Bow Church-yard; BARCLAY & SONS, Fleet Market; HOWARD & EVANS, Long-lane; or SHAW & EDWARDS, St. Paul's Church-yard; each of whom likewise vend them retail; as do BACON & Co. 150, Oxford-street. WITHERS, Temple-bar; CLARKE, Borough, High-street; NEWBERRY, corner of Ludgate-street, St. Paul's; and briefly, *all general Medicine Venders in Town and Country*; nor can the remotest obtrude a counterfeit, if purchasers carefully reject what has not the engraving "J. HAYMAN, GOLDEN-SQUARE," in the Government impression of its Stamp. In which Stamp also, (since Mr. Butler's agency terminated) he universally writes "*Now of Twyford, Berks.*"

Patients still solicitous to have these Drops from the fountain-head, may notwithstanding do so, by addressing a line to "*Mr. Hayman, Twyford, Berks.*" and inclosing the amount of the number of either size Bottles they require, which will be sent, safely packed, to London; and thence to any place in the United Kingdom, or known parts of the world.

The two next letters shew some
of the consequences of his late
agent's mismanagement; who (to the

and *Portsmouth* to remain without

Plymouth, 12 May, 1806.

Captain Ducker, of the *Britannia*
Transport, writes that he has expe-

FROM GENERAL OBSERVATION
