the pin and the webb in the eye.

Take a quantity of the leaved grass, as much red fennel, as much red sage, as much Dazies, the white of an Egge, beaten, and the froth taken away, halfe a spoonefull of Hony, Campe all the hearbs together, and then take the inice thereof, and put thereunto the white of the Egge, and the Hony, and then stir them together, and doop the same into the eye of the patient: then take a platster of flar tow, and dip it in the said Pedicine, and lay it be pon the eye of the said patient, and bind it sast and let remaine so an houre at every time of desing.

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Another for the same.

Take the leanes, of Sallendine, and Campe them and Craine them: then put one drop of the inice thereof in the eps, and it will helpe by Gods grace.

For the webbe in the eye if it be old.

Take the red Pimpernell and Euphrasia, and Kampe them in a Postes: and then, frie them with Capons greate in a cleane pan: then wring it through a cloth into a vectell of brake and let it And therein three daies after: put it in a bore of home or tinne, and take thereof and put it into the webbe of the eye: This Pedicine is soueraigne.

A good Medicine for the eyes, being either. Pearle or Webbe.

Take three leaves of Dazies, and Pouch wert, alias Bursa Pastoris, and the Chest-lops, alias Alood-lisse: Kampe them together and Kraine them in a little good Ale: drinke of the same three severall mornings, two houres before you rise, and you shall sinde ease. Potwithstanding your eyes will bee sore, then wash your eyes with cleare running Water: then drinke of your drinke two mornings againe: and you shall bee whole and Ande great ease by Gods grace.

A water comfortable for the eyes.

Eake the inice of Euphrasia, or else water made of it: for it is the belt hearbe that can be sor the eyes, what way soener you can take it.

For fore eyes.

Take rotten Apples and diffill them: and with the water thereof walh your eyes, and it will purge and cleanle them, and cleare your fight.

For the same.

Aake Coperas and lay it in running water and fraine it: and when you goe to bed, Arike the brees of your eyes with the same water, and let it doop into your eyes.

A water very good for the eye-fight.

Wake Rose-leanes, a great handsult of red-Kennell: Meruaine as much: Rewa handsult: Salendine as much: and divillthem together, and you hall have a good water and comfor-

comfortable for your eyes.

A drinke for the eye-fight.

Take a quantity of Juie that groweth byon the Ashe, a quantity of the rotes and leanes of Passes in the field, also a quantity of there were and a quantity of the leaned Grasse: all these being washed cleane, thampe them and Araine them with a pint of state Ale: and drinke thereof evening and morning, or at midnight for a season.

A perfect water for the eye-fight.

Take Sage Kennell, Meruaine, Betony, Cuphzasia, 02 Cyc-bzight, Pimpernell, Sinckfoile, and Pearb-grace, and lay all these in white Wine all night: and then visible them in a Cillatory 02 glasse, 4c. This water is speciall god.

For the Emrodes, and to dry vp any fore.

Take the broad pemphane leafe, commonly called Canelleaves, which grow in the waters: walh them cleane, put them in a paper, and fry them in the Embers, and apply them as hot as may be suffered, and make them in powder, and cast them into the sore, and it helpeth.

For the fame.

And set it under a close chaire, and sit over it, and lap warme clothes about the chaire, that no agre may goe out, and so sit over it till it be cold, and then anount the members with the liquoz.

For the fame.

Take a plate of Lead and rub thereon a quantity of Bozes, greafe, for a man, and Swines-greafe for a woman, and walh it with white Wine, and anount the Emzodes.

A Medicine for a red and high coloured face.

Take Ainc-leaves, Strawberries and Creame, and out two penny-worth of Camphire but it: then put it in a fill-litory with the aforesaid leaves, and diffill it: and take the water thereof, and wash your face therewith morning and one ning for a certaine space, and it will take away the high colour of the same.

Another for the same.

Take Comeumbers, and parethem cleane, and cut them in fices, and distill them, and with the water that commeth of them, walh your face daily, three or foure times in the pay: if you have none of the mater, them take the Comcumber it selfs, and pare it and rub your face therewith.

A Medicine to destroy heate in the face, or in any other

place, though it be St. Anthonies fire.

Take a quart of Smiths water a handfull of Sage, a handfull of Gloer leaves, or of the greene barke, a penny worth of Allmon and feeth them alltogether from a quart to a pint, then put in an earthen pot and anoint the patient.

For the pimples in the face.

Take wheat-dower mingled with Wineger and Hony and lay byon them, and it will cleanfe them.

Good for a Fellon.

Take Sage, Rew, Snailes, Bay-salt, and Bacon, and beat them together, and then lay it to the Fellon, and it shall helpe you.

For the same.

Take Pearb-grace, Parch, and white Wozts, ruty. Bacon a little Butter, a house Snaile, mingle them together, and make thereofa plaister.

A Medicine for Biles, Fellons and, vncomes.

Take Theate-nower, Bores-greace, Pay Butter, and Sage, and Kampe it together, and make a plaister thereof, and lay it to the Bile, or Fellon, and it will both ripe it and draw it, and if it be freed it will worke the better.

To ripe Biles, Fellons, and Vncomes.

Take apint of sweet Wilke, and set it over the fire, and put therebuto a quantity of sheepes Sewet, small sheed, and a handfull of two of Dismeale fine beaten, and set all these seth till it ware very thicke, so that ye may spread it spon a faire sinnen cloth, and lay it as warme as you can suffer to the soze, and it will quickly ripe it, and breake it without great paine, then when it is broken, lay a little Aurpentine spon a piece of white leather pricked full of holes, and it will draw and beals

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beale it. A gargresse for sleagme.

