At PERTH, and within the Town-Hall there, Thursday the Fifth day of February, Eighteen Hundred and Forty-Six years, at One o'clock afternoon,—

THE NINTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the QUALIFIED CONTRIBUTORS and SUBSCRIBERS to the COUNTY and CITY of PERTH INFIRMARY, called in terms of the Constitution;

CHARLES GRAHAM SIDEY, Esquire, Lord Provost of Perth, Deputy Chairman of the Institution, in the Chair;

THERE were produced and read to the Meeting the Report of the Directors, together with the Medical Reports applicable to the Patients treated at the House, and to those treated in the Dispensary Department, and an Abstract of the Treasurer's audited Accounts, all for the bygone year,—whereupon it was moved by the Rev. John Anderson, "That the Report now read be adopted, and, together with the relative documents, be printed and circulated;" which motion was seconded by John M'Euen Gray, Esq., and unanimously agreed to by the Meeting.

Thereafter it was moved by the Rev. Thomas Dymeck, seconded by David Chaigie, Esq., Banker, and unanimously agreed to—" That the thanks of the Meeting be given to the Directors, and the Medical and other Officers, for their valuable services during the bygone year.

And on the motion of Joseph Murray, Esq. of Ayton, seconded by David Hepburn, Esq., Writer, the Meeting unanimously re-elected and made choice of, and do hereby re-elect and choose, Robert Smythe, Esq. of Methven, to be Chairman, and Charles Graham Sidey, Esq., Lord Provost of the City, to be Deputy-Chairman of the Institution for the ensuing year.

The thanks of the Meeting were then, upon the motion of LAURFNCE CRAIGIE, Esq. of Glendoick, unanimously voted to Provost Sider for his conduct in the Chair.

REPORT.

THE Directors now submit to the Subscribers the Eighth Annual Report of the County and City of Perth Infirmary, embracing the proceedings of the year 1845.

During the early period of the bygone year, the number of patients, and consequently the ordinary expenditure, were much reduced, but towards its close, the numbers have rapidly increased; so that there exists no very great difference on the aggregate numbers and expenditure for the year.

The number admitted within the walls last year was 408, being sixty of a decrease on the number of the previous year. There have received medicine and advice at the House 349 persons, being a diminution of 76, when contrasted with the previous year. The District Surgeons have treated in their dwellings 476 poor persons, being less by 172 on the amount of the preceding twelvemenths. The whole numbers (after deducting double entries) thus made partakers of the varied benefits of the Institution are 1124.

Of fever cases, 65 were treated in the Infirmary, and 7 in their own houses—being 72 in all; which is 118 less than the fever cases of the previous year, whilst that year again had less by 100 than its precursor. These facts speak loudly of the preventive influence of the Fever wards over the spread

and continuation of contagion in one of its most fatal and extensive manifestations.

The cases of accidents have been unusually great during the year, amounting to 45 in number; and 24 operations, many of them of difficulty, have been successfully performed.

The Directors have much pleasure in referring to the very accurate and full Tables prepared by the Medical Officers, for complete information of their several departments of the Institution.

The previous year's Statement of Expenditure embraced a period of thirteen months, because of a change in the adjustment of periods, so as to make the term of the Medical and Financial Statements in future coincide—both now closing with the last day of each year.

The Subscription list of last year amounted to L.395, and that of the previous year to L.409. Whilst the Parochial and Congregational Collections for 1844 amounted to L.417, this most important source of revenue during the year 1845 yielded only L.332. The Donations, however, last year, amounted to L.251, including the munificent anonymous gift of L.100. The whole ordinary income of the bygone year, including interest on Stock-but excluding the before-mentioned donation and a legacy paid into the Stock Account-was L.957. The ordinary expenditure of the Institution-including salaries. house furnishings and repairs, and interest on the debt due the Bank over the sum standing to the credit of the Stock Account -amounted to L.1159, leaving an apparent excess of expenditure over the ordinary income, of L.202. There was a farther outlay of L.55 in the erection of a straw and lumber house, which has proved to be of great utility, as well for the safety of the main building against fire, as diminishing the premium of insurance. It is gratifying, however, to notice, that the total income from every source has met the ordinary expenditure for

the year, leaving only L.12 short—demonstrating, for the first time, what many have never believed—that the Institution can be easily maintained if its friends from time to time aid it according to the magnitude of its necessities and high importance as a great County benevolent institution.

The debt due to the Central Bank stood at the audit of 1844 at L.1015, and the amount of Stock Account in same Bank, bearing the same rate of interest, L.500. During the last year there has been paid into the Stock Account L.190, being the amount of the before-mentioned donation and legacy, making the whole amount of the Stock Account, with interest as at last audit, L 698. But, on the other hand, the apparent debt standing due to the Bank on the current account is increased to L.1291, which makes the actual debt due the Bank L.593.

The full details of these financial results will be found distinctly disclosed in the Treasurer's accounts. From the accurate Tables drawn out by General Lindsay, and printed with the last published Report, and adding the experience of another year, the average expenditure of the Infirmary, in all its branches, may now be safely estimated at L.1200, whilst the ordinary income, arising from subscriptions and congregational or parochial collections, have hitherto averaged L.1000, leaving an apparent annual deficit of L.200. This deficiency, however, will now nearly be met by the funded Stock of L.4000—but of which the Newbigging mortification of L.1000 may not be available for some years, being so far dependant on the lives of two aged annuitants.

In these circumstances, the Directors have had it already under their consideration, and recommend it to their successors in office, to consider whether it might not be expedient, rather than keep up a nominal debt to the Bank, at once to apply the existing Stock Account, and in addition, part of a bequest,

which has been announced as having recently opened to them, in . paying up the whole debt of L.1291 due to the Bank. They urge this measure with the hope that the continued liberality of the public may keep up the ordinary income of the Institution at the average above denoted, and which, with the interest arising from the funded Stock, would henceforth meet the annual ordinary expenditure. The Institution would thus be relieved from the existence of debt, and an assurance be given to those who may entertain kindly intentions to the Institution, that their legacies will in future not be applied to the extinction of debt, but will be funded so as to secure an annual benefit, which may at once lesson the pressure on the public, increase the benefits of the Institution, and secure the best guarantee for its permanency, by providing against any emergency, which might render its ordinary income precarious, at a period, too, when the demands for its benefits might be all the greater in extent.

Whilst on this subject, the Directors cannot refrain from alluding to the important source of revenue arising from Parochial and Congregational Collections. They look at this source as at once the most important in principle-regular and sure in its supply-and extensive in amount. These supplies have their origin in Christian Charity, where the whole population of a Parish or District, without distinction of sect or party, mingle their alms-deeds with their thanksgiving. In this mode a multitude of small gifts, of humble givers, can be collected, and together, accumulate an amount which far ex_ ceeds the individual contributions of many annual subscribers. The Infirmary of Aberdeen has long been almost wholly supported from this source, without almost any individual subscriptions. The Directors publish annually, a list, taken from the Almanac, of all parishes within the district, distinguishing the contributing from the non-contributing; and within these few days, the Directors of the Edinburgh Infirmary have resolved on a similar method of doing justice to those officials who do their duty, and of arousing the energies of the remiss. The Directors of the Perth Infirmary have no wish, at present, to follow these examples, being averse to adopt any step which might appear in the most distant degree as invidious. Nevertheless, they do invite a perusal of the Treasurer's Lists. A glance at these, for several years bygone, will disclose Parishes and Congregations where, to the praise of the Pastors and other influential persons, regular Annual Collections have been made, sometimes on the same day, and almost always at the same season. The result has been, that the annual amount has been generally sustained, and sometimes increased. Had it not been for these Parishes, the Institution must, before this time, have closed its door, or been incumbered with a hopeless load of debt. But justice painfully compels the Directors to record, that there are not a few Parishes and Congregations in Perth and the County, all within reach, and actually enjoying the benefits of the Institution, who have not, for years bygone, given any Collection to the Institution. This state of things ought not to exist; and the Directors fondly hope, that those on whom the duty more immediately rests will in future imitate the examples so set them by others, and afford their Congregations, and inhabitants of their districts, the opportunity, which they would all gladly embrace, to contribute, each to the best of his ability, to the cause of benevolence.