Take a quantity of Endine-water, and as much Hony-fuchle-water, a god spoonefull of pure Hullard, a spoonefull of Hony, two sponefuls of vineger, and a little powder of Pepper, two 02 the beanches of Rose-mary, and the leaves of Sage, and put all these together, and heate them by on a Chalingoilh of coles luke-warme, and let the patient put a spone-full at once in his mouth, and hold his head bewards, and wall his theoat therewith, and it shall make him void much sleague, let him take thereof as oft as he shall thinke god.

To breake the fleagme, and for the Cough.

Take a piat of Isop-water Killed, one quart of god Muscadine, this of source god races of case Ginger, pare them cleane and cut them in sices, and twice so much Licorice, and pare it likewise, one god handfull of Sugar-Candy, grosse be vised, put all these premises together in a glasse, and shake them together, and stop it close, and let it stand source and twenty houres then drinks thereof at your pleasure.

To breake Fleagme.

Take Butter without Salt, and Honey, of each a like quantity, and a few bitter Almonds, blaunch them and beate them fine, and eate a little enery day.

For the same.

Take Smallage, and sethit in Aineger, then take the vines ger and wash your brest withall, and then take the Smallage and put it in a cloth, and binde it to your stomacke three houres.

For the fame.

Take Sozrell and flampe it, and firaine it, then take the inice and temper it with old Ale, and drinke a god quantity in the morning before you rise out of your bed: then take askeps after, and you shall beliver sleagme wonderfull to see for the quantity.

A Medicine for the Flixe, or Laxe.

Take Egges, and roke them hard, and take the yolkes of them and kraine them with red-Mine, and put thereunto Sinamon,

Sinamon, then fieth them together, and dinke it as hote as you may fuller it.

For the same.

Take Theat-flower, and the yolkes of Egges, with the inice of Plantine, and make a Cake of it, and bake it in an Onen, and eate it ashot as you can, and drinke thereto ked Thine 02 Respice all hot, 02 else the inice of Plantine, so it will bind him.

A Caudle for the bloody Flixe.

Take a pint of Ked Mine, and the yolkes of five new layed Egges, agood quantity of Sinamon, and a little Sugar, the pill of a Pomegranat dayed and beaten to fine powder a god quantity, and boile all these in a faire platter upon a Chasing-dith of coles, till it bee some what thicke, then let the Patient sate of it morning and eneming, and as oft else in the day as his Comacke will serve him thereto, and it Chall Cop him, be the Flire never so great.

A fingular medicine for the bloody Flixe.

Take so much kne cloth as will make a suppolitory, being weapped round together bottomwise, then wet the same in the best Aqua vitæ, or Aqua composita, and let the parties griened convey the same into their Fundament, and it will belpe them God willing within three or source drestings: this is proved, and hath holpen many that have beene brought very low, and judged past enre.

Another for the fame. The mant sug sin

Take a piece of Allmon, as much as a Walnut, put it in a pint of new Hike, and seth it on the stretul the Wilke turns to a curd, then take off the curd as you doe the Postet Ale, then take the liquoz that remaineth, and put but of a quantity of the powder of the pill of a Pomegranat, and Sinamon sine beaten, and let them drinke it, and it will stop them, and if they eate of the curd, they shall be stayed the soner.

For the bloody Flixe.

Take Almonds, skinnes, and all, and sampe them small, and take the water of hocked Barly sodden, and make thereof Wilke and put therein skins and scorches of Pomegranats, being

being Camped to powder, with a little Sugar, and so eate the same every morning and evening, and put gads of Ciele that have been made red hot in the fire into their drinke.

To ftop the bloody Flix.

Make a quart of Beanes dried over the fire, so that ye may make powder of them, then bruse them in a morter very small and boult them, and take a quart of god Ale, and a quantity of flower, and so seth them both together, and let the patient eats thereof at night as hot as may be suffered.

For the bloody Flix.

Take a pint of running water, and a pint of warme Wilks as it commeth from the Cow, and put them together, then put five 02 are fint Aones in the Arc, and when they be red hot, quench them in that liquoz, then put them in the Are againe, and quench them againe them 02 four etimes therein, till the liquoz be halfe consumed, and let the party brinks of it warms.

A Medicine for the falling of the fundament.

Take red Pettles bray them well, and put them in an earthen pot, and put thereinto a god postion of white Wine, and feeth it till the halfe bee walted, and give it the ficke to drinke first and last alwaies warme, and lay the heards to the fundament as hot as he can suffer it.

A plaister to heale a gowty Legge, a wound or fore whatsoeuer.

Take a handfull of Pallow-leanes, and another of Ground-fell, put them in a Poinet with faire water, and let them boile till they be lodden to tender, that pe may make a plaister of them, then put the liquoz from the heardes, and straine them through a strainer upon a platter, and let the platter upon a Chasingdish of coles, then put therebuto a quantity of Weares Sewet, or Shæpes-Sewet claristed, and unwrought ware, Sallet Ople, Turpentine, and Kozin: let all these boile upon a Chasing dish of coles, untill they be thick: then straine all the said stusse through a linnen cloth into a vessell that you will keep your salue in, and so let it stand untill it be cold, then will keep your salue in, and so let it stand untill it be cold, then be the same being spread upon a cloth, and you shall sinds ease up Gods grace, and belpe.

RAY

A plaister for the Gowt or Ache in the ioynts, wher with the Lord Rich was cured, when all Chirurgians thought him to be vncurable.

Make halfe apound of buwrought Ware, halfe apound of Rozin, an ounce of Dlibanum, a quarter of a pound of fine Lite targe of gold, thee quarters of a pound of white lead, beaten to powder, and fearce it through a Bercer, and take a pint of agle of Peates-fete, and fet it on the fire in a small Wellell with the Ware and Mozin, and when it is molten then put thereto the other powders, and firre it fast with a flicke, and then put a little of it upon a peloter fawcer, and if it be hard being so tried on the pewter sawcer, then take it from the fire, and anoput a faire boad with fome of your ople of peates-fixte and as you may handle it for heat, worke it as it were Cornyers ware, and make it in great roles, a make plaffers of it with a chafing diff of coles, and fpzead it thin boon a linnen cloth as leather, and lay the platter warme where the paine is, and fo renew it mogning and evening butill you be whole, og till the Ache bee brinen into some other topnt, and then take the plaister, and lap where the Ache is, and beware of the cold, and bot Wines.

A Medicine for the Gowt.

Take foure handfuls of Mall-wort, and one handfull of Horehound, and bray them in a Horter, and put their inice to one pint of Swines-greafe, and boyle them on the firethe space of halfe an houre, then Araine it fairs: for it is god for all cold Colds in the armes, legges, or fate, and for all griefes in the hones that come of cold.

A drinke for the Gowt festered.

Take a quantity of Archangell, Betony, Wernin of each like much, and boile them in Wine, and let the ficke person drinke thereof first and last, and it helpeth.

A plaister for the same. Take a sawcer full of the inice of Smallage, another of Worme-woo, Hony, salt, and vineger, and mingle them well together, and doe thereto aquantity of Rie Cower, Air them

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fast together, and boile them, and make a plaister on a cloth, and lay it to the love, vie the dunke a foresaid, and the plaister, and it will helpe by Gods grace.

Good for the heart.

Haffron, Butrage, Huske, Cloues, Calingall, Putmegs, the red Role, Arolets, Sugar, Paces best of all.

Ill for the heart.

Beanes, Peafe, Likes, Barlike, Onious, fabneffe, anger, Dread, to much travell, to drinke cold water after travell, and evill tidings.

A Medicine for the passion at the heart, called

Take the powder of Burrage flower, the powder of put, megs, white Amberlike wife in powder, the bone in a Stags heart, the powder of Sinamon, all these powders drinke luke-warme with Bore, Ale, or Wine, evening and morning, and the party griened thall find eate. These things must be proportioned by god advice.

A Medicine for a continual head-ache.

Take Betony water, and take a cloth the wor foure double and but the fingers broad, wet it well in the Betony-water, and lay it to your forehead cold. Let the cloth being wet come round about the head, and tie it falt, and there or foure times thus doing, it will helpe thee, and when the cloth is dried, wet it agains.

A Medicine to clenfe or purge the head.

Make Pellitory of Spaine, and thew the rote in your mouth three dayes at times, and it thall ove away the Ache, and fasten the texth in the gummes.

A Medicine for the paine in the head.

Make a Rose-take, cut it in length and breadth of the forebead, then take Rose-water and vineger of like quantity, as hot as you may suffer it, and lay it to the forehead,

A medicine for the wind in the head.

Take a handfull of flowers of Camomile, and halfe a handfull of powder of Cummin, and mingle them together: and make two bagges of the breadth of your eares,

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For the head Ache.

Take the inice of Rew, and put it into the nole-thails, for it getteth out the fleagme, and cleuseth the braine, the hearte lodden in Minedoth the same.

For the Megrume or head. Ache.

Take foure or five Quimegs, and pare and fice them as you would pare and fice Ginger thin, then make two little bagges of linnen cloth, of the length of your finger, and put in the Putmegs, then take a quantity of pure red Rose-water, and lay your bagges in the same water in a diffi upon a Chafingdish of celes, and make them hot, and lay them to the temples of your head.

A Medicine for the Megrime truely proued.

Take halfe an ounce of Pepper, two Putmegs, halfe a quarter of an ounce of graines, one pint of Uneger, and a handfull of Kofe-mary, and boile all together betwirt two platters by on a Chafing of the coles, and then take a cloth, and put it ouer your head, and hold your head close over it till it be boiled well-niere all away, and by Gods grace it helpeth.

For the Megrime.

Eake five-leaved grasse, and Pozell that is called S. Pary hearbe, even pozitions of these two, and Betony as much as of both the other, and beate all these in a Pozter, and take the inice of them, and put to the same wice as much Pay-butter as the quantity of the inice, and thereof make an otherent, and anoint therewith the patients brows when hee goeth to bed.

Another for the fame.

Take Bole Armonick, Sanguis Diaconis, and Terrasionilat, of each like quantity, and heat them in powder, then to make a plaister, take star and lay it upon a russet paper, as broad as you will have your plaister, and take the cleare of an Egge, and lay it upon the star, and then take the foresaid powder, and east it on that side of the plaister that shall lye nert your head: and put one folde of russet paper, or else of linnen betweene your head and the Pedicine, or else it will sinnen betweene your head and the Pedicine, or else it will seleave

cleane very fore to the haire of your head, and this Dedicine is well proued.

A good Medicine for the Megrime in the head.

Take leather buallomed, to broad as your fore-head, and in length from Temple to temple, take the same leather, but not through, thereupon lay the ople of the white of an Egge, then take of the Apothecarie Sanguis Draconis beaten into powder, and scatter the same uppoin the ople thinly, and this done, lay it upon the fore-head, not taking it away till it be ready to fall away of it selse.

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A Medicine for the blacke Iaundis.

Take Wheate-Uraw and lay it abroad byou a faire floze, in a close house, and put in Gase, and watch when they dung, and take it by whole, and with a knife scrape off the white that is about the dung, till you have a quantity thereof, then drie it in an Duen, and make powder thereof, and drinke it morning and evening in Ale, warmed, and that will cure both the blacke and yellow Jaundis.

Another Medicine for the Blacke Iaundis.