During the last year a Legacy of L.100, (less the duty) was promptly paid to the Treasurer, bequeathed by the late William Dron, Esq. of Blackruthven. The Directors have been recently informed, that the Institution is entitled to the residue of the estate of the late Miss Margaret Jaffray, of Perth, which it is reported may amount to about L.1400 (after deducting legacy duty), and is likely to be paid to the Treasurer in the

course of the current year. If the public give due heed to what the Directors have before expressed, they will not permit these munificent gifts, so honourable to the memory of the donors, to diminish their steady annual support of the Institution; but they will, by increased exertion, enable the Directors to fund as great an amount as possible of these bequests—certainly designed for its permanent, and not for its temporary support. It is only by a firm adherence to this rule that other affluent individuals may be induced to similar manifestations of good will.

But, by the Deed of Constitution, the retiring Directors may be re-elected.

The thanks of the Directors, the Public, and especially the Patients, are justly due to the Reverend gentlemen who have so kindly and anxiously attended to the religious duties of the House during the year, and a continuation of their spiritual over-charge is respectfully and earnestly solicited.

The Directors have again to record their unabated confidence and approval of their Office-bearers—their Medical Officers and others of their Household—for their unceasing and able management, an approval which continues to receive the sanction of the Public voice.

None have hitherto offered themselves for the advantages proffered in last year's Report, of being qualified, in the House, to act as Outdoor Nurses, neither has any movement been made to aid the Medical gentlemen in establishing a Museum of Pathological subjects. Perhaps neither matter has been sufficiently brought before the Public, and it is thought proper thus shortly to notice them as both worthy of public attention and support. If the Medical profession in Perth were to move, in the last mentioned matter, sufficiency of funds for a purpose so intimately connected with their important pursuits, would assuredly be speedily collected.

In conclusion, it remains only to the Directors to express their thankfulness to the Author of all good for the success that has hitherto attended their humble labours in this walk of Christian duty and benevolence. There is no charity which unites more the discordant feelings too often dividing society, even as to schemes of philanthropy. There is no charity where the amount of good is so cheaply purchased-so effectually and directly applied—so general in application—and so beneficial in results, alike to individuals as to society. The ravages of disease are arrested-contagion and pestilence are modified and restrained, if not stayed. The sick-the diseased-the haltthe maimed-and sufferers under disease of every painful form and variety, receive an Asylum-and treatment such as is best suited to their various cases and maladies. The Directors have every reliance on the continued and adequate support of such an Institution by a Christian public, and to their generosity they now kumbly appeal for its ample sustenance during the year now commenced-being the ninth since it first opened its doors to the calls of suffering humanity, and since which, no fewer than 8953 persons have enjoyed its manifold and important benefits.

During the past year, there have been fewer patients admitted, either to the Infirmary or to the Dispensary, than during the previous season. This might have been anticipated, as the community, in general, then enjoyed a greater degree of health than it has done for some years past.

During the year 1844, there were I465 patients in all, and during the past year, there have been only 1226, being a

diminution of 239. This result must be gratifying to every one. It would be taking, however, a very limited, if not a very unjust, view of the blessing of a healthy season to the labouring man in comparison with an unhealthy one, if he himself was alone considered. The suffering and privations which his family endure are frequently very great. Debt is too often contracted, poverty and want generally follow, and the once happy and contented family of the industrious labourer, is obliged either to the hand of private benevolence, or compelled to apply to the public funds for the bare necessaries of life.

Along with diminished numbers there, however, has not been a lower rate of mortality. In I844, the rate of mortality was 6.01, there having been 1297 cases treated to a termination, and 78 deaths; and during the past year, 1035 cases, and 69 deaths, being 6.66. If reference be made to the table of diseases, which have proved fatal, (No 3.) it will be observed that, with the exception of three, their were few deaths from any particular malady. These three were Bronchitis, Disease of the Heart, and Consumption. From the first there were five, from the second eight, and from the last thirteen deaths.

During the past year, there have been very few cases of Fever. There were treated in the House 65, and by the District Surgeons, 7 cases, in all 72, of these 4 died, being 5.5 per cent.

The class of diseases which have prevailed most, were those which affect the chest, such as Bronchitis, Disease of the Heart, and Consumption. Of the first, there were, of acute and chronic 81; of the second 23; of the last, 16 cases. The Diseases which effect the Stomach and Bowels were the next most frequent, such as Constipation, Diarrhæa, Dyspepsia, Dysentery, and of which there were, altogether, 99; of common Catarrh there were 63; of Itch 41, (but admitted for other complaints), of Rheumatism 44, and of Measles 39 cases.

The difference in the rate of mortality of these classes of disease was very striking; for whilst their are only 4 from Diseases of the Stomach or Bowels, there were no less than 30 from Diseases of the Chest, although the number of cases of the latter was less than that of the former.

Table, No. 4, is the list of operations that have been performed during the past year. These were 24 in number; 17 of which were cured, 3 relieved, 3 died, and 1 is still under treatment, with every prospect of a complete recovery. The operation of Ligature of the Carotid Artery was performed, in an attempt to save the life of a patient, endangered by a fearful Hemorrhage from a severe wound in the face. It was unfortunately, not successful, the patient dying in a few minutes after the operation was completed.

The only other observations which the Visiting Surgeons deem it necessary to make, is in reference to Table No.9 which gives a condensed view of the admissions and deaths in each month, and the admissions and deaths at the different decennial periods of life.

In the month of September there was the smallest number of patients admitted, being only 87: and in the month of December there was the greatest, being 131. In the month of June, one died; the greatest mortality was in the month of April, when there were 11 deaths.

During the Spring quarter of the year, there were 344 admitted, and 23 deaths; in the Summer 286 admissions and 12 deaths; in the Autumn 279 admissions, and 17 deaths; and in the Winter 324 admissions, and 17 deaths. By this we find that during the Spring months there were the greatest number of admissions as well as the greatest number of deaths; the smallest number admitted was during the Autumn; and the fewest cases of deaths were during the Summer months.

With regard to the liability to disease at the different periods

of life, it is well known, that there are more patients at the earlier ages than the latter ones. By the Table we find that the greatest number, in any decade, was between the ages of 10 and 20, being 238; and, as might be expected, the smallest between the ages of 80 and 90, being 4.

With regard to the rate of mortality, it is scarcely necessary to say, that it rapidly increases with the age of the patient, so that without farther comment, those who may be desirous of more information on this subject, will find it in the table itself.

In conclusion, the Visiting Surgeons have only to remark, that the Statistical Tables, given this year, have been altered and improved in form, at the desire of the Directors, and ordered to be continued so, unless changed by their authority.

The information which the Tables give is applicable to the whole of the Patients, whether In-Door or Out, so that whatever value they may have heretofore possessed, will, in future years, be greatly enhanced by a greater degree of fulness, accuracy, and regularity.

THE District Surgeons, in presenting to the public their eighth Annual Report, are prevented from entering into a lengthened detail of the transactions, as, to a considerable extent, those transactions are a mere matter of routine, the same duties falling to be performed year after year, thus necessarily confining them to a reiteration of the statements already made in former Reports. The Tables, however, afford ample information concerning the nature and termination of the diseases which have come under their treatment; there, also, the details will be found so minute as to render it unnecessary that much should be said in the way of explanation.

Making a total of 3802 who have reaped the advantage of this branch of the charity.

During the past year we have not been visited with any epidemic disease; the number of admissions has consequently been less than in the two years preceding. Fever prevailed extensively during the currency of the years 1843 and 1844; during the past year, on the other hand, this disease has scarcely come under our observation. Employment for the working class has been abundant, and, consequently, that fruitful cause of disease, destitution, has been little felt; and to this cause we think we are warranted in attributing the almost total immunity of our poorer brethren to the ravages of this malady.

As in former years we find that the diseases which have prevailed most extensively have been Catarrh, Bronchitis, and Measles. In our city the two former diseases are found peculiarly to prevail during the months of winter. Our situation is low, and infested with damp from the neighbourhood of the river. Often when Perth lies enveloped in clouds of fog, the adjoining high grounds of Kinnoull and Cragie have a clear atmosphere, with sunshine. This state of our winter climate no doubt tends much to create and foster diseases of the respiratory organs.

The number of deaths during the year has been 33, being (after deducting from the total 424, 54 sent into the House, and 19 irregular), a per centage of 7.7, or one death in 13 cases. This large mortality is to be accounted for by many of

our patients dying from incurable diseases. Some of whom were dismissed from the Infirmary as such before they came on our List.

The irregular cases amount to nineteen; several of these were found in circumstances enabling them to pay for medicine and attendance and were therefore discharged.