Take the hearbe Ambros, Betsny, Hugwort, of each of them a handfull, of Centory halfe a handfull, and three or fours Dock: rotes, cleane walhed and scraped, and Kampe all these together in a morter till they be indifferent small beaten, then take Spicknell, Aurmeticke, and Galligarie, of each of them like quantity, and Kampe them like wife in a morter, then put the hearbs in a cleane linnen cloth by themselves, and the spices by themselves, and tie them sake with Krings, and hang them in a gallon or two of Ale when it is new and ready to bee tunned, after three or four dayes drinke every morning next your heart a good draught thereof, and drinke nor eate nothing two or three houres after, and do so like wise when you goe to bed, and no doubt by Gods grace it will helpe you.

For the blacke Iaundis M. Anthony Cox prisoner.

Take the gall of a Kauen, and drie it, and grate it into powder: take a quantity in a spowe, and temper the same with Bere or Aletogether, and drinke it faking in the morning.

A Medining.

A Medicine for the yellow Iaundis.

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Takea handfull of red Pettle crops, and læth them in a pint of Ale, and dzinke the same being Aramed, this of source daies together.

Another for the same.

Take hard Spanish Sope, a little stale Ale, in a cup, and rub the Sope against the cup bottome, till the Ale bee white, and sane it in Juozy, and let the patient drinke thereofficst and last till it be whole.

For the fame.

Take Salendine leaves, and put them into your holen nest your fate.

A Medicine for the yellow Ianndis.

Take a bigge Apple, and cut the top, so as it may coner the Apple againe, and take the coze, and put into it some swet Butter, and a good deale of Turmericke, and a good quantity of English Saffron, and rolle it very tender, and lef the ticke person eate of it this of source mornings together, or more if nade be.

For the same.

Take a quart of white Thine, a great handfull of Salendine leaves, and bottle them to a pinte, but in Winter take the totes, and drinke thereof morning and evening warme.

For the yellow.

Take Bay salt, Des, and Tummin, and day all these, and make two bags thereof, and as hot as may be suffered, lay the one after the other to the plow or crowne of the head, and so ble it a good while.

For the same.

Take tharpe leanen and Bay-latt, open it cold, and put it to the yellow and it will helpe.

A very good Medicine for an itch.

Take Dock-rots, and beate them, bruise them and frie them with Fresh. Butter, and anoint the patient with the salue, and in fine or fire times dressing, it will helpe you.

To make one seeme young, long, to purge the winde and cleare the fight.

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Make powder of Fennell, Annis, and Elicompane, and temper them with Aqua vita, and day them againe, and eate a quantity thereof morning and enening.

To make a Whay Laxatiue.

Take a pint and a halfe of clarified Thay, halfe an ounce of Sieny, a greats worth of Annis-leds, halfe a handfull, of Hops Burrage, Buglas, of each halfe a handfull, and a little Funitory, and fieth all these in clarified Thay, butill it be halfe confumed, and brinke it two mornings.

A good plaister for the festered legges that

haue beene long fore.

Aake Parch, and wild Tanke, Plantine, and the great Pozell, Poney, and the white of an Egge, and milke of a Cow that is of one colour, and barley flower, and thicken all these together, and bear the hearbes in a moster, and after that mingle the rest with the hearbes.

For the stopping in the Liuer-

Take the broth of a Chicken, of Mercury and Succory halfe a handfull, and a few great Kailins, and picke out the Kones, and let all these boile together: then take a few bitter Almonds and blanch them, and beate them, and with the same liquor make Almond milke, s so ble to drinke it every morning first.

Another for the same.

Take Padder rots, boyle them in halfe a pint of Ale, and let it sath to a draught, and let him drinke it in the morning facing: twice in a wake.

For the fame.

Take Turpentine of Tenice, to the quantity of a Beane, and put it in a spoone, and hold it over the fire till it do melt, then put thereto a little white Sugar, and let him eate it every day falling.

For heat in the liner, and drynesse in the hands.

Take a quantity of Strawbery water Killed, fixth therein a quantity of Liverwoost, and deinke it with as much Sirrope of Wints.

For the heate in the Liver.

Take Saunders, and good Arong vineger, and heate them hote.

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bote, then take the scarlet in graine, and bip in the same, and so lay it to the spone of your breff, one the right fibe.

For the Plurifie.

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Take Backelime, Shep fewet, and a little faire water, and fry them together in a frying pan, and make theresta plaifer, and lay it to the Patients five, and it will braw out the corruption.

For the Plurifie, or Stich.

Take Aqua vita, and Capons-greafe, beple them together, and dip therem blacke woll, and lay it hot to the Comacke, and it will ease the flich.

For the Lungs.

Take the Lungs of a Fore, and day it to powder, and put a quarter of a sponeful into a Ittle Almond milke, 02 both, and eate it, and it is very good to preserve the Lungs.

For the pricking of a thorne, or needle in a joynt, if the

hole be stopped againe.

Take fine boulted flower of Wheat, and temper it with white wine, and boyle it together butill it be thicke, and lap it on the loze as hote as you may inffer it, and that thall open the hole, and draw out the benome or filth, and ease the aking, and heale and close it bp againe: and for lacke of white wine per map take Ale or 1Béere: and this medicine is good to heale a Byle Wihitlow of Uncome.

An easie Purgation.

Take a pint of white Mine, and one ounce of Sieny, and a and handfull of Mailins of the Sunne, the Cones being taken out, and halfe a sponefull of Annis ledes : put all these into the faid White Wine a whole night, and the next morning boyle it to a draught, and fo let the perfon orink it luke warme: and if you will, you may put thereunto their of foure rotes of Polipodie of the Dke.

An easie Purgation.

Naketwo pound of Figges, and put them in a gallon of Anewoost of Barly Walt, put thereunto two ounces of the powder of Licorice an ounce of Sugar, when the figges are boyled, brag them small in a Worter, and draw them through a Aramer,

Arainez, and let it bople againe, and cast thereto a pint of the best Dyle Dlive, when it is well coled: an ounce of Kaisins of Currants, and cate this with light bread.

A plaister to be layd to the same side that the melt is in.

Take a good quantity of new wheat branne, as much Anaissands, and beat them small in a morter, then in a pan mingle them with Uineger upon the fire, till it be like a plaister, then put it in a linnen bag of two handfuls long and one handfull broad, and make it thin and warme, lay it to the fide where the melt is, and role it sake, and in the morning take it away, and then walh the side with his owne water, and drinke againe, ble this order four nights.

For the Morphew.

Take and drinke Elder-water nine dayes three sponesuls, and enery day loke that ye sweate, then take three sr source Oke Apples, and lay them in white bineger source and twenty houres, and then wash the body with vineger, and it helpeth.

Another for the Morphew.

Take the inice of Salendine, and mingle it with the powder of Brimstone, and lay it where the Worphew is, all cold.

For the Morphew white, or blacke.

Take Betony Parts, tongue, Sage, Plantine, red Kennell, water-Creffes, of every of them one handfull, of hearbe Benet halfe a handfull of the leaves, of Meruine an ounce: and diffill these, and drinke every day safting source sponefuls thereof, and walke an houre after spon it.

To clense the mouth, and to fasten the teeth.

Take Sage and Modbine-leanes, of each a handfull, o god sponefull of Hony, a piece of Allom as big as a god Malnut, boyle all these together in a quart of running water to a pinte, and wash the mouth with this water luke, warme this of source times in the day.

To destroy a Ring-worme.

Take a red Docke-rote, and let the roote be pared, and when it is pared, lap it in vineger, till it be well keped, and then rub it well vpon the King-worms: and if it be very ranke, take the powder

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powder of Bimstone, and lay it in the vineger: and temper them well together, and then rubbe well the Ring-worms withall, and it shall destroy it.

A Medicine to kill a Tetter, Ring-worme, or any kinde of Itch.

Take sallet Dyle and Sait tempered together, and being luke warme, anount the soze therewith.

A restority which divers Noble-men have vsed, and hath preserved their life.

They toke a pound of Cap Dates, cleane picked, and the Aones taken out & caused them to be sodden in a pint of Puscadine, till the wine were somewhat consumed, and kept it in a glasse, and thereof did put in their pottage them of source sponefuls at once when they did cate any broth energy meale.

To heale the veffell wherein Nature lyeth,

if it be broken.

Take the hulkes of ladies, or Acornes dryed, and beaten to powder, take a sponefull, and drinke it in the morning with a little warme Ale, and lye in your bed an house or two after.

For the Palfie.

Take a handfull of Sage, a handfull of Sotherne-wod, a handfull of Spike, a handfull of Lauender, a gallon of running water, and boyle all these together, till it come to a pint and a halfe, then Araine it and put it out into a Cone Cruse, and take every time thereof source of sine sponefuls in a sawcer luke-warme, and gargle it in your mouth to and sto, and after spit it out; and in like manner put source of sue sponefuls in a sawcer lukewarme, and so chase that part of the body which is pained with the Palse, with a spunge dipped in the said water.

Another for the same.

Take powder of Depper, and powder of Pellitezy of Spain and powder of Juie of each an ounce, and powder of Sage, two ounces, and ble this powder in thy pottage.

For lamenesse in the side comming by Palsie. Wake a bath of Sage & Pisope, & boile a great quantity of them together, in running water, and bath the side which is soze with it, and bind the hearts to it so hote as you can suffer it.

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A Medicine very good for those that bee taken with the Palsie, though not the shaking Palsie.

Take the blood a for warme, as it commeth from the Fore, the blood about the heart is best, but all the rest is good: and with this blood all to chase the place that is taken, and then take the skinne of that Fore, and put the raw side neare where the Passe is: and it must lie to it at the least twelve houres: and in the meane time till you can get the For, chase the numbers place with Dyle of Dlive, or Aqua composita: this med bicine of the For is speciall good so; the Palse, and hath beine well proved.

For the Palfie that taketh away the speech.

Take Sage-leaues, Primrole-leaues; and if it be Minter ble Primrole-rots, then beat & Sage and the Primrole-leaues together, of each like much traine it with Ale, then give the Patient to drinke a god quantity. This is well proved.

For the same.

Take Sage and day it betweene two warme tyles, and lay it to the nape of your necke, and binde it to the waits of both the armes: then take a putmeg and lice it thinne, and lay one Aiceaboue the tongue, and another under the tongue, and so ble it as often as you thinke god, and by the grace of God it hall do much god: the necke, and the waith mult be anothed with Oyle of Spike, or the water of Spike.

A Medicine for the Palfie,

Take Lauender, Spike, and Dage, and distill them, and brinke thereof a god quantity enery morning, being warme, either in Ale or otherwise: take also Sage and Betony, and put them betweene two dishes byon a Changdish of coales, and sprinkle them with god Palmse, and so apply them warme to the nape of your necke, and the wrists of your hands.

A Medicine for the Palsie.

Take the beards of the heads of buset Likes, and wath them cleane: take a quantity of running water, and such them therein till they be somewhat tender, then dry them wet in a linnen cloth, Campe them as small as you can, then take a

good pice of fresh butter, boyle them therein, byon a Chasing dish of coles, and put in a good quantity of English Sastrons and boyle them together, and when it is well boyled, Arainett through a faire cloth into a glasse, and kæpe it, and when you will occupie it, make a plaister thereof byon a linnen cloth, and lap it cold to the griefe.

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To stench the bleeding of the Piles.

Drinke the inice of Milfoile, for that is proned: also dos therebuto the powder of burnt Barlicke, the Piles Chall die.

To destroy the Piles.

Take Dyle of Roles, and Frankincense and Hony, and make an ointment of them, e put it in with thy finger, into thy sundament: and put thereunto Hirrhe, and often anount the fundament therewith, and let the breath thereof go by into thy Fundament.

A true medicine for the Piles.

Take blacke wooll, and blacke sope, and binde it thereto.

To make a falue to bring wounds that rankle and ake

into their owne kind and ease the bur-

ming and aking.

Take the inice of Smallag and Plantine, like much, take Hony and the white of an Egge, like much, and put to them boulted flower of wheate, and fir them well together until they be thicke, and let it come neere no fire, but all cold, and tabe : lay it to the fore, and it shall cleanse the wound, and ease the aking, and bying it to his kind, and heale the wound faire:

This is a principall salue.

For a wound that is oner-healed and fore underneath.

Take barly meale, the white of an Egge, and Hony, and mingle them together, and make a planker thereof, and apply it to the foze, and it helpeth.

A plaister for a greene wound.

Take flower and milke, and feeth them altogether till it bee thicke, then take the white of an Egge, and beate them together, and lay it to the wound, and it will keepe it from ranko ling.

To make Mollonitret to cure any greene wound or Vacome, or others, what sever they be.

First, take two pound of kiozin halfea pound of ware, halfe apound of Frankinsense, a quarter of a pound of Shæpes sewet clarified, put them into a faire pan, then take a pottle of the inice of Pillonet, boyle these aforesaid stuffes with a soft fire, till they be moulten, and six them a pretty while, then put therennto the inice of your Pillonet, and six them till they be cold, and let them sand a day of two, then melt it agains with a soft fire; and when it is moulten, put therennto a pint of ted Wine, and sixte it till it be cold, that you may worke it with your hand, and make it in toles.

A water to cure all manner of wounds and fores, be they neuer fo fore and stinking, and all manner of cankers in the nose, mouth, throte, or wheresoeuer.

Take a hand full of red Sage, a handfull of Salendine, and as much of Wlebbine-flowers with the leanes: take a gallon of running Water, and put the hearbes in it and let them boile to apottle, then fraine them through a frainer, and take the lis quoz and let it oner the fire agains: then put thereto a pinte of Englich-Pony, a good handfull of Roch allom finely beaten, a penny worth of graines grofely bruifed, and let them boile all together thee or foure walmes, and then let the foum be taken off with a feather, and when it is colo put it in an earthen pot or bottle, fo as it may be kept clofe: and for a green wound take of the thinnelt of the fame water, and for an old fore, of the thickell, the water being first well haken together, and after that you have clenfed the old foze with white Wine, take a quantity of fine lint, and the fame being well wet in the faid Water, bo you therewith oftentimes bathe pour faid mound. and with the faid lint in the end couer the wound: and if there be any holes in the faid wound, fill them with Lint made tent wife, and so after coner the whole wound with a piece of a bladder, the moze better to continue pour lint in mopfing: deede your wound twice a day in the morning and in the euce ning, and it bealpeth.

A Medicine or drinke for him that is burft in the belly or cods.

Take aknuckle of Meale, a pottle of white Mine, halfe an ounce of Pace, halfe so many Dates, halfe a pound of Kaiking of the Sounce, a handfull of Cumfrey, a handfull of Polipos dium, alias Ketne of an Dke, a handfull of Sparoking alias Knotwozt, take all these, and put them in an earthen pot, and set on a Kettle of water of fine gallons, and set the earthen pot in the water, and stop it with passe very close, and let the Kettle bee kapt sething sue of sire houres with the earthen pot therein, and kape the Kettle still full with other sething water: then take all these and beat them in a Moster, and straine it, and give the patient of the liquos thereof both first and last.

For the Tooth-ach.

Take a pinte of white wine, halfe a handfull of Lanender-cotten, and fath them together till the wine be halfe spent, then put into it halfe a sponefull of Bay salt, then let it sath a little, then take a sponefull of the liquoz, and put it in that five which the paine is in, and kape it in thy mouth, and then put another sponefull in, so one after another, and it will help that.

A good drinke to put out the small Pox or Pimples.

Make a Poset of Ale with Hilke, and the curd being taken off, take red Fennell the quantity of a sponefull, as a the same being sod together with the Ale, araine it, and put thereto the quantity of a Putmeg, of fine Areacle, a quantity of Setwall, and a quantity of English Sastron, being well mingled together, and give it the patient to brinke warme.

A present remedy for an Ague,

Take two ounces of Bay-falt, as much of white Frankins cense, and a handfull of Sinallage, beaten all together, and lay it to the wrists of your hands, sto the boughts of your armes two houres before the fit doe come: producd.

For the same.

Take two orthree Cloues of Carlicke, and bruile them, and a pennyworth of Aquavita, halfe a pint of Ale, and feth them together, and drinke it a little before the course or fit

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descome, as hot as you may.

For the Collicke.

Take Grommell-led, Partig-leds, and Annis-leds of each two sponesuls, greene-Fennell one handfull, one Partig-twie, one Radilly rote, of each as long as a finger, buset. Time one handfull, one handfull of Philopendula, and a handfull of Chezery-Kones, wash all these and bruise them and Kampe them very small, boile all these in two quarts of white Wine, in an earthen pot close, till a pint be consumed, then let it run through a timen cloth of it selfe, without Kraining, and drinke it morning and evening.

For the windie Collicke.

Take a quart of Ale clarified, two sponefuls of the flower of Licorice, one sponefull of the flower of Annis-sixos, halfe a sponefull of beniefed Kennel-sixos, alittle Time and sixth them together till a pint of Ale bee consumed, and so deinke it first and last.

For the Collicke and stone.

Take a handfull of Anens, a handfull of Pellitozy of the wall, as much of Cammomell as will lie in the palme of your hand, and a sponefull of Party-size bruised a little, make a Postet of Renish wine, take the curd, and boile all these together in the drinke till the substance be boiled out, then we it morning and evening.

For a paine in the fide that commeth of winde.

Take a handfull of Cummin-lev, another of Annis-lev, and two of Kew, and leth all thele together in running water from a pottle to a quart, put to it halfe a pint of white Tineger before it be cold, dip a spunge in it, and wring out the liquor somewhat, and lay it to the Patients Ade as hot as he can suffer it, and when it beginneth to ware cold, take a new.

To remooue a difease from the stomacke.

Dinke a quantity of Diagon water, or water imperiall mingled with Treacle or Withrivatum.

For them that doe cast vp their meate, by reason of weakenesse of the stomacke.

Take the nether crust of Browne bread, drie it well and leisurely

leisurely at the fire, then skipe it in arong Aineger a little while, take it out and spread by on it the powder of Cloues, warme it againe, and tie it about the month of the comacke, and the bomit shall ccase.

A drinke for cleanfing the stomacke, and to be taken

luke-warme in the morning.

Take Nope, Rolemary, and Time, of each two crops, and put them in a pint of Ale, with a good a quantity of Sugar, and let them boile while the Arength is in them, then drinke thereof two houres before meat.

A drinke to avoid the fleagme out of the stomacke, to make it easier to come vp: you may take of it a spoonefull

or two, continually when you need.

Take eight sponefuls of Kole-water, souresponefuls of Conduit water, and two sponesuls of white Mineger, halfea quarter of white Sugar, boyle all these in a Pozringer vpon a Changoich of coales, and scum it cleane, and then brinke it luke-warme.

A remedy against the Plague, sent to the Lord Mayor of London, from King Henry the eight.

Makea handfull of Sage, ahandfull of Wearh-grace, a hand. full of Cloer-leaves, a handfull of red Bramble leaves, Campe them all and fraine them through a fine cloth with a quart of white wine, then take a quantity of Dinger and mingle them together, and fo take a fponefull of the fame, and you hall be fafe for foure and twenty dayes, and fo being nine times taken thall be fufficient for all the whole yeare by the grace of Gab. and if it be so that the party be Arichen with the plague before he hath ozunke of this Wedicine, then take the water of Scabious a sponefull, and water of Betony a sponefull, and a quantity of fine Treacle, and put them all together, and cause him to drinke it, and it Mall put out the benome. If it fortune the Botch to appeare, then take the leanes of Brambles, Cider-leaues, Puffard-lade, and ftampe them all together, and make a plaifter thereof, and lay it to the foze, and it thail draw out the benome, and the party Mall be whole by the grace of Bob.

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To cause one for to sleepe.

Take a sponefull of pure Role-water, as much of Aineger, two sponesuls of the Dyle of Roles, halfe a handfull of Role-leaves made in powder, mingle them altogether, and take crummes of leavened bread made of wheat, and make a plaister thereof, and lap it over the sorehead and temples.

For a fore thronte

Take Collumbines, and Sinckfoile, and famps them both together, and fraine them with Withe, and drinke it very warme.

For the Hickop.

Take Dyle of Lillies, and anoint the licke mans body fun-

For a Canker in the Mouth.

Take a flower-beluce-rote, and walh it, and lice it, and a few leaves of Penny-royall, lay them in Aspe in Conduit was ter, and so walh your mouth with the water.

For a Laske.

Take an Egge, and Aqua composita, and boile it with the Egge till it be daie, then take Sinamon and Sugar, and eate with the Egge.

A Medicine very precious called Flos unquentum, good for all manner of maladies, that is to wit, against all sores, and wounds, against all manner of impostumes in the head or body, against head-ach, singing in the braine, or boiling in the heart, shrinking of sinewes, it draweth out any thorne or broken bone, and all manner of Ache out of the Liuer, Spleene, or Lungs, it helpeth the Emerodes, and it is very good to make a Scare-cloth for all Gouts, Aches, and pestilent Botches, and therefore this treatise is worthily called Flos unguentum.

Take Rozin and Per, of each halfe a pound, of Mirginware, and Frankincense, of each a quarter of a pound, of Pa-Aicke an ounce, of Parts sewet a quarter of a pound, Campher, two dragmes, melt that is to be melted, and pare that is to be pared, and searce it, boyle it over the fire, Araine them through

for the difeafed.

through a cloth into apottle of white wine, with all the other Bedicines together, then let it coole; till it be no hotter then blood warme, then put thereunto a quantity of Aurpentine, ever Airing it untill it be cold, but ever bemare that your Auxe be no hotter then blood warme when you put in your Auxpentine, or elie it marreth all the Auxe : and make it up in colles, and keepe it to youre vie, and when you will, occupy it plaistermise to your griefe.

To make the blacke falue, that cureth all old fores and Vicers,

be they never fo great, foule and stinking.

Take a gallon of Cale Ale being bery Arong, two hanofuls of Mobbine-leaues, halfe a handfull of red fæded Bettles, as much Coleworts, with the ranged leanes, halfe a pound of red Onions, halfe a pound of Barlicke pilled, a pound of bulet Lickes, a little bilh-full og haubfull of the pomber of a rotten Dott, of an Dhe is belt : let all thefe be famped fmall in a mozter fenerally by themselues, put them into the Ale with halfe a pound of Roche Allom, then fet them ouer a foft fire and let them boile til the one part og moze bee boiled away, then let them fand thee og foure baies, but Artt freine them through a cleane cloth into a cleane bellell then put to them balfe a pound of ware, halfe a pound of Rogin , halfe apound of the pernell which is græne, a quantity of Cone Bony, then fet it ouera foft fire againe, and let them boyle till the one halfe be confumed, then put it into a cleane earthen pet, and flop it bery clofe, and ble thereof when you have occaffon.

Prescriptions and rules made by M Doctor Good, to be observed at the Bathe

V Den pou come to Bathe, after your fourney, rest and quiet your body for the space of a day or two, and see the sashion of the Bath, how and after what sort others which are there doe vie the same.

If it be not a faire cleare day, goe not into the open Bath, but rather ble the water in a Bathing vessell in your Chamber

as many men boe.

The beat times in the day to goe into the Bathes, is in the

morning an houre and a halfe after the Sun rifing, or thereas bout, in the most quietest time, and when you shall feele your Comack well and quiet, and that your meat is well digested, and have rested well the night before: but before you goe into the Bath, you must walke an houre, or halfe an houre at the

leaff in pour chamber, og elfewhere.

Pou must alwayes goe into the Bath with an empty so, macke, and as long as you are in it, except great necessity require the contrary, and then to take some little supping before your walking, or before you rise is not hurtfull, let your tarrying in the Bath bie according as you may well abive it, but tarry not two long in any wife at the first, although you may well abive, that your strength at no time may faile you.

You may tarry in the Crosse Bath an houre and a halfe at a time after the first bathing, and in the Kings Bath you may tarry after the first bathing, at one time halfe an houre of the quarters of an hours, but in any wife tarry no time butill you

be faint, og that your frength faile you.

And if at any time you be faint in the Bath, then you may brinke some Ale warmed with a tolle. or any other supping, or grane Ginger, or if great nied be, Aqua composita, Methridatum, the bignesse of a Autherness at time, either by it selfe or mired with Ale or other siquor,

As long as rou are in any of the bathes, you wulk coner your head very well, that you take no cold thereof, for it is very perilous to take any cold on your head in the bath, or in any o-

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ther place buring your bathing time.

cover your solves very well, and day off the water from your body with warms cloathes, and then put on a warms thet and a Mantle, or some other warms gowns: for taking of cold, and so goe Araight way to your warmed bed, and sweat distinguished, and after that you may sepea while, but you must not drinke any thing till dinner time, except you be very faint and then you may take a little Sugar-candy, or a few Kaisins, or a little thin broth, but small in quantity to flake your thirst onely, because it is not god to drinke or eate by and

by after the Bath, butill you have dept awhile if you can.

After that you have flept and Iweat enough, and are clearely delivered from the heat that you had in the Bath, and in pour bed, then may you rife and walkea little, and lo goe to pour Dinner, foz by measurable walking, the enill vapours and windinede of the Comacke that are taken in the Bath be buinen as way and biterly aboyded.

After all this, then goe to pour dinner, and eate of god meates but not bery much, that you may rife from the table with fome appetite, to that you may eate moze if you would, and pet you

mult not eate to little foz becaping of your frength.

Let your bread be of god fwate meale, and of one dayes bas king of two at the mote, and pour meate well beiled of rolled, and especially let these be your meates, Mutton, Weale, Chiskins. Rabbets, Capon, Whelant, Wartrich, 02 the like.

Vou may also eate fresh water fish, so it be not muddy, as Geles and the like, reframe all falt fift, as Ling, Daberoine, &c.

auopo all fruit and raw hearbs, Sallet, and the like,

Apparrell your body according to the colonesse of the weather and the temperature of the ayre, but in any wife take no sold.

And if you hathe agains in the afternone, or after dinner, then make a very light binner, as a couple of poached Egges, a Cample, 02 forme other both with a Chicken, and then after foure of Aue houres your dinuer to taken you may bathe as gaine, and in any wife tarry not fo long in the bath as you bid in the fozenone,

Bou must at no time goe into the bathe, except you baue beneat Ante, either by nature of other wife, and if by no meanes it will be of it felfe, then take a suppositozie once in the

vayes at the least wife.

For all manner of Wormes.

Take Groundfell, and Plantine with the rots, and Campe them and fraine them with Balmue, and warme it, and give it the patient to orinke thee dayes together, it will kill al manner of wormes, and if you have a Ague, it will also rid it by Cobs grace.

A medi-

A medicine for the wormes in a child

Take Aqua composita that is made ofheards, and wath the brest of the childe, then take the powder of mirrhe, bery and beaten, and strew it by on the brest of the childe after that it is washed, and lay a warme cloth to it, and let it lye source and twenty houres.

For the wormes.

If it fortune the Chilo to ansyo a worms, as offentimes they soe, then take that Morms and dry it, so that you may make it into powder, and give it to the child to drinke in Ale or Mort, and it shall kill the rest of the Morms, or earle them to come forth alive.

For him that hath druske venome, and his belly be-

ginnethto fwell or ake,

Take græne Rew, washit, stamp it and temper it with white wine, and give it him to brinke.

To cleare the voyce.

Take Degany, Flope. Hatts-tongue, Clicompans, of Litopice, and of Fennell: and boile them together with cleane was ter, and so deinke it first and last.

A Medicine for the Tificke, and stopping in the brest,

and to open the pipes.

Take Partly-rotes, Kennell-rotes, Succory-rots, and take out the pith of them, and fath them in white Mine till they be soft, sath therewith Juniper verties, if you can get them, then straine it: when it is well soden, put Pellitory of Spaine to the Mine and

let the ficke drinke of it mozning and enening eight dayes.

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
